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Road Funding Boost

Hills Shire Council has received \$2.49 million for road safety projects under the Federal Government's Black Spot Program for 2023/2024 and further \$1.88m under the Local Road and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) program.

The majority of the Black Spot Program money _ a massive \$1.9m, will be spent on Annangrove Rd, between Edwards Road and Kenthurst Road.

The Black Spot Funding also includes \$380,000 worth of works for Langford Road/Davey Road, Dural and \$210,000 on improvements to Sanctuary Drive, Rouse Hill between Caddies Boulevard and Grandiflora Street.

The \$1.88 million Phase 4 LRCI funding announced on Thursday (November 17th) will fast-track 18 infrastructure projects.

Of that amount \$689,142 has been allocated specifically for road projects. This funding will be used to improve Chapel Hill Road, Sackville North and River Road, Lower Portland/Leets Vale, which were damaged during the March and July 2022 floods.

Hills Mayor Dr Peter Gangemi said he was pleased that all the projects that Hills Shire Council recommended for the LRCI Phase 4 Program will receive funding.

"I'm looking forward to seeing these projects come to fruition, particularly the proposed improvements to Chapel Hill Road and River Road, which were decimated by the 2022 floods."

Other projects to win funding include:

- \$240,000 to construct two additional netball courts with lighting at Kellyville Netball Complex, North Kellyville
- \$175,000 for a new dog offleash facility and pathway at Colbarra Place Reserve, West Pennant Hills
- \$150,000 to replace worn turf area between Field 1 and amenities at Bernie Mullane Sports Complex, Kellyville
- \$130,000 to renew the ball stop fencing at Kenthurst Park, Kenthurst.
- \$100,000 to construct a new playground at Kellyville Park. Kellvville
- \$75,000 for new drainage for Field 4 at Crestwood Reserve. Baulkham Hills
- \$60.000 to replace worn turf area between Fields 1 and 2 and amenities at Caddies Creek Sports Complex, Beaumont Hills
- \$45,000 to install pedestrian safety fencings outside Excelsior Public

Works are expected to commence on these projects in 2024.

DRUG HOUSE

A Cannabis Hydro House (pictured) was discovered by police on Sunday November 12th in the Duncraig Estate Kellyville. Police from The Hills Area Command say it was lucky the house didn't burn down with the amount of power boards and plugs needed for the lighting system.

Police say they are watching some houses and others are reported to them.

Others are discovered by landlords because their tennants were not answering calls for inspections. Police are urging anyone who suspects that their rental property may be used for Cannabis production, to call police first. The last two houses found by the landlords had dangerous electrical hazards, which can only be safely disconnected by Endeavour Energy.

The basic signs to look out for are:

- Newly dug power lines from the street to the house.
- Tenants only seen once a week putting the bin out on bin night.
- Multiple security cameras placed around the home.
- Constant whirring noise, and bright lights from cracks in windows.

If you suspect your neighbouring rental property is a hydro house, then call 1800 333 000. Never enter a hydro house.



A man died after a crash at Pennant Hills Road, Carlingford on Sunday, November 12th. Emergency services were called to the intersection of Jenkins Road and Pennant Hills Road, Carlingford at around 6.45pm following reports of a multiple vehicle crash.

Officers attached to The Hills Police Area Command attended and were told a vehicle collided with two vehicles before coming to a stop.

A driver, a 76-year-old man, was treated by NSW Ambulance paramedics on scene, before being taken to hospital where he later died. No other drivers were reported to be injured.

Anyone with information or dash cam footage is urged to contact Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000. . A report will be prepared for the information of the Coroner.

SPEEDING L DRIVER

A 17-year-old Learner driver who was not displaying his L-Plates has been fined \$4,685 and immediately suspended for 6 months after he was clocked driving at over 140/kmh in an 80km/h zone at Oakville.Officer from Hawkesbury Highway Patrol detected the silver Honda Civic on Boundary Road Oakville shortly before 10pm on Sunday 12 November 2023, He was recorded driving at 141km/h and was then seen allegedly overtaking several vehicles over double unbroken lines before being stopped. The 17 year old learner driver was not displaying L plates and did not have a supervising passenger. His licence was immediately suspended for 6 months plus he was issued \$4685 in fines with 11 demerit points.

Police have been increasing their attention on speed enforcement in the Oakville area in response to 2 fatal crashes in that area this year that involved speeding.

Hills says ...

Kylie Druett has lived experience of the ripple effects of domestic violence on families and communities.

She has worked in various government and non-government organisations since early 2000 working to improve safety for women and children in their own homes.

Tragically, in 2017 her grand-daughter at 10 weeks old became the 5th generation of her family to experience the impacts of DV when her maternal grandmother was killed by her ex-partner.

Being a health professional and someone with significant lived experience of domestic violence, Kylie, her granddaughter's paternal grandmother, set out to raise awareness and start discussions about domestic violence to ensure women and children who were killed did not become invisible or just number on an annual count.

The theme of the year's Hills Says No to Domestic Violence event is "The Ripple Effect" and it will be held on Friday 24th November at the Castle Hill RSL, commencing at 9.45am.

It has been organised by the Hills Domestic Violence Prevention Network.

Acting Police Superintendent Claudia Alcroft and Dr Niveditha Manokran will also speak at the event. Dr Niveditha Manokaran is a sex educator, TEDx speaker and domestic violence awareness advocate. She's an ambassador of Indian Women Empower.

Students from Oakhill College will talk about their involvement in a project with The Sanctuary_ the Hills Women's Shelter and students from Kellyville High will present their video on the Love Bites program being held in local high schools.

The program teaches teenagers the importance of respectful relationships has reached more than 1,000 local students already this year.

The NAPCAN (National Association for Prevention of Child abuse and Neglect) program focuses on young teens aged 15-17 and consists of two interactive workshops addressing relationship violence and the foundation of healthy relationships.

Hills Says No to Domestic Violence Co-ordinator Aileen Mountifield from the Lisa Harnum Foundation said to date, 47 people, including children, have lost their lives as a result of DV.

Their names will be remembered at the moving rose ceremony which is held each year.

She said: "The rose ceremony is so important to reflect and remember people by name, who have died.



Hawkesbury Community Hub BY JOSH KERWICK

Residents of Hawkesbury are being encouraged to attend the monthly Hawkesbury Community Hub, a hotspot to help residents easily access community support services in one convenient location. The Hub, started by Link Wentworth earlier this year in May, is hosted on the first Wednesday of every month and now offers 35 services to locals, ranging from support for addiction, domestic violence assistance, housing aid and much more. The most recent Hub, held on November 1st, had the biggest turnout yet, and was attended by Macquarie MP Susan Templeman.

Toni Joseph, a Sector Capacity Specialist at Link Wentworth, says that the Hub was created so that the wide range of services across the Hawkesbury could be brought together for those who are struggling. She explains: "I was running a digital literacy course, and one of the participants asked what the use of doing a budget was when they didn't have enough money to get through the fortnight.

"So I started telling him about the different services you can go to, and he mentioned that he doesn't know half the things that are available to him. And I thought, why not bring it each month to one space to have all the services there to support the community?" By having all of these services in one place, which are spread out across the huge area of the Hawkesbury, people who need help are more easily able to access the services they need. Toni says: "It was initially aimed at the most vulnerable in society, but it's for anybody that needs information or to just come in and have some socialisation, meet new people and what not."

In the six months that the Hub has been run, the number of attendees has grown exponentially, with nearly 40 people at the November session. One man was able to easily organise a New South Wales ID thanks to Service NSW being present at the Hub, while the Salvation Army covered the cost. A displaced young family were able to receive support from Centrelink and talk with DCJ Housing, who preapproved a bond loan so that they could apply for private rentals.

Toni says: "The Hub plays a vital role in strengthening community and enhances the capabilities of residents in the community in various ways. I love being able to empower people when we're bringing the services to

them, giving them the opportunity to speak to different services all while socialising. The community is starting to trust us, and that's why they're coming in more and more often."

"I'd like to make it known that it is for everyone; absolutely everyone," Toni says. "Our December hub is going to have a Christmas theme – we've got Santa coming, we're going to give out some gifts and have barbeque chicken and salads, while still offering our usual services. It's an awesome vibe."

The Hawkesbury Community Hub is held at the corner of Moses Street and Greenway Crescent in Windsor, and the next open day is on Wednesday December 6th, from 11:30am-2pm.

the club's bistro.


Trish has been a member for 14 years . "I come from a musical family and just love music. The group is lovely and has just grown and grown. You build relationships.

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Lower Portland Ferry will be temporarily out of service for essential maintenance

The Lower Portland Ferry will be temporarily out of service for a compulsory inspection and maintenance from Monday 15 January 2024 for approximately 12 weeks, depending on the required works.

In accordance with Australian Maritime Safety Regulations, Lower Portland Ferry is required to undergo an out-of-water service to retain its commercial license for operating a public service.

Council endeavoured to source a replacement ferry to allow the connection to remain open during the service, however Transport for NSW has advised that a suitable replacement is not available.

Hawkesbury City Mayor Sarah McMahon said she appreciated that the downtime for the ferry would be inconvenient to residents, but that it was unavoidable, due to the legal requirements for maintenance.



"The Lower Portland Ferry is a critical link between the Hawkesbury and The Hills for many residents. These works are essential to ensure the ferry remains safe and reliable," Mayor McMahon said.

"Council will do everything in our power to ensure that the ferry is returned to service as quickly as possible."

Mayor of The Hills Shire Council Dr Peter Gangemi said the works are required to keep the Ferry operating, which is in the long-term interests of residents.

"The Lower Portland Ferry connects our Councils on the Hawkesbury River, and the inspection will enable the service to continue beyond April when its current licence to operate expires," Mayor Gangemi said.

Motorists are advised to detour via Sackville Ferry, approximately 13 minutes south of the Lower Portland Ferry.

The cost of the ferry overhaul will be jointly shared by Hawkesbury City Council and The Hills Shire Council. Both Mayor McMahon and Mayor Gangemi urge the community to only rely on official sources of information when it comes to the operations of the Ferry.

Reclaim the Night – The Hills BY MICHELLE BYRNE

Reclaim the Night is a global movement that began in Leeds in the UK in 1977. At that time, a massive man hunt was on for the Yorkshire Ripper, a serial killer who attacked women and girls initially in residential areas before turning his attention to women in red light districts.

He was eventually caught in the early 1980's and was convicted of 13 murders and 7 attempted murders. During this period the police response was that women should not be out after dark unless necessary which partly led to the very first Reclaim the Night, an all female march protesting against sexual violence against women as well as advocating for the rights of women to be able to move around public spaces without being harmed.

Since then, Reclaim the Night has evolved to be a protest against all forms of violence against women and for the rights of women to be safe not only in public places but also in their workplaces and in their own homes. Reclaim the Night is now held globally including here in Australia and involves both women and men marching down the main street of their suburbs or towns before returning to the nearest park for speeches and a rally.

This year will be the first year that Reclaim the Night will be held here in the Hills and it is our chance as a community to come together, to march for change and for an end to domestic violence in the Hills. Like all communities, the Hills is not immune from domestic violence with the NSW Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research data reporting 325 domestic violence related assaults in the Hills from January to December 2022, an increase of 10.6% since 2018. Domestic violence is no longer a private matter within families, it is a whole of community problem and is only getting worse with one woman killed every week in Australia by a current or former partner. Something has to change. Reclaim the Night is an opportunity to call for change but also to be a voice for those who cannot speak or who have been silenced.

Reclaim the Night – the Hills will be held 1 December meeting at Arthur Whitling Park at 5:30pm before marching down Main Street before returning to Arthur Whitling Park for speeches and a BBQ. A huge thank you to the Hills Soroptimists and Castle Hill Rotary for their assistance in establishing and running this event as well as to the Castle Hill Police and the Hills DV Prevention Network for their support. Working together we can reduce domestic and family violence in the Hills.

Remembrance Day Services By JOSH KERWICK



However, what impressed us most and kept us most entertained was upstairs which is all aimed at creative playing and getting children to use their imaginations. There is a section dedicated to playing dress ups



Choosing to adopt hearing aids earlier saves the need for looking at other methods of hearing augmentation, such as TV entertainment system upgrades, earphones/headphones or assistive listening apps.

The early bir d gets the worm, and the early hearing aid adopter maximises the benefits of hearing aids. When it comes to maximising the benefits of wearing a hearing aid, there is a lot to gain from acting quickly, and a lot to lose if the decision is delayed. Watch out for the early warning signs that should prompt you to act: Voices are audible but not clear – people tend to sound like they are mumbling more than before.



The work of talented locals is the focus of the current Hawkesbury Now Art Fair, taking place at Hawkesbury Regional Gallery until the 3rd of December. The exhibition is a chance for artists in the area to have their work properly displayed, whether it's their first or fifteenth time putting their art in public for gallery patrons to see.

Over 150 works by 62 artists have come from all across the Hawkesbury, including from the minds of creatives at beloved community makerspace Hawkesbury Remakery. A number of different artistic disciplines are present in the Remakery section of the exhibit, with metal sculptures, photographs, baskets and upcycled plane parts on display. Hawkesbury Remakery co-founder Liz Germani says it's "an incredible opportunity for artists to be part of this exhibition and get the exposure. Thanks to the Gallery for featuring local artists at least once a year!"

It's the first chance that Tasman Clayworks' Steph Brown has had to display her artwork in a formal gallery setting, despite having already made pottery her full-time profession in the last three years. "It started as a hobby on a Friday morning with a group in Blacktown, and I just fell in love with designing and creating little clay masterpieces," she says. "I moved to a group in Richmond, and they asked me to start teaching.

"My student list got so big that I had to find my own little shop in the South Windsor Mall. Now, I run multiple classes a week with 43 students and no longer have my normal day job – I've just had my week as a full time potter, and I'm loving it!"

Steph's pieces in the exhibit are a number of intricately decorated bowls and a set of breakfast ceramics, all distinctly striking in their designs. She is very pleased to have her work in the gallery: "The Remakery was glad to submit a few of my pieces, and I put a few of my favourites in. It's so nice to see the talent we have in our little community, all the amazing artists and artwork that's up there now. It's a very major privilege to be doing this!"

Another artist, Jim Green, submitted a number of his meticulously crafted metal sculptures of Australiana. He's been creating sculptures of animals, movie characters and much more for over a decade, and this exhibit is not the first time that his work has been displayed publicly: "I displayed a dragon made out of recycled materials three years ago at the Hawkesbury show, and I got first prize in my category. Last year, I made a rooster, and that also got the top prize."

For the Hawkesbury Now exhibit, Jim submitted pieces that he was proud of that all revolved around Australian iconography. "After creating for so many years, the quality of my work keeps increasing, and I'll keep pushing myself to do better next time. Liz at the Remakery has been amazing, pushing me to do public pieces like a farmer over 6 feet and to submit to the Hawkesbury show, and three years in a row I've taken the top prize."

Creating artwork is a satisfying reprieve from working life for Jim: "Work can be repetitive, so I need that creativity so I can use my mind and hands for other things. I'm always trying to find new and interesting things to create and continue increasing the quality of my work." Basket-weaver Sally Blackwell is also familiar with displaying her artwork across her 15 years of artistry: "I had just retired from the Department of Education, and I was offered the chance to learn basket making. So I went 'Sure!' and I haven't stopped since, because it's very addictive."

Sally has been involved with Hawkesbury Remakery from the beginning, since before they took up residence at their old Loder House location. She says "I like the ethos of it, being not-for-profit and all about giving opportunities to local people, while also having a social aspect. I noticed people isolate themselves too much, and through a number of programs at the Remakery, we try to counteract that."

The terrific works Sally is showing at Hawkesbury Now are all made out of upcycled materials, including bits of raffia and recycled net. It's indicative of her general style, for which she has won a number of awards at the Hawkesbury Show. Displaying the art is not what drives Sally, though: "I do a lot of workshops around the Hawkesbury, so that lots of people know how to weave and express themselves creatively. Because I was a teacher for so many years, I really like passing on knowledge and want everybody to keep learning – I firmly believe in that."

TICKS YOU DON'T WANT

Summer is here! While the long awaited warmer weather means we can head outside and enjoy the sunshine with our pets, it unfortunately has also encouraged some creepy crawlies to show themselves as well. The combination of recent rains and the warm conditions have resulted in the perfect environment for paralysis ticks to flourish.

Whilst usually more common in coastal areas, at Bligh Veterinary Services Centre we have had reports of ticks popping up in unexpected places.

Paralysis ticks are small insect with a distinct pale grey body. They tend to thrive in warm and wet conditions and usually live in bushy areas, however can sometimes be found in parks and even gardens. As they grow they seek out higher branches and leaves, then as an unsuspecting animal walks past they will drop on to them and begin feeding.

As suggested by their name, it is this feeding process that will cause paralysis to the unlucky victim. As the tick feeds it will secrete a powerful neurotoxin into the bloodstream, resulting in a profound paralysis.

This toxin will generally take anywhere between 2-3 days for signs to manifest, but in smaller animals may be quicker. Once signs develop they can progress quickly and form what we call an 'ascending paralysis'.

The paralysis tends to ascend from the hind limbs, up through the body towards the head over hours or days. Wobbly back legs are often the first visible sign, however presentations

can vary substantially. As the syndrome progress, the animal will be completely unable to walk as all the limbs become affected. The toxin will then start affecting all muscles throughout the body, inclusing those that control swallowing and barking and most importantly, the muscles of the chest that allow an animal to breath. If left unattended, this paralysis will leave an animal unable to breath and result in death.

Signs that tick paralysis are developing include weak or wobbly movement, breathing difficulties, changes in bark or vocalisation, vomiting and regurgitation.

Fortunately tick paralysis can be treated by means of an antiserum, but due to the way that tick serum binds to muscle, even after they are treated, most animals will still get worse for some time before they get better. Additionally, even mild cases of tick paralysis will still require long hospital stays and require significant supportive care to recover fully.

This is absolutely a case where prevention is better than cure and fortunately there are

a wide range of effective tick preventatives on the market today for both dogs and cats. When given regularly, these products almost completely negate the risk of deadly tick paralysis. Whilst classic knowledge has often reccomended only giving these products through summer, our changing climate has led us to see ticks popping up even through the winter months, and as such we recommend year round preventative medication be given to your pet.

Shellduck (Tadorna tadornoides). All three mostly prefer a hollow in a tree for nesting which is only a short distance above the ground in close proximity to water.

These three species may lay up to 10 eggs each. The clutch leaves the nest very soon after birth. Both parents take seriously the responsibility of raising and protecting their family. The Australian Wood duck illustrated has a clutch of at least 13 chicks to look after.

When young, the newborn ducklings are confined to the ground, concealing themselves in long grass not far from the parent birds. They also have the ability to swim within a couple of days of hatching.

HIDDEN IN THE HILLS

Along many creeks flowing through local bushland reserves there are numerous ponds or deeper pools. Several water birds frequent the larger pools in search of food as well as establishing a secure nesting environment in thicker vegetation around the shoreline.

One such bird is the Pacific Black Duck (Anas superciliosa). Although it is found in suitable habitats throughout Australia, it is generally a wary bird when not accustomed to people. It can be solitary, but also gathers in pairs and small groups. When breeding, mature ducks are mostly seen in pairs as they dabble along the edges of water courses searching for aquatic plants.

This common species is characterised by a distinctive blue bill, black and white markings on its head, with its neck and body being covered in dappled dark brown plumage.

Other ducks that frequent bushland waterways are the Australian Wood Duck (Chenonetta jubata) and the Australian

Pavilion's Baskerville To Deliver Big Laughs BY JOSH KERWICK

Castle Hill Players are delivering one more play before 2024 begins with Ken Ludwig's Baskerville: A Sherlock Holmes Mystery, a production that promises to pair an engaging murder-mystery with a healthy dose of comedy.

The men of the wealthy Baskerville family are being picked off one-byone by a mysteriously clever killer, and it's up to Sherlock Holmes (David Allsop) and John Watson (Peter Phan) to crack the case before it's too late in this comedic twist on the classic Arthur Conan Doyle novel.

Baskerville is the first time that Jason Spindlow, a long-time member of the Pavilion Theatre family, has fully stepped into the role of director. Since his first play at the theatre, 2014's *Just Macbeth!* directed by Meredith Jacobs, Jason has become a valued member of the Castle Hill Players family, starring in a number of plays and recording many of them for archival purposes.

Having previously directed a *Dracula* radio play and been assistant director on 2022's production of *The Mystery of Irma Vep.* Jason says: "The big difference has been seeing all the other stuff you have to do as the full director backstage. Being assistant director, you just sit there and write your own notes, just focusing on the actors – but with directing, you have to answer lots of different questions. It's a lot of troubleshooting!"

In directing a play based on one of the most famous literary characters of all time, Jason has been inspired by a number of other Sherlock Holmes adaptations to build out the version in this play. "It's been interesting, because people have their own view of that character as well. Since it's comedic, everything has to be a bit tongue and cheek to the audience, while also showing he's struggling in a world of normality because of the way his mind works."

A notable aspect of *Baskerville* is its unique distribution of roles; while David Allsop and Peter Phan play the iconic duo of Holmes and Watson, the play's remaining three actors – Lana Jean Hill, Josiah Lucas and Jonathon Burt – play close to forty different roles in the play. Jason says one of the biggest challenges was determining how to differentiate each character: "Costume is a huge component of that, but the crew backstage have always said 'Yeah, we can do that.' And even when I ask if they're sure, they always say they've got it.

"Lana, Josiah and Jonathon have all been a blessing to work with too, because they've been building so many different characters. It was really tough during auditions, there were other actors that could do that, but these three came in with preset characters ready to go, and I was immediately thinking that's what I want."

Even for David and Peter in the roles of Holmes and Watson, Jason has encouraged a lot of playing around. "We're being irreverent to the text, having a crack at anything even if the script makes you feel one way, you try to take it another. Peter has been particularly irreverent, I get lots of different things from him - it'd be a different accent every night, from Northern England to Cockney!"

Although it's a lot of work to create so many different characters, everyone's been having an "almost illegal" amount of fun, according to Jason. "I think sometimes that maybe I should be a little more rigid with





things, but I feel like we've produced some really cool stuff. We've had some things happen accidentally onstage and we've burst out laughing, and I say keep that! That's brilliant for your character."

Jason has deeply enjoyed being in the director's seat for *Baskerville*. "I loved the journey with it; seeing the evolution of the actors, the difference between the rehearsals in the foyer and then seeing a set with a black curtain being put up, and you sit there thinking how different it was to when you first started. I've got lots of enjoyment out of it, but the fact that this is a story lots of people are going to come and see... that's the part I'm most excited about."

Baskerville: A Sherlock Holmes Mystery opens on Friday 17th November at 8pm, with the season running until the 9th of December. It's a play you'll die laughing trying to solve, providing lots of laughs while still containing the bones of an enthralling murder mystery - don't forget your deerstalker caps. Tickets are \$30pp, or \$25pp for Concession tickets.

Bushfire Season is nearly here; **BE PRÉPARED**

The official start of summer is only a short few weeks away, but hot temperatures in recent weeks have given a foreboding warning about the season to come. The declaration of an El Nino event means that conditions will be drier than they have been in recent years, making rural areas like those in the Hills and Hawkesbury highly susceptible to bushfires.

Local RFS brigades have been doing work year-round to prepare residents for what NSW Premier Chris Minns has called a potential 'horror summer', with a number of fires having already occurred throughout the state. However, it's not too late to get prepared - a number of fire safety events are on the horizon to keep residents informed about the best practices to keep their homes safe.

Berowra MP Julian Leeser is hosting two bushfire readiness on Sunday 26th of November, one of which is taking place at Dural Country Club from 10am-12pm. The event will give community members the opportunity to make a fire plan, watch RFS demonstrations about preparedness, hear from bushfire survivors and understand what should be in a 'to-go' box in case of emergency.



Mr Leeser said the following: "The Rural Fire Service has told me that our community has told me that our community is more at risk of significant bushfires this summer than at any time in the last 20 years. We can hope for the best, but we need to prepare for the worst; being prepared could save your life and the lives of your family."

Hills RFS Inspector and District Co-Ordinator also warned of the danger to the community this vear. "Due to high fuel loads and the forecast of warmer, drier conditions, residents are expected to see an increased risk of fire this year." he said. "It's important to be alert to local risks of bushfire over the coming months, regardless of their location. You must understand your risk, know where you will get your information, and talk to your family about what you will do."

this Bushfire Season:

- 1. TRIM: Trim overhanging trees and shrubs. This can stop the re spreading to your home.
- 2. MOW: Mow grass and remove the cuttings. Have a cleared area around vour home.
- 3. **REMOVE:** Remove material that can burn around your home (e.g. Door mats, wood piles, mulch, leaves, paint, outdoor furniture).
- 4. CLEAR: Clear and remove all the debris and leaves from the gutters surrounding your home. Burning embers can set your home on fire.
- 5. PREPARE: Prepare a sturdy hose or hoses that will reach all around your home. Make sure you've got a reliable source of water.
- Electric vehicle charging stations at the Waves Fitness and Aquatic Centre
 - Water level sensors in some dams
 - Free public Wi-Fi in major retail centres Facilitating the submission of forms,
- payments and applications online Increased utilisation of QR Codes

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Why girls cricket is booming in the Hills & Hornsby

Girls' cricket is booming in the Hills District and Hornsby, thanks to the amazing groundwork laid by Glenorie District Cricket Club's Amanda Fraser. Recently-crowned Cricket Australia's and Cricket NSW's Volunteer of the Year, Fraser has made a tremendous impact on grassroots cricket in a relatively short time.

Fraser has made Glenorie District CC, one of the outer Sydney suburbs' most successful clubs with a 50% female committee, uniting the local community with her leadership. As the girls' cricket coordinator for the Hornsby Ku-ring-gai & Hills District Cricket Association (HK&HDCA), Fraser has inspired the district to focus on girls' cricket, boosting the number of female cricketers by more than 30 percent.

This year, HK&HDCA has started its first girls' Stage 1 competition in the association's history. The Stage 1 HK&HDCA girls competition features seven of the 13 clubs putting together girls-only teams, while two clubs had a joint side. Four clubs in the association have Stage 2 and 3 teams as well.

If you visit Montview Oval at Hornsby Heights on Friday afternoons, there is a carnivallike atmosphere with music, dancing, and lots of cricket, played by girls who just can't have enough fun, according to Cricket NSW.

Jacob O'Sullivan, Cricket Manager, Sydney North West, acknowledged that Cricket NSW and HK&HDCA have been able to start the girls' Stage 1 competition after two seasons, due to Amanda's efforts.

"She is a powerhouse and has been able to build those club connections in the district for clubs to buy into the idea. We were also bolstered by the Hornsby Council's support of growing female cricket participation in the area," O'Sullivan said. "It is a clear strategy for Cricket NSW to have more girls, especially in the 5-12-year-old age group, play and love cricket. The mission has been transformed into reality with the

Stage 1 girls' competition, made possible by our strong female volunteers in the district. We are grateful for their efforts and are excited to provide more opportunities for girls to play cricket in the Hornsby and Hills area."

Stage 1 girl players (8-12 years) who previously played Cricket Blast or haven't played the game, play against other teams at Montview Oval. They use pink balls, and their playing kits are colourful. There is a lot of fun with girls dancing with their bats, inventing cricketing moves and perfecting their legwork all in one. A few pink hoodie-wearing fielders move around, ready for a catch, or to stop runs.

At the scorers' corner is the remarkable cricket force, Amanda Fraser, watching on with pride.

season. There were four girls' only Stage 1 teams, formed after Fraser met multiple times with club volunteers to make sure all their questions were answered to keep a focus on growing female participation.

"This year, the HKHDCA girls are playing cricket on their own turf, with teams from their own communities."

To encourage players, Hornsby District CC has made registrations free for girls, while West Pennant Hills-Cherrybrook CC have found equipment and kit sponsors for their teams.

Some girls play in mixed teams on Saturdays, so HK&HDCA decided to hold the girls' only matches on Friday evenings under lights, with music and dance thrown in. Liesl, Fraser's daughter, loves her all-girls cricket, plus the fact that she can wear green pants to play.

After the closure of the studio, he was invited by the Lanceley family to start a new studio at Norbrick Brickworks at Baulkham Hills, the site now forming part of the Norwest and Bella Vista suburbs.

As a ceramic artist and muralist, he created many ceramic murals for large buildings, clubs and other architectural sites around the country. One of his largest, and a favourite was the huge 30m mural that featured in a wall in the Hills Entertainment Centre. This was lost however when the centre was demolished in 2015 to make way for the Norwest Rail Link. Whilst most of the ceramic tiles were reduced to rubble and dumped, at least one was saved and is now in the hands of the Friends of Bella Vista Farm where it is hoped that a space will be found in which to display the tile within the homestead.

Whilst a lot of his work has been lost due to the demolition of buildings over time, The Hills Shire council preserved some of his pieces by way of photographing panels before demolition. A selection of his works is also displayed at the Shepparton Museum in Victoria, as well as at various locations throughout Sydney and elsewhere.

Professor Dr. Vanessa Berry is a fan of Vladimir and said, when discussing a tunnel at Museum Station in the City, "The end of the tunnel expands into a shopping arcade, located in the basement of 227 Elizabeth Street. One wall is engraved with ceramic murals by Vladimir Tichy, a sculptor from Czechoslovakia (now Czech Republic), who arrived in Sydney after World War II, he created many ceramic murals around the city during the 60s and 70s. "I knew about him, so I saw that wall. Most people walk by and probably think it's a feature wall," said Dr Berry.

She said the tunnel is hardly a profound element of Sydney. "It's just another part of the city." But noticing these tiny details make a walk "psychogeographic", Dr Berry said.

"There's just something about being there, in the moment, observing things around you and paying attention ... [it] can make you feel more connected to the city and its stories. And I think that's a very worthwhile thing."

Tichy retired in his 60s and then established a small studio at his home in Hornsby. His output of work slowed down, with Tichy laying down his tools upon the death of his wife Jirina (Georgina) in 2009. Having been married for 46 years, Tichy said there was no way he could continue making art without Jirina in his life. "I stopped working completely when my wife passed away," he said. "My work was for her, and from that moment I lost inspiration. "I can't work anymore."

His art has been displayed in galleries and public spaces across the country, as well as Czechia and Russia, but some of his best work rested behind the walls of his Malsbury Rd, Hornsby home and in his garden. This included more than a hundred pieces of art believed to be valued, collectively, in the hundreds of thousands of dollars. His art has African and Egyptian influences but his daughter, Marcella Roman, said it was "very much his unique style".

When The Hills Centre was demolished to make way for the North West Rail Link, the greatest work of Vladimir Tichy's colourful artistic career was broken into rubble. The mural took Tichy more than 12 months to design, sculpt and install.

"This mural is the biggest and the best that I have ever done," he said. "It means a lot to me, and I am not happy about losing, it but what can I do?"

Investigations by The Hills Shire Council found there was no cost-effective way of saving the mural, with the artwork simply crumbling when removed from the wall. It is not the first time Tichy will have watched his work demolished in the name of progress. A giant mural at the base of Centrepoint Tower was pulled down during redevelopment in 2009, while other significant works were lost at Queanbeyan RSL and St George Sailing Club. Tichy said he had lost track of how many of his one-of-a-kind creations had been destroyed. "It's sad but that's just how it is," he said.

Tichy's last creation was a lovingly handcrafted urn, which occupied pride of place in his Hornsby home, cradling the ashes of his muse, Jirina. Tichy passed away, aged 92, in July 2019 leaving a great legacy.

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

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


