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# CAROLS BY CANDLELIGHT

Glenhaven Carols by Candlelight will be celebrating 21 years when it bursts into life again at Glenhaven Oval on Sunday, December 12th.

The much-loved community event which has been attracting thousands of people each year was unable to be held last year due to COVID restrictions.

This year's event is a ticketed event for double vaccinated people only.

Mitchell Blue, volunteer firefighter at Glenhaven Rural Fire Brigade and Chair of the Glenhaven Carols Committee says it will be bigger and better than before.

"We are truly grateful for what the Carol's event has become and the support the community shows each year," he said. "As COVID restrictions did not permit the event to run last year, there is much excitement in the Carols returning. Each year the community comes together on this great night to relax and celebrate."

He says his favourite memory is the 2019 Glenhaven Carols held during the "horror" bushfire season.

"The community were deflated by the constant news of destruction and of homes and lives being lost due to the fires. To be able to up the spirits of the community at this time was great. The community were in turn very supportive of the brigade and their assistance on the night and showed this by purchasing thousands of raffle tickets.

"We were not able to proceed with the fireworks that year due to Total Fire Bans but having the entire event hold candles in darkness and sing Merry Christmas was an amazing sight to see."

Organised by the Glenhaven Carols by Candlelight Committee and the Rotary Club of Greater Hills it showcases local talent with Reid the Music, Hills singer Cassidy-Rae Wilson, Jenna's Singing School, Sister 2 Sister School of Singing and the combined North West Wind Ensemble and Castle Hill Youth Orchestra all set to entertain. Entry is from 4pm where all the fun of the far will be running with rides, food vans and stalls.

As well as a packed entertainment program Santa will also be visiting. The finale of the evening is a fireworks display.

Proceeds from this year's event will be donated to Glenhaven Rural Fire Brigade, The Hills SES, Rotary Club of Greater Hills,



Hills Community Aid, Glenhaven Community Defibrillator Project (two have already been purchased) and ONE80TC Rehabilitation Services which works to rebuild lives following alcohol and drug addiction.

"Without the generous support of local businesses such as fireworks sponsor Louis Carr Real Estate, our stage sponsor Element ICT, West Pennant Hills Sports Club, Kindalin, and the Rotary Club of Greater Hills amongst many other local businesses, this event simply wouldn't be able to proceed," he said.

## **CAR CHASE CHARGES**

A man has been charged with several offences following a police pursuit that ended in Castle Hill after the car was stopped by the use of road spikes in Citadel Crescent on Monday, November 22nd.

Police from Riverstone Police Area Command attended a home at Acres Road, Kellyville, as part of ongoing inquiries into alleged firearm offences at about 12.15pm on Monday (November 22), and found a 22-year-old man and a 34-year-old woman at the property.

The man allegedly threw large rocks at police and threatened officers with a hammer, before fleeing the scene with the woman in a Toyota Yaris. A pursuit of the vehicle was initiated through Kellyville; however, terminated

## **FIREARMS ARREST**

A 42-year-old Kurrajong man has been charged after investigators seized almost 40 firearms and more than 250 kilograms of explosive material during a police operation targeting the importation and manufacture of prohibited firearms.

Detectives from the State Crime Command's Drug and Firearms Squad commenced an investigation in November (2021) and uncovered a Kurrajong property which was allegedly being used to store significant amounts of illicit explosive material and numerous prohibited weapons.

Following extensive inquiries, officers executed a crime scene warrant at the address on Wednesday, November 24th assisted by specialist police attached to the Rescue and Bomb Disposal Unit, Chemical Operations Team, North West Metropolitan Region Operations Support Group, Forensic Evidence and Technical Services Command, as well as Fire Rescue NSW HAZMAT and NSW Ambulance.

During the search, police located and seized a significant amount of prohibited weapons, including almost 40 firearms, seven improvised explosive devices (IEDs), seven pipe bombs, ammunition, a ballistic vest, as well as 250kg of Ammonium nitrate and various other chemicals.

Additionally, police located and seized 77 knives, six firearm silencers and five electronic stun devices.

A 42-year-old man was arrested and taken to Windsor Police Station where he was charged with six offences, including possess more than three unregistered firearms including a prohibited pistol, manufacturing firearms without licence or permit, three counts of possess or use a prohibited weapon without permit, and custody of knife in public place first offence.

A short time later there was a further sighting of the Yaris, and another pursuit was initiated before the vehicle was successfully stopped using road spikes at Citadel Crescent, Castle Hill.Local police, with assistance from the Traffic & Highway Patrol Command, the Dog Unit, and officers attached to Riverstone and Blacktown Police Area Commands, arrested the man and woman.

## **APPEAL FOR AUDI**

Homicide Squad detectives are appealing for public assistance in locating a grey Audi TT RS, which was seen travelling in the vicinity of Tallowwood Avenue, Cherrybrook, prior to – and immediately after – the murder of an 86-yearold man last year.

Police say that just before 12.30am on April 29th 2020, emergency services were called to a home on Tallowwood Avenue, Cherrybrook, following reports two men had forced entry to the home. They found the occupants, an 86-year-old man and 83-year-old woman, with serious head injuries. They were treated at the scene before being taken by NSW Ambulance paramedics to Westmead Hospital, where the man, Kalim Saliba, later died.

## **TOW TRUCK FINES**

NSW Fair Trading Director of Investigations and Operations Stephen French said consumers should exercise caution when tow trucks arrived at the scene of an incident.

"Motorists involved in incidents can refuse the services of a tow truck company for any reason. The first tow truck on the scene does not have the right to tow away the vehicle. If possible, motorists should contact their insurance company before signing a towing authorisation form as it may offer a service organising a tow. Motorists can also ask for their vehicle to be towed to any location, such as their home, and need not agree to having their vehicle towed to a particular repair shop."

His comments came after two tow truck operators were fined a total of \$23,000 and ordered to pay \$34,877 in costs after being found guilty of offences arising from their partnership operating a Blacktown towing business trading as Westside Towing Services.

The offences occurred between September 2018 and June 2020 and were investigated by NSW Fair Trading's Tow Truck Investigation and Australian Consumer Law units in response to complaints.



offences including: Possess unauthorised firearm, aggravated break and enter, stalk/ intimidate intend fear physical harm, police pursuit – not stop – drive recklessly, take and drive conveyance without consent of owner, resist officer in execution of duty.

The woman was charged with, be carried in conveyance taken without consent of owner. Investigations are continuing.

Homicide Squad Commander, Detective Superintendent Daniel Doherty, said an extensive review of CCTV from the surrounding areas at the time of Mr Saliba's murder identified the Audi as a vehicle of interest.

"Over the last 18 months, investigators have worked tirelessly to locate the Audi, which we believe was used in this heinous crime, and we're now asking for public assistance in the hope someone may recognise it," Det Supt Doherty said.

## **DRIVER ROBBED**

Police are appealing for information following the armed robbery of a delivery driver in Carlingford at about 8am on Saturday, November 27th.

The 22-year-old driver parked a white Toyota Hiace van on Adderton Street, Carlingford, before delivering to a home on the street. Police were told when he returned, two men were standing outside the van – one armed with a knife – and demanded he hand over his keys.

One grabbed the keys and got in the driver's seat, while the second got into the front passenger seat, before driving off with 70 parcels, the driver's wallet, shoes and backpack inside.

Police would like to speak to anyone who was in the area at the time and might have dashcam vision, or who has seen the van, NSW Registration BK0 3PD.

# PURPLE NAIL TRIBE

#### Hills Police Commander Superintendent Darrin Batchelor was one of several police officers who had purple nail varnish painted on the ring finger of their left hand last week.

The Purple Nail Tribe project was created by Aileen Mountifield, founder of the Lisa Harnum Foundation, to spark conversation about domestic violence all year round.

Supt Batchelor said at lunch that day everyone was asking why his nail was painted purple.

"It did spark a lot of conversations about domestic violence which is good," he told *the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News*.

Aileen Mountifield said: "The Purple Nail Tribe was created to provide an ongoing conversation and awareness regarding the issue of domestic violence/abuse.

"It is non-productive to have one or two weeks in November, to focus on the issues surrounding D,V then complete silence for the rest of the year. We have an epidemic in Australia so let's highlight it," she said.

"The main objective is for men to agree to wear purple nail varnish on the ring finger of their left hand, to signify their commitment in being a part of ending DV and creating a conversation with others."

Last week the Hills Domestic Violence Prevention Network held an online rose ceremony to remember the 37 women killed by a former partner or partner in this year in Australia.

Supt Darrin Batchelor said he realised more needed to be done after he lead the investigation into the murder of 31-year-old Rachelle Yeo by her former lover on the Northern Beaches in 2012.

"There were so many missed opportunities for people to do something," he said. "In the weeks leading up to her murder she had spoken to her friends, she had spoken to her boss about her fears and she had gone to see a clinical psychologist worried about being stalked."



He said despite all the concerns, no report was ever made to the police. "We have to get the community to recognise the signs and report it."

He said The Hills PAC would be placing confirmed constables on a six week rotation with the domestic violence team of four full-time officers at Castle Hill.

"Educating our junior police is a priority, it's beneficial to the police and the community and to DV victims as well."

Aileen said 2021 had seen an increase in women seeking help.

"This year has been quite busy with referrals coming through other agencies and court. In the Hills, typically the type of abuse that we see is emotional, psychological, financial, isolation, stalking and harassment.

The Lisa Harnum Foundation has a safe room at both Rouse Hill Town Centre and at Castle Towers where a counsellor will meet with someone needing to talk about domestic abuse.

## STATE AWARD FOR By BEV JORDAN

Shirley Purser from Castle Hill was presented with the prestigious Jean Arnot Award from National Council of Women at a special Zonta Says No to Domestic Violence Dinner at Dural last week.

While the 90-year-old volunteer was shocked and surprised by the award no-one else was. The great grandmother has volunteered in the Hills community for nearly 70 years. A Club director and founding member of the Zonta Club Sydney Hills, Shirley was nominated for the State Award by the women's group, Soroptimist International The Hills.

The award was in "acknowledgement of her contribution to the advancement of women and her community over many years", and was presented by Carol Baker from SI of the Hills, Elisabeth Shaw CEO of Relationships Australia NSW and Hills Mayor Michelle Byrne.

Shirley said she was "shocked" by the unexpected award. "It's in my nature (to volunteer)," she told the *Hills to Hawkesbury Community News*. "I have a God-given set of gifts which I use mostly to help women and children. We are the mothers of the future and we have to look after each other and the environment. I feel, often, there is no thought for the future, it is all about what people want now."



The list of things she has helped start are enormous and include the establishment of the Baulkham Hills Pre-School Kindergarten in Torrs Street which opened in 1963; the Gazelles Netball Club and Castle Hill Sports & Recreation Club.

She was a member Shire Youth Suicide Prevention Committee; Charter Secretary and member of Pennant (now Dural) Toastmasters Club; Charter member of Zonta Club of Sydney Hills and member for over 42 years; member of the Hills Domestic Violence Prevention Network since 2000; Member of The Hills International Women's Day Committee since 2007; founding Secretary Western Sydney IWD Breakfast Committee to name a few.

She is still active in many groups in executive roles including secretary of Castle Hill Red Cross.

Her advice: "If something needs to be done, just go and do it."

Shirley moved to Baulkham Hills as a newlywed with her husband Geoff in 1953, Geoff built their home where Shirley ran her dress-making business. She started volunteering with Baulkham Hills Guides in 1953, which began her history of volunteering in the Hills including as Chair of The Hills Shire Council 355 Management Committee and running Jazz at the Pines for 15 years.

President of Zonta Sydney Hills, Donna Fraser said: "Shirley is an inspiration to us all. She has dedicated her life to her family and her community.

"In 2004 Shirley designed a soft temporary breast form (TBF) to fit inside the bras of breast cancer patients after they had their mastectomy. Shirley then formed a group of volunteers who have sewing bees at the Westmead Princess Mary Breast Cancer Institute (BCI) to make them. These TBF's are treasured by the recipients.

"The energy she exudes is boundless and her volunteer achievements are many."

ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR NORMAN BLUMENTHAL has helped more than 13.000 babies arrive into this world.

This month he will be delivering his final baby at Norwest Private Hospital. It will be a huge milestone for the dedicated obstetrician who has been delivering babies for nearly 40 years. Joanna Mikhail and her husband Mathew (*pictured on the front cover*) are delighted that Professor Blumenthal's last delivery will be their daughter as he delivered their older two children, Joshua (5) and Nora (2) and they couldn't be happier.

"He's such an awesome guy," said Joanna. "He's been such a blessing to our family."

Prof Blumenthal trained in South Africa and became a Fellow of the South African College of Obstetricians & Gynaecologists and a member of the Royal College of Obstetricians & Gynaecologists in England in 1981. He became a Fellow of the Australian College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists in1983 and obtained his Masters in Medicine (MSc) at Notre Dame University in 2017. He immigrated to Sydney in 1982 and delivered his first baby in Australia at the old Baulkham Hills Private Hospital on Windsor Road, which later moved to Bella Vista to become Norwest Private.

He's the oldest practising obstetrician in the area because, as he says, he loves the joy of birth and communicating with his patients.

"I really love it so much," he told the *Hills* to Hawkesbury Community News. "Most of my colleagues stopped obstetrics many years ago. I am the oldest practising obstetrician in the area because I delight in confinements and really enjoy being with the parents. Childbirth is a once in a lifetime experience with everlasting memories and consequences for them."

The father of two and grandfather of four, says he's always enjoyed the work despite the fact that it has meant working at the weekends, late at night, early mornings and despite the disruptions to his family life.

"My wife (Caron) has been fabulous and been very very supportive," he said. And while 85 percent of births are problem-free there are always about 15 per cent that throw up challenges and have some form of complication.

# DV PREVENTION, AWARENESS AND EDUCATION

Sadly, the last two years of COVID-19 resulted in more incidents of domestic violence in the Hills, Hawkesbury and Parramatta local government areas. CHRG (Castle Hill RSL Group), has worked with local domestic violence support and prevention partners for several years and recognises the importance of providing better outcomes for victims/ survivors and effecting long-lasting change.

Andy Abey, Head of Corporate Affairs for CHRG said: "We believe this can be achieved through continued support of our DV prevention partners and most importantly, via education and awareness in our children and youth."

The group supports local shelter organisations and support groups such as the Lisa Harnum Foundation, The Sanctuary and Youth Rezolutions, each year. This year, in addition, CHRG donated places on the Love Bites Training Program (delivered by NAPCAN – the National Association for Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect), to the Hills, Hawkesbury and Parramatta local area commands to support the training of 40 police officers in the program.

"The aim of this program was to support additional training of police who are then better equipped to deal with situations involving youth, which then enables them to run bespoke programs at local schools as educated facilitators," said Andy.

"School programming is focussed on educating youth about 'respectful relationships' with the hope of providing information and education that prevents young people becoming involved in domestic violence as a victim or an offender. CHRG is committed to raising domestic violence prevention awareness and supporting local organisations that provide pathways to women and families. Additionally, the group is in the planning phases of donating another round of 'Love Bites' training to more local area police

officers, as we believe that educating our children and youth, is the first step in breaking the cycle of abuse."

Inspector Chris Laird from The Hills Police Area Command said officers who undertook the Love Bites program benefited from it.

"The police are very grateful for the generous donation of the Love Bites training. It was for the North West Sydney Commands and really gave a good understanding of dealing with young people. The police were already using the knowledge gained in their day-to-day working roles."

# THE LOFT CAN HELP

As demonstrated through numerous studies and research, the onset of most mental health conditions occur in young adulthood.

Young adults increasingly experience mental health concerns at higher rates than adults aged 26 and over, however, they have the lowest rates of treatment.

The Hills Clinic in Kellyville, a member of Aurora Healthcare, is the first purpose-built mental health facility in NSW and incorporates The Loft, a dedicated young adults unit, catered to people 16 to 22 years.

Over the past decade, approximately 2000 young adult patients have accessed inpatient and day programs offered by the clinic.

CEO Jacki Maher has been instrumental in the evolution of the clinic and contributes its success to its holistic approach. "At The Hills Clinic, we treat not only the mind but the body. 'In addition to our traditional psychotherapies, we offer physical therapies such as boxing, martial arts, tai chi, circuit training, art therapy, equine therapy and mindfulness. These activities serve as a distraction, but also allow patients to express themselves physically, while they develop skills they can take home and use during periods of heightened stress."

"At The Hills Clinic we also engage the family – parents, siblings and peers. By doing so, the treatment we provide is able to address communication issues within the family structure, as well as any additional issues that may be present at school, work, or in the home."

Mental health conditions such as bipolar and schizophrenia, among others, may be more prevalent in the late teens and early 20s and young adults are often vulnerable to substance abuse, eating disorders, depression and anxiety.

Rhys was 17 years old, he decided to admit himself to the Young Adults three-week inpatient program because he felt 'unsafe in the real world,' and has checked-in as an inpatient multiple times over the past few years.

"I originally admitted myself for 2 reasons, to keep myself alive, as well as to provide myself with the safest space possible to work through the monstrosity that is my mind and work towards a better life," he said.

"When I started the program, I was so relieved to start getting better after living on the edge of suicide for five years. The staff were very comforting and all the other patients were very friendly.

"The program helped me in many ways. Being in hospital allows your medication to be altered at a quicker rate so that plays into it. The set schedule around sleeping and eating was great, but I found the therapy groups were what really helped me. With the right mindset, I was able to unpack the years of bad thinking patterns and how to best change them using the strategies I learnt in therapy.".

## TOXIC TREATS TO AVOID BY DR BENJAMIN J GRAHAM

## While sitting down with friends and family to eat and drink this Christmas, it is important to be aware which foods are dangerous for pets.

What is a tasty treat for us, can cause toxicities or diseases in our beloved pets. Pancreatitis (inflammation of the pancreas) is a very common cause of unwell pets and it is most often caused by an overdose of fat.

#### **THINGS TO AVOID**

Fatty offcuts, ham leftovers and turkey stuffing can all cause severe and potentially lifethreatening illness in dogs. Just one sausage for an 8kg dog can be the equivalent of a tensausage 'snack' for an 80kg person! The same goes for a rasher of bacon or a biscuit.

Common culprits of toxicities include macadamia nuts, onion, garlic, chocolate, alcohol, avocado, xylitol (an artificial sweetener), grapes, raisins, and sultanas.

Symptoms can include lethargy, diarrhoea, vomiting, seizures, collapse, coma, pale or purple gums, red injected gums, wobbly gait, head or muscle tremors, eye tremors (nystagmus), red urine and difficulty breathing.

The chance of survival following ingestion of a toxic substance decreases as time to treatment increases. If you have concerns that your pet has ingested something they shouldn't have, get them to your vet as soon as possible.

#### **KEEPING COOL**

Our pets wear the same outfit through summer as they do in winter so we need to keep them comfortable and healthy through the hot days.

- Clipping: Reducing that heavy coat is an easy way to help pets stay cool. They will also dry off faster after a bath or playing in the sprinklers.
- Shade: Swimming and playing under the garden hose is a great way to cool our pets off, we just have to let them dry off in the shade. Letting them lie in the sun can result in overheating.
- Cold food: Freezing dog food, lean meat, or water is a fun way to keep your dog entertained and cool. It's impressive how quickly a dog can demolish a large block of ice when the sun's out!
- Exercise: Taking walks during the evening will reduce the chance of burnt pads. Your dog's feet will burn as easily as your hands on hot concrete. Bad burning will result in sloughing of the pads on their feet, infection and worse.
- Ice packs: An ice pack wrapped in a wet towel will provide a cool place for your pet to lie down as will a paddle pool or half clam shell filled with water.
- Car Trips: Pets can easily overheat in the car, even with the aircon blasting. Stress, inability to move around, and direct sunlight all contribute to a very hot, and potentially ill pet. Ensure they can safely move into different positions and have ready access to an air conditioning vent. A cracked window can help, and regular stops for wee breaks and to drink some cool water are a must. Don't leave your pet in the car, they can overheat, become ill, and even die.

## BLUNDELL INSPIRES BY LAWRENCE MACHADO MACHADO

For Australian and Hills champion Jenny Blundell, focussing on the basics of athletics is as important as preparing for major events.

The former Cherrybrook Little Athletics star is back home after competing at the Tokyo Olympics but is already setting her sights on two big championships

Blundell, 27, one of the several Hills locals to compete in Tokyo, has returned to her first running coach, Valme Kruger from Cherrybrook Athletics, for a change of pace and also to encourage the new crop of local athletes. Blundell finished 11th in the women's 5000m at Tokyo. At the 2016 Rio Olympics, Blundell finished 11th in the semi-finals of the 1500m.

The former Cherrybrook Technology High School student is aiming to compete in two demanding events next year, the IAAF World Championships in Oregon (US) from July 15-24, and the Commonwealth Games in Birmingham, England, from July 28 to August 8.

"It's such a quick turnaround which is why we are trying a new training routine of a 10-day cycle rather than seven days,"

Blundell said. "I'm really enjoying it. It's been good getting back in touch with Valme who is letting me do some sessions with her squad. I love running with a mixture of abilities, everyone has different strengths and weaknesses. I can be a world-class runner, but I can still be getting a good training effect running with up-and-coming teenagers. I am really, really enjoying that. It's also good for the younger runners to see someone who is world-class and see that they don't train hard every session."

Cherrybrook athlete Idris Burkhardt, 14, said it was "really inspiring" having the track star join their training sessions. "It encourages us to be more engaged in training, and also knowing that Valme helped train Jenny to become an Olympian inspires us that we can do it too," Burkhardt said.

Blundell, who is keen to give back to the local club, also attends Cherrybrook Little Athletics competition nights, prompting one excited boy to come running up with a photo of Blundell in action in Tokyo to ask: "Is this really you? I saw you on TV at the Olympics!"

Blundell said it's important for young athletes to see that they are no different than she was at the same age. "I was lucky through Little Athletics to be exposed to people who had done what I have done now, and to realise we are all human," she said. "When I was a kid, I couldn't wait to come to Cherrybrook every day to train - I loved training and I loved the friends I made while training."

Blundell said she is enjoying "recovery" runs around The Hills, where she grew up. "The 5000m is still quite a new event for me and it's still exciting.

"If the Tokyo Olympics had gone ahead in 2020, I would have been running the 1500m but with the extra year of training I got fitter and my event naturally gravitated to the 5000m.

"But I am still wrapping my head around the laps and my strengths and weaknesses in the event ... but it's good, I like a new challenge. I just feel like I have a new lease on my running life by changing events, which is really cool."

The Hills Barbarians Cricket Club are pitching more resources, including extra coaching classes, into their expanding female teams.

Baa Baas president Steve Wickman, speaking to Hills To Hawkesbury Community News, said they have always encouraged girls teams in their club, with numbers rising in recent years.

Wickman said the club will use the recent \$1000 grant from HomeWorld and Sydney Thunder to also purchase new equipment for their female players.

"We have a significant growth in the girls teams at our club," he said. "We have always had young girls in our teams but now that they have their own teams, we have seen a bigger growth thanks to the great girls we have playing spreading the word. Cricket NSW have been very supportive at every turn to try and help us fill teams helping run come try days. The grant will be used for extra coaching opportunities

and equipment for our female teams to help them keep improving at the rate required to help them keep enjoying the game and staying involved. It would be great one day to have a female player on our committee as an administrator. We have had some increase in our Junior numbers this season with a small number of senior cricketers The Hills Barbarians will be using the \$1000 grant to boost their female cricket programs. dropping away."

This season, the Baa Baas are fielding three all girls teams in addition to seven senior and 15 junior teams across different age groups. After Christmas, the club will be hosting the junior and Master Blast program with around eight teams.

The club had a successful 2020/21 season, with their A Grade side finishing runners-up in the grand final for the second successive year. The club, however, won the

B5 title, while their Under-17 Division I side and B2 team lost their respective finals. Wickman also said bad weather put paid to several of their teams in the semifinals.

#### MEMORIES WITH IVOR JONES & FRIENDS



I was going to call this item "A MOTORING OUTING" because I often relate to my wife that when I was a child in England my father, at one time during the mid 1950s, decided that we would go on a trip by motoring around the countryside to see a little more of England.

What my father really wanted to do however is visit as many pubs as he could to play darts and go to Ascot for the horse racing.

My father was a champion darts player in the South West of England winning many trophies and prizes and was also a bit of a gambler, hence the visit to Royal Ascot. There was barely a week that his photograph or an item featuring him would not appear in the "Bristol Evening Post" holding on to a trophy or prize of some sort.

At the time he had entered the "News of the World". National Darts Competition in which I had been told he came 7th in the competition. Only recently did I consider that perhaps the "trip" may have been to enable him to compete in heats for the competition.

I did not however inherit his talent for darts in this regard. My wife thinks that the term "Motoring" is old fashioned but still rather quaint.

Whilst we were living at Cabramatta, my father joined Cabra-Vale Diggers and captained the darts team and for a while was also NSW

Clubs Darts Champion. But I have digressed from what this article is about.

I am sure that many readers have enjoyed driving around the country from time to time. Country drives have changed since I first came to Sydney.

A drive to Campbelltown, Windsor, Central Coast etc would have once qualified as a country drive as you passed through farmlands, orchards and bush.

Not so much now-a-days would such a drive be considered a "country day trip" but thinking back to times when I would drive to Wisemans Ferry, when the "Bull & Bush" hotel at Baulkham Hills or Old Northern Road shops at Castle Hill were practically considered the end of suburbia.
