Hills Relay For Life volunteer Ruth Didsbury who co-ordinated the wrap said they were overjoyed by the result which was more than 25% higher than last year's record-breaking figure.

More than 100 people gave up their time to support the wrapping station over the 205 hours that it was operating.

"Our volunteers included a number of Castle Hill High students, we also had a couple of men who volunteered to wrap, some mother and daughter teams and grandparents.

"Quite a few people actually sought us out to have their presents wrapped as they appreciated the wrapping last year and thought it was a wonderful idea plus such a great cause. "Some people, who were in a position to do so, gave very generous donations which was, greatly appreciated."

Volunteers had wrapping skills tested with Katanas (swords), several unicorns and dinosaurs, bonsai plants and fishing rods plus numerous hard-to disguise sports equipment.

The Christmas Wrapping at Castle Towers is organised by the Hills Relay For Life, a Hillsbased community organising committee which raises funds for the Cancer Council NSW.

The 2023 Hills Relay For Life will be held at Castle Hill Showground on Saturday May 20th from 9am. The 24-hour event raises funds for Cancer Council research and support programs.

This year's Hills Relay will be the 22nd in the Hills.

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DEADLY SWIMMING SPOT

The Hawkesbury River at Windsor is one of the deadliest stretches of water in NSW with two people drowning in the area last month.

Sundeep "Sunny" Dutta a real estate agent and boxing coach died on Christmas Day, just 11 days after 16-year-old Ryan Bibby drowned in the same stretch of water.

A petition started by Sunny's niece Alisha Tuli after his death (www.ipetitions.com/petition/ stop-windsor-beach-from-taking-our-loved-ones ?fbclid=IwAR2r4kasbMPqFvcMqxeF207jR36Jt Wlr_fVWgTlSGgTZl0XpM9FboGLDjBg) already has over 800 signatures from people with many demanding Hawkesbury Council close the "beach" saying the popular swimming spot is too dangerous.

Sunny, 36, had been with friends on December 25th when he decided to go for a swim. When he failed to surface they called emergency services which arrived at Windsor Bridge at Windsor at about 5.15pm. He was

found a short time later and brought to land; however, NSW Ambulance paramedics were unable to revive him. Officers from Hawkesbury Police Area Command are investigating.

A report will be prepared for the coroner. Ryan died just days before his 17th birthday. He went missing on December 14th at around 12pm while swimming in the river at Windsor Beach. His body was recovered just over four hours later.

Royal Life Saving Chief Executive Officer Justin Scarr said Royal Life Saving was especially concerned about people swimming inland waterways, where calm water can often lead to people underestimating the dangers.

"Rivers, and lakes can look calm but often hide extremely dangerous hazards like strong currents and steep drop offs. These are especially dangerous for non or poor swimmers, who can get out of their depth quickly, and disappear silently," Mr Scarr said.]

P-PLATERS FINED

It was a not so happy New Year for one P-Plater stopped by officers from The Hills Highway Patrol in the early hours of January 2nd on the M2 at Baulkham Hills.

Police say they detected the Kia Rio travelling at 141km/hr in a sign posted 100 km/hr zone at around 5.55am on Monday, January 2nd.

The 22-year-old male driver from Regents Park, the holder of an NSW P2 Provisional licence, had three passengers in the car.

His licence was confiscated and suspended on the spot for a period of 3 months. He was also fined exceeding the Speed Limit (over 30 km/hr).

* On New Year's Eve another P-Plater was fined for speeding by officers attached to Ryde Highway Patrol. The police were conducting speed enforcement duties on the M2 Motorway at West Pennant Hills when they detected (using a Lidar instrument) a 4WD travelleing at a speed of 154km/h in a signposted 100km/h area at 1.53am on Saturday 31st December. The 18-year-old male driver, produced a Provisional P1 licence. Police say he stated he was travelling into the city to pick up a family

member, in a vehicle owned by a parent. He was subsequently fined \$2,616 for Exceed Speed (over 45km/h) and his license was immediately suspended for a period of 6 months.

* A man whose P1 licence expired over two years ago was stopped by officers from The Hills Highway Patrol travelling at 175km/hr on the M2 Motorway at Baulkham Hills.

The 34-year-old from Baulkham Hills driving a Toyota Aurion in a sign posted 100 km/hr zone was stopped by police at about 1.45am on Wednesday, 28th December. A check revealed he was the holder of an NSW C Class P1 Provisional licence which had expired in August of 2019. The driver was subjected to a roadside breath test returning a positive reading, he was arrested and conveyed to Castle Hill Police Station returning a reading 0.114 grammes of alcohol per 210 litres of breath. He is due before Parramatta Local Court in February 2023 for Drive Motor Vehicle with Mid Range PCA – 1st Offence and Licenced Expired 2 years of more – 1st Offence. The number plates of the vehicle were not seized as the driver was not the registered owner of the vehicle.

LATE EXCUSE

A driver who told police he was running late for work has been charged with Drive whilst Disgualified and Exceeding the speed limit by more than 45 km/hr after he was stopped in Bella Vista on New Year's Eve. Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol detected the 26-yearold at about 8.30am on Saturday the 31st of December 2022, driving a white Renault Master van along Old Windsor Road, Bella Vista at 136 km/hr in a sign posted 80 km/hr zone.

Checks revealed that the driver was disqualified by the courts until May 2023. He is due before Parramatta Local Court in February for Drive Motor Vehicle during Disqualification period (1st offence) and Exceed Speed Limit by more than 45km/hr. The number plates of the vehicle were not seized as the vehicle was registered to a company and not the driver.

FATAL FIRE

Emergency services were called to a fire at a property in Quakers Hill at about 6.20pm on Friday, 30th December 2022.,

Fire and Rescue NSW fighters extinguished a blaze in the garage attached to a home and found the body of a woman was located inside the garage.

Offers from Riverstone Police Area Command attended and the site was examined by specialist forensic police.

An investigation into the cause and circumstances surrounding the fire is being held and a report will be prepared for the information of the Coroner.

DRINK DRIVING CHARGE

A 24-year-old man from Castle Hill has been charged with Mid Range drink driving after he was seen getting into a car and driving off on New Year's Eve. Hills Highway Patrol officers were leaving the carpark of Castle Hill Police Station at about 4.20am on Saturday, 31st of December 2022, and observed three people walking along Castle Street near the Police Station.

They said the group appeared to be unsteady on their feet and got into a red Suzuki Swift which was parked near by and drove away. The vehicle was stopped and the 24-year-old driver was subjected to a roadside breath test which returned a positive reading. The driver was arrested and conveyed to Castle Hill Police Station where he returned a reading of 0.107 grammes of alcohol per 210 litres of breath. His drivers' licence was immediately confiscated and suspended. He is due before Parramatta Local Court next month.

Inquiry into Hills Council By BEV JORDAN

Submissions to a Parliamentary inquiry into allegations of impropriety against agents of the Hills Shire Council and property developers in the region close on January 22nd 2023.

The Upper House inquiry is examining matters raised by Castle Hill Liberal MP Ray Williams in State Parliament on June 23rd last year made under parliamentary privilege.

Portfolio Committee No. 7 - Planning and Environment will also look at any matters relating to the integrity, processes of Council, employees and elected officials of council; the role and influence of developers and their interactions with councillors and members of parliament in the region.

The committee will be chaired by Greens MLC member Sue Higginson. Deputy Chair is Mark Pearson MLC Animal Justice Party. The committee also comprises of Liberals Aileen MacDonald and Lou Amat; ALP members Rose Jackson and Penny Sharpe plus National's Scott Barrett.

A statement from Hills Shire Council's General Manager Michael Edgar said: "Council supports the principles of transparency, open decision making, integrity and good governance. In fact, this Council was one of the first councils to establish an Audit Committee ... Council has an annual internal audit program along with an Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee (ARIC), and has proactively participated in a number

of external performance audits by the NSW Audit Office.

"Most recently, Council was selected to participate in the audit - Development applications: assessment and determinations stages. The audit reviewed how effectively each council assessed and determined Development Applications (DAs) and how they supported independent planning panels (local and regional) in their determination of DAs. The assessment also ensured councils carried out DA processes and assessments according to current legislation, regulations and government guidelines. Findings from the audit showed that Council has an outstanding reputation for development assessment and management processes, as well as professional oversight of its services and programs.

"In addition to this, The Hills is one of a few councils in Sydney meeting housing and job targets, which is extremely important for accommodating Sydney's growth. Council is also fit for the future and enjoys a high level of community satisfaction with its services. "Residents can be confident of the processes and systems Council has in place to appropriately manage DAs. All DAs are either



determined by qualified staff, Local or Regional Planning Panels and in some cases, the courts.

"All planning proposals are assessed by qualified staff and reported for a determination at an Ordinary Meeting of Council where the public can witness the decision-making process. All decisions are then referred to the NSW Department of Planning for progression or finalisation. Only a few planning proposals are delegated to Council for finalisation by the Department of Planning.

"Council holds a register that records all decisions of Council on planning matters and this is publicly available on Council's website."

Two days have been set aside for the public hearings (February 15th and 16th) with the committee due to table its report by 2nd March.

Joe Carbone and five friends met on the streets as teenagers practising parkour which essentially involves moving around by bouncing off structures, their hobby is now a business entertaining thousands of people around Australia.

This Australia Day Dauntless MC (pictured front cover) will be doing their fast-paced show at Bella Vista Farm at Norwest with acrobatics, fire, breakdancing, beat box, parkour and gymnastic routines taking centre stage.

Joe says there are three of the original crew left in a team that is now into its third generation with about 18 people making up the core team.

Since their local council asked them to do their first show in 2015, the Dauntless Movement Crew have been moving at great speed despite the huge slowdown through COVID restrictions.

"In 2022 we did about 400 events with 70 of those in December," says Joe.

"We are now the hype squad for the Sydney Kings games."

"Our motto is embracing athletic diversity so when we do a show we do everything ... parkour, acrobatics, Hip Hop and break dancing," says Joe.

Dauntless MC runs training workshops in schools and in several local council areas. "We are hoping to bring classes to the Hills," says Joe. "We have had a lot of requests."



A Survivor's Story By BEV JORDAN

MONICA MATAK EVANS was 43 when she was diagnosed with ovarian cancer.

The Kellyville resident had six rounds of chemo and now volunteers to raise awareness of Ovarian Cancer and raise funds for research. Her advice to women is to "pay attention" to their body.

If they have any symptoms that are unusual for them, for more than two weeks, get it checked out. Early detection is key.

This is her story:

"My name is Monica and 2017 was going to be my year! I had a new job but was a little tired, who isn't? I was aiming to lose weight - it was working I thought; I was watching what I was eating. I thought my hard work was paying off.

"I was feeling constipated, (too much info I know) and I had a sore lower back. All the symptoms I had been experiencing are symptoms of ovarian cancer but I had no knowledge about these signs and symptoms then. Unfortunately, the symptoms are so subtle and generally ovarian cancer is diagnosed in the later stages.

"Many women push the symptoms aside, as they are so vague. They are looking after their families and quite often put themselves last.

"Vague symptoms like bloating and fatigue are often confused with other women's health problems, IBS, menopause or food allergies and are easily explained away.

"Ovarian cancer is the leading cause of death of all gynaecological cancers. The reality is that I was one of the lucky ones. I was diagnosed early. Having been diagnosed at

stage one though was not a walk in the park for me. I still had invasive surgery, I still had chemo. I still lost my hair. I still feel fatigued at times.

at later stages. Less than half of the women diagnosed will survive beyond five years. Ovarian Cancer also has a high rate of recurrence so even though they may have had successful treatment, for many, the cancer

Below are some of the symptoms. It is important to see your GP if you experience any of the symptoms, especially if they are unusual for you and are persistent.

- Unexplained fatigue
- Unexplained weight gain or loss
- Changes in bowel habits such as constipation
- Abdominal or pelvic pain
- Increased abdominal size or persistent abdominal bloating
- Appetite loss or feeling full quickly or indigestion
- Lower back pain
- Urinary changes such as frequency or urgency

"Most women however, are diagnosed

"It has been 5 years since my diagnosis. I've been one of the lucky ones diagnosed early and no recurrence to date. Being diagnosed early I have gone on to lead a relatively normal life.







Boundaries for the current state seats of Baulkham Hills and Castle Hill have changed. The remodelled seat of Baulkham Hills has been renamed Kellyville for the 2023 election.

Transport Minister David Elliott (pictured), currently the Member for Baulkham Hills is retiring at this election.

Ray Williams has been endorsed by the Liberal Party to be their candidate for the newly named seat of Kellyville which takes in a large section of his old electorate.

Hills Deputy Mayor Mark Hodges has been endorsed by the Liberal Party to stand for the seat of Castle Hill. Changes have also been made to the electoral boundaries of the Seven Hills electorate, currently held by Liberal MP Mark Taylor, which has now been renamed Winston Hills.

The electoral boundaries were redrawn In August 2021, to ensure the number of eligible

voters in each district does not vary by more than 10 per cent from the average enrolment across all 93 electoral districts in NSW.

The new Castle Hill electorate is bounded by the M2, Windsor Road, Old Northern Rd and Castle Hill Rd, O'Haras and Cattai Creeks. It includes West Pennant Hills, Castle Hill, parts of Baulkham Hills, Annangrove, Kenthurst, Glenhaven, Dural and Middle Dural.

The new Kellyville Electorate takes in the suburbs of Kellyville, North Kellyville, Rouse Hill, Beaumont Hills, Norwest, Bella Vista and part of Baulkham Hills and Castle Hill. It is bounded by Old Windsor Rd, Toongabbie Creek, Windsor Rd and Cattai and Caddies Creeks. The renamed seat of Winston Hills includes the suburbs of



Glenwood, Baulkham Hills, Seven Hills, Winston Hills, Toongabbie, Constitution Hill, Northmead, Pennant Hills and Wentworthville.

A Few Good Men

Aaron Sorkin's ground-breaking debut play, later adapted into the 1992 Academy Award nominated film of the same name, was inspired by actual events that took place at Guantanamo Bay Naval Base in July 1986.

This Broadway hit tells the story of two military lawyers one callow and unmotivated, the other impassioned and driven – assigned to represent two United States Marines accused of Conspiracy to Commit Murder of a fellow Marine. In the course of defending their clients, the lawyers uncover a high-level conspiracy designed to eliminate weaker soldiers in the name of patriotism.

A Few Good Men considers the idea that a Marine's private code of unquestioning loyalty to "Unit, Corps, God, Country", breeds a dark flipside of self-righteousness.

The title came from the U.S. Marine Corps recruitment campaign, "We're looking for a few good men". The play explores and exposes what it means to truly be a "good man" in the United States Military.

It's a Sale!!!!!

OW IT'S 2023 and the post-Christmas and New Year Sales are over, many may have purchased gifts and other goods from the various on-line retailers. In this little piece I intend to look at what many did back in the late 1800's and early 1900's. In those days before the internet and mobile telephones if you wanted to purchase the latest innovation, appliance or fashion and lived in an outlying area away from the main city centres you would rely on mail order catalogues.

Printed catalogues first appeared in 1498 when Aldus Manutius of Venice printed a catalogue of books he was printing and distributed them to customers, whilst in 1667 English gardener William Lucas printed a seed catalogue containing prices which he distributed to his clients. One early cataloguer, in 1833, Antonio Fattorini started a watch club in Bradford, England which eventually transformed into the British retail chain store group of Empire Stores. But the first "mail order" catalogue was created by Welsh retailer Pryce Pryce-Jones (Yes that was his name) of Newtown, Wales who had acquired a drapery in 1856 and had named the drapery the Royal Welsh Warehouse selling local Welsh Flannel. In 1861, using the uniform Penny Post service in the UK which had been established in 1840 with the invention of postage stamps, he turned his small drapery business into a major retailing business by sending his catalogues to people throughout the UK and, eventually, to North America and the British colonies amassing 200,000 customers around the world including Queen Victoria, Florence Nightingale, European Royal households and the then Princess of Wales amongst many others.

Catalogues proved to be a boon to quite a few retailers such as department stores. You would order or subscribe to stores such as Farmers or Anthony Hordens in Sydney. Each major city would have similar stores such as Boans in Perth, Myer in Melbourne, Fitzgeralds in Hobart etc. These stores would send you a catalogue to peruse. These city-based stores gained hundreds of new customers from rural areas.

How did these retailers get their customers from the outlying areas? Well, as the saying goes, "It pays to advertise". They placed ads in newspapers and magazines which circulated in those areas from where they sought new customers. Some retailers targeted certain types of customers with their ads and catalogues. Farmers department store for example had separate catalogues aimed at men and women as well as general catalogues aimed at the entire family. Many retailers still place ads in publications where they hope to grow their market share.

As their sales increased with the growth of customers, it enabled the retailers to gauge where they may benefit from opening branch stores. The 1920's and 30's saw some growth with stores such as Grace Brothers expanding from their Broadway location in Sydney to Parramatta and Bondi Junction. Other department stores such as Mark Foys, Marcus Clarkes and McDowells followed suit and also spread out into the suburbs. Some further expansion of the Department store chains came about from acquisition of other large stores in country areas or interstate and outlying suburbs. Grace Brothers, for example, acquired JB Young of Canberra and Queanbeyan who had also taken over the NSW Country chain of John Meaghers. They were eventually converted to Grace Brothers for a couple of years until the Myer Emporium acquired Grace Brothers re badging the JB Young stores and Grace Bros stores to Myer. Myer also took over Farmers and the country chain of Western Stores. Anthony Horderns and Murdochs, which was situated on the corner of Park and George Sts, were acquired by Waltons. By the end of the 20th century, after a series of mergers and acquisitions and the introduction of online retailers, there were only two major Department store groups operating in Australia, that of Myer and their rival David Jones. The old names of many retailers have now been consigned to history and are just a memory for many.

Pele strode the world like a Colossus By LAWRENCE M

Pelé was more than just a once-in-a-century football genius. This goal-scoring Brazilian magician became a living legend not only in football but across all sports after bursting into the international arena as a 17-year-old in the 1958 World Cup.

He scored two goals in that final where Brazil vanquished Sweden 5-2, with his first goal, later selected as one of the finest in World Cup history.

I interviewed Pelé, then a roving ambassador for football, while working for the *Khaleej Times* in Dubai, in the nineties. This is easily one of my best, and most memorable interviews, because we grew up in a world where Pelé ranked among the most recognised faces, long before social media made stars of ordinary people. Pele strode the world like a Colossus but never lost his common touch.

Pelé's greatness was his ability to be humble and approachable, and also easily marketable not only for his beloved Brazil and club Santos, but also for the world game and his many sponsors. When Pelé sat down for his interview with **Khaleej Times**, it was a fulfilment of a dream for me and also a rare opportunity to get down and personal with the legend.

Alongside another sporting legend, Muhammad Ali, who I was also blessed to interview in the United Arab Emirates for another daily, the *Gulf News*, Pelé transcended sports and also waded bravely into politics, becoming the Sports Minister in Brazil. But whereas Ali loved being brash, bold, and provocative, Pelé was the down-to-earth superstar who inspired millions to take to football, which he turned into 'The Beautiful Game'.

During our lively interview, Pelé answered all questions without dodging any like did with so many defenders during his prime, and flashed his million-dollar smile whenever he felt something was something outrageous or funny.

Despite a massive media and fan crush outside, Pele spoke like he had all the time in the world. We spoke about his career, his highs and lows, his family, the controversy at that time with his government, and the development of football in the Gulf Arab countries among other things. His jovial face and joyful laugh when I asked him if I could take a picture with him, capped the unforgettable interview.



While there will always be comparisons with modern day football greats like Diego Maradona and Lionel Messi, Pelé is unrivalled because of his three World Cups wins (1958, 1962, and 1970), Athlete of the Century in 1999 by the International Olympic Council, World Player of the Century in 2000 and joint winner of the FIFA Player of the Century (with Maradona).

Playing professional football at just 15, the 1.73cm star scored a record 1279 goals in 1363 matches, and is the highest scorer, according to the Guinness Book of World Records. This includes a record 77 goals for Brazil.

There will always be a new football superstar but there will never be another Pelé. May the turf lie gently on him.

Box Hill to get huge sports complex By LAWRENCE MACHADO

The rapidly growing suburb of Box Hill will be host to a massive multi-sports complex and reserve, which will benefit local cricketers and basketballers.

The Hills Shire Council has already begun work on Box Hill's first dedicated sports and recreation centre at Brindle Pathway.

The masterplan for the 5.3 hectare complex features two full sizes rectangular fields which can be used as a cricket oval. There will be two

cricket nets, which will be a boon considering the growing number of young cricketers competing in the local and representative events.

The installation of specialist sports field lighting will make night time practice and play possible.

The Hills Shire Mayor Dr Peter said these are exciting times for the Box Hill community and underlines the council's commitment to improving sporting facilities and active lifestyles.

"We are so excited to begin construction at Box Hill's first sport and recreation reserve," Mayor Gangemi said.

"This project will deliver the sport and recreational facilities that this new community needs – now and into the future. It also complements council's on-going investment into providing quality sporting facilities that promotes health, wellbeing and community connectedness.

"I look forward to people using this new sports complex very soon."

The new centre, to open in mid-2024, will have an amenities building, a children's playground with picnic facilities and a 130-space carpark. Residents can also enjoy a nature walk and shared pathways, which will connect to the wider Shire network.

The present stage of construction involves the importation of soil to reach the required design level, with work speeding up when Terry Road is reopened for traffic.

"We will be taking advantage of the school holiday period, which usually has lower traffic levels, to get as much done as possible without overly impacting residents," Mayor Gangemi

NEW FOOTBALL, CRICKET FIELDS

A third natural turf football field and a competition standard cricket field at West Pennant Hills will be welcomed by the Hills sports fans after the council accepted a tender at a recent meeting. The upgrade at the George Thornton Reserve includes the movement of two existing fields to the east, the renewal of the lighting and irrigation as well as the construction of a new cricket pitch and cricket practice nets.

Mayor Dr Gangemi said these works will result in three rectangular senior-sized natural turf playing fields as well as a premier competition level standard cricket ground.

The upgrade begins this month, and should be opened by early 2024, weather permitting.







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June Long's Legacy Continues

Those who knew her say that June Long was a one of a kind; an energetic woman who lived for others. She had a vision back in 1979 to create a community for the stay-at-home mums and retirees to come together each week, to learn craft and make friends.

The program was to have volunteers as its backbone and heart. It was overwhelmingly successful when it began, with more than 200 people signing up (the fees were \$2 per term with free kindergarten and baby minding) filling every corner of the newly-constructed Castle Hill Seventh Day Adventist church. This was the birthplace of Creative Activities.

44 years on, the community has changed. More working mothers mean the majority of the participants are retirees. There are other similar programs and alternate means of learning craft, but Creative Activities continues. June sadly left

us back in 2016 but continued to attend until she was 94. Her daughter, Carolyn now leads a very faithful band of volunteers and a contented group of attendees. Despite Covid shutdowns in recent years, the program managed an almost full year of classes in 2022 and there's plenty of room for more to join. As you can imagine, the fees have changed a little over the past 44 years Cost: \$30 per 8 week term (\$25 for seniors). Term 1 commences February 8 2023.
