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Rotary Awards

Members from the 65 Rotary Clubs from District 9685 gathered at two special Changeover lunches to witness District Governor Mina Howard hand over the chains of office to incoming District Governor Christine Owen.

Toplace Fallout by Bev Jordan

Thousands of people will be affected by the collapse of developer Toplace Pty Ltd which was placed into receivership on Monday (7th July). Company director Jean Nassiff is believed to still be overseas.

Toplace has several high rise developments in the HIlls including Atmosphere and Skyview at Castle Hill and was developing Box Hill City Centre at Box Hill on land bounced by Terry Rd and Mason Road. The Toplace website is still showing plans for townhouse developments at Grand, Kellyville and Watkins Street, Baulkham Hills.

Antony Resnick and Suelen McCallum of DVT Group were announced as voluntary administrators (Administrators) of Toplace Pty Ltd (Toplace) on Monday (7th July)

Fair Trading NSW is urging anyone who believes they have claims against Toplace to contact the administrators by calling (02) 9633 3333 or emailing mail@dvtgroup.com.au to register as an unsecured creditor.

The first meeting for creditors is being held on 19th July at Drummoyne Oval.

NSW Police issued an arrest warrant out for Jean Nassif last month alleging he obtained a \$150-million loan from Westpac through fraudulent pre-sale documents for the construction of three buildings in the Skview development in Day Street Castle Hill.

On June 15th this year Hills Shire Council issued Toplace with a notice to rectify fire safety issues at its Skyview Apartment building after the partially completed apartment complex failed a Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW) inspection.

FRNSW discovered several fire safety breaches including an inoperable and dry fire hydrant system (for the three of five buildings under construction within the complex), faults, isolations, and disablements on the fire indicator panel, problems with the emergency warning and intercom systems, issues with the absence of fire compartmentation in the basement carpark. A media statement from Hills Shire Council said staff also inspected the building and identified issues with the sprinkler system, non-compliant ceiling heights, nonrelated fire services found in the fire stairway and problems with fire doors not opening and closing, amongst other safety breaches.

In March Advisory firm KordaMentha was appointed as the receivers and managers of 51 OCHR and JKN Finance which were listed as the owner and developers of the Skyview complex of five towers..

Buyers were prevented from moving into the 900-apartment complex after the NSW Building Commissioner confirmed "extensive signs of cracking" were discovered in the building's basement.

Toplace and its associated entities are being sued in the NSW Supreme Court over its Atmosphere project at Castle Hill and two developments at Parramatta.

NSW Fair Trading has stated that disciplinary action to cancel and disqualify Toplace's contractor licence remains in force.

Building work rectification orders and other orders issued by NSW Fair Trading remain in force.

TEEN STABBED

Police are investigating a stabbing of a teenager following a party in the Hawkesbury.

Emergency services were called to a service station on Bells Line of Road at North Richmond just before 1 am on Saturday, 1st July 2023 where they found a teenager suffering stab wounds.

The 19-year-old was treated by ambulance paramedics before he was taken to Westmead Hospital where he remains in a stable condition with non life-threatening injuries.

Police were told he was stabbed after he and his friends were confronted by three men after they left a party held at a property on East Kurrajong Road, East Kurrajong.

The 19-year-old was punched to the head and stabbed twice in the lower back before the group fled the scene in a dark vehicle; they were last seen travelling north along East Kurrajong Road.

Friends drove the injured man to the North Richmond service station where they met with the ambulance paramedics.

Officers from Hawkesbury Police Area Command are appealing for anyone with information to contact Crime Stoppers.

The males have been described as being of Pacific Islander / Maori appearance, aged in their late teens to early 20s, and with heavy builds.

FRAUD WARNING

Police are again warning people to be very careful about clicking on links sent through text messaging on mobile phones or through emails purporting to be from the Australian Taxation Office or from banks.

In May 2023, the ATO received 1,978 reports of ATO impersonation scams _ a 70% increase from last month. Of those 742 were SMS messages on mobile phones, 1,128 were scam emails, 94 were via landline phones and 12 were on social media.

According to the Government's Scamwatch https://www.scamwatch.gov.au scammers are using new technology which tricks victims into believing the call comes from the bank's legitimate phone number or by sending a text that appears in the same conversation thread as genuine bank messages.

A Box Hill businesswoman who was nearly scammed last month said it was important to warn others on how easily it happens.

She was taken in by a text from her bank (pictured) containing an Online Security Code "837829" asking her to call NAB on 1800 517 229 if she don't recognise the transaction. Ref: JA283.

She said she rang and the call went through to similar sounding recordings as the real NAB and she followed the prompts to get through to someone. She was asked if she had used her credit card for a \$400 purchase in Canberra and she said NO.

She was "escalated" to someone in "security" who said he would help her reset her password as there had been signs of fraudulent activity. "The whole call was so professional and seemed genuine," she said. "He told me that he had blocked/secured my accounts, and that I needed to go to an NAB branch on Monday quote Ref # T400AB to get get my new Personal ID, and also a refund for the \$400 that was transferred out."

It was then that alarm bells started ringing, it was Friday and she couldn't understand why she couldn't go to the bank straight away.

She called the NAB number on their website and realised when she spoke to staff she had been scammed. The bank acted quickly and blocked the card. She reported the incident to the bank and Police Assistance line.

Scamwatch received 14,603 reports about bank impersonation scams in 2022, resulting in more than \$20 million in losses. Total losses to phone and text scams increased significantly last year, with over \$169 million lost.

If you receive an SMS with a telephone number to call, do not use it. Instead, call your bank direct on a number you have sourced yourself.

Never provide online banking passwords, one-time security codes, pins or tokens to anyone over the phone. Contact your bank or financial institution immediately if you think you have been scammed.

Never click on links. Links have also been generated by scammers pretending to be from Australia Post and other delivery services asking people to click on links.

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PEDESTRIAN INJURED

Police are investigating a crash in West Pennant Hills on 5th July which left a pedestrian with critical injuries. Emergency services were called to the intersection of Castle Hill Road and Church Street at West Pennant Hills at about 9.50am (Wednesday 5th July 2023) following reports a pedestrian was struck by a car.

The pedestrian, an 83-year-old man, was taken to Westmead Hospital in a critical condition. The driver, a 67-year-old man, was not injured and was taken to Westmead Hospital for mandatory testing.

Officers from The Hills Police Area Command established a crime scene and are investigating the circumstances surrounding the incident.

As inquiries continue, anyone with dashcam vision or further information is urged to come forward. Contact Crime Stoppers. Information is treated in strict confidence.

PLAY-DOH DRIVE

The Hawkesbury Police Area Command kicked off its annual Play-doh Drive with a huge haul at Richmond Market on 29th of June.

Every year the Play-doh is donated to children at Westmead Children's Hospital where the product is used by the hospital's physiotherapy teams to assist with muscle recovery, co-ordination building and other treatments to assist the recovery of young patients from illness or surgery.

Due to a risk of cross infection, the Play Doh is disposed of after each use.

Thanks to the community's response every year the Hawkesbury Police drive has provided thousands of tubs to the hospital, enough to last a year, enabling the money normally spent on the purchase of Play Doh to be used on other things at the hospital.

The next collection will be at Richmond Good Food Market on Saturday, July 22nd.

Older Women's Housing By BEV JORDAN

A move to open up accommodation in Kenthurst for older women at risk of homelessness is another step closer with the Kenthurst Community Transitional Housing project launched on the Wesley Mission's website.

Wesley Community Housing (part of Wesley Mission) and a local community steering committee are working together to provide a safe haven for women over 55 without a roof over their heads. Wesley Mission Housing will manage the property.

The housing project has won the support of several local service groups including Kenthurst Rotary Club, Galston branch of the Country Women's Association and The Hills branch of Soroptimists International which have given a financial commitment.

Members of the former Kenthurst Uniting Church began looking at options to provide accommodation to people who were homeless around five years ago,

At one point members looked at the feasibility of converting unused rooms at the Jones Rd church into transitional short-term accommodation but Parramatta/Nepean Presbytery of the Uniting Church viewed the conversion of the church building as too costly and Uniting offered another building instead.

Several years of talks between Uniting and Wesley Mission have now had a positive result. James Visione and Dennis van Someren who led the campaign thanked all the groups and individuals who had attended the public meeting, heard the talks and committed their support.

They told the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News: "A safe and comfortable home is a basic need we all share. We want the Kenthurst project to provide this security to at least a few of the growing number of older women experiencing homelessness.

"The project may become an example of what can be done, even by a small but determined group with community support, a possible pilot for similar projects elsewhere. It has taken a long time to get off the ground but we never lost hope. We were continually encouraged by our faith and the goodwill and support of so many individuals and community groups."

Terese Wilson from Kenthurst Rotary said: "Kenthurst Rotary Club is very supportive of this. We should be supporting older people."

Ann Waters from Galston CWA (Country Women's Association) said her branch had donated to the project because they believed it was needed. "Our members felt as women that it is very important to have a safe place in the area for women."

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

Rouse Hill Estate

Rouse Hill Estate offers an amazing glimpse into the history of Rouse Hill.

On the top of the hill within the Estate sits the heritage Rouse Hill House which has magnificent views over adjacent paddocks and was owned by 6 generations of the Rouse and Terry families.

The house was initially constructed by Richard Rouse, who was the Colonial Superintendent of Public Works and Convicts at Parramatta in 1813. This particular site was chosen given its proximity to the Windsor Road tollhouse which formed part of Governor Macquarie's upgraded road to the Hawkesbury River and allowed Rouse to keep an eye not only on the tollhouse but also on his ever expanding property portfolio.

Following the construction of the house outbuildings were added over time including the laundry wing, cottage, barn, woolshed and servant's arcade. A large formal garden was also constructed and today remains one of Australia's oldest surviving colonial gardens.

Given its continuous occupation by a single family, each generation simply improved and added another layer of additions and objects. Today the house contains 20,000 artefacts spanning over 180 years and include the earliest colonial treasures such as baubles and brooches to a 1960s television. The Rouse and Terry families continued to occupy the house until the late 1990s when it opened to the public as a Museum.

Apart from Rouse Hill House, Rouse Hill Estate also includes the restored 1888 Rouse Hill school house, a section of the original Windsor Road turnpike proclaimed by Governor Macquarie in 1813, and the site of the doomed 1804 'Vinegar Hill' convict rebellion.

The Rouse Hill Estate is now operated by Museums of History NSW and it is an opportunity to step back in time and to explore the estate whilst having fun and getting some exercise. You can walk along part of the original Windsor Road, look at the animals on site including cows, horses and chickens, take a tour of the Rouse Hill House as well as exploring the outbuildings, stables, barns and the expansive gardens. The highlight for us, however, was exploring the school house, writing on small chalk boards, looking at specimens in jars and ringing the school bell.

The visitors centre onsite is also an opportunity to learn more about the history of the site including the Aboriginal history of the area and includes some great displays. A room in the visitors centre is dedicated to a Lego model of the Rouse Hill Estate and an opportunity for children and adults to sit down and have fun building their own models as well.

Rouse Hill Estate is open to the public every Sunday for free and is a great activity for families and kids. For more information on the Estate go to https://mhnsw.au/visit-us/rousehill-estate

Vale Warren Glenny By BEV JORDAN

Long-time former president of CHRG (Castle Hill RSL Group) Warren Glenny AO passed away on Wednesday 5th July. He was 87.

The Castle Hill Resident was a club director for 26 years and President for 17 years. He had dedicated 70 years of his life serving his community through various roles including Commissioner of St John Ambulance and Commander of the 1/15th NSW Lancers.

The retired Major General was also Patron of numerous service clubs and charities.

He joined the Royal New South Wales Lancers in 1950 as a regimental cadet and did national service in 1953 before completing his time in the Lancers as Lt Colonel and Commanding officer in 1975.

He held several posts at Reserve HQ and in 1990 was promoted to Major General and was sent to Melbourne to command 3rd Division and then to Sydney to Command 2nd Division and serve full time in the Reserves.

He was an honorary ambulance officer early in his life which was followed by a 7-year stint as a volunteer firefighter. He was heavily involved in the Parramatta Foundation Week Procession (1964 to 1976) and in later life was chair of the Refugee Resettlement Advisory Council among other appointments.

He worked in the wool industry for nine years and for a time worked in the steel industry. He was a retail executive which included time as General Manager with K-Mart in 1986 and GM for Coles Myer-Linfox joint venture. He accepted early retirement and later became CEO of AUSTCARE (Australia's Overseas Refugee Aid Organisation (1996 to 2002) which included clearing landmines in Cambodia.

Warren was the recipient of numerous awards for service. He was appointed an Order of Australia, a Commander of the Order of St John, was a recipient of the Chief of Army's Commendation, and the Reserve Forces Decoration to name a few.

CHRG Group general manager David O'Neill said Warren was an inspirational leader, mentor and friend – kind, compassionate, considerate and committed to his family, friends, colleagues and the community.

"He was a true statesman respected, and admired by all that met him," he said. Warren will be best remembered as a loving husband, father, mentor and friend."

Cheryl Hill, President of the Castle Hill sub-branch, said that Warren first joined the sub-branch in 1960 and had been a member for 63 years.

"Warren regularly attended sub-Branch meetings and was an avid supporter of the sub-Branch and all of its activities," she said. "He was a very compassionate man, a great mentor, always ready to give his time and to listen, his guidance and wisdom will be greatly missed."

Warren is survived by his wife of 59 years, Gay and their son Andrew.

The funeral service will be held on Friday, 14th July at 11am at All Saints Church North Parramatta.

The Glenny family have asked for donations to the Heart Foundation in lieu of flowers.

There are thousands of reasons to head to the Gables on Sunday 30th July between 9am and noon, where Hills Shire Council will be celebrating National Tree Day with a huge tree-planting event.

The Council is expecting 4,500 trees to be placed at Wheelie Park to increase the amount of greenery in the new suburb. Mayor of the Hills Shire Peter Gangemi shared his excitement for the upcoming event, which community members are encouraged to participate in. "It's a great initiative where we can give back to the environment, and we can get volunteers involved to help improve the local area in a practical way," he said.

The Mayor continued, adding that residents will be helping to make the Gables a more environmentally friendly place: "As a council, we're looking to plant more trees in newly

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developed areas - they provide more shade and it's great for the habitat. It's an initiative that is good for both the environment and the community."

The Castle Hill Lions Club are thrilled to be providing a free barbeque on the day, eager to provide for the community while they plant trees. The Club's President Ritesh Duggal is keen to help with the event: "We are here as a Lion's Club because we care for nature. It's everyone's responsibility to save the planet and Mother Earth. We're planning to have the barbeque so we can all have a little fun while we plant the trees on that day."

Helen Roth, the Lions Club Zone Chair, shared Ritesh's anticipation for the National Tree Day event. the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979. The project will therefore be exempt from the requirements for an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) in accordance with Section 90 of the NSW Parks and Wildlife Act 1974.Community consultation is being undertaken in order to assist the assessment of cultural significance of the Beaumont Hills study area. This notification is being undertaken in accordance with Section 4.1.3 of the Heritage NSW guidelines *Aboriginal cultural heritage requirements for proponents 2010.*

New Australian Musical Premieres at Richmond Players By JOSH KERWICK

A new Australian musical is having its NSW Premiere at the Richmond School of Arts, opening on August 5th. *Captain Moonlite* chronicles the adventures of Andrew George Scott, an Irish immigrant and bushranger in the late 1800s who led a gang of fellow outlaws that became the centre of an early Australian trial-by-media case.

Jye Bryant, the creator of *Captain Moonlite*, was initially intrigued by Scott's story as far back as 2016: "There's an injustice element to the story, and this captivating character in Scott that often gets in his own way. There's just so many questions, and to me that is interesting. The show uncovers how the gang were presented in the media, and we see where that was untrue."

Though Jye has extensive experience writing musicals, having penned the international hit *The Things I Could Never Tell Steven*, he initially wondered how to adapt the story of Scott into a musical. Jye found the necessary framing device in Scott's death cell letters that he found both poetic and passionate. The eventual result was *Captain Moonlite*, which Jye planned to premiere in 2020 before COVID shut down all theatre productions in NSW.

However, thanks to Queensland's more relaxed lockdown laws, the musical was able to premiere at the Redcliffe Musical Theatre. "Though I couldn't go up there, they filmed it and I got to see that," Jye says. "I reached out to critics and people who saw it, and asked 'What needs work?' So that was my rewrite, which is what's in production." It was *Captain Moonlite's* concept about a group of wrongfully maligned outlaws that made Jonathon Brown return to the director's chair. "I've directed lots of musicals and plays, and I just finished *Romeo and Juliet*," Jonathon says. "I was going to have a break when Jye talked to me about *Captain Moonlite*, and I thought 'This is interesting - a brand new story.""

Jye and Jonathon have enjoyed working together on this production, praising their actors, musicians and crew. "We've got a really strong cast and Captain Moonlite in Peter David Allison," says Jonathon. "He's one of the best actors I've ever seen. And he looks like a bushranger!" The process of collaborating with the crew has been rewarding for Jye, admiring the production crew's ability to problem-solve on a new production: "It's such a relationship of trust with a new show, but it's great fun."

"There's that hope that when people see this, they'll go 'Yeah, well, who was this guy? I want to read more about him," says Jye. "I hope that I might just have them interested in finding out who this man was."

80% of dogs Have Dental Disease by 3 years

It is often a surprise to many pet parents that their dog is suffering from dental disease at their veterinary check up. Over 80% of dogs develop dental disease by the age of 3. If we don't look after our pet's teeth properly, not only will they have problems with their teeth and gums, they can also suffer from issues elsewhere in their body.

Bad breath in dogs is often considered normal but it is actually due to an unhealthy mouth and an overgrowth of bacteria. The subsequent inflammation (gingivitis) and sore, often bleeding, gums can allow the bacteria to enter the bloodstream and spread to their internal organs potentially causing severe illness. In the later stages of dental disease, the teeth become loose and can fall out or lead to severe bone infections around the tooth roots. You may also notice dark red areas appearing along the gum line and brown discolouration (tartar) of their teeth. Normal healthy teeth should always be white.

In the early stages the problem is often reversible with regular dental care. The gold standard is daily teeth brushing with a special toothbrush and dog-specific toothpaste (human toothpaste can't be used, as is toxic to dogs!) which will help slow the build up of plaque and tartar.

Dental chews can also be offered which help to draw plague and tartar off the teeth helping to keep them clean. Special prescription dental foods are also available to help prevent dental disease in your dog. Hills T/D prescription food and OraVet chews are discounted in our practices until the end of our dental months.

During July and August, Sydney Animal Hospitals are offering free dental checks with our veterinary nurses, along with reduced price dental procedures and discounts on dental dog food. Jacqui McLachlan from Soroptimists International of the Hills said: "We have been supporting this project for two years. Social and affordable housing is one of our key focuses this year and we have made a financial commitment to support this project."

The SI group will be holding a Hidden Homeless Forum in October to discuss the issue homelessness in the area.

THE STATISTICS

ABS Statics from the 2021 census highlighted by Mission Australia show:

- 1 in 7 people experiencing homelessness are over the age of 55.
- There are over 122,000 people experiencing homelessness on any given night.

In NSW the February 2023 street count revealed 1,623 people sleeping rough – a 34 per cent increase compared to 2022.

Street counts took place between 2 February and 27 February 2023, in more than 350 towns and suburbs in 76 local government areas (LGA) across NSW.

The Housing for the Aged Action Group (HAAG) estimates there are 405,000 older women at risk of homelessness in Australia. Women experience homelessness later in life due to a number of factors including: rising housing costs, eviction, job loss, financial instability, the end of a relationship, sudden illness and disability, domestic violence or elder abuse or a combination of these factors. Limited superannuation is also a problem.

According to HAAG Many older women are "hidden" and do not present at homelessness services. They may be couch surfing, pet sitting, or travelling in vans.

Wesley Mission webpage states: "Our Wesley Community Housing team has joined with the Kenthurst community to address the growing need for safe, stable and affordable housing for older women.

"Known as the Kenthurst Community Transitional Housing project, together, we're turning a three-bedroom cottage into a safe, stable and affordable place for older women to call home. But we need your support to make this home a reality."

Founder of The Hills Winter Sleep Out Dr Michelle Byrne said it had been an eye opener for people taking part and the funds raised were needed more than ever.

"With the increased cost of living coupled with soaring energy costs, more and more families and individuals are doing it tough in our own community," she said.

"The sleep out is an opportunity to raise much needed funds to help those who are homeless or one step away from becoming homeless.





I'm proud to say that our Government has delivered on that commitment.

From the 1 July this year, around 1.2 million families will be able to access cheaper childcare - including around 9,300 families right here in Greenway.

For a family earning \$120,000 with one child in care - their child care costs will be about

\$1,700 a year less than they otherwise would be. For families on a combined income of \$80,000 or less, the Child Care Subsidy rate will lift to 90 per cent.

Families with two or more children aged under 5 in care will continue to receive the higher subsidy rate of 95 per cent for their second child and any further children.

I'm proud to belong to a Government that is committed to delivering for families. That's why we're also expanding the single parent payment and making paid parental leave more flexible for families.

I got to know Wayne through various organisations that he supported in the Hills district. Wayne, and his wife Olwyn, were active in several groups in the district which he represented in the NSW State Parliament.

Wayne was also a musician who played in a local Salvation Army band. He had a particular interest in Vintage cars though and, in what little spare time he may have found in between his various community and parliamentary work commitments, he would enjoy playing around and restoring his vintage vehicles at his Dural home.

Wayne served in the NSW Parliament from the 19th March 1988 until his retirement on the 4th March 2011 and during that time, of almost 23 years, served in the Ministry and shadow Ministry or as Parliamentary Secretary in numerous positions and on numerous Parliamentary Committees.

During the campaign for the State election held in March 2011, Barry O'Farrell, who was then leader of the Liberal Party, was opening a new Salvation Army store when he sighted an old radio for sale at just \$20, just the thing for a retirement gift for Wayne Merton. The radio, or I guess it may have been a "wireless" as they were once called, was made of bakelite and O'Farrell paid \$50 for the wireless. He asked the sales assistant if he was the store's first customer only to be told that he was the second customer. O'Farrell then commented that coming second would not happen again, referring to the upcoming election. He said, whilst performing the opening ceremony of the new Salvos store, "I like the Salvos because my family went through

Recently, at an open day held at Bella Vista Farm, a visitor enquired about staging a Vintage Car display. This approach reminded me of a person, who in the past used to organise an annual vintage car display at the Bull & Bush Hotel at Baulkham Hills. This communityminded fellow, Wayne Merton, also organised an annual Senior's

Concert at North Rocks during the same period.

Cyclone Tracy, my mother would tell you, if she was here with me today, "the people who helped the most were the Salvos."

During an interview in 2012 Wayne went on to say "Well I'm very proud of Bella Vista Farm. I was first alerted to the problems that arose at Bella Vista Farm by the caretaker. A chap by the name of Frank Ward (actually Len Ward). Frank was a very fine English gentleman, not a young man and he was the caretaker as I have indicated. He came in and told me that the farm was going to wrack and ruin and that there were vandals and hoodlums there at night time. I was listening to him and then he started to tell me the story that he was sleeping in his caravan that he lived in on the premises. One night he woke up and heard all this noise, next thing he said "everything just seemed to spin around. I didn't know what was happening". What was happening was they'd pushed his caravan down the side of the hill while Frank was in bed and the thing rolled three or four times before it stopped. He was in some state of despair. This guy was probably in his seventies at this stage. So I went out there to have a look at it and obviously saw the caravan and saw what had happened. So I then spoke about this issue in Parliament. I also raised it with a number of Ministers from time to time who had the responsibility for heritage matters. I took out two or three Ministers to have a look at it. They all agreed that there was a problem."

What people have got to understand about Bella Vista Farm is that this is the place where Merino Sheep were first bred in Australia. So we finally persuaded or found a friend in former Labor Minister Craig Knowles who could see the virtues of the farm. It was on a parcel of land some fifty acres as I recall. It just had all the ingredients to be a great recreation area and reserve for The Hills, the people of NSW and the people of Australia. So Craig Knowles indicated that he would see if he could obtain a Heritage Grant. He finally bailed me up one day in the corridor of Parliament and said "Mert he said I think that it's coming off, I'll keep in close contact with you". That's exactly what he did and that's exactly what happened. The then State Labor Government gave a grant of one million dollars which at the time was the largest single Heritage Grant that had ever been made. That got the mechanism going and also Craig Knowles suggested that a steering committee an advisory committee be set up. I was on that committee for some years. The Council has restructured it and made some changes. Then the work commenced. First of all stabilising the situation so the buildings didn't deteriorate further, then the conservation work proceeded and it's come a long way. It's now open for inspections and hopefully in the not to distant future it will be available for community use. It is an outstanding venue. It is of note that the Bella Vista Farm is probably about two or three kilometres down the road from where my grandfather's dairy farm was (in Toongabbie). Which is a bit ironic."

Wayne's daughter Rachel has followed in her father's footsteps and is now also a NSW State politician and is a member of the NSW Legislative Council (The NSW State Upper House).





Hills star Simon eyes World Cup glory By LAWRENCE MACHADO

The most capped Australian footballer in the Hills, Kyah Simon, will be showcasing her silky skills in the 2023 Women's World Cup which gets underway on Thursday, July 20.

Having missed the 2019 edition, Simon, 32, knows this could be her last chance to perform on the world stage. The Quakers Hill star, who has 111 caps, was a surprise Matildas selection having just recovered from an ACL tear, suffered while playing for Tottenham last October.

Simon, 32, has been a sensation since winning her first cap way back in 2007, scoring 29 goals. She is the eighth most-capped women's footballer in Australia. Matildas coach Tony Gustavsson called her a "game-changing" substitute after selecting her.

"I haven't got a whole season under my belt, and the discussion with Tony was that maybe I will have a different role in this team for this tournament," Simon told the Sydney Morning Herald.

"Even when Tony told me I was in the squad, I said: 'I'm not expecting a free ticket, and I don't expect a free ticket for what I've done in the past at World Cups and goals I've scored, or the type of player that I am. I want to be there because I want to feel like I deserve to be there'."

Simon is the first indigenous Australian to score a goal at a FIFA Women's World Cup (in

2011). She attended the Pacific Hills Christian School, Dural, and later Hills Sports High School.

Simon first played for Quakers Hill Junior Soccer Club, and later for Hills Brumbies and Penrith Nepean United. Her prodigious talent saw her represent Australia at just 16 years.

I have been writing about this amazinglytalented but humble footballer for years and she is very grateful to the Quakers Hill club.

"I like to go back to the club and help them because they have given me the first opportunity to play rep football," she told me some years ago. "It's a huge honour they have named the Golden Boot after me and that will always keep me tied to the club."

She has played professional football for Australian, European, and American clubs though her recent injury had her pondering her future. "Why do I want to play football? Why do I want to put myself through this?," she told the SMH.

"Emotionally, I was a moody wreck some days and then other days, I'd be on top of the world because I had small wins in my rehab. So, Quaker Hill's Kyah Simon can play a big role for the Matildas. Picture courtesy KS Facebook

I really tried to stay present and not even think about the World Cup."

The 2023 Women's World Cup, contested by 32 countries, is jointly hosted by New Zealand and Australia from July 20 – August 20. The Matildas are grouped with Ireland (their first opponents on July 20), Canada, and Nigeria.

Bruce Fraser's Footballing legacy will live on By LAWRENCE MACHADO

Much-loved Bruce Fraser, the founding father of Glenhaven Football Club, is being mourned by his family, the club and community.

Bruce, 72, a towering influence in sports in the Hills and beyond, was fittingly awarded the Commonwealth Australian Sports Medal in 2000.

He was married to Donna, and they have two children, Andrew, and Kristy, and four grandchildren, Bronson, Ryan, Dylan, and Theo.

A brilliant goalkeeper in his younger days in Queensland, Bruce played for Pine River, where he helped in the development of that club, and San Souci before moving to Glenhaven. Glenhaven FC said it was in 1990 when Bruce and other local football enthusiasts decided to form the club. "The inaugural official meeting took place on March 25 1991 at Glenhaven Community Centre, where Bruce Fraser was elected as our inaugural president," the club said.

After consultation with the then Baulkham Hills Shire Council, a Park Management Committee including Bruce, was formed to develop Holland Reserve which opened in 1991.

Initial funds to finance the Holland Road project were sourced through donations, raffles & BBQs run by the Glenhaven Father's Club plus the generosity of members. On January 19, 1991, the first Glenhaven Soccer Club Registration Day was held. The club fielded just seven teams in the 1991 winter season.

Bruce served the club as president for the first 10 years, playing a vital role in its success. Apart from his long football playing days, he played many 6-a-side competitions in the Kenthurst and Glenhaven summer series plus touch football. According to club secretary Terry Louras Hoyle, they now boast over 600 registered players representing 43 teams, including 25 junior mixed sides. There are more than 100 coaches, managers and volunteers who

support the committee. Bruce was the first person at the fields even on a cold winter's morning and was a familiar figure walking his dogs around Glenhaven Oval or Holland Reserve.



Close mate John Robertson said Bruce was incredibly passionate about sports. "He was an avid cricketer, with St George and Kenthurst," John recalled. "He played a lot of golf, and we joined Lynwood Country Club when it opened. Bruce had retired due to Parkinson's, and I was between jobs, so we played a lot of mid-week golf there.

"I started full time work again, and Bruce kept going for as many years as he could. He made a lot of new friends there and it was quite amazing to see all the symptoms disappeared when he was concentrating on the game.

"His influence on the football kids throughout the years was just enormous, and his legacy from that will live on.

When he was unable to tend to his beloved garden, we organised a working bee to do a makeover and tidy up. The first ones to put their hands up to attend were the kids that grew up through Glenhaven FC and knew how much they owed the man. It was heartwarming to say the least.

"It was his passion, vision, and drive that has made not just this football club, but all those others that he has been involved in." May the turf rest gently on him.

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


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
