Mrs Pal and her daughter Nayna will be among 72 residents taking their citizenship oaths on Australia Day at the Hills Shire Council event.

Born in Nadi, Fiji, Mrs Pal and her husband Ashwin, lived in Wellington, New Zealand, after marriage in 2002 and moved to Sydney in 2007. The couple and their 14-year-old daughter all have New Zealand citizenship.

She said they love Australia's natural beauty and appreciate the delightful mix of cultures.

"I always wanted to be an Australian citizen because I love this country," Mrs Pal said. "This is very exciting for us and we will celebrate the citizenship with a barbecue on January 28, because it is my husband's birthday. I do love New Zealand but Australia is very green like Fiji. Australia has a mix of everything and is an exotic place."

Mrs Pal, whose sister-in-law is also receiving her citizenship, said she does miss some things from Fiji, "specially family, friends and the laid back lifestyle".

The Pals moved into West Pennant Hills several years ago, having first lived in Epping and Ryde.

TREE TRAPS WOMAN

A 26-year-old woman sustained injuries to her neck and lower limbs when a tree fell onto the caravan she was in during the storms on Monday, January 4. CareFlight's Rapid Response Helicopter was tasked by NSW Ambulance at 4:45pm and landed in Wiseman's Ferry on a nearby oval around 5.05pm. NSW Ambulance paramedics had provided initial treatment to the woman. CareFlight's specialist doctor and NSW Ambulance critical care paramedic worked with emergency services crews from the RFS and Fire and Rescue NSW to extricate the woman and perform a clinical assessment on her while taking spinal precautions. The woman was freed from the caravan after one-and-a-half-hours and was airlifted by helicopter in a stable condition to Westmead Hospital. (Picture: Careflight)

TEEN CRITICAL

Two men have been charged after a teenage boy was found critically injured on Perseus Circuit, Kellyville, around 10.30pm on Monday, January 4. The Hills Police Area Command said the 17-year-old was treated at the scene by NSW Ambulance paramedics before being taken to Westmead Hospital, where he is in a critical condition. Following inquiries, an 18-year-old man was arrested at Windsor Police Station about 10.30am on Tuesday, January 5. He was charged with assault with intent to rob armed offensive weapon wound/weapon and refused bail. Police will allege the older man was in a vehicle with three other males, aged 18, 19 and 20, who drove to the location to meet with the younger male. Police will allege the charged man stole a quantity of e-cigarettes from the younger man while armed with a knife. A 19-year-old man was arrested at Castle Hill Police Station on Friday, January 8. He was charged with negligent driving occasioning grievous bodily harm and failing to stop and assist after vehicle impact causing grievous bodily harm. He was granted strict conditional bail and is due to appear at Parramatta Local Court on Wednesday, February 3.



SUSPICIOUS FIRE

The Hills Police Area Command is treating a house fire in Rouse Hill as suspicious. Emergency services were called to a two-story house at Pellegrino Grove, Rouse Hill, about 4am on Sunday, January 10, and found the brick home well-alight. Fire and Rescue NSW crews extinguished the blaze with only minor damage sustained to the building. There was no one home. Police believe it was a targeted incident and investigations are continuing. DISQUALIFIED UNTIL 2038

A 52-year-old South Windsor man, disqualified from driving until 2038, has been charged with multiple traffic offences. About 4pm on Monday, January 11, officers from Hawkesbury Highway Patrol received reports of a fail-to-stop crash on Macquarie Street, Windsor. Police were told a Holden Commodore crashed into the back of a utility and drove off. A short time later, officers located the vehicle on Mileham Street, Windsor. The Holden failed to stop when directed to by police, and a pursuit was initiated. A short time later, police arrested the driver after the Holden stopped on James Meehan Street. Police allege he provided a positive roadside breath test. He was taken to Windsor Police Station, where he allegedly returned a breath analysis reading of 0.219. Checks revealed the man is disqualified from driving until 2038. He was charged with drive with high range PCA, not give particulars to other driver, police pursuit not stop – drive recklessly, drive motor vehicle during disqualification period, disobey no right turn sign and negligent driving. The man was refused bail.

GRENADE FOUND

The Police and Bomb Squad took possession of a WW1 grenade found in Haigh Place, Castle Hill, which apparently belonged to a deceased veteran. Anyone with information about this incident is urged to contact Crime Stoppers: 1800 333 000.



THREE GIRLS BURNT

Three girls were rushed to hospital in a stable condition after suffering burns when the boat they were in caught fire on the Hawkesbury River (Cumberland Reach) on Sunday, January 10. CareFlight's Rapid Response chopper landed next to the river at 4.29pm with crews from NSW Police, NSW Fire and Rescue and NSW Ambulance crews also on scene. Two CareFlight specialist doctors and a NSW Ambulance critical care paramedic provided treatment to a six- year-old and two ten-year-old girls who all suffered burns to the face and body. One girl was flown to the Children's Hospital at Westmead and two were taken by road with NSW Ambulance and a CareFlight doctor providing ongoing care. (Picture: Careflight)

MACCAS RAGE

A man has been charged after allegedly damaging property and refusing to comply with a Public Health Order at a McDonald's outlet in Kellyville Ridge. About 8pm on Saturday, January 9, Quakers Hill officers attended the McDonald's restaurant on Windsor Road, following reports a customer had been aggressive towards staff. Police will allege in court a man began to make an order at the counter when he was asked by staff to complete a COVID-safe check-in, in line with the current Public Health Orders. The man refused and allegedly became aggressive and verbally abused staff, before he pushed a cash register and printer off the counter and left the restaurant. No injuries were reported. A 25-year-old man from St Mary's was arrested at Riverstone Police station about 4.15pm on Monday, January 11. He was charged with destroy or damage property, use offensive language in/near public place and not comply with noticed direction re s7/8/9 - COVID19. He was granted conditional bail to appear before Blacktown Local Court on Monday, February 1.

HILLS MAN CHARGED

Officers from The Hills Police Area Command were patrolling a shopping centre at Castle Hill about 12.30pm, when they approached a man, who was not wearing a mask as he wandered around the food court. The 39-year-old man refused to speak with police and allegedly pushed past the officers before a struggle ensued. He was arrested and charged with not wearing a fitted face covering in retail/business and resisting officer in the execution of duty. He was granted conditional bail to appear at Parramatta Local Court on Wednesday, January 27. About 11.15am on Christmas day, Hawkesbury Police received information a Northern Beaches resident attended a home at Bligh Park in breach of the Public Health Order. Police attended the home on Porpoise Crescent and spoke to the 32-year-old Collaroy woman who confirmed she had travelled to Bligh Park in her car on Thursday, December 24. She was directed to return to Collaroy and issued a \$1000 PIN for fail to comply with noticed direction in relation to section 7/8/9 COVID-19.

ESCAPEE ARRESTED

A man, who escaped from a correctional facility in May 2020, was arrested at a home in Windsor. The 44-year-old man was reported missing from the minimum security facility on Gwydir Highway, New England, about 12pm on May 23. Following extensive inquiries, officers attached to Hawkesbury Police Area Command, assisted by the Dog Unit, attended a home on New Street, Windsor about 5am on Monday, January 11, where they arrested the man who was allegedly attempting to flee from the back of the house. He was arrested and taken to Windsor Police Station where two outstanding warrants were executed for inmate escape/attempt to escape from lawful custody and steal motor vehicle. He was refused bail.

TRAIL BIKES STOLEN

Five trail bikes were allegedly stolen from a home in Glenhaven with police saying some of them

are unique. The Hills Police Area Command are investigating a break and enter in Glenshee Place, Glenhaven which occurred sometime between 10pm on Friday, January 8, and 6.30am on Saturday, January 9, while the occupants were asleep. MAN ATTACKS GUARD

A man has been charged after allegedly assaulting a security guard before stabbing a member of the public at a shopping centre at Windsor. Hawkesbury Police were told the 25-year-old man, a woman and two children were at the centre on George Street, Windsor, when the woman was asked by a security guard to put on a mask about 8.20pm on Tuesday, January 12. A short time later, the man approached a 59-year-old security guard and allegedly pushed him before punching him a number of times. A 53-year-old male customer intervened triggering a fight ensued, before the younger man allegedly stabbed the older man in the leg with a knife. The customer and security guard restrained the man before officers arrested the man after a short struggle. He was taken to Windsor Police Station and charged with armed with intent to commit indictable offence, affray, and resist or hinder police officer in the execution of duty. He was refused bail. Inquiries are continuing.

CHARLIE A CLASS ACT

If you close your eyes and listen to CHARLIE TCHETCHENIAN's singing, you may think you are listening to a famous crooner.

That's the magic of Charlie's deep and strong voice and you forget that he is just 16 years. When he was just 15, the Cherrybrook youngster sang with his idol Michael Buble during his Sydney concert, being invited on stage by the legend.

They sang Dean Martin's You're Nobody Till Somebody Loves You, with Buble telling the star-struck Charlie that he had a deep voice like a man. The legend looked stunned when Charlie began singing and their duet could not have been better planned.

"Buble is so cool and he has a perfect voice," Charlie told *Hills To Hawkesbury Community News*.

"I attended three of his concerts in Sydney and it was at the third when I put my hand up when he was looking for someone to join him on stage.

"This was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity and it was surreal." Charlie's mother, Annette, was also invited onto the stage after the song.

After the concert, Charlie hooked up for a year of special training with Buble's star trumpeter, Jumaane

Smith, who has also worked with legends Stevie Wonder, Quincy Jones, Herbie Hancock and Aretha Franklin. Herbie Hancock, Aretha Franklin

Charlie sang with *The Voice Australia* finalist Masha Mnjoyan at the major Armenia National Committee fundraising gala in Sydney last November.

Charlie grew up to the sounds of Frank Sinatra, Sammy Davis Jr, Dean Martin and Buble and jazz greats, including Ella Fitzgerald, and takes after his mum's Dad, after whom he was named.

"My Dad used to sing a lot and Charlie has got his deep voice," mum Annette Madjarian said.

Charlie's musical career has been boosted by the Talent Development Project, run by top artistic director Peter Cousens, after he was accepted into the 2020 batch.

An inspiring visit to Australia's famed wine-growing Barossa Valley has catapulted our very own country music star Kylie Adams-Collier within grasp of her first Tamworth Songwriters Salute Award.

She wrote and recorded the delightful Camel Up Earlston Said last year and is chuffed the single - produced by Kross Kut Records' Lindsay Waddington - made it into the prestigious awards.

"It is is a very prestigious, long running award entered by many talented songwriters around Australia," Adams-Collier said. "To be judged as a finalist is a huge pat on the back. There are 14 songwriting categories in the awards."

Because of COVID, the awards, usually held in January in Tamworth, will be streamed live on YouTube at 7pm on Tuesday, January 19.

"Thankfully my music single releases get a lot of radio airplay around Australia, including Hawkesbury Radio 89. The nomination means the world to me. My song entry Camel Up Earlston Said' was inspired by a trip around the Barossa Valley while on tour. "This is the third time I have made the finals so fingers crossed."

The contest is judged by well-known industry folks, including radio presenters and artists.

Adams-Collier is a super ambassador for country music, having been on the road and air for more than 30 years. She presents and produces the popular national Good Morning Country program on Thursdays on the Community Radio Network.

She has won two Brumby awards, a Stan Coster Australian Memorial Bush Ballad Award and Gidgee Coal gong and was a finalist in the Australian Songwriters Association National Songwriting Awards.

Adams-Collier has used her extra time due to the lack of touring to study her certificate 3 in screen and media.

"I have also been re-visiting songs, writing more songs and continuing my weekly Good Morning Country national radio program," she said. "I have begun to network in my community with other artists and have recently joined the Rotary Club of Kenthurst which will lead onto more contacts and events. It's great spending more time with family too."

The busy artist has plenty of plans this year if all goes well.

"My main plans this year are to continue my radio program, write my next album, book tours for next year, travel to Queensland in May for the Bouldy Bush Ballad Bash," Adams-Collier said. "I want to plan a mini-tour around a gig in the central west, prepare for Tamworth Country Music Festival 2022, study and get to know my local community."

Adams-Collier, who writes from the heart, has released five albums, including two with the Snow Leopards on Waterfront Records and three solo albums.



Local property development and investment company Mintus, which purchased the Stockland Mall Baulkham Hills last month, is creating an exciting new brand image and more facilities for this centre.

The Windsor Rd mall, which is very popular for residents in surrounding suburbs and neighbouring communities, was purchased for \$141.25m on December 3.

It will be known as Grove Square, The Hills, which is a throwback to the history of Baulkham Hills, which was renowned for growing various citrus fruits for the Sydney area in the early 1800s, particularly oranges. The re-branding and signage is likely to be installed before Easter.

Mal Hazzouri is the founder and Director of Mintus, a Paramatta-based property investment firm, which has grown from a residential focus to specialising in retail and commercial developments.

Now Mr Hazzouri and the Mintus team are keen to improve the centre and provide a great place for the Baulkham Hills community to shop.

The centre, anchored by major supermarkets Woolworths, Coles and ALDI, boasts of 76 specialty stores, includes a 200seat food precinct, and has 830 car spaces. It has a net lettable area of 17,082 sq m.

By early next month, the centre hopes their first new retailer will open the BH Fish Market in the food court.

Mr Hazzouri said they have worked with Modemedia from Parramatta, to create a new brand direction for the centre.

The Grove Square, The Hills logo uses earthy tones and simplistic lines to create an abstract fruit tree formed inside a square.

"The symmetrical tree has a warm energy and represents our collective mission of growth and prosperity while never forgetting our roots," Mr Hazzouri said.

"At Mintus, we believe for families and residents to thrive it takes an active community, a place where locals can discover new possibilities.

'We aim to create offerings where you can find convenience and delight in your everyday life. It's about the joy you get from being together. We look to provide a welcoming retail destination where all generations can come together and create new experiences each day. Our family is your family, and it's simple - we thrive when you do."

EAT ART AT THE GALLERY

Hawkesbury Regional Gallery has a colourful new exhibition called Eat Art that is a feast for the senses.

Historically, food in art has multiple meanings, from demonstrating skill to symbolising virtue or lust and the extremes of wealth or poverty.

In the Eat Art exhibition, the artists use food to reveal something – personal, cultural, or philosophical; and all of the art works offer us a new way of looking at the commonplace around us. Through arranging and capturing food in paint, clay, or other mediums – these art objects describe life beyond the ordinary.

The ceramic food recreations by artist Mechelle Bounpraseuth reveal everyday Australian life with soy or fish sauce, along with 'typical' Australian condiments like Heinz tomato sauce and Vegemite.

FREE HEALTH CHECK FOR YOUR NEW FUR BABY

Owning a new puppy or kitten can be a very exciting time for pet owners. There are some crucial health care measures that need to be taken to ensure your new furry friend gets the best start in life.

Puppies and kittens need a balanced, premium puppy/kitten food. Puppies and kittens grow and develop rapidly and have very different nutritional requirements to adult dogs and cats.

For example, puppies and kittens require additional calcium and energy to facilitate proper growth of bones and muscles, in dogs this ratio of calcium and energy can be different for small breeds to large breeds.

Parasite control is very important for puppies and kittens as they are more likely to be carrying gastrointestinal worms at this stage in their life. An all wormer tablet should be given every 2 weeks until 12 weeks of age, every month until 6 months of age and then every 3 months for life.

For puppies heartworm prevention is even more important – the best way to prevent heartworm is with injectable medication administered by your vet, this removes the possibility of forgetting to give a dose, one missed monthly heartworm dose can result in heartworm infection.

Heartworm in dogs is a potentially fatal disease that is transmitted

from infected to uninfected dogs by mosquitoes. These mosquitoes inject a number of tiny worms (microfilaria) into the dog's body which then mature into adult heartworm over about 6 months. These adult worms settle inside the chambers of the heart and interfere with the flow of blood.

Tick prevention is a must, even in the colder weather. The newer oral tick preventatives and tick collars are highly effective. Most of these products also prevent fleas for extended periods.

Vaccinations are also imperative to prevent deadly infectious diseases such as parvovirus, distemper, hepatitis and infectious canine cough in puppies and feline herpesvirus, calicivirus and feline panleukopenia in kittens. During the vaccination consultation the veterinarian will complete a full physical examination to ensure your puppy or kitten is healthy and fit for vaccination.

After these vaccinations are completed your puppy or kitten will then be able to safely mix with other pets at dog parks and



public places without the risk of acquiring these infectious diseases.

For new puppies our vet will also be able to suggest some puppy schools for him/her to attend to receive some basic training and the critical socialisation needed.

During January to March Sydney Animal Hospitals are offering free for a new puppy or kitten, a free health checkups with our vet, free pet insurance for one month and a free sample bag of Hill's puppy or kitten food. Plus for puppies a free dose of year-round heartworm prevention and 4 weeks free tick and flea protection. 

FROM MODEL FARMS TO BOOMING SUBURBS

Immediately after the end of World War II, Australia sought to increase its population due to manpower losses caused by two World Wars and the fear of possible Communist expansion in former European colonies in Asia. Mantras rang out across the nation such as "Populate or perish" and to protect the then British culture of a white Australia, the population and industry was urged by advertising posters and the print media to "Bring Out a Briton." Refugees from war torn Europe were also generally welcomed and, as the economy expanded over time, refugees and migrants from other countries were encouraged to join the Australian community. This led to a demand for housing and vast areas of what was once farmland or other open space became subdivided into building blocks and whole new suburbs being created on the outskirts of Australian cities.

The area just north of Parramatta called Model Farms was one such location, due to farms in the area being used to demonstrate

the variety of crops and other rural activities that could be promulgated in the Cumberland district. Developers and the government considered that would be ideal for creating new suburbs being close to existing commercial and industrial sites at Parramatta. During the early to mid1960's L J Hooker, the largest real estate company in the country and one of the most prominent land developers at the time through it's Hooker-Rex division, acquired a number of properties along Windsor Rd and started to develop the area. Searching for a name for the development they considered calling it "Churchill Hills" in honour of the former wartime British Prime Minister, Winston Churchill, but later deciding on "Winston Hills"

If you study a street map of Winston Hills, you will notice that the main entrance on the Eastern side of the suburb is called Churchill Drive. This was the first entrance to the new estate when driving north from Parramatta and on the corner was a wall emblazoned with the

name of Winston Hills, the second entrance to the estate was Model Farms Rd where at the corner of Windsor Rd and Model Farms Rd once stood a railway platform and railway siding that farmers of the area had used to transport their wares to market. As you travel along Model Farms Rd you will note that a number of streets that run off Model Farms Rd bear the names of former British Prime Ministers such as Baldwin, Lloyd George, Asquith, Palmerston and Disraeli. This was one of the first areas of what is now Winston Hills to be developed and started a trend as further areas were developed. Other areas bore names of Scottish locations (Lomond, Clackmannan, Dornoch, Skye etc) Whilst another portion used the names of authors as a theme (Thackery, Twain, Defoe etc) and so it continued with names of poets, scientists etc. being used as themes for street names as the suburb grew. The last area of Winston Hills to be developed was the area along the southern side of Buckleys Rd due to its steep slope. This being developed in the 1980s and 90s.


