MERCEDES DURANTE, a dedicated volunteer with numerous organisations has been named The Hills Shire Council's Australia Day Citizen of the Year. Honoured at the same ceremony last week were council's youngest ever recipient,12year-old Scarlet Bradatsch (Young Citizen of the Year) and one of the area's longest-serving volunteers, Shirley Purser (Senior Citizen of the Year) who turned 91 on Australia Day.

The Lisa Harnum Foundation was awarded Community Group of The Year and Chris Jones received the Environmental Citizen of the Year Award during a special award ceremony at the Pioneer Theatre on Wednesday, January 19.

Mercedes Durante from North Kellyville who volunteers with The Hills Women's Shed and Positive Vibes Foundation, and is also a Board Member, actively supports programs promoting

good mental health. She is also a St John Ambulance volunteer and President of Norwest Sunrise Rotary Club.

She told the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News: "I was so shocked when I got the phone call telling me about my nomination. I was so happy to be a finalist. That was enough for me. I am so honoured to be named Hill Shire citizen of the year. I am happy that the good work of the groups I am involved with has been recognised. I couldn't choose a better country to live and raise my family, I am a very proud Australian. "

Young Citizen of the Year Scarlet Bradatsch was in Year 6 at Kellyville Public School when she decided to do some research during the lockdown last year and put a presentation together about women's rights and gender inequality.



A keen footballer herself (she plays for Kellyville Kolts Soccer Club) she sent the presentation to the Football Federation of Australia where it was well received.

She also wanted to help women and children impacted by domestic and family violence and in the second lockdown Scarlet, with the help of four friends, filled 150 backpacks with school supplies to donate to The Sanctuary – The Hills Women's Shelter.

Sagarika Venkat received a Highly Commended award in the Young Citizen category.

Senior Citizen Shirley Purser from Castle Hill has dedicated her life to The Hills community with a long list of volunteer achievements including charter member of the Zonta Club of Sydney Hills, a founding secretary and current co-chair of Western Sydney International Women's Day Committee and executive member of Red Cross Castle Hill Branch

CHILD ABDUCTION

Four people have been arrested and charged following the abduction of a 4-year-old girl in Stanhope Gardens on Friday, January 21st.

Officers from Riverstone Police Area Command were called to outside a property on Midlands Terrace at about 12.30pm (Friday 21 January 2022), after reports of an abduction.

Police were told a four-year-old girl was outside the location with her dad when a Honda CRV stopped nearby, and an unknown man and woman got out.

The woman grabbed the girl and put her in the car while the man kept the girl's father distracted. The vehicle then fled the scene.

A police operation commenced and with assistance from Traffic and Highway Patrol Command and PolAir, the vehicle was located travelling north on the M1 motorway.

The vehicle was stopped by police at Kinta Drive, Beresfield, about 2.20pm and two women – one of whom is known to the girl – and two men were arrested.

The girl was found in the vehicle distressed but uninjured and was reunited with her father.

An investigation into the circumstances surrounding the incident was commenced by officers attached to State Crime Command's Robbery and Serious Crime Squad.

They have charged two women, aged 75 and 53, and two men, aged 52 and 60, with take/detain child with intent to remove from parental control.

KENTHURST CRASH

A 5-year-old child died and the driver was seriously injured in a head-on crash in Kenthurst on Thursday, January 13th.

Emergency services were called to Annangrove Road, near Aston Road, Kenthurst, shortly after 4pm following reports a red Mazda 2 and grey Toyota Hilux had collided.

The driver of the Mazda – a 33-year-old woman – and her passenger – a five-year-old boy – suffered serious injuries.

The boy was transported to the Children's Hospital at Westmead, in a critical condition but later died. The woman was taken to Westmead Hospital in a serious condition.

The driver of the Hilux – an 18-year-old man – was uninjured and taken to hospital for mandatory testing.

Officers from the Crash Investigation Unit attended, and the scene was forensically examined.

As inquiries into the circumstances surrounding the crash continue, investigators urge any witnesses or anyone with dashcam vision in the area at the time to come forward.

HOUSEBOAT TRAGEDY

The body of a 32-year-old father-of-two who disappeared while swimming in the Hawkesbury River was found on Wednesday January 19th afternoon, almost 48 hours after he disappeared at Laughtondale, near Wisemans Ferry.

The man and his family and friends were on a house boat when the men and two children decided to use the tender, on approaching the rear of the house boat the 32-year-old dived from the tender to swim a short distance to the house boat.

He dived and surfaced near the ladder, dived again and did not surface.

A search was commenced by the other men prior to emergency services being contacted.

A search by emergency services was not able to locate the male before darkness.

The search involved NSW Water Police and Divers, NSW Maritime, SES, NSW Marine Rescue and PolAir.

His body was found just before 3pm on Wednesday, January 19th. A report is being prepared for the coroner.

Police urge any person, no matter how good a swimmer you are, to wear a life jacket when on or in the water.

FATAL FIRE

The body of a woman was located following a house fire at Northmead on Friday, January 14th. Emergency services were called to a duplex apartment at Hammers Road, Northmead following reports of a house fire.

Fire & Rescue NSW attended.

With a person unaccounted for, crews immediately gained access to the property when they arrived at Hammers Road at 9.30 am.

More than 30 firefighters, in specialised breathing apparatus, battled the flames while setting up protection hoses to ensure a neighbouring property remained safe.

Crews extinguished the fire that had spread throughout the home. One person was located deceased inside the premises.

Officers attached to Parramatta Police Area Command established a crime scene and have commenced an investigation into the circumstances surrounding the fire. FRNSW Investigation Research Unit will be onsite to help determine the cause of the fire.

A report will now be prepared for the information of the Coroner.

Superintendent Scott Dodson from Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW) said it is a timely reminder that calling Triple Zero (000) for a fire emergency can be the difference between life and death, or a building or other property being saved or destroyed.

"The Triple Zero (000) service is the quickest way to get the right resources from emergency services to help you. It should be used to contact Police, Fire or Ambulance services in life-threatening or time-critical situations."

POOL SHOCK

A man, aged in his 30s, was taken to hospital in a stable condition after suffering an electric shock during swimming pool maintenance at a pool Carlingford on Tuesday, January 25th .

NSW Ambulance paramedics arrived by road and provided initial treatment, before the critical care medical team arrived.

The Mounties Care CareFlight Helicopter was tasked to the scene shortly before midday, landing within 10 minutes at Murray Farm Reserve.

CareFlight's specialist doctor and NSW Ambulance's critical care paramedic conducted a full trauma assessment on the man and provided treatment at the scene.

The medical team provided ongoing monitoring for the man as he was transported by road with NSW Ambulance in a stable condition to Westmead Hospital.

He was a solicitor from 1976-2005 and was a senior partner at Watts McCray before being appointed a Judge of the Family Court.

He is a member, Family Law Council, Attorney General's Department, 2004-2012, former President, Parramatta and District Law Society. Former Independent Children's Lawyer, Australian Legal Aid Office and Legal Aid Commission.

Ensemble, since 2006. He is also the Musical Director, NSW State Youth Concert Band, a role he has held for the past 10 years.





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ACTING UP WITH LYNNE MCGRANGER

Sitting in a Kellyville coffee shop with Lynne McGranger to chat about her newly released book Acting Up is an entertaining jaunt down memory lane with the down to earth actor who loves a good yarn.

The book (subtitled: Me, myself and Irene) is as relaxed as Lynne who has spent nearly three decades playing Irene Roberts on the Logiewinning Home and Away series on Channel 7 which is syndicated to over 80 countries around the world

What began as a three month stint on the popular soapie filmed on Palm Beach has turned into a 29-year-life changing experience for the former primary school teacher who honed her acting craft at the Q Theatre, Penrith before doing an audition for a "guest role" on Home and Away.

"I was told there was an opportunity it would be an on-going role and I thought, yes right," she laughs. "I had learnt not to get emotionally attached to auditions."

Her daughter Clancy was not even 2 years old when she landed the role in January 1993.

She is now the longest-serving female cast member of any Australian TV show.

The book covers the Hills resident's early life (she was born in Paddington), her childhood, teaching and the years leading up to Summer Bay and beyond.

It's an easy-to-read book, full of warm humour and emotion. It's like listening to an old friend.

Lynne says while she loves to chat and tell stories she was unsure about the writing element when she was approached to write a book during COVID.

"I am not a writer, but I can talk under wet concrete," she laughs. After six months with co-writer Summer Land she is more than happy with the result saying it was like putting together a patchwork quilt.

"In the middle of the night I would remember something and write myself a note, memories would prompt other memories."

Neither her husband Paul nor daughter, Clancy got to read anything until the book was published. She also did an audio book which she found exhausting. As Lynne tells it she grew up in a close-knit family and decided to go into teaching because she didn't want to be a nurse or a typist.

"It was the early '70s and those were the choices, it didn't take me too long to realise that I wasn't cut out for teaching."

She says she is very grateful for college (Riverina College of Advanced Education Wagga Wagga) for giving her the love of theatre: "It made me realise I wanted to be an entertainer".

She said being paid to do something she loved was amazing. She left the Q Theatre in 1983 and joined the Murray River Performing Group which is where she met her musician husband Paul McWaters.

The book covers this early life and the parade of personalities she has acted alongside in Home and Away.

She says while she did leave some things out she also changed the names of some people.

Acting Up

"I didn't want to hurt or embarrass people," she savs.

Lynne does talk about the onset bullying she endured but does not name the culprit.

"I wanted to make people aware that there will often be people who can't help themselves."

Her huge fan following in the UK and Ireland has resulted in numerous Panto performances in England during the Christmas season which have been interrupted by COVID restrictions.

Lynne says she has missed being the annual "Panto baddie" which she has been doing for over 20 years.

She says her biggest joy in life has been watching her daughter Clancy blossom into the talented woman she is, running her own business and engaged to be married to local Luke Dickson.

Lynne's an AFL fan and a dedicated Swans fan (she is an ambassador), loves cricket and supports several charities including the Hills Relay For Life.

Lynne turns 69 on January 29th and her advice is: "Live your life not your age. If ageing disgracefully is your thing, go for it, just don't post too many photos on Instagram."

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
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HAWKESBURY'S ONLY LATE NIGHT GP CLINIC TO CLOSE END OF THE MONTH

The Hawkesbury will be left without a late night after-hours GP clinic with the closure of the clinic at Hawkesbury Hospital from next week, January 31.

The closure means Hawkesbury residents have neither a late-night GP clinic or a late-night chemist, with the nearest at Rouse Hill and Penrith. The Hawkesbury District Health Service (HDHS) say they are making the clinic closure move due to low demand and "recruitment challenges".

It means that if you need a doctor after 7pm in the Hawkesbury after Monday January 31, your only option is to visit the hospital's Emergency Department or to travel to Penrith where there are several late night GP services.

"The decision to close the clinic has been made in consultation with Wentworth Healthcare (the provider of the Nepean Blue Mountains Primary Health Network) and the Nepean Blue Mountains Local Health District," say the HDHS in a statement.

The shut-down means there are only a handful of GPs in the Hawkesbury open until 7pm, but it may be hard to get in to any of those unless you are registered with that doctor or surgery.

At the hospital, you could simply turn up and see a doctor. Hawkesbury District Health Service CEO, Strephon Billinghurst, said the clinic was opened 6 years ago to meet a gap in after-hours health care in the region. "In that time, the service has provided more than 30,000 patient consultations," he said.

"GP practices in the region have steadily increased their after-hours services, with 11 now operating in the evening and on weekends,"

he says. "As such, this has led to a decline in demand for the hospital-based service."

We found 3 medical centres in the Hawkesbury open until 7pm – well short of the 10pm the hospital offered – and one open on a single day until 7pm.

Some others are open to 6pm, often on individual days, but it's hardly late-night. Mr Billinghurst said difficulties in recruiting for positions within the after-hours GP clinic had also made it hard to provide a reliable service to the community. "While this decision is regrettable, we are confident that our community has a range of after-hours health care services available to them, including our Emergency Department for urgent and acute care," he said.

SOUTH CREEK ENVIRONMENTAL SPILL UPDATE

Council is continuing to investigate the cause of the rising main failure at South Creek that caused sewage to leak into South Creek and determine the extent of the leak.

Water samples have been taken daily since the leak was detected on Monday, 17 January. The first of these results is expected to be received shortly. We will provide further advice when it is available.

As part of our investigations, Council is working to develop a timeline of when the leak occurred. The damaged rising main has been isolated and there is no further risk of a spill to the environment. Work will begin shortly to repair the main.

It is recommended that there is no swimming and fishing between South Creek at the Windsor Boat Ramp and Windsor Beach in Macquarie Park as a precaution until Council can determine if there is any contamination. Signage has been erected at Macquarie Park and Governor Phillip Park to advise river users.

Council will continue to provide regular updates to the public. Council is also sending a letter update to residents living near the affected section of South Creek.

NEW WASTE SERVICES SURVEY FOR OUR COMMUNITY

Hawkesbury City Council is inviting the community to have its say on the future of waste services in the Hawkesbury in a new survey, the Mayor of Hawkesbury, Councillor Patrick Conolly has announced.

\$8M FOR NEW WILBERFORCE-BASED HAWKESBURY FIRE CONTROL CENTRE FROM NSW GOVERNMENT

NSW Minister for Emergency Services and Resilience, Steph Cooke, has announced \$8m has been earmarked for a new Fire Control Centre for the RFS at Wilberforce.

The money is part of a \$31 million injection of funds for the construction of three new Emergency Operations Centres (EOC) and Fire Control Centres (FCC) at Hawkesbury, Moruya, and Tumut

The Hawkesbury Centre will be based at the Woodlands Reserve off Sackville Road at 295, Sackville Road, Wilberforce - Ironbark Drive, opposite Woodlands Oval.

The site was given the tick by Hawkesbury Council back in November, and today the funding was officially announced.

Minister Cooke said the RFS identified a number of existing FCCs as sub-standard and in need of an urgent upgrade, following recommendations from the NSW Bushfire Inquiry. "The NSW Government is committed to ensuring our emergency services and local communities have the infrastructure and resources needed for future emergencies right across our State," Ms Cooke said today.

"We're investing \$15 million in a new hub at Moruya, and \$8 million each in facilities at Tumut and Hawkesbury to ensure our emergency services have purpose-built infrastructure in place to respond to future major emergencies.

"As we have seen throughout the horrific 2019-20 bush fire season, recent floods and the COVID-19 pandemic, our emergency services personnel do a remarkable job responding to threats to the community's safety and wellbeing," she said.

Hawkesbury was identified as one of the next priority projects by the RFS, after construction began on previously funded facilities at Armidale and Mudgee.

RFS Commissioner Rob Rogers welcomed the news and said the Hawkesbury facility would drive efficiencies in the response to future emergencies.

"When a major disaster strikes, it is critical that all the relevant agencies can come together to coordinate their activities to protect and assist the community," he said.

"Our existing Fire Control Centre at Hawkesbury is long past its use-by date. The development of a new centre answers one of the vital priorities identified in the NSW Bushfire Inquiry."



THE AUSTRALIAN ROMANTIC AND CLASSICAL ORCHESTRA RETURNS TO THE HILLS

Featuring the work of Elgar, Holst, Schumann, Wolf and Herbert, the Sunday afternoon 4pm concert at Hills Grammar School, Kenthurst is the orchestra's first of the year and first of the series which will continue on to Newcastle City Hall, Sydney's City Recital Hall, the Queensland Conservatorium in Brisbane and the Melbourne Recital Centre.

In the late 19th century, the serenade was the vehicle for exquisite, expressive writing by some of the biggest names of the era. Originally for solo instrument and piano, this enlarged arrangement highlights the superb playing of co-artistic director and violin soloist Rachael Beesley against a lush, enchanting torrent of strings. Schumann's title suggests uninhibited imagination, and that is precisely what you will hear!

Rachael Beesley directs an ensemble of outstanding Australian international musicians - all experts in Historically Informed Performance or 'HIP' and playing authentic period instruments.

Founded under the artistic direction of renowned musician and educator, the late Richard Gill AO, and already a dynamic influence on the Australian music scene, the orchestra's twin goals of performance and education are delivered through live concerts in Australia's capital cities and in metropolitan and regional centres, collaborations with quest ensembles, radio broadcasts, innovative education programs, pre-concert presentations and specialist online resources. Bringing together leading Australian and international exponents, the Australian Romantic & Classical Orchestra brings historical insights and new perspectives to masterpieces from the Classical and Romantic periods. HOW WELL DOES YOUR BRAIN PROCESS WHAT YOU HEAR?

Auditory processing is how the brain processes what you hear. In short, it's how the brain recognises and interprets speech and sound. When there is an error in auditory processing, it is known as an auditory processing disorder (APD).

This processing disorder can affect both children and adults, even if they have normal hearing on a standard hearing test. For children, this may present as misunderstanding when listening, difficulties following instructions, difficulties listening in the presence of background noise such as a classroom, unable to maintain their attention or being easily distracted. With the school year about to begin, be alert to how your child is, or is not, interacting, engaging and understanding at home and in the classroom.

For adults, many people complain that they need to constantly asks for repeats during conversations, struggle hearing in background noise, always getting music lyrics wrong or they must use subtitles to understand the television.

In a general population, approximately 6% of people will have an auditory processing disorder. However, the prevalence of APD is higher in marginalised and vulnerable populations. APD can also occur alongside

autism, ADHD, dyslexia, and brain injury. Additionally, the incidence of APD is higher if a child has had middle ear pathologies during early childhood.

APD can be frustrating, confusing, and isolating. However, the good news is that research has shown that APD can be tested and treated in children as young as 3.5 years old. The process of identifying if you have any auditory processing concerns must start with an evaluation by an audiologist who specialises in this field. Your audiologist will assess your hearing to understand what sounds you can and cannot detect. An individual, or child can have hearing that appears to be normal on a standard hearing test, but still have an auditory processing disorder. Once a deficit has been diagnosed, we can match the problem that you or your child is having to a treatment. This involves auditory training to improve a specific auditory skill.

A trial that has lived long in the memory of many in Australia is not a criminal trial but one of reliability of Australian ingenuity and endurance. I am referring to the world famous "Redex Reliability Trials" of the 1950s – a rally around the nation in a motley collection of motor vehicles driven by an even more motley collection of drivers and navigators, some of which were to become household names in Australia and even further afield.


One such person was the legendary larrikin,"Gelignite Jack Murray". Jack was definitely a true blue Aussie character with a dry sense of humour. During the 1953 Redex Trial, Jack's Plymouth overturned on a bush track. A passing competitor yelled out - "You alright Jack?" Jack replied "Got a ring spanner? Nine-sixteenths SAE?" Thinking ... followed by the puzzled query: "A ring spanner. What the hell do you want that for?" "I thought I'd do the brakes while the wheels were up like this." Silence ... then everyone started to laugh.

Gelignite Jack once said that he got the nickname during the 1954 Redex Trial as "They christened me 'Gelignite Jack' after the big bang in the tin outhouse at Townsville Showground", he is quoted as saying "Gelignite wouldn't hurt a flea out in the open. It's just the same as a cracker, only louder. Jack's co-driver and navigator at the time was Bill Murray (no relation). Bill Murray was a construction and explosives expert. The two Murrays took boxes of gelignite on the trial with the intention of clearing any fallen

trees or other obstacles blocking the narrow outback roads. It was never used or required for this intended purpose. The gelignite became Jack's toy.

The first Redex Trial in 1953 was organised by Dunlop executive Harry James, and there were 187 cars entered for that first trial. Some commentators referred to it as a race whilst others referred to it as a Rally which it was.

Each car had to be kept stock standard, except for limited underbody protection and changes to seating, exhaust, carby's, shock absorbers, lighting and instruments. Repairs were allowed to be made on the run. Drivers lost points for lateness at check in points along the route. They would lose one point for every minute late to enter a control point, as well as a further 100 points for disobeying a direction from race adjudicators. If a driver had to swap a part at any point during the race, they would also have 500 points deducted from their overall score. The 1953 route ran Sydney - Bundaberg - Rockhampton - Mackay - Townsville - Mount Isa - Darwin




- Tennant Creek - Alice Springs - Kingoonya -Adelaide - Melbourne - Albury - Sydney. From Townsville to Adelaide, except for the bitumen between Mt. Isa, Darwin and Alice Springs, the route was little more than a collection of faint tracks criss-crossing claypans and saltbush.

There were 50,000 people at Sydney Showground to see the start, which saw the first competitor, Ted Hoy in the Airnow, leave at 2pm. and the last, Queenslander, Miss J. Hill, in a Renault 750, at 11.33pm. The leaders averaged about 50 mph (80 km/h) up the Pacific Highway to Brisbane, with mechanical failure taking points from some of the novices.

The eventual winner of the first Redex Trial in 1953 was 37 year old Ken Tubman in a Peugot 203 who had won by 25 seconds from Ken Robinson driving a Humber Snipe - 25 seconds after 10.500 kilometres of murderous country.



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

ANIMAL JUSTICE MP CALLS FOR A BAN ON GREYHOUND RACING

Richmond Racing Club was Australia's deadliest greyhound racing track in 2021, recording 10 deaths and 572 injuries, according to data collated by the Coalition for the Protection of Greyhounds.

Richmond's 2021 injury tally of 572 is more than the combined total of the second and third worst tracks in the state (The Gardens, 295 and Wentworth Park, 228), with its death toll of 10 narrowly topping tracks in South Australia (Murray Bridge) and Queensland (Albion Park), each recording 9 deaths.

Upper House MP for the Animal Justice Party Mark Pearson has called for greyhound racing at the track to be banned until the venue is investigated by the Greyhound Welfare and Integrity Commission.

'Ten deaths and 572 injuries: if these statistics applied to any human sport, this

venue would be torn down and heads would roll." he said.

Mr Pearson is calling on Minister for Hospitality and Racing, Kevin Anderson, to halt all races at Richmond until the cause of its "disproportionately high" number of injuries and deaths is investigated and addressed.

"These dogs deserve justice. And if Mr Anderson doesn't act, he'll begin 2022 with blood on his hands – aiding and abetting criminal behaviour in allowing racing at this death-trap to continue."

Richmond Race Club is located an hour from Sydney's CBD in the Hawkesbury and is

billed as "Western Sydney's premier greyhound racing track"

Last year, Richmond and Wentworth Park shared in \$1.6 million of funding to "undertake work to meet stringent new minimum safety standards to drive down injury rates in the sport".

Over \$23 million was allocated by the New South Wales Government to greyhound racing clubs across the state, in addition to another \$7 million already spent on "safety works" through the Government's Greyhound Raxing Capital Grants Program.

In April 2021, Richmond opened the state's first straight track, which the industry lauded as "a great step forward for NSW, with huge racing and welfare benefits".

"Where is this money going? And how many races at Richmond last year actually took place on that straight track?" Mr Pearson said.

"The numbers just aren't adding up. This track has seen a share in close to two million dollars and dogs are still dying virtually every week."



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






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






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
