It was super Iuesaay on January 11th when both Hawkesbury City Council and Hills Shire Council held meetings and elected new leaders

COUNCILLOR PATRICK CONOLLY (*Liberal*) was elected Mayor of Hawkesbury unopposed by fellow councillors at Tuesday's meeting, Hawkesbury councillors. **BARRY CALVERT** (*Labor*) was elected as Hawkesbury City's Deputy Mayor both positions are for a two-year term.

The two men are long-term councillors and former Mayors at Hawkesbury City Council.

Patrick Donolly said: "As Mayor, I intend to continue to build on the great work this Council has achieved during my previous term.

"My priority will be continuing to make Council an organisation that is focused on its customers, our rate payers and residents. I've always believed that Council is first and foremost a service provider. Our job is to make sure we're delivering the services that people want and that we're delivering them to a good quality, and that we're doing our best to make the Hawkesbury a great place to live and work," he said.

There are three new faces on the 12-member council, The council is now made up of four Liberal councillors, one Small Business Party, two Labor, three Independent, one Greens and one Shooters, Fishers and Farmers member.

The Hills Shire Council is headed by popularly elected Mayor, DR PETER GANGEMI (*Liberal*) was elected by voters at the December 4th election

On Tuesday night the newly elected Hills Shire Council voted on the role of Deputy Mayor which was won by first time councillor **MARK HODGES** (*Liberal*) who will hold the post until April 30th 2023. He defeated Ryan Tracey (Labor) in a vote, nine votes to four.

ENERGY STRATEGY SCRAPPED BY BEV JORDAN

At its first meeting for 2022 Hills Shire Council's newly formed council has dumped the energy strategy proposal approved at the last Hills Shire Council meeting of 2021 before the election on December 4th.

The motion to: "not to proceed with the development of a specific energy strategy" was passed at an extraordinary meeting of council held on Tuesday, January 11th.

It was moved by newly elected Liberal councillor Mark Hodges, who was elected Deputy Mayor at the same meeting, and seconded by newly elected Liberal councillor Jerome Cox.

Councillors Tony Hay, Ryan Tracey and Barbara Burton (Labor) and Mila Kasby (The Greens) asked for their names to be recorded against the motion.

The motion followed a successful move to rescind the Renewable Energy decision made by the previous Hills Shire Council at its meeting on November 23rd, 2021.

The Item, moved by Councillor Jacob Jackson and Seconded by Councillor Alan Haselden, recommended: "Council to commit to the development of an Energy Strategy to review our use of renewable energy and to reduce reliance on fossil fuels such as coal, gas, petrol and diesel.

"The strategy will identify options for increasing the use of renewable energy and identify the most appropriate energy projects including solar generation/storage, electric vehicles for Council's operations and to commit to develop targets/milestones for Council to manage its energy in a financially viable manner."

At that time, two Councillors Mike Thomas and Liz Russo requested that their names be recorded as opposing the Resolution of Council.

Tuesday's (January 11th) revision motion, signed by Mayor Peter Gengemi and Councillors Hodges and Cox, said: "We believe the current policy settings include significant renewable energy actions, which reflect a positive direction for Council and the community. Notwithstanding such belief it is always prudent for Council to review policies and as such the rescission of the Notice of Motion will afford all Councillors time to properly consider the Environmental Strategy and other policies where relevant."

Councillor Hodges said the council was increasing its use of solar panels and LED lighting, saying the existing environmental strategy would ensure the continued reduction of the energy footprint.

Clr Ryan Tracey said scrapping a strategy on energy at council's first sitting was "irresponsible"

Cir Mila Kasby said a Renewable Energy Plan was "absolutely" needed. "We should be



A move to have the matter put before a strategic planning workshop for further discussion and briefings from council staff was defeated by Liberal councillors.

- Council has 17 operational solar panel systems on operational buildings and 58% of council's lighting network are LED lights.
- Other projects include:
 - requiring LED lighting for sports fields
 - installing instantaneous gas hot water systems
 - introducing sports field lighting control via textmessaging in Glenhaven and Russell reserves
 - installing carbon dioxide sensors and variable speed drives to car park exhaust and supply fans at the Castle Grand conference centre."

DO YOU RECOGNISE This man?

Investigators have released a COMFIT image of a man and are appealing for public assistance, as part of ongoing investigations into the sexual assault of a young girl more than 42 years ago.

Police were told the girl, then aged nine, was playing with friends in bushland off Randal Crescent and Richard Close, North Rocks, on the afternoon of Sunday, July 1stin 1979 before she was approached by a man who claimed to be a council ranger.

The man – described as being aged between 25 and 30 years old – took the girl away from her friends and further into the bushland where he allegedly sexually assaulted her.

Officers attached to The Hills Police Area Command were notified and commenced an investigation into the incident.

Despite extensive investigations by local police at the time and over the years, no one has been charged in relation to the assault.

As part of ongoing inquiries, investigators with assistance from the Facial Recognition Unit have now released an additional COMFIT



image of a man who they believe may be able to assist with the investigation.

The man – as reconstructed by the victim's description – is shown in the image as he would have appeared at the time, next to how police predict he would look now.

It is understood the man may have lived in the North Rocks area at the time of the incident but could have moved away since.

Detectives are urging anyone who may recognise the man depicted in the COMFIT image, or who has information about the incident, to come forward.

BUILDING COLLAPSE

Crews from Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW) assisted two injured workers following a structural collapse at a residential construction site in Kings Langley on Thursday January 6th.

Firefighters provided immediate medical first response to two men aged in their 30s who suffered lacerations from the collapse on Perry Street just after 9am.

Crews also established an exclusion zone around the construction site to ensure the structural safety of the rest of the building. NSW Ambulance treated the two men on over to Safe Work Australia to investigate. Acting Superintendent Tim Hassiotis from

PURSUIT CHARGES

A 20-year-old Kings Park man has faced court on several charges following a pursuit which started in South Windsor late on Christmas Day and ended in Bella Vista early on Boxing Day.

Police say officers attached to Hawkesbury Police Area Command were travelling on Cox Street, South Windsor, in an unmarked vehicle, when they were overtaken by a white Isuzu D-Max at about 11pm on Saturday, December 25th.

Checks of the vehicle revealed it had allegedly been stolen from a home on Toorah Street, Londonderry, earlier that night and police attempted to stop the Isuzu at the intersection of Cox and Bell streets.

Police will allege the Isuzu then reversed into the unmarked vehicle twice before fleeing the scene. A pursuit commenced, however was terminated a short time later, before a separate unmarked Hawkesbury Highway Patrol vehicle resumed the pursuit on Richmond Road, Bligh Park. The pursuit continued to the Windsor Downs area before it was terminated due to the dangerous manner of driving.

Pol Air commenced monitoring the Isuzu as it continued to the Baulkham Hills area, where road spikes were successfully deployed by police on Seven Hills Road, about 12.40am on Sunday, December 26th (2021).

The driver – a 20-year-old man – allegedly fled the scene on foot before officers, with the assistance of the Dog Unit, arrested him at the rear of a home on Barraba Place, Bella Vista.

It is alleged that during a search of the Isuzu, police seized cash, knives and identification cards believed to be stolen.

Following inquiries, the Kings Park man was charged with take and drive conveyance without consent of owner, three counts of police pursuit - not stop - drive dangerously, negligent driving (no death or grievous bodily harm), possess prohibited drug and goods in personal custody suspected being stolen (not motor vehicle).

SUSPICIOUS FIRE

Police are investigating a suspicious fire which destroyed a retail store in Northmead on Christmas Eve.

Emergency services were called to a fire on Sherwood Street, Northmead about 12.30am (Friday, December 24th), after reports of a building fire. Crews from Fire and Rescue NSW attended, and extinguished the blaze; however, the building sustained significant damage.

The occupants of residential units above the store were evacuated. No injuries were reported. Detectives have commenced an investigation into the cause of the fire, which is being treated as suspicious. Inquiries continue.

MAN ARRESTED

A 18-year-old Bankstown man appeared in Parramatta Local Court on January 5th charged by Detectives from the Hills Police Area Command with Wounding with intent to inflict Grievous Bodily Harm following from a stabbing incident in Rouse Hill in March 2021.

Detectives commenced an investigation after a 51-year-old man was stabbed after hearing a noise outside his home on Ponsford Ave, Rouse Hill at about 12.40am on Saturday, March 27th, 2021.

He told police he saw an unknown male sitting in his car and yelled out to the male, who exited the vehicle and fled the scene on foot.

The 51-year-old went outside and drove the vehicle to a nearby street where he located the male with two other unknown males.

When he exited the vehicle, a physical altercation allegedly occurred with the males, where the man sustained four stab wounds to his back. The males fled the scene on foot up Mailey Circuit. The 51-year-old man drove back to his home, where emergency services were contacted. He was treated at the scene before being taken to Westmead Hospital in a stable condition.

BIKES STOLEN

Hills Police Area Command are investigating a Break and Enter in Glenshee Place, Glenhaven that occurred in the early morning of Sunday, January 9th whilst the occupants were asleep.

Five valuable trail bikes were stolen during the incident. Some of the bikes are unique and would be recognized by members of the motorcross racing community.

CANNABIS FIND

Two 37-year-olds from North Kellyville have been arrested and charged with cultivating a commercial quantity of cannabis following the execution of a Search Warrant by The Hills Police Area Commands proactive team at a North Kellyville house on Tuesday (January 11th).

A total of 72 cannabis plants and 2.9 kg of cannabis leaf were allegedly located in different parts of the house.

A large number of suspected canna bis seeds were also seized by police.

The woman was granted conditional bail and is due before Parramatta Court on January 19th. The man appeared in Parramatta Local Court on January 12th.

Both have been charged with:Enhanced indoor cultivation – commercial quantity expose child, Possess cannabis (indictable and commercial quantity); Cultivate prohibited plant (small & indictable quantity); supply cannabis (indictable and commercial quantity).

MAN CHARGED

Robbery and Serious Crime Squad detectives have charged a man as part of ongoing investigations into a spate of alleged car jackings, and armed robberies committed at gunpoint in Sydney's north-west at the weekend.

Investigators from the State Crime Command's Robbery and Serious Crime Squad – assisted by officers from The Hills Police Area Command – established Strike Force Bellinger to investigate a number of motor vehicle thefts and assaults which occurred in the early hours of Saturday 8 January 2022. They include:

- About 3.15am, two males armed with handguns approached a man and woman – aged 58 and 59 – travelling inside a black BMW 640i as they drove into the driveway of a West Pennant Hills home. It's alleged the males demanded the keys to the vehicle before smashing the passenger's side window and stealing a handbag, then fleeing in a black Lexus sedan.
- About 3.35am, a 37-year-old man was approached by two males and threatened with a firearm, then assaulted, as he exited a service station on Windsor Road at Northmead. It's alleged one of the males then fled in a white Hyundai, while the second male left the scene in the man's black Range Rover Evoque.
- About 3.50am, a 36-year-old man had stopped his white Hyundai on the side of Prospect Highway, Blacktown, when two vehicles approached his car and stopped; preventing him from driving off. Police have been told two males – armed with a machete and handgun – then forced the man into one

of their vehicles, as a third male stole the Hyundai. It's alleged the duo then made a range of demands for cash and other property, before he was eventually released near Girraween.

Crime scenes were established at multiple locations and several items were seized by investigators – including the stolen Lexus and Range Rover – which were located abandoned later that day and have since undergone forensic examination.

Following extensive inquiries, strike force investigators arrested a 24-year-old man in Lithgow just before 2pm on Tuesday January 11th.

The Mount Wilson man was taken to Lithgow Police Station and has since been charged with destroy property in company use fire, three counts of robbery while armed with dangerous weapon and take/detain person in company with intent to obtain advantage.

Investigations under Strike Force Bellinger continue.

COVID IN THE HAWKESBURY ALMOST 1500 NEW CASES In the last 7 days

COVID cases across the Hawkesbury continue to climb and with no test centres open over Christmas and New Year there is still likely some lag in the system with more cases to be revealed.

In the last 7 days the Hawkesbury recorded 1498 new cases, and a large number of them without any known source, so the virus is spreading fast.

All aged care facilities in the Hawkesbury are in lockdown or have enhanced screening in place, following the death of a resident from Windsor's Fitzgerald aged care home back just over a week ago, and three current residents at Richmond's March St Hawkesbury Living aged care home testing positive. Two of the residents, though positive, are not showing any symptoms, and the third has mild symptoms, relatives have been told.

There are currently almost 2000 active Hawkesbury COVID cases - 1904 - and with most test centres now reopened we will likely see a rise in the number of recorded cases in the coming weeks.

And while residents are being urged to use Rapid Antigen Test (RATs) for self testing, rather than clogging up test centres, the kits' availability across the Hawkesbury is best described as patchy and prices vary.

The Hawkesbury, Blue Mountains and Lithgow local government areas represented 39% of all cases in the Nepean Blue Mountains Local Health District on January 11 after 39% on January 10 and 34% the day before. It's normally 10-20% each day so we're part way through a significant wave (of both reported and unreported cases) in this part of Sydney.

Until two weeks ago, these Local Government Areas weren't that badly affected by COVID compared to the rest of Greater Sydney.

The positivity rate of tests across NSW is currently high at 36.27%, which means that on January 11, for example, of the 71,325 COVID tests 25,870 were positive.

The World Health Organisation considers a 5% positivity level is the virus under control, so we're way ahead of that.

Reported cases in NSW over the last 5 weeks have been approximately 85% Omicron and 15% of the far more dangerous Delta.

80% of the 342 people in ICU in Australia have Delta and 20% Omicron and for the 3865 in hospital in Australia it's approximately 65% Delta and 35% Omicron.

Current COVID cases in NSW hospitals, in ICU, and on a ventilator, and vaxx status:

- IN HOSPITAL: 2186 patients (was 2030, 1927, 1795, 1738, 1609 on previous days) - 69.8% fully or triple vaccinated, 2.5% one dose, 27.7% not vaccinated.
- IN ICU: 170 (159, 151, 145, 134, 131 on previous days) - 52.0% fully or triple vaccinated, 1.2% one dose, 46.8% not vaccinated.
- ON VENTILATORS: 51 (47, 38, 40, 33, 38 on previous days) - 52.0% fully or triple vaccinated, 1.2% one dose, 46.8% not vaccinated.

There were 166 people in hospital 27 days ago - 2186 today. There were 21 people in ICU 27 days ago - 170 today. There were 7 on ventilators 27 days ago - 51 today.

COLO HEIGHTS MUM GETS PETITION UP TO ACCELERATE DRIVING TESTS FOR TEENS AS COVID PUTS THE BRAKES ON

We all know how poor public transport is in many areas of the Hawkesbury and it's led a Colo Heights mum to set up a petition calling on Hawkesbury MP Robyn Preston to get in gear and push for shorter driving test waiting times for our teens.

There's been a big blow out on driving test availability as COVID hits staff at test centres, including Richmond, where there's now a minimum wait of a month for a test and very often much longer.

And the shortage of tests is not just in the Hawkesbury, so even travelling to another test centre far away doesn't seem to solve the problem.

"We live in a rural part of the Hawkesbury in Colo Heights and I have tried to get my daughter an early age licence for education and employment purposes," says Rosalynd Martin. "We've tried as far away as Tamworth and Taree, but no success.

"We have been trying for months to book this in and there have been no appointments available for at least 6 months," Mrs Martin told the Post.

Her daughter Kathryn has worked hard to get her driving hours up so she can sit the driving test, not least because her mum is having to drive her from home to education and work.

"Rural teens are in desperate need of their licence," said Mrs Martin. "I can no longer work the hours I need to provide for my family because I'm needing to taxi my daughter 4 hours a day to and from educational and work engagements, and it's been that way for 6 months. I also have a 8-year-old old son who I have to get to school and back again. With no public transport, and I might add we have no before and after school services in our area, something needs to be done, and done quick."

Mrs Martin says she's hearing day in and day out from frustrated parents in remote areas with the same issue.

And she's calling on Hawkesbury MP Preston to put pressure on to get some action for local teens.

"What are you going to do in the Hawkesbury for our children?" asks Mrs Martin of the MP, "the government needs to step up and take action for our communities.

"Step it up for our Hawkesbury teens. They deserve to be listened to."

Young learner drivers in the Hawkesbury can apply – as can all rural teens – for an early age licence but Mrs Martin says her experience is there's little point because that is also being rejected across NSW.

You can apply for an early age test at age 16 and 6 months, if you've held L-plates for 6 months, do extra driving lessons (the safer driver course), pay \$150, have a letter from employers or education, and a letter from Transport for NSW to prove there is no transport available, plus a letter from anyone with a licence living in the same household, and you also have to complete the 120 hours driving plus 20 hours night driving.

"All that had to be done before even applying for the test," said Mrs Martin, "and then we were told by the test centre it would be rejected. I've been told teens as far out as St Albans also have been refused recently."

There was nothing to be done but wait until Kathryn turned 17 and now she can get her Ps, but only if she can get a test and pass it.

She was told by the RMS test centre in Richmond it could be 5 to 6 months' wait for a test.

"It's unacceptable for our rural teens not to be able to get their licence to keep themselves moving forward with their education or employment and it means parents having to make the choice between working to provide for their family or by reducing work hours to drive their teens to education or jobs," says Mrs Martin.

"Something needs to be done asap to clear this backlog in licencing, not least because our kids have no access to public transport in a lot of areas in the Hawkesbury and now have limited access to licence testing too. "The Blue Mountains, Bilpin, St Albans, Upper MacDonald, all these areas would be feeling the same stresses that we are."

A spokesperson for Service NSW told the Post they were, "experiencing a high demand for driver testing across the state due to the impact of COVID restrictions.

"However, Service NSW is actively recruiting new driver testers to better meet the high demand.

"Online bookings for driver testing are still available statewide.

"The wait time for Richmond Service Centre is about four weeks. However this number changes when more customers book their test.

"Service NSW understands the wait time is frustrating and appreciates customer patience and understanding as testing returns to normal."

The spokesperson said a temporary driver testing site had been put in place at Howell Oval in Penrith to assist the Nepean-Hawkesbury region, and they said that had a current wait time of one week.

"Driver testers must be fully vaccinated and customers either need to be fully vaccinated or have received a negative COVID-19 Rapid Antigen Test result on the day of their driver or rider licence test," said the spokesperson.

"A photo of your negative test next to your existing licence or ID on a mobile phone is sufficient proof. A negative PCR test is no longer required," said the spokesperson.

"Guidelines for face masks, disposable seat covers, hand sanitiser and other personal protective equipment remains in place."

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT WELCOMED By BEV JORDAN

Hills Shire Mayor Peter Gangemi won cross party approval for his move to strengthen ties to the indigenous community in the Hills.

At Tuesday night's Extraordinary Council meeting (January 11th) the first item on the agenda was to include Acknowledgement of Country at council meetings.

"It is a gesture that we can do to show our residents of indigenous descent that Council is reaching out to them for their wisdom and support," he said.

"In addition to an Acknowledgement of Country before each Council meeting, I believe that Council needs to do more outside of our meetings to further reach out to our indigenous population."

He has suggested a Council-backed celebration of NAIDOC week in July saying:

"I want this Council to represent the whole community. Conducting an Acknowledgement of Country at the start of Council meetings is an important step in the process. However, I believe it is important to have additional measures outside of Council meetings including better displaying our indigenous history, looking at place naming opportunities, conducting an event during NAIDOC week and visiting Muru Mittigar's Cultural Education Centre at Rouse Hill." The motion has also called for the indenous history of the area to be displayed more prominently in the community and on the council's website.

"Remains of both open camps and cave dwellings have been discovered in the Hills Shire, with charcoal drawings, shellfish middens, animal bones and stone flakes being discovered in caves," he said.

"The rock dwellings found in the Darling Mills Creek area of West Pennant Hills date back almost 12,000 years.

"I believe that the history of the Darug people is an amazing one and should be better known in the Shire."

The Mayoral Minute and motion was unanimously approved:

- at the earliest council meeting possible a proposed updated Code of
- Meeting Practice is tabled (containing an Acknowledgement of Country) and placed on public exhibition for 28 days.
- Council continue to conduct an Acknowledgement of Country prior to Citizenship Ceremonies and Major Events.



- Councillors accept an invitation to visit Indigenous members of the community at Muru Mittigar's Cultural Education Centre at Rouse Hill.
- Council conducts an appropriate inperson event for The Hills community to attend to celebrate the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples during NAIDOC week.
- Council investigate options to better display the indigenous history of the Shire in key locations such as the Council website, Libraries and key parks.
- Council investigate indigenous place naming opportunities of a proposed park or newly built park in The Hills, with a report to be brought back to Council of potential options for Councillors to consider.

Starting with the street kids of Kings Cross in the 1970s, he worked with the Wayside Chapel until he moved to Ashfield in the '80s and opened his now famous Loaves and Fishes free restaurant in the grounds of the Uniting church.

To this day, thousands of free meals are served every week to those in need, while providing free dental, medical and social services. The food and health services are now mobile as his work spreads far beyond its Ashfield roots.

"What a couple of years it's been eh?" says Rev Bill. "Time for a bit of hope and entertainment! A play set in a graveyard performed in a church? Fabulous!

For rising Hills athletes, Isabella Fisher, Xavier Hennessey, Sarah-Anne Koot and Olivia Moresi, training at the Little Athletics Australia Team Camp under national coaches, should have been their most exciting time.

Unfortunately, the under-15 camp to have been hosted by Gold Coast this month, was cancelled due to COVID-19 risks. So now, these Cherrybrook LA stars are putting aside their disappointments, to prepare for other big opportunities this year.

"It would have been a unique opportunity for the up-and-coming dual Little Athletics and senior competitors to train with some of the nation's top coaches," a Cherrybrook LA club spokeswoman said.

The four young stars shone at the 2021 NSW All School Championships in December: Moresi won silver in the 14 girls high jump, Hennessey took silver in the 14 boys triple jump and Koot landed bronze in 14 girls 200m hurdles. Fisher ran a close fifth in the 14 girls 400m. Moresi and Hennessey were also picked for the NSW Merit team.

"It (the camp) is something we were all really looking forward to so it's disappointing, but it was encouraging just getting to that level and hopefully there will be other opportunities this year," Moresi, 14, said. The Cheltenham Girls High student finds track events "intense" but says when she is high jumping, "I just have fun all the time!". Moresi is keen on following in the footsteps of Tokyo Olympics silver medallist Nicola McDermott.

Gilroy College's Hennessey, 14, said: "It was a great honour to have been chosen ... I was a bit devastated the camp was cancelled. I was really looking forward to spending time with the other athletes and improving my triple jump technique. But I look forward to competing across the rest of this season."

Fisher, 14, loves the 400m, and hopes to compete internationally at the highest level. Fisher, who moves from Mount St Benedict's College to Barker College this year, said being chosen for the Australian Team Camp had been "unexpected" given the calibre of competition in her event, but "made me realise I was actually good enough".

Koot, 14, who studies at The Cherrybrook Technology High, said hurdles "just feels right" to her, and has lofty ambitions like her team-mates.

Hennessey said he was "surprised" to be selected in triple jump – an event he really started becoming competitive

last season. Hennessey recently broke the cub record in his age group, and said he is "getting better each week".

To many, the last two years may seem to have been eventful, but have they really? A number of what was once regular or annual events failed to go ahead or were curtailed due to COVID. Spring, Summer and early Autumn one would normally come across many events from School and Church fete, garden shows, carnivals and the like.

As we are now into January, one regular event has been the Australia Day celebrations. Australia Day has not always been celebrated on January. Other states and territories celebrated on various dates. In New South Wales the 26th January had been called "Anniversary Day" up to 1866 but also In early colonial times, the 26th was also called 'First Landing Day' or 'Foundation Day' by some, and would be celebrated by European immigrants (particularly ex-convicts) by holding anniversary dinners. Other states and territories also had anniversary or similar days set aside for celebration on the anniversary of the founding of the state or territory. Names for the particular day in those states and territories were "Settlement Day", "Foundation Day", "Proclamation Day" and in the case of Tasmania it was the "Hobart Regatta Day" on the 1st December which celebrated the discovery of the island by Abel Tasman in 1642.

The first ever official national day that was actually named Australia Day was July 30 in 1915, and was instigated to raise funds

for the World War I effort. It was not until 1994 that all states and territories decided to celebrate what we now call Australia Day on the 26th January. Some states still maintain their own celebrations for the anniversary of their foundation. Tasmania now celebrates "Hobart Regatta Day" but in January instead of December.

One of the highlights during past years of Australia Day in the Hills and Hawkesbury regions has been the fireworks displays. The venue has also changed for celebrations during recent times. I can recall when the major celebration for the Hills district was at the Castle Hill showground, one year it was at the Balcombe Heights sports grounds at Baulkham Hills whereas more recently it has been celebrated at the Historic Bella Vista Farm heritage grounds which has become one of the major showcases for events in the Hills. The major event in the Hawkesbury region is held at Governor Philip Park alongside the river at Windsor, where again one of the major attractions is the fireworks display.

Apart from the fireworks. Australia Day is also the day that showcase the talents of young and old performers in concert and many newer arrivals are confirmed as Australian Citizens with citizenship ceremonies held throughout the land. Prominent citizens also receive Awards for charitable or notable deeds.

At the time of writing this piece I cannot say whether Australia Day celebrations will be either live or on-line due to the Covid situation that we are all forced to live with. Perhaps by the time this article is published on 14th January it maybe clearer as to whatever changing rules and regulations will allow. If not, get in touch with your local council closer to the date either by visiting their website or telephoning them

But whatever you do I wish each and everyone of you a Happy enjoyable "Australia Day" whether you are having a guiet day at home or enjoying a family bar-b-que.
