

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Budget Boost for Hawkesbury

Federal member for Macquarie, Susan Templeman said the Federal Budget delivers on her election commitments, including \$4.95 million for disaster recovery and preparation funding across the electorate plus \$2.5 million for North Richmond Community Centre. This is to ensure it is upgraded for better use during a disaster.

The first Labor Budget, delivered by Jim Chalmers last week, importantly continues the \$400m budgeted for the North Richmond Bridge duplication. "I have advocated and progressed this project since 2010, when the then Infrastructure Minister, now Prime Minister, Anthony Albanese committed \$20 million to do the first planning for a duplication," said Ms Templeman, the Special Envoy for Arts.

"For many years, I was a lone political voice in the Hawkesbury on this issue at a State and Federal level, but there has always been enormous community support. I look forward to progressing work with the NSW Government, who is ultimately responsible for finalising the route and constructing the bridge. I intend to continue advocating for those most affected by the proposed route so that we get the best possible outcome for our whole community."

The member for Macquarie said additional road funding, separate to the flood road funding already available to the council, has been announced in the Budget, with \$11.2 million for road upgrades in the Hawkesbury.

"There are many other exciting initiatives in the Budget for the Hawkesbury including the first community battery, which will allow Hobartville residents with solar panels to store their energy, meaning cheaper electricity bills for them," Ms Templeman said.

She said \$12.5 million has been allocated for local road upgrades in the Blue Mountains plus \$3 million for the upgrade of Woodbury Reserve in Glossodia.

"Again, this is a project that will be delivered by the (Hawkesbury) council, and they have existing plans in place," Ms Templeman said. "Glossodia residents have been waiting a very long time for improvements to Woodbury Reserve, and I'm very proud to be assisting council in bringing them to life."

Glenbrook Oval, which is used by Glenbrook Little Athletics Centre and other sports clubs, will benefit from a \$2.5 million upgrade.

Meanwhile, in a speech to the Parliament last week, Ms Templeman said the Budget has lifted support for veterans.

"Our Budget tackles many of the issues people have talked to me about — improving the claims process, simplifying laws and providing better support as people shift into civilian life," she said. "It implements key recommendations from the interim Royal Commission report, with more than \$230 million to bring on 500 new front-line staff to eliminate the compensation claims backlog — a key election promise — plus an increase in TPI payments.

"At a local level, my promise of a veterans and families hub for our region is funded, a \$5 million election commitment. In addition, we've continued the \$5 million for the Scheyville veterans families and community centre, which will provide a range of wellbeing opportunities for veterans and the community alike.

"I look forward to working closely with my community as we develop both these projects. Veterans have stood up for us, and in return, we must look after them."

Changing Electorates By BEV JORDAN

There are big changes ahead for the State electorate of Baulkham Hills which will be losing its current MP, Minister for Transport and Veteran Affairs David Elliott, and also its name at the March 2023 State Election.

Mr Elliott has announced that he won't be standing for preselection for the Liberal party in the next State Election which will be held on March 25th.

The State seat of Baulkham Hills has been renamed Kellyville for the 2023 election following changes to the electoral boundaries. Changes have also been made to the electoral boundaries of the Seven Hills electorate, which has now been renamed Winston Hills, and the Castle Hill State seat which will now take in more of the old Baulkham Hills seat. (see diagrams on page 24).

As yet no date has been set for Liberal Pre-selections for the new seat of Kellyville and the seat of Castle Hill. Sitting MP for Castle Hill, Ray Williams has indicated he will be standing for pre-selection for Kellyville which now takes in more of his existing electorate. Mr Elliott has ruled out standing for Liberal Preselection in Castle Hill. Sitting MP for Seven Hills, Mark Taylor has been endorsed as the Liberal candidate for the reshaped and renamed electorate of Winston Hills.

Mr Elliott was first elected to the State Seat of Baulkham Hills in 2011 and has served as the Minister for Police and Emergency Services (April 2019 to December 2021) Minister for Counter Terrorism (January 2017 to March 2019) Minister for Corrections and Minister for Veterans Affairs (April 2015 to March 2019) and Minister for Emergency Services (2015 to 2017).

His decision to leave politics follows a bitter factional row in the Liberal Party. He has refused to run in his reshaped seat of Kellyville as he didn't want to compete against factional ally and current Ray Williams who is up for pre-selection for the renamed Kellyville seat. Mr Elliott said he did not have the support needed from Liberal branch members to be selected for Castle Hill.

In a public statement the veteran member of the Liberal Party said: "With the abolition of my Baulkham Hills electorate and advice that I cannot be accommodated in the new seat of Castle Hill on factional grounds, I have today advised my community that I will not be re contesting the 2023 State Election."

"I simply want to offer my thanks to three groups. Firstly, the people of Baulkham Hills have given me fantastic support and

encouragement. Nicole and I moved to The Hills Shire when I discharged from the Army more than twenty years ago and we immediately felt welcomed. It's an honour to be the last Member for Baulkham Hills.

"Secondly, to the 200,000 police and corrections officers, volunteer and salaried fire fighters, emergency services and transport personnel who I have represented in Cabinet over eight years I offer my thanks and best wishes. All of this could not have been done without the tireless work of my ministerial and electorate staff. They deserve the Victoria Cross."

He saved the biggest thanks for his wife Nicole and sons Lachlan and William.

"Having spent nearly two decades serving my country in both the military and the NSW Parliament, I leave public service content that I've done the best job I could."

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SERVO ROBBERY

Police have released CCTV vision and are appealing for public assistance following an armed robbery in Baulkham Hills earlier this month.

About 1.50am on Monday 3rd October 2022, a man entered a service station on Windsor Road, Baulkham Hills, and collected drinks from a fridge.

He approached the counter and demanded money and cigarettes.

He was handed a plastic bag containing cash and cigarettes before fleeing to a rear car park where it is believed he left in a vehicle.

Officers attached to The Hills Police Area Command were notified and commenced an investigation into the incident.

As inquiries continue, police have released CCTV images of a man who they believe may be able to assist with their inquiries.

The man depicted is described as being Caucasian appearance, about 175cm to 180cm tall, and of slim build.

He is shown wearing a black hooded jumper with 'never give up' on the chest, black tracksuit pants, a black beanie, white shoes, and a face mask.

EMERGENCY PHONE APP

Police are encouraging the public to download the free Emergency+ app to their phones.

The free app was developed by Australia's emergency services and Government and industry partners to help pin-point where help is needed.

Emergencies can happen in places that are difficult to describe – or on an unmarked stretch of beach, bush track, or unfamiliar road, or outside a crowded sports stadium.

When you need to report an emergency in hard-to-find locations, the Emergency Plus App gives you the option to tell emergency services your location, either in the form of your closest street address, your GPS coordinates or your what3words address.

The Emergency Plus App which provides the GPS coordinates of their location as well as what3words which is a system that has given every 3m square in the world a unique three word identifier.

The what3words functionality contained within the app is a quick and simple way to communicate a precise location. Unlike street addresses, what3words addresses work offline, so it can be used in remote areas with poor data connection and are as accurate as GPS coordinates.

Images have just been released by police of a man wanted for questioning about a hold-up at a Windsor hotel in September.

Police say they were called to licensed premises on George Street, Windsor at about 9.30pm on Sunday 18th September following reports of an armed robbery.

They were told a man – who was wearing dark clothing and a face covering – gained entry to the premises, threatened a female employee, and demanded cash from a till and safe in the hotel's office.

The woman complied; placing amounts of cash into a bag provided by the man, who then fled down Union Lane.

Although shaken, the woman was not physically injured during the incident.

Officers from Hawkesbury Police Area Command attended and established a crime scene, which underwent forensic examination.

Detectives have since established Strike Force Craigmoor to further investigate the robbery.

As their inquiries continue, strike force investigators have released CCTV images of a man

who may be able to assist with their inquiries.

The man depicted is described as being of a medium build, about 170cm-180cm tall, and shown wearing dark coloured clothing and a face covering.

Investigations under Strike Force Craigmoor are continuing.

LOCK IT OR LOSE IT

Police are urging residents to take steps to make their homes and property safe by ensuring they lock all doors and their vehicles by 9pm at night.

There have been numerous thefts of luxury cars in the area including a 2020 Mercedes CLS350 and 2011 Jaguar XF stolen in Bella Vista. Police say many cars have been stolen with a key that has been taken from a break and enter at the home. In other cases cars have

been left unlocked outside with garage remotes inside them enabling access to homes where the keys have been stolen.

There have also been incidents when the front door has been left unlocked or garage door left open.

Police are urging residents to ensure all windows are secured and downstairs alarms activated. Tracking systems installed in late model cars should be set up and activated.





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From Student to RFS Captain

Volunteer Jarryd Barton (pictured) has been a firefighter for most of his life. A former Northholm Grammar School student, he joined the Dural Rural Fire Service (RFS) at the age of 16, as part of The Duke of Edinburgh's Award.

"When I needed to do the community service component for the program, I joined the fire brigade back in 2001. I just never ended up leaving," he said.

Now Brigade Captain, he says the RFS has a variety of volunteers from different occupations and backgrounds, all bringing their own skillset to protecting the local communities.

"I'm a town planner, as my day job. I work with engineering firms doing town planning, but then other guys in the brigade come from all different types of backgrounds. We have people in emergency services like the police, plumbers, electricians, project managers, mechanics. Everyone comes from somewhere different," he said.

Reflecting on the disastrous 2019-2020 bushfire season that swept across the east coast of Australia, he described it as "stressful" and "full-on".

"That was a really busy time. We were involved in that season from early November, late October in 2019 all the way through to late February, early March the following year. Our brigade went all over NSW, to regional areas and the north and south coast. A couple of guys even went up to Queensland at one stage," he recalled.

"I think we had about 55 days' worth of time and over 1,000 hours of people and trucks out in the field. At that point, I had only been captain for about six months as well."

He says the RFS has strategies in place before the fire season starts. "When the weather is appropriate, we do hazard reduction burns as a pre-emptive tactic. Back-burning is more of a defensive strategy, so we use that when there is an actual fire happening. We have our own plan, and every brigade across the area also has one that provides strategic benefit for their district," he said.

He highlighted the need for residents, particularly those in fire-prone areas, to have a bushfire survival plan.

"The best thing is to have a plan or at least have thought about it... another thing is as simple as deciding whether you are going to stay or leave, if you feel comfortable defending your property, or if you feel safer leaving early. Either one you choose you have to make decisions by staying aware of what is going on around you. The biggest mistake people make is not having a plan," he said.

Masonic School By BEV JORDAN

Neville Menzies (pictured) was 11-years-old when he became a boarder at the William Thompson Masonic School at Baulkham Hills in 1948. His father, a Mason, had died in a workplace accident in 1947.

Neville's mum and his younger brother moved in with his maternal grandmother in Young where they also shared the two-bedroom house with Neville's uncle and aunt. It was a local jeweller, who was a Mason, that heard of the family's plight and put them in touch with the Masonic school at Baulkham Hills. He paid for Neville and his mum to travel to Baulkham Hills to be interviewed for the boarding school.

The Masonic school was built for the care and education of children of deceased Freemasons and opened to huge crowds on November 11, 1922

Neville says: "In primary school when I started the boys were taught on site and for the first year I stayed in a Junior Boys' cottage then I spent three years at Cropley house (the senior boys' boarding school) and went to school at Westmead Technical school."

"Every school holiday I would go home." Neville says they were all well clothed, well fed, well boarded and they had access to a good education.

"There were 24 boys in a dormitory, we would get up at about 530am in the morning, strip the bed, have a cold shower, make the bed, clean our allotted area and then go down for breakfast."

Once dressed for school the boys would then march down from Cropley House to Seven Hills Road to catch the bus to school.

Saturdays were "heavy housework" and sports in the afternoon. Neville left when he passed his leaving certificate and got an apprenticeship as a fitter and turner.

He will be returning to Cropley House on Saturday November 12th for an old boys' reunion dinner to celebrate 100 years since the Masonic School at Baulkham Hills opened.

A Mason himself for 62 years, he will also be speaking at a special Remembrance Day service at Balcombe Heights this Sunday, 6th November.

The service will be held under the shade of the Memorial avenue of 364 Brush Box gum trees, planted to remember each of the Freemasons who died in WWI.

HISTORY

The Masons volunteered their time, skills and materials to build William Thompson Masonic School and provide a place for children from all over NSW who lost their Masonic fathers in World War 1. Their mothers had to find employment as there were no social services at that time.



Enrolment reached its peak of 380 pupils at the height of the depression in 1929.

There were five bungalows each with two dormitories for girls from Seven Hills Road leading up to the two storied Administration building, and then five bungalows for boys each with two dormitories.

Behind the Administration building there was a recreation hall and dining room.

The bungalows were surrounded by gardens, with a 25 yard pool, two ovals, a rotunda, a play house for the girls, weekly movies, a gymnasium and tennis courts.

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Heather Lee OAM By BEV JORDAN

Heather Lee turns 96 in a few days and she walks faster than a lot of people younger than her run. Her amazing stride and stamina are the reasons why the Richmond resident is the proud holder of several world Masters records and a multiple Australian records.

This year alone she has achieved 3 world record times in the 400m, 800, and 1500m ... she is keen to tackle the mile.

There is not a lot that deters Heather from running, she checked out of hospital to attend one race meeting and walked in the pouring rain at another meeting breaking a World Record in her stride...

"I was walking in water and I was soaked!" she says.

A video of her setting the new World Record for W95 1500m (pending ratification) in 13min 45.93secs on the Athletics NSW Facebook page went viral, breaking another record with a staggering 79,000 views, 2,200 shares and 2.3k comments.

A week earlier Heather smashed the W95 400m World Record at the Treloar Shield with a finish time of just over 3 minutes 10 secs (3:10.21) surpassing the previous World Record held by USA Track and Field competitor Diane Friedman (3:21.00) by over 10 seconds.

Although there are no competitors in her 95 to 100 age bracket at the Australian Master Athletics there still needs to be at least four people in each event so Heather is often walking against people much younger

Heather started in a local walking group, then took part in numerous fun runs before joining Masters Athletics in 2011 and clinching four gold medals in her first meeting, at the age of 84, at the Australian Masters Games in Adelaide

"I was beating women younger than me," she says. She has twice been named Australian Masters Walker of the Year. She has an Order of Australia Medal (OAM) and is the 2019 NSW Senior of the Year.

A passionate walker, Heather is also a fundraiser and raises money for several charities every year. This month it is the #PremmieMarathonChallenge to fund neonatal equipment. "My birthday coincides with World Prematurity Day this month," she told the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News.

"I will be walking the 42 kms in less than a week. I walked 100kms last year in a week."

At the last Hawkesbury Relay For Life event in 2018 Heather walked 100,000 steps in 21 hours. (This writer had to run to keep up with her



at the time). Heather has been supporting the Cancer Council for over 20 years since her husband Len died from lung cancer. His last words to her were. 'Now is the time to show vour mettle.'.

She says a good diet and healthy lifestyle that includes exercise are the best way to nurture mind. body and spirit.

"I have good genes, and good knees and hips, "she says." When I was young I couldn't keep still, I was always very active, I played tennis, hockey, netball, swam and walked."

She said COVID was hard, she had her treadmill and bike at home and trained on those and did virtual events but missed being with people.

"I thought I would not compete again." She will be heading to Campbelltown this weekend to better her own world record in the 1500m and she still wants to tackle that mile.

But for many kids, they'll be spending Christmas in a ward, treatment room, or outreach centre, instead of being at home surrounded by their family.

This festive season, Sydney Children's Hospitals Foundation is asking local families to take part in their annual Lights for Kids campaign by lighting up their homes to help give sick kids like Jamison the brightest Christmas possible.

Jamison was diagnosed with severe aplastic anaemia when he was just nine years old – a rare disorder in which the bone marrow fails to produce enough blood cells. Under the care of the expert team at Sydney Children's Hospital, Randwick, it was determined the best option for Jamison was an urgent bone marrow transplant from a sibling donor. But they faced another problem: there was only a 25% chance Jamison's older brother Lachie would be a match.

Thankfully 12-year-old Lachie was a match. "We'll never forget the day the team told us Lachie was a match. The relief that he wouldn't have to wait for the possibility of another donor

coming along was overwhelming," remembers Christie, Jamison's mum.

In just a few short weeks, both boys were admitted for transplant, and Lachie gave Jamison the best gift any brother could - a chance at a happy, healthy childhood. As soon as the transplant was complete, the relief for the family of four was immense.

"We all stayed in hospital together that night, and the boys were allowed to see each other after Lachie woke up. It was a pretty special moment when we saw the bone marrow going into Jamison," says Christie.

Thanks to his brave big brother, Jamison had the chance to return to the childhood that every kid deserves, one free of pain, worry and





RDA Riding High By BEV JORDAN

Riding for the Disabled Tall Timbers at Gables is a finalist in the 2022 Australian Disability Service Conference & Awards (ADSCA) and is one of only three finalists across Australia in the Most Outstanding Allied Health category.

It's a huge accolade to the RDA Tall Timbers Centre which introduced allied services at its North West Sydney base three years ago to meet the additional needs of clients.

The RDA's occupational therapy, speech pathology and counselling services are all carried out at the Tall Timbers Centre in Gables on the centre's 10.9ha bushland site.

Head Coach Nicole King will be heading to the Gold Coast for the awards which will be presented on Wednesday 9th November.

She told the *Hills to Hawkesbury Community* News: "As a Not for Profit NDIS Provider it is extremely exciting to be recognised as a finalist in these awards.

"Our Allied Health team has worked hard over the last few years to develop the Allied Health services to compliment our equine programs. Having the input from the Allied health team into our Equine programs has been invaluable for our Coaches as we strive for a holistic individualised program for each participant.

RDA Tall Timbers has been running therapeutic equine based programs for children with disabilities for 50 years. The benefits for participants

are physical, social and psychological.

So far this year, 195 Participants have accessed services across all programs _ averaging 100 per week. There are 18 horses at RDA Tall Timbers and 65 volunteers.

Nicole says for many participants, being with the horses is life changing.

She said a 12-year-old girl who had been on the program for three years had developed her confidence to such a level that she was now able to interact with her fellow students at school. "That's not an usual occurrence," she said.

Tall Timbers was established in 1972 by Pearl Batchelor at her riding school in West Pennant Hills. The centre moved In 1976, due to impending development, to Kellyville where

> it was based until 1999 when it moved (due to development) to Box Hill (now called Gables).

Tall Timbers faced challenges through COVID as they tried to look after the horses and manage the Centre's beneficial programs in a COVID safe way while trying to retain volunteers. Annual fundraisers also had to be cancelled. Constant wet weather and storm damage have also had an impact.

Nicole says. "It costs \$1200 a year to run the program for one rider and on top of that we have the cost of feeding each horse and maintaining the facilities.

Hay fever season is upon us... Achoo!

The days are longer, it is warming up, flowers are blooming, and the smell of fresh cut grass lingers in the air. Along with these wonderful seasonal delights, perhaps you are also feeling congested, and your ears may be feeling blocked.

Your sinuses and your ears are connected inside your head and for some people, sinus issues may lead to their ears feeling blocked. Sinus congestion can affect the pressure in your middle ear and cause a blockage or feeling a full sensation.

This sensation can occur when the eustachian tube is not functioning well or it becomes obstructed. The eustachian tube is a small channel that connects the middle ear to the nose and sinuses. This tube equalises the pressure in your middle ear, behind the ear drum. There are tests used to check that the pressure behind your eardrum is equal to the pressure in the atmosphere, outside of your ear. This test is called tympanometry. When this measurement shows that the pressure in the ear is too high or too low, this can be a sign that the eustachian tube is not working, or it is blocked. When the eustachian tube is not functioning well, you may experience fullness or pressure in your head.

What causes blocked Ears?


Our ears can feel blocked for several reasons such as an ear wax excess, fluid build-up behind the eardrum, something stuck in the ear such as a cotton-bud or tip of an earphone, or a sudden hearing loss. Unfortunately, when people experience blocked ears, they often have a "wait and see" approach to see if the ears unblock themselves. It is extremely important that the cause of the blocked or full sensation is investigated immediately and not left to "fix itself." Hearing care professionals can complete several tests on your ears to identify what is causing your symptoms.

Blocked eustachian tubes can be caused by allergies, sinus infections or swelling from a recent cold. These conditions can cause fluid to collect in the middle ear. The pressure and fluid can cause pain in your ears or head. You may also experience muffled hearing, ear pain, ringing or popping noises in the ears as well as dizziness.



What to do if your Ears are blocked?

If your ears are feeling blocked, it is important to see a local hearing care provider, such as Ear Studio. 
The new Castle Hill electorate is bounded by the M2, Windsor Road, Old Northern Rd and

SCHOOKS BEST HOCKHON

What do Ned Kelly, Gough Whitlam and the William Thompson Masonic Schools have in common?

As we all know, November 11 is called "Remembrance Day" as the day that World War 1 ceased. It is also a day that other events have also gone down in Australian history. Ned Kelly's reign as an outlaw and bushranger came to an end in 1880 on that date when he was hanged for his crimes. Former Prime Minister Gough Whitlam was dismissed by the Governor-General in 1975, and 1922 saw the official opening of the William Thompson Masonic Schools exactly 100 years ago this year.

William Thompson, after whom the school was named, was a Brother (Member) of the Masonic Lodge who had selected the land which had formerly formed part of a land grant of 30 acres to George Best by Governor John Hunter in 1796. George Best went on to increase his land holdings to 805 acres by 1828 between Seven Hills Rd and Junction Road. George Best died in 1833. William Thompson had been looking for land upon which to build a home for children of Masons who had lost their lives in World War 1 and he selected the land for its healthy location and productivity. William Thompson Hall at the rear of the school's administration building is

named in his honour. At the time of acquisition by the Masonic Lodge the Best farm was described as a 168 acre "run- down dairy farm" and was sold to the Freemasons for 4,500 pounds and included George Best's original farmhouse which was demolished in 1922.

William Thompson, as well as being a Freemason, was also an architect and a Liberal politician. The foundation stone for the school was laid in February 1922 and, as stated, the official opening took place on the 11th November of that year.

Whilst the school was named after the Freemason who founded the school, the best-known building and personage associated with the school was perhaps Rubert Cropley after whom Cropley House is named.

Rubert was a boot retailer who relinquished this role to undertake the honorary position of Superintendent of the Masonic School. Together with his wife, Beatrice Ada Evans, they dedicated the rest of their lives to the care and welfare of needy children. Their only child, John Thomas Cropley had died at the age of 6 in 1914.

During World War II the school was converted to a Military Hospital with the Army moving in by September 1942. It had 700 beds by January 25th 1943 and the

Army also erected additional buildings which, when completed, enabled the hospital to add additional beds so that it came closer to the original 1200 beds originally proposed back in February 1942. Much damage occurred during the occupation by the Army whilst using it as a hospital. The repair bill came to 58,741 pounds of which the Army paid 50,000 pounds in compensation. The school officially re-opened in November 1947. By 1974 many of the buildings were in need of repair. It was decided to phase out the school and sell the property.

The Hills Shire Council eventually purchased the site, selling off some of the land for housing and the M2 motorway, whilst retaining much for land for community use in the way of sporting fields. Heritage buildings were also retained as accommodation for community groups. You will find amongst the buildings the Museum established by The Hills District Historical Society which showcases how the Hills District has changed over the decades. The Museum features a school class room and extensive photographic collection as well as research facilities and books for sale. Another of the buildings houses our local radio station Alive 90.5 whilst other buildings house a mixture of community groups.
