

Repairs Completed on Vandalised Sporting Fields

New sporting fields in North Kellyville that were damaged in a senseless act of vandalism have been restored.

Council staff and contractors have worked hard to replace the turf, which was vandalised by cars in the early hours of Saturday, May 13.

"We've calculated about \$50,000 worth of damage was done when these vandals broke into our new sports complex and senselessly destroyed our fields," Mayor of The Hills Shire, Dr Peter Gangemi said.

"Some sections needed to be cut out and new turf laid. In other areas where the damage was less extensive, rolling, topdressing and fertilising could be done to save the grass.

"Fortunately, no damage to the irrigation system has occurred, but we do have delays with getting onto the next stage, which is installing the sand slit drainage."

Sand silt drainage is a method of drainage using small trenches filled with sand, gravel and pipe to remove excess water. This makes the playing surface more durable and allows sport to return much quicker after wet conditions.

"This could still impact those using the fields for this season's summer sport," Mayor Gangemi said. "But we are doing everything in our power to avoid any delays and our contractor, TRN Group, is also doing everything possible to recover impacts to the schedule caused by this reckless act.

"We know how much these sports fields mean to our local sporting groups and the wider community, and that's why we are working hard to get the grass to re-establish itself in time for summer sport.

"I'd like to thank our Council officers and contractor for restoring these fields."

Mayor Gangemi said he hoped this incident would deter would-be vandals.

"Many of our residents were outraged that someone would do this to a community facility," he said.

"Damage to our facilities inevitably leads to their closure, impacting the whole community. This is not to mention the extra resources and costs associated with their repairs, which ratepayers ultimately have to cover.

"I encourage residents to report antisocial and illegal activity to the police and this will go a long way to deterring future acts of vandalism."



A new update from the NSW Government has revealed that Warragamba Dam holds theoretical climatic and geotechnical risks in its current configuration in the case of rare weather conditions.

The main risks identified by WaterNSW are the potential for a geological seam to open beneath the wall and compromise its integrity, or for water levels in the lake to overtop and cause dam assets to be damaged.

WaterNSW stated that this risk would only be present in the event of a Probable Maximum Flood (PMF), a theoretical flood event that would far exceed any previously recorded flood event.

Speaking to Hills to Hawkesbury Community News, WaterNSW confirmed that they

conducted a comprehensive risk assessment of Warragamba Dam in May 2021 and first presented the findings to Dam Safety NSW in June 2021.

However, WaterNSW stressed that the Dam is still safe for day-to-day operation: "In adapting to climate change and the risk that extreme floods would pose to downstream communities, WaterNSW as the owner and operator of Warragamba Dam, must assess practical and reasonable ways to reduce them, in line with contemporary dam safety regulatory standards."

Labor's Water Minister Rose Jackson also reiterated that there is no immediate safety risk for Warragamba Dam: "The safety of the local community will always be our priority, and we will continue to share updates as we receive them to ensure local communities are informed and across the status of the dam."

Ms. Jackson also confirmed that WaterNSW is currently conducting investigations into the Dam to address any other issues, stating that "Our Government is committed to working with regulators to ensure the appropriate steps are taken to maintain the safety of this dam and surrounding communities."

This follows the new Labor government's announcement in April that they would not be proceeding with the plan to raise the Warragamba Dam Wall that was put into place by the Liberals before the State Election. After the recent report about the Dam was made public, the Minns government has reiterated that the policy is still for the Wall not to be raised

However, there was also some significant pushback to the rejection of the plans.
Hawkesbury Mayor Sarah McMahon has been vocal since the announcement in criticising Labor for their scrapping of the Liberal Party's plans: "As the Mayor of this community, where the Hawkesbury has been under water time and time again, Chris Minns and his Ministers just ripped all hope from us in terms of sensible, long term flood mitigation."

AFFRAY CHARGES

Police arrested 5 teenagers at Cherrybrook Metro station on Sunday (June 11th) following an affray which resulted in a stabbing at the Macquarie Park Metro just before 5.30pm.

Emergency services were called to a park in Herring Road, Macquarie Park, following reports of a brawl just before 5.30pm on Sunday 11th June. Officers from Ryde Police Area Command located a 14-year-old boy suffering a stab wound at a nearby railway station.

He was taken to hospital in a critical condition. It's alleged the injured boy was involved in a fight with a group of teens at the park before fleeing to the railway station where he was allegedly stabbed by one of the teens.

A crime scene was established at both locations, and investigation commenced into the circumstances surrounding the incident.

Following inquiries, five boys were arrested at Cherrybrook Train Station a short time later and conveyed to Ryde and Castle Hill Police

The 15- and 13-year-old boys were charged with affray and possess prohibited drug and granted conditional bail to appear before Surry Hills Children's Court on Monday 26 June 2023.

The 14-year-old and two 17-year-old boys were charged with affray and granted conditional bail to appear before Surry Hills Children's Court on Monday 26 June 2023.

STABBING CHARGE

A 16-year-old from Cattai has been charged with affray following the stabbing of a 17-year-old youth at Dural at around 10pm on Thursday 1st .lune

Emergency services attended the intersection of Frensham Place and Martin Place, Dural, following a report that a male had been stabbed. NSW Ambulance paramedics treated a 17-year-old male at the scene. He was taken to Westmead Hospital in a serious but stable condition.

It is alleged the male had been stabbed at a carpark on Allen Way before running from the scene towards Frensham Place.

The following day, at around 2.45am, the 16-year-old was arrested at a home in Cattai.

Both teenagers are known to one another. Investigations are continuing.

TRAIL BIKE THEFTS

A teenager riding a stolen trail bike who was run over by a truck on Windsor Rd at Annangrove has been charged with Aggravated Break & Enter and Steal Motor vehicle after he was discharged from hospital after three days.

Police allege that three males broke into a Motor Sports store at Capital Place Rouse Hill at around 11.30pm on May 29th and have stole six trail bikes over a number of hours secreting

At 4am on May 30th two male riders on trail bikes allegedly stolen from the store have ridden out on to Windsor Road from Annangrove Road into the path of an oncoming semi trailer. A 17-year-old rider on one of the trail bikes went under the semi trailer, and suffered serious injuries. The other rider left the scene.

Investigations by Hills Police resulted in a Search Warrant being conducted at Glenwood on 30th May 2023, where an 18-year-old male was arrested allegedly being the third male at the Break & Enter at Capital Place earlier that evening. He was charged with Aggravated Break & Enter and Steal Motor vehicle.

At 4pm on the 31st of May Hills Police executed another search Warrant at an address in Quakers Hill, where a number of items believed to be taken from the Motor Sports store and a trail bike stolen from a previous break and enter were seized. A male who resides at the premises is still wanted in relation to leaving the scene of the accident and the break and enter prior.

PEDESTRIAN INJURED

Police are appealing for witnesses to a road incident on Wednesday, 14th June which left a pedestrian with severe injuries.

A 17-year-old red P Plater who only had his licence for one month will appear in court next month charged with High Range Drink Driving following a collision on Baulkham Hills Rd, Baulkham Hills.

Police allege that the teenager was driving down Baulkham Hills Rd when he collided with a gutter near Apollo Ave at around 12.50am on Monday.12th June.

Police arrived a short time later. The driver returned a positive roadside breath test. He was arrested, taken to Castle Hill Police Station where he returned a reading of 0.181 on the Breath Analysis Machine.

He was issued with a Court attendance Notice and suspended from Driving.

DRUG BUST

On Friday 2nd June, 2023, officers attached to the State Crime Command Organised Crime Squad and The Hills Police Area Command, with the assistance of North West Metropolitan Region Operational Support Group, executed a search warrant at a high rise apartment building

During a search of the apartment and a Mercedes AMG motor vehicle located in the basement carpark, officers seized an amount of money suspected to be the proceeds of crime, various quantities of cocaine, cannabis and multiple mobile phone devices.

A 21-year-old male was arrested and is assisting police with their enquiries.. Enquiries are ongoing in relation to the supply of prohibited drugs in the Castle Hill area. Investigations are continuing.

King's Birthday Honours

An incredible collection of local volunteers have been honoured in the King's first official birthday honours list, including residents with backgrounds in health, education and sport.

Quakers Hill resident and Blacktown City COUNCILLOR JULIE GRIFFITHS AM was made a Member of the Order of Australia for significant service to local government, to women's football, and to industrial relations.

She has been Senior Women's Coach at Glenwood Redbacks Soccer Club, since 2012 and is a committee member, Coach, and Volunteer, Quakers Hill Soccer Club. She is former Chairperson and a Board Member of Women in Sport.

Councillor Griffiths was first elected to Blacktown City Council in 2008 and has twice served as Deputy Mayor. For the past 30 years, she has been an active member of the Australian Local Government Women's Association (ALGWA) NSW, serving as President.

DR GREG MARCAR OAM from North Kellyville was awarded a Medal of the Order of Australia for service to medicine through a range of roles.

He graduated from medical school in Bangalore and worked in India before moving to Australia. "I was interested in Public Health and preventative medicine." he said. He held several roles during the next 25 years including Acting Deputy Medical Officer of Health and Relieving Medical Controller, Granville Train Disaster in 1977.

"It was an awful sight, even to this day it still haunts me," he says.

Dr Marcar was Foundation President, Overseas Medical Graduates Association/ Australian Indian Medical Graduates Association.

"It was set up to deal with equity issues and registration issues," he said.

His contribution to the medical field through a range of roles on boards and committees has made a considerable impact at both State and Federal levels. He also served on an advisory committee to the Ethnic Affairs Commission of NSW.

When he retired from the role of Medical Superintendent at Lidcombe Hospital it became his mission as a volunteer to preserve the 100 year plus history of the hospital site after it was sold to developers.

He founded the Lidcombe Heritage Group in 1995 and was Principal author of the book: A Historical Tour of Lidcombe Hospital. "We



wanted to make people aware and we did. Most

wanted to make people aware and we did. Most of the significant buildings have been tastefully preserved. There is a very nice heritage trail and our book has been referenced," he said.

Dr Marcar said when he first received the email telling him about the OAM while holidaying with his wife Dianne he thought it was a scam.

The 84-year-old spent the day of the official announcement walking his daughter's dog and telling his three children and grandchildren the good news.


Musically in Good Hands

Indie rock outfit In Good Hands, who hail from four different corners of North-Western Sydney, have recently released their third single *Feel This Way* and played a stellar gig to celebrate at The Great Club in Marrickville.

The clock displayed 10pm as the lights dimmed. The atmosphere became alive with excitement as guitars were slung over shoulders and the clacking of drumsticks rang through the buzzing venue. From the first chord that lead singer and rhythm guitarist Jack Kenyon strummed, the crowd was totally engaged for the next hour of top tunes.

The warm angst of Jack's vocals provided a wonderful tone the entire night; meanwhile, lead guitarist Jayden Hall effortlessly danced his hands across the neck of his guitar. Drummer Simon Godbehere proved why his bandmates call him a human metronome, and bassist Harry Archbold diligently delivered slick basslines. The audience's energy was infectious through the set, smiles never too far from the faces of the four musicians.



Being raised in Pitt Town, Kellyville, Riverstone and Quakers Hill, each member of In Good Hands has brought a wide number of local friends and family to the show, all excited to bring their support to Sydney's Inner West.

The history of In Good Hands is present in how comfortable they are playing together. The band started practising in 2019 after Jack, Harry and Simon had been in another group together. "I thought we played really well together, and I had a few songs I wanted to play with a band as well," Jack says.

an arpeggio I discovered, and I fitted chords around that. When I'm writing songs, I'm always thinking about hooks, all the time. So normally if I get a hook, I write around that, rather than writing it from start to finish."

When the song came on deep into In Good Hands' hour-long set, the audience full of enthusiastic supporters recited all the lyrics of the song back to the band while throwing their hands up; a moment that Jayden described as awesome.

That energy from the crowd gives the quartet inspiration to create music, despite packed full-time schedules. "I think we all do a good job of balancing," comments Jayden, "But it's still a challenge. We meet up at least once a week, but going into creative mode after a full day of work, trying to get the juices flowing at nighttime, it can be difficult."

Despite that difficulty, music is a refreshing outlet for all of In Good Hands. "The thing for me, it's just the love of music, the love of creating, the craft of it," says Simon. "Being able to build something, look back on it and be proud of it, that's what drives me."

As the last notes of their "cult classic" single Lately echo through The Great Club, the crowd isn't ready for the show to be over. They chant for "One more song!" The four looked at each other, checking the time to ensure they hadn't gone over their 11'o'clock curfew. 10:56 pm - enough time for one more song.

It was hard to tell that In Good Hands' late-night rendition of *Mamma Mia* had been a late addition to the setlist, the boys still running

through chords ten minutes before the show started. Regardless, everyone was ready to go again one last time as the venue came alive for the encore.

Without warning, the lights switched off. The band would find out that the photographer they hired had accidentally stepped on a power switch, casting the whole show into darkness. Jack, Jayden, Harry and Simon continued to play in the dark, when an audience member turned their phone flashlight on. Another followed suit, and then several more until a sea

of lights shone brightly onto the stage, allowing perfect vision of the last moments of In Good Hands' time on-stage.

After the show, the band agrees that the Feel This Way launch gig was one of the best gigs that they've ever played. Harry says: "It's that energy. Being able to be such a big part of creating the vibe of the room... It's really exciting. It just feels good to have mates jumping around and singing to songs that you made. We're just there for a good time, and it seems like others are too."

Green Funding for Norwest

The Clean Energy Finance Corporation has given an \$80 million green loan to Mulpha Australia for Stage 1 of its Norwest Quarter residential development.



Importance of Annual Hearing Tests

Our sense of hearing plays a key role in our overall health and wellbeing. While poor hearing and ear health can have serious lifelong negative effects if they are not managed correctly. Consequently, an annual hearing test is imperative for every Australian, regardless of age. It is very easy for all of us to overlook our hearing health if we do not feel as though we are struggling or needing hearing care. Although, regular hearing checks are just as important as regularly seeing your general practitioner or dentist.

There are numerous reasons why we should all have regular hearing checks. First, hearing loss can be the result of another underlying health concern, such as high blood pressure, diabetes, or a heart disease. Disorders that effect the blood circulation to parts of the body, including the organ of hearing, can cause a permanent hearing loss than cannot be reversed. Therefore, it is important that your hearing is regularly monitored to ensure that your health conditions are not impacting on your ears and listening.

Annual hearing assessments can allow you and your hearing care provider to have a baseline understanding of your hearing. Many people tend to only have a hearing test when they suddenly notice a change to their hearing, or they are really struggling to hear. If we have a baseline understanding of your hearing, then we can track and measure changes as they occur to achieve a more accurate diagnosis

and treatment. For example, unfortunately there is a high incidence of something called a sudden onset sensorineural hearing loss. This means there has been rapid loss of hearing in one or both ears in the matter of hours or days. We often do not know why this has occurred, although, the correct treatment of this hearing loss depends on being able to measure how much the hearing has changed. This is difficult to do if we do not know your baseline hearing or if you had a pre-existing hearing loss that had not been measured.

Additionally, if you are aware that you have a hearing loss, it is imperative that you monitor your hearing annually to ensure your hearing loss is not changing or progressing. This annual hearing test could alert the hearing care professional to any potential dangers such as noise-induced hearing loss, ear wax buildup or even a tumour on the hearing nerve. If changes to your hearing are measured and treated early, we may be able to prevent further damage.

Lastly, an untreated hearing loss can affect the function of our brain and cognition. If a hearing loss is left untreated for too long, our ears experience something called auditory deprivation. This means that the hearing nerve is not stimulated, and it forgets how to process auditory information. Therefore, the brain is not receiving information to remain healthy and active. Research has

shown that this auditory deprivation can lead to cognitive decline and possibly dementia. Hearing loss is a slow and gradual process. which you may not notice at the beginning. Annual hearing tests mean that you are carefully monitoring your hearing with a hearing care professional.

Coen's Story

One of Australia's largest children's health charities, Sydney Children's Hospitals Foundation (SCHF) is hoping to raise \$15 million for sick kids this tax time.

"At that point in time, he was physically behind... finding out his diagnosis included some intellectual delays - that was heartbreaking," says Haley.

Coen is now under the care of a highly dedicated and specialised care team at Sydney Children's Hospitals Network, who work tirelessly to provide the support and care that he and his family need.

"At one point we had 13 specialists, as well as five allied health professionals caring for Coen," says Hayley. "I don't even want to think about where Coen would be without the care he's received. He definitely wouldn't be where he is today," says Hayley.

Hayley is incredibly grateful for the extraordinary care that Coen has received and the vital difference it has made in his life.

"Just look at our story and how much support we need for Coen. If anyone can give any little amount, it all adds up and it all helps," says Haley.

A drink and a chat with Yang Sun

ack in 2012, when I had just graduated from high school in China, my family sent me to Australia for my University

I still remember the first few weeks of my University life as I was trying to adjust to this new country, culture, language. Pretty much everything.

One day, I was walking to the bus station and passed a random bar. Through the window, was one bartender making cocktails.

The sounds of cocktails being shaken, and the vibe of the venue deeply attracted me. That was something I never experienced before, and it was then that I decided to work in a bar.

I started working at a pub as 'glassy', which is just picking up glasses. While working there I thought that Jack Daniel's and coke was a fancy and mysterious drink (laughs) Lucky that pub carried a nice selection of spirits and I found myself always picking up bottles, taking photos of them and researching them when I got home. I then became a bartender in that pub. That job went through my whole University life.

In 2017 I went straight back to China when I finished University, however, Engineering really was not my thing. I missed my time behind the bar and the vibe of a hospitality business. I started









looking for a bar job in China and luckily enough received an offer from YIHE MASHIONS (Relais & Chateaux) luxury hotel which had an impressive whisky bar.

At that time, I was addicted to Single Malts whiskies, and I was spending an extra 4-5 hours after my shifts searching for and improving my knowledge of single malts. 

Hills teen Isabella to make debut for the Philippines

Kellyville Ridge teenager Isabella de Jesus, who has played competitive basketball for many years, will make her dream debut for the Philippines Under-16 team for the FIBA Asian Cup in Jordan in July

After being inspired by her Dad, a former professional basketballer in the Philippines. Isabella, 15, is on the cusp of creating her own slice of history.

Isabela, whose Dad Charles is Filipino, and Mum Melissa, a Filipino-Australian, was chosen to represent The Philippines after standout performances at the inaugural NBTC women's basketball tournament. She represented the Filipino-Nation Select (including female talent from the US) in Manila in April. The Select team blew their competition away to win the title after an unbeaten run.

Isabella, whose first club was Hills Hornets, was then invited to trial for the U16 Philippine national team to play in the FIBA Asia Cup in July 2023, in the USA.

"I was honestly so happy that I cried because I know I have worked so hard," Isabella said of her selection to the Filipino team. "I am very proud of what I have accomplished as I got here by myself. It was a really good experience (playing for the Select team), as I got to meet really nice girls. Our chemistry was great and it was another type of ball game that I experienced because it was a lot more physical and fast. I got to compete at the higher levels."

The shooting guard, who last played for the Hornsby Spiders in the Waratah Junior

Basketball League, has been putting in the hard vards through the Talented Athlete Program and Developing Athlete Program while trialling for the NSW PSSA teams.

Isabella, one of four children, caught the eye of selectors after attending a Filipino-Australian Basketball Combine scouting camp in Sydney earlier this year.

A student of St John Paul II Catholic College at Schofields, Isabella is honing her skills by training with the NBL1 Inner West Bulls team, though she is too young to represent them. The versatile athlete represents her school in basketball, netball, Oztag, and crosscountry running.

"I would love to play college basketball and hopefully even go pro in the Women's National Basketball League," Isabella said. "My shortterm goals are to do well at the Asia Cup, help the Philippines to do well, and get to finish my high school years in America."

Remarkably, Isabella is also a level 2 accredited basketball coach. She coaches the Royals Basketball club under the highlyexperienced Rodger Mantua. Isabella is now undergoing a four-week training camp in Manila before the national team competes in the Asia Cup in Amman, Jordan from July 10-16.

It's not surprising that when news reports of horrific heat leading to the death of sheep being exported to the Middle East that people call on the government to act. For the last 7 years, I've received hundreds of emails and phone calls on this issue, pleading for the government to do more to prevent animal cruelty.

The Albanese Government is taking a leadership role, as government should. We took a commitment to the last election - and the one before - to end live sheep exports, and last month in Parliament, legislation passed through the lower house to improve the animal welfare rules.

Prioritising animal welfare just makes sense: the industry acknowledges it, the community knows it and our trading partners expect it.

Our improvements expand the role of the Inspector-General of Live Animal Exports to include additional animal welfare-related objectives. One of the first things that will happen, when the legislation passes the Senate, is a review of the effectiveness of the things livestock export officials do, to identify any gaps that are affecting animal welfare.

The package of changes will increase the oversight, accountability and transparency for exported livestock, part of our commitment to a science-based approach to animal welfare.

Work is underway to consult with the agricultural sector on the timeline for phasing out the live sheep trade. It will not end in this term of Parliament, because we want to allow time for individuals and businesses to adapt and prepare for that transition.

This provides the space to look at what opportunities open up in terms of expanding domestic processing and increasing sheepmeat export overall. I think that is appropriate, but in the meantime, I'm pleased to see higher standards and greater transparency of this sector.

Recently I spent my Monday morning hosting a mobile office in Seven Hills Station. It was great to chat with local residents and small business owners commuting to work.

ROUGHLEY SPEAKING ABOUT AN OLD MATE

Having lived in The Hills for quite some time I have met some wonderful characters whom I remember fondly. One such person, I would have to say, was a guy who sold his home to the local council for just \$1.

The fellow I called an old mate was Gordon "Clive" Roughley who lived in the home in which he was born in 1914, known as "The Pines" at Dural. Old Clive was known locally as the "Honey & Egg Man". One recollection I have is calling on Clive one evening when it was getting dark. Knowing that he spent much of his time in the rear kitchen I went to his back door and knocked. He came to the door with a lump of 4" x 2" wood in his hand ready to "knock me head over heels". You see Clive had been robbed a number of times and was fearful that I may have been a burglar. He always had a dog at the house. I can recall three dogs that he owned during the years that I knew him. They were "Sally", "Jackson" and "P.C." (for Police Constable), so named as he had obtained it from the local Police who gave him "P.C" after a robbery to help frighten off any burglars.

Clive was often seen pulling out wads of notes from his pocket as he gave out change to purchasers of his honey or eggs. No doubt this would have been an attraction to those who wished to rob him of his hard-earned cash. Among the robberies was a situation where his dog "Sally" attacked a pair of burglars who stole \$600 he had collected for a childrens' cancer charity. Clive loved to chat with visitors particularly during "Jazz at The Pines" concerts which were being held on his front lawn.

It was through the original "Jazz at The Pines" events that I first came to know Clive. My wife and I were members of a local tourist association and, at a meeting where the establishment of a Tourist Information Centre was being discussed, a suggestion was put that such a centre should be sought to be built at Mt.

Wilberforce, West Pennant Hills. Later it came to the group's notice that the local

council had built a building that would suit our purpose. The building was located alongside the driveway to "The Pines" and had been built with funds being donated by way of a grant to council in 1988 for the Bi-centennial year. The group formed a new Tourist Association taking in the Greater Hills area, with representatives from tourist related business. Thus, Sydney Hills Tourism Inc. stationed at "The Pines", was formed with Lisa Pegler as Chairperson, my wife as Secretary, myself as Public Officer and Jennifer Touzel, daughter of this magazine's founder, handling publicity. The Committee then established "Jazz at The Pines" as a way of introducing the new Tourist Information Centre to the local community.

Clive always made us feel welcome and would sit on his front verandah listening to the

various jazz bands and other performers that would entertain the visitors once a month on what became an enjoyable afternoon. Later the Council decided to form a management committee to manage the event as it was on Council owned property and even later handed the operation of "Jazz at The Pines" to a local Rotary Club where it is still held on a regular basis during the warmer months of the year.

Clive's home is a time capsule of the five generations of Roughley family that once lived at "The Pines". Clive, being the last member of the family to reside there, died during February 2002. At his funeral which I attended, his dog "P.C." was also in attendance.


