# **Good for Business**

Businesses in the Hills Shire are being urged to fill out the 2023 Performance Sentiment Index (PSI) survey to provide a snapshot of business confidence in the region.

The Hills Shire Council and Sydney Hills Business Chamber have partnered with McCrindle since 2015 to produce the PSI.

The 21-question survey of business owners and managers takes 10 minutes to complete and measures the three key indicators on a scale. It measures current performance (actual earnings, expenses, staffing numbers) as well as sentiment – forecast costs and growth and expectations of the six months ahead.

The results of all 21 questions across the three measures indicate whether business conditions, performance and sentiment are in the positive zone (improving, rising, advancing, accelerating) or the negative zone (slowing, falling, deteriorating, collapsing). The average of the three main measures gives an overall Business PSI score.

The 2022 PSI score for the Hills was 6 showing improving business confidence and was a huge rebound from the 2020 score of -45 which reflected the effects of COVID-19.

There were also negative scores in 2018 (-3) and in 2019 (-2).

The 2022 survey showed that people enjoyed operating their business in The Hills because of its proximity to the main centres and public transport.

Work/life balance was an important positive factor. The Hills is seen as a family friendly region and owners and employers enjoyed working in a positive and neighbourly environment.

Hills Shire Mayor Peter Gangemi said the 2023 PSI survey was a vital one for local businesses to get involved in as the short survey will provide beneficial feedback on how Council can further support the local business community.

"I am calling on local business owners to participate in the PSI survey to help shape a stronger Hills business community."

"We want to see our business community reach even greater heights, and one way we can do this is to understand their challenges and sentiments. Helping to remove roadblocks, providing education pathways and advocating to remove red tape will help our businesses to

be the best they can be. This also means we can keep people employed, support local families and help businesses become more sustainable."

Kerrie Sheeves, Chairman of Sydney Hills Business Chamber said: "More than ever before is it important for us to gain insights into business sentiment and the issues that keep people up at night," she said.

"The Hills PSI survey is as much an annual health check on our business community as it is an important planning tool for both Council and organisations like Sydney Hills Business Chamber as we develop the right programs and tools to support economic growth and business success in our community."

The PSI is open until Friday, 30th June at 5pm. Feedback from the survey will also help inform the format of Council's business series, workshops and initiatives for the following year.

## **CAREFLIGHT MISSION**

A man in his 40s was airlifted to Westmead Hospital following a crash on Bell's Line of Road at Bilpin last week (Thursday 25th May).

He was airlifted to hospital in a serious but stable condition after his vehicle left the road and struck a tree on Bell's Line of Road.

The Mounties Care CareFlight Rapid Response Helicopter was called in by NSW Ambulance shortly after 2pm. The man was retrieved from his vehicle by a local off-duty police officer, who directed the CareFlight helicopter to land in his adjacent paddock,

where the crews met NSW Ambulance paramedics and NSW Police.

NSW Ambulance paramedics worked alongside CareFlight's medical team to treat the patient. CareFlight's specialist doctor and NSW Ambulance critical care paramedic performed a clinical assessment including ultrasound, and provided pain relief and treatment for injuries to the back and torso.

The CareFlight helicopter then flew the patient to Westmead Hospital in a serious but stable condition.

## **WINDSOR CRASH**

Police are appealing for dash cam footage of a multiple vehicle crash in Vineyard on Monday (29th May)

Emergency services were called to Windsor Road, Vineyard, near Perth Street, at around 3.30pm following reports of a multiple vehicle crash.

Officers from Riverstone Police Area Command attended and found a minibus, a truck and a Subaru sedan had collided.

NSW Ambulance paramedics treated the driver of the minibus for lower body injuries, and the two passengers - a 16-year-old boy and a woman believed to be in her 40s.

Paramedics also treated an 82-year-old male driver of the Subaru and the 32-year-old female passenger.

The four adults were taken to Westmead Hospital and the 16-year-old boy to the Children's Hospital at Westmead, all in stable conditions.

The truck driver was uninjured. Officers from Riverstone Police Area Command have commenced inquiries into the circumstances surrounding the crash.

# **LUCKY ESCAPE**

A trail bike rider had a lucky escape following a collision with a truck on Annangrove Rd, Rouse Hill at 4am on Tuesday 30th May.

Police say that two trail bike drivers rode out onto Windsor Road from Annangrove Rd in front of a semi trailer.

One of the trail bike riders was run over however police say he miraculously survived despite not wearing a helmet or protective guards.

The other trail bike rider left the scene. The driver of the truck was taken to hospital for mandatory testing.

The injured rider was conveyed to Westmead in a serious but stable condition. Anyone with information about the other rider is asked to call Crime Stoppers NSW on 1800 333 000.

#### **PORSCHE WRECKED**

Five people ran from a stolen Porsche after it crashed at 7.30am on Sunday 21st May near the intersection of Windsor Rd and Samantha Riley Drive Beaumont Hills.

Three males and two females left the vehicle. A male and female were arrested at the scene.

A police dog and POLAIR tracked two males to Kellyville Metro station. With the assistance of the Metro Security they were tracked to Tallawong Station where another Police Dog was waiting for them as their carriage door opened.

The second female seen at the scene has not yet been traced. The Porsche was allegedly stolen from Collebee.

## **GEL BLASTER WARNING**

A P Plater has been arrested in possession of Gel Blasters at Castle Hill.

He was arrested at 3.30pm on 20th May near Castle Hill Metro and charged with two counts of Unlawful Possession of Firearms and will appear in Court next month.

The day before (19th May) a 21-year-old Kellyville man was charged with Unauthorised Possession of a Firearm after he was found in possession of a replica assault rifle (Gelblasters) in his car near Showground Station, Castle Hill at 5pm.

Gel blasters are illegal in NSW as they are considered replicas.

NSW is participating in an ongoing National Firearms Amnesty to reduce the number of unregistered firearms in Australia.

In NSW the amnesty allows for: firearms or firearm related articles to be registered, supplied or surrendered to a participating firearm dealer without fear of prosecution.

Ensure you contact the participating firearms dealer or your local police station, prior to attending the location with a firearm, firearm related article or prohibited weapon.

Before taking a firearm to a participating firearms dealer or a police station, make sure the firearm is unloaded and where possible, remove the bolt or other method to render the firearm safe. Place the firearm in a gun bag or wrap in a blanket. Ammunition can be taken at the same time as a firearm; however, it must be stored in a separate bag, box or container. https://www.police.nsw.gov.au/online.../firearms/ amnestv

# Relay for Life 2023

Hope shone brightly at the 22nd annual Hills Relay for Life held at Castle Hill Showground.

Thousands of people were involved in the 24-hour community event which raises funds for Cancer Council research grants and support programs.

The \$250,000 target was reached even before the Candlelight Ceremony of Hope began on Saturday, May 20th at 6pm.

Chair of the Hills Relay for Life Organising Committee Lisa Carruthers said the new \$300,000 target will be beaten following the Relay Gala dinner at Castle Hill this Saturday, June 3rd.

Lisa said the local community had been amazing in supporting the Hills Relay For Life which looks like being the biggest Relay for Life event in the State.

Teams included schools, youth groups, service organisations, churches, local businesses and teams of family and friends who all walked to make a difference to people on their cancer journey

Six high school teams, Glenwood High, Castle Hill High, Crestwood High, Rouse Hill Anglican College, Kellyville High and Kings School took the track and raised over \$55,000 between them.

Lisa said: "Our relay is such a mix of ages, we have babies and toddlers, students, parents and grandparents all taking part in this fantastic community event.

"The schools add such energy. Our first lap for Survivors and Carers is such an important lap for us all to see."





Cancer survivor Damien MacRae was guest speaker this year and spoke about how he was living proof of the importance of research. Damien was guest speaker in 2017 when he was given just six months to live.

He said the true heroes were the researchers and carers.

Federal Member for Mitchell Alex Hawke MP spoke in Parliament House to congratulate the Hills Relay For Life volunteer organising committee saying it was an amazing community event. He has had a team in the Hills Relay Relay For Life for the past 15 years.

"I'm told by the Cancer Council that the Hills Relay for Life is probably the largest in Australia and that the relay that has raised the most money, which is a very significant achievement from the Mitchell community," he said.

"Relays for Life are to recognise and celebrate local cancer survivors, patients, their carers and to honour and remember everyone who's been lost to cancer and to raise that vital money for research and funds in the ongoing progress that we are all making as humans against an insidious disease that takes so many. "It's a great privilege to represent such a generous and charitable community." He said he looked forward to participating in this event for many to come.

Planning has already started for next year's Hills Relay For Life which will be held on May 18th/19th 2024.

Lisa Carruthers said: "In the past 22 years The Hills community has raised nearly \$6 million for cancer research and support programs that have benefited the local community.

"We would like to thank everyone in our amazing Hills Community for their support this year." The Thank You function is on Tuesday 27th June.



# Iranian Artist Living Her Dreams Locally

Quakers Hill resident Shiva Dadvar is living her dream of working as an artist after fleeing her home country of Iran due to religious discrimination, having recently completed a mural along the Bondi Beach Sea Wall.

Shiva secured the opportunity through Waverley Council's United To End Racism art competition: "One month after I registered for that, I got a message from one of the members in Council, asking me to send them more photos of my artwork," she says. And after that, a congratulations email - I won the competition."

The Bondi mural is adorned with the phrase 'Ye are the fruits of one tree, and the leaves of one branch.' The striking array of colours mixed with combined imagery of birds, butterfly wings and sharp geometry represents Shiva's goals as an artist; her hope for the world to come together and heal.

A chance to display her art for millions of people was impossible to imagine for Shiva in Iran; she is a follower of the Bahá'í Faith, a group that is subject to intense religious discrimination in Iran.

"One of these types of discrimination is that you can't go to university if you are Bahá'í," Shiva says. "There is an underground Bahá'í university, but it has a very small number of courses, and art is not one of them." Despite not being able to formally pursue an education in art, Shiva was still able to explore her creative side and even sell artworks with help from her supportive mother.

When she was an adult, Shiva left Iran with her husband and daughter to escape discrimination and pursue tertiary education. The family spent five years in Turkey, awaiting acceptance into either the United States, Canada or Australia depending on which country was taking refugees at the time.

When Australia was accepting refugees three and a half years ago, Shiva didn't know which country would have been the best for them. "Obviously when we came here, we noticed that here is better because of the weather," she says. "And because of the government as well."

After completing a tertiary preparation certificate, Shiva had heard about TAFE through settlement services, finding it much more practical than traditional university education."You get ready for a job much easier and inserted into the market if you choose a course in TAFE. So I applied for a Certificate III in Fundamental Design, and I found it very useful for one who wants to start in art." Soon after completing the course in 2021, Shiva was able to win the mural competition.

The skills that Shiva gained from the course are evident in the Bondi mural. Influenced by the surrealist works of Frida Kahlo and Salvador Dalí, her work evokes a strong feeling through its unique mixture of imagery. Shiva also has a particular interest in architecture, incorporating into the piece geometrical shapes that pervade buildings like Persian mosques and Mona Vale's Bahá'í Temple.

Many of Shiva's artworks are conceptualised first in the studio she has set up in her Quakers Hill home. The desk she works at is lined with an extensive array of pencils, and hanging overhead are notable inspirations such as the Mona Vale Bahá'í Temple and rainy streets seen through windows drenched with droplets.

Art has always been a true method of expression for Shiva: "I always think to myself, that I always could talk with my art in the way that I could



not talk with words. Art is some instrument, some way you can talk about something you can't say in your words."

One project that Shiva will express her feelings through is an artistic commemoration of ten Bahá'í women who were killed 40 years ago in the wake of the Iranian Revolution. "They were executed because of their belief in improving the community and society. The 18th of June is the memorial day, and the Bahá'í community asks people around the world to create art to remember them by," she says. In addition to being a talented visual artist, Shiva

is also a classical Persian dancer, and is looking to create video clips that incorporate both painting and dance into a piece that "will help to remember them."

Shiva's ability to navigate her thoughts through art is extremely impressive and important, and she is pleased to be able to use the skills she learnt at TAFE in her work. "In music, singing, media or visual arts, you have to be the very best of yourself. And if you work with your heart and soul, you can find your place," she says. Now able to fulfil her lifelong dreams, Shiva has found hers.

# GenesisCare Norwest New specialised centre for radiation oncology services

#### Now open

GenesisCare has opened a new cancer centre located adjacent to Norwest Private Hospital.

# **Dural Locals Raise \$30,000** with Variety Bash! By JOSH KERWICK

A local group of four men, known as Team Inferno, recently completed a journey through regional New South Wales to raise funds for disadvantaged kids.

The Team, which comprises Mark Engall, Adam Bell, Mark Vint and Dave McMillian, set off on Sunday 21st May alongside 300 other drivers to partake in the NSW Variety Bash. This 2,160km rural adventure delivers essential equipment and items to schools in regional areas, all while raising money for the children's charity Variety.

For Mark Engall, who has been the owner of Engall's Nursery for nearly three decades, this is his fifth time taking part in a Variety Bash. "I did a couple of the big B to B Bashes that go all around Australia, and that's where I got the thirst for it," he comments. After that Bash, Mark found a 1984 Ford Falcon hearse online pre-decorated with flames that would form the foundations of Team Inferno.

"I thought, 'That would be an awesome Variety car," says Mark. "We did a Facebook post, and one of our friends named it the Falcon Inferno because of the flames, and then everything else we've got since then is obviously flame-related." The Fairlane Inferno, the team's second car, was brought in two years ago by Mark Vint after also loving the Bash experience. Just as impressive as the flames are the

innumerable stickers that line the doors and windows of both cars. Each one represents a sponsor for the Team, many of whom are locals or work in the nursery industry alongside Mark Engall. "We're up to over \$30,000 now raised with our two cars, and a lot of those businesses have donated \$500 or \$1,000. Considering the economic times, I'm really amazed that they've done that well this year."

Fruit trees from Mark's nursery are included in the supplies for each stop along the road. and he is proud to be able to bring a part of his nursery to the schools that the Bash visits. He says: "Every school we visit, we're giving four fruit trees to them - a mandarin, orange, blueberry and fig tree. A lot of other teams give away a box of books or something like that. I thought, well, I've got fruit trees, and every school would love a fruit tree!"

On one of the last nights of the Bash, Team Inferno received the 'Wheelchair Cup' for their achievement in raising \$30,000 for Variety. Mark says taking part in the Bash is an invaluable experience for Team Inferno: "It's uplifting for the communities we visit, especially the

# **Missing Link of Norwest** Cycleway to be Built

Cycling through Norwest Business Park will become much easier and safer thanks to a brand-new 2.6km shared pathway along Norwest Boulevard.

The Hills Shire Council has secured \$3.1 million under the NSW Government's Get NSW Active program to construct the shared pathway for pedestrians and bike riders, linking existing paths on Windsor and Old Windsor Roads.

Mayor of The Hills Shire, Dr Peter Gangemi said the new pathway will transform the way people move around Norwest, which is home to thousands of businesses, two metro stations (Bella Vista and Norwest), two hospitals, shopping complexes, multiple cafes and restaurants, schools and education providers and family homes.

"This new shared pathway will mean that those who live in, work in or visit Norwest can hop on their bike and ride from one end of the park to the other," Mayor Gangemi said.

"It means fewer cars on our roads and encourages more people to ride to and from work, to functions or meetings, to bus stops, or even the metro stations.

"This shared pathway completes a vital missing link within Norwest Business Park, and I know this news will be welcomed by many of our residents and cycling groups who have been calling out for better cycling infrastructure."

The soon-to-be-built almost three-metrewide shared pathway will be located on the southern side of Norwest Boulevard and connect to the Shire's broader cycleway

"It also links up to the 12km Greenway Cycleway that extends from Bella Vista to Rouse Hill Town Centre and the 40km M7 Cycleway that goes all the way from Baulkham Hills to Prestons in southwest Sydney," Mayor

"We've seen more and more people taking up this mode of transport, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic, and we want to encourage more of this. Cycling is also an inexpensive mode of transport, it's a great form of exercise and good for our environment. I would like to thank the NSW Government for their contribution to this project, which will provide more options for people to travel safely."

The Get NSW Active program provides funding to local councils, such as The Hills Shire, to create more opportunities for people to

NSW Minister for Transport Jo Haylen said this will be a transformative project that will give people another way to travel through Norwest and Bella Vista.

"The \$3.1 million investment will make it safer for people to walk and cycle to and from the Norwest Business Park and easier for everyone to access public transport," Ms Haylen said.

Bike North president Phillip Hart represents one of the largest cycle groups in the state and said he is extremely pleased to hear about the new shared pathway.

"Congratulations to The Hills Shire Council on gaining funding for this important piece of active transport infrastructure. It will hopefully assist Council in achieving its objective of more people riding more often," Mr Hart said.

Construction of the cycleway is expected to start before Christmas 2023.





Bidjigal Reserve, named in commemoration of the Bidjigal people (part of the Darug Nation) is a beautiful piece of paradise in the bustling Hills and Parramatta areas. The reserve itself is 186 hectares in size and lies in the suburbs of Castle Hill, North Rocks, Northmead, Baulkham Hills, West Pennant Hills and Carlingford.

What is special about the reserve is the opportunity to appreciate the history of the area, to reconnect with nature and to enjoy some time away from the business of modern living. Bidjigal Reserve is home to a diverse array of native and natural fauna as well as Aboriginal artefacts including caves and rock shelters. The reserve also contains a number of walking tracks including shorter and easier trails to longer and more difficult tracks.

The Platypus Track, the easiest track available, is brilliant for families with young children, novice bushwalkers or people just looking for an easy peaceful walk. This was the first time I had taken my daughters bushwalking

and despite their initial protests that it would be boring, it ended with requests to return to the Platypus Track again soon.

The Platypus Track is accessed by walking along fire trail on the left at end of Excelsior Avenue, Castle Hill and is well sign posted. The track itself starts by walking along a concrete path which soon turns into a well graded gravel path. Here we enjoyed the avenue of Turpentine trees and the incredible views from the ridge line down into the valley below. It was at this point one of my daughters asked for complete silence so we could appreciate nature and listen to the birds.

The descent down into the valley and to Excelsior Creek consisted of a steep track of rough sandstone steps which even my 3 year old managed. The creek itself is picturesque with the sandstone rocks, Water Gums and ferns growing along the banks. Our favourite part of the walk was the creek crossings including stepping stones over Excelsior

Creek, a rustic bridge to again cross Excelsior Creek and concrete stepping stones over the Coachwood Creek. Interestingly, enough the Coachwood Creek is located near a weir called Loch Bruce which was built and used by residents in the 1930's as a swimming spot, again illustrating the important role Bidjigal Reserve has played over many generations.

Back up out of the valley was steep in parts but once complete we enjoyed a well earned rest in the picnic area at the start of the track which includes a grassy area to sit, tables and chairs as well as a wood BBQ.

The Platypus Track is 2.1km in total and took us approximately 1.5hours but there are places to rest along the way. Public toilets and a playground can be found at the nearby Eric Mobbs Reserve.

If you haven't explored Bidjigal Reserve, then I encourage you to do so. You won't be disappointed.



**Persimmon and White Chocolate Tart With Pistachios** 

By MEREDITH PANETTA (from Panetta Mercardo - Baulkham Hills)

#### **INGREDIENTS**

#### For the chocolate pastry

150g chilled cubed butter 90g golden caster sugar 250g plain flour, plus extra for dusting 50g cocoa powder 1 egg

#### For the filling

300ml double cream 200g bar white chocolate, chopped 1 tsp vanilla bean paste 2 eggs, beaten For the syrup and fruit 50g golden caster sugar ½ vanilla pod 1-2 persimmons. cut into slices 1cm thick (you need 6 slices in total) 4 tbsp finely chopped pistachio, to serve

#### **METHOD**

#### STEP 1

Heat oven to 200C/180C fan. Put all the pastry ingredients except the egg in a food processor. Add a pinch of salt and pulse until it has the consistency of chunky crumbs. Turn the motor back on and crack the egg in. Let it run until the mixture forms a ball, then remove.

#### STEP 2

Roll the pastry out on a floured surface and use to line 6 x 8cm individual tart tins. Put in the freezer for 5 mins until hard. Line with baking parchment and baking beans. Place on a baking sheet, bake for 15 mins, then remove the parchment and baking beans. Bake for another 5 mins, then remove. Reduce the oven to 160C/140C fan/gas 3.

#### STEP 3

To make the filling, put the cream in a heatproof bowl and microwave on High for 1 min, or heat over a pan of water. When hot, add the chocolate and stir until melted, then add the vanilla and eggs, whisk well, then pour into the tart cases. Bake for 10 mins, then cool at room temperature.

#### STEP 4

Meanwhile, make the sugar syrup for the fruit, put the sugar, vanilla pod and 75ml water in a small saucepan. Heat until boiling, then simmer for 5 mins. When it's syrupy, remove from the heat and add the persimmon. Put back on the heat for 1 min. then remove and cool to room temperature.

#### STEP 5

Just before serving, add a slice of persimmon and a sprinkle of nuts to each tart.

# Former Hills hooker Dolly now an English rugby star

Former Kenthurst local Nic Dolly is lighting up the English rugby fields after barnstorming his way into the national squad. The powerful hooker played for Dural and Eastwood Rugby Club, where current Australian Sevens coach John Manenti nurtured his talent.

Dolly, 23, visited England in 2017 and was spotted by the Sale rugby scout to become one of the surprise success stories. Qualifying for England through his maternal side, Dolly plays for Leicester Tigers in the English rugby premiership.

Dolly represented the Barbarians (coached by current Australian coach Eddie Jones) against the Rest of the World in London last Sunday. The Barbarians won 48-42 with former Wallaby Israel Folau scoring a try for the World

"Individually, selfishly, I don't know how many people can say they've done it (played for the Barbarians)," Dolly told Talking Rugby Union. "So, to get the opportunity to run out on Sunday and play again, just to play well and play at a high level against high-quality players, that's what it is all about."

Dolly, a former student at Marian Catholic College, had the right support from Manenti who

told the Sydney Morning Herald: "I had to push to get him eligible to play Colts as he was underage and needed dispensation.

"He was small but was tough as. We discussed his going overseas as a learning opportunity, never could we have imagined what might end up happening.

"He's an Eastwood junior and Colt and we are incredibly proud of him."

He turned out for the English Under-20 team before being selected by then-England coach Eddie Jones in the exciting 27-26 win over South Africa in November 2021.

"I have got a really good relationship with Eddie," Dolly said. "Ever since he first called me up for my first couple of camps to give me my first cap, I am definitely grateful for what he has done for me and the opportunities he gave me.

"I am sure at the time people were saying 'he has only played 10 or so games in the Prem' and I was on the bench against one of the best



teams in the world in South Africa. All I can say to Eddie is thank you.

"I want to play as many internationals as I possibly can and I understand that is going to take a lot of hard work and I have got to re-establish myself, but that is something I am willing to do and put everything in that basket."

Eastwood are slated to move to the Hills within the next two years in what should be the biggest rugby union boost for the district.



# RISING COST OF LIVING HURTING LOCAL

# **FAMILIES AND BUSINESSES** As I have spoken to people across the electorate



A program that has been shown on the Stan streaming service called "The Ten Pound Poms" purports to tell the story of migrants from the UK to Australia back in the 1950s. As a member of such a group at that time I have my own memories of settling in a new country far from what was my homeland.

At the age of eleven I embarked on a voyage of adventure to far off Australia that took me across the seas during which I encountered different lands and cultures to those I had been used too. It broadened my life experiences and education. After around five weeks of sea travel and seeing "Flying Fish" my family reached the shores of Western Australia for a very quick visit to Fremantle where younger sister and I placed our toes in the waters of the Indian Ocean for the very first time. Later that day we re-boarded our ship "Fairsea" and travelled on to Melbourne.

We crossed the Great Australian Bight where we hit the heaviest seas that we had ever encountered with waves breaking over the decks. It was, to me, all part of this adventure

Life on board the ship was so different in the 1950s. Families were split with men and boys sleeping in quarters segregated from the females. My father and I were deep in the bowels of the ship and up at the front whilst my mother and two sisters shared a cabin with another woman and her daughter at mid-ships.

Despite the information that had been provided by Australia House in London in

many brochures depicting what we would find in Australia awaiting our arrival, very little actually turned out to be correct. Information that had shown "happy migrant families living in detached homes with nice gardens" was actually replaced by hostels that were converted military camps where families were housed in Nissen Huts. The huts would normally accommodate two or possibly three families. We had communal shared toilets, laundries and bath houses. Meals were served in Community halls. Large halls or Nissen Huts served as Youth Centres, Post Offices or Community Shops. None of the huts were serviced with air-conditioning and were hot in summer and cold in winter. In the first hostel we lived, the hostel adjoined an abattoir with millions of flies, animal smells and in the midst of a heat wave where temperatures of more than 100 degrees Fahrenheit. In the 1950s there was hostility directed at migrants by many Australians who felt their jobs and lifestyles were threatened by the hundreds and thousands of newcomers.

I found that one teacher at my local school particularly disliked the migrant children from the local hostel. What caused her dislike of migrants I never found out but such actions can and did lead to colour the views of others. Australians, I found, generally have a great sense of humour as do many migrants from various other countries. I have lost count of the times that I was called a "bloody pom" or told

that "poms would only wash a few times in a year". I took such comments in jest for a vast majority of the time, however there would be times that such comments would wear very thin. You could usually tell by the tone of speech whether it was an intentional insult or said in

I guess also the problem of accents has also led to misunderstandings for many. Whist Britons, Australians, New Zealanders, Americans and Canadians all profess to speak English different terminology and sounding of vowels etc can cause confusion between people. Despite being brought up in England for the first eleven years of my life I cannot fully understand what some other English person maybe saying. Thankfully television today provides sub-titles in text form that can be read and can possibly be something that I can write about in a humourous form sometime in the future as I have noticed many grammatical and spelling errors in the sub-titles.

Still the fact that a vast majority of migrants stayed and "made a go of it" and have contributed to make Australia what it is today speaks volumes of the success of the migration programmes of yesterday and hopefully for the country's future.
