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Sarah McMahon on her Hawkesbury Mayor Re-Election

In a vote held by Hawkesbury Councillors on September 12th, Liberal Clr Sarah McMahon and Labor Clr Barry Calvert were re-elected as Mayor and Deputy Mayor of Hawkesbury City Council for the remainder of the Council's term. Both votes passed with a 7-5 split for the Mayor and Deputy Mayor, after Independent Clr Nathan Zamprogno challenged both positions.

Mayor McMahon is honoured to be re-elected to the position, following her first year in the position: "I feel very strongly about being able to work for this community, advocate for outcomes – especially after fires, floods, and COVID – and try to get our community on the path to recovery. So having the support of a majority of my colleagues was very humbling, and I'm pleased to be here for another 12 months. I absolutely love the Hawkesbury and to be able to do my little part in history and try to help this community is very rewarding."

"We are focused on the community - it's probably best to not listen to the white noise in the background and actually look at the good work that a lot of councillors are doing.

"We don't have wards, we don't have a popularly elected Mayor, we are a group of 12. We're not a parliament in there, and the best thing I want to say to my co-councillors is put your political differences aside and work for our community, because that's what they want."

There's plenty Mayor McMahon has planned for the next 12 months. "We'll get on with the community consultation for WestInvest, get those projects started and that sort of thing Once we find out what the new government wants to do with flood mitigation, we'll know as a Council how much money they're allocating and we'll continue flood advocacy. And we'll be doing everything we can to educate our community to be prepared to get ready for the bushfire season coming up."

Winners and Losers BY BEV JORDAN

While the NSW Budget has ear-marked \$3.5 billion over four years for 24 new and 51 upgraded primary and high schools in Western Sydney, including a new high school for the Schofields/Tallawong catchment, it has been blasted for ignoring growing needs in the Hills.

The Budget included money for upgrades to Northmead High School, Northmead Public School and The Ponds High School and Rouse Hill High and confirmed that a new primary school for Gables/Box Hill area would include an on-site public pre-school but failed to include money for a new high school or primary school at Castle Hill to meet the area's growing needs.

Hills Shire Council expects an extra 7000 preschool-aged kids and 25,000 additional school-aged students by 2036. Castle Hill Public currently has over 1,100 students enrolled and Castle Hill High has over 2,000 students enrolled.

Both Hills Shire Mayor Peter Gangemi and Castle Hill MP Mark Hodges have hit out at the fact that no money was included in the Budget for much-needed new schools despite the fact that the population is set to grow dramatically with the multiple developments planned around the Showground Metro station.

The NSW Government rezoned the Showground Precinct for medium-to-high-density development in 2017 as part of its Planned Precinct Program along the Sydney Metro Northwest.

The number of homes was limited to 5,000 until the NSW Government provided the necessary infrastructure but the cap has now been scrapped meaning the precinct will have 9,500 dwellings at total capacity. Over 3,500 homes have already been approved.

Hills Mayor Peter Gangemi said the decision showed absolute disdain for the people of The Hills Shire, which he says is already buckling under the pressure of an infrastructure shortfall.

"In our conversations with the NSW Government, we were told that the number of homes in the Hills Showground would be restricted to 5,000 until a new school site had been identified and funded," he said.

"Now the Minns government has discarded that, paving the way for almost double the number of homes without the schools so desperately needed by families within The Hills."

Castle Hill MP and Hills Shire Councillor Mark Hodges said public schools were bursting at the seams.

"The recent funding announcement for schools by the Minns government did not include any new school funding within The Hills, despite the Department of Education raising the need for a school to be located in a priority precinct, such as the Showground.

"By 2036, we will have more than 90,000 new residents living across The Hills; of that number, 20,000 will call the Showground Precinct home."

A development application for an upgrade for Castle Hill Public which includes: a new three-storey building with flexible classrooms, a new hall, and refurbished administration and staff areas has been submitted to Hills Shire Council.

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FIREARM AMNESTY

Police have renewed their appeal to people to hand in illegal firearms after two replica firearms (Gel blasters pictured) were handed in to Hills police under the National Firearms Amnesty. Police will even collect them.

Gel blasters are illegal in NSW and are considered actual firearms.

Police say a person who supplies, acquires or possesses an unregistered firearm could be arrested and charged for possession of a firearm (under Section 36(1) of the NSW Firearms Act 1996) which holds a maximum penalty of 5 years for a firearm or up to 14 years for a pistol or prohibited firearm. Possessing 3 or more where at least one is a prohibited firearm carries 20 years.

Section 82 of the NSW Firearms Act 1996 states that if a parent (or guardian) knowingly allows a person under the age of 18 years to contravene the Act, each parent/guardian is taken to have contravened the same provision.



YOUTH CHARGED

A Riverstone man has been charged after a teenager was allegedly dragged by a car and left injured in a service station.

Police have been told the incident unfolded shortly before 7pm (Friday 15th September 2023), when a 15-year-old boy and a 19-year-old man, who was sitting in his car, began arguing in Forge Street, Blacktown.

Police allege that as the man drove away, the boy was dragged by the vehicle along Sunnyholt and Vardys roads before he fell from the vehicle outside a service station in Vardys Road.

The 15-year-old was taken to Blacktown Hospital before being transferred to The Children's Hospital at Westmead, where he remains in a serious but stable condition.

Officers from Blacktown Police Area Command commenced an investigation and stopped a vehicle on Sentry Drive at Stanhope Gardens a short time later. The 19-year-old driver was arrested and charged with dangerous driving occasioning grievous bodily harm, negligent driving occasioning grievous bodily harm, and supply a prohibited drug.

BOY, 5, HURT

Emergency services were called to White Gum Place, North Kellyville, at about 10.35am on Saturday (9th) following reports of a child being hit by a car.

The 5-year-old was injured after being hit by a Mercedes SUV. Officers attached to the Hills Police Area Command attended and were told that the boy ran in front of the SUV being driven by a 41-year-old woman, who was moving her car at the time of incident. The boy was treated by NSW Ambulance and CareFlight paramedics before being taken to Westmead Children's Hospital in a stable condition.

The 41-year-old woman underwent a roadside breath test at the scene, which returned a negative result. No charges have been laid.

GRASS FIRE - BOX HILL

Two teengers are being questioned by police about a fire which burnt a park during a total Fire Ban period at Box Hill on Tuesday night.

The teens, aged 15 and 16, were arrested initially by two members of the public who were driving past Equinox Park and saw the sparks and flames. They held the boys until Police and RFS from Box Hill Nelson RFS and Schofields RFS arrived at the scene at 9pm with police from Castle Hill.

Police were told the teenagers were lighting aerosol cans which ignited and set fire to the dry park. Firefighters extinguished the area of grass which was alight. It was quickly extinguished, preventing damage to park equipment.

With Extreme Fire Danger conditions declared the community is urged to Call (000) should anyone see a fire without a fire truck in attendance and report suspicious activity to Crime Stopper.

MUCK UP DAY DISASTER

Muck-up day excitement turned into horror when a 17-year-old Oakhill College student was hit by a car at First Farm Drive and Old Castle Hill Road on Wednesday afternoon. (20th September).

CareFlight and NSW Ambulance conveyed the teenager to Westmead hospital in a stable condition at about 1.45pm. He is expected to make a full recovery.

Witnesses say a lot of students were in the road throwing water balloons at cars when the collision happened.

Hills Police have been assisting the Metropolitan Crash Investigation Unit and say the driver of the vehicle involved, an 18-year-old P-Plate Driver, has been charged with "case bodi;y harm by misconduct in charge of a motor vehicle".

Anyone with information about this incident is urged to call Crime Stoppers NSW. Anyone with video or dashcam footage is asked to forward to police via CrimeStoppers portal. Information is treated in strict confidence.

CHILD PROTECTION

A total of 19 people across NSW have charged various online grooming and child abuse material offences, as police continue to remind parents about online safety.

Police officers, with assistance from the State Crime Command's Sex Crimes Squad's Child Exploitation Internet Unit (CEIU) executed a targeted 'Week of Action', focusing on ongoing investigations relating to online grooming and possession of child abuse material.

Arrests included: A 20-year-old man who was spoken to at a Dural home at 7am on Tuesday 5th September. During a search, officers seized digital devices allegedly containing child abuse material, a laser pointer, and a gel blaster. The man was charged with five offences including possess child abuse material, possess prohibited weapon without permit, and possess unauthorised pistol.

Earlier this month, detectives from the CEIU commenced an investigation in relation to alleged child abuse material being accessed. Riverstone detectives executed a search warrant at a home in Rouse Hill at about 7.30am on Wednesday 6th September. A 51-year-old man was arrested and charged with use carriage service to access child abuse material. Police seized a number of electronic devices for further forensic examination

CHAINSAW INJURY

An off-duty nurse has been praised for her guick actions in treating an injured man following a terrible chainsaw accident in Kenthurst last week.

A man in his late 70s was transported to hospital in a stable condition following the accident on his Kenthurst property on Tuesday (12th September).

The Mounties Care CareFlight Helicopter was tasked by NSW Ambulance and landed on a cricket oval nearby the scene. CareFlight's critical care team and NSW Ambulance paramedics worked together to treat the patient who had deep lacerations to his arms.

The CareFlight specialist doctor thanked the off-duty nurse who had provided first aid to the patient prior to CareFlight's arrival which included applying a tourniquet.

As one of Australia's newest charities, Pink Ink is aimed at making life a little brighter for male and female breast cancer survivors who are left scarred by having a breast/breasts removed.

Hills local June Belkovskis said for many people the perception is that when treatment has finished for cancer patients then "it's over" which she says is not true at all.

A breast cancer survivor herself, she says many people struggle with the emotional upheaval and physical reminders of the treatment they have received such as scarring and burns.

A fundraiser for cancer research for many years, June says she wanted to do something to "fill a gap" and after hearing a friend's story decided to raise money to fund cosmetic tattoos for breast cancer survivors.

"It has been in the back of my mind for some time to do something that will directly impact a person's life," she told the *Hills to Hawkesbury Community News*.

"A friend had a double mastectomy and underwent surgery for implants. She went through life for years looking like a Barbie doll (without nipples) and she eventually saved enough money to have 3D areola tattoos to make her feel like a woman again."

It was hearing that story that the idea for Pink Ink (Australia) started to form.

When Tiffany Udo-Dean became an Australian Citizen on Sunday (September 17th) it was the latest milestone in a journey that has seen her leave her home in Brittany France and settle in Rouse Hill after finding love via the Twitter app (now called X).



Tweets on the social media platform 10 years ago led to a Facebook connection followed by long Skype conversations which resulted in Tiffany finally visiting Australia for the first time in October 2014.


She and her wife Jacinda have now been married three years, live in Rouse Hill and run a photographic business together.

Tiffany says the recent Women's FIFA World Cup broke her heart. "I absolutely love the Matildas but my heart was with France. It was awful for me"

She said they watched the match at the Fan Zone at Rouse Hill Town Centre... "I think I was one of 3 or 4 people going for France. Becoming an Australian Citizen on Sunday was a "special day," she says. "I will be able to vote in the Referendum and so I am glad about that."

Sunday (September 17th) was National Citizenship Day in Australia and 237 residents were given their citizenship certificates by Hills Mayor Peter Gangemi at one of two ceremonies held at The Hills Shire Council offices.

In the last financial year 2,831 Hills residents became citizens. According to figures gained from the census. The biggest group of overseas born residents in the Hills Shire Council area in 2021 came from India (6.6 %) followed by China (6.4%) UK (3.1%), Philippines (1.8%) and South Korea (1.7%).

Tushar, his wife Smitha and their sons Tejas, 15, and Shreyas, 10 became Australian citizens on Sunday, an event Tushar said they had all been looking forward to.

"Australia is a safe, multicultural place and feels like home," he said.. The director of an IT company, he first arrived in Australia in 2010 to work in Melbourne. He returned to India but three years later, work brought him and his family to Melbourne and then on to Sydney in 2017.

He says they love living in a country where there is freedom of religion, freedom of speech and a helpful community. While the whole family loves cricket their favourite pastimes are bushwalking and exploring Sydney.

"We have our values and they really match with Australia's values," said Tushar.

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Hills Shire Mayor Peter Gangemi said: "The Hills is a blessed community and one of our greatest strengths is our diverse multicultural population. I would like to thank each of our newest citizens for making our wonderful region even greater."

The newest Australian citizens in The Hills came from 36 countries throughout the world including India, China, Iran, Pakistan, South Africa, Egypt and the United Kingdom.

Hawkesbury City Council Mayor Sarah McMahon welcomed 120 new citizens who came from a diverse range of countries in Europe, South America and Asia including Belgium, Brazil, Britain, Canada, China, Colombia, Czechia (Czech Republic), India, Indonesia, Iran, Ireland, Korea, Malta, Netherlands, New Zealand, Pakistan, Philippines, South Africa, Spain, Sri Lanka, United Kingdom, USA and Vietnam.

The Mayor said receiving Australian Citizenship on Australia's national citizenship day was special for everyone involved and would be a special memory for all.

"Whether we are citizens through birth or by active choice, Australian Citizenship Day is a chance for all Australians to take pride in our citizenship; celebrate our democratic values and think about what unites us as Australians," she said. "It is one of the greatest honours as a Mayor to confer citizenship upon people from all nations of the earth, who have such significant and varied stories about their journey to Australian citizenship.

"It gives me great pleasure to listen to every new citizen, knowing that this day brings so much joy because they now belong to the very best country, and can call themselves a 'true blue Aussie!'

According to the census the largest number of residents in the Hawkesbury born overseas are from the UK (3.8%), followed by New Zealand (1.2%); India (0.8%), Malta (0.7%) and the Philippines (0.5%).

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Death of Oakhill Teacher

Popular Oakhill College teacher Andrew "Wisey" Wisemantel has died in France. The popular Castle Hill teacher and rugby coach was in France to celebrate his 50th birthday by watching the Rugby World Cup.

He died in his sleep following the flight from Australia. He leaves behind his wife Jacqui and two daughters Lara and Chelsea.

Tributes have flooded social media since news of his death including The Hills Bulls who said: "He was a great team-mate and friend to many...He will be deeply missed."

Posts on social media described him as "a great coach and a great man". For many he was the "heart and soul" of the college where the former had taught for over 30 years. More than 300 people paid tribute to him on the Oakhill College Facebook announcement of his death.

It is with heavy hearts that we share the passing of our beloved friend and colleague, Andrew Wisemantel, who peacefully died in his sleep on Monday morning (September 18th French time). Andrew has been an integral part of the Oakhill College community for over 30 years.

Changing Lives at RDA

Nicole King was only 12 years old when she first started volunteering at Riding for the Disabled NSW in Ryde.

"I was a horse mad kid, and it was an opportunity for my mum and I to get involved," Nicole says. "I learnt a lot of skills through great mentors and other volunteers at the centre, and that was really invaluable." Now, over thirty years later, she's the Head Coach at RDA's Tall Timbers Centre in the Gables. "It was an opportunity not to be missed – there's a reason you get offered opportunities to do things," Nicole adds. So you might as well jump at it and see where it goes."

The Riding for the Disabled Association NSW was founded in 1972 by Pearl Batchelor OAM after she visited the RDA in England in the early 1970s. The first lessons were held at Pearl's Tall Timbers property, originally in West Pennant Hills, where the first participants in the program came from Northcott Society and Crowle Home.

Since then, there have been many changes at the Tall Timbers Centre, including two changes of location to Kellyville in 1976, and to the current Gables site in 1999. Now located near the border of the Hills Shire and Hawkesbury Council areas, participants come to RDA from all over both regions and beyond.

"We've seen massive changes in the way centres need to operate these days," Nicole says. "At the core we are a volunteer organisation, but volunteering is changing, and we need to connect with the community and make sure we've got the right opportunities for people to volunteer. But we do the same work; we're still doing programs, we're still teaching people, and we're still offering opportunities for them to engage and participate."

For Nicole, there's no such thing as a 'typical day' at Tall Timbers. "Our role as coaches is to facilitate programs and manage our volunteers and organise the horses. It's very much about what sessions are on any given day, what we need to make the sessions happen and communicating with everyone what we need."

Each individual who visits the Tall Timbers Centre has an individual program organised for them, each including horse-related activities designed to be engaging, therapeutic and fun. "Participants are able to learn skills on the ground working with horses that will translate back into life or work skills," Nicole explains. "We also have individual and group writing programs, a consultative learning program and a mental health program as well."

Not only are the programs hand-picked for each participant; the horses are too. "All the horses have their own story, their own likes and dislikes – we treat them as individuals because you need to," Nicole says. "We match our riders with our horses, and we match our horses with our volunteers to make sure it's a happy combination."

The two horses starring on our cover, Cloud and LJ, are examples of the two kinds of horses at Tall Timbers. "Cloud is quite new to the program, she's only been here since January of this year," says Nicole. "We've worked out what her individual likes are, and she's been awesome. And LJ has been here for much longer — he's been a great RDA horse as well, especially with riders that need to develop leg strength and need encouragement sometimes."

That connection with the horses and the use of riding as a therapeutic activity has seen many success stories come out of the RDA Tall Timbers Centre. From young people whose favourite time of the week is with their horse to the adults with acquired disabilities who have needed a reason to do an activity outside of their home, RDA participants can enrol for any number of reasons and find themselves enriched.

Nicole recalls one particularly touching story: "We've had a participant that had their first words on the program. We had a parent come one day to watch their child ride in a school program, and they said 'I don't hear him talk at home.' And to us, we thought 'Oh my gosh, he talks to us no worries!' Everyone has a reason for being here and needs to be here. Seeing them transition, it's really rewarding. We love seeing the participants thrive in this environment, and that's the role of the organisation; it's why we love it."



RDA Tall Timbers Centre is funded by donations and fundraisers. Upcoming events from the Centre include their Charity Race Day at Hawkesbury Race Club on the 8th of October, which will support five other RDA centres, as well as Bunnings BBQs on the 23rd and 24th of September.

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New Friend of Bella Vista Farm

Bill Duncan OAM likes to call himself 'a man of many hats'. Why? He is dedicated to volunteering for good causes. He was awarded the OAM in 2014 for service to business and community.

Bill's volunteering started after being in the school cadets at Marist Brothers College, Darlinghurst at 16. In the school holidays, senior boys came back to the school to assist the student cadets and this dedication motivated Bill to involve himself in community volunteering. His interest in military matters continued when he joined the Sydney University Regiment. He met his future wife Pat there, who came from a family with a history of military service dating back to her grandfather in WWI. Bill served for 20 years in Australia's Army Reserve, was a scout leader and has held interesting positions in the Rural Fire Service (RFS) for over 20 years and 10 years in Marine Rescue.

Bill gives pro bono talks to clubs, community groups and schools about the 'ANZAC Spirit'; mentoring youth; volunteering roles and RFS matters. Kenthurst RFS has been running award-winning training workshops for residents for the past 10 years and 600 locals have now been put through the course. These courses are conducted at Kenthurst RFS Station and in a paddock on Bill's property. Property protection preparation is so critical in the current extreme temperatures.

Bill designed *Glenwarrie*, his beloved home, in the colonial style. He is a lover of antique furniture and artwork and has a collection of original farm machinery which he has painstakingly restored. His present project is a beautiful 1886 Australian cedar sulky. *Glenwarrie* captures so much of an early era with much grandeur but with the warmth and charm of a happy home. Much birdlife is present, the magpie family visits first, then kookaburras, butcher birds and rosellas.

Not only does Bill spend time researching and reading history, he also writes and recently wrote 75 Years of Service Protecting Our Community 1942-2017, a soft-cover book on the Kenthurst Rural Fire Brigade.

Bill has had a varied career, hence the reference to 'many hats'. He began as a high school teacher, went into education publishing, trained as a barrister and has held significant positions in industry, community and government organisations. In the year 2000, Bill worked as project manager with the NSW Paralympic Committee and from 2005 to 2009 was recommended by the Hon. Alan Cadman OAM, Member of the House of Representatives, to Chair the Greater Sydney Area Consultative Committee (ACC), the largest in Australia, established by the Federal government and headed by the former Deputy Prime Minister the Hon









John Anderson AC. This committee engaged directly with community and stakeholder groups on approved NSW projects. One such project, "The Mamre Shed", was a partnership with TAFE NSW and the Sisters of Mercy, initially a teaching Order. Over the years, the Sisters focussed on social issues getting more involved with the settling of refugees. Refugees from the Sudan were given the opportunity of education in landscaping, market gardening and commercial agriculture which was close to their natural skillset as they had come from agricultural areas in their country.

Bill has recently been welcomed as a new and valued Friend of Bella Vista Farm. With his knowledge and interest in history, he is perfect to fill the role as a tour guide at Bella Vista Farm. He loves the Farm and you can look forward to meeting him along with other Friends of the Farm the first Sunday of each month (except January) and enjoy a most rewarding and rich historical experience.

Fire Pump Maintenance

The fire pump is critical to any fire protection plan. It must start first time and work well during an emergency.

Run the engine regularly. Replace stale fuel, and have sufficient additional fuel on site for refills. Check the oil and the air filter, and get the engine serviced yearly.

Aussie Pumps fire pumps are self priming, so once set up they will hold their prime unless drained. Never run the pump dry as this will damage the mechanical seal. The pump will not prime if there is an air leak in the suction hose or the strainer is blocked.

Run the pump, and check for water leaks around the body and hose joins. If water is leaking from the back of the pump, the mechanical seal needs to be replaced.

Delivery hoses need to be in good condition and long enough to reach around your property. The suction hose must reach the water source even if the level drops. Run sprinklers to ensure they are not blocked.

Regular practice is the best way to ensure that everyone is familiar with starting and using the pump and the hoses.

Dr. Peter Gangemi was thankful to each brigade for their work. "I attended the Box Hill/ Nelson and Sackville brigades, and both had truly outstanding events that were very well attended. Well done to all our brigades for a job well done this weekend."

Hawkesbury Mayor Sarah McMahon also attended the open day and celebrated the work of each brigade. "I visited Freemans Reach Rural Fire Brigade and the RFS Glossodia Brigade and I was so impressed with their displays. Thank you to all our wonderful NSW Rural Fire Service volunteers."

The Get Ready Weekend couldn't have come at a better time - hot and windy conditions saw total fire bans introduced on Tuesday 19th and Wednesday 20th September with high risk ratings as many fires burn across the state. The Bureau of Meteorology officially declared an El Niño event on Tuesday, and NSW Premier Chris Minns has warned of a "horror summer" for bushfires.

Know the Australian Fire Danger Rating System

The NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) uses a simplified Australian Fire Danger Rating System.



The Fire Danger Rating System has four levels – Moderate, High, Extreme and Catastrophic.

When there is minimal risk, such as when it's raining, No Rating will be used. There will be actions for each level, so you will know what to do to protect your life, family and property.



Flying the Flag for Mental Health BY JOSH KERWICK

The MATES in Construction flag was flown with pride in South Windsor on Thursday September 14th, where over 30 workers from Prime Build had honest and open conversations about their mental health.

Taking place at 54 Fairey Road, where the South Windsor Enterprise Park is being developed by Prime Build, the Fly the Flag event in Windsor was one of 900 events that happened nationwide last week, involving over 100,000 construction workers.

The event was attended by a wide range of Prime Build employees, both on-site and office workers in attendance. Many of them were younger graduates, and benefited greatly from the open dialogue around mental health on the day.

Brad Parker, CEO of MATES in Construction, says that the nationwide Fly the Flag events are all about celebrating the work of people in the industry. "What they do everyday toward improving mental health and preventing suicide amongst their work colleagues, they spread that throughout their community as well. It's about celebrating that."

MATES was established in 2008 in response to the AISRAP Report, which found that young men in the construction industry were 2.38 times more likely to commit suicide than youth working in other industries. Since then, the charity has provided suicide prevention services through community development programs on sites and a 24/7 help line. MATES was acknowledged by the World Health Organisation in 2021 for their remarkable work in suicide prevention and mental health awareness.

"What sets us aside is we're boots on the ground, dealing with people on an everyday basis, and encouraging those life saving interventions which are so important," Brad says. "And we know that we've had a real positive impact – we've got some research to suggest we're having a positive impact."

Dean Willemsen, chairman of Prime Build, praised the work of MATES and was pleased

to continue their work with the charity: "The concept of suicide is something that our culture doesn't deal with very well.

"There's so much stigma around it, and what MATES have helped our organisation with is to break down that stigma and be okay with not being okay, while giving us all the tools to be able to have those conversations that ultimately could help save someone's life," he says. "It's that talking and reflecting that's such a big part of supporting our mental health, and that's really what the day was about."

With over 900 Fly the Flag events nationwide, it's Brad's hope that more conscious attitudes towards mental health will be incorporated into the industries where it's most needed: "93% of construction workers who committed suicide in the past never sought professional helpful. When people say build a bridge and get over it, we are the bridge – we need to get to those people in the first instance, and that's where MATES comes in, teaching some simple life skills, so we can all have an opportunity to play our part."





Wild dog and fox control program

Greater Sydney Local Land Services will be leading a wild dog and fox control program in the Hawkesbury, Blue Mountains and Penrith regions.

\$75.5 million Boundary Road upgrade to progress to design phase

A crucial rural road in The Hills Shire's north-west is a step closer to receiving a major upgrade. Hills Shire Councillors unanimously voted to commence the detailed design phase for the \$75.5 million transformation of Boundary Road at the Council meeting on Tuesday 12 September.

The project will see the rural thoroughfare, which is located on the border of The Hills Shire and Hawkesbury LGAs, upgraded to a major collector road. As part of the works, Boundary Road will be converted to four lanes between Windsor and Old Pitt Town Roads with a roundabout or traffic signals to be constructed at four key intersections.

The Hills Shire Council will commit to 70 per cent in design costs with Hawkesbury City Council contributing to the remaining 30 per cent, which was decided as part of discussions in the Boundary Road Technical Working Group, chaired by the Department of Planning and Environment's Planning Delivery Unit (PDU).

Mayor of The Hills Shire, Dr Peter Gangemi said he was looking forward to the completion of the project. "Boundary Road connects our two great communities, and the roadway will further grow in importance as more families choose to live in the area," Mayor Gangemi said. "This is an essential upgrade that will service our existing and future population. It's vital that our infrastructure caters for our population growth in Box Hill and Gables and enables safe travel for commuters."

Mayor of Hawkesbury City Council Sarah McMahon said reliable roads were one of the top priorities for local residents. "We are proud to partner with The Hills Shire to deliver this critical upgrade to Boundary Road," Mayor McMahon said.

"Both councils are committed to getting on with the job of delivering a robust road network for our communities and Boundary Road will serve as a perfect example of how great outcomes are achieved when we work together.

"Boundary Road is an important link for thousands of residents across both local government areas, and its role will only grow in the coming years."

Detailed design will include plans for:

- the upgrade of Boundary Road to four lanes between Windsor Road and Old Pitt Town Road
- the construction of the Boundary Road bridge over the Killarney Chain of Ponds
- traffic signals at the intersection of Boundary Road, Commercial Road and Brocklebank Street

- construction of a roundabout at the intersection of Boundary Road, Harkness Road and Brahman Road
- traffic signals at the intersection of Boundary Road, Menin Road and George Street and
- traffic signals at the intersection of Boundary Road and Old Pitt Town Road.

The total project cost will be partially funded using the combined \$9.2 million both councils received under the NSW Government's Accelerated Infrastructure Fund (AIF).


The AIF funding will be used to bring forward the first stage of construction, which includes new traffic lights at the intersection of Commercial Road, Brocklebank Street and Boundary Road and the Boundary Road bridge over Killarney Chain of Ponds Creek.

"I want to thank Hawkesbury City Council and the NSW Government for their ongoing support in fast-tracking the upgrade of Boundary Road" Mayor Gangemi added.

June says tattoos are a simple way to ease the distress caused by the residual scarring, body disfigurement, loss of nipple/areola, radiation burns and permanent eyebrow loss that may result from breast cancer surgery, chemotherapy or radiation treatment but for many people the cost is a barrier.

cancer surgery, chemotherapy or radiation treatment but for many people the cost is a barrier.

She has a board of eight business women who are all involved in the community and are all determined to bring a bit of beauty into someone's life at a very vulnerable time.

An example of a mastectomy tattoo

"We want to stop survivors from going down the rabbit-hole of depression and developing the mental disorder of body dysmorphia (an obsessive mental disorder)," said June.

"Body dysmorphia has ruined marriages, affected relationships, impacts ones everyday thought processes and has been linked to suicide. If a simple tattoo can save a life - or provide a sense of normalcy, then all our efforts will be worth it. "

Referrals will have to be made through a medical professional. June hopes their first tattoo will be a Christmas gift for a breast cancer survivor.



Proposed Road Closure - Mile End Road, Rouse Hill


Council is proposing to close part of Mile End Road, Rouse Hill as it intends to subdivide and sell the portion of the former road to an adjoining landowner.

Waves Fitness and Aquatic Centre

With the hot weather already here, now is the perfect time to visit the recently rebuilt Waves Fitness and Aquatic Centre in Baulkham Hills.

Like most places in the Hills and Hawkesbury, Waves has its own story to tell of generations of residents learning to swim and enjoying the coolness of the sparkling water on a hot summers day. Baulkham Hills War Memorial Pool or Waves as it is now known as first opened on the 11th March 1967 by the Minister for Local Government & Highways, The Hon P.H. Morton MLA and Shire President Bernie Mullane.

Prior to 1967 there was no public swimming in the Hills with the closest being Granville pool which was built in the 1930s and Parramatta pool which was built after WWII. Heather Watson, author of "Castle Hill Where have all the Orchards gone?" tells the story of swimming in the early days of Castle Hill before the pool where locals would swim in water holes and creeks particularly as there were no swimming pools in rural Castle Hill. Residents would create weirs or dams across the Darling Mills Creek near the bottom of Church Street, Francis Street and Excelsion Avenue. In 1943 Council enlarged one small weir on Darling Mills Creek to create a 'swimming hole' known as Loch Bruce. The Council promised if the enlarged 'swimming hole' was well utilised they would consider building a swimming pool for Castle Hill. As expected, the 'swimming hole' was very popular with locals and Council stuck to their word and built an Olympic sized swimming pool on the 'Roxborough Park Estate' half way between Baulkham Hills and Castle Hill.

In 2020, 53 years after the pool had opened, the decision was made to replace the ageing facility that had served the community so well with a brand new modern facility with more swim space to meet the needs of a growing population well into the future.

The new Waves Fitness and Aquatic Centre which opened in 2022, contains a FINA Olympic standard 10 lane, 50 metre outdoor pool, a 10 lane 25 metre outdoor pool and an indoor 25 metre pool plus an indoor family leisure and toddler pool area. There is also an outdoor water splash pad which will open on 23 September for the summer season.

For the fitness fanatics there is a large gym as well as spa, sauna and steam room. Waves also has a large café on site, function rooms and cabanas to enjoy a family catch up or a celebration.

Like many kids who grew up in the Hills, Waves was where we learnt to swim and where we spent our summers. I have many fond childhood memories of Waves and it is exciting to see the next generation of Hills residents creating their own fond memories in such a fantastic award winning facility.

North West Community Services Inc. (NWCS) is a non-profit community organisation based in the Sam Lane Community Complex, Park Street, Riverstone.

Formally know as Riverstone Neighbourhood Centre, NWCS was renamed in March this year (2023) and is behind the Riverstone Family Medical Practice where I work. It supports a range of services including a Men's Shed and community garden.

On Saturday (September 16th) NWCS held a Community Spring Fair at South Maroota.

Present were all the services that help foster community, engage and support those who are vulnerable, help with preparedness for disasters and improve and nourish the community with more green spaces.

I spoke to Alex Blair from Maroota RFS who told me the summer is going to be hot and dry. And not that long ago there were serious fires.

I spoke to Angela Van Dyke the CEO of North West Community Services about this wonderful organisation which works in multiple

ways to foster community well-being and disaster preparedness. This service has helped several of my patients.

CEO of Landcare Tulough Guerin was also there. The Landcare movement is an invaluable organisation which encourages a community-based approach to protecting and managing our resources. Our natural world is so important for our physical and mental health.

Our interests overlap as I do nature prescriptions and this does intersect with the work of Landcare. I prescribe time with nature for my patients such as a walk in a wooded area or gardening. It helps with psychological distress and improves general health. There are good studies in Australia with supporting evidence of this.

The SES and service NSW Service NSW were also present. As we have increasing heat waves and extreme weather. We need to have community preparedness and good disaster

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

As we approach the official start of the fire season, I want to acknowledge our remarkable Rural Fire Service volunteers. Across Berowra there are over 1,500 local volunteers across 27 brigades who do a remarkable job. They're an extraordinary group of men and women.

They volunteer all year round. In autumn and winter they undertake drills and hazard reductions and prepare. Over the past year brigades across the two local districts have responded to over 700 incident calls. Floods, storms, multiple-vehicle accidents-no matter what the disaster, they're always there to lend a hand.

But, of course, the role the RFS volunteers play in our fire safety is their most significant contribution. Berowra is a beautiful bushland electorate. But it means we're also a bushfire prone electorate. Every year, our RFS volunteers stand ready to defend properties and lives during the fire season.

Many residents will not have lived through the terrible bushfires that ripped through our area in 2002. Those who did will remember how ferocious and devastating they were.

That is why it is so important to start getting your property ready now, in case we face similar conditions this fire season.

Make sure your bushfire survival plan is up to date and that you undertake important preventative work, like clearing out gutters or keeping your yard free of combustible material. As part of that bushfire survival plan, you should think about which valuables you need to pack up - so if you need to go, you can before it's too late.

If you've got a pool, I would also encourage you to get a static water supply (SWS) sign at your property entrance. That water might save your own home, or your neighbour's.

Thanks again to the wonderful RFS for all the work they do for our community and for all Australians.


Be Fire Ready

With the weather heating up recently the Rural Fire Service recommends some simple steps you can take to prepare your home for the upcoming bushfire season:

- 1. Trim overhanging trees and shrubs. This can stop the fire spreading to
- 2. Mow grass and remove cuttings. Have a cleared area around your home.
- Remove material that can burn around your home (e.g., Door mats, wood piles, mulch, leaves, paint, outdoor furniture).
- Clear and remove all the debris and leaves from the gutters surrounding your home. Burning embers can set your home on fire.
- Prepare a sturdy hose or hoses that will reach all around your home. Make sure you've got a reliable source of water.

TAKING CARE OF THINGS

Some of the team on this journal are associated with the historic property of Bella Vista. Naturally, we care for the preservation of its heritage. Many years the property was left vacant and started to rot and decay. Due to its isolation, it also became a haunt of drug dealers who used it to distribute drugs to addicts.

The Heritage Council of NSW took control of the property in the early 1980s and decided to advertise for a caretaker in 1982. A British migrant from Yorkshire decided to apply and was interviewed by Justice Hope on behalf of the Heritage Council. That person was Len Ward, born in Middlesborough, Yorkshire in Capt. Cook's home district and went blackberry picking at the village of Great Ayrton where Capt. Cook had attended school.

Len first arrived in Australia in 1951 after he signed up in England to join the Australian Army and after six years he then worked in a number of different occupations where he worked on sheep stations, shark fishing and working on the Snowy Mountains Scheme. He spent twenty five years in these jobs until he decided to apply for the position of Caretaker at Bella Vista.

Len had a reputation of being a bit of a story teller and much that he may have said could be taken with a grain of salt. However it is true that some of the going ons at Bella Vista did in fact happen whilst the property was under his watchful eye.

Len's residence during his period at Bella Vista was a caravan situated on the property. Inially he had no electricity but only candles for lighting until a diesel generator was installed. Les said he was reluctant to use the generator,

as it consumed two gallons of diesel an hour. The property had become overgrown and redbellied black snakes could be found basking in the sun. In fact Les claimed to have been bitten on at least three occasions and said that he had never called a Doctor "I self-medicated by sweating it out" he said.

Len's main concern however were the "Druggies" who had been using the property to distribute drugs and vandals who would ride mini-bikes around the homestead and throw stones smashing windows as they rode past. Some of the drug dealers and vandals would also be armed with shots being fired at him. He had a pet dog who would walk alongside Len that was hit and a distraught Len had to "Finish it off". Local vandals had also battered to death 175 geese and two pet deer were shot.

Len thought that he would also try to get the local politicians involved to help curb the violence that occurred at Bella Vista and as I reported in this magazine back in July he approached local MP Wayne Merton who raised the matter in the NSW Parliament and convinced the State Government to give a State Heritage Grant and provide assistance in the preservation of the property.

Len decided to get the local schools involved to assist in curbing the vandalism by

having meetings with students and parents and getting involved in projects on the history of Bella Vista. Schools groups started to visit the farm and a greater respect was engendered within the community of the history of the farm and its importance.

Len's most frightening experience at Bella Vista was during a storm in 1988 when a lightning strike overturned his caravan one night. His leg pouring blood from a gash he eventually clambered out of his van and stumbled almost a kilometre to Old Windsor Rd to stop a car to take him to hospital.

Len retired back to the UK in April 2004. Much of what Len started at Bella Vista has been carried on by the members of "Friends of Bella Vista Farm" who hold a monthly open day on the first Sunday of the month during which members of the public can visit the farm and also undertake tours of the homestead. Much restoration has been undertaken by the "Friends" and money raised by the "Trash and Treasure Stall", the sale of Devonshire Teas and the house tours is put towards the restoration of the property and the feeding of the sheep.

As I said some of the people who bring you this journal very fortnight are asl associated with "Bella Vista" and I hope to see you there one day.



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










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
