A new school will be opening in Kellyville next year, starting with Kindergarten to Year 2, and is inspired by the principles of the Bahá'í Faith which teaches that every individual is a noble and spiritual being.

The principal at Esslemont College is Judy Navidi who has a 40-year career in education, spanning primary and secondary education, adult training and English as a second language. HCF and Healthscope Issue By BEV JORDAN

Negotiations between private health fund HCF and Healthscope which runs both Norwest Private Hospital and The Hills Private Hospital have broken down meaning that patients with HCF will be charged higher fees at the hospitals from February 1st.

HCF has emailed its members outlining the situation with Healthscope and saying if patients have any concerns or need to make alternate hospital arrangements to email HCF at HealthscopeEnquiries@hcf.com.au or call 1800 565 919. An HCF Group spokesman told *the Hills to Hawkesbury News:* "We're disappointed Healthscope chose to terminate our longstanding agreement, but we are still in negotiations.

"We're committed to keeping members informed of the changes, and will also be updating our website (hcf.com.au/healthscopehospitals) with information as it becomes available. We ask that members please stand by us, we hope to have alternative arrangements in place before the end of the transition timeline."

In its statement to clients HCF said: "Members shouldn't experience any disruption or unexpected out-of-pocket costs if admitted to a Healthscope facility before 31st January 2023. Members will be covered further until 31st July 2023 for certain treatment they have commenced or booked before 31st January 2023 (and longer for pregnancy)."

"Our guiding principle of putting health before profit means we remain focused on building long-term partnerships that deliver meaningful benefits for our members. This includes providing access to innovative models of care and alternate treatments at home, as well as securing purchasing arrangements to help keep the cost of health services and premiums affordable and deliver more value for our members."

A statement from Healthscope posted on the Norwest Private Hospital site called it a "disappointing outcome, and certainly not our preferred option."

The provider hit back at HCF saying: "Unfortunately, HCF were not prepared to fund the cost of providing private hospital care for their members, meaning HCF members will be required to make up the funding gap. The cost of providing quality hospital care continues to rise quickly, and is impacting both public and private hospitals, especially in the wake of the COVID pandemic.

"We have been challenged by health insurers not adequately funding the real and rising costs of our private hospital services, including rising interest rates, food, energy and power, insurance, nurse wages, PPE, maintenance and cleaning costs. These

cost pressures have been well documented throughout the pandemic, and are now being exacerbated by the highest levels of inflation seen in decades.

"We will continue to negotiate with HCF in the hope of reaching a fair agreement that removes the need for their members to pay additional out-of-pocket costs."

Healthscope says maternity patients who have pre-booked their hospital admission before 31 January 2023 will face no additional out of pocket charges if they are admitted before 1 November 2023.

HCF Members have been told that If they undergo treatment at a Healthscope hospital that starts between now and 31 January 2023, they will be covered (other than any excess that applies to their cover and other small permitted gaps). They can also attend ER at Norwest Private until 30th of April and pay normal gaps in cover. After that day the fees will be determined by Healthscope.

Healthscope says it has agreements in place with all other major Australian health insurers.

Lakeside Private Hospital at Norwest is unaffected as it still has a contract with HCF as does Hawkesbury Hospital at Windsor.

STUDENT KILLED

Detectives are investigating whether a 90-yearwoman driver suffered a medical episode during a crash in Carlingford on Thursday, 1st December after her car mounted the kerb, killing a teenage boy.

Calvin Wijeweera, 17, a Year 12 student from Carlingford High School was walking on a pathway near Carlingford Court with two friends when the incident occurred. They had just completed their HSC exams.

Police said the woman's car crashed into a van that was parke d at a residence near the path, pinning the teenager under the vehicle.

He was treated at the scene but could not be revived. One of his friends who was injured Twas taken to The Children's Hospital at Westmead. The third student was not hurt.

Flowers have been left at Rembrandt Street where the incident happened.

TRAFFIC NIGHTMARES

There have been several drink driving and speeding arrests made by Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol.

- A 17-year-old female P1 licence holder from The Ponds was stopped at about 7.20pm on Sunday the 11th of December near Gilbert Road, Castle Hill. Police say they observed a silver Kia Cerato travelling along Applecross Drive and watched two rear passengers seated on the rear door window with half their bodies out filming each other. The two rear passengers were 14 years of age. Only 20 minutes prior to being stopped, the driver was recorded travelling at 93 km/hr on Tuckwell Road Castle Hill which is sign posted 50km/hr. The driver was issued an infringement notice for P1 Driver Exceed Speed Limit - Over 30khp and 2 x Drive with Passenger 7 years or older by less than 16 years old not restrained as prescribed. Her NSW driver's licence was confiscated and suspended on the spot for a period of 3 months.
- A P2 licence holder was recorded travelling at 174kph on the M2 at Baulkham Hills about 7.30am on Sunday, 11th December. The male driver of the Ford Territory Doonside had four passengers in the car. DROWNING DEATH

The body of a teenage boy who disappeared whilst swimming in the Hawkesbury River at Windsor was recovered on Wednesday (14th December), just over four hours after he disappeared following an extensive search.

Officers attached to the Hawkesbury Police Area Command were called at noon following the disappearance of the 16-year-old.

A search of the river commenced, with assistance from specialist police including PolAir, police divers, as well as NSW SES, and the Toll NSW Ambulance Aeromedical service. His body was located at around 4.20pm.

The death is not being treated as suspicious. A report is being prepared for the Coroner.

There have been several drownings in the Hawkesbury River including a 16-year-old boy who died the day after being pulled from the water at the Hawkesbury River in January 2021 near Sackville and a 51-year-old man drowned while swimming in the river near Windsor in December 2020.

The driver was detected at about 2.30pm on Sunday, 4th December in a silver Holden Commodore on Windsor Rd Baulkham Hills travelling at 120 km/hr in a sign posted 60 km/hr zone. He was issued an infringement notice for Exceed Speed Limit - over 45 kph (6), Not comply P1/P2 high performance vehicle restriction (7) and Not Display P Plates (2). His NSW driver's licence was confiscated and suspended on the spot for a period of 6 months.
- The driver of a red Maserati was fined for travelling 57 km/hr over the sign posted speed limit of 100 km/hr on the M2 Motorway at Baulkham Hills at about 8pm on Saturday 3rd December. DRUG CHARGES

Three men arrested driving through Kellyville have been charged as part of an investigation into the supply of prohibited drugs across Western Sydney.

Police allege the men had over \$2m-worth of cocaine in the vehicle when it was stopped in Free Settlers Drive on Wednesday (14th December).

Strike Force Stickers was set up six months ago to investigate the ongoing supply of cocaine and other prohibited drugs.

Investigators from Penrith Region Enforcement Squad, with assistance from North West Metropolitan Region Operations Support Group, stopped the vehicle at about 1.50pm on Wednesday 14th December following extensive inquiries..

The three male occupants – aged 31 and two aged 29 – were arrested. Police searched the vehicle and located a cooler bag containing blocks of cocaine, with a total weight of 9.2kg, and an estimated potential street value of \$2.3 million dollars. The men were taken to Castle Hill and Riverstone Police Stations.

Later that day, search warrants were executed at homes in Shalvey, Rooty Hill and Blackett. Police seized electronic devices, cash, vehicle keys, luxury goods and other items relevant to the investigation.

A 29-year-old Rooty Hill man was charged with supply prohibited drug (large commercial quantity), and knowingly direct activities of criminal group.

The 31-year-old Blackett man was charged with supply prohibited drug (large commercial quantity), and participate criminal group contribute criminal activity.

The 29-year-old Willmot man was charged with take part supply prohibited drug (large commercial quantity), and participate criminal group contribute criminal activity.

Investigations under Strike Force Stickers continue.

Memorial to Bryson Anderson

Family, friends, dignitaries and police officers gathered at Windsor Police Station last week to honour the 10-year anniversary of Detective Inspector Bryson Anderson's death, and to unveil the Bryson Anderson Police Memorial.

The respected senior police officer was fatally wounded while responding to a neighbourhood dispute at Oakville on Thursday 6th December 2012 at a property on Scheyville Road.

During the course of the police operation he suffered serious stab wounds and, despite efforts of his colleagues and emergency services, he later died at Hawkesbury District Hospital.

His wife, Donna, and three children, Cain (now a probationary constable) Darcy and Olivia, attended the dedication of the memorial with Bryson's mother Shirely and his brothers.

The memorial includes three sandstone pillars, each with the words inscribed '*Courage*', '*Pride*' and '*Integrity*'. Names of officers who were members of the NSW Colonial Police Force (pre-1862) and those members of the NSW Police Force (1862 and onwards) who passed away while serving the Hawkesbury community will also be inscribed on the pillars.

Donna Anderson, Detective Inspector Bryson's Anderson's wife, said she was moved by the immense community support and that of his colleagues.



"To stand here 10 years on and to see the memory of Bryson honoured in such huge numbers is truly overwhelming and indicates just how truly respected Bryson was," she said.

"Bryson's murder has received significant attention on a level that was hugely overwhelming to my family and me; however, it was extremely comforting to know that we had the support and love of our family, friends, the community and the NSW Police Force.

"Our blue (police) family are ordinary people doing an extraordinary job in order to make our community a better and safer place."

Hawkesbury Police Area Command Superintendent Andrew Garner said the loss of Bryson was immeasurable. He said officers there at the time said: "There was an immense sense of loss, confusion, disbelief and devastation."

NSW Police Commissioner, Karen Webb gave an emotional address saying that the Bryson Anderson Police Memorial would ensure the legacy of distinguished fallen officers would carry through for generations to come and never be forgotten.



She said Bryson was a brilliant police officer who was also a retained firefighter and junior soccer coach, "a true hero".

"One of the toughest challenges for police is starting work each day not knowing what will happen yet understanding they may have to risk their own life to save another," she said.

"It is with great pride I dedicate this memorial and honour Detective Inspector Bryson Anderson, and those officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty, whose names are inscribed, remembering their selfless sacrifice and courage. They will not be forgotten."

The unveiling came just days before the shooting of Queensland Constables Rachel McCrow and Matthew Arnold in the course of a routine inquiry.



Axed Horse Course By VIRAG TOTH

The local equine industry is still fuming after TAFE Richmond shut down its Equine Unit and all of its corresponding courses at the start of the year, blaming funding cuts. The drastic move saw 12 TAFE staff lose their jobs.

Former head teacher of the TAFE Richmond Equine Unit Karlie Triffit said that the Richmond campus was one of only two facilities in the country that ran courses on trackwork and taught students on horseback.

"We had a program called Thoroughbred Industry Careers which produced about 100 students who went on to be successfully employed in racing. There are so many young people who aren't fortunate enough to grow up around horses, and we provided a way for them to work in the horse industry."

She said staff were so dismayed by TAFE's decision that they offered to step down to parttime roles. "We even spoke with Robyn Preston, the MP for Hawkesbury, to try and generate support and understanding. We were just trying to do the right thing by the TAFE and the industry, and we were treated like criminals.

"The government just wants to cut costs wherever and run it like a business, which it's not, it's an educational facility. TAFE didn't listen, no-one listened, they just tied our hands and legs together and said swim," she said. Lindy Maurice, founder of the not-for-profit program Thoroughbred Industry Careers, which was run through Richmond TAFE, described the process of lobbying and the ultimate closure as "deflating and stressful".

"The whole closure was all smoke and mirrors, it was like a vendetta against us. I established the program because I saw there was a gap in our industry to educate people properly, so I made it a mission of mine to try and help. All I can say is it's devastating. Our programs were really just gaining momentum and credibility. All our students were very welleducated, well-rounded people, and they were out in the industry flying the flag and growing our reputation," she said.

Annangrove resident Corinna Huskinson slammed the decision as "ridiculous".

"Our farriers used to have at least one or two apprentices, but for the last six months, if not longer, they have been turning up by themselves and have found it incredibly hard to find apprentices. Between Richmond, the Hills and the Hawkesbury, every other property has a horse. It's crazy to be shutting down equine courses in such a horse-dominated area," she said.

A TAFE NSW spokeswoman said TAFE's "training portfolio is aligned with emerging skills needs and changing labour market conditions".

"This means, TAFE NSW regularly reviews the courses it offers. As a result, in Western Sydney resources have been directed into peri-urban agriculture, animal sciences, childcare, aged care, disability support, and traditional trades."

"Almost 12 months ago, TAFE NSW ceased delivery of equine courses at Richmond following several years of declining enrolments. We will continue to review our local and state-wide course profile, to ensure our delivery prioritises the skills needs of local communities and industry. The equine industry in Western Sydney is serviced by a number of private training providers that teach the necessary skills required to work with horses," the spokeswoman said

She said that since 2021, the NSW Government had invested more than \$1.9 million at Richmond in classroom technology and new teaching equipment, including a new veterinary clinic and agricultural livestock facilities.

Top Place Developer

NSW Fair Trading has revoked the licence of Toplace, while the developer behind it, Jean Nassif, has had his building licence revoked for 10 years.

The disciplinary action comes after an investigation into Toplace's Atmosphere and Skyview developments at 299-309 Old Northern Road and 51-53 Old Castle Hill Road, both in Castle Hill.

Toplace has over 1,000 apartments under construction across Sydney and 24 projects in its development pipeline including: Box Hill City Centre; Hyda, Phoenix and Vela in Castle Hill; Grand in Kellyville and Watkins Street Town Homes in Baulkham Hills.

A NSW Fair Trading spokesperson said:

On 1st December 2022, NSW Fair Trading made a disciplinary decision regarding Toplace Pty Ltd. The disciplinary decision, due to take effect on 15 December 2022, cancels Toplace's contractor licence and permanently disqualifies Toplace from being the holder of any authority under the Home Building Act 1989 (NSW).

On 2 December 2022, NSW Fair Trading made a disciplinary decision regarding Mr Jean Nassif, the sole director and secretary of Toplace. The disciplinary decision, due to take effect on 16 December 2022, cancels Mr Nassif's supervisor certificate and disqualifies Mr Nassif for 10 years from being the holder of any authority under theHome Building Act 1989 (NSW).

This disciplinary action was taken following a NSW Fair Trading investigation of building work at the following developments: 299-309 Old Northern Road, Castle Hill, 15 and 18 Charles Street, Canterbury, and 51-53 Old Castle Hill Road, Castle Hill.

Fair Trading Minister Victor Dominello was quoted on Channel 9 as saying: "This is a double hammer blow, firstly it's a hammer blow against Mr Nassif but it also sends a warning signal to all developers who do

the wrong thing that we have a building commissioner with strong powers that will come after you."

A statement from a Toplace spokesperson posted on the NINE website said: Toplace will challenge the notices issued by NSW Fair Trading in court.

"We have always stood by our projects and where defects occur we will fix them like all other major developers. We remain committed to supporting our customers."

Dural Country Club Rescue

Dural Country Club is set to rescued by Parramatta Leagues Club in a multi-million-dollar deal to effectively save the club from going under.

Parramatta Leagues Club will inject \$5 million into reviving Dural Country Club, as well as pay off its debts, which are believed to be some \$3 million.

In a detailed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), Parramatta Leagues Club has guaranteed spending at least \$5 million within the first three years of the amalgamation, which will go towards upgrading, refurbishing and renovating Dural Country Club's premises and facilities. This includes upgrading the clubhouse itself, the bowling greens and also the bocce courts.

Within the first 12 months, Parramatta's plan includes renovating the main bar; installing new gaming machines; putting in facial recognition technology; and repairing parts of the building.

It also has visions to build a new alfresco area and kids play area; upgrade the existing function rooms; upgrade food and beverage facilities (kitchen); install outdoor lighting for bowls; upgrade the facilities for bocce; install an EV car charger and solar panels; and upgrade the audio/visual technology throughout the premises.

As part of the Amalgamation, Dural Country Club would be wound up. The MOU states the core property would not be "disposed of" for 10 years. According to the MOU, Parramatta intends to conduct a strategic analysis of the club's 58 existing gaming machines and depending on the outcome, would "either increase or decrease the number of gaming machines at the Dural Premises". It's believed Dural Country Club has been struggling financially for some time, with Covid placing extra pressure. Membership has been dwindling and the club cut its operating hours. Dural Country Club President John Puleo said the amalgamation would give the Board, members, and the club security and a future.

"We had difficulty with Covid lockdowns and we were not able to recover from that unfortunately. Also, we've had competition with newer hotels that have opened up around us, so that's not been easy either," he said.

"We see this as an ideal fit. Parramatta Leagues is very comparable to us, very sports orientated. They will continue to support the sub-clubs like the bocce, which is really important."

As part of the MOU, Parramatta Leagues plans to spend \$150,000 annually towards marketing and activities to increase brand awareness, and to grow membership. The two



bowling greens and bocce courts will remain for at least the first 10 years after amalgamation.

Parramatta Leagues said that prior to completing the amalgamation, it will make offers of employment to all of Dural's employees.

Parramatta Leagues Club CEO Chris Dimou said he saw the amalgamation "as a great outcome for members of both organisations".

"The PLC Group has a strong connection to the Hills District, including the thousands of PLC and Eels Members who live in the area. It is home to our future \$60 million Centre of Excellence & Community Centre at Kellyville and we currently provide significant grants to local sporting and community clubs within the area."

Windsor Landmarks 200 Years On By BEV JORDAN

This Sunday (December 18th) the bells at St Matthew's Anglican Church Windsor will ring out 200 times at 10.30am to mark the bicentennial of its Consecration by Rev Samuel Marsden.

Both St Matthew's and the historic Windsor Court House were designed by former convict Francis Greenway and are still operating as they were intended, 200 years on.

Attorney General Mark Speakman described the 200-year commemoration of Windsor Court as a milestone event.

"This building has stood in the centre of the Windsor township for 200 years, as the focal point for the administration of justice in the Hawkesbury valley," he said.

"When this building first opened in 1822, convicts were still being transported to Australia and Governor Lachlan Macquarie had not long returned to Scotland."

He said the Government was committed to ensuring the courthouse remained fit for purpose and retained its historic character.

Member for Hawkesbury Robyn Preston said the courthouse has been upgraded over the years to meet modern justice needs.

"Most recently, the NSW Government has completed upgrades to the existing safe room and remote witness room to help empower domestic and sexual violence survivors and vulnerable witnesses to give their best evidence in court. Additional restoration and landscaping works to preserve the building's unique heritage have also been carried out over the past month," Ms Preston said.

Hawkesbury Mayor Sarah McMahon said it had been a historic week for the area with the 200th milestones for both St Matthew's Anglican Church Windsor and the Windsor Courthouse.

"It is not widely known that the Hawkesbury was actually the third colonial settlement of Australia, after Sydney Cove and then Parramatta, in 1794 (although discovered earlier). That is why we have centuries old buildings, steeped in history and local significance," she said on social media.

"There are not many other places in Australia that have what we have - and as its current custodians, it is our duty to honour, commemorate and to share, so that future generations may be lucky enough to celebrate their 300th and 400th anniversaries."

Windsor Court House was commissioned by Governor Macquarie, designed by Francis Greenway, and built by William Cox, using convict labour.

William Cox was also responsible for construction of the road from Sydney to Bathurst and St Matthew's Anglican Church in Windsor.

Francis Greenway had the first building started on the site of St Matthew's torn down part way through construction because he said the work was of inferior quality. He sacked the original builder Henry Kitchen and the rejected bricks were used to build a wall next to the Macquarie Arms hotel in Windsor.

Greenway designed a totally new structure for St Mattew's and oversaw the stonemasons and construction workers.

Lighting Up Christmas for a Cause

Opera singer Viktoria Bolonina (pictured) thrilled residents in Grasmere Ave Northmead when she sang at the official launch of the Christmas lights at the Catajar family home.

The mezzo-soprano with Australian Opera who is currently undergoing her own cancer journey is the ambassador for the Kids With Cancer Foundation and this year Andy Catajar is fundraising for the charity with his illuminated home.

Viiktoria has been diagnosed with stage four brain cancer. A tumour the size of an orange was removed from her brain earlier this year and found to be malignant.

The mother of toddler Milana, reached out to the Kids With Cancer charity to ask how she could help saying she knew as an adult what having treatment was like and she wanted to help children facing a cancer diagnosis.

Tonight (Friday December 16th) she will again be on stage as part of the Christmas at the Domain carols concert. She has performed several times at the annual event since being a finalist on Season 1 of The Voice in 2012.

For Andy Catajar and his wife Carmen having their home covered in over a million lights is quite normal. The happy grandfather starts work on the decorating his home months in advance and has been a feature in the street for over 25 years. The family always raises money for children's charities and this year his light display will be raising money for the Kids with Cancer Foundation.

The display will set the street and suburb aglow every evening until 31st December but the biggest night is set to be Christmas Eve when there will be a barbecue with volunteers from Kids with Cancer Foundation and Christmas carols at a giant street party in Grasemere opposite the Catajar home.

It will be a well lit community barbecue. The 82-year-old said: "I have been creating my Christmas light display for more than two decades now, using it to shine a light for sick children.

"Kids with Cancer Foundation is a locallybased charity which does a lot of great work in my area, throughout Sydney and nationally and I am honoured to partner with them to raise awareness and funds to help kids with cancer."

The Castle Hill- based foundation has helped over 2,450 families, funded 186 clinical

positions and donated \$23 million to children's hospitals across Australia.

A spokesman for the charity said: "Near 800 children are diagnosed with cancer every year, and the team at Kids with Cancer Foundation, together with their supporters – such as Andy - are committed to making today easier and brighter for these children and families.

"Donations for Kids with Cancer Foundation will be welcomed at Andy Catajar's Christmas Light Up, via both a donation bucket plus QR code online donations, and Andy is also selling raffle tickets with fabulous prizes to help raise funds."

Hills Community Aid AGM By BEV JORDAN

Executive officer at Hills Community Aid, Mici Beer says the past year has been the busiest in the services 51 year history.

In 2022 HCA helped 2,824 clients with emergency relief, an increase of 289% from the previous year. HCA's Financial inclusion program gave out \$311,000 in gift cards to buy food this year which was up from \$170,000 in the previous financial year _ an increase of nearly 83%.

More than 7,200 people were referred to HCA's financial inclusion program during the 2022 financial year (7276).

Patron Michelle Byrne said the challenge for Hills Community Aid during the year had been to service more and more people on a limited budget with limited resources.

"It is vital that we continue to work together to ensure HCA is sustainable and in a position

Different pets grow to different sizes, have differing appetites and temperaments, and differing training and exercise needs. Please do your research carefully before deciding which pet is the right fit for your family, if any."

She said that if a family is certain that the responsibility of pet ownership is something that they are ready to take on, they should first consider adopting a pet from the Shelter rather than from a pet store or breeder.

"We have a large selection of beautiful cats and dogs just waiting for a second chance at a forever home. They are much cheaper than from a shop or breeder, and come with microchipping, lifetime council registration, desexing and their first vaccination," she said.

All cats at the shelter are currently \$29 until Wednesday December 21st.

SKIPPING ROPES 8 SPINNING TOPS

With Christmas comes thoughts of children and toys. In days gone by, before the advent of electronic and computer games and toys, life was much simpler. With the Depression of the 1930s and the deprivation following the war years of the 1940s families often "made do" with hand made toys or "hand me down second-hand toys"

Wood was quite plentiful whereas metals and plastics were very much in short supply. Wood, therefore, was often whittled or shaped to form such things as wooden spinning tops, skipping rope handles, or to build billy carts skipping rope handles, or to build billy carts or rocking horses. Wooden dolls' houses, toy farms, castles or forts were created. Other plentiful materials were used to make rag dolls, golliwogs, nurse's or cowboy outfits. My father once made me a toy farm with wooden buildings and a pond made from an old mirror. He once also bought me a second-hand Hornby Clockwork Railway for Christmas. Living in a cold climate country, my father also once also made me a sled. Taking it up a nearby hill in the snow I sat on it to slide down the hill only to find that it kept turning to the right. I guess one side must have been a little shorter than the other side. I just loved these toys at the time and spent many hours playing with them.

Many parents would spend time in the work shed or elsewhere with lathes or sewing machines creating wonderful simple toys for their offspring to be placed under the Christmas tree or at the bottom of the bed on of children past. The toys and gifts would have been created with love and affection by the parents and thankfully received by the children

of yesteryear. Children would be seen out in the street or park on Christmas day playing with their mates and with their toys and games. Boys would gather round for a game of street cricket and girls may be seen skipping with their ropes. Times have changed since those idyllic days. What children want now seems to be the latest computer games or robotic toys. The days of hand-made and robotic toys. The days of hand-made and home-built toys and games have gone into the history books.

Hannah wins Wheelchair Athlete of the Year Award

Acardia-born Hannah Dodd continues to raise the standards in Australian wheelchair sports. She is now Basketball Queensland's number one wheelchair athlete.

This follows a stellar year where she helped Australia win the silver medal at the 2022 Commonwealth Games in Birmingham in the highly-competitive in 3x3 wheelchair basketball event.

Hannah, who was born with sacral agenesis and spina bifida, also led the Australian team to the Asia-Oceania Basketball Zonal (AOZ) title in May.

Hannah said she was floored when she was named Basketball Queensland's Wheelchair Athlete of the Year.

The multi-talented athlete is currently playing in the Italian National Wheelchair Basketball League, where she continues to add new admirers to her exciting style of play. Her partner Steven Elliott plays alongside her in the same team, PDM Treviso.

Hannah told The Hills To Hawkesbury Community News from Italy that she was humbled to be honoured by the Queensland federation. "This is definitely a surprise to be named because there have so many great performances from other Queenslanders in wheelchair basketball this year," the 30-year-old said."I was informed by Basketball Queensland telling me I'd been awarded Wheelchair Athlete of the Year for 2022 and my first reaction was total surprise because I really didn't expect it."

Hannah moved to Queensland to study and play basketball. She still has time to turn out for Sydney Uni and Wollongong in the National Leagues.

In awarding our Hannah their Wheelchair Player of the Year trophy, Queensland Basketball said that the two-time, two-sport Paralympian has "emerged as one of the best low-point female wheelchair basketball players in the world".

"Hannah's success and commitment to excellence makes her a worthy recipient of the 2022 Wheel Chair Athlete of the Year Award," the association said,

Hannah skippered the Australian team which won gold at the 2022 Asia-Oceania Zonal (AOZ) championships to qualify for the 2023 world championships. She won the NWBL championship and bronze in the WNWBL championship. Hannah was named in the All-Star 5 and MVP for 1 point classification for the 2022 season. USTRALIA

"I now play only basketball competitively but I jump in a rugby chair every now and again as well as tennis and paddling on very rare occasions," Hannah said.

Speaking about her professional career in Italy, Hannah said: "I miss home. I grew up on acreage and I do miss the open space and farm life living in suburbia.

"But It's going well here in Italy. We're just over halfway through the regular season and about to stop for Christmas break before starting up again in the New Year.

"We have no plans for Christmas just yet, we'll probably do a little bit of travel but don't have that much time off with the season starting back the first week of January."
