

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Liberal Sarah McMahon elected Hawkesbury Mayor

Hawkesbury councillors have elected Liberal councillor Sarah McMahon as their new Mayor until January 2024 after incumbent Cllr Patrick Conolly recently resigned the position.

The move comes after incumbent Liberal Mayor Patrick Conolly stood down to spend time with his family, some months after an horrific home invasion – a case of mistaken identity, police have said.

The alleged perpetrators have been arrested and charged by police and are before the courts.

Some members of the public called out "shame on Labor for voting with the Liberals" after Deputy Mayor, Labor's Barry Calvert, voted for Ms McMahon in the second round of voting at Tuesday's Council meeting.

Cllr McMahon - previously known under her married name, Richards - says she will be a full time mayor. She will be in the position until January 2024.

As Sarah Richards she lost against MP Susan Templeman in the Federal election back in March, seeing a wafer-thin margin of 371 votes – Macquarie was the most marginal seat in the country – grow to a whopping 14,000plus margin in favour of Ms Templeman.

There were two rounds of voting in this last week's Mayoral election. In the first, three candidates put their names forward - independent and one-time mayor Mary Lyons-Buckett, Labor's Amanda Kotlash, and Cllr McMahon.

In that first round, Cllr Lyons-Buckett got the votes of Greens councillor Danielle Wheeler and Shooters Farmers and Fishers' Shane Djuric, as well as her own vote. Cllr McMahon got six votes, from Eddie Dogramaci, Les Sheather, Paul Viegel, Jill Reardon, Patrick Conolly and herself. *"I believe that tonight has presented itself as an opportunity for a new chapter. As councillors we all know that we must work as one and do our best for the Hawkesbury that we all live in and all love."*

Cllr Kotlash only got her own vote and that of her Labor colleague Cllr Calvert, so she was knocked out of contention.

In the second round between Cllr Lyons-Bucket and Cllr McMahon, Cllr Lyons-Buckett's number of votes remained at three, while Cllr McMahon got seven votes, including her own.

The others who voted for her were Labor's Barry Calvert, Eddie Dogramaci of the Small Business Party, independent Les Sheather and Liberal councillors Paul Veigel, Jill Reardon and Patrick Conolly

"I would just like to say a few small words," she said as she took the Mayor's chair.

SES Commander Visits

Kevin Jones Unit Commander Hawkesbury SES spoke to residents at Riverside Gardens Retirement Village last week about the recent floods and assured residents that they were nowhere close to being affected by the July floods.

Riverside Gardens Village manager Patricia Campbell said the morning tea provided an opportunity for residents to thank the SES for its great work but also find out more about the work of SES volunteers in the Hawkesbury area.

"Kevin gave a great talk about the role of the SES during any nature of emergencies from people falling down holes, pets stranded in trees and the rescue of flood or fire victims," she said.

"Kevin also pointed out the importance of flood evacuation plans not only as a community but on an individual basis. Many residents said they were sorry he couldn't have stayed longer, but are looking forward to him returning to talk about fire and rescue."

Kevin told the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News it is important that people know where to find out information during floods and know what to do. "A lot of people are concerned about whether they are safe or not and it's good to let people know where to get information," he said. "Our message is be prepared and to heed the warnings, know what your evacuation route will be, where you are going and leave early."

He said the March and July floods peaked at just over 14m but the biggest concern in the July floods was the speed at which the water was rising.

Riverside

"The water was rising 1.6m an hour which really restricted the time we had to door-knock and warn people," he said.

SES volunteers door-knocked thousands of people during the floods.

He said people are advised to listen to the flood warnings on the radio and keep an eye out on weather reports and SES advice to evacuate.

MOTORBIKE CHARGES

The Hills Proactive Police arrested and charged a 34-year-old Guildford man following an investigation into an aggravated break & enter and theft of a Harley Davidson motor cycle on the 13th August at Carlingford.

Police alleged that the owner advertised the motorcycle online, and was telephoned by a prospective buyer. The motorcycle was later stolen from the garage of a home in Carlingford.

Investigations byThe Hills Proactive Team located the motorcycle at Grove Street, Guildford U on Thursday the 18th of August 2022 in a garage of a unit complex. A further two motor cycles were seized and are undergoing examination.





PRAISE FOR RESCUE

Police Minister Paul Toole and Hawkesbury MP Robyn Preston visited Windsor police station earlier this month to thank Probationary Constables Lindsay Morgan and Ryan Blume-Poulton from the Hawkesbury Area Police Command for their courageous acts during the recent flooding crisis.

Lindsay and Ryan waded through neckdeep floodwaters to a submerged vehicle at South Windsor on Tuesday 5th and attempted to smash the window with their batons and a rock, before wedging the vehicle door open and helping the occupant to safety.

Superintendent Andrew Garner commended the officers for their actions in the face of extreme danger: "These officers assessed the situation and took action to ensure the stranded motorist was rescued safely," he said.

"The reality is that police face many dangerous scenarios, and they will do everything they can to protect the community.

"We thank all our police and emergency service colleagues for their continued dedication to helping others, particularly through all the recent challenges we have faced."

Cross Country Challenge

Jersey Day 2022 By BEV JORDAN

What started out as a local campaign to get more people to register for organ donation has grown into a major Australiawide movement with sporting greats, schools, businesses and politicians, all embracing Jersey Day.

The annual Jersey Day event was founded by the Hills-based Gremmo family in 2015 to encourage people to start a conversation with family and friends about organ donation and to raise awareness of The Organ and Tissue Authority and the Donate Life network.

The Jersey Day campaign honours the memory of 13-year-old Nathan Gremmo who lost his life following a road accident in Glenhaven on April 30 in 2015. The Year 8 Oakhill College student passed away in hospital the next day and his organs were donated, saving six other lives.

Months before his death, Nathan had watched a documentary about organ donation and spoke to his family about it which is why his parents Michael and Kylie and sisters Annaliese and Ashley supported his wish to be an organ donor. They describe Nathan as: as "a boy with a unique sense of humour, a love for animals and an insatiable energy for life."

His sister Annaliese said: "I believe we all should live our lives the same way as my brother did with his selfless, caring and respectful nature. Nathan's last Instagram post only hours before his tragic accident was: **You only live once, but if you do it right once is enough**.

"Each Jersey Day we are simply asking everybody to wear a Jersey to school or work, and most importantly have a conversation with their friends and family about Organ and Tissue Donation.

"Our family has endured the cruelest possible circumstances. I can only think that if our circumstances were reversed and Nathan was desperate for an Organ Donation we would

move heaven and Earth to save my brother; However, the reality is that we would be waiting for a generous organ donor family to save Nathan's life."

According to Donatelife there were 349,947 new registrations on the Australian Organ Donor Registry in 2021 _ an increase of 87% on the previous year. In 2020 there were 186,656 new registrations _ an increase of 16%.

Norwest Land Sale

Property, funds and wealth specialist company Landen believes investors are turning their focus to land-only options as the development industry weathers the storms of increased building costs and timeline pressures.

Landen's capital raising for phase 1 of its first land-only investment vehicle, the Fairway Fund, is now fully subscribed, attracting \$6.4 million from high-net-worth individuals and Self-Managed Super Funds (SMSFs), highlighting the demand for investment in the busy Norwest area.

Investments in the retail fund, which targets an 8.75% p.a. distribution rate, net of fees, were for a minimum investment of \$100,000. Landen intends to invest the contribution mortgage fund into its 18-lot Fairway Drive land-only project in Bella Vista, adjacent to Castle Hill Country Club.

Already Stage One of the project, comprising 10 lots – each larger than 700sqm have sold, priced from \$2,300,000 each.

The fund launched to the market in November 2021 and will run until November 2023. Dividends are expected to be paid in December 2022 and December 2023. Landen's Head of Funds Management, Jeff Li, said: "When people invest money, they definitely like high returns, but recognise these come with high risks. Given the current economic situation in Australia and the issues in the housing market, we are seeing an uptick in investors looking to take an asset allocation approach to balance risk and reward."

Landen has home and land packages available in Rouse Hill, Norwest, Marsden Park and Box Hill. They will soon launch packages in Bella Vista, Grantham Farm, Caddens, Leppington and Kenthurst.

Rashed Panabig, Landen's Director said the popular North West, with its limited land supply remains in demand.

"The Fairway Drive development is in one of the highestperforming priority growth areas in NSW. The area is expected to provide new housing, employment, education, infrastructure and lifestyle opportunities for years to come," he said.

MP '100% committed' to lowering the Dam Wall level

A packed meeting hears it needs to happen now

There are any number of people with opinions on how to lower the risk of flooding across our region, but on Saturday Hawkesbury Community Alliance (HCA) got an expert along to explain what urgent flood mitigation options might be possible if the NSW Government changed legislation to allow Warragamba Dam to be used for flood mitigation as well as water supply.

Time is pressing because five days ago the Bureau of Meteorology sent out a La Nina alert - which typically means wet weather on the way - with NSW SES saying "there remains an elevated risk of flooding" over the next few months.

Quite simply, if the forecasts are correct, another flood could be on the way soon.

Today – Sunday – Warragamba Dam is at 99.9% full, the first time it's been less than 100% full, and spilling, for around two months.

On Saturday, the University of NSW's Dr Stuart Khan, who is a Professor in the School of Civil & Environmental Engineering, as well as Director of the Australian Graduate School of Engineering (AGSE), spoke to a meeting, held at the Richmond Race Club, of almost 300 concerned Hawkesbury residents.

Prof Khan is widely considered one of the leading experts in water management and was

able to discuss all the aspects of lowering the Full Supply Level (FSL) of Warragamba Dam.

He previously spoke to the Post about flood mitigation in a story we published in July. All Hawkesbury councillors had been invited to the meeting, with independents Mary Lyons-Buckett, Nathan Zamprogno, Eddie Dogramaci and Les Sheather, plus Greens' Danielle Wheeler, all making an appearance. No Liberal or Labor councillors attended, while Macquarie MP Susan Templeman sent her apologies and her Chief of Staff.

Hawkesbury MP Robyn Preston was there. The forum was arranged by Hawkesbury Community Alliance (HCA), a new amalgamation of several Hawkesbury community interest groups. HCA is urgently calling on the NSW Government to investigate flood mitigation options ahead of the third La Nina in a row, and Indian Ocean Dipole events, predicted to coincide in Spring 2022.



"To be honest I wish I wasn't here," said MC Samantha Magnussen as she opened the meeting on Saturday. "The reason we are here is an absolute tragedy." She described the likely approaching weather patterns as an "impending disaster".

Ms Magnusson, who is a spokesperson for HCA, and whose family and business are among the many severely impacted by the most recent devastating Hawkesbury floods, said, "the NSW government stubbornly remains focussed on raising the dam wall, a project that will take several years".

"Despite the damning findings of the NSW Upper House July 2022 Flood Inquiry, and the government's response published last week, we still have no commitment to lower the dam level ahead of predicted weather events. Nor do we feel the government feels any real sense of the Story continues on page 26

The chance of La Niña forming in the coming months has increased to around 70%.

The Cold Truth of Homelessness By **GISELA HORNER**

Stories about the homeless became the raw truth when Rachel spoke at the Hills Winter Sleepout held at Bella Vista Farm on Saturday 13 August.

"I was homeless. I was living on the street seven years ago this month". Rachel started life in a happy, normal environment with her parents and grandparents, which turned upside down at 12 when her parents split up. After leaving home, her world shrank even more. By 25 she had four small children living in an unsafe situation. Rachel became homeless and the children became wards of the state. Her life became a number, she was moved around, had false reports against her, was looked upon as "a bad person".

At 42, she was introduced to The Big Issue. The magazine, started 26 years ago, is sold by people who have endured difficult times. Rachel spoke in a whisper, had no confidence, but with encouragement, she donned the little red cap and said: "I now have my own little spot which I call my business. It gives me time to see myself and connect with community. Most importantly I've gained respect and confidence to lead a better life". As Rachel started to enjoy herself, she was plaqued by epileptic fits and PTSD due to a brain injury suffered in her earlier life. Rachel had to start again, but with courage she has learnt to adapt it into her life. She goes out, sells The Big Issue but doesn't have to pretend anymore. As she says "we are we".

'CS', a woman suffering extreme violence at home wondered how she was going to survive with her disabled son and twins. She has been given support by Hills Community Aid (HCA) through its Hills Homeless Prevention Initiative (HHPI), part of HCA's financial 'wrap around' programs aligned with supportive organisations. This has given 'CS' financial counselling, emergency relief with food vouchers and has helped to find a home for herself and her three children. Mici Beer, Executive Officer, HCA, said 'CS' wanted to send a huge message of thanks to everyone for such life-changing help

Mici spoke about the distressing statistics in the past year. "Over 30% of people who have been supported by HHPI have identified as living in a violent domestic relationship, 87% are women and 71% are families with children. 44% of applicants are over 46. In the last financial year \$90,000.00 has been raised, not only for homelessness but for flood relief, multi-cultural funding and other causes".

Money from the Hills Homeless Sleepout will also go to StreetMed which offers support and help to hundreds of homeless people with physical and mental health issues.

Chris Cleary who founded StreetMed in 2014 has also set up StreetPets, Paws for the Homeless, providing veterinary support including microchips, surgery, inoculations, fresh food, canned food, and other vital needs for animals. Chris says: "I can't stress it enough. Every single cent donated makes a difference. I will fight to my last breath to make sure that society's most vulnerable are looked after".

Other charities were represented, all telling of the support they are giving to people who have fallen on hard times.

Azita Abdollahian. President of Norwest Rotary Club and member of Shining Light Foundation, has spent the past five years, meeting large groups of people living on the streets, cutting their hair, providing, socks, beanies, blankets, bedding and loving care.

Dennis Van Someren from Kenthurst Rotary Club spoke about the work being done over the past five years to find and provide transitional housing for women over 55 at risk of homelessness. Dennis said: "We were distressed and ashamed to hear of women and children forced to couch-surf or live in cars due to domestic violence".

Dr Michelle Byrne, founded the Hills Winter Sleepout nine years ago. She said: "Thank you to all the charities and those present who've braved the cold for a night to raise awareness of homelessness in our own. The incredible amount of money raised, especially on the back of COVID and increased cost of living pressures, reflects the generous nature of our community and the desire to help our most vulnerable".

Michelle continued "2023 will be our 10th year and promises to be bigger and better than ever, with more sponsors giving life-saving opportunities to people who have suffered difficult circumstances".

The night of the Sleepout was a crisp clear night with a 'super' moon shining down on those taking part who are fortunate to have homes to go to after the sleepout. Not so for the thousands who live on the street suffering extreme conditions. 78 people and teams registered including The Hills to Hawkesbury Community News.

Bella Vista Farm is one of the most magical places in the Hills and one of our favourite locations to visit. The first time I took my twins to the Farm they were only a few months old, two tiny babies dressed in Christmas outfits to promote Christmas in the Hills. Since then, we have continued to regularly visit the Farm and have created many more wonderful memories along the way.

When they were little, Maddie and Alexis' favourite things to do at the farm were to try and walk along the rocks bordering the garden closest to the homestead, as well as following the sheep around just hoping maybe they would be able to pat them. As they have grown older Maddie and Alexis have become more interested in the homestead itself, exploring each room, asking questions about the history of the homestead and the people who once lived there and admiring the view from the veranda. The sheep however have remained a highlight, although both girls have learned that it is unlikely the sheep will want to be patted unless you have a handful of feed.

Set high up on the Hill with spectacular views, it is easy to forget that you are surrounded by housing, a rapidly growing business park, metro stations and major arterial

It is one of our last links to settlement times and is an eye opener to what life was like in those early years. There is no doubt life was incredibly tough.

Bella Vista Farm was home to the first Merino Sheep Farm in Australia and also played a role in the Australian citrus industry. Some notable families have lived there. Elizabeth and John Macarthur ran their Merino flock there and the Pearce family, whose descendants continue to live in the area and play a role in its preservation and ensure the history is captured for future generations.

These days Bella Vista Farm is looked after by the Hills Shire Council and the Friends of Bella Vista Farm who continue to be instrumental in driving the restoration and maintenance of the Farm, protecting the

heritage of the site, documenting the history and creating opportunities for people to visit and enjoy the farm. The first Sunday of every month, the Friends run Open Days giving the public access to the homestead and outer buildings. There are Devonshire Teas, a sausage sizzle, tours of the house and grounds, a weaving demonstration, a Trash and Treasure Stall, craft for the kids and live music provided by Hills Shire Symphony Orchestra. The volunteers are incredibly friendly and eager to share the history of the site with you and all funds raised on the day go straight back into the maintenance and improvement of the site.

Every time we visit the Farm it gets better and better, there is more to see and more to do resulting in us loving the Farm even more.

CWA of NSW Awareness Week 4 - 10 SEPTEMBER 2022

A catalyst for the formation of the Country Women's Association of NSW a century ago was the need for adequate maternal health services in the bush. 100 years on, the Association continues to advocate for improvements to maternity services and support in rural and regional NSW and is the focus of this year's annual Awareness Week campaign from 4 to 10 September.

The issue was on the Association's radar at its annual State Conference in May. A number of branch motions were put to members about the need for improved maternity services and care in rural and remote NSW, and for the establishment of a dedicated hotline to support women in rural areas to navigate available maternity support services.

On the final day of the conference, propelled by the release of findings from a NSW parliamentary inquiry into rural and regional health, a motion of urgency was unanimously endorsed by members, calling for immediate action by state and federal governments to address the current crisis in the provision of primary medical services due to the lack of general practitioners and medical staffing in hospitals in rural NSW.

One of the key recommendations from the parliamentary inquiry was around establishing a

review of rural maternity services in the wake of the closure of dozens of hospital birthing units around the state, and often harrowing testimony from inquiry witnesses who shared their stories of giving birth without adequate support and facilities or having to travel far from home to have their babies.

It seems fitting that in the CWA of NSW's centenary year, we're continuing the advocacy around urgent improvements to maternal and antenatal care. This year, the CWA of NSW is partnering with the NSW Nurses and Midwives Association and the Gidget Foundation, a notfor-profit organisation that provides programs to support the emotional wellbeing of expectant and new parents.

CWA Galston advocates for a variety of issues, both locally and state-wide. We will be holding a Charity Fashion Parade on Tuesday 18th October 10:30am

Reptiles can make PERFECT PETS!

Australia is home to a wide range of native

reptiles and many of these make ideal pets, provided they are cared for appropriately. While it is illegal to procure reptiles from the wild in Australia, or release captive reptiles back into the wild, there is a safe and legal avenue for purchase of captive bred animals.


Native reptiles must be purchased from a licenced pet shop or licenced animal keeper. The list of available species in our state is called the NSW Native Animal Keepers' Species List; in order to keep one of these species as a pet you must hold a biodiversity conservation licence appropriate to your desired species. Individual licences range from \$10 to \$60 per year. In order to advance through the grades of reptile licences, you must first prove that you can care for easierto-look-after reptiles. Some licence classes allow you to own venomous species and require you to fulfill additional obligations. These include holding a first aid certificate, having escape proof enclosures, a lockable room, references detailing your skill handling venomous reptiles and a verified emergency response plan.

It is important when considering adopting a reptile as a pet that you research your desired species and their environmental requirements. Reptiles require their enclosure (vivarium) to provide specific temperatures, humidity and lighting. The most common reason reptiles present to the vet as unwell, is that their environmental requirements are not being met. Reptiles must have appropriate environmental stimulation as comparable to their natural environment. This can include branches, rocks, sand and dirt.

The temperature across the enclosure must vary to allow your pet to choose where it is most comfortable throughout the day. A thermostat must be used to ensure a consistent year-round temperature. Lighting requirements vary by species and breed; ensure you research the correct light source. Diet is equally important and may consist of a single source of nutrition (such as whole rodents) or a varied diet which may consist of daily or even monthly feeding intervals.

Veterinary care is as important for your reptilian pet as it is for their more common, mammalian counterparts. Veterinarians confident in reptile care are unfortunately rare. Ensure you speak to your local vet to find out whether they are comfortable providing healthcare for your new pet, and if not, source a clinic in your area that can assist. It is important to know where you can turn for help before an emergency occurs.

The key take-home message for aspiring reptile owners is to do your research ahead of time to ensure you become a safe, responsible and legal reptile keeper.

Notice of Ongoing 1080 Program

NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) is conducting ongoing aerial and ground baiting programs using meat baits, meat bait products and canid pest ejectors containing 1080 (sodium fluroacetate) poison for the control of wild dogs and foxes.

Aerial Baiting Program: Monday 5th September 2022 -Friday 16th September 2022

1080 poison baits will be delivered aerially from a fixed wing/ rotary aircraft in the following reserves: Dharug National Park (NP), Manobalai Nature Reserve, Parr State Conservation Area (SCA), Wollemi NP, Wollemi SCA and Yengo NP.

Ongoing Ground Baiting Program: Monday 9th May 2022 to Wednesday 9th November 2022

1080 poison baits will be delivered on the ground in the following reserve: Yengo $\ensuremath{\mathsf{NP}}$

The program is designed to minimise predator impacts on wildlife, especially threatened species, and to minimise impact of wild dogs on neighbouring stock.

Signs will be placed at the entry to the baiting location. Domestic pets are not permitted in NSW National Parks managed lands. Pets and working dogs may be affected (1080 is lethal to cats and dogs). Pets and working dogs must be restrained or muzzled in the vicinity and must not enter the baiting location. In the event of accidental poisoning seek immediate veterinary assistance.

MEMORIES WITH IVOR JONES & FRIENDS

I'LL DRINK TO THAT

Every nation is renown for many things. They may be known for a relaxing lifestyle, culture, history and the like. Here in Australia we are known for our sunshine (if it is not raining), the beaches, the relaxing lifestyle and also known for the ruggedness of the country and hardworking on the land.

One feature of the Australian culture that has been depicted in movies and song is the local pub. We all know of the "Walkabout Hotel" which featured in the Crocodile Dundee movies, and of the hotel scenes in the movie "They're A Weird Mob" and what about the Slim Dusty songs where he sings about having a drink with Duncan in the "Town & Country" or the song "The Pub with No Beer".

In recent times many have asked me about what is happening with the "Bull & Bush"? I have also mentioned in columns recently pubs such as the "Bird in The Hand" and the "Stanhope Arms" which both stood at Kellyville plus "The Bird In The Hand" at Pitt Town.

These thoughts have led me to think of the various watering holes in our Hills to Hawkesbury district. Whilst many of the hotels maybe of recent construction, we do have a few that have some interesting history. Some of the historic inns or hotels still standing and serving their communities within our area include the Wisemans Ferry Hotel, Macquarie Arms Hotel at Windsor, The Settlers Arms at St Albans and The Fiddler (formerly known as The Mean Fiddler) at Rouse Hill. Other hostelries that are of interest include the "Ettamogah" at Rouse Hill.

To start with the "Wisemans Ferry Hotel", once the home of Solomon Wiseman after whom the village is called. He was first buried within the grounds of his home then called "Cobham Hall" later he was reburied in the grounds of the local church and after that church was damaged in a fire he was reburied once more in Wisemans Ferry Cemetery.

Macquarie Arms at Windsor. This great old pub can safely claim the title of "Oldest Pub In Australia" (on the mainland).

In 1815 a "spacious and commodious inn" was constructed by Richard Fitzgerald adjoining Thompson Square and was known as the Macquarie Arms. In order to save Government the cost of providing such a structure, Macquarie had given "Mr. Fitzgerald a large allotment in the square on the expressed condition of his building immediately thereon a handsome commodious inn of brick or stone and to be at least two stories high." (Macquarie's Journal of his tour s- 12th Jan. 1811)

The Settlers Arms. Established in 1836, the Settlers Arm Inn is built from convict - hewn sandstone. Surrounded by mountains, it nestles alongside the Macdonald River within the tiny village of St. Albans, the heart of the Macdonald Valley. Of Georgian simplicity, the hotel became a stopover for Cobb and Co. stagecoaches travelling between Sydney and Newcastle in the nineteenth century.

The Fiddler. Previously operated under the names "White Hart Inn", "Royal Oak Inn", "The Windsor Wayhouse" and "The Mean Fiddler Inn". The inn is an important example of the early colonial coaching inn of the 1820-1840's period and is the only surviving inn on the Windsor Road, from this time, that operates today as a licensed establishment. By 1818 Windsor Road was still a rough track and in 1821 Charles Davis obtained a land grant for the area that included the site of the inn. In 1829 he leased part of his land to William Cross who constructed an inn, which he named the "White Hart Inn", acquiring a publican's

license in 1830. The inn was one of the earliest licensed premises in the colony. "White Hart Inn" was a single storey building. By 1846 the inn had been purchased by John Booth who changed the name to the "Royal Oak Inn". In 1852 the inn was sold to George Sheffield and sold again in 1858 to John Seath who changed the name back to the "White Hart Inn" and operated the inn until his death in 1876. The construction of the Blacktown-Richmond railway in 1864 saw a downturn in road traffic and hence hard times for the inn and its days were numbered. By 1916 when the site was sold to Thomas Peterson, it had ceased to operate. The building was in need of considerable repair, both internally and externally. By 1923 Peterson had replaced the original shingle roof with tiles and repaired the brickwork. In 1949 the inn, then a residence, was sold to Stuart Bins. In 1962 the Windsor Road was widened and sealed (up to then it had changed little from when it was first used in 1806) and the following year the Kroehnert family aguired the site. The Kroehnert's planned to operate the inn (then in use as an antique shop) as a restaurant, but it was not until 1970 that the inn began trading again as a colonial style restaurant, under the name "The Windsor Wayhouse". In 1976 it was leased to Graham Bridgewater and Kiaran Waner who renovated the inn and operated it as a licensed restaurant "The Royal Oak Inn". In 1983 it was sold once more and in 1996 began operating as a licensed tavern under the name, "The Mean Fiddler". It now has new owners and is now called "The Fiddler".

impending disaster," she said. "Our community needs flood mitigation now, not in the distant future. Ten years is too late."

Raising the Warragamba Dam wall, which is one option to possibly help lower the risk of major floods, is at least a \$2bn project which will take an estimated 10 years to build and is not without controversy for its potential effects on the wider environment.

The HCA are more concerned about potential floods which could arrive this Spring and Summer, given the Bureau of Meteorology's new La Nina weather pattern alert, five days ago, and the NSW SES's suggestion we all remain on guard for potential flood events in the next few months, as severe weather is likely.

Professor Khan told the community meeting, "Reducing the current water storage

in Warragamba Dam is a realistic alternative to raising the dam wall."


He said a 12 metre drop in water when the dam is 100% full would mean smaller floods downstream – that means the Hawkesbury - and more evacuation time.

"While no solution provides complete protection from flooding – there is no silver bullet," he said, "maintaining a lower water storage in Warragamba can significantly mitigate many floods, reducing peak flood heights and enabling additional evacuation time".

Professor Khan did warn that reduced storage in Warragamba Dam would decrease Sydney's drinking water supply security and would only be viable if drinking water supply was immediately replaced by alternative sources. "Any reduction in reliance on Warragamba Dam must be accompanied by the introduction of new rainfall-independent water sources, such as new seawater desalination or water recycling. In addition to enabling flood mitigation at Warragamba Dam, new rainfallindependent water sources will provide significantly enhanced drought resilience for Sydney."

He pointed out that Sydney's water supply from sources other than rainwater and water catchment – mainly desalination and purified recycled water – was around half what every other Australian capital city provided for its residents.


Having said that, Sydney does have a desalination plant – it was running throughout the floods, partly because of poor water quality due to flooding along the river system – and if its output were doubled it would make up the equivalent of a 12m drop in water at Warragamba, so securing Sydney's drinking water supply.



Bird In The Hand, Pitt Town

In the most recent Hawkesbury flood, water began spilling over the dam wall at 2am, without any warning to the community from Water NSW. The following morning, a press release was put on the Water NSW web page. As a result, the community was caught off-guard.

An unprecedented increase in water level and flow velocity resulted in a much-reduced evacuation timeline, excessive flood damage, and major damage to the riverbank, all of which may have been prevented, if managed differently, says HCA.

"It is essential to consider the 'big picture' for water management in Sydney, rather than look at individual components in isolation," says Prof Khan.

MP Preston, who put up a Motion in the NSW Parliament on August 11 calling for "a change in legislation that allows for the release of larger volumes of water from Warragamba Dam", said towards the end of the HCA meeting she was, "100% committed to lowering the level of Warragamba Dam". But no decision has yet been made by the State government.

"Today," said Ms Magnusson, "Professor Khan clearly demonstrated that lowering the Warragamba Dam Full Supply Level (FSL) by 12 metres is not only possible but is the best option for urgent flood mitigation for the community, who are filled with fear and uncertainty about what a third La Nina and negative Indian Ocean Dipole weather system in coming weeks might bring.

"Had they used the dam for mitigation in the last flood, we would have recouped all the water from the rain event," she said.

The big issue for Hawkesbury residents is time - with the SES pointing out just last week, that the Bureau of Metrology's threemonth climate outlook shows a high chance of above average rainfall for most of the eastern two-thirds of the Australian mainland between September and November - and that includes the Hawkesbury.

Ms Magnusson said on Saturday, "we are now running out of time".

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
