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
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Connecting a Community

Growth Plans Released

An extra 56,000 jobs in the next 18 years, new public spaces, more investment opportunities, housing and vital infrastructure to support a growing population are all part of The Hills Shire Council's 20-year vision for Norwest, Castle Hill and Rouse Hill.

The draft plans for the three precincts (all centred around Metro stations) are now on public exhibition with residents invited to have their say. Submissions close on July 31st.

The plans include a new waterfront park at Norwest and the potential expansion of Arthur Whitling Park at Castle Hill, an 'Eat Street' in McDougall Lane in Castle Hill plus an enhanced and extended Main Street.

Hills Shire Council General Manager Michael Edgar said: "This is our vision to create more opportunity for the people of the Hills, including jobs close to home, more housing, new public spaces and vital new infrastructure connections.

"By concentrating high-density developments within walking distance of a world-class train line, we can preserve our existing residential character whilst providing a mix of housing options for future generations and more places where people can set up a business, such as a retail outlet or café," he said.

"Under these plans, there is an estimated capacity for around 56,000 extra jobs by 2041, with a large share of this identified within the

Norwest Strategic Centre. This means our residents can find jobs that match their skills, work closer to home, commute less, and spend more time with family and friends."

Key features in Norwest Precinct Plan

- Capacity for 30,000 extra jobs with dedicated areas for commercial office development.
- Capacity for 18,100 homes;
- Enhancement of the Cattai Creek Greenway Link Corridor next to Castle Hill Showground;
- New pedestrian bridges and links over Norwest Boulevard, Windsor, Carrington and Showground Roads

Key features Castle Hill

- Capacity for 13,500 extra jobs with dedicated areas for commercial office development within and around the Ring Road, including an education precinct with a new university;
- Capacity for 7,400 homes;
- New urban plazas and expansion and enhancement of existing local parks;
- New pedestrian bridges and links over Pennant and Terminus Streets; and

Key features Rouse Hill:

- Capacity for 8,800 extra jobs with dedicated areas for commercial office development that can capitalise on the planned Rouse Hill Hospital;
- Capacity for 2,750 homes;
- A new central open space and plaza area in the undeveloped lands north of the town centre:
- New pedestrian bridges and links over Rouse Hill Drive, Commercial and Windsor Roads;

The draft Precinct Plans will be available for comment via Council's website, www.thehills.nsw. gov.au, under the 'Have Your Say' tab. Council will also be holding workshops and drop-in sessions throughout the consultation period.

Council's Town Planners will also be on hand to answer questions via the Forward Planning Hotline, 9843 0597.

Submissions and input from the consultation period will be considered by Council later in 2023 when deciding on whether to adopt the draft Precinct Plans.

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ASHES RETURNED

A family has been reunited with the ashes of their beloved aunt following devastating floods in the Hawkesbury region.

Sergeant Ben Garrod was patrolling near Brooklyn Boat Ramp when he was approached by a local business owner about an urn next to a skip bin nearby.

Noticing the urn bore the words 'Mollie 'May' Grinsted', Sergeant Garrod commenced inquiries with funeral homes so he could reunite Mollie's ashes with her family.

He discovered that Mollie 'May' Grinsted had passed away in 2007 at the impressive age of 101, and that her next of kin, nephew Peter Hart, had taken care of her ashes at the place she loved the most – his idyllic property by the Hawkesbury River in Lower Portland.

Mollie's ashes were kept on the bookshelf in the bedroom where she had spent her final years. Peter's entire house went underwater during last year's floods, and Mollie's ashes and many other items were washed away.



Sergeant Garrod said: "Being able to return her ashes to her family is such a special and rewarding feeling."

Peter Hart said: "Mollie never wanted to leave here, she loved it here and now she has come back home. I'll never forget this – I am so grateful to Sergeant Garrod for going above and beyond to bring Mollie home."

SEXUAL ASSAULT CHARGE

A member of the Comanchero outlaw motorcycle gang (OMCG) has been charged with various historical domestic, child sexual abuse, assault, and firearm-related offences, following an investigation by Hawkesbury detectives.

In October last year, officers from Hawkesbury Police Area Command received reports a 29-year-old woman was allegedly sexually assaulted by a man known to her between 2017 and 2021.

Detectives commenced an investigation under Strike Force Muecke.

Following inquiries, a 60-year-old man was arrested by detectives in Bathurst on 1st February and was charged with several offences.

As part of ongoing investigations, strike force detectives spoke with a further two women – aged 19 and 39. Following subsequent inquiries, investigators travelled to Bathurst on Wednesday 19th April where they arrested the 60-year-old man at the police station after he was transported from a correctional facility. The man was charged with groom child under 14 years for unlawful sexual activity, three counts of aggravated indecency - victim under 16 and under authority offender, two counts of supply prohibited drug small quantity to child by adult and supply prohibited drug.

Police will allege in court that the man – who is known to the women – allegedly sexually abused the 19-year-old when she was aged between nine and 13 and supplied her with prohibited drugs when she was aged between 11 and 13.

Additionally, he was charged with four counts of common assault (DV), possess unauthorised pistol, two counts of attempt stalk/intimidate intend fear of harm and assault occasioning actual bodily harm (DV). It will be further alleged the man allegedly assaulted the 39-year-old woman on multiple occasions and threatened her with a firearm.

Investigations under Strike Force Muecke continue. Anyone with information about this incident is urged to contact Crime Stoppers. Information is treated in strict confidence.

DRINK DRIVING

A 38-year-old man has been charged with High Range Drink Driving following a collision at Gainsford Drive, Kellyville on ANZAC Day.

Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol were alerted at 9pm on Tuesday 25th April that a Mazda sedan had collided into a kerb. When officers arrived at the scene, the driver was fast asleep still in the vehicle and there was a strong smell of alcohol in the car. The driver was woken up and subjected to a roadside breath test returning a positive reading and taken to Castle Hill Police Station. The breath analysis returned a reading of 0.341 grammes of alcohol per 210 litres of breath. His drivers' licence was immediately confiscated and suspended. He is due before Parramatta Local Court next month for Drive with High Range PCA – 2nd Offence.

FAGAN PARK ATTACK

Emergency services were called to Fagan Park at Galston at 12.30pm on Sunday (30th April) to reports that a man had been assaulted.

Police were told that two unknown males threatened a man aged in his 60s who was with his family at the time. The older man was punched to the face before the pair fled on foot.

Officers from Ku Ring Gai and The Hills Police Area Commands – along with PolAir and the Police Dog Unit – established a perimeter and commenced an extensive search of the surrounding area.

No arrests have been made and investigations into the incident continue.

Anyone who may have information that could assist is urged to contact Hornsby Police Station or Crime Stoppers.

SPEEDING TEENS

An L -Plate motorcyclist has had his Learner licence suspended by police after he was clocked travelling 78 km/hr over the sign posted speed limit in Castle Hill on ANZAC Day.

Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol were travelling behind a Yamaha Motorcycle along Showground Road at about 11.45pm on Tuesday 25th which was travelling at 80km/ hr in a sign posted 60 km/hr zone. As officers were about to stop the motorcycle, the rider was heard changing gears and began to accelerate away with officers following. The motorcycle reached speeds of 138km/hr and was stopped

. The 19-year-old male rider from Cherrybrook was issued an infringement notice for Exceed Speed Limit - over 45 kph, his NSW driver's licence was confiscated and suspended on the spot for a period of 6 months as the number plates of the motorcycle were seized and confiscated for 3 months.

A few days earlier a red P-Plate driver was stopped by police driving at 56km/hr over the speed limit in Kellyville.

Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol suspended the driver's P1 licence after detecting him travelling at 116km/hr in a sign posted 60 km/hr zone at around 10.40pm on Saturday 22th of April.

The 19-year-old from Cherrybrook was driving a Nissan Pulsar. He was issued an infringement notice for Exceed Speed Limit - over 45 kph, his NSW driver's licence was suspended and confiscated on the spot for a period of 6 months. The vehicle was not owned by the driver and the number plates remained on the vehicle.

If you have ever wondered how to connect with your teen while they are constantly online this free forum at Castle Hill may have some useful tips and answers.

The expert speakers include Terrie Toner who has over 30 years experience working with families and adolescents, dealing with relationships and family distress, mental health issues, stress, depression and anxiety,

She will be joined by Dan Hardie, experienced teen counsellor, who founded My Strengths Australia. Dan has worked with young people for his entire career and is passionate about helping them overcome those obstacles that keep them anxious and blocked.

Hills Police Command's Youth Liaison Officer, Senior Constable Ethan West is the final speaker. His main role is developing strategies to engage and implement crime prevention initiatives and diversion strategies for offending and at risk youth in the area.

The free parent forum will be held on Wednesday May 10th at the Pioneer Theatre underneath Castle Hill Library with registrations open from 6pm.

The forum has been organised by the Hills Domestic Violence Prevention Network (HDVPN) and has been held for many years due to demand.

HDVPN Convenor Uma Menon said: "The topic this year is 'dis/CONNECTing with your TEEN - How to connect with your teen when they're connected online. It can often seem like our teens are inclined to be using technology for a bigger part of their daily lives in this digital world. It is also essential to remember that, just as teens do need to have good boundaries and rules for offline behaviour, they most certainly need guidance to protect them when online. "While understanding the potential risks for our teens when they are connected online, this forum for parents will be presented by experts on how to help you have a healthy relationship in this digital world with your teen."

MC for the event is Youth Worker and student support worker Tara Gleig who says the forum will provide new insight and strategies.

"Parenting is a big job which comes with a lot of pressure to have perfect children, however along the way it becomes increasingly complex as we enter the adolescent stage," she said.

"Factors such as technology, peer pressure, curiosity, pushing boundaries, sexuality and

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BREEDing Innovation By JOSH KERWICK

From Bollywood to Western Sydney, Sanjeev Mehra is helping to spotlight a local not-for-profit organisation that helps people achieve their business goals.

Despite his renown as an actor, director and writer in Bollywood, Sanjeev had difficulty finding work in Australia after relocating from India. He started Garage Film Studios and moved into the BREED Business Hub in 2017 - but he found much more than just an office space for nominal rent.

BREED Australia is a not-for-profit that offers business incubation and mentoring services. The Business Hub is located in Quakers Hill's Nirimba Education Precinct, inhabiting a three-storey building that was once living quarters for the old Naval Air Repair Yard. Now, it is host to over 30 tenants who are directly assisted by BREED, who offer reduced rental rates and consultation services to local people starting businesses.

Emmanuel Martin, general manager of BREED and long-time Western Sydney local, is a strong believer in elevating the stories of small businesses. "Stories have the power to inspire and change the world. When we wake up, when we go to bed, we hear stories. Either through our own thoughts, or social media, or we read the newspaper - whatever it is, it's important to tell stories." It's those stories that Sanjeev has been able to help tell through video, showing the common thread that ties young beautician Annalise Matar, visual artist Caroline Khalil and horse wrangler Lyn Lynch together. Despite their ages ranging from 16 to 61, the three women have all had assistance with their small, independent businesses thanks to BREED's entrepreneurship courses.

Sanjeev comments that BREED has given him much more than just a base for his business: "If I need to shoot a film around here, they will help me. And they have promoted us through their website and Facebook page. Any time an event happens



Formed over 25 years ago, the Blacktown Regional Economic Employment Development (BREED) Taskforce came into existence after a study showed that youth unemployment was tied to a lack of education. BREED came into the picture to be a guide for young people in the area, and to assist small businesses by giving them the skills to be successful.

After spending almost three decades in the corporate world, Emmanuel moved into his

current role at BREED after spending 2019 on the Board of Directors. His first week on the job was in March 2020, settling into his role as the country was shutting down due to COVID.

Despite the challenges presented by the pandemic, Emmanuel immediately drafted a plan to ensure BREED and the businesses under its care survived. "Half of the businesses struggled, they couldn't pay their rent because there was no money coming in," he says. "But we managed to fund their rent for three months, and we survived."

In the Business Hub, a sense of community is extremely important for Emmanuel and administration manager Amber Carlson. Coming from a real estate background, Amber was enticed by working at BREED thanks to its focus on helping the community. "It really interested me, because they talked about being a charity and a nonfor-profit, and that was something that really resonated with me."

Although the company team is small, Amber says that she never feels lonely thanks to people like Sanjeev with whom she constantly interacts. "I'm surrounded by a community of business partners that I have a really good relationship with. There's always someone saying good morning or good afternoon, and it just really helps my day go by."

Amber has been a driving force behind the Sunrise Studio, a community space for hire that can be used for shooting videos, podcasting and editing. She and Emmanuel believe that


it's a space that will help the local community by making audio and video equipment as accessible as possible. "It took a long time," Amber comments, "but we just wanted to make sure we got everything right. And it's not like we can't continue to build upon the room, it's a nice foundation. It's been a long process, but I'm really proud that we've made it."

Louise Azzopardi was the first to fully utilise the Sunrise Studio, using ANZAC Day to film seven episodes of her new podcast Let's Talk Apprenticeships with co-host Raman Badekar. A life coach and heavy vehicle mechanic, Louise is using her podcast to address many frequently asked questions about securing an apprenticeship.

She says that "BREED has really allowed me to produce big things locally, with all this nice equipment. Being able to get it done locally has really allowed us to be anchored straight into the community."

Stories like those of Sanjeev and Louise are common at BREED as the team works hard to continue supporting local people. Paired with learning programs for young people and providing assistance to small businesses all across Western Sydney, the Sunrise Studio is the latest stone on the path of innovation that BREED has brought to the community.

For Emmanuel, his role is more a passion project than work: "It's not a job - jobs are corporate. For me, it's a chance to live my life's purpose, which is to help others find their goals and dreams," he says. "Through BREED, I can do it."

Tiny Homes Expo By BEV JORDAN

The fascination for "Tiny houses" has seen a huge surge in demand with builder Michael Duffy pivoting away from project homes to build Tiny houses exclusively under the brand, Highlands Tiny Homes.

He said 20 years ago he was building 2 Tiny houses a year alongside his building business, by 2015 Tiny houses made up half his usual business.

"I could see that this was no short term fad as the more house and land prices increased the more enquiries we got about Tiny houses," said Michael.

"We are now doing Tiny houses full time and as a small family business aim for between 20 to 30 a year depending on the size of the house."

He says they can build Tiny houses to suit most budgets from basic cabins to the latest design which has three bedrooms, a good sized kitchen and living area, a bathroom and ensuite for under \$200,000.

He told the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News that clients include people setting up BnBs and others in their 20s with parents with big enough backyards for a Tiny Home.

"I have three boys aged 17, 20 and 23 and they can see that they will probably never afford to enter the housing market ... so Tinys are the perfect entry level for a generation of children," he said. The company has also built Tiny houses for people in the South Coast affected by the fires and in the Lismore and Ballina area for people affected by floods.

Tiny Homes Expo organiser, Phae Barrett says Individual councils in NSW are "the only thing" holding up the idea of people living in a tiny house.

"There is more support towards using them as 'temporary homes', which is actually unhelpful as it aligns with AirBNB and short stays - which doesn't help with the housing crisis."

She said while NSW State government legislation enables people directly affected by "disasters" such as floods and bushfires to live in tiny homes currently for two years it did not cover the housing crisis stress caused by rental shortages, interest rates increases, and the rising cost of living.

The upcoming Tiny Homes Expo will be the 9th Tiny Home event she has organised. She says in the past 5 years the number of businesses involved in Tiny Homes has grown from 30 to over 500.



There will be 40 exhibitors at the Tony Homes Expo at Hawkesbury Showgrounds from May 12th to May 14th. Michael Duffy's Highlands Tiny Homes will be showcasing four designs including the two-bedroom Brooklyn which is pictured.

Due to the Expo's popularity it will be a ticketed event with tickets ranging in price from \$20 to \$30 and staggered entry times. For details visit www.tinyhomesexpo.com.au

The Bond Opens

The landmark timber building which houses the \$10 million world-class GenesisCare cancer centre at Norwest certainly impressed those that gathered for the official opening by Hills Shire Mayor Dr Peter Gangemi last week.

The Bond building at the corner of Elizabeth Macarthur Drive and Norbrik Drive, adjacent to Norwest Private Hospital, is one of Australia's first health and medical facilities purpose-built from mass timber to enhance the wellbeing and health of its occupants.

It is the first commercial building in a larger masterplanned health and medical precinct being developed by Mulpha in Norwest and is anchored by a range of specialist providers including GenesisCare Oncology offering access to comprehensive cancer care, including surgery, medical oncology, and radiation therapy; fertility specialist Dr Antony Lighten who has a specialised IVF clinic, reproductive surgery and day hospital; psychology allied healthcare provider Talbot Centre, and Douglas Hanley Moir pathology.

Space has also been taken up by medical imaging, orthodontic, obstetrics and gynaecology practices, as well as a café, restaurant, and 110-space Kinda-Mindi childcare centre.

Mulpha's Head of Developments Tim Spencer said: "This cutting-edge building had been purpose-built to transform the experience of people-centred healthcare, as well as provide a one-stop-shop for patients in the fast-growing northwest corridor.

"In addition to offering design flexibility and unique aesthetics, The Bond's CLT construction gives incredible strength and efficiency, and the aspiration in the drive to be carbon-neutral over an occupant's lifecycle, something that proved to be increasingly attractive to bluechip clients."

Fergus Rourke, GenesisCare NSW General Manager said: "A cancer diagnosis can be very challenging for an individual and their loved ones. Having access to care close to home makes getting to treatment easier.

"The GenesisCare team will work with surgical, medical and imaging health professionals within The Bond precinct and the adjacent Norwest Private Hospital.

"Our integrated approach to cancer care aims to provide patients access to seamless, personalised care, and ensure they feel supported throughout all stages of their treatment journey."

The Bond was designed using stateof-the-art cross-laminated timber (CLT) for THE BOND

the floorplates, walls and stairs, as well as traditional laminated timber columns and beams forthe frame, plus full-height glazing for natural light.

The fabric of the building was chosen in large part for its biophilic properties, with visible timber known to increase feelings of wellbeing and optimism as well as improving concentration for people working within such buildings. Two more purpose-built health and commercial buildings are planned.

Tim Spencer said that The Bond plays a key role in Mulpha's long-term commitment to the transformation of Norwest Business Park into a world-leading innovation, lifestyle and economic hub.

Joel Sedger was 18 months old when he attended his first Hills Relay For Life event with his mum Melissa at Castle Hill Showground ... he was wearing a Survivor's sash.

Now 17, Joel has taken part in every Hills Relay For Life since then and this year will be having his mullet shaved off to raise money for cancer research and support programs.

Joel was a baby when he was diagnosed with stage 3 Neuroblastoma and started chemotherapy at the age 12 weeks, undergoing six rounds of chemo treatment in 10 months.

When his mum accompanied her toddler around the track at Castle Hill Showground for their first Carers and Survivor's lap Joel was in remission.

Every year people look out for Joel. He has shaved his hair once before but the apprentice electrician decided 3 years ago to grow a mullet with the express purpose of shaving it off for the Cancer Council. It is now a healthy 35cm long

Joel said: "I am shaving my head for relay and donating my hair to give back to the community that supported my family while I was going through treatment. I don't really remember much of my cancer journey as I was so young, one thing I do remember is coming to relay each year. It was really up there with birthdays and Christmas."


His mum Melissa said: "I am so proud of him for doing this, he has grown quite attached to his mullet! Personally, I can't wait to see it go!".

Family friend and Hills Relay For Life volunteer committee member Jaime Berglin (pictured with Joel on the front cover) will also be having her head shaved on the main stage at Hills Relay For Life at 12.15pm on Saturday May 20th alongside Kellyville businesswoman Sharon Capizzi.

Jaime said: "My hair is a huge part of my pride/identity and being able to make choices about what I do with my hair means a lot to me, and I always thought I'd be devastated if I lost my hair for some reason, such as cancer.

"Then I thought about how so many cancer patients and survivors don't get the choice, and I felt like one of the most meaningful ways I could show support and raise money would be giving up something that is so important to me.

"Relay is important to me because everyone needs community, help and compassion, and when you're going through some of the scariest, most confusing times of your life that's even more important.

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"So many lives, including mine, have been and will be touched by cancer and a cancer free future is something I want to see and be a part of. '

Sharon, who is captain of the BNI Prime team, said: "The Relay for Life annual event is very close to my heart. I have too many family and friends who have had, and are thankfully in remission, or are currently going through the hell of treatment for one form of cancer or another. And there's those we have last to this insidious disease. This will be my fifth head shave. Why do I do it? To show my support for those who didn't have the choice of losing their hair from the horrible treatment they go through."

The 24-hour Hills Relay For Life will be held at Castle Hill Showground from 9.30am on Saturday May 20th.

Participants can walk as many laps of the 400m track and stay as long as they like. Some people enjoy camping overnight.

National Parks and Wildlife Services Blue Mountains

Notice of 1080 Program

NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) is conducting an aerial baiting program in Dharug National Park (NP), Manobalai Nature Reserve (NR), Parr State Conservation Area (SCA), Wollemi NP, Wollemi SCA and Yengo NP from **Monday 22nd May 2023 to Friday 2nd June 2023.**

The operation will use 1080 (sodium fluoroacetate) poison for the control of wild dogs and foxes.

The program is designed to minimise predator impacts on wildlife, especially threatened species, and to minimise impact of wild dogs on neighbouring stock.

Signs will be placed at the entry to the baiting location. Domestic pets are not permitted in NSW National Parks managed lands. Pets and working dogs may be affected (1080 is lethal to cats and dogs). Pets and working dogs must be restrained or muzzled in the vicinity and must not enter the baiting location. In the event of accidental poisoning seek immediate veterinary assistance.





Climbing Everest to Save Lives By JOSH KERWICK

Five months from now, Joe Capaldi will be braving the cold weather and steep climb towards Mount Everest Base Camp with thirteen other travellers. At 5,364 metres above sea level, it's one of the world's most iconic ascents and beautiful locations.

But for Joe, whose business and wider family is based in the Hills, the monthly training hikes or physically demanding concreting and building he does for work are small steps in a long journey that has led him to the tallest mountain in the world.

Nineteen years ago, Joe's wife Danielle gave premature birth to two twin girls - Madison and Charlotte. At eight weeks old, Madison was found to have a condition called Necrotising Enterocolitis (NEC), a disease that attacks the bowels of babies born prematurely. Taken to the Royal Hospital for Women's NICU, Madison received non-stop, quality care; but it was sadly not enough to save the young girl's life.

Although stricken by grief, the loss of Madison inspired the couple to make a change. "It all started in lieu of flowers at Madison's funeral," says Joe. "We decided to donate money to the hospital, and we've been fundraising ever since."

Since that day, the Madison Capaldi Research Fund has gathered nearly \$3 million in donations for NEC research - money that has made a tangible difference on both a local and international level. At the Royal Hospital, about 20 infants a year would pass away from the disease; now, it's only one or two.

Globally, the research has expanded into Canada, the UK, South Africa and Japan to prevent even more deaths internationally. "We're saving babies when we can. It helps the families, the uncles, cousins and friends of the family. It's good," says Joe.

The Everest Base Camp trip is the latest event organised by the MCRF that aims to raise more awareness and funds for the treatment of NEC. All money raised will go to funding WithHolding or continuing Enteral feeds Around blood Transfusion (or WHEAT) trials, which aims to determine if refraining from feeding during a blood transfusion reduces the chances of NEC occuring in premature babies.

The MCRF is aiming to raise \$100,000 and have already achieved over 25% of their goal, with over \$60,000 raised at time of writing. The group will depart on the 29th of September from Sydney airport, heading for Nepal to begin the adventure of a lifetime. Those attending work in many fields, from librarians and tech workers to CEOs and nurses.

Marco Scannone is a long-time friend of Joe and one of those undertaking the Everest challenge. A broker by day, he's preparing for the trip by consistently running along the streets of Kenthurst.

Yet Marco says that the biggest challenge of the trip is the time necessary to commit to it. "Everybody is putting in time away from the family, time away from work and to fundraise. That's the biggest challenge and the most pleasing thing to see that everyone is willing to do that."




Joe admits that it's easy to get emotional when ruminating on what others have helped him, Danielle, Charlotte and his son Noah achieve. He's extremely thankful to the Royal Hospital for Women Foundation for their unending support, saying that the whole journey has been "quite humbling."

When the Everest Base Camp leaves in September, Joe is certain Madison will be there with them: "I think my daughter is proud of us and what we're doing, so she'll look after us out there. We'll all come back safe and sound - we have an angel."

Angelina, Olivia strike gold at Australian LA Titles By LAWRENCE MACHADO

Angelina Burford and Olivia Scott-Rogers were the golden girls as The Hills District Little Athletics shone brightly at the 2023 Coles Australian Little Athletics Championships in Melbourne.

Angelina was unbeatable in the under-14 girls' 90m hurdles and 200m hurdles, winning a rare double at the highest Little Athletics arena in Australia.

Olivia cemented her form at the 2023 NSW Little Athletics Championships by capturing gold in the girls' under-13 high jump. Olivia has been in excellent form this season, winning the same event at the state titles at Homebush in March.

Jack Proudford, the reigning NSW LA under-14 100m champion, won silver at the Australian championships, to make it one of the most successful nationals for the Hills team. He ran fourth in the 200m.

Harrison Ferns, the fourth Hills team member, finished sixth in the under-14 boys 800m, an experience which should help him in the next season.

Hills District Little Athletics president Nathan Scott-Rogers said this is a great end to their season. "Our athletes represented our club and Team NSW with distinction, between them competing in six events, and achieving three gold medals, one silver, and two top 10 placings," Nathan said.

"It's an immensely proud moment for Hills District Little A's to see four from our club competing on the highest stage, and to achieve what they have is simply outstanding. It's a wonderful way to end the Little Athletics season and I've no doubt their efforts will act to inspire others competing in their school carnivals and our new season come September.

"In recent times, we've seen Sally Shokry, Josh Atkinson and Nick Hough move on from their Hills District Little A's journey and compete on the world stage.

"We hope there's more that go on to achieve their dreams and we'll be behind them every step of the way."

The Hills District LA had a bumper membership in their 51st season with more than 900 athletes.

Tokyo Olympian Nick Hough, 29, is one of the star alumni from the Hills, winning the 110m gold at the inaugural Youth Olympic Games in Singapore in 2010, and the 110m silver at the 2012 IAAF World Junior Championships. He won the 110m bronze in 2018 Commonwealth

The stakes are high in the nationals with the winners qualifying for Little League World Series in Williamsport, USA, where there also be attention from talent scouts.

Adrian is a pitcher and plays first base. In five years, he has shown immense promise and like Adam, has inherited the baseball genes from Dad Vasko Jankuloski, who played for Wollongong Cardinals.

Mum Diane Jankuloski said her sons, who attend Bede Polding College, Windsor, moved clubs to "achieve their baseball dreams".

"They both started baseball at Hawkesbury Hawks, and are great pitchers who are truly passionate about the game," Danielle said. "They have played club baseball together and won premierships together.

"Both Adam and Adrian are very committed to the Hills and truly love playing baseball. They both would love to go to America and play there one day."

Finals Concert of The Hills Young Musicians




All finals will receive comment sheets from the judges, and certificate awards.

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THE LADY LOVES TO DANCE

MAKING A POINTE & KEEPING THE KIDS ON THEIR TOES.

In recent times, particularly, there has been a great deal of discussion regarding the lessening of physical activity of children. The amount of screen time spent by children on computers and mobile phones has led to obesity in some and physical weakness in others. This has caused me to investigate how one group of young children in Hills during the 1960s passed their time.

In the early 1960s Glenda Lloyd, a young girl of 17 who had studied ballet, decided that she would like to teach others a subject that she really enjoyed. In fact, she had decided at the age of 12 that teaching ballet was where she wished her life to lead. She had also been told in early life that her great grandmother danced with the world-famous prima-ballerina Anna Pavlova.

At the time, Castle Hill was mostly rural with five acre lots. However, Woolworths had seen potential in the district and had opened a supermarket in Old Northern Rd, opposite Showground Road, so Glenda thought "if Castle Hill is good enough for Woolworths, it is good enough for me". With that she opened her own ballet school after securing a nearby hall at the local RSL, then located on Old Castle Hill Rd, where the present Metro station is now located. After placing notices in the local newspapers, the Glenda Lloyd School of Ballet was born. She opened with a view to only teaching classical ballet but around a month after opening she realised that she had to offer something else also. So as time went on, she offered a theatre

class and much later also introduced other forms of dance including Jazz and finally Tap.

After the RSL hall became unavailable, the school moved to the Gangemi building in Old Northern Rd. As the rooms were not really suitable the school then moved to the Terminus Street Kindergarten and stayed there for a number of years successfully until the hall was carpeted. Then it moved to the Wesley Uniting Church Hall for the next 28 years.

Life for the school was not always kind. The school had a frustrating time during 1990 when they had contracted to use a portion of the Council owned Hills Centre then located in Carrington Rd Castle Hill. Glenda had a contract to hire the Hall for ballet classes for five Saturday mornings. After using the hall for three of those contracted mornings she was informed with less than twenty hours notice that the hall was not available on the fourth Saturday morning due to a booking for a seminar of medical practitioners and that the ballet classes would be moved to the Council Chambers which caused much consternation not only with the ballet students and their parents but also aroused community disquiet. A group then headed by Jim Gooch of the Concerned Resident's Action Group was particularly vocal regarding the treatment of the Ballet School by the Hills Centre management. Both the Manager and the Assistant Manager of the Hills Centre resigned their positions shortly after.

A number of Glenda's pupils went on to success after getting their start at Glenda's school of dancing, with a few appearing on stage overseas in the UK, USA and France. A former student of Glenda's was offered and accepted a contract with the Stadtheatre Ballet in Bern, Switzerland, such was the quality of teaching at Glenda's school. The school was active throughout the community participating in fetes, fairs and festivals providing entertainment and winning numerous awards in the community during its lifetime.

During its forty five years of operation from 1962 through to 2007 Glenda has kept thousands of Hills district kids on their toes doing worthwhile exercises through dance helping with poise and posture.

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Positive use of Green Space

North Kellyville has a new 'pocket park' with a fenced playground and kickabout play area.

The Mayor of The Hills Shire, Dr Peter Gangemi, has cut the ribbon on Deepwater Circuit Reserve, the latest in a series of new playgrounds built adjacent to stormwater management basins. Deepwater Circuit Reserve is in addition to the other playgrounds that have opened alongside new stormwater basins in North Kellyville, including McMillian Circuit and Barry Road Reserves. The basin helps prevent downstream flooding and removes pollutants from stormwater run-off before entering the natural watercourse. Work will continue at Deepwater Circuit Reserve, including landscaping and the planting of native vegetation, over the next month.

We're getting on with the job of building the essential infrastructure that new communities like North Kellyville need, but we're not letting the green spaces that surround stormwater basins go to waste. We are utilising these spaces for residents to exercise, play and socialise within walking distance of their homes.

"The playground will include two slides – one for older children and another for toddlers – multiple climbing structures, and an abacus. There's also space where people can kick a ball or enjoy a picnic and relax beneath the picnic shelter, where a table and seating are available," Mayor Gangemi said.

The multi-purpose reserves are in addition to the local parks, such as Withers Road and Oxlade Street Reserves, and sporting complexes with playgrounds already under construction, including Stringer Road and Samantha Riley Drive Reserves. An additional playground and stormwater basin at Kumbatine Circuit Reserve, also located in North Kellyville, is under construction and is expected to open later in 2023.

He's the Managing Director of the Insight Intelligence Group, ex-military and diplomatic security-intelligence services specialist as well as the author of at least 6 best selling books. He currently features on Alive on Fridays 2-4pm with his show LIFE: THE BATTLEFIELD. Everything in his radio show is drawn from first-hand experience. From his vulnerable childhood to his 1800 consecutive days as a combatant in the brutal Croatian civil war, culminating in the forging of a new life and business in Australia. Mario explained to me how absolutely amazing he found Australia when he arrived here and couldn't believe how he was actually able to speak out on a whole range of subjects and even more amazing that he could give his opinion on radio. 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
