


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DANCING WITH THE STARS Busy mum and business woman Leanne Shelton has the Cha Cha on her mind as she washes the

For Leanne, raising money for cancer is a cause close to her heart as her father, Garry Belinfante is currently undergoing treatment.

"Dad has been battling cancer on and off for five years. CASTLE ISLAND RELEASE

The first stage of the \$300 million Castle Island project has just been released by KWG Property.

Fronting Fishburn Crescent, Castle Hill, the development, when completed, will feature seven towers ranging in height from 7 to 8 levels with a total of 295 units.

Stage one consists of 76 units in 8-levels with construction proposed to start towards the end of the year with completion expected in 2024. It includes a roof garden and gym. Stage 2 will start in 2024.

Sales for the first stage opened at the weekend (February 19th). Eddie Mansour, Managing Director and Partner Ray White Projects said: "We have had just over 40% of the apartments that were released sell over the past weekend. We have had a high level of owner occupiers that are prominently downsizers and first home buyers."

Castle Island is one of several major developments planned around the Showground

Metro Station and the revitalisation of the Castle Hill Showground precinct which will provide for shops, medical centre, childcare centres, leisure and community spaces as well as walks and cycle tracks. The precinct is considered a state-significant development and the \$1 billion town centre precinct project was awarded last year to OCULUS- and Cox Architecture.

The development will include nine buildings, ranging in height from three to 21 storeys and accommodate 13,000 square metres of commercial floor space. It will also include 4,900 square metres of new public open space, 500 square metres of community facilities and at least five per cent affordable housing for a minimum of 10 years.

Castle Hill Showground has been a muchloved community and sporting destination for 130 years. The Hills Shire Council's Masterplan for the area highlighted six areas including The Village, a Promenade, the arena, the Terraces and Paddocks.

The implementation of the Castle Hill Showground Master Plan is proposed to be carried out in stages over a 30 year period. The site will become a primary civic space for a new precinct of 20,000 residents.

Hill Shire Council also released a concept plan last year for a green link between Middleton Avenue through to Carrington Road, and onto Showground Road, Castle Hill for walkers and cyclists. Green Space

The plan will create a "green spine" with new pathways, seating and connections for pedestrians and cyclists near the Showground Metro station. The project will also see valuable ecological areas protected and the Cattai Creekline rehabilitated.

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

CARJACKING CHARGES

Robbery and Serious Crime Squad detectives have charged a second man as part of ongoing investigations into a spate of alleged car jackings and armed robberies committed at gunpoint in January this year.

Investigators from the State Crime Command's Robbery and Serious Crime Squad – assisted by officers from The Hills Police Area Command – established Strike Force Bellinger to investigate a number of motor vehicle thefts and assaults including 3 incidents on January 8th.

- 3.15am: West Pennant Hills: Police say that on Saturday January 8th two males armed with handguns approached a man and woman aged 58 and 59 inside a black BMW 640i as they drove into the driveway of a West Pennant Hills home at about 3.15am. It's alleged the males demanded the keys to the vehicle before smashing the passenger's side window and stealing a handbag, then fleeing in a black Lexus sedan.
- 3.35am: Northmead: Police allege that about 20 minutes later a 37-year-old man was approached by two males and threatened with a firearm, then assaulted, as he exited a service station on Windsor Road at Northmead. It's alleged one of the males then fled in a white Hyundai, while the second male left in the man's black Range Rover Evoque.

• 3.50am: Blacktown: On the same day, a 36-yearold man stopped his white Hyundai on the side of Prospect Highway, Blacktown at about 3.50am when two vehicles approached his car. Police were told two males, armed with a machete and a handgun, forced the man into one of their vehicles, as a third male stole the Hyundai. It's alleged the duo then made a range of demands for cash and other property, before releasing him.

The stolen Lexus and Range Rover were found abandoned later that day and have undergone forensic examination.

A 26-year-old man was charged on Monday, February 21st with three counts of robbery while armed with dangerous weapon and other charges including take/detain person in company with intent to obtain advantage. A 24-year-old man from Lithgow was charged on January 11th.

STABBING IN HILLS

Police are appealing for public assistance following a stabbing at Winston Hills over the weekend. Emergency services were called to a hall on Edison Parade, Winston Hills, following reports of a brawl at around 11.10pm on Saturday, February 19th.

Officers attached to Parramatta Police Area Command attended and found an 18-year-old man with a stab wound to his thigh.

Police were told a group of people arrived at a party uninvited and were directed to leave. They left the scene; however, returned a short time later and a physical altercation occurred which left the 18-year-old man injured.

He was treated by NSW Ambulance paramedics at the scene before being taken

to Westmead Hospital in a stable condition, where he underwent surgery. His injuries are not considered to be life-threatening.

During a search of the crime scene, officers located and seized a number of exhibits, including a knife police believe to be linked to the incident. All items will be forensically examined.

Police would like to speak to a man who they believe may be able to assist with the investigation. He is described as being of Pacific Islander/Maori appearance, with a large build. He was wearing a black hoodie, black gloves and black ski mask.

Anyone with information, or who may have witnessed the incident, is urged to contact Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

DRINK DRIVING CHARGE

A 24-year-old female driver has been charged with high-range PCA after allegedly failing to stop following a crash with a marked police vehicle in Marsden Park on Friday (February 18th).

Officers attached to Riverstone Police Area Command were travelling along Garfield Road West, Marsden Park, when at the intersection of Richmond Road, a Hyundai sedan allegedly failed to stop at a red light and the two vehicles collided at around 11.50pm.

The Hyundai sedan continued to drive from the scene; however, was stopped by police a short time later on Excelsior Avenue.

The driver of the sedan was subjected to a roadside breath test and allegedly returned a positive result. She was arrested and taken to Riverstone Police Station where she underwent a breath analysis, which returned a reading of 0.189.

The Lethbridge Park woman was charged with five offences: Negligent driving (no death or grievous bodily harm), Interlock licence holder -not have approved device installed, Not give particulars to other driver, Proceed through red traffic light (not toll booth), and Drive with high range PCA – 2nd offence.

The occupants of the police vehicle were uninjured during the incident and minor damage was caused to the vehicle.

ATTEMPTED RAM RAID

Police have renewed their calls for information following an attempted ram raid in Glenorie last month.

Officers attached to The Hills Police Area Command were called to a shopping centre on Old Northern Road, Glenorie, at about 11.30pm on Sunday, January 30th following reports of an attempted robbery of an ATM outside the shopping complex.

Police have been told a white Toyota Hilux drove to the location before the three occupants attempted to dislodge the machine.

Following a number of unsuccessful attempts, the three unknown people drove from the scene

About 12.30am on Monday, January 31st, emergency services were called to a vehicle fire on McClymont Road, Kenthurst.

Fire and Rescue NSW officers extinguished the blaze a short time later; however, the vehicle – a Toyota Hilux – was destroyed.

Initial inquiries have led police to believe the vehicle was stolen.

As police continue their investigations into the incidents – which are believed to be linked – they are appealing for anyone with information or who has dashcam footage to come forward and contact Crime Stoppers.

SES KEPT BUSY

A month of rain fell in just a few hours on Tuesday with Box Hill, Kenthurst and Glenorie the hardest hit areas locally.

According to the Bureau of Meteorology Box Hill was inundated with 103mm of rain in two days.

More than 100 requests for assistance were recorded by The Hills SES on Wednesday with more jobs being reported on Thursday.

Runoff and localised flooding affecting new developments in Box Hill resulting in a high number of calls for sandbagging

Flooding closed several roads across The Hills and Hawkesbury including Blue Gum Rd, Annangrove which had 2m over the road, McClymonts Rd, Marayla with water 3m over road and Cattai Ridge Rd (pictured) which was severely damaged. Flooding also closed Terry Rd at Box Hill, Old Hawkesbury Rd and Wolseley Rd at McGraths Hill and Brennan Dam Rd/ Commercial Rd at Vineyard.

The Hills SES had 42 unit members in the field dealing with storm and flood damage, helped by teams from Campbelltown and Kogarah SES units.

NSW Rural Fire Service volunteers had teams working to clean up damage in both Glenorie and Box Hill. An additional six SES volunteers were working in incident management and logistics.

Joe Vurchio, Deputy Commander The Hills SES said: "While we cannot control what nature occasionally throws at us, there are some

simple things we can do to reduce or even prevent the impact on life and property.

"If you are advised that a storm is on its way, you should park your vehicles under cover and away from trees. To prevent water damage, gutters, downpipes and drains should be checked and cleaned periodically. Blocked gutters and drains are a major cause of damage to internal ceilings, walls, furniture and floor coverings and can be easily prevented.

"If you are driving when flooding occurs, please be safe and never drive through flood waters. Be aware of driving hazards such as mud, debris, damaged roads and fallen branches or trees. If driving conditions become dangerous, safely pull over away from trees, storm drains, low-lying areas and floodwater."

OVEN FIRE

Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW) officers were faced with a tricky fire in an industrial oven at South Windsor last week. About 10 workers evacuated a building in Walker Street when a gas-fuelled industrial oven caught fire about 8.45am on Thursday, February 17th.

Firefighters, from Windsor and Richmond, cut the gas and electricity supply and, wearing breathing apparatus, used numerous carbon dioxide (CO2) portable extinguishers to suppress the flames.

The oven, used to heat plastic tank moulds, kept re-igniting due to its contents - highly flammable plastics. Firefighters had to re-enter

the factory and hit the seat of the fire with additional carbon dioxide from a FRNSW bulk CO2 truck at the scene.

The company's maintenance crew removed the front of the oven, to enable firefighters to rake out the remains of the burning plastic and extinguish it outside.

Fire crews used thermal imaging cameras and gas detectors to monitor the area and prevent re-ignition. The cause of a fire which caused severe damage to a two storey home house in Iwan Place, Beaumont Hills on Tuesday, February 1 has been traced to an airconditioning unit.

FEARS RICHMOND TAFE FACES CLOSURE AS EQUINE COURSES GET THE CHOP BY TONY BOSWORTH EDITOR HAWKESBURY POST

If you love horses and want to work with them safely there is a place in the Hawkesbury that can teach you all you need to know, but Richmond TAFE's equine courses are being axed and there are fears it is just the first step in closing the TAFE down or even privatising it.

"If they close the TAFE here, the local students of the Hawkesbury are going to have to travel to Scone, that will be the next closest place they can do these courses," said Phil Chadwick who is the NSW Teacher's Federation Deputy Secretary for TAFE, and who says there is a pattern emerging.

Mr Chadwick joined Macquarie MP Susan Templeman, along with Tim Crakanthorp, Shadow Minister for Skills and TAFE in the NSW Parliament, and a large group of concerned students, teachers and industry members, at the entrance to Richmond TAFE to voice their concerns.

Some 12 members of staff are set to lose their jobs with the axing of the equine courses, but there is rumour – no-one will comment publicly – that Racing NSW will step into the breach and offer the same courses.

"What's happening here kind of mirrors what happened this time 12 months ago in Scone where TAFE NSW said it was not going to close, that they had no plans to sell," Mr Chadwick told the Post this morning.

"The Connected Learning Centre offside of the campus opens and lo and behold, just 6 months later the TAFE college in Scone has been sold for less than replacement cost to Racing NSW," said Mr Chadwick.

"If they were to close the college in one fell swoop that would be too noticeable so what they do is cut a course here and cut a course there. What they will do here is whittle away one course at a time and then we may see Richmond TAFE up on realestate.com.au in the same way we found Scone TAFE last year," says Mr Chadwick.

Labor's Mr Crakanthorp said, "it's an appalling situation. We have seen this happening all over the State. First of all they cut courses and cut so many teachers. 5500 staff and enrolments 150,000 less since the [state Coalition] government came in. We have seen apprenticeships halved and TAFEs sold off.

"That's why it's important here at Richmond to take a stand. Here the Minister is using 'enrolments have decreased' but in fact he's using a figure when this TAFE had to train everyone in the industry across the State. He's being very sneaky by saying the course enrolments are decreasing. Here today we have an example of how important equine is to this area. I'm from the Hunter and we were devastated to see Scone TAFE sold off [to Racing NSW] and I'm getting that feeling here as well. You mention Racing NSW – it's privatisation by stealth which really goes to the heart of the matter. Since the Coalition has got in they have run down TAFE, downgraded it, cut the staff, cut the courses, the enrolments have gone down. They just don't see themselves in the role of public educators and vocational education. TAFE has had a wonderful brand for well over 100 years, and this government came in and trashed it."

Montana Jonker went to Richmond TAFE when she was 16 to do a Certificate 3 in Performance Horses. It meant she could confidently go into track riding at Hawkesbury Race Club, and she hasn't looked back since.

"I learnt everything about horses at Richmond TAFE," said Montana, now aged 20. It gave me so many opportunities in the industry and if they stop the courses it's going to take those opportunities away from so many kids."

Montana's mum also pointed out her daughter was a very shy 16-year-old and during the course she blossomed and is now clearly a confident young woman with a set of industry standard skills.

MP Susan Templeman said, "closing these courses will have a profound impact on the teachers and the students.

"This industry is one of the pillars in the Hawkesbury. This is the place where people can come and learn how to stay safe in an industry which is so potentially dangerous because we are dealing with extraordinary animals who have extraordinary power, and people need to know how to be safe around them and how to treat them with respect.

"It worries me deeply because it's not just about a group of horses going, but it's about a TAFE being undermined. The equine programs here have been so highly prized by this community. This TAFE is too important for this community to lose."

Brooke Somers who is an experienced trainer at Hawkesbury Race Club and responsible for 25 horses – she got her accreditation at Richmond TAFE – said the move to close the courses was worrying and she didn't believe replacement courses – if they happened – from Racing NSW would fill the gap.

"If these courses are not here it means we are going to have a harder time to find people who can fill the roles. We have them do the Safe Horse NSW certificate. If this closes down here, it means I have to do my job as well as train someone to do their job, so we lose out.

"At Richmond TAFE they learn management of the horses, how to manage wounds, and injuries to look out for, caring for the horses, checking whether it needs treatment. They have a riding program here at Richmond TAFE so you can learn safely how to manage the horses, and how to manage different horse temperaments.

"If it doesn't exist we are going to have to do it on the job, but that will lead to more workplace accidents, that is a strong possibility."

"Racing NSW is offering on the job training, so I have to take time out to train them. What they teach here at TAFE is learning, the horses here are older horses, so they can learn safely."

Ms Templeman urged people to voice their concerns to the NSW government.

"I plead with people have your say about this and let the NSW government know it's not good enough. People here are standing up. We will not give up on this, we will keep going."

MULTI-MILLION DOLLAR KURRAJONG HEIGHTS, BILPIN, MACDONALD VALLEY CASH SPLASH FROM FEDS

The big winner is the Kurrajong Heights Bowling Club which gets a whopping \$811,695 which will allow a fire staging area to be set-up and for the buildings to be better prepared for future fire situations.

Almost half a million dollars - \$453,212 - is being handed over to Rufftrack Limited to upskill and engage vulnerable young people through nine land rehabilitation projects in the Macdonald Valley, but that's not all, there's also \$455,000 earmarked for a community hall upgrade to St Albans School of Arts to create a 'Refuge & Social Hub' in the Macdonald Valley and that will include a new kitchen and improved access points.

Hawkesbury Independent School gets \$185,656 for risk reduction and resilience projects which means the installation of two large capacity water tanks, a rooftop sprinkler system to reduce the risk of ember attack and a solar and battery system which would run access to the water supply even in times of emergency.

Successful funding for projects under the Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grants and the Connected Communities grants had been due to be announced by the Federal government in December last year but was delayed by two months, keeping community groups waiting.

Hawkesbury Council has been handed over \$4m under the Connected Communities Through Disaster Recovery and Beyond fund to work with Telstra to install three new base stations at Berambing, Central MacDonald and Upper Colo. In addition to the new base stations, a 4G Small Cell at St Albans and two new 4GX-lite Mobile Satellite Small Cells at Upper Macdonald and Higher Macdonald will also be installed.

Hawkesbury Council will receive over \$330,000 to design and construct a new car park next to the Bilpin Community Centre. The carpark will double as a key staging area.

The Council will also receive \$78,000 for the installation of new shade shelters at Bilpin Oval, Colo Heights Reserve and St Albans Park playgrounds, and just over \$158,000 for the production and presentation of a new exhibition that will explore residents' experiences of the bushfires - Burnt into Memory.

The Macdonald Valley Association will receive over \$280,000 to help provide residents with access to and training in critical 2-way radio communications and emergency kit resources, under the 'Connected and Prepared Hawkesbury' banner.

Hawkesbury Council will also receive just over \$196,000 for new signage for the St Albans area that identifies roads, bridges, creeks and other key features.

Hawkesbury Mayor, Patrick Conolly, said today, "I'm very pleased to see such a significant investment from the federal government following our advocacy. It's going to make a huge difference in future emergency situations."

- Burnt Into Memory, which goes to Hawkesbury Council and is already underway - \$158,740

Macquarie Federal MP Susan Templeman congratulated those Hawkesbury community groups that have been announced to receive the long-awaited bushfire recovery funding.

"Community groups put in some very hard work applying for this funding, and I not only congratulate them for their success in securing millions of dollars, but thank them for their patience," Ms Templeman said.

"There are some communities who'll be very happy to see projects announced in the latest bushfire recovery funding, from the tough-asboots Kurrajong Heights and Bilpin community who might end up with a bowling club that actually meets their needs — to the Macdonald Valley," Ms Templeman said.

"St Albans and the surrounding community are still finding their feet not just from fire but from two floods, and they'll see things like an upgrade to their community hall. There's also a Connected Communities Program and other smaller projects that have been announced in the Hawkesbury. These grants are the result of the hard-fought battle I took to the federal government in January 2020, speaking about it in every Parliamentary sitting and sharing stories of survival and recovery.

"Now - more than two years after the fires devastated our area and just weeks out from an election - we are seeing the result.

"I am sorry for those who missed out, and I will continue to fight for mitigation and preparation funding from the government's \$4 billion Emergency Response Fund. Not a cent has been spent and it has now earned the government \$800 million in interest. Now we need to see this promised money delivered as soon as possible, so work can begin. No doubt the Prime Minister, who has not visited bushfire-affected communities in our area, will find time to pop in within the next few weeks to take a few photos on the back of this announcement," said Ms Templeman.

quite some time now," she said.


"The involvement and relationships within the community is something we feel is incredibly important especially after two years of living in isolation because of COVID.

KIDS TO **FARM PLEA**

A call has gone out to extend the Kids to Farms Program run by the Federal Government to the end of the year, enabling more local farmers and schools to get involved.

Federal Member for Macquarie, Susan Templeman said that under the fund, which began last year, schools receive up to \$1500 towards the costs of an excursion to a local farm, with a program that fits with the curriculum but it ends in the middle of the year.

"It's a great idea to encourage schools to do excursions to farms, and our local farmers are keen to take part," she said. "Unfortunately, since the Kids to Farms program began, the pandemic has consistently interrupted children's schooling, and the last thing teachers have had the energy for is planning excursions that probably wouldn't have taken place.

These excursions are not only beneficial to a child's education, but to their well-being. Extending this deadline would mean more schools can take the classroom out on the road after such a disruptive couple of years."

Aaron Brocken of Harvest Farms in Bilpin is one local destination that is taking bookings so local school children can find out about where their food comes from.

"We grow about 30 different varieties of fruit and vegetables here and sell through local outlets ... for me, this is a chance to help children learn



about sustainability and how food is produced,

and even just what it looks like when it grows." Ms Templeman has written to the Minister for Agriculture and Northern Australia, David Littleproud, asking him to extend the deadline to the end of the year. The Kids to Farm program is a joint initiative of NSW Farmers and the Federal Government.

"I really urge the government to extend the deadline for this program for the benefit of our school children and our family-owned farms,"

Harvest Trails and Markets, a not-for-profit organisation aimed at bringing consumers and farmers closer together, runs the Farmers' Markets at Castle Hill Showground. It is getting behind the project and has an interactive map for people to find its farm members open to schools and the general public.

The uppity housekeeper, Jane, has her doubts Enid will ever measure up to the esteemed Irma and behaves accordingly.



ZERO CARBON PRECINCT AT NORWEST

The first stage of a zero carbon retail and residential precinct to be built by Norwest developer Mulpha is set to go on sale soon.

Each apartment in Norwest Quarter, off Solent Circuit, will consume two thirds less energy than a typical code compliant apartment and will underpin residents' aspirations for zero carbon living at up to 25 percent less cost.

The first stage of the \$1billion master planned community will include two residential apartment buildings spanning a 9,450 sqm master planned landscaped site and will provide196 apartment homes, as well as convenient retail and commercial space including a full-floor commercial gym, fresh food grocer, medical services, and restaurants.

The 115-apartment Banksia building designed by Bates Smart will be launched off-the-plan on March 5th, and the 81-apartment Lacebark building by Smart Design Studio will be launched a month later. Apartments will have high efficiency lighting and appliances, induction cooktops, and electric hot water. Smart passive design initiatives include high performance glazing and insulation, use of light-coloured materials, building orientation and facades that invite winter sun to penetrate whilst blocking summer sun.



Mulpha Head of Developments, Tim Spencer, said as well as making a real contribution towards mitigating the effects of climate change and decreasing the urban heat environment at Norwest, this precinct targeting zero carbon will lower energy bills while increasing well being through healthier buildings, better air quality and greater access to nature.

"Our goal in developing Norwest Quarter has been to truly deliver a zero carbon precinct, renewably powered with a low environmental impact," he said. "I believe people will choose to live here for the opportunity to be part of a community, aiming for a better future, with 100 percent electric, no gas, reduced waste, and efficient use of resources including perhaps the most precious of all, clean water."

There will be rainwater harvesting and water recycling, on-site organic waste separation and treatment, worm farms and composting, a share

and repair centre and community upcycling market days.

Other sustainable community initiatives will include car sharing, communal electric BBQs, lobby book libraries, communal gardens, and productive beehives for enhanced pollination.

When complete, the Norwest Quarter masterplan will transform over 3.8 hectares of greenfield land into a vibrant village centre for over 2,000 residents, with 70 percent of the site used for landscaping. There will be nine residential towers containing 864 apartments, with 6,000m 2 of space provided for cafes, restaurants, neighbourhood shops and childcare facilities.



In 1953, Bruce Jones came as a newborn to Bella Vista Farm, the eldest of 3 siblings - Ken, Eleanor and Gwen. The previous year, Bruce's grandmother Ellen Jones, signed the lease for a 1000-acre farm at Bella Vista. They came with 100 dairy cattle and farmed for nearly three decades. Albert and Ellen, Bruce's grandparents, had eight children. Along with Bruce's parents William and Joan, his uncle Charlie and aunts Kathleen and Daisy lived and worked on the farm. The rest of the family married and moved elsewhere. Flora, a niece, did the books for Bella Vista Farm.

William and Joan lived upstairs on the western side of the big house, but they had to be careful where they walked as the floors were full of white ants. Once Bruce was born, they were glad to set up home in the shop, believed to be the original Seven Hills Post Office. They lifted the ceiling to accommodate the fireplace they built. Ellen and Charlie operated the farm as Ellen Jones & Son, employing Bruce's parents. Bruce's mother would sit Bruce in his pram in the cow shed while she hand-fed the cattle, 19 at a time. When older, Bruce helped to feed the cows, but never did the milking. The family was self-sufficient, growing vegetables and raising poultry for consumption. Any excess went to market. There were big family lunches on Sundays in the kitchen next to the house. Bruce recalls the difficulty he had catching a 28lb turkey for Christmas dinner! Daisy plucked and cleaned the bird and Ellen dressed and cooked it for over three hours in the fuel stove. The family was well fed that day. Every 6 months Bruce's job was to clean the

stove. A very messy and time-consuming job! The stove never went cold so Bruce would wait until it cooled enough to scoop all the soot out. Then it had to be polished with a lead-based polish, an absolute no-no today! He also remembers feeding the birds in his

father's large aviary, built adjacent to their living quarters. There were flocks of budgies, parrots, finches, doves, quails and canaries. Bruce attended Kellyville Primary School and then went to Castle Hill High in its foundation year of 1963 until he was 16. As he was always interested in farm machinery and engines, he started work at 18 with an auto/electrical business in Parramatta, doing an apprenticeship at TAFE. This became his life's work and passion. Bruce left Bella Vista Farm in his 20's and moved into a caravan park at Vineyard, finally buying his house in the late 90's in Richmond. On Ellen's death in 1978, the 99-year lease expired and the Jones family were given notice to guit. By 1979 they had sold all their farm machinery and stock at a large clearing sale. Bruce's parents William and Joan retired to Taree and ran a hobby farm until 2007. William died in 2008 and Joan still lives in Taree, aged 98.



NEW FIELDS PLANNED

Plans to create three full-sized sports fields at George Thornton Reserve in West Pennant Hills are now on public exhibition and residents have until Thursday, March 17th to comment on them.

Hills Shire Council's draft landscape master plan proposes to expand the playing opportunities at George Thornton Reserve by realigning the existing Reserve.

Suggested improvements to the site, depending on funding becoming available, include an expansion of the amenities building to provide additional change rooms, as well as an extension to the existing car park to make more spaces.

One of the proposals is to use a synthetic playing surface on one of the three fields but is dependent on public response, as well as funding.

Hills Shire Mayor Peter Gangemi encouraged residents to "have their say".

"Our community highly values our sporting facilities and that's why we want to hear from them about these new plans," Mayor Gangemi said.



"It's always important that Council plans strategically to ensure our community has the necessary infrastructure in place, such as additional sporting fields, to support both our existing and future Hills residents. Thankfully our Council benefits from strong financial management which allows us to provide these great outcomes for our community," Mayor Gangemi added. Residents can have their say by making an online submission via Council's

website, www.thehills.nsw.gov.au, by 4pm on March 17th 2022. Simply click on the "What's Happening" tab and then click on "Current Plans on Exhibition".

Once the public consultation is complete, all feedback will be considered and a final version of the plan will be presented to Council for adoption. Following this, Council anticipates a staged implementation of the adopted plan.

SPORTING WINS

Four multi-purpose rectangular turf sports fields that can also be reconfigured into two ovals, along with an amenities building with accessible toilets, change rooms, kiosk, referee room and storage are set to be built in North Kellyville.



Works on the brand new Samantha Riley Drive Reserve could commence as soon as April after The Hills Shire Council accepted a multimillion dollar construction tender.

The approved plans also include a basketball half court, two practice cricket nets, sports field lighting, a maintenance storage building, a local playground with picnic facilities, an onsite car park with 200 spaces, concrete shared pathways, a field irrigation and underground storage tanks to collect rainwater.

Hills Shire Mayor Peter Gangemi said: "Our parks, reserves and playgrounds are more important than ever before and I'm proud that this Council is working hard to deliver more of the facilities that are vital to our residents' health and wellbeing."

Council has also accepted a tender to increase the size of the playing field area at Kenthurst Park to accommodate an additional full-sized sports field.

The end result will see three senior-sized playing fields in the area along with the retention of the existing turf cricket pitch at Kenthurst Park.

GLENORIE COURTS UPGRADED

Recently completed work at Les Shore Reserve, Glenorie has seen two existing tennis courts upgraded on the site and the repurposing of two other courts into multipurpose areas for basketball and netball.

The project was made possible through \$215,000 funding from the Australian Government through the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program. This program supports local councils to deliver priority local road and community infrastructure projects across Australia, supporting jobs and the resilience of local economies to help communities bounce back from the COVID-19 pandemic.

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FREE QUOTES



Almost a year ago I wrote a piece in this publication about Albert (Bert) Collins who at the time was said to be the oldest surviving soldier in Australia from the Second World War. Bert had just celebrated his 105th birthday at the Bankstown RSL and the celebration was carried on several news programmes on television in Sydney at the time. As well as my article in this publication, Lawrence Machado, a colleague on the "Hills to Hawkesbury Community News", also wrote a piece regarding an interview that he had with Bert just after his 104th birthday in 2020. Whilst Bert's home may have been located at Bankstown he also had family ties with the Hills district where he often stayed with his niece, Lorraine, who had provided care for him over many years.

My wife and I, together with Lorraine and a few friends, also celebrated Bert's 105th birthday at a local club on the day after the Bankstown RSL celebration. Bert was very chatty and enjoyed our little celebration where memories and jokes abounded.

Bert was a fighter throughout his life. At the age of 100, Bert had been diagnosed with a severe case of Melanoma and had been given a sentence, when told he would only survive

for another six months. Instead, Bert, after receiving an injection to remove the melanoma, continued until February 13th of this year at almost 106 years of age. Bert's next birthday was to fall in March. He passed away just weeks short.

Bert was a generous person who, for many years, built dolls houses of all sizes and colours for children right up to his 90s. As he told Lawrence Machado in 2020, "I enjoyed making the dolls houses as it gave so much pleasure to the children and their families, many keeping them for years after their children had grown up". Bert went on to tell Lawrence "I bought all the pieces and did everything in my shed and even got some equipment made to my specifications."

Bert had many talents and also loved Ballroom dancing and, as I had once been a ballroom dancer myself having given it up some 55 years ago, we both reminisced about the dances we once enjoyed and the ballrooms and dancing competitions of the past. Bert remained dancing up to his 90s. He said that it helped keep him fit and healthy.

During the evening that Bert and I spent together he told me a tale that he claimed

happened during his war years. He said that whilst on duty as a sentry at an army base he spotted a Senior officer approaching the gate. Knowing that his army buddies were behind a building playing an illegal game of "two-up" he asked the Senior Officer for the password before he could be allowed to enter the camp.

The officer did not know the password so Bert refused him entry. The officer said that he would come back the next day. One of Bert's mates asked "What is the password?" Bert replied "Hell if I know, I just wanted to stop him before he discovered you lot playing two-up. As far as I know there isn't a password."

Bert was a humble man who never forgot his mates and told Lawrence back in 2020 "I am one of the luckiest men alive. I am grateful to return from the Second World War alive whilst many of my mates never made it back. I have a spirit within me and I hope that spirit never leaves me".

Sadly, on February 13th Bert said farewell to this world and has gone to join his mates who never made it back during the Second World War. RIP Bert. Your face will be missed at the ANZAC DAY marches after many years of marching with your comrades.



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
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
