Box Hill Land Dispute

A row between Hills Shire Council and the developers of The Hills of Carmel estate at Box Hill over the sale of land for parks and sport fields has reached a new level.

At Tuesday night's council meeting (February 7th) councillors approved a Mayoral Minute by Peter Gangemi calling for a report on compulsory acquiring land within the estate for community use.

The Hills to Hawkesbury Community News understands that Hills Shire Council made a formal offer to buy a large parcel of land within the master-planned estate for parks and sports fields but the offer was knocked back by the land owners in January.

General Manager, Michael Edgar is now preparing a report for Council setting out the processes and options to proceed "as expediently" as possible regarding the acquisition of land within the Hills of Carmel estate.

In his Mayoral Minute to Hills Shire councillors, Dr Gangemi said while council had opened new parks and sports fields in other areas of Box Hill and the neighbouring Gables development it had not been able to do the same in The Hills of Carmel development.

He said: "The rollout of parks and sports fields within The Hills of Carmel section of Box Hill has been slower than surrounding areas, and a number of community members have contacted myself and councillors on the matter. I want the community to know that as a Council, we are listening to you and are doing everything in our power to provide you the services you deserve."

He said Council has always sought to prioritise the acquisition of land as early as possible in the life of a precinct to keep the future costs of delivering local infrastructure down and had bought more than \$200 million worth of land from around 40 landowners within the precinct since 2014.

"As in all precincts, different landowners have different time horizons and different expectations and sometimes it takes time for the parties to agree. So far, Council has not needed to compulsorily acquire land in this precinct however that may soon be something Council needs to consider for some important open space, drainage and road projects.

"Despite making offers based on formal independent valuation advice to acquire land from this developer, and in contrast to our successful acquisition of land and delivery of community infrastructure elsewhere in the precinct, agreement has not been reached for the purchase of this land. I also understand that while frustrating for the community, commercial matters of this nature need to be dealt with confidentially at times. I feel that Council needs to appropriately consider its The Hills of Carmel in 1965 when it was Brahman cattle stud

option to progress the matter as expediently as possible within the processes available to us under legislation and also with the ambit of our available budgets.

"Residents within The Hills of Carmel deserve open space recreational opportunities, and as a Council, it is important that we do all we can on this issue for the community."

Hills Shire Council has recently opened new parks in Box Hill including Ceres Way Reserve, Equinox Drive Reserve and Hannaford Avenue Reserve. Construction has also started on the Brindle Parkway Sports Fields in Box Hill (pictured). The nearby Gables development also has a significant number of community parks that have been completed.

The \$1.3 billion development of the 223 ha Hills of Carmel, a former Brahman Cattle stud owned by Albert Scheinberg since 1960, was officially launched in 2013 with the announcement it would provide 2000 homes, schools, shops and sporting fields when completed in 2025.

POLICE PURSUIT

A disqualified driver caught speeding in Quakers Hill has been charged with Police pursuit - drive recklessly - not stop and Drive motor vehicle during disqualification period -2nd Offence.

Police from Riverstone Highway Patrol say they observed a white Volkswagen Golf travelling on Quakers Road in Quakers Hill at speed just after 11.15pm on Sunday 29th January.

The driver ignored police signals to stop and a pursuit was commenced through Marayong. The Volkswagen then moved to the incorrect side of Richmond Road at which time police terminated the pursuit.

A Police helicopter quickly identified the Volkswagen which came to a stop a short time later in Blacktown. Police converged on the location with the male driver arrested for the pursuit. Checks revealed that the driver was disqualified from driving until 2026 at the time of the offence.

FENCING CLUE

Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol have arrested and charged a 31-year-old man from Kellyville with drug and multiple stealing offences. He is due before court this month.

He was stopped by police at about 5.15pm on Saturday 21st of January by officers patrolling Commercial Road at Rouse Hill who sighted a white Toyota Hilux carrying temporary fencing.

Officers were aware of recent thefts of temporary fencing and stopped the vehicle. Checks on the vehicle's registration confirmed that the number plates attached to the Hilux were stolen from a Castle Hill address a few weeks earlier on 4th January.

The driver was questioned about the stolen number plates, but he alleged that the vehicle was borrowed and could not provide any further information to Police. He could not provide information of ownership of the fencing either. He was subjected to a roadside breath test which returned a negative result but the roadside drug test returned positive to methylamphetamine.

Officers arrested the driver and conducted a search of the vehicle locating rolls of copper, drug paraphernalia and a white crystal-like substance which was seized for analysis. The driver was conveyed to Castle Hill Police Station where the secondary drug test returned positive to methylamphetamine.

Officers continued the investigation of the stolen number plates while the driver remained in Police custody. CCTV footage was obtained from the Castle Hill address where the number plates were stolen from. The driver was charged. Officers from the Hills Highway Patrol are continuing with their investigation.

TEENS ARRESTED

Two 17-year-old males have been charged with numerous offences relating to Break and Enters and Steal Motor Vehicle at premises in Kellyville, Bella Vista, Box Hill and The Gables just before Christmas.

On January 30th Hills Proactive Police attended an address in Mt Druitt where the first 17-year-old was arrested. He was taken to Mt Druitt Police Station where he was charged with 30 offences including:

- 7 x Enter vehicle or boat without consent of owner
- 7 x Larceny value <= \$2000
- 4 x Take & drive conveyance w/o consent of owner
- 9 x Dishonestly obtain financial advantage etc by deception
- 1 x Aggrevated enter dwelling in company intent to steal <= \$60000
- 1 x Participate criminal group contribute criminal activity
- 1 x Learner not accompanied by driver/police officer/tester

A second 17-year-old male, this time from Marsden Park, has been charged at Riverstone Police Station with 28 offences relating to Break and Enter and Steal motor vehicle. They include:

- Larceny x 7
- Enter vehicle without consent of owner/occupier x 7
- Take and drive conveyance without consent of owner/occupier
- Be carried in conveyance without consent of owner/occupier x 3
- Dishonestly obtain financial advantage etc by deception x 7
- Agg enter dwelling in company intent to steal <=\$60000
- Participate criminal group contribute criminal activity
- Learner not accompanied by driver/police
 officer/tester

SPEEDSTER STOPPED

Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol have suspend the licence of an 18-year-old P1 licence holder allegedly seen travelling 71 km/hr over the sign posted speed limit at Bella Vista.

The red P-Plater was spotted at about 5.50am on 29th January when officers were conducting stationary speed enforcement along Old Windsor Road at Bella Vista. The yellow Toyota C-HR was detected travelling at 151km/ hr in a sign posted 80km/hr zone.

Police stopped the vehicle and spoke to the driver who allegedly stated, "I need to go to the toilet." The driver returned negative results for alcohol and drugs.

The driver was issued an infringement notice for Exceed Speed Limit - over 45 km/hr, his NSW driver's licence was confiscated and suspended on the spot for a period of 6 months. The vehicle was not owned by the driver and the number plates remained on the vehicle.

DRINK DRIVER

A 45-year-old Schofields man has been charged with exceed speed, and mid range drink driving after being stopped in Glenwood. It will be alleged that at 8.10pm on Friday the 27th January officers from Hills Highway Patrol, detected the man driving on Old Windsor Road at Glenwood at a speed of 164kph in a posted 80km zone driving a white sedan.

When stopped, he returned a positive roadside breath test. He was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station, where he returned a reading of 0.09. His licence was suspended.

FIREARM AMNESTY

Police are reminding people to make an appointment when handing in items under the Firearms Amnesty after someone handed in two 9L buckets full of hundreds of rounds of ammunition.

The Firearm Amnesty allows for firearms or firearm related articles to be registered, supplied or surrendered to a participating firearm dealer or surrendered to a police station without fear of prosecution.

Police say ensure you contact the participating firearms dealer or your local police station, prior to attending the location with a firearm, firearm related article or prohibited weapon.

Before taking a firearm to a participating firearms dealer or a police station, make sure the firearm is unloaded and where possible, remove the bolt or other method to render the firearm safe. Place the firearm in a gun bag or wrap in a blanket. Ammunition can be taken at the same time as a firearm; however, it must be stored in a separate bag, box or container.

New Line Road Concerns Continue

Residents have once again expressed concern and frustration over traffic, congestion and safety along New Line Road, despite a \$70 million upgrade pledge from the NSW Government.

NSW Transport carried out consultation with the local community and road users towards the end of last year in a bid to identify development options for the New Line Road corridor.

The 'Have your say' consultation resulted in three main themes:

- Congestion (particularly at the key intersections of Shepherds Drive/County Drive, Hastings Road/Sebastian Road and Old Northern Road)
- pedestrian and bike provisions
- safety at existing roundabouts.

Concerns were also raised about the need for more active transport and pedestrian infrastructure along New Line Road. Once again, suggestions were made to widen New Line Road with two lanes of traffic in each direction.

In his Budget announcement in June, NSW Treasurer and Hornsby MP Matt Kean pledged \$70 million, saying the funds would go towards widening New Line Road from single lanes to dual carriageways between Purchase and Hastings roads. At the time, Mr Kean said the much-needed upgrade would widen the Pyes Creek Bridge to improve traffic flow and effectively make "an enormous difference to those that live and travel through the area".

In this latest community consultation, residents said they were concerned that widening New Line Road between Purchase Road and Jenner Road would lead to an increased volume of traffic.

The consultation found:-

- Concern regarding congestion on New Line Road near Purchase Road, particularly during school pick up and drop off times.
- Suggestion to provide an overpass at Pyes Creek to increase number of lanes available.
- Suggestion to widen New Line Road between Purchase Road and Jenner Road to three lanes in either direction to future proof the road.
- Request for the provision of a bus lane on New Line Road.
- Request for New Line Road to be made into a dual carriageway from Castle Hill Road to the roundabout at Old Northern Road.

The next big area of concern for residents was the section from Boundary Road to Purchase Road. Several suggestions were received to install traffic lights at the roundabout of County Drive/Shepherds Drive and New Line Road to aid in managing traffic and pedestrians during peak hours. **The community feedback included requests for**:

- Traffic lights with a pedestrian crossing on New Line Road near the bus stop between the intersection of Boundary Road and New Line Road and County Drive/ Shepherds Drive.
- More pedestrian crossings and a request to move the existing pedestrian crossing on Shepherds Drive closer to the Roundabout.
- A pedestrian overpass or underpass to be installed at the intersection of County Drive/ Shepherds Drive and New Line Road.

The Government has said the community's feedback will be "considered as part of the future planning development of this corridor".

Further engagement with the community is expected to occur this year.

This smiley little girl is KYAH.

She's six years old, full of sass and makes friends with everyone she meets.

EMILY LOWE, 21, was named as Hawkesbury's 2023 Young Citizen of the Year. Emily joined Tennyson Rural Fire Station as a Junior Volunteer in August 2013.

During this time, Emily has been involved in community education and preparedness initiatives through the Rural Fire Service where she has also been an active firefighter responding to incidents around the Hawkesbury.

She has been deeply involved in the response to multiple disasters that have directly impacted the Hawkesbury community including 2019/2020 Gospers Mountain Fire and the multiple floods the Hawkesbury has seen during 2020 to 2022.

In 2021 and 2022, Emily also participated in the Starlight Foundation Super Swim Fundraising Challenge. Through this challenge over two years, she achieved and exceeded her fundraising goals, raising hundreds of dollars by swimming over 40kms. Her citation read: "Emily has excelled in an organisation with an under- representation of young women. She is an inspiration for many women and young people to join the Rural Fire Service and to volunteer in the Hawkesbury community."

LOCAL HERO: MITCHELL BRENNAN. In 2019, he fought the fires in Wisemans Ferry as a Rural Fire Service volunteer. He fought the fire for weeks on end and received an award from the Rural Fire Service Commissioner for this work.

During the first flood in 2020, he helped deliver goods to residents over many weeks and assisted with the flood clean up.

In the floods of March 2022 and July 2022, Mitch was yet again delivering goods to the Hawkesbury community and cleaning up again. He was one of the few people who knew the river well and was also truly aware of the needs of the community.

which performers can build their confidence and skill. Many performers have moved into professional careers within their chosen field including elite international ballet and dance companies, acting, teaching, law and more.


The Eisteddfod Society helps the Hawkesbury community by bringing together families, teachers, and performers and boosting tourism.

Bluey The Platypus By BEV JORDAN

Bluey the shy Australian has just been tagged and released back into Cattai Creek by a team researching the health of the platypus population in the Hawkesbury-Nepean River Catchment. The study will continue over the next three years.

It's very much a night job, conducted from dusk to dawn when the platypus come out of their burrows at night to forage.

The healthy monotreme was found by Dr Michelle Ryan, Senior Lecturer Ecology and Environmental Science from the School of Science, Western Sydney University and PhD candidate Katherine Warwick (pictured on the cover) close to midnight the day after Australia Day.

CHEN (Cattai Hills Environment Network) and Dr Ryan have been investigating the platypus population in the Cattai and Little Cattai Creek Catchments for the past four years looking at environmental DNA (eDNA) in water samples taken at a number of sites at different times throughout the catchment.

"Sample analysis has shown that platypus are present in Cattai Creek and use the entire length of Cattai Creek, from Castle Hill to Cattai. Platypus are also present in many of the creeks and tributaries of Cattai Creek," said Dr Ryan. When Bluey was captured he was measured, weighed and given a quick health check, which he passed with flying colours. He was also microchipped to monitor his movements and check his growth and development over the next few years.

Dr Ryan said the tagging is vital for research: "This is important so we can see how platypus use the creek system and we can monitor their health.

"So far, the platypus captured have been in good condition. This is telling us that there is a good food source for the platypus in the creek. Platypus eat waterbugs and waterbugs are a great indicator of water quality, but more work needs to be undertaken.

"The floods had a large impact on our local creeks. We have seen that the riparian zone (vegetation along the creek) has been greatly impacted and removed in many areas. This has led to an increase in sedimentation and silt into the creek system. This sedimentation and siltation

can impact the availability of waterbugs for platypus to eat. "

Dr Ryan said people needed to be mindful of what they put down stormwater drains and not littering.

- The platypus (Ornithorhynchus anatinus) is an egg-laying mammal which is only found in Australia. The male has venom in the spurs at the base of its hind legs.
- It is one of the most unusual animals in the world and when European naturalists first examined a preserved platypus body in 1799 they thought it was a fake and made of several animal parts sewn together. The first occurrence in the fossil record of a platypus-like monotreme

Our first winner was Linda from Kings Langley who has been reading the paper for several years.


She said: "I love reading local news and finding out what is going on and I love the history pages."

Nursing students will start their Bachelor of Nursing degree at the new University of Canberra Sydney Hills (UCSH) campus at Castle Hill this month.

The first intake for the three-year full-time course has been limited to 60 students in Semester One 2023 at the state-of-the-art campus


"We know there is high demand for health courses, particularly in this locale and internationally, so the establishment of the campus has received strong support from local community groups and council."

Peak Pursuits

Peak Pursuits Castle Hill takes indoor climbing to a whole new level.... literally! It is unlike any climbing centre we have been to so far and certainly one we can't wait to visit again soon.

Nestled in the Victoria Avenue trading zone, Peak Pursuits is 400sqm of climbing challenges and activities many of which aren't for the faint hearted. There is more than just rock climbing walls on offer and we certainly were conflicted as to what to climb first.

Connected to the auto belay system, there was little to fear as my daughters climbed the giant rope spider web and attempted to scale the wall on the cat burglar climb. The Galaxy Climb with UV glow in the dark rocks also provided much delight as did the tube cargo net which the girls climbed with ease. Other vertical activities provided much more of a challenge such as the SAS log climb which required using a rope to pull yourself up a horizontal wall of logs as well as the urban glass tower climb that required much concentration to get to the top. The bean stalk, donut tyres and the rope ladders created an opportunity for a race to see who could get to the top first.

Up in the air is the high-ropes course which does require some courage to give it a go. There is a rickety bridge, a tight rope bridge, swinging steps, a zigzag beam and a cargo net. Alexis and Maddie were brave but the sheer height and watching the ropes and steps sway soon put them off from completing the course.



The Kung Fu Poles was also a challenge with the poles getting higher and higher as you scaled from one to the next, climbing higher and higher towards the ceiling. Neither of my daughters made it to the top of the highest pole but they certainly enjoyed swinging back down to the ground on the auto belay system.

The highlight for Maddie and Alexis was the big drop giant slide which is very steep and involves being mechanically winched to the top of the slide before letting go. First attempt they only made it halfway up the slide before letting go but the second time around made it to the top before letting go. It requires upper body strength to hold onto the winch for so long before dropping.

Peak Pursuits is for all ages and offers a range of challenges to suit all abilities and fitness levels. Some challenges such as the Leap of Faith require participants to be over 15 and the high ropes course is restricted to children over 5 and 1.2M in height unless accompanied by an adult. A 1-hour session was more than enough, and we were certainly tired by the end of the hour.

If you are looking for a challenge and something different to do that's indoors, Peak Pursuits is well worth a visit. You will get a workout as well as a lot of laughs and entertainment at the same time.

Why Hills ace Molly is a natural for Dakar Rally

Australia's all-conquering rally champion Molly Taylor finished a gutsy 12th at the 2023 Dakar Rally, the world's toughest event, despite a collision on the eighth stage.

The Hills local was delighted at improving on her performance in the T4 Modified Production SSV Class – with co-driver Andrew Short having finished 14th in her debut Dakar Rally in 2022. Last year, she also showed her amazing courage at tackling SAS Australia, a Seven TV series where contestants are pushed to the very limit of their endurance.

Molly, 34, is as brave as they come. With rallying running through her veins, Molly and Short showed incredible fortitude to complete the near 9000km Dakar epic held in Saudi Arabia from December 31-January 15.

"I have definitely improved on my performance at the Dakar Rally compared to our first time, our pace was strong and our navigation was better," Molly said. "We were a lot stronger but we did have some technical issues which meant we could not get the results we wanted.

"Yes, our goal is to be there next year to put together the result we know we can do."

Speaking about the incident which saw their vehicle T-boned, Molly said: "It was a pretty

crazy stretch on the sand dunes and as we came out on top, a ute was coming from the opposite direction directly at Andrew's side."

Fortunately, none of them were hurt. "Certainly, it was not something you expect at the top of a blind," Molly said. "Fortunately, it was not a big hit. We lost only a minute or two and in the scheme of things in the Dakar Rally, it wasn't that big a deal."

The multiple Australian rallying champion spent a few weeks during Christmas with the family in The Hills, saying it is something she missed while on tour.

The Dakar Rally has always been one of the things Molly was keen to compete in because every January, her family will watch the gruelling event on TV.

She acknowledged the immense value of competing in SAS Australia, saying she is able to use the experience and skills not only in her rallying career but also in her daily life.

"This was pushing yourself to the absolute brink.... and knowing how to respond," Molly said. "It gave me a lot of self-confidence when



things get tough and put a perspective on everything we do in life.

"SAS Australia is definitely the hardest thing I have ever done and the Dakar Rally is the next most challenging event. SAS showed how much we are capable of and has helped me in rallying and life in general."

For all her international adventures and fame, Molly is a Hills girl at heart: "I have travelled to all the cool places around the world but there is nothing like home. Coming home is the reset I needed.

"Nothing feels as nice as sitting on the grass at my home in The Hills – definitely it's the place I want to be."

MEMORIES WITH IVOR JONES & FRIENDS

SCISSORS & SILHOUETTES SHORT STORY OF SCISSORS JOHN

Many older Aussies would recall the master of the scissors cutting out silhouettes. That man was Sebastian John Ross who was seen at agricultural shows around the country and at places such as Luna Park.

Known as just S. John Ross, he was born in America and served in the US Army during WW2 in the Philippines and Australia. Whilst in Sydney he met and married his wife, Florence Phyllis Counsell (known as Phyllis). They married in February 1945. He took her with him back to the US but after just a short time they returned to Australia in 1946 where they lived at Falcon St, Hazelbrook. He then started to embark on his travels to various shows setting up a small booth at the shows displaying silhouettes he had created of famous people He had learnt his trade back in the US in the 1930s from silhouette artist Budd-Jack.

I first came across him in the 1960's when he cut my silhouette. I cannot recall exactly where but it may have been at either Sydney Town Hall or the Trocadero in George Street, Sydney. He had performed his trade at numerous locations such as Centrepoint Tower (now Sydney Tower) and for quite a while at Sydney's Luna Park as well as the aforementioned agricultural shows. He was quick and prolific with his creations. He also created silhouettes of our daughters. He worked quickly with a pair of small scissors, cutting portraits from thin matt black card. He usually concentrated on the profile of a sitter but would also enhance the portrait by snipping out a few details. Each portrait was mounted on a white card. The likenesses were remarkable, so that it was easy to recognise the famous faces that were on display. He claimed that not everyone's face was suitable for profile portraits and that he was selective as to whom he would portray.

During his lifetime he created tens of thousands of portraits during his 60 year long career and Vivian Leigh, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Nicole Kidman, Sir Robert Menzies and Queen Elizabeth II are among his famous sitters. Before he joined the US Army, he also worked in Hollywood where he created silhouettes of some of his early celebrity 'cuts' including Stan Laurel, Al Jolson, Spencer Tracey and Mickey Rooney. During his war years, whilst he was working with General Douglas MacArthur he continued his "hobby" of creating silhouettes and created silhouettes of MacArthur and celebrity entertainers such as Bob Hope.

John was held in high regard by all in the Australian Show Society, being given many Show legend awards. When receiving one of these awards John always said jokingly that he would "rather be a live legend than a dead one". He also claimed that only the Australian Taxation Office knew what the "S" in his name stood for. He was sometimes referred to as Scissors John.

Ross Eastgate, a military historian and journalist, said of Ross that "He was not tall in stature, but he was a giant in Australian entertainment."

In August 2008, S. John Ross did not attend the Brisbane Ekka as usual. John had previously taken ill at Cairns during his annual northern Queensland show tour and returned to Sydney where he was rushed to Westmead Hospital. Sadly, after some four weeks in hospital, S John Ross passed away on Sunday August 24, 2008 with his wife Phyllis (1918-2011) and younger son Philip present. John was aged 89.

Phenomenal Noah crowned Junior Sports Person of the Year

NOAH KEMP is a phenomenal sports ace who is the number one swimmer in Australia in his age group and a champion athlete to boot.

Noah is unbeatable in swimming and athletics in his age group with a swag full of gold medals plus national and state records. From the age of seven, Noah has blazed a magnificent trail at Hawkesbury City Little Athletics Club and Windsor Swim Club outclassing virtually everyone on the track and in the pool.

The 11-year-old Noah was recognised for his countless records with the Junior Sports Person of the Year Award at the 2023 Hawkesbury Council Australia Day honours.

At the 2022 Swimming NSW Championships, Noah won six gold medals and set two NSW records. Following his amazing feats, Noah was ranked first in Australia (in his age group) for the 100m freestyle, 100m butterfly, 100m backstroke, 50m freestyle, 50m butterfly, and 50m backstroke. At the 2022 Swimming NSW Short Course Championships, Noah won a total of eight medals, six gold, and two silver.

Two of the swim records he has broken had been untouched for more than 24 years,



showing that this youngster is set for bigger things. He is the first 11-year-old Australian to go under 30 seconds in both the 50m butterfly and 50m backstroke events.

One of Noah's champion qualities outside the pool and track is to help and encourage his competitors. He wants to make it to the 2032 Brisbane Olympics, and if he maintains this stupendous form, we should be hearing more about this exceptional swimmer.

Noah won gold medals in all seven events he contested at the 2022 School Sport Australia Championship in Brisbane, to be named Male Swimmer of the Meet. He also set four NSW records at this event.

To put his sporting achievements into perspective, consider this: Noah holds 26 State and NSW All-Comers records, three Queensland All-Comer records, four NSW Metropolitan records, in addition to countless Metro North West, Windsor Swimming Club and Hawkesbury District records.

The youngster with the golden touch is also a three-time Hawkesbury District Swimming and Hawkesbury District Athletics Champion.

Youngest English Channel swimmer honoured

MICHAEL PAYNE, the youngest swimmer to complete a solo crossing of the English Channel, has won the Hawkesbury Special Achievement Award at the 2022 Australia Day Awards Ceremony.

Michael was just 17 years when he completed the arduous 32km swim in very cold temperatures in July 2022. The brave Colo High School student overcame strong currents, waves, and cramps to reach Cap Griz Nez, France, in 12 hours, and 48 minutes.

Swimming the English Channel is one of the world's most famous achievements, and to prepare for his biggest test, the Nepean Aquatic Centre SC star trained hard under coach Jackie Barck in the company of his team mates.

Michael also swam in Lake Wallace, Wallerawang near Lithgow, to get used to swimming in cold conditions. Sessions in the Nepean River in Penrith and Windsor also saw him tackle muddy conditions with floating debris in preparation for his channel marathon.



He received the Special Achievement Award during the recent Australia Day celebrations hosted by Hawkesbury City Council, along with other winners.

"Always looking for another challenge, Michael made a formal application to swim the English Channel in 2022," Hawkesbury Council said during the awards ceremony.

"Swimming the English Channel is considered one of the ultimate challenges for long-distance swimmers. It is a test of physical and mental endurance. The cold water, strong currents, and waves make it an incredibly difficult swim."

When he is not working, spends his time at the grounds talking to the youngsters and members to find out what can be improved. He also ensures that the facilities are clean and professionally looked after.

"The club needs anywhere from 10-20 volunteers each game day and we welcome new members," Giles said. "The best part about volunteering is when you see players develop not just at football but as people."


