# Mayors campaign for pothole repairs fund Edited by GISELA HORNER

Mayors across Western Sydney and Northwest Sydney have united to campaign for the establishment of a metropolitan road repairs fund to help support Sydney councils with the extent of damage across their respective road networks.

Mayors from The Hills Shire, Hawkesbury and Hornsby and others who are supporting the cause, including Wollondilly, Penrith and Campbelltown have called for funding from the State and Federal Governments after many Local Government Areas (LGA) experienced record-breaking rain and multiple flooding disasters over a three-year period.

The joint campaign comes after Local Government NSW declared a 'Statewide Roads Emergency' at the National Local Roads and Transport Congress in Hobart. The declaration, that was supported by NSW mayors, urged the State and Federal Governments to increase funding commitments to help local councils repair their road network before the situation becomes even more dire.

The NSW Government has already announced it will provide \$50 million under the Fixing Local Roads Pothole Repair Program to regional and rural councils to address their highest priority pothole requests.

Mayor of The Hills Shire, Dr Peter Gangemi said Sydney councils, especially those with large rural or semi-rural areas, are in desperate need of a similar fund to assist with repairs to return roads to a standard which residents have been calling for.

"Just like rural regions, The Hills Shire has also been affected by persistent wet weather systems. On top of this, residents have endured several major flooding disasters in the last few years and our roads are deteriorating much quicker than our modelling could have predicted under a third consecutive La Nina. Despite about two-thirds of our Shire being considered rural, it is hard to understand why we are still not eligible

to apply for this funding. In addition to the record rain, we are seeing more requests for pothole and road repairs than ever before. In 2019, Council received 1680 calls to fix potholes and carryout road patching work. This has now grown to 5086

requests in 2022 – and we still have just under two months to go" Mayor Gangemi said.

Mayor of Hawkesbury City Council, Sarah McMahon said since the July flood, Council has filled 9,400 potholes. In the past three years, \$1.07 million has been spent repairing potholes, with another \$1 million to be spent this year. This is on top of the \$240 million in flood related repairs and other routine upgrades and maintenance that is currently being managed.

"After six floods in three years, roads in the Hawkesbury and right across Sydney are in dire need of coordinated and well-funded assistance from the government. Without assistance to recover and future-proof these networks, millions of motorists will continue to be put at risk every day," Mayor McMahon said.

Mayor of Hornsby Shire Council, Philip Ruddock said the recent weather events have been unprecedented and resulted in significant damage to roads across the Shire, particularly in the rural areas. "I am pleased to join with Hills Shire Mayor, Dr Peter Gangemi, and other fellow Sydney Mayors in seeking assistance to repair our rain damaged roads". Mayors from Penrith City Council, Campbelltown City Council and Wollondilly, echoed similar sentiments. State Government assistance is essential to get NSW roads repaired following the damage caused by the wettest year on record.

**Rouse Hill Hospital**

Health Minister Brad Hazzard has released the Master Plan for the \$300 million Rouse Hill Hospital and early works for stage one are due to start early next year.

The new hospital will include an emergency department and will be built on the corner of Commercial Road and Windsor Roads, on land next to Rouse Hill Shopping Centre and opposite The Fiddler on Commercial Rd.

The exhibition of the development application and environmental impact statement (EIS) of the New Rouse Hill Hospital Concept & Stage 1 Early Works ended on 24th November.

Mr Hazzard said the Rouse Hill Hospital will include emergency services, inpatient and outpatient services that will be designed to take advantage of digital innovations in Healthcare.

"The new hospital will be specifically designed and built to embrace advanced digital technology and innovative models of care to bring world-class care right into the Home," he said.

The new hospital will include:

- inTouchCare
- Urgent and Emergency Care
- Day Surgery Unit
- Adult & Paediatric Short Stay
- Ambulatory & Outpatient Care, including Women's Health, Ante/Post
- Natal Care, Cancer Care, Renal Dialysis, Mental Health, Infusion Centre and
- Paediatrics



• There will also be a multi-storey car park.

Castle Hill MP Ray Williams said the State Significant Development Application (SSDA) has also been lodged.

"The SSDA will allow enabling works to start onsite such as installing road access and in-ground services including water, electricity and gas.

"I look forward to seeing early works commence in early 2023 following the review and finalisation of the clinical services plan and planning approval."

Riverstone MP Kevin Conolly said the selected site and Master Plan for the new hospital campus ensured convenient and easy access to hospital services for the community.

"The Master Plan for the new hospital shows the building's location on the hospital

campus and how it relates to parking zones, public transport, access roads and other retail and community services. It also identifies future clinical expansion zones," he said.

# **Race for Grace**

It wasn't the usual high powered police vehicle for Hills Highway Patrol officers but their pedal power has helped raise over \$4,300 for The Grace Centre for Newborn Intensive Care at The Children's Hospital at Westmead.

Hills Highway Patrol and Hills Police rode spin cycles for 11 hrs at Castle Towers to raise the funds through the Sydney Children's Hospitals Foundation.

Organiser Senior Constable Nicole Ziedan from Hills Highway Patrol said last year officers The Hills PAC and Hills Highway Patrol walked from Castle Hill Police Station to Westmead Hospital but this year they wanted to push things up a gear or two.

"We wanted to set a challenge and use this as an opportunity to raise as much money as possible for The Grace Ward."

# **DRUG CHARGES**

# DV OPERATION

The NSW Police Force has launched its annual proactive state-wide operation targeting perpetrators of domestic and family violence to coincide with the global '16 Days of Activism' campaign which ends on World Human Rights Day (Saturday 10th December).

The state-wide operation will implement a number of proactive strategies to disrupt and prevent recidivist offending and ensure the safety of victims. This includes Apprehended Domestic Violence Order compliance checks, proactive checks targeting known offenders and providing additional support to at-risk victims, with assistance from the Domestic Violence High Risk Offender Teams.

Deputy Commissioner Mal Lanyon, says that police remain committed to preventing violence, supporting victims, and ensuring perpetrators are held accountable 365 days of the year.

"Police do not just wait for reports of incidents to happen; we actively engage in proactive policing initiatives to identify, assess, and target individuals who are suspected of being repeat offenders to reduce crime," he said.

"We believe that gender-based violence is everyone's business. There are no innocent bystanders when it comes to domestic and family violence."

# **TEENAGER CHARGED**

A teenage boy has been charged following a stabbing of a 15-year-old boy at Castle Hill Fred Caterson Reserve, about 2.50pm on Sunday, 20th November.

Police allege that the stabbed boy and two of his friends were involved in an altercation with a group of youths in the car park before he was allegedly stabbed in the chest.

His friends, along with the other group, left the reserve prior to the arrival of emergency

The injured teen was treated by Ambulance paramedics before being taken to the Children's Hospital at Westmead.

Officers from The Hills Police Area Command established a crime scene and commenced an investigation. Following inquiries, detectives executed a search warrant at a home in Parklea on Wednesday 23rd November and arrested a 17-year-old boy.

He was charged with wield knife in a public place, custody of knife in public place, affray, and reckless wounding,

# Storm Damage By BEV JORDAN

When it comes to storm damage Baulkham Hills and Castle Hill are in the top 10 according to data just released by Suncorp Insurance.

The company analysed more than 32,000 weather-related home insurance claims across NSW from 1st July 2021 to 30th June 2022, to reveal the hardest hit suburbs.

While Boambee East on the Mid North Coast grabbed top spot, followed by Armidale on the Northern Tablelands, the two Hills suburbs came in at numbers 6 and 7.

Suncorp Insurance EGM Home Claims, Alli Smith said the figures are a stark reminder of the difficult year NSW residents have had weather-wise and should be viewed as a reminder that the warmer weather can bring sudden storms, cyclones and heavy rains that can lead to floods.

"Our data shows that no one region is more prone to significant weather events - with our top ten storm- battered suburbs coming from four different regions - once again highlighting that severe storms can strike anywhere.

"We've released this list of storm-battered suburbs to remind residents across NSW that the impact of storms and significant weather events on property can be severe, and highlight the importance of ensuring you have done everything you can to strengthen your home's resilience against the effects of Mother Nature," she said.

New research by Suncorp Insurance found that while 90 per cent of NSW residents admit

to knowing at least one activity that should be completed prior to storm season, more than a quarter (26 per cent) admit to doing nothing to prepare.

"New South Wales residents know the messages around preparing for storm season," she said.

"But unfortunately knowing the messages and actually doing something to better prepare and protect your home are two separate things, and many people in NSW are failing to actually complete the often quick-and-

# **New Cancer Centre**

Maria Worthington from Baulkham Hills was the first patient to be treated at Icon Cancer Centre at Norwest.

The 79-year-old's 25th and final radiation therapy session was at the end of October.

She was diagnosed with Stage 3 breast cancer in April.

"I felt a lump in the breast while I was showering. I booked in to see my GP straight away. It all happened very quickly," she said. "I had surgery, followed by four months of chemotherapy. After my chemotherapy treatment, I was advised to have radiation therapy. My daughter told me that Icon was opening a new centre only three minutes from home, which was a big relief. Maria still plays the piano accordion in The Accordion Society of Australia Orchestra.

"Shoulder dysfunction after radiation is not uncommon. Thanks to modern radiation techniques used here at Icon, we can better direct the treatment to where it needs to go, which was imperative in Maria's case. I'm constantly amazed at the sub-millimetre accuracy we can now achieve for patients through our cutting-edge treatments. We have also introduced a new advanced tattoo-less technique.

" Many radiation departments still use tattoos to help the radiation

therapist position the patient correctly to deliver treatment to the right location. Unfortunately, these are a constant reminder of treatment even many years later," he said.

Icon Cancer Centre Norwest has the capacity to deliver 900 courses of radiation therapy each year and offers the latest technology and treatment techniques.

The centre is home to an advanced Varian TrueBeam linear accelerator with cutting-edge IDENTIFY technology, which offers patients the option to have tattoo-less treatment.

"As the first private radiation therapy centre in the region, Icon Cancer Centre offers a co-ordinated approach to cancer care in partnership with Norwest Private Hospital. These services are vital in our ageing local community. Florence and her parents Esther and James started the Love for Australia charity 10 years ago with free family festivals in Western Sydney.

During the COVID lockdowns and restrictions they started delivering free food hampers and when most restrictions were over they decided to open a free grocery store for people doing it tough.

"It's more than just giving food. We want people to know there is support and we are here to support them," says Florence.

He was a taxi driver and had to have open heart surgery. Each day (my mum and I) would visit my father in hospital. Every night we would get home and there would be food on the doorstep. Not everyone has that support and people to rally around them in time of need. We want to be that support."

She says for a lot of people they see, going to a free grocery store is not something they thought they would ever do.

She said one family ran their own successful business and some savings but lost the business and their income when the husband was involved in a road accident and shattered his hip.

His wife was heavily pregnant with their child and couldn't take over the business, they faced mounting medical bills and had no way of making the business work. The only way they could save money on groceries was by coming to the Love for Australia store at Seven Hills

Florence studied economics at university and runs a music school but says the family charity is her passion. "It's a joy to see the people that come here and that we can help share the love. I love that we can do this as a



# **Cool Future for Norwest**

Mulpha, the parent developer of Norwest Business Park, has set a target to reduce the urban heat in Norwest by two degrees.

The Urban Cooling Guide released by Mulpha and University of NSW Built Environment School marks the culmination of two years of monitoring and analysing Norwest's microclimate from a network of 15 environmental sensors around the Norwest

The ground-breaking plan targets the reduction of urban heat in Norwest by two degrees through smart building, infrastructure and landscape design.

Urban Heat islands form as vegetation is replaced by asphalt and concrete for roads, buildings, and other structures which absorb and re-radiate the sun's heat, causing surface temperatures and overall ambient temperatures

The target of the Urban Cooling Guide is to lower the local Urban Heat Island Effect and deliver significant cost savings and health benefits to the businesses, residents and visitors... create a more liveable environment and address the challenges of climate change at a local level.

Dr Negin Nazarian, Scientia Lecturer, UNSW Built Environment, said: "Heatwaves are becoming more frequent and severe, which has serious consequences for public health, liveability and functionality of urban

environments. Heatwaves in Australia kill more people than any other natural disaster.

"With the increased rate of urban development, city and precinct scale climate is dramatically changed, resulting in additional warmth brought about by the urban heat island

"It is paramount that we understand and closely monitor not only the climatic factors, but also the urban design characteristics that impact human health and well-being in the face of such heat events, and further promote smart city strategies to address this."

Mulpha has adopted an urban heat response to minimise heat build-up in its Norwest developments, including its zerocarbon development Norwest Quarter. The buildings have been designed to use light coloured materials throughout for high solar reflectivity, as well as using awnings, screens and external shading structures.

There is also substantial rewilding planned, with a high percentage of deep soil planting and canopy cover, tree planting in both private and public spaces, and water features established throughout the precinct.

Tim Spencer, Head of Developments, Mulpha said: "The design considerations adopted at an early-stage in any development

will have a major impact on the climate variability and liveability in urban environments such as Norwest."

"We are excited to be collaborating with some of the leading thinkers and bright young minds of UNSW to really understand the Norwest micro-climate and how we can influence it with good planning and design.

"Effective collection of on-the-ground data and analysis by world leading experts is central to our vision for Norwest as a Smart City that leads the way in urban design.

"Only through collaboration are we going to be able to realise a liveable precinct, so by sharing this knowledge we hope other developers and even homeowners will take steps to assist in lowering the urban heat in Norwest."





# MEET OUR TEAM:

# 5 Minutes with Sandra (Audiometrist) discussing Tinnitus

You've been working for Ear studio for almost 3 years now, what makes you passionate about working as an Audiometrist?

I am able to really help people. It may look like I just prescribe hearing aids, but this can have a major impact on a person's quality of life. It can reconnect them to their social life, their families, activities they love and can help them to live a happier and fuller life. I also enjoy working with people who have tinnitus.

# What does it mean to "have tinnitus" and what does it sound like?

Tinnitus means that you perceive a sound inside your ear or inside your head that other people cannot hear. It can present in diverse ways. For some people it is a high whistling sound, for other people it can be a chirping sound like a cicada, others describe it as a buzzing or a static sound and sometimes people have even said it is a roaring sound.

### What does a Tinnitus Assessment involve?

We begin by taking a detailed history to understand when the tinnitus started and the circumstances surrounding it. We then check the overall ear health and complete an in-depth hearing test. We perform a "tinnitus match" if it is appropriate and necessary.

A tinnitus match is where we attempt to recreate the sound of your tinnitus, through headphones, to help us understand what you

are experiencing, then we try to mask it. This means we will create a custom sound to help free you from the intensity of the tinnitus, while you are hearing that sound.

### Is there a Cure?

In most instances there is no medical "cure" for tinnitus. As a result many people often hear "nothing can be done". However, it is a very common misconception that nothing can be done for someone living with tinnitus. There are a number of different things that might bring you relief such as sound therapy, for some people a hearing aid might be suitable and for others there might be more support through programs like CBT (Cognitive Behavioural Therapy). It is important to understand that every case is very different, as is the way we manage it.

# What happens if I have not noticed tinnitus before and it begins suddenly? Should I be worried?

If you have a sudden persistent onset of tinnitus, it is important to have it checked promptly. Sometimes tinnitus may happen in connection with sudden hearing loss (usually in one ear) and getting urgent medical attention is absolutely crucial and may successfully prevent it from becoming a permanent tinnitus or hearing loss. Most medical practitioners will ask to see a report from a hearing test prior to considering any treatment.

helped someone suffering from tinnitus?

A patient of mine experienced tinnitus and communication difficulty despite having hearing aids for some years from a different provider. She had been suffering from strong tinnitus and she also had quite a considerable hearing loss. I managed to fit her with better hearing aids, this really helped her by solving communication problems she had been experiencing. Also, as a by-product of well-fitting hearing aids, it has also remarkably reduced her tinnitus. This means she feels much more relaxed in her dayto-day life and now she no longer has trouble going to sleep at night.

# Is there anything people can do from home if their tinnitus is really getting to them?

The main thing you can do is to look after yourself, make sure you are having enough sleep and take some time out for your physical and emotional well-being. Try to do something every day that brings you joy and reduce any stressors and pressures that you may be experiencing.

Cherrybrook Athletics Club will be represented by six of their brightest athletes at the Australian All Schools championships in Adelaide from December 9-11.

Teddy Hampton, Xavier Hennessey, Viktorija Calusic, Sarah-Anne Koot, Joel Moresi, and Sam Price will represent their schools and Cherrybrook Athletics Club as a part of the crack NSW team contesting the first Australian All Schools since 2019.

Xavier previously made the 2021 NSW merit list - for athletes who would have attended Australian All Schools had it been on - in the triple jump.

Barker College's Viktorija figures in the under-17 high jump, having competed here in 2019. She is among the top junior female high jumpers in Australia, consistently reaching the national level. She is aiming to better her recent personal best

"It's always in the back of your mind that one day I would

like to represent Australia but for now I am focussing on the next PB," said Viktorija, who took to the sport when her PE teacher advised her: 'You're tall, try this!"

Carlingford High's Joel and St Aloysius student Sam (under-13) both represented Cherrybrook LA at the 2022 Australian Little Athletics Championships and also qualified for the Nationals.

Last year in the under-12s, Joel won the high jump gold plus two silvers and a bronze at the NSW All Schools Championship while Beecroft's Sam claimed silver in the javelin. In Adelaide, Joel will be competing in the under-14 high jump and 800m while Sam is vying for a medal in the under-14 shot put.

Cherrybrook Technology High's Sarah-Anne, who made the top six in 90m and 200m

Sarah-Anne Koot, Teddy Hampton, Sam Price, Xavier Hennessey, and Viktorija Calusic. hurdles at the Nationals in April, will compete in under-16 90m hurdles in Adelaide. She wants to beat her 13.19PB with hopes for a sub-13 second result - before moving up to a longer distance next season.

"I am really looking forward to the team environment and to competing for the last time in this event," Sarah-Anne said.

Throwers Anna Kely (Pennant Hills High) and Daniel de Sacadura (Cherrybrook Technology High), who won gold and silver in September, are not going to Adelaide, having both completed their HSC this year.

Cherrybrook AC athletes have always been high achievers, many of them representing Australia at the Olympics, Commonwealth Games, and World Championships with success.

On December 4th 2002 a rare solar eclipse occurred, visible to much of the southern hemisphere. On that day another significant event occurred in The Hills and Hornby Districts that would forever change the lives of those who were present.

Three large bush fires started on the same day and combined to be known as the Baulkham Hills Complex of fires. This event lasted more than a week, causing significant damage to property and infrastructure from Maroota South to Glenorie, Berowra to Brooklyn, Wisemans Ferry to Kenthurst and the suburbs between.

Twenty Years on, the following are extracts from a recollection of the events.

Following two years of drought New South Wales was experiencing extremely dry conditions. The El Nino effect had well and truly taken its toll on the native landscape. On Wednesday 4th December 2002, yet another Total Fire Ban had been declared with hot, dry and windy conditions being experienced.

A bush fire was reported in Chilvers Lane Maroota South, to be followed by an additional report of a fire at Lower Portland. Soon after the first fire fighting units arrived on scene, the Chilvers Lane fire spotted ahead of itself into the Broadwater Swamp. The tall, dead and very dry grassy reeds quickly burst into flames, fanned by very strong westerly winds.

The fire made a run directly towards Old Northern Road in the vicinity of Meriden Ave Glenorie. As the fire was approaching Glenorie, a third fire was reported at Red Gables Road Kenthurst.

The Rural Fire Brigades from The Hills were all dispatched to the impacted areas, to be supported by Hornsby Ku-ring-gai, Cumberland, MacArthur, Warringah and the Blue Mountains Districts. It was evident from the rapid escalation in fire behaviour that the fires would not be contained under the weather conditions being experienced and the priority was to preserve the lives of those in their direct path.

As fire crews arrived on scene they immediately located themselves at properties under direct threat.

The fire front was seconds away. Spot fires were occurring in every piece of garden, mulch bed and in grass paddocks. The glow from the approaching fire was incredible. We couldn't see the flames through the trees, yet there was an intense fire flare, or pre glow.

Someone yelled 'Here it comes, get ready!'

As the fire crew from Glenorie Brigade was arriving at a property they were directly impacted by the head of the fire and were forced to retreat. Driving through flame and dense smoke, unable to see in front of the vehicle they crashed into the side of a house that was already catching fire.

The driver trapped on the steering wheel and crew trapped inside the truck, as flames surrounded them and scorched everything in its path.

Myself and the late Group Officer Jim Williams met up, as we both tried to get to the trapped Glenorie crew. Making our way to extract the crew we came across two ladies whom had managed to escape the burning house just in time as the garage collapsed. All crew and the two ladies were crammed into the RFS four wheel drive car and we made a quick escape, back through the fire.

Scenes like this were repeated over and over again as crews did their best to protect those surrounded by fire. As Old Northern Road was being impacted by fire, residents and motorists became encircled.

At some point a crew made a red call over the radio advising the fire was about to cross the road to the south of us near Mount View Road, our exit would be blocked and we would be 'swamped in'.

This meant we were surrounded on three sides by fire. We were in an unburnt pocket about 500 metres wide, that was about to be engulfed.

At one point 15 civilians, including young children and injured fire fighters were sent into a brick constructed house and took refuge as the fire front passed. Meanwhile fire crews remained outside to protect the house.

The Chilvers Road Fire was now burning towards Arcadia, Berrilee and Berowra Waters. Crews dedicated the remainder of the day to 'house hopping', going from property to property in an attempt to steer the fire around dwellings and structures and protect lives.

Over the coming days the Lower Portland Fire, Chilvers Lane Fire and Red Gables Fire would all combine into one, forming the Baulkham Hills Complex. Close to 40 homes were destroyed on day one. 2 Civilian deaths were recorded as a consequence of the fires.

On the 5th December 2002 the fire would spot across Berowra Creek and make a run towards the township of Cowan and later that evening another spot would impact on Berowra and Berowra Heights.

20 years on from this event much has changed in the way we have learnt to live with fire and how we deal with large scale emergencies. Emergency alert messages and phone applications provide the community with timely advice and the actions required.

Recently the new Australian Fire Danger Rating System has been introduced giving the community and fire fighters a better forecasting tools and understanding of fire behaviour.

In the 20 years we have seen similar events occur in bush fire prone areas across NSW.

A timely reminder to be prepared.






Fires Solar Eclipse 2002




