

SAVE THE DATE: Saturday May 20th and head on down to Castle Hill Showground for the huge purple-tinged community gathering that is Hills Relay For Life.

The annual 24-hour community event raises funds for cancer research and support programs. The event will be the 22nd organised by a volunteer community committee to raise funds for the Cancer Council.

The first lap of the track is for Cancer survivors and carers which will be followed by a special morning survivors and carers morning tea. The twilight candlelight ceremony of Remembrance starts at 6pm.

There are 60 teams already registered for the 2023 Hills Relay including local businesses, schools, service groups, churches, youth organisations and groups of families and friends. You don't have to run at the Hills Relay For Life, in fact most participants walk and talk around the 400m track at Castle Hill Showground, but this year will be the added value of pedal power. Trek Cycles is setting up a 24-hour cycle challenge for Hills Relay For Life participants as part of the activities around the track at Castle Hill Showground.

The aim is to register for the cycle challenge and be part of the push to keep a static exercise bike in motion for 24-hours during the Hills Relay For Life. The highest fundraising team in the challenge will win an Electra Townie Go eBike valued at \$2,400 donated by Trek Cycles at Rouse HIII.

Eamon O'Neill who will be running the challenge said getting involved with a personal journey as he lost someone close diagnosed with skin cancer. "This is an opportunity to help. I have a passion for cycling."

Chairperson Lisa

Carruthers said the trackside activations would keep people moving and entertained during the day and also included a box car rally and a fancy hat parade with onstage entertainment appealing to all ages.

'There is such a carnival atmosphere at Relay," said Lisa. "As you walk around you see neighbours and friends catching up and there is so much to see and enjoy. You really can see four generations in action to make a difference in the cancer journey."

She thanked all the sponsors and supporters but in particular the Purple sponsors: Castle Towers, CHRG (Castle Hill RSL Group) and Event Cinemas Castle Hill.

Everyone interested in having a team as well as registered team captains are urged to attend a Hills Relay For Life Information Session at Castle Hill RSL (Luxe Lounge) on Tuesday 4th April at 7pm.

Individual registration is \$30. There is a group family registration available for \$70. Under 8s are free to attend. Registration for 8-13 years is \$15 with student tickets \$20 with a student card.

Resident Protest Grows by ANNETTE MADJARIAN

Hills Shire Council has continued to come under fire over its plans to redevelop Fred Caterson Reserve, Castle Hill's last mass natural bushland, in exchange for an elite rugby sports precinct worth tens of millions of dollars.

More than 100 residents, environmentalists and politicians, including Hills Mayor Peter Gangemi, met at Castle Hill Bowling Club on Sunday 18th March to discuss the contentious issue.

One of the meeting's organisers, Castle Hill resident Andrew Tonkin, said residents made it very clear they did not support Council's Masterplan which makes room for a highperformance rugby facility for the Eastwood District Rugby Union Football Club.

In November 2020, Hills Council adopted its Masterplan showing that 23,710 square metres of vegetation would be bulldozed to accommodate the rugby precinct.

But residents and environmentalists contend that the plan would see the loss of 52,821 square metres (13 acres) of bushland, including the removal of hundreds of trees.

Save Fred Caterson Reserve, a group of residents and environmentalists, said not only trees and habitat would be demolished, but that the integrity and character of the reserve and surroundings would be compromised. They say they are also concerned about the threat to local fauna and flora, with the Reserve home to several threatened species of animals and plants.

The rugby facility will be developed on the former Pony Club site and will include three playing fields (including synthetic fields) and

associated infrastructure, including lighting, drainage, irrigation, amenities building/s and a car park. There would also be upgrades to the existing sporting facilities - soccer, tennis, baseball, basketball and BMX bike riding.

Eastwood Rugby's General Manager Robert Frost said he hoped the relocation to Fred Caterson would occur as early as next year.

Residents claim they were not consulted adequately about Council's plans. A Friends of Caterson Reserve petition against the redevelopment had more than 12,700 signatures by Thursday, March 23rd.

Council has said its Masterplan will "cater for existing and future residents, with the reserve being in close proximity to the State Government"s Showground Precinct, which will grow by another 11,000 people in the next 10-15 years and by more than 20,000 people once the precinct is fully developed".

Last month Council announced that the Castle Hill Showground Arena would be transformed into a "modern venue for large scale community and sporting events", thanks to \$11.475 million in WestInvest funding from the NSW Government.

Residents are now questioning why Castle Hill Showground was not being considered as a venue for Eastwood Rugby.

A council spokeswoman responded to questions from this paper by referring to an updated Master Plan on the council website. (See council story pages 16 and 17).

The updated Plan said... "investigations and studies including ecological assessments and an arboricultural report which are currently being finalised, have informed the current Concept Plan with an emphasis on retaining the majority of the Critically Endangered Ecological Community (CEEC)... and minimising the disturbance to the Sydney Hinterland Transition Woodland to the south-east of the site".

It also states that: "only a very small number of trees will require removal from the CEEC".

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WOMAN, 90, CHARGED

A 90-year-old driver has been charged with negligent driving (occasioning death) and negligent driving (no death or grievous bodily harm) following a crash in Carlingford last year which left a high school student dead and his friend injured.

Emergency services were called to Rembrandt Street, near Carlingford.Court at about 11.15am on Thursday. 1st December 2022 after reports a car had left the road and hit some high school students walking on the footpath.

Officers attached to Ryde Police Area Command and NSW Ambulance paramedics attended and rendered assistance; however, a 17-year-old, Calvin Wijeweera, died at the scene.

A second Carlingford High school student, also aged 17, suffered a head injury and was taken to hospital in a stable condition.

The driver of the sedan, a 90-year-old woman from Epping, had to be cut from her car which crashed into the side of a van after hitting a tree. She suffered a leg injury and was taken to hospital, where she underwent mandatory testing. A crime scene was established, which was forensically examined by specialist police. Following inquiries, the 90-year-old woman was issued a Future Court Attendance Notice, charged about 7pm on Sunday 19th March and is due to face Burwood Local Court in May.

CAR PARK DEATH

A 70-year-old woman on her way to Bible study died in the car park of Castle Hill Baptist Church after she was hit by a reversing car.

Emergency services were called to the car park on Showground Road, Castle Hill, at about 9.30am on Monday morning (March 20th) following reports a pedestrian had been hit by a car. NSW Ambulance paramedics treated an unconscious woman at the scene; however, she could not be revived.

Her husband, 70, who was the sole occupant of the vehicle was not injured, and was taken to hospital for mandatory testing.

Officers attached to The Hills Police Area Command established a crime scene and commenced an investigation into the circumstances surrounding the incident. A report is being prepared for the information of the Coroner.

SPEEDSTERS CAUGHT

The driver of a Ford Mustang has been fined \$2580 and his licence was suspended after Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol recorded the 29-year-old travelleing at 158km/hr in Bella Vista.

Officers were conducting mobile speed enforcement along Old Windsor Road at Bella Vista when they detected a blue coloured Ford Mustang travelling at 78 km/hr over the sign posted speed limit of 80 km/hr at about 12.40am on Saturday, 18th of March 2023. Police stopped the vehicle and spoke to the driver who returned negative results for alcohol and drugs.

The Marayong man was issued an infringement notice for Exceed Speed Limit over 45 kph, his NSW driver's licence was suspended and confiscated on the spot for a period of 6 months. The vehicle was not owned by the driver and the number plates remained on the vehicle.

On Friday the 10th March, Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol suspended a 20-year-old P2 licence holder for travelling 41 km/hr over the sign posted speed limit. He will also face court for High Range drink driving and positive roadside drug test.

Officers were conducting mobile speed enforcement along Old Windsor Road at Bella Vista at about 2.08am on 10th March when they detected a green Holden Commodore utility travelling at 121km/hr in a sign posted 80km/ hr zone.

As the vehicle approached the traffic light intersection of Old Windsor Road and Seven Hills Road, they allege the driver failed to stop at the red arrow and continued into Seven Hills Road. Officers stopped the vehicle and subjected the driver to a roadside breath test returning a positive reading, the driver also returned a positive roadside drug test to

The driver was arrested and conveyed to Castle Hill Police Station returning a reading of 0.152 grammes of alcohol per 210 litres of breath and the secondary drug test returned positive to Cocaine.

He has been charged with exceeding the limit by over 30kp/hr, Not Stop at Stop Line at Red Arrow (Motor Vehicle) and Drive with High Range PCA. Officers are waiting for the drug analysis results in relation to proceeding with driving with an Illicit Drug. His licence was suspended and he is due before Parramatta Local Court in early Aprli.

And on 8th March another P-Plater was fined for speeding. Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol suspend the licence of a 19-year-old P2 licence holder travelling 51 km/ hr over the sign posted speed limit.

Officers were conducting stationary speed enforcement along Old Windsor Road at Bella Vista at . About 12.30am when the detected a black coloured Lexus ravelling at 131km/hr in a sign posted 80km/hr zone. The driver was issued an infringement notice for P2 Driver Exceed Speed Limit - over 45 kph, his NSW driver's licence was confiscated and suspended on the spot for a period of 6 months. The vehicle was not owned by the driver and the number plates remained on the vehicle.

A SAFE PLACE

The Hills Police Area Command, in partnership with the Women's Domestic Violence Court Advocacy Service (WDVCAS), are continuing an initiative to support vulnerable women who are subjected to domestic violence.

The safe place initiative is for women that require additional support and are not able to attend a Police Station. If in immediate danger you can always call 000, however if you are not able to come to the station, or have Police come to your home, there is a safe space setting within the Hills, that Police and specialist DV Support Workers will meet with you. LIFE SAVING ALARM

Firefighters from Fire and Rescue NSW were joined by RFS volunteers from Kellyville Rural Fire Brigade, Glenhaven, Rouse Hill and Round Corner after alarms were raised over a house fire in North Kellyville at 3am on Tuesday, 21st March.

Smoke alarms alerted the family to the blaze at the home Roland Garros Crescent and they escaped the smoke-filled building. Investigators are still examining the cause but it is believed a fan in a child's bedroom may have been at fault.

Fire and Rescue crew and NSW RFS crew performed inital knock down of the fire and overhaul was completed by NSW RFS crews.



Emergency services said that the fact that the family evacuated at 3am because of the smoke alarm being activated showed that smoke alarms saved lives.

Rescue agencies in joint training exercise

16 Marine Rescue NSW volunteers from the Hawkesbury and Cottage Point units have taken part in a joint Search and Rescue training exercise with multiple NSW Rural Fire Service brigades around Milson Island on the Hawkesbury River.

The exercise saw MRNSW crews conduct search pattern training and rescue methods for a simulated person missing in the water.

The MRNSW crews onboard HW 30, HW 22, CP 30 and CP 31 also took part in a simulated ferry fire involving multiple casualties requiring first aid and transporting.

Marine Rescue NSW Hawkesbury Unit Commander Peter Moore said joint operations are held regularly so agencies are familiar with processes during emergency responses.


'The exercise was a great success. Marine Rescue showed the RFS ways to conduct search patterns while our crews got a better understanding of their vessels and how to transfer patients if required during an emergency situation," Mr Moore said.

The Hawkesbury Unit Commander said cross-agency training exercises are invaluable. "Because there are several hundred homes in the area that don't have road access, we share a numbering system among multiple agencies which enables us to act quickly in the event of an emergency.

"We look forward to more joint training exercises and value our relationship with the RFS," Mr Moore said.

Women of the Year

Every year Local MPs nominate who they think is worthy of recognition as their electorate's woman of the year and this year's local winners include Jenny Walker, Principal of Kellyville Public School and Bella Vista businesswoman and founder of the Powerful Empowered Women's Network Pratibha Bhanushali.

State MP for Castle Hill Ray Williams who named Jenny Walker as Castle Hill electorate Woman of the Year said she is the very definition of a 'Woman of Excellence'.

The citation read: "Jenny became Principal of Kellyville Public School in 2007 and has transformed the school into one of the most



well respected and high performing schools not just within The Hills district, but across Greater Sydney.

"Jenny's outstanding calibre of leadership and excellence in her field has ensured that she is a respected and admired member of the local community.

"She is a role model to other principals as well as the roughly 30 full time equivalent classroom teachers she manages, alongside deputy principals and assistant principals. Her attitude and dedication has ensured she will have a lasting impact on Kellyville Public School and the surrounding area."

An educator for over 40 years, Jenny also mentors, inducts, trains and supports other principals as they progress in their careers.

Pratibha Bhanushali was named Baulkham Hills Woman of the Year by Baulkham Hills MP David Elliott for her extensive contribution to the Hills community.

She set up her Bella Vista based accountancy business 16 years ago but wanted to connect other women in local businesses so they could support each other.

Pratibha founded the Facebook group Powerful Empowered Women in 2019. Two years later, after Covid restrictions eased, she and her team of volunteers started fundraising for charities and causes as well as setting up business events where members could connect.

To date the Powerful Empowered Women's group has raised thousands of dollars for charity including \$11,000 to the I4Give Foundation, \$5,500 for the Hills Winter Sleepout to support people at risk of homelessness, \$1,400 to the Cancer Council through the Hills Relay For Life, Pratibha has also organised two Pink Ribbon breakfasts at her office.



PEW has supported The Sanctuary – The Hills Women's Shelter with \$1000 in vouchers and with two Back to School Drives for stationary items.

PEW also secured 10,000 bottles of water to donate to the StreetMed organisation which helps with the homeless in Parramatta and the Hills area. Other areas of help have included donations to bushfire ravaged communities and support for Beyond Blue and The Women's Shed - Hills Shire.

Pratibha said she wanted to thank the community "from the bottom of my heart" for their incredible support for the various fundraising projects.

She also received an Australia Day Special Mayoral Recognition Award 2023.

Fashion Show

The Positive Vibes Foundation gave itself a stylish funding boost with a recent fashion show held at Castle Hill RSL.

The money raised at the event will help Positive Vibes Foundation (PVF) renovate its meeting place at the Balcombe Heights Estate at Baulkham Hills to cater for bigger groups including the very popular Hills Women's Shed. The show featured fashion from Leilani Boutique with shops at Cherrybrook and Baulkham Hills with volunteer models.

The Hills Woman's Shed is an initiative of the Positive Vibes Foundation (PVF) and is a place where women can interact, share their stories and undertake activities/programs and workshops in a safe environment.

PVF runs programs to promote positive mental health in communities and runs a youth forum, a dog visitation program at aged care centres and regular mental health workshops.

Older Women's Housing

Accommodation in Kenthurst for older women at risk of homelessness is a step closer to becoming a reality thanks to years of planning, collaboration and determination by a small group of local residents.

A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is set to be signed off by Uniting, kickstarting a partnership with Wesley Community Housing (part of Wesley Mission) and a local community steering committee to provide a safe haven for older women without a roof over their heads.

According to the Australian Bureau of Statistics there were more than 6,400 homeless people aged 55 and over in NSW on census night in 2016, Of those, 2,186 were women — a rise of 48 per cent. When it came to women aged 65 to 74, the increase was 78 per cent.

The Housing for the Aged Action Group (HAAG) says the figures are just the tip of the iceberg.

The move to establish interim housing started nearly five years ago when members of Kenthurst Uniting Church started investigating how to provide transitional accommodation for the homeless spearheaded by two members of the congregations, James Visione and Dennis van Someren.

In 2020 the discussion focussed on the feasibility of converting the unused Sunday school rooms at the Jones Rd church into transitional short-term accommodation for homeless women over the age of 55 to provide women with housing security and provide them with time to recover and get back on track.

For many older women, losing a partner, losing a job and the financial implications of living as a solo person places them in a vulnerable position.

After months of talks with supportive members of the Parramatta/Nepean Presbytery of the Uniting Church, housing support networks, including Women's Community Shelters, a public forum was organised by the Kenthurst Uniting church to discuss the issue with local residents, especially those living in the adjacent Kentgrove Retirement Village.

Dennis said that as converting part of the church building was considered too costly at this stage Uniting offered a local property they owned for use as transitional housing for at least four older women.

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President of Soroptimist International — The Hills Cathy Tracey, James Visione, Dennis van Somerenand and SI Past President Jacqui McLachlan.

"Wesley Mission Housing came on board with the blessing of the Parramatta/Nepean Presbytery to manage the property and provide older women in danger of homelessness with appropriate accommodation," said Dennis.

"Our project group has already gained wide community support and offers of donations."

Dennis, a member of the Rotary Club of Kenthurst, said the project had the support of service groups such as local Rotary clubs, Men's Shed and the women's service group Soroptimist International - The Hills which organised a well-attended forum at Norwest on older women and homelessness in March 2020.

At the forum Bev Baker from The Older Women's Network said the face of homelessness had been changing in Australia.

"As the Older women's network, we know that older women over the age of 55 are one paycheck away from not being able to pay their rent. "These are women who have worked all their lives, they retire with less super ..., priority housing is not given to women until they are over the age of 80 but the grim reality is there is not enough housing stock."

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Locals Win World Best Vodka

The 2023 World Vodka awards recently presented the honour of World's Best Infused/Botanical Vodka to Karu Distillery, an independent distillery located in Grose Vale that overlooks the Devils Wilderness, for their highly acclaimed Morita Chipotle Vodka.

This award certainly isn't the first accolade that Karu Distillery has won. Married couple Ally and Nick Ayres started independently distilling spirits under the Karu banner in 2018. Since then, the two have received over 70 accolades globally for their gins and Morita; the vodka alone has earned multiple awards in the last two years, including Double Gold at the San Francisco World Spirits Competition.

Ally, head distiller at Karu and a lifetime Hawkesbury local, says that Morita Chipotle began as a personal project for her and Nick to use in their own cocktails. However, they soon realised that Morita could fill a gap in the bartending market after monitoring forums and reading that many people were no longer after tequila in their cocktails like margaritas, but vodka.

The pair got back to work on Morita, Ally being the one to fully develop the recipe into the award-winning concoction it is today. The spirit was an instant hit with bartenders, she says; "They love it, because it can be so versatile!"

Inspired by the couple's love of Mexican food, Morita is infused with two types of chillis. It isn't a spicy spirit, though, thanks to the rigorous deseeding of the chillis before distillation. Add in an eclectic mix of ingredients including agave syrup and green capsicum and the result is a vodka that's equal parts smooth, smokey and flexible.

The Karu Distillery operates on the beautiful acreage of Ally's aunt and uncle, and was always intended to be in the Hawkesbury region from inception. "It was important for us to be in the Hawkesbury because I've been a local here for so long. When you live in the Hawkesbury, the whole Hawkesbury is your home," Ally says.

The landscape surrounding Karu Distillery plays a huge role in its operation. Many

botanicals required for the spirits are grown in a garden on-site, and the UV-treated rainwater used to cut down the drinks makes a huge difference in the quality of the final product. Run-ins with wildlife are common, as are visits to the on-site lookout into the expanse of the gorgeous Devils Wilderness.

Despite their success, Karu has been directly affected by many of the challenges created by the pandemic and natural disasters in recent years. During the 2019 fires, their first ever batch of rum barrels had to be evacuated from the property while they were being aged to market standard. Morita Chipotle was released during the second wave of NSW lockdowns in 2021, making it difficult to fully communicate to spirit enthusiasts the vodka's details even while it was winning innovation awards - all this while continuing to expand their team and company.

Yet, regardless of those challenges, Ally is very positive about the hard lessons they've had to learn as both a business and as individual people. All of those tribulations have taught her and Nick a lot. "I'm grateful for learning the lessons. Hopefully by the time we're 50 years old, we'll be genius problem solvers," she adds with a laugh. "We've got something very important, and we've come too far now to let that stuff take us out."

Though the journey has been an intense one, Karu Distillery have countless achievements under their belt. From the moment Ally and Nick won their first award three months after releasing their debut gin, the Karu name has been one associated with prestige and innovation.

Reflecting on the path up to the most recent World Vodka Awards title, Ally says: "Everything that's happened is really unexpected, and ridiculous and fun and wonderful and terrifying,

and to think that it's all happened to the people who were sitting in this seat right now is mental." But the reality speaks for itself, both in Karu's tasty spirits and their spotless international reputation.

Karu Distillery is hosting Autumn Long Lunch on the 2nd of April, an event where you'll be able to try all their spirits in an afternoon of good food and drinks. Be on the lookout for Karu in the community, too, as they plan to hold plenty of tastings all around the area and beyond - more information can be found on their website.

If you're interested in trying the world-class Morita Chipotle Vodka at home, you can order it on Karu's website or from retailers like Dan Murphy's and Cellarbrations. Ally recommends the Camino, a cocktail with lime juice and tamarind syrup. Shake it until it's got a bit of foam on the top, add ice and cracked pepper to finish it off and enjoy. "You can definitely overdo those ones," Ally warns, "So drink responsibly!"

Windsor or "the little town on the river" as Maddie refers to it as, has fast become a favourite destination for us. We have visited several times and explored the township, the Australiana Village, and the Windsor Regional Museum. We have walked along the river and through the town centre looking at the boutique shops and enjoying visits to the ice cream shops as well as Lollies n Stuff, Sydney's largest lolly shop.

Being a warm autumn day, we decided to visit Governor Phillip Park after our usual visit to Windsor for ice-cream. Named after Governor Phillip, the first Governor of the Colony of NSW South Wales, this park is no ordinary park and it is easy to see the history of the Hawkesbury reflected in the design of the playground.

The sandstone fort with a slide, a tunnel underneath and a climbing mound up the side along with the large sandstone bricks around the playground pay homage to Windsor and the early colonial days. The net tunnel represents fishing by local Aboriginal people in the river and creeks in the region.

The playground also focuses on nature play with logs and sandstone stepping stones as well a focus on animals including 3 large metal cicadas to climb on and a large lizard that wraps around in-ground trampolines. Smaller metal animals such as frogs, crabs and bats are hidden around the playground for children to find. A bird nest swing is also provided.

The park was also designed in consultation with the Touched by Olivia foundation and as a result is an inclusive playground that children of all abilities and ages can enjoy together. Sensory play is provided with musical chimes, merry-go-round, chalk boards (BYO chalk), mirrors as well as an easily accessible water play area with a water fountain in the middle with several more spouts coming up from the ground.

Outside of the fenced playground are two flying foxes as well as large, sheltered picnic table areas with electric BBQs. There are plenty of large grassy areas along with toilets as well as walking/cycle paths. It is a fantastic place for family and friends to enjoy a catch up or celebration particularly with the sparkling Hawkesbury River as a backdrop.

Governor Phillip Park is now one of our favourite parks in the region. For me it is about the history reflected in the park and for Maddie and Alexis it is just an "awesome park" with lots of water and close to the best ice-cream and lolly shops in Sydney.



Modern Slavery By BEV JORDAN

For many people, slavery is something that used to happen long ago and yet figures from 2022 released by the International Labour Organisation state that 50 million people are trapped in modern slavery and that includes thousands of people in Australia.

Hills resident Anna Ruth was shocked when she first heard about modern slavery 15 years ago. "I was living in a bubble...I had no idea," she said.

Modern slavery includes forced labour, debt bondage, human trafficking, deceptive recruitment, forced marriage, slavery, worst forms of child labour and servitude by Anti-Slavery Australia.

According to the Global Estimates of Modern Slavery, in 2022 20 million women were living in forced marriages, two out of five under

The Global Slavery Index also estimated that in 2018 there were 15,000 people in modern slavery in Australia with forced marriages and dowry abuse seen as a growing problem.

After years of wondering how she could help, Anna left her job in the corporate world and has made it her mission to end human trafficking and modern slavery with the foundation of the not-for-profit organisation: Freedom For Humanity. The aim is to end slavery through education by funding educational scholarships for people escaping slavery.

Anna herself has three degrees and says: I see education as the key to freedom ... it empowers you to become resourceful

and stand on your own two feet.

"It's about creating a pathway and opportunities that otherwise they may never have had. By helping one person you are empowering a whole family and a whole community," she said.

The scholarships are a way of supporting rescued victims to regain their independence and dignity through education and gainful employment.

Anna said the shocking figures about modern slavery reveal that estimated numbers have increased by 10 million people in just six

"One in four victims are children," she said. Figures show that modern slavery is a 150 billion dollars business. High levels of slavery globally, are seen in the technology, fashion and

Freedom For Humanity is committed to working with companies to ensure that their supply chains are not using child labour or slaves.

Anna says the organisation is always looking for volunteers and donations are always welcome towards scholarships.

Her most recent awareness event was held at The Hills Lodge to celebrate International Women's Day. The keynote speaker was human rights activist Patricia Garcia who has spent more than 20 years working in some of the world's most dangerous conflict zones including Afghanistan, Sudan and Burma.

The next event is - The Freedom for Humanity Gala Ball which will be held in Sydney on Thursday, June 22nd.



A brand new sporting complex at Stringer Road, North Kellyville is a step closer to construction following a decision at a recent Hills Shire Council meeting.

Councillors have awarded the tender to build the Stringer Road Reserve at North Kellyville. The suburb will see an additional 6,500 homes built by 2036, and many more people and families moving into the area.



Fred Caterson Reserve Master Plan

The Hills Shire Council is progressing a Master Plan to enhance Fred Caterson Reserve, Castle Hill, to cater for existing and future residents including the more than 11,000 people predicted to move to the nearby Showground Station precinct within the next 10 to 15 years. The Draft Master Plan was reported to Council in July 2020 and placed on public exhibition from 12 August to 11 September 2020 for viewing and comment.

Together with the exhibition of the Master Plan, Council invited Expressions of Interest (EOI) in August 2020 for the establishment, management and maintenance of a premier rugby union facility and resolved to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Eastwood District Rugby Union Football Club. The MOU is nonbinding and Council plans to provide the facility for the community even if the ultimate user of the site does not end up being the club.

The Fred Caterson Reserve Master Plan was adopted by Council on 24 November 2020, with the aim of providing premier sport and recreation infrastructure while maintaining ecological communities within and around the reserve.

The Master Plan identifies future upgrades including:

- Development of the former pony club site into a premier rugby union facility consisting of up to three fields with the main field for high competition level rugby in accordance with Council's Recreation Strategy
- Expansion of the Tennis Centre from 10 to 14 courts
- Expansion of Field 6 to a full-size football (soccer) field, incorporating the relocation of the car park
- Improved pathway network and spectator facility upgrades to the radio control car track.

- Improved facilities for the BMX track
- Upgraded facilities for Fields 1, 2, 3 and 5 (baseball)
- A range of other possible features across the site, and
- Conservation of the reserve's ecological communities through revegetation and restoration activities.

The Master Plan represents Council's vision for the site on behalf of the community and is subject to further detailed investigation, design, funding and planning processes before becoming a reality.

A Premier Rugby Union Facility

One of the upgrades planned for Fred Caterson Reserve is the construction of a premier rugby union facility. It is proposed that this will be home to Eastwood District Rugby Union Football Club, which provides a pathway to elite rugby for much of North and North-Western Sydney, including The Hills, through affiliated junior clubs and senior representation.

As well as this partnership, Council is committed to ensuring high levels of community access. Partnering will allow embellishment of the complex to a higher standard for the community than what would otherwise be possible.

The site occupies approximately 6.8ha of the total 58ha Fred Caterson Reserve. It is estimated that approximately 4.2ha of the site is currently cleared, with an anticipated 10 per cent (approx. 0.7ha) to be further cleared to deliver the three playing fields and associated amenities.

Ecological assessments and an arboricultural report aim to retain the majority of the critically endangered ecological community in the north-east of the site and

minimize the disturbance to the Sydney Hinterland Transition Woodland to the south-east.

It is estimated only a very small number trees will require

The majority of tree removal is from the western end of the site, which are species not identified with any endangered or threatened community.

Planning and design is currently in progress with the final design to be informed by further studies including site survey, geotechnical assessment, ecology, traffic, noise and heritage assessments. This will ensure that the facility will be designed in accordance with environmental standards.

Works, if constructed by Council, will be carried out under the State Environmental Planning Policy (Transport

and Infrastructure) 2021 and accompanied by Review of Environmental Factors once all preliminary studies and designs are completed. Depending on approval pathways and the final version of the works, further opportunities will be available for comment.

These base-level works will be funded by Council through developer contributions from the neighbouring Showground Precinct. Should the Rugby Club propose further works to bring the site to a premier level facility. these will be funded by the club and may be subject to a future Development Application (DA). The community would be notified and provided opportunities to make submissions in response to any proposed DA.

The Hills Shire Council and Fred Caterson Reserve user groups are currently pursuing funding for other Master Plan items.



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

My parents were ten-pound Poms, as they were called in the 50's, and as such they enjoyed the British humour of visiting artists to this country. The occasion that I recall mostly was the appearance of Max Bygraves on the stage at the Tivoli in 1965. He called to the audience "Anyone from Manchester?" (we came from Bristol) and a number of hands shot up to which he then said to those who raised their hands "It's still raining". Which got the audience laughing as we were all in sunny Sydney.

The Tivoli Circuit was an Australian live theatre which started life in 1893, founded by English comedian Harry Rickards. The theatre was mostly known for its Vaudeville, Black & White Minstral shows and Pantomines. Max Bygraves (who later moved to Australia and lived on the Gold Coast, dying in 2012) was continuing the type of programming that had made the Tivoli a household name here. The theatres in both Sydney and Melbourne were affectionately known as "The Tiv".

Harry Rickards was born Harry Bejamin Leete in London in 1841, His niece, Katie Lawrence described him as "as bit showy" saying that he "had diamonds instead of buttons down his shirt".

The "House Full" signs went up for the final show on the 26th March 1966. In that final

audience were many notable performers who had appeared on stage over the many years that the Tivoli was operating and, in some cases, the spouses of those who had passed on to show their appreciation of the Tivoli. Amongst the 1,800 patrons were such notables as Queenie Paul (who also served in management in 1932), Evie Hayes and Sadie Gale (widow of Roy Rene aka "Mo"), whilst Gwen Plumb went on stage to make a speech. English comedian Jimmy Edwards, in his closing speech, said "I don't relish the distinction of being known as the man who closed the Tiv. Music hall's dead in Britain. Now this one's dead there's nowhere to go. I'll either become a character comedian or a pauper" Jimmy Edwards passed away in 1988.

The end of an era had come and gone and Channel 9 telecast the second half of the final show to the wider national audience on the Nine Network.

Along with my memories of going to "The Tiv" back in those days of what was to become the swinging sixties, is the fact of family connections with the "Tiv". My wife's Great Aunt, Winnie Gill, held the very responsible and highly regarded role of wardrobe mistress. In the book "Tivoli" by Frank Van Straten he tells of her as starting as an assistant in the wardrobe at the Sydney Tivoli in the Connor & Paul days of the 1930's. In August 1949, on

the departure of long-serving Barbara Mackay she was promoted to head the wardrobe in Melbourne. Frank Van Straten goes on to say in his book, "Loved by several generations of chorus and ballet girls, Winnie supervised the Tivoli's costumes until the (Tivoli) Circuit closed." Winnie had to be much more than a dressmaker. Her duties included millinery, wig-making and was a first-class buyer (buying materials by the hundreds of yards) and was required to improvise, often transforming costumes from one play to another. Probably one of the most well-known stars dressed by Winnie was Sabrina. Winnie moved to the London Tivoli (a separate entity) in the mid 50's until her retirement in the late 70's when she retired to Sydney. Upon leaving London, and unable to bring her aging pet dog home with her, she left it in the care of her close friend and neighbour, Danny La Rue.

Auntie Win had worked and dressed many famous performers or actors during her time at the Tiv. Win was also much loved by my wife and was one of her favourite relatives. I first met her when we visited her at home in Monterey NSW and found her very charming and likeable. Her name appeared on the programmes of the Tivoli for many of the shows, including the final show that appeared on the stage of theatre "One Dam' Thing After Another".



Daniel rides the Waves at Australia titles

Daniel Carter lit up the 2023 Australian Open Water Championships with two barnstorming gold medals to power himself and the new Waves Fitness And Aquatic Centre into national recognition.

Daniel won the boys 16 years titles in the 7.5km and 5km Open categories at Busselton, WA, last month while braving stingers and a very strong field. He was third and fourth overall in the 7.5km and 5km races, which featured 17-year-olds.

Thanks to his exceptional results, Daniel made the Swimming Australia Open Water Flippers Squad. His delighted Waves coach Josh Stapley said National Flippers Squad members are recognised by Swimming Australia as being capable of transitioning into the senior national team and achieving podium performances within four to six years. "It is a huge achievement for Daniel to make an Australian team," Stapley said.

It sealed Daniel's form at the previous Australian Open Water Championships - he claimed silver in the 15 years 5km in 2022, and gold in the 14 years 5km in 2021. Daniel also won two titles at the NSW Open Water Championships.

His team-mate Charlotte Brown captured bronze in the girls 18 years 5km event, having taken silver at the gruelling 10km at the NSW Open Water event. In the 2021 Championships, Charlotte took silver in the 16 years 5km. Stapley said this was a fantastic effort from his Gold Squad, which is the top tier team at Waves. "With Waves only opening in September 2022, this is a completely new squad, with athletes coming from right across The Hills to train out our new state-of-the-art facility," Stapley said.

"All my (nine) swimmers did a great job and that's put down to their love and dedication to their sport. They are in the pool at 6am every morning and training hard, and they are achieving everything that they have dreamed of," Stapley added.

The Hills Shire Mayor Dr Peter Gangemi said: "Hills residents are so proud of our Gold Squad for their amazing results. This is a testament to our squad swimmers ... as well as our hard-working head swim coach Josh Stapley and the world class facilities at our revitalised Waves Fitness and Aquatic Centre in Baulkham Hills."

At the NSW Senior Age Championships, Waves won one gold, three silvers, and two bronze medals The highly-regarded Callum Thomas won gold in the boys 18 years 50m backstroke and bronze in the 100m backstroke.

Caleb Yago grabbed silver in the 50m and 100 butterfly events (boys 16 years), while Daniel Carter grabbed silver in the 1500m freestyle (boys 15yrs). Ruben Langley won bronze in the 1500m freestyle (boys 15yrs).

"The major event my squad is training for is the Swimming Australia National Age and National Open Championships in April," Stapley said. "Daniel, Callum, and Caleb will go into the event ranked very highly and will be chasing medals, while others be looking at qualifying for finals."

Stapley said some will then focus on the Australian Trials in June to select the team for the World Championships: "Callum Thomas is shaping as a major up-and-comer in the 20m backstroke and will look to make himself known to the Australian Team at the Trials."

Hills United teams in goal-hungry moods

Hills United men's and women's teams are setting impressive standards in their respective NSW football competitions.

The Hills United Men's League One side, coached by Luke Casserly, is enjoying a strong start to their season with five wins, one draw and one loss after seven rounds. Last Saturday, they defeated Northern Tigers 1-0 on Saturday, thanks to a 13th-minute goal by Cameron Philp in their seventh round clash.

Hills United (4) are second on the ladder after two rounds, behind Central Coast Mariners (6).

Meanwhile, Glenhaven FC, which belongs to the Hills Football Association, will be able to upgrade their home ground thanks to a \$90,000 grant from the NSW Government's Football Legacy Fund. The Hills Shire Council is to add \$200,000 towards the project at Glenhaven Oval to upgrade its lighting.

Glenhaven FC president Bill Kafkis said that planning for growth and demand is key to their club's strategy. "The upgrading of our venue is crucial for the unprecedented growth that will come out of the FIFA Women's World Cup (to be hosted by Australia in July)," he said.
