Ebenezer 11-year-old breaks NSW swim records

Meet Noah Kemp who has been swimming pretty much since his dad Michael first introduced the nipper to the pool at the tender age of just three months.

Noah has just blitzed the state School Sport Australian Swimming Championships held at Chandler Aquatic Centre at Brisbane last week over three days and he's forged new NSW record times.

Not only new records, he literally scooped the pool of gold medals. In Brisbane he entered seven events and won seven gold medals.

He's only 11, is an Ebenezer PS student – the sixth generation of Kemps to go to the school, as it happens – and on Monday, a special celebration was held by a proud school, pupils and parents, with MP Susan Templeman sending through her congratulations too.

Here's Noah's formidable list of achievements from the weekend.

- GOLD 50m Freestyle (NSW Record)
- GOLD 50m Butterfly (NSW record)
- GOLD 100m Butterfly (NSW Record)
- GOLD 50m Backstroke ((NSW record)
- GOLD 100m Backstroke (NSW record)

- Gold in 4x50m Medley Relay
- Gold in 4x50m Freestyle Relay

He was also awarded Male Swimmer of the Championships at the closing ceremony. And he holds the NSW records in Short Course swimming for -

- 50m Freestyle
- 50m Butterfly
- 50m Backstroke
- 100m Backstroke

Noah's name now sits alongside the young lan Thorpe and Grant Hackett's records when they were his age, so you know something special is going on here.

Noah's dad,

Michael, told the Post his son has been competing since he was 9, started swimming seriously from the age of 7, and from 10 onwards he was reeling in the records.

"He has gone very quickly from district to regional to State," says Mr Kemp.

He says he and his wife, Emma, are "very, very proud." "If he makes leaps and bounds in the next couple of years," Michael says, "you never know where he could get. He is pretty focussed on it and he is just making that big a leaps and bounds, who knows what he could do."

For one so young, Noah is clearly levelheaded and confident, not at all arrogant, and with a good degree of humility, but he is certainly focussed.

"Honestly I couldn't really picture it for a while and it's only just coming to me that it's happening," he told us. And how does he think he'll do in this weekend's State Short Course Championships?

"Obviously I'm nervous but I'm going to try and give it my best shot. I think I've got eight individual events." But he's also looking ahead – quite a way ahead... "I have just been figuring what ages I'll be at the next two Olympics. I probably wouldn't make 2028 but there's 2032 in Brisbane," says Noah.

The much anticipated \$55-million centre, funded completely by Hills Shire Council, captured rave reviews for its facilities including a FINA approved 10-lane 50m heated pool and a 25m metre heated pool outside and a 25m heated indoor pool plus a baby pool area.

The centre also has a spa, an outside children's splash pad play area, a large gym, a cafe, group exercise room, meeting room and a spin room with cycles.

The state -of-the-art fitness centre replaces the 1960s swimming pool which was demolished two years ago to make way for the new facility.

The official opening took place on Friday with a smoking ceremony and relay race by members of the resident swimming club with Olympic gold medal swimmer Brooke Hanson watching on.

She told the crowd she wouldn't be surprised to see the pool produce its own Olympic swimmers.

On Saturday Hills Shire Council hosted a free "pool party" to give residents a look at the modern facilities. Hills Mayor Peter Gangemi said it was a proud moment.

"Waves is the largest project ever undertaken by The Hills Shire Council and it also highlights what the local government sector can achieve for the community. Waves is a magnificent facility which will serve our region for decades to come - allowing our residents and visitors to make a lifetime of memories," he said.

"Our new Fitness and Aquatic Centre is not only modern and fun, it also features the latest environmentally-friendly technology, such as solar panels and electric car charging stations."

He congratulated the builders, designers, contractors and council staff for creating a versatile centre for all abilities with ramps and wheelchair accessible pathways, as well as accessible change rooms, gym equipment and toilets. Waves also has a portable pool hoist and two aquatic wet chairs.

"We can't thank our staff, contractors and builders enough for everything that they have done to build this world class facility here, in Baulkham Hills. They worked incredibly hard throughout the project and a global pandemic and multiple natural disasters to complete this venue with very little delay and on budget," he said.

ADCO Constructions NSW State Manager, John Basilisco, said they were honoured to have been selected as the builder of choice.

"It's a huge pleasure for the ADCO team to see the community already loving the new Centre," he said.

Hills Shire Council General Manager Michael Edgar said 41 full-time positions have been created in the ongoing operations of Waves.

"We would like to thank ADCO, their contractors and our staff for all their hard work and support to ensure that this venue was completed," Mr Edgar said.

#### **MARIJUANA HAUL**

Hills Police executed a search at a home in Oakes Road West Pennant Hills at 6.30am on Thursday 8th September and discovered a hydroponic set up inside. Police say there were 68 mature cannabis plants being grown under lights in two rooms of the premises. A 43-year-old man was arrested at the house and has been charged.

### **HOME INVASION**

A man has been charged following a home invasion in Kellyville last year.

Four men allegedly forced their way into a home on Lavender Avenue, Kellyville at about 11.30pm on Thursday 30th December 2021, and a 61-year-old man and a 26-year-old woman before fleeing the scene. The residents suffered minor injuries.

Officers from The Hills Police Area Command attended and secured a crime scene, which was examined by specialist officers. Detectives established Strike Force Bristlenose to investigate the incident, which they believed to be targeted.

Following extensive inquiries – including a public appeal for information – police arrested a 20-year-old man at an address on Marsden Street, Liverpool, Friday 2nd September. He was charged with special aggravated B&E & commit serious indictable offence.

Inquiries under Strike Force Bristlenose are ongoing.

### **DRINK DRIVE**

A 71-year-old man from Baulkham Hills has been charged by officers from The Hills Highway Patrol with high range drink driving following a collision on Monday 5th September.

Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol were patrolling Old Northern Road, Baulkham Hills when they were informed that the driver of a Hyundai i30 had left a nearby hotel at around 2.30pm, collided with a Toyota Hiace and had failed to stop. Police stopped the car a short distance away. The driver said he wasn't aware of

an collision. Officers said they observed minor damage to the rear offside of the Hyundai i30.

The driver was subjected to a roadside breath test returning a positive reading and was conveyed to Castle Hill Police Station. The male informed Police that he consumed 2 or 3 glasses of red wine, the breath analysis returned a reading of 0.153, more than 3 times the legal limit.

His licence was immediately suspended. He is due before Parramatta Local Court in late September 2022 for Drive with High Range PCA.

## SPEEDSTERS STOPPED

Officers from Darling Mills Highway Patrol have suspended the licence of a red P1 licence holder from Castle Hill who was allegedly driving at 66 km/hr over the sign posted speed limit.

Police say they detected a silver Mitsubishi Lancer sedan on Coonara Ave West Pennant Hills at about 4.35pm on Wednesday 31st August travelling at 116 km/hr in a sign posted 50 km/hr zone. The male driver was issued an infringement notice for Exceed Speed Limit - over 45 kph, his driver's licence was confiscated and suspended on the spot for a period of 6 months however the number plates were not seized as the vehicle was not registered to the driver.

Police from Riverstone Highway Patrol were patrolling Schofields Road when they observed a white Mazda utility driving at high speed in a northerly direction at about 2.15am on Saturday 27th August.

Police checked the vehicle's speed to be 139km/h in the sign posted 70km/h zone. At the time the road was wet, and the vehicle appeared to be swerving and unable to stay within a marked lane on the roadway. Police interactions with the driver indicated he was extremely intoxicated.

Police breath tested the driver who returned a positive reading for alcohol. The driver was

arrested and conveyed to Riverstone Police Station where he returned a high range reading of 0.207, over four times the legal limit.

The accused driver was issued with a Court Attendance Notice for Drive with High Range Prescribed Concentration of Alcohol he was also issued with an infringement notice for exceeding the speed limit by more than 45km/h. The driver's licence was suspended until February 2023.

A Motorcycle rider has been fined \$2,616 and his licence suspended after he was clocked by police from Riverstone Highway Patrol travelling along Old Windsor Road, Glenwood at twice the speed limit.

Police say that they observed a red Honda CBR motorcycle heading West on Old Windsor Road at about 5am on Friday, 26th August 2022 at an estimated at 160km/h in a signposted 80km/h zone. The vehicle's speed was checked by Police LIDAR at 157km/h. The motorbike was stopped.

The 32-year-old male rider was issued a traffic infringement notice for the offence of Exceed Speed Over 45km/h (\$2616), his licence was suspended for six months and the number plates on the motorcycle were seized with the registration cancelled for three months.

### PARENTS CHARGED

A 42-year-old man driving with two young children in the back of his car has been charged with drink driving by officers from Hawkesbury Highway Patrol.

Police attempted to stop a Mazda CX-5 in Pitt Town for Random Testing at 6pm Saturday 3rd September 2022 however the vehicle pulled into a driveway to avoid police.

Checks revealed the driver had no association with the property and when tested, the driver returned a positive result for alcohol. Police summonsed a RBT Bus to attend the location to avoid taking the children, aged four and five, present in the vehicle back to Windsor Police Station.

The male returned a reading of 0.116 and was charged with Mid-Range Prescribed Concentration of Alcohol, his licence was suspended and a Children at Risk notification was generated with the Department of Communities and Justice.

A 30-year-old woman with two children in the back of her car was stopped by Hawkesbury Highway Patrol at 7:38pm on Sunday 4th September,. Police say the Toyota Hilux was detected travelling at 91km/h in a 60km/h zone through Bilpin. The vehicle was stopped and the driver produced a P2 Provisional Licence, she was with two children aged 7 and 8. Alcohol and drug testing was conducted on the woman and returned a positive result for Cannabis. She was arrested and conveyed to Windsor Police Station. There she provided a sample for further testing and issued a penalty notice for exceeding the speed limit by more than 20km/h. A Children at Risk notification was also generated with the Department of Communities and Justice.

## Zero Carbon Construction By BEV JORDAN

Construction has officially started on the first stage of Mulpha's \$1billion Zero-carbon Norwest Quarter development at 40 Solent Circuit.

It has been described as: "one of the most ambitious in Australia in terms of sustainable practices, initiatives, and design considerations", by Tim Spencer, Mulpha Head of Developments.

Construction on the first stage of Norwest Quarter will include two residential apartment buildings, Banksia and Lacebark, with a total of 196 apartment homes, and more than 3,500 sgm of retail and commercial space including a commercial gym, fresh food grocer, medical

The ground-breaking ceremony brought together people involved in the development and construction process, including architects Bates Smart and Smart Design Studio, environmental sustainability firm Finding Infinity, landscaping architect Aspect Studios and urban designers Terroir.

"Despite difficult market conditions for the construction industry, Mulpha with the support ofits top-tier partners is on track to deliver the first zero carbon precinct in the Hills, testament to its strong sustainability credentials and longevity in the Australian industry," said Tim

"Our off-the-plan buyers in Norwest Quarter can be confident that we are committed to delivering quality apartment buildings that far exceed minimum code requirements, whilst simultaneously setting new benchmarks in lifestyle design, community focused wellness, sustainability and harmony with the natural environment."

Parkview Constructions General Manager, Simon Gobbo, called it "an important milestone in construction history, the first of what we hope will be many such collaborations in bringing zero-carbon projects to life.

"Mulpha's foresight into sustainable practices and initiatives ensures this iconic residential and retail precinct will be future proofed for communities and generations to come. We look forward to helping deliver tomorrow's buildings, today."

Council's GM, Michael Edgar, said: "I am really pleased with the focus on building design, attention to detail and the ambitious sustainability measures. It is a commendable goal and shows a deliberate intent to make this building resilient into the future.

"It is essential we see confidence return to the apartment market and that can only be achieved through good design, efficient use of technology, good use of materials, good sense of place, quality workmanship and a determination to contribute to the public domain."

When completed in 2030, the Norwest Quarter masterplan will be home for over 2,000 residents in 26,000m 2 of green open space. There will be nine residential towers containing 864 apartments with 6,000m 2 of space provided for cafes, restaurants, shops and childcare facilities over 3.8 hectares of land.

## 1,245 Cars Off the Road for a Year

Hawkesbury City Council is a step closer to achieving their ambitious net zero emissions by 2030 after awarding a new contract to LGI Limited, one of Australia's leading carbon abatement companies.

LGI's Australian-developed technology recovers biogas from landfill, reduces methane emissions, delivers sizeable environmental benefits and allows leading councils to achieve lofty emissions targets.

Founder and CEO, Adam Bloomer said LGI is thrilled to be working with Hawkesbury City Council to deliver meaningful environmental outcomes for the region.

## Fired by passion by tony bosworth editor, hawkesbury post

Councillor calls for Windsor's heritage lamps to run on gas as the clock ticks...

Hawkesbury City Councillor Shane Djuric is a man on a mission to protect and enhance the Hawkesbury's heritage, so much so he's just been – at his own expense - to Port Pirie, in South Australia, for a special event – the relighting of that town's restored gas lamps.

It was a timely visit because while some Hawkesbury councillors and business folks too want to see Windsor's historic street Mall lamps once again running on gas, the multi-million dollar Liveability project - which in part will see a revitalisation of Windsor town centre and surrounds - may lead to the lamps running on decidedly unromantic non-heritage LED lights.

Councillor Diuric was invited by David Holden, Manager of Australian Gas Networks (SA), to attend the launch of the Port Pirie Winter Festival on the evening of Friday 5 August where the town relit eight restored gas lights.

Work on the seven gas lights mounted on posts, and one on the front wall of the Port Pirie museum, was inspired by the passion of members of the local community to save their area's heritage gas lights.

Meanwhile, in Windsor, there are some councillors and council staff who want to see our historic lamps run on LED lights - not least because they believe it will take the Council closer to the net zero emissions they have promised ratepayers.

The plan is for the Windsor gas lamps – which are not running on gas now, but are still connected underground - to be kept but moved to the sides of the Mall.

Cllr Djuric says moving the underground gas pipes too would not be much of an issue given the Mall is going to see some fairly major rejuvenation running into millions of dollars.

"I went to Port Pirie to try and gain some knowledge to hopefully inspire some of my fellow chamber members to support the appropriate restoration of our gas lamps, in line with community sentiment," Cllr Djuric told the Post.

Cllr Djuric says he doesn't think it is a major job - in the great scheme of the planned rejuvenation to re-lay the gas pipes.

"Being on the cusp of pure green hydrogen gas, I think to then put LEDs in our lamps, it's just vandalising those lamps.

He says we need to embrace our history, and Windsor's gas lamps are a big part of that.

"Windsor is so important, so significant in regards to the beginning of the modern Australia, surely the Council should be embracing this at every turn."


"We also hope that this cruise 'gives a little support' to the carers who, providing some respite and the chance to chat to like-minded people who share their challenges.

3.5 (23) - 0.7 (7), with their steely defence keeping the Wolves from scoring a goal. It was 5.5 (35) to the Eagles at the end of the third quarter as their harassed rivals finally scored two goals. Some fine work by the winners kept the Wolves scoreless in the fourth quarter with the Eagles adding one more goal as the celebrations started in the stands.

For our latest adventure we decided we wanted a walk, to enjoy some fresh air and have some fun at the same time. Over the years we have spent hours at the Norwest Lake watching the ducks and fish, but we had never explored the walking trails through the Norwest Business Park.



We are certainly fortunate in the Hills and Hawkesbury districts having a number of historic properties open to the general public. Some of these properties have been gifted by descendants of pioneering families such as the Roughley and Fagan families of Dural and Galston to local communities. Other properties have been acquired by local councils and handed to volunteer committees to manage and operate on behalf of the local community.

In 1980, Bruce Fagan moved out of his family home of "Netherby" at Galston and the home with the adjoining land was placed under the trusteeship of Hornsby Shire Council. After the death of Bruce in 1984 came an end to the prominence of the Fagans who had been prominent in the Arcadia, Dural and Galston district for 130 years.

Bruce's grandfather William emigrated to Australia from Londonderry, Ireland in 1848 at the age of 20. After arrival he once said that "he went looking for a wife" and soon after he discovered and married Ann Waddell. This linked two of the pioneering families of the Galston district. In 1854 William purchased 70 acres of land at Arcadia for one per acre. This land adjoined a grant of 600 acres owned by George Hall at Galston. During William's travel along the Hawkesbury region he had observed early orchards and felt that his land at Arcadia would be suitable for growing citrus trees. This became the foundation of a vast citrus growing business as the family and William's property interests grew. Two of his sons, William II and Samuel, formed a partnership called Fagan Brothers at the corner of Carters and Galston roads.

Samuel was the youngest son of William and Ann and was born in the old stone house on the original property at Arcadia and the partnership with his older brother William II was dissolved when Sam purchased extensive property at Galston which included part of George Hall's grant from Nicholson and Griffiths plus land owned by Herbert Hudson along Carrs Rd. Sam married in 1890 to Emma High from Highs Rd Castle Hill and they had three sons and four daughters. The gradual closing down of the Fagan's citrus growing empire, by Samuel, during the Great Depression of the 1930s saw the start of orchards reaching the end of their economic production. The youngest member of Sam's family was

Bruce who had never married and had placed his property under the trusteeship of Hornsby Shire Council in 1980. Whilst Bruce's parents and siblings had established an extensive citrus growing business, Bruce's interest lay in cattle and particularly the Jersey dairy breed and this led to a top quality breeding programme. Bruce became a well-respected expert and his services were very much in demand at the Royal Easter Show, the Castle Hill Show and in country shows elsewhere.

When Bruce moved out of his home "Netherby" the furniture and other bric-a-bac was all removed by the family as it contained some very valuable antiques. The family took photographs and sketched where everything was so that the trustees had a good idea of what the place looked like. Former Hornsby councillor, Ron Payne, and a handful of dedicated workers had the task of restoring the home to its former glory. They searched the state for period furniture and other items that fitted with the home

Ron Payne said that "pieces of furniture were arriving from all over the place. A lot had been sitting in backyard sheds for years without being realised". Ron told a journalist, Allison Bone, that "It's amazing some of the places we have found items". He went on to tell a tale of a dresser that was recovered from a chicken coop where it had been used a hen roost. "When we got the dresser back to Fagan Park it was covered in fowl manure and we didn't know how to go about getting it off" he said.

"Anyway, we thought about if we could just wet it down and scrape it off but as soon as the water hit it, it just turned to a thick paste and there was no way we were going to remove it. In the end we had to get a high-pressured hose to blast the stuff off. But the dresser is now in position in the homestead and no one is any the wiser".

Thousands of items were donated by local families for the restoration and much was used to add to additional museums created in the barns within Fagan Park.

Fagan Park is now one of the main attractions in the Hills district with great walks, picnic areas and naturally, the Netherby homestead and its gardens and barns.
