

RFS BRIGADE'S Amazing 75 years

Volunteers with North Rocks Rural Fire Brigade are celebrating 75 years of community service.

NSW Minister for Police and Emergency Services, David Elliott MP joined with NSW RFS Deputy Commissioner, Peter McKechnie to congratulate members past and present for building up the brigade into the community focal point it is today.

"This Brigade has a proud history and has put in a lot of effort developing its members over the years and strengthening its relationship with the community," Mr Elliott said.

Current North Rocks Brigade Captain John Meredith received his Lifetime Membership award during the evening.

The Brigade was formed in 1945 as the North Rocks-West Pennant Hills Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade serving what was then orchards and chicken farms.

Members initially used their own vehicles, with a trailer acquired in 1958. The first dedicated vehicle was acquired eight years later. The Brigade has been based in Carlingford since 1979.

The North Rocks Brigade has 85 members, the longest serving is GroupCaptain Hills District, Bruce Walton who has been with the NSW RFS for over 40 years.

Deputy Commissioner McKechnie said: "During the Black Summer bush fires, North Rocks Brigade responded to fires as far afield as Glen Innes and Queanbeyan and spent significant time in the Hawkesbury on the Gospers Mountain fire on dedicated strike teams," he said. "After that devastating bush fire season the brigade received over 200 enquiries from community members wishing to join and 12 have now completed basic training to be welcomed as new members."

Deputy Commissioner McKechnie said the event was an opportunity to congratulate the brigade on this significant milestone and to thank members for their ongoing commitment and service.

"The hard work and professionalism of all NSW RFS members does not go unnoticed and while they do not ask for praise, we should take this milestone to acknowledge their contribution and commitment to their community."

He said the Hills District is afforded a world-class level of fire protection due to the experience and dedication of its 17 Rural Fire Brigades. There are just over 1000 volunteers across the 17 brigades.

"We must also thank the family, friends, employers and colleagues of these and all volunteers. We know it takes their support to help our members do what they do to save lives and property," Deputy Commissioner McKechnie said.

Over the past 12 months since the Black Summer bushfires, the District fielded 500 inquiries for membership. 100 new members have been trained up across the District.

TREE PLANTING GRANTS

Hawkesbury City Council has welcomed new tree planting grants that are now available from the Foundation for National Parks & Wildlife (FNPW) to restore bushfire affected regions.

Hawkesbury Mayor Patrick Conolly said: "The FNPW bushfire restoration grants aim to support individuals, community groups and organisations that are working to bring communities together to restore the bush that was left scarred by the 2019-2020 bushfires."

The bushfire restoration grants are open for online applications at fnpw.org.au/grants until June 30, 2021. Individuals, community groups, organisations or government departments working in these areas are eligible to apply for support for projects commencing in 2021.

In 2020, FNPW supported the upgrade of the Hawkesbury Community Nursery to become a bushfire recovery nursery to assist in restoration activities.

Clr Conolly said: "I'm proud that Council's Hawkesbury Community Nursery in Mulgrave is supplying the trees for the 2021 planting season under this grant program.

"Our local area has experienced first-hand the effects of the bushfires but fortunately, we have a well- developed community nursery volunteer program that helps support the regeneration of our local flora and fauna. The tree planting grants will make a big difference to regenerating the native habitat for Australian wildlife."

If you are working to restore large areas of habitat by tree planting in areas that were impacted by the 2019- 2020 bushfires, apply for a Bushfire Restoration Grant from the Foundation for National Parks & Wildlife (FNPW) before going to the Nursery for the trees.

CEREMONY MARKS START OF BOND BUILDING AT NORWEST

A tree planting ceremony on Wednesday (May 19) marked the start of construction on The Bond in Norwest, which will include a major cancer treatment centre run by GenesisCare.

The multi-million dollar building being constructed close to Norwest Private Hospital is due for completion in the third quarter of 2022.

Norwest master developer Mulpha has already secured tenants for over 50 per cent for the landmark timber building on the corners of Elizabeth Macarthur Drive and Norbrik Drive.

Genesis Oncology's \$10 million radiation therapy facility will have the capacity to deliver more than 14,000 treatments to 800 patients a year.

Dr Antony Lighten has taken 735m 2 of space for his IVF Clinic and reproductive surgery. Space has also been taken up by orthodontic, obstetrics and gynaecology practices, as well as a 110-space Kinda-Mindi childcare centre.

The building has been designed using state-of-the-art cross-laminated timber technology for the 1600m2 floorplates, walls, and stairs, as well as traditional laminated timber columns and beams for the frame. It will be just the third commercial building in Sydney to be built this way, and a first for the Hills.

Mulpha Developments Executive General Manager, Tim Spencer said: "We are thrilled to commence construction on this cuttingedge building which will set the standard for

guality and innovation as Norwest transforms into a major residential, commercial, and retail hub in Sydney's economic growth corridor along the Metro Norwest.

"The Bond's location and focus on wellness and sustainability is appealing to high guality knowledge companies who want to attract and inspire the best staff and offer an appealing environment for clients.

"In addition to offering design flexibility and unique aesthetics, these new-age timber technologies have incredible strength and efficiency, and the potential to be carbon-neutral over their lifecycle, something increasingly attractive to blue-chip clients."

The Bond will comprise a ground floor retail environment, a gym, six floors of commercial office building, a childcare facility, end-of-trip facilities (showers, changerooms and bicycle storage), basement car parking, short-term visitor parking and service vehicle and loading facilities.

"Our vision for Norwest is to drive real cultural change in how people live and work, and to enable people to be more connected to their environment, not only technically but physically and emotionally," Tim Spencer said.

DRIVER CHARGED AFTER PEDESTRIAN HIT

A driver has been charged with a series of offences including dangerous driving occasioning grievous bodily harm following an incident involving a pedestrian at Kellyville Ridge on Wednesday morning (May 19).

Emergency services were called to the intersection of Windsor Road and Merriville Road, Kellyville Ridge just before 9am following reports that a 27-year-old woman had been hit by a Toyota Camry while crossing the road.

Officers from Quakers Hill Police Area Command attended and found the woman with serious head injuries. She was treated at the scene by NSW Ambulance paramedics and a Careflight doctor before being taken to Westmead Hospital where she remains in a serious, but stable condition.

The driver of the Toyota, a 36-year-old woman, was tested at the scene and returned a negative result.

Officers from the Crash Investigation Unit examined the scene and commenced an investigation into the circumstances surrounding the crash.

The Lalor Park woman was arrested and taken to Riverstone Police Station where she was charged with dangerous driving occasioning grievous bodily harm drive manner dangerous, negligent driving occasioning grievous bodily harm, proceed through red traffic light, not stop at stop line at red light, cause bodily harm by misconduct (in charge of motor vehicle) and negligent driving (no death or grievous bodily harm). Her licence was also suspended.

She was granted conditional bail to appear at Blacktown Local Court on Monday June 7, 2021.



\$700,000 Cash uncovered

A man faced court on Friday May 14 after police seized more than \$700,000 cash as a result of a vehicle stop for a seatbelt offence in Bella Vista.

Just before 8.30pm (Thursday May 13), officers from The Hills Traffic and Highway Patrol were conducting patrols of the Bella Vista area, when they detected a driver not wearing a seatbelt.

Police stopped the Toyota Camry on Circa Boulevarde and spoke to the unrestrained driver.

During a subsequent search of the vehicle, officers allegedly located \$75,000 concealed in the boot and secreted under the rear seat.

The 39-year-old male driver was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station.

As part of inquiries, officers executed a search warrant at a serviced apartment at Bella Vista, where a further \$650,000 was seized.

The Queensland man was subsequently charged with knowingly deal with proceeds of crime. He has been refused bail to appear at Parramatta Local Court today (Friday, May 14). Inquiries are continuing.

MAN BASHED OUTSIDE HOME

Police are investigating the robbery of a man at Baulkham Hills on Saturday evening (May 15).

The 31-year-old man was at home on Quintana Avenue with his family when the power went out at about 10.30pm on Saturday (May 15).

He went outside to the electrical box when he was approached by two men, wearing balaclavas and armed with a baseball bat.

The resident was struck over the head, causing him to fall to the ground, where he was struck a number of times to the head and body. The injured man's mobile phone was stolen before the two men fled on foot.

Police were notified and officers from The Hills attended and commenced an investigation.

The man was treated by NSW Ambulance paramedics and taken to Westmead Hospital in a stable condition with head and facial injuries.

Police would like to speak to two men who may be able to assist with their inquiries. They have been described as being under 180cm tall, of slim build and were wearing grey hooded jumpers and face coverings.

Anyone with information about the incident is urged to call The Hills Police Area Command or Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

WOMAN IN COURT OVER ALLEGED FRAUD

A woman will face court next month after she allegedly defrauded a not-for-profit treatment centre of almost \$250,000.

Following extensive investigations, police arrested a 43-year-old woman at a home at Freemans Reach about midday on Wednesday, May 19. She was taken to Windsor Police Station, where she was charged with two counts dishonestly obtain financial advantage by deception and knowingly deal with proceeds of crime.

Police will allege in court the woman, who was an employee at the centre, defrauded the centre of \$244,105.99 between 2018 and 2021.

Detectives from Inner West Police Area Command commenced an investigation in March after a not-for-profit treatment centre reported suspected fraudulent activity within their reimbursement systems.

The investigation revealed that fraudulent expense forms had been submitted for a patient who had passed away and were allegedly paid into an employee's bank account.

The Freemans Reach woman was granted strict conditional bail and is due to appear at Windsor Local Court on Thursday, June 24. Investigations are continuing.



UNIT FIRE

DISCOVER BETTER Mental Health

This week (May 23 to May 29) is Schizophrenia Awareness Week and registered nurse Wendy Hynh from the Windsor Road Private Clinic at Baulkham Hills has compiled this column.

In 1992, the World Health Organisation (WHO) shared their international research on schizophrenia and the results were shocking: people in developing countries had better outcomes when compared with people in developed countries.

These surprising findings raised the question, how could richer countries with more resources and sophisticated healthcare systems have poorer outcomes?

Schizophrenia is a mental illness that alters a person's perception of reality and disturbs thoughts, emotions and behaviour. It is highly misunderstood and stigmatised, yet it is a common illness.

About 1 in 100 Australians have schizophrenia (Healthdirect Australia,

Disorder (PTSD)

2020). Based on current population statistics for Baulkham Hills-Hawkesbury, an estimated 2,277 people in our community are affected by this illness. It's likely that you know a friend, neighbour or colleague living with schizophrenia.

What is clear from the WHO studies is that schizophrenia affects people all over the world and psychosocial factors have a direct impact on outcomes. These studies invite us to learn from other cultures and their values.

A consumer from a developing country once shared with me that in his community there is a strong sense of ownership and support – where 'your problem is everyone's problem'. We know that social isolation plays a big role in poor patient outcomes and much can be learnt from observing other cultures and their social and community constructs.

Strong family ties, community and a sense of belonging are all predictors for good outcomes for people living with schizophrenia.

In our service, we encounter culturally diverse people from all walks of life, and we witness firsthand that schizophrenia does not discriminate. As mental health nurses, we are fortunate to have people share their lived experiences with us and allow us to be a part of their journey.

You can read about pathophysiology and medications for treatment in textbooks, but what a textbook cannot teach you is what each person's experience means to them, how their symptoms impact their lives and what will help them in their journey towards recovery.

The theme for Schizophrenia Awareness Week in 2021 is "Discover Better Mental Health".

We invite you to discover better mental health by having these conversations in the community and taking these learnings to find new ways to support each other.


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MAIN STREET GROCER CELEBRATES

The Main Street Grocer in North Richmond Shopping Village is celebrating its first birthday in style on Saturday, May 29.

The Main Street Grocer, however, traces its origins back to 30 years when it was known as Vegi Patch, which was a stalwart in the community. Under the new management, the store has been transformed into a thriving gourmet grocer, deli and fresh produce store.

According to owner Anil Soni, he and his business partner Ish Ahmed wanted to try something different. Mr Soni has been in the food industry for many years and runs a large manufacturing plant in Seven Hills





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"We really wanted to create a refreshed brand for the shop, one which shows our passion for more than just fresh produce and bring in more gourmet supermarket ranges, suitable for the changing palate of the Hawkesbury," Mr Soni said.

Mr Soni and his team actually saved Vegi Patch from being closed down in April 2020 and have redesigned the vision for the store.

"Our hope is to bring the Main Street Grocer to its full glory with a full redesign and renovation commencing end of 2021, without losing the local favourites like our famous deli," Mr Ahmed said.

The proudly Hawkesbury-based team were overwhelmed with local support during last year's floods, working directly with local suppliers, farmers and producers to keep the shelves stocked and the North Richmond community fed.

Due to road closures, both Mr Soni and Mr Ahmed were unable to travel to their new venture for a week. Mr Soni said their store manager (and former owner), Connie Panetta and her husband Rocky were able to keep it open daily and secure supplies from the local farmers to ensure their customers were not left in the lurch.

"It was so frightening not being able to source the basics due to road blockages, but we reached out to our neighbouring farmers and kept the community reassured they would not go hungry," Ms Panetta said.

"It was the worst floods we had seen because this time both Bilpin and Windsor were inaccessible."

The store will have specials, samplings and face painting for children as a part of the first birthday celebrations on Saturday May 29, from 10am-3pm. Everyone is welcome.



CLOSE SHAVE TO HELP OTHERS Glenwood High School has raised over \$15,500 for

cancer research and support programs through its involvement with this year's Hills Relay For Life event.

Students and staff have held bake stalls, raffles and a headshave to raise money as a team in the Cancer Council fundraiser.

Science teacher Kiel Moore is used to close shaves, the House Captain Coordinator at Glenwood High usually has his head shaved when the school attends the annual charity event.

This year he was joined by Year 11 student Lucy North and Year 12 student Joshua Gleeson on the school's quadrangle to have their heads shaved in front of the whole school.

"In past occasions, (the head shave) has been done on stage at Relay in front of mostly strangers. This year it was in front of my students and colleagues so it was a bit more confronting," said Mr Moore.

Year 11 student Lucy North said she had wanted to shave her hair for a long time and says family and friends were extremely supportive. "After some discussion, we decided to shave our heads in-front of the school rather than at the event to make it more personal and be surrounded by the people that supported and donated to us ... it was so heart-warming to know that I had a community of people behind me the whole time, "she said.

Lucy opted for a #3 shave:" I absolutely love it! I do not have to worry about styling it in the morning, and it has boosted my self-esteem and self-confidence. I do not think I have stopped smiling since I shaved it all off"

Joshua Gleeson Year 12 and Vice-School Captain said he was initially hesitant about the shave but said he felt guilty about being vain about the way he looked.

"I started to think about all the people who have been taken away from me by cancer," he said. "So many family members



and close friends have been impacted by this unjustly selective disease, and too many have lost their long and arduous battles.

"Particularly, for our school, our dear Mrs Nash passed away just last year. "

A team of 30 Glenwood High students and staff also attended the shortened Hills Relay For Life Event at Castle Hill Showground on Saturday, May 15.

Mr Moore said: "It is always great to show the wider community what amazing students we have here at Glenwood High School.

"This is an opportunity for them to demonstrate their leadership skills and most importantly, to raise money for cancer research and to educate other students about these difficult topics."

They love to be part of transforming the garden into a showpiece enhancing the beauty and charm of the historic home which stands atop the hill at Bella Vista.

Council is in the process of repairing Pages Wharf Road in Sackville North after it collapsed due to the recent floods.

Currently, vehicle access to properties on Mud Island Road and Pages Wharf Road to the north is restricted to the use of Chapel Hill Road, with a three tonne limit. Council is developing options to stabilise the collapsed sections of road as a matter of urgency, and a two-stage approach is proposed.

Stage one involves temporarily stabilising the sections of collapsed road on Pages Wharf Road using an embankment stabilisation method. This temporary solution will take a number of weeks to complete and while we understand that this may create inconvenience for residents whose property access is limited, it is essential that the work is carried out as soon as possible.

Stage two involves devising a more permanent solution to reduce susceptibility to damage from future floods. This will require detailed geotechnical investigations and design.

Geotechnical investigations are also being carried out in order to identify the remedial work necessary to enable the temporary three tonne load limit on Chapel Hill Road to be lifted.

Stage one is expected to be completed by the end of June. Council thanks residents and road users for your patience during this time.



Funding for home packages is being significantly increased, and a new support at home program will be designed with senior Australians and stakeholders that is responsive to the changing nature of care and the needs of senior Australians.

The Government's reforms will deliver improvements in residential care, with a better funding model and increased transparency, and better support for rural, regional and remote, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and vulnerable senior Australians.



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CHEMICAL CLEANOUT

To help flood affected community members, free Flood Recovery -Chemical CleanOut events will be held in June. The events are intended to support flood affected community members of the Hawkesbury, The Hills, Hornsby and the Central Coast.

The events will be run by the NSW Environment Protection Authority (NSW EPA) in conjunction with Hawkesbury City Council and The Hills Shire Council. Hawkesbury City Council and the NSW EPA have nominated Pitt Town, Wisemans Ferry and Wilberforce as the three locations for the Flood Recovery - Chemical CleanOut events. The events will be held on:

- Tuesday, June 1 •
- 8am to 11am, Pitt Town & District Sports Club
- o 2pm to 4pm, Wisemans Ferry Carpark, Off Northern Rd
- Wednesday, June 2 •
- 8am to 1pm, Woodlands Oval, Wilberforce.

At the Chemical CleanOut events, flood affected community members will be able to safely dispose of any potentially hazardous household chemicals. These include household cleaners and solvents, batteries, fluorescent globes and tubes; paint and paint related products, pesticides and herbicides, poisons, gas bottles, fire extinguishers, pool chemicals, hobby chemicals, acids and alkalis, car batteries, motor oils, fuelsand fluids.

Only items up to a maximum size of 20 litres or 20 kilograms can be dropped off. Further information is available at epa.nsw.gov.au/yourenvironment/recycling-and-reuse/household-recycling-overview/householdchemical-cleanout or call the NSW EPA on 131 555.

Primary producers and small businesses that have been impacted by the flood and now need to safely dispose of chemicals and hazardous waste should contact Council's Waste Education Officer on 4560 4566 to determine if Hawkesbury City Council can accommodate your needs or if another disposal option would be more suitable.

An annual Chemical CleanOut event will also be held for all Hawkesbury residents on Sunday, August 8 from 9am to 3:30pm at Hawkesbury Showground, Clarendon.



SWING CITY On the way

Construction starts in June on a \$12million golf and hospitality venue featuring 40 golf driving ranges, minigolf, plus dining and entertainment in Norwest.

Norwest parent developer Mulpha received DA approval from Hills Shire Council for the \$12m "Swing City" development earlier this month. Work on the venue is scheduled for completion in late 2021.

The venue will cater for a broad range of sporting, leisure,entertainment and corporate function demand in the Hills district.

A Mulpha spokesperson said: "Each bay at Swing City's golf driving range will feature the latest in golf ball tracking technology allowing players to not only improve their swing, but also to compete in a range of challenges including longest drive, nearest the pins and virtual play on many of the world's most famous golf courses."

Swing City is located on Elizabeth Macarthur Drive, near Norwest Private Hospital, opposite Mulpha's new landmark timber commercial building The Bond currently under construction.



Mulpha CEO, Greg Shaw said: "With families now making up 64 per cent of households in The Hills, Norwest is ideally located for a diversified leisure and entertainment offering.

"There are limited licensed sporting venues currently in the area, so Swing City will tap into a growing demand from people to enjoy the game of golf in a more family-friendly setting.

"Świng City is just one of a number of new initiatives designed to create a vibrant, active and socially-engaged community, connected to nature and neighbours, and ultimately a highly liveable Smart City in Norwest," he said.

Norwest has been identified by the State Government as a strategic growth centre, where numbers over the next decade are expected to increase to 60,000 workers, 20,000 residents and 10,000 visitors, as well as over 2,000 organisations.

As well as 40 golf driving range bays, The "Swing City" development will include a licenced restaurant with undercover and outdoor alfresco dining, corporate function and entertainment facilities, mini-golf and amusements.

MEMORIES WITH IVOR JONES & FRIENDS

MUSICAL MEMORIES

One thing that always seems to generate memories of the past is music.

We all have our favourite songs and recording artists and some even recall the favourites of their parents.

Quite often our age can be an indication of our musical memories as music does seem to be a generational thing.

My interest in music was more intense during the 1960s, although I first became interested in the 1950s when my parents bought a stereogram. Do you remember them?

I can recall that they had a record which seemed to be played over and over again. It was Doris Day singing "Deadwood Stage". Doris has been a favourite of mine since that time.

What has brought these memories back to me was the death, a short while ago, of Michael Gudinski, the musical entrepreneur who founded Mushroom Records.

During the 1960s I was asked to organise and run a Saturday night dance or disco at Fairfield, I added to that a similar disco at Cabramatta.

At Fairfield, we had a regular band each week called "Shades of Purple" and I featured on one occasion "Donnie Sutherland & The Titans". Donnie and I were students at a Radio Announcing school located in the City.

Donnie went on to a recording contract with Reg Grundy Records and into radio announcing and television. Whereas I just went nowhere in the music industry except at one stage producing radio programs and becoming Chairman of the local radio station now known as Alive 90.5 based in the Hills district.

During the late 1950s and early 60s American born Lee Gordon was the leading musical entrepreneur in Australia. He founded Lee Gordon Records which later became Leedon Records and featured many of the top Australian recording acts of that time including Johnny O'Keefe, Judy Stone, Noelene Batley and Col Joye.

He also introduced American artists to Australian audiences. He brought out acts such as The Platters. Johnny Ray, Bill Haley and His Comets, La Vern

Baker and Freddie Bell and the Bell Boys with his protégé, Johnny O'Keefe, as a support act.

The mid-1960s saw another wave of musical entrepreneurs such as Ted Albert and Robert Stigwood.

Ted Albert from the well-known Albert's music publishing family, enjoyed his biggest success managing The Easybeats, he also gave us the Ted Mulry Gang, The Throb, John Paul Young and many others whilst Robert Stigwood was largely responsible for the success of the Bee Gees. Stigwood also went into film production producing movies such as "Grease" and "Saturday Night Fever".

Ron Tudor also started managing musical talent and producing records, establishing the Fable record label.

My musical interest also included producing videos for former Bandstand artist Maggie Jodrell Britton where she and I collaborated on "Good Ship Earth" and also Maree Montgomery where I produced a number of videos featuring her song "Sydney The Place To Be". I also produced a number of videos featuring music from our very own, the late James Pegler.

Kamahl also once asked if I could produce a video for him but unfortunately, he has never sent me the music.

ABERDOON HOUSE

Historic Aberdoon House at Rouse Hill has undergone a makeover.

The exact date of when Aberdoon House was constructed and by whom is a mystery, but the earliest renovations on the historic building dates back to 1887.

The Hills Shire Council has just given the Colonial Georgian Cottage a makeover, including polishing and repairing the decking, the internal walls were painted and the old chicken shed repaired as part of rejuvenation works.

North West Disability Services, which uses the building for art classes, said it was thrilled with the renovations.

"North West Disability Services feels honoured to be the current custodians of Aberdoon House. Our clients have a great venue, which holds such history to explore through creativity, and enjoy all that Aberdoon and the property has to offer," Angela Martin, Co-ordinator at Aberdoon House, said.

Aberdoon House is located in Clower Avenue, Rouse Hill The land surrounding the homestead was originally granted to Thomas Clower in January 1818. Clower, a former convict, arrived in the colony in 1798.

Hugh Kelly, whom the suburb Kellyville is named after, purchased the property in 1826 and also owned the nearby 'Bird in the Hand' tavern located near Windsor Road.

He named his farm 'Vinegar Hill Farm' to distinguish it from the many properties he owned around the district.

The property then passed to Alexander and William Gamack in 1841,

who subdivided the property into several smaller quarter acre blocks.

Aberdoon House is now maintained by council. Hills Shire Mayor, Dr Michelle Byrne said maintaining the area's remaining historic buildings is important.

"These renovations mean we can continue to preserve our earliest buildings and ensure future generations have access to a tangible piece of Hills history."

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
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
