MEMORIAL AVENUE UPGRADE by BEV JORDAN

The \$224 million upgrade to ease congestion and improve safety along Memorial Avenue at Kellyville tool another step forward last week (February 18) with the official sod turning ceremony on the site last week.

Minister for Transport and Roads Andrew Constance was joined by Baulkham Hills State Liberal MP David Elliott for the landmark moment.

State Government first announced the upgrade to the 2.2kms road, which joins Old Windsor Road with Windsor Road, in January 2020.

Mr Constance said: "This major upgrade will improve congestion, safety and travel times for the 30,000 drivers who use Memorial Avenue every day."

Memorial Avenue is being widened to a four-lane divided road, with shared pedestrian

and cyclist paths. The upgrade also includes additional dedicated left and right turn lanes at the Windsor Road and Memorial Avenue intersection, and bus users will benefit from new bus priority traffic lights.

David Elliott said the Memorial Avenue upgrade would assist the community meet the future transport needs of Sydney's growing North West.

"Residents are looking forward to the delivery of this much-needed upgrade to manage current and predicted increases in traffic and respond to residential and commercial development in the area," he said. Work will be carried out on weekdays (excluding public holidays) between 7am and 6pm, weather permitting.

During this time, road users are urged to drive to conditions and follow the directions of signs and traffic control. The Memorial Avenue upgrade is expected to open to road users in late 2023. Once completed, Memorial Avenue will have a consistent speed limit of 80km/h.

Transport NSW has listed the Memorial Avenue upgrades as below:

- From a 2-lane to a 4-lane road (with an option to expand to 6 lanes if needed in the future)
- Will include new bus stops as well as upgrading existing bus stops
- Building shared paths for pedestrians and cyclists along both sides of Memorial Avenue that will connect with paths to Kellyville and Bella Vista Metro stations, as well as connecting to other shared paths in The Hills Shire Council local area.

In May 2020 The Hills Shire Council officially opened the Greenway Bridge over Memorial Avenue, Kellyville.

The \$3.77 million project, links Pellizzer Boulevard to Thomas Boulton Circuit Reserve at Kellyville, and forms part of the bigger Greenway cyclelink between Bella Vista Farm and Rouse Hill Town Centre.

The 50-metre bridge is one of the largest pedestrian bridge projects Council has ever worked on.

LAWN MOWER ACCIDENT

HOUSE FIRE ESCAPE

A dozen Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW) firefighters worked to extinguish a fire that broke out at a home on McKellar Crescent in South Windsor just after 6.30am on Thursday, February 18.

Crews arrived on scene following numerous Triple Zero (000) calls reporting large plumes of smoke issuing from the home. Firefighters managed to quickly extinguish the fire, which is believed to have started due to a fault inside a dishwasher.

A woman in a wheelchair was safely removed from the home by NSW Police. NSW Ambulance were also in attendance however no injuries were reported.

With Fire and Rescue NSW crews attending multiple house fires this week, Superintendent Scott Dodson said it was a timely reminder for residents to develop their fire escape plan.

"Now is the time for residents to check they have a working smoke alarm and that all members of the family have an awareness of calling Triple Zero (000) in an emergency" he said.

CRASH APPEAL Renewed

Police are still appealing for public assistance as inquiries continue into a serious crash at Baulkham Hills last month.

In particular, they would like to speak with the driver of a small white vehicle seen in the area at the time, who they believe may have witnessed the crash or anyone who may have dash cam footage of the incident.

Just before 8.30am on Saturday, January 30, emergency services were called to Seven Hills Road, after reports a Nissan Micra and a Kia Sportage had collided head-on.

The Nissan driver, a 31-year-old woman, was trapped in the vehicle before she was released and taken to Westmead Hospital with multiple fractures.

The Kia driver, a 36-year-old man, suffered minor injuries and was also taken to Westmead Hospital.

Officers from the Hills Police Area Command attended, with officers attached to the Metropolitan Crash Investigation Unit commencing an investigation into the circumstances surrounding the crash.

STUDENT HIT BY CAR

A 16-year-old boy leaving his school in Carlingford was struck by a vehicle on Wednesday, February 17 as he was crossing the road.

The teenager sustained injuries to his legs and suffered a seizure from the incident. CareFlight's Rapid Response Helicopter was tasked by NSW Ambulance at 3:10pm and landed less than ten minutes later in a nearby oval.

RAPTOR CHARGES

A Schofields man has been charged following an investigation by Strike Force Raptor into a criminal group involved in drug supply and public acts of violence.

Last year, Strike Force Raptor commenced an investigation into the criminal activities of a gang with links to Western Sydney and correctional facilities across NSW.

As part of ongoing inquiries, Strike Force Raptor executed a search warrant at a home at Deguara Street, Schofields about 9.15am on Wednesday, February 10.

Cash, jewellery, clothing, shoes and a white powder believed to be cocaine were located and seized for forensic examination.

About 8.25pm, detectives arrested a 19-year-old man at Riverstone Police Station and charged him with supply prohibited drug (commercial quantity), knowingly deal with the proceeds of crime, knowingly deal with the proceeds of crime intent to conceal and deal with property proceeds of crime.

Strike Force Raptor was established in 2009 and conducts proactive investigations and intelligence-based, high-impact policing operations to prevent and disrupt conflicts, and dismantle any network engaged in serious organised criminal activity.

There was a flurry of activity in Jan Sanders Baulkham Hills garage last week as she, her daughter Vicki Stack and three friends packed items for those in need

Last year their group sent over 1500 gift packages to Anglicare Family Support at Mt Druitt.

Jan and Vicki have been running the group since Vera Abell, whose mother (Beatrice) originally established the BEA Group, decided to step down.

For Jan, it was a continuation of the volunteer work she had been doing for decades for Anglicare knitting children's jumpers.

"I have been doing Aqua Aerobics at ARV in Castle Hill for 26 years, and heard of the BEA group with Vera at the helm," said Jan, "And I joined."

"About 8 years ago, Vera had to move to Brian King Gardens (at Anglicare Castle Hill) and she asked Vicki, my daughter, and I, if we would take over and continue her legacy. Which we did."

The groups meets every month to sort and pack donated items, many made or bought by group members. Jan and Vicki regularly shop together to build up supplies and Jan knits and sews items, such as baby wraps and fleece throws for children.

Toiletries and school essentials are packed into age appropriate hand-made material bags which are created by volunteers who sew and knit, some in their 80s and 90s.



There are also special gifts for Mothers' day and Fathers' day and also Christmas.

"We do up special gift packs so the families and children can choose gifts for each other," said Jan.

"We have lots of helpers who give their time by making bags, over 300 last year, children's clothes, and beautiful dolls clothes for the dolls (we buy) at Christmas.

COVID VACCINE ROLL-OUT

Instant celebrity status was bestowed on 84-year-old Jane Malysiak who became the first Australian to be vaccinated against the coronavirus.

The aged care resident had Prime Minister Scott Morrison by her side when she received the Pfizer vaccine at Castle Hill Medical Centre on Sunday (February 21).

Frontline workers, Mr Morrison, Chief Health officer Paul Kelly and Chief Nursing officer Prof Alison McMillon, were amongst the 20 people to be vaccinated at Castle Hill that day.

Mrs Malysiak told ABC radio: "I wasn't nervous. I have had no side effects, everyone should just go and get a jab." The 84-year-old is a patient at MyHealth Kable Street in Windsor.

Prime Minister Scott Morrison said: "This is an historic day for Australia. What we're demonstrating today is our confidence. I am supremely confident in the expert process that has been led to get us to this day. So, from tomorrow, tens of thousands of Australians over the course of the next week will confidently come forward from those key priority groups that have been defined to ensure that we move into this next phase of how we've been preparing and dealing with COVID-19."

The first stage of the roll-out will see nurses delivering vaccines to aged care residents. Frontline health workers, border and quarantine staff are being administered in hospital hubs.

The first phase is expected to take about six weeks and reach 600,000 people.

The next phase due to start in late March will focus of those over 80 and then those between 70 and 79, other healthcare workers and people who are immunesupressed.

Phase 2a will start in the middle of next year and include other critical and high-risk workers plus adults over the age of 50.

The goal is to immunise 20 million people by October.

Castle Hill Medical centre at Castle Mall will be part of the wider roll-out. It has a dedicated Respiratory Clinic for the COVID-19 testing and in the last year has tested over 6,500 individuals.

Castle Hill Medical Centre GP Dr Nigel Grebert, who was vaccinated said: "I believe it's the medical centres and general practitioners across the continent that will play a very important role in this stage of the pandemic.

"We've all done our bit over the last 12 months in providing ongoing support as front-line medical teams in our communities, but we're not done yet."

"Clinimetrix (a complete analytics tool available for medical practices across Australia) allowed management to think on its feet when the pandemic first hit last year and patients stayed home.

"Not only has it delivered the insight and understanding around our database – we have 10,400 patients over 70 and 8,000 of our patients have chronic disease - it has also allowed us to report back accurately and seamlessly on managing the COVID-19 pandemic as a team." When medical centres become part of the roll-out Castle Hill Medical Centre has nurses to deliver 800 vaccines a day.

Alex Hawke MP, said: "Our message is simple - the vaccines are safe and effective. Get vaccinated and help Australia out of this pandemic."

As Minister for Immigrations, citizenship, migrant services and multicultural Affairs, Mr Hawke said: "I think multicultural communities are also embracing the concept of vaccination as the wider community is, and from the government's perspective, we have a series of consultations, roundtables with community leaders, faith leaders, some of which have been mentioned today.

"There's so much diversity in the Australian community. We thought about translations in about 60 languages, there's communications would be in every single one of those languages. There's video communications. We're working with the Multicultural Council of Australia as well to ensure that every part of the vaccination message is delivered to every community in Australia. "

ARTISTIC JOURNEY AT NORWEST PRIVATE

Four stunning artworks by emerging aboriginal artist Karen Lee are now gracing the entrance lobby of the Norwest Private Hospital.

The major works were commissioned by Suzanne Hall, General Manager of Norwest Private Hospital, at the start of last year. The aim was to recognise and celebrate the traditional owners of the land on which the hospital sits.

Karen Lee, a Wiradjuri woman from NSW who has lived and worked in Darug country for over 40 years, met with the Norwest Private Hospital Team over a number of weeks to develop the concept for a series of art works titled "The Journey", representing the past, present and future journey of Healthscope's Norwest Private Hospital.

Together the series showcases how all these elements work in harmony to come together for the common purpose of caring for the people of The Hills and surrounding communities.

Elder Graham Davis King sang a welcome to the land and conducted a smoking ceremony outside the hospital's entrance before Karen Lee and Suzanne Hall unveiled the four paintings.

Gabin-Gidyal (Gubbin-giyal) A Beginning

The first artwork features hill symbols to represent the land on which the Bella Vista Homestead and the suburb of Norwest sit. To this day ancient bunya pines line the entrance to the homestead. Bunya are of profound cultural significance to indigenous culture as a staple food source.

Murun (muron) Life

The second piece celebrates the journey of life, from birth to life's end and the role of Norwest Private Hospital in providing care to our community through every part of life's journey. Every person who passes through Norwest Private Hospital has a role to play in the celebration of life, whether they are staff, doctors, patients or visitors.

Mayiny (Mi-in) People

The third piece tells the story of the diversity of cultures in the Norwest area, which may signify a birth place, workplace or a community of practice at Norwest Private Hospital. The four long journey symbols meeting together at the meeting point in the middle of the piece represent the diversity of cultures coming together and working together in harmony.

Dhagun (Daagon) Land

The fourth piece holds many symbols representing the native flora and fauna of the environment, such as animal tracks, flowers, and waterholes. The land of this country is both significant to Indigenous culture and where people gather and meet.

Together we respectfully acknowledge the Traditional people of the land on which we work and learn, and pay respect to the First Nations Peoples and their elders, past, present and emerging.

CHERRYBROOK MAN ARRESTED OVER MAGIC MUSHROOMS

A Cherrybrook man has been charged after a large-scale seizure of \$700,000 worth of magic mushrooms in Greystanes earlier this month.

Police investigators arrested the 26-yearold man at Kellyville around 10am on Wednesday, February 24.

He was taken to Castle Hill Police Station and charged with manufacture prohibited drug, (large commercial quantity), supply prohibited drug (large commercial quantity), organises/conducts/assists drug premises, and possess or use a prohibited weapon without permit.

In January 2021, detectives attached to Cumberland Police Area Command established Strike Force Bagster to investigate the suspected manufacture of illicit drugs

in the Greystanes area. As part of inquiries, Strike Force investigators executed a search warrant at a home in Merrylands Road, Greystanes, on Wednesday, February 3.

At the premises, officers located an active clandestine laboratory used to manufacture psilocybin. With the assistance of the State Crime Command's Chemical Operations Unit, a total of 46.3kg of psilocybin, with an estimated street value of nearly \$700,000, was seized. A 26-year-old man has been charged and remains before the courts. Psilocybin is considered one of the most well-known psychedelics.

Proposed Licence Agreement with Parramatta National Rugby League

In 2019, Council called for Expressions of Interest for the development of Kellyville Park as a Premier Rugby League facility and the establishment of pathways that will support community members who aspire to reach a representative and/ or elite level in their chosen sport.

Council resolved to accept the Expression of Interest from Parramatta National Rugby League. A draft licence agreement has been prepared. In accordance with Section 47 of the Local Government Act, Council is notifying its intention to enter into a licence agreement with Parramatta National Rugby League (PNRL) for 21 years in keeping with Council's Masterplan and Plan of Management for Sportsgrounds.

The Licence Agreement at Kellyville Park relates to land classified as "Community" that includes Lot 1 DP 167535, Lot 60 DP 10702, Lot 123 DP 1113073 and Lot 1002 DP 113811.

The intended licence agreement is for the exclusive use of two playing fields and the current temporary Centre of Excellence (COE) facility. Upon completion of the playing field expansion and future permanent COE, the exclusive area will consist of the two fields, future COE and associated amenities. The remaining areas of Kellyville Park consisting of five additional playing fields (existing and those under construction), and future facilities including associated amenities, playground, pathway network and the existing car park will remain accessible to the public and community groups.

The partnership between Council and PNRL will provide an elite facility for our community at this location consistent with Council's recently updated Master Plan in an economically responsible way consistent with Council's current funding levels.



Worm farming EOI update

In October 2020, Council conducted an Expression of Interest in order to select an apartment building in The Hills to receive a free worm farming trial.

An apartment building in North Kellyville has been chosen as the site for the worm farming trial. In February, residents will receive educational materials and support on how to use the worm farm and what food scraps they can add. The three month trial will run from March until May.


Recent kerbside bin audits show that over 40% of red lidded garbage bin waste in The Hills is made up of food scraps. As part of Council's Local Strategic Planning Statement, Council is prioritising the trial of organic waste separation for high density developments. This trial will help inform Council on food scrap separation behaviours and allows for further discussions to take place on the potential of collecting food waste separately from apartment complexes in the future.

Food waste in The Hills Shire is currently sent to landfill and breaks down in a way that can create emissions which impacts upon air quality and public health. One such gas is methane, which is more potent and detrimental to the environment than the carbon dioxide emissions that come out of your car.

Food scraps can also be composted to enrich soils and grow more food instead of disposing of them in landfill, where disposal costs are currently on the rise.

Shovel ready projects across The Hills Shire proposed for LRCI Funding

The Hills Shire Council is proposing 34 projects to be funded under the Federal Government's Local Road and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Phase 2 Extension Program.

Council has already received approval for almost \$1.2 million under the economy-boosting program, and will now seek to secure a further \$5.4 million from the Federal Government to fund these projects.

Some of the projects include:

- \$150,000 war memorial upgrade at Balcombe Heights Estate in Baulkham Hills;
- \$250,000 reconstruction of netball courts at Ted Horwood Reserve in Baulkham Hills;

BAGPIPES AND DRUMS

The Hills District Pipe Band has been performing at local community events for 51 years and is well-known for their excellent uniform; proudly wearing the McDonald of Clan Ranald tartan (bagpipers) and the

Argyll of Sutherland tartan (drummers). While 2020 had its challenges for the live

music industry, the Hills District Pipe Band is looking forward to reconnecting with the Hills community throughout 2021. As a social band the engagements connected to the community hold great value.

In a traditional pipe band there are four different instruments – the bagpipes, bass drum, tenor drum and snare drum. Multiple bagpipers play tunes together, and with harmonies, under direction from the Pipe Major.

The bass drum is the largest drum in the drum corps, which is held vertically with a harness, hit on either side, and provides the band with a low-tone beat. The tenor drum is held horizontally on a harness and hit with two tenor beaters, to produce a mid-high tone beat to compliment the bass drum.

The tenor beaters also flourish in the air in-between beats for dramatic presentation. The snare drum is popular for its military "rat-a-tat-tat" sound; played with drumsticks to produce accents and rhythmic patterns to accompany the bagpipe tunes.

With a sense for music and rhythm, any of these instruments can be learnt. Members of the Hills District Pipe Band are experienced tutors and welcome any new or experienced players to the band.

The Hills District Pipe Band practices in the Stamford Hall at Balcombe Heights Estate, Baulkham Hills every Wednesday night from 7pm-9pm. The band warmly welcomes you to come along to practice if you're interested in learning a new instrument and skill. Bring a friend.

WHEN YOUR PET IS POORLY

Vomiting and diarrhoea are common reasons for pet owners to seek veterinary attention. The causes of vomiting and diarrhoea in pets are numerous and can be serious or relatively mild.

Because there can be a number of possible causes of vomiting and diarrhoea in pets tests are often needed to determine the cause and therefore the treatment required. Significant vomiting and diarrhoea quickly leads to dehydration which can be life threatening – regardless of the underlying cause.

Vomiting and diarrhoea can be related to a primary gastrointestinal problem. The most common reason is 'dietary indiscretion' which is when pets (especially dogs) eat or scavenge foods that they don't usually eat. This can cause inflammation of the digestive tract and subsequent vomiting and diarrhoea.

Any change in pet food needs to be done slowly to avoid a sudden change in the population of the microbiome of the gut (called dysbiosis) that can lead to vomiting and diarrhoea.

In severe cases, dysbiosis can lead to inflammation of the colon – called colitis, which often leads to bloody diarrhoea. Parasites can also cause vomiting and diarrhoea. For adult dogs and cats we recommend deworming medication be given every three months. Puppies and kittens need more frequent treatments as they are more at risk of carrying parasites. In addition to worms, protozoal infections, bacteria and viruses can also cause gastrointestinal disease in pets, similar to humans.

Vomiting and diarrhoea can also be secondary to other health problems. Liver and/ or kidney disease can affect the digestive tract secondarily and cause vomiting and diarrhoea.

Pancreatitis (inflammation of the pancreas) sometimes follows ingestion of a very fatty mean and can cause life threatening illness. Dogs and cats with pancreatitis often have abdominal pain and vomiting.

A thorough physical examination by one of our vets, blood tests and stool analysis are often used to determine the cause of vomiting and diarrhoea in pets and to determine the best treatment.

COLOUR IN THE AUTOMIN GARDEN by SUE MONTGOMERY | Horticulturalist

Brachycome

With a bit of know-how it is quite easy and rewarding to add a bit of seasonal colour to any garden. Go for a ramble through yours and check for areas that need some colour. Colour will also brighten bland courtyard areas. Add a visit to a local nursery on your list of things to do and consider some of the following suggestions.

PERENNIALS AND SHRUBS

Cordylines provide colour and height to the garden, together with begonias with their colourful flowers and wonderful leaf patterns.

Tall foxgloves and groups of salvia, ornamental grasses all add variety to the garden bed.

The silver Artemisia provides a great contrast with tibouchina

"Jules" which is a purple low-growing shrub. Scaevolas has long flowering fan shaped flowers.

Dahlias and camellia sasanqua are also attractive to birds for their nectar so provide a wonderful focal point.

Another shrub to consider is plectrantus argentatus, also known as Silver Shield. Grevilleas flower throughout the year and are attractive to birds and insects.



The beauty of small native shrubs is that they are water-wise and attract insects and birds to the garden.

Salvias

Native violets provide groundcovers for partly shaded areas and the purple flowered Hardenbergia, Patersonia (*native iris*) and Anigozanthos (*kangaroo paws*) are delightful additions.

Everlasting daisies, Swan River daisy, (*brachyscome multifida* and *hibbertia*) are ideal rockery plants for seasonal colour.

COLOURFUL TREES

The Ivory curl tree (*Buckinghamia celsissima*) is a beautiful native tree with long cream flowers.

The Firewheel Tree (*Stenocarpus sinuatus*) with its red flowers is spectacular and the nectar attracts birds.

Pin Oak (*Quercus palustris*) and Scarlet Oak (*Quercus coccinea*) are also lovely.

Popular trees with autumn colour are: Crepe myrtle (*Lagerstroemia indica*); Golden Ash (*Fraxinus excelsior*), Aurea and Claret Ash (*Fraxinus oxycarpus "Raywoodii"*), Japanese Maple (*Acer palmatum*) and Chinese tallow (*Sapium sebiferum*).

MAJOR WORK STARTS ON Memorial avenue upgrade

Major work to ease congestion and improve safety along Memorial Avenue in Kellyville has begun, with the sod turned on the \$224 million upgrade last month.

Memorial Avenue is being widened to a four lane divided road, with shared pedestrian and cyclist paths to help people connect with Sydney Metro stations at Kellyville and Bella Vista, and will improve safety and travel times for the 30,000 drivers who use the road every day.

The upgrade also includes additional dedicated left and right turn lanes at the Windsor Road and Memorial Avenue intersection, and bus users will benefit from new bus priority traffic lights.

Work will be carried out on weekdays (excluding public holidays) between 7am and 6pm, weather permitting. The major upgrade is expected to open to road users in late 2023. Once completed, Memorial Avenue will have a consistent speed limit of 80km/h.



BIDJIGAL RESERVE SECURES \$500,000 FOR IMPROVEMENTS

Funding of \$500,000 will be used for improvements at Bidjigal Reserve in Baulkham Hills through the Greater Sydney Crown Land Open Space Activation Program.

This investment allows for a range of upgrade works to be done at this beautiful local reserve, including bushland restoration and upgrades to walking trails, signage and stormwater infrastructure

The reserve contains an extensive network of walking tracks and can be accessed from various points including Baulkham Hills, Castle Hill, West Pennant Hills and North Rocks.

Bidjigal Reserve is part of a 300-hectare corridor of bushland along Darling Mills Creek and is home to 370 native plant species, 140 native animal species and a diverse bird population.

Works already done by The Hills Shire

Council as part of the Master Plan for the park include the construction of a new playing field, refurbishment of two existing fields, construction of a new car park and access from Stone Mason Drive.

Apart from the works, the council recently resolved to enter into a licence agreement with the Parramatta NRL for the joint redevelopment and use of Kellyville Memorial Park as a premier rugby league facility.

"We are proud to say this will become the best rugby league facility in the country," Sarantinos said.

> "The project is testament to the great relationship our club has with the council and we look forward to seeing the precinct develop further for the local community over the coming years."

> > A council spokesperson said that once the work is complete, there will be five rugby league grounds, along with the existing baseball field and facilities. Eels players should

be using the two new fields 1 and 3 for their training at Kellyville Memorial Park by the end of the year.

The Eels are also building a \$40 million Centre of Excellence at the park, with the Federal Government committing \$15 million to the project, which will be the largest community rugby league facility in Australia, according to the club.

The Hills Shire Mayor Dr Michelle Byrne said the extension of the fields "is just a small piece in the bigger picture to transform Kellyville Memorial Park into a premier rugby league facility. Our community is growing, and we need to provide further opportunities for play, as well as a pathway for our emerging talent to reach a representative level in their chosen sport."

"I'm so proud of the work we are doing at Kellyville Memorial Park and I'm looking forward to seeing our community using these new and improved fields very soon.

The new grounds will add to the existing fields onsite, and will be used by the Parramatta NRL their training facility.

The majority of the playing field expansion project is being carried out by Western Earthmoving.

The council spokesperson said the value of the field extension works is around \$1.4 million and the new fields will also be used by the community.

MICK'S THE MAN For Bulls' Charge

For Mick Withers, last year's COVID-interrupted rugby league season had at least one silver lining.

The Hills Bulls, who usually played in the Ron Massey Cup, were thrown into a tougher competition via the President's Cup, and very nearly entered the grand final.

"That was a stronger challenge for the players and they stood up well," Withers, 44, told *the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News.* "We lost by a mere two points in the semi-final at Maitland, which was tough to take. But by playing in the President's Cup, the team gained valuable experience which will hold them in good stead in this year's Ron Massey Cup.

"Because of COVID restrictions in the NRL, there were a lot of players from the Reserve Grades playing for us last season. There is always room for improvement, of course, and we are fortunate we have retained several players from last year because the club has recruited well. We also have a lot of youngsters coming through the junior ranks.

"Wentworthville Magpies are again the ones to beat in the Ron Massey Cup while St Mary's, Mounties and Windsor Wolves always produce strong teams."

The Bulls have retained highly-rated ex-NRL players, Tim Robinson, Levai Li, Daniel Harrison and Josh Lewis while recruiting David Gower in the off season.

Withers himself was a classy player, having led Bradford Bulls to three Super League titles in Britain and three World Club Challenges, where his team saw off Newcastle Knights, Penrith and Balmain Tigers in style. Withers was a regular scorer for the Bradford Bulls, planting 108 tries in 170 games.

Former NRL coach Matthew Elliott, who first suggested to the centre and full back that he should move to Britain, is among his favourite coaches.

The Hills Bulls are gearing up for the start of the 2021 Ron Massey Cup on the weekend of March 13 and 14 where they will play Windsor Wolves.

The Bulls began their trials with a win over the Wolves on February 13 but more

> over the Wolves on February 13 but more importantly blew away the cobwebs after the holiday break.

The Bulls then went down 22-28 to the reigning champions Wentworthville Magpies in their second trial.

"We are happy to be playing footy again and I gave many players a hit out against the Magpies," Withers said.

"We have one more trial game, against St Mary's this Saturday before the season opens. "The main thing is to go through the trials

without injuries, regardless of the results.

"However, we did have one injury when our front rower Dylan McKeown, dislocated his shoulder during the trial but he should be fit for the opening game."

Withers, who has three children, Zack, Tenieke and Keira, also helps in training the junior teams.

The Hills Bulls play their final trial game against hosts St Mary's. The Sydney Shield game is scheduled at 4pm, followed by the Ron Massey Cup game at 6pm.



MEMORIES WITH IVOR JONES & FRIENDS

What's In A Name?

Have you ever wondered how your street, suburb or district got the name that it has? Some names are logical. Australian towns, villages and streets were often given names that were familiar to white settlers from the "old country". Around Windsor in the Hawkesbury district names such as The Terrace came about as it overlooked the river. Bridge St is selfexplanatory as it ran down to the South Creek Bridge and Court St led to the Court House.

Green Hills was the original name given to present day Windsor by settlers due to the hills that surrounded the settlement. Lachlan Macquarie, when visiting Green Hills, said that it reminded him of Windsor in England and renamed the settlement to reflect that. Some of the early streets of Windsor owe their names to Lachlan Macquarie such as Campbell Street which was named after Lady Macquarie whose maiden name was Campbell. Argyle Street was named after Argyleshire, Scotland from where Governor Macquarie had originally come from. Quite a few streets were named after early settlers and prominent citizens in the area whereas George St was named after King George III who had many streets and towns named after him throughout the then British Empire. British politicians and noblemen also provided a source for the names of towns, villages and streets in the district. Politicians such as William Wilberforce, William Pitt, Evan Nepean, Viscount Castlereagh all provided a source for town names around the Hawkesbury, or in the case of Evan Nepean the name for a river.

George St Windsor approx 1900s (Pinterest)

Pioneer settlers and prominent residents are remembered by names such as Mileham St named for Dr Jas Mileham, Bell St for Lieutenant A Bell, Day St for Dr Day, Christie St for William Christie and so on. The Hawkesbury was so named after Baron Hawkesbury the Earl of Liverpool (1770-1828). There is some conjecture however over the name of Freemans Reach. Some say it got its name as it was the site of settlement for free men whilst others claimed that two brothers named Freeman settled there. Names such as Tizzana, of Italian origin, was given by Dr Fiaschi, a vitner and Vineyard was so named as it was in this area that early settlers grew grapes. Aboriginal names were also used for local settlements such as Kurrajong which has also appeared with alternative spellings such as Curryjong (1824), Korijong (1857) and has appeared in places as Kerri Jong and Kurry Jung. Cattai also had various alternative spellings over time including Caddie, Caddye, Catta and Catye. The settlement along the banks of the Hawkesbury named Cornwallis was named after the ship "Marguis Cornwallis" which arrived in the colony in 1796 carrying Capt. Brabyn, an early settler in the area who also has a street named after him.

There we have it. The origins of some of the street, suburb and town names. Of course there are a few names that I haven't mentioned which I am sure some of our readers would know. Space in this publication prevents me from mentioning them at the moment but they may become part of a future "Memories" article.






