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George Thornton Reserve reopens

Following 12 months of upgrades that cost nearly \$1 million, George Thornton Reserve in West Pennant Hills is now open again to sports teams and local residents to fully utilise. The most major upgrade for the reserve is the addition of a new field that brings the total number up to three; an important upgrade for locals in the densely populated West Pennant Hills area. Other key features include the implementation of new walking paths and cricket nets, better grounds for the pre-existing fields and improved drainage systems.

For local sports clubs like Redbacks FC, the new upgrades are a terrific boon for their operation as more locals become interested in trying out football. Club President Phil Simmons says: "Now that we have these new beautiful grounds, we're really excited for the year ahead. They're attractive for both new and experienced players because the grounds are so neatly manicured. That makes it attractive to high grade players too! We also have a nice pedigree of players in the club - Chloe Legato is an ex-Redbacks player, and she's now in the Matildas. So is Soccerroo Aaron Mooy - we're very proud of that legacy."

After the heroic Matildas run in the Women's World Cup last year, Phil says that more people are becoming interested in trying out football especially young women. "Our registrations are doing really well so far," he says. "We're expecting that we'll be filling all the grounds every Saturday and Sunday, and every night during the week for training sessions as well. Mostly, though, it's a great open space that kids and families can come to have a nice little kick around!"

Phil was in attendance with NSW Legislative Council Member Peter Primrose and Hills Shire Mayor Peter Gangemi to commemorate



the completion of the park's upgrades. Mr Primrose, who was representing NSW Sports Minister Steve Kamper, spoke to why the State Government finds it essential to fund projects like this: "Spaces like George Thornton Reserve aren't just great for sport and bringing people together, they're also important for the mental health of local communities. People like exploring quiet green spaces full of trees to get away from everyday life. This contribution from the State Government has really allowed the Reserve to become something I hope the community will be very proud of."

Mayor Peter Gangemi encouraged Hills Shire residents to visit the Reserve and see what premiere features it has to offer residents: "It's very important to us as a Council for our residents to live an active and healthy lifestyle. Here in West Pennant Hills, we saw a need for additional facilities as more families choose to live in The Hills, and so we wanted those facilities so that people can play grassroots sports, walk around the oval and use the cricket nets while being amongst nature as well. The benefits are endless for the people of both the local area and the wider Hills area - there's really something for everyone here at George Thornton Reserve."

Redbacks FC are hosting an open day on Sunday, February 25th from 10am-1pm at George Thornton Reserve - come along for a great day of fun and trying out football.

Councils Angry Over Density

Three local councils have rejected proposed NSW Government planning reforms which will encourage low and medium density levels near town centres and train stations.

The State Government proposal, which aims to increase housing stock, has been roundly condemned by Hawkesbury, Hills and Hornsby councils.

The reforms will allow residential buildings of 3-6 storeys high, terraces, townhouses, duplexes and smaller 1-2 storey apartments in suburbs where they aren't currently permitted.

Hawkesbury City Mayor Sarah McMahon said the plan could put the lives of current and future residents at risk.

"The proposed reforms are at odds with the State-acknowledged risks that exist in the Hawkesbury with relation to natural disasters like floods and bushfires," she said.

"It is already well acknowledged the difficulty and risks we would face if we had to evacuate 60,000 residents using the existing evacuation routes that have been sorely neglected by successive state and federal governments. "Adding more people to that mix is a disaster waiting to happen. Instead of talking about increasing our population, the government should be listening to this Council when we tell them that so much more needs to be done to provide better flood resilience and evacuation routes for the Hawkesbury."

Hawkesbury City Deputy Mayor Barry Calvert said: "Council is sympathetic to the issue of housing undersupply in NSW, however – this proposal would undermine the unique character of the Hawkesbury, put lives at risk, and supercharge road and public transport congestion, while barely making a dent in NSW's housing shortfall."

Hills Shire councillors are asking the Depart ment of Planning, Housing & Infrastructure to provide it with an exemption saying the **Hills Shire Council** has already zoned and planned for 50,000 new dwellings.

Hills Shire Mayor Peter Gangemi said: "Our family-friendly suburbs are now at risk of being overrun by 2-to-6-storey apartment blocks, duplexes, terrace houses and manor homes. The proposed changes will lead to increased traffic, fewer school places, less on-street parking, and overcrowding in our already struggling hospitals.

"It is of particular concern that there's been no mention from the NSW Government on how it will support Council to provide more parks, better roads, and other services for everyone who will live here. Council is already a leader in housing supply - being one of the fastest growing areas in the country, exceeding our housing targets and determining more Development Applications last financial year than any other council in Metropolitan Sydney.

"There are thousands of dwelling approvals yet to be acted upon and land zoned for 50,000 more homes in our Shire, so I believe these reforms will not solve the housing crisis. Instead, they will make housing prices even more unaffordable for our young people and will stifle the progress of legitimate opportunities for housing delivery that already exist,"

At its General Meeting on 14th February, Hornsby Shire Council also showed little love for the proposal saying the state-wide approach to deliver housing will impact the character of the Shire's suburbs, heritage, environment and tree canopy, infrastructure and risk overdevelopment in areas prone to risks such as bush fires and flooding.

Hornsby Shire Mayor Philip Ruddock said: "We're concerned by the 'one size fits all' approach that is outlined in this proposal."

SPEEDING P-PLATERS

Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol stopped a P2 licence holder on Friday 9th February at about 8.55pm after he was detected driving along Green Road, Kellyville between 109 km/hr and 99km/hr in a 60km/hr zone. The 19-yearold male from Kellyville behind the wheel of the white Ford F6 Typhoon was a holder of an NSW C Class P2 licence.

The driver was not displaying P plates on the vehicle. The Ford F6 Typhoon is listed on the high-performance vehicles which is banned for P1/P2 drivers.

The driver copped over \$2,000 in fines after he was issued an infringement notice for P2 driver Exceed Speed Limit - over 30 km/hr (\$1,036), Not Display P Plates (\$302) and Not Comply P1/ P2 High Performance Vehicle restriction (\$644). His NSW driver's licence was suspended and confiscated on the spot for a minimum period of 3 months where he accumulated a total of 14 demerit points for the 3 offences.

In another incident officers from The Hills Highway Patrol detected a white Mazda CX-5 along Samantha Riley Drive, Kellyville travelling up to 124 km/hr in a sign posted 60 km/hr zone at about 10pm on Tuesday 6th February.

When the 18-year-old male driver from Kings Langley was stopped officers sighted his mobile phone connected to the entertainment unit within the car which was playing music at the time.

Drivers with a provisional P1 or P2 licence are not allowed to use a mobile phone (which includes music and/or navigation), whether or not held by the driver while the vehicle is moving or stationary but not parked.

The driver was issued an infringement notice for P1 driver Exceed Speed Limit - over 45 km/hr and Provisional P1 or P2 licence holder use mobile phone while driving.

His NSW driver's licence was suspended and confiscated on the spot for a minimum period of 6 months where he accumulated a total of 11 demerit points. The vehicle was not owned by the driver and the number plates remained on the vehicle.

LIGHTNING STRIKES

The Hills SES dealt with multiple calls during a short intense storm and lightning strikes on Monday (19th February) at around lunchtime.

A direct hit on a house in Grevillea Grove, Baulkham Hills (pictured) caused a fire in the roof. Emergency services including Fire and Rescue NSW and SES were called. Fortunately no one was home when the lightning struck.

The intense downpour and winds caused havoc on the roads and brought down trees. The NSW SES were quick to respond, removing fallen trees in the hills district suburbs of Kenthurst and Castle Hill. Numerous power lines were down in the Hawkesbury area during wild storms earlier closing several roads and causing power cuts.

TRIPLE MURDER CHARGES

State Crime Command Homicide Squad officers have charged a 49-old man with triple murder after a man was found dead at his Watkins Road home in Baulkham Hills on Tuesday morning (20th February) and the body of his wife and child were found several hours later in North Parramatta.

Taekwondo instructor Kwang Kyung Yoo (also known as Master Lion) was charged in hospital with the murder of Steven Cho, his wife, Min Cho and the couple's seven-year-old son Benjamin, a student at Winston Hills Public School.

Police were notified after the taekwondo instructor was admitted to Westmead Hospital early on Tuesday morning with serious stab wounds and underwent emergency surgery. He told police he had been attacked in the carpark

SUSPECT UNCOVERED

A 34-year-old man who allegedly caused more than \$10,000-worth of damage to six vehicles in local shopping centre car parks has been charged. He appeared in court on Monday.

Three Teslas, an Audi, a Mercedes and a Golf were allegedly damaged during January and February this year, while parked in shopping centres in Rouse Hill, Box Hill and Schofields.

Following an appeal on Police Facebook pages with a photograph of a suspect which asked for assistance, a member of the public called police to a shopping centre car park in In one week officers from The Hills Highway Patrol confiscated Provisional Drivers licences from five P-Plate drivers due to speeding.

of a supermarket on Church Street in North Parramatta earlier that evening.

Just before 10.30am on Tuesday 20th February officers attached to The Hills Police Area Command were called to Watkins Avenue Baulkham Hills where they found the body of Steven, 39, with several fatal stab wounds.

About 12.30pm the same day, police located the bodies of Min, 41, and her son at Lion's Taekwondo academy.

Master Lion, a father-of-two from North Kellyville was kept under police guard while he was treated for his injuries, before being charged at about 9pm on Wednesday 21st February by officers from Strike Force Bernarra with three counts of murder.

Schofields on Sunday 18th February where a 34-year-old man was arrested.

Police alleged in court, a three-bladed metal multi-tool was found in the man's possession when he was searched.

Officers from Riverstone Police Area Command charged the man with six counts of malicious damage, and one count of custody of an offensive implement in a public place.

Police have been advised the repair bill for the six vehicles is estimated to be more than \$10,000. Inquiries are continuing.

SONIA AND TODD Soldiering On for Charity

Early this morning (Friday February 23rd), Sonia and Todd Young tied up the laces on their walking shoes and fastened their travelling packs to begin their 422km on-foot journey from Bligh Park to Port Macquarie.

The long walk is all to raise money for Soldier On, a not-for-profit organisation that looks to assist both former and current members of the Australian Defence Force by delivering important support services. It's a cause close to Sonia's heart, knowing first hand the effect that war can have on veterans returning home.

"My dad, Morrie, was conscripted into the Vietnam War," Sonia says. "He was badly injured there in an incident where an APC hit a landmine. Over the years, he was in and out of hospital and he was eventually confined to a wheelchair, but through it all kept a good outlook on life. He used to say 'There's always someone worse off than yourself.' My mum was his full-time carer, but they would travel around Australia a lot in a Kombi Van and motorhome. Although he died in 2017, we thought the story of my mum and dad was inspiring, and that this was a good cause to help other people."

Having heard the experiences of her father firsthand, Sonia and Todd find it important

to raise funds for current members of the ADF and veterans. Sonia says: "We've had discussions where we both agree we would not be the people to go to war. When people come back, they have all of these memories and things to cope with. And that's what Soldier On is there for, to help them through those difficult times."

After spending the last few years living healthier lifestyles, Sonia and Todd see the walk as an opportunity to use their health to help those who really need it. Todd says: "I'm already on my feet 8-10 hours a day, this time it's just for much longer with about 10-12 kilos on our backs. We'll have Soldier On labels on our backpacks and QR codes on us to spark interest along the way."

For the couple's health and wellness coach Leanne Gerber, seeing their training take form in such a selfless manner makes her feel very proud. Leanne says: "I've had the privilege to be a part of the journey - Sonia inspires our healthy community anytime she shares her story. People are so moved and touched, and I admire her bravery and willingness to step out of her comfort zone." To Sonia, Leanne directly said: "I could not be prouder of you two - I can't even express it with words. Go you!"

Stages 1 and 2 of the Riverstone East precinct were rezoned in 2016 and the draft precinct plan for Stage 3 is now on exhibition for public feedback.

Stage 3 is in the North West Growth Area in the Blacktown Local Government Area, where we are aiming to develop a more inclusive community by rezoning land for more homes, including affordable homes, and creating a new neighbourhood where people will want to live.

Exhibition details

The draft precinct plan for Riverstone East aims to deliver a new neighbourhood of up to 3,600 new dwellings, including a 10% affordable housing target to support entry into the housing market for key workers and low-income earners. Riverstone East, Stage 3 covers approximately 174 hectares for urban development.

Planning for a new neighbourhood in Stage 3 includes educational facilities, each co-located with a community centre and double playing fields. It will also provide better connections with the broader North West Growth Area.

Amendments will be made to the State Environmental Planning Policy (Precincts – Central River City) 2021 (the proposed SEPP) to rezone the precinct primarily for residential purpose.

Castle Hill High Asbestos

SafeWork NSW has initiated legal action against the NSW Education Department over an asbestos scandal at Castle Hill High School following results of an inquiry which began in 2022.

A spokesman for SafeWork told the *Hills to Hawkesbury Community News:* "On the 15th February 2024, SafeWork NSW filed charges in the District Court of NSW against the New South Wales Department of Education. The charges were filed under sections 19(1)/32, 19(1)/33 and 19(2)/33 of the Work Health and Safety Act (NSW) 2011. They relate to alleged failures by the Department to discharge its health and safety duties to workers and other persons between April 2015 and October 2018 regarding asbestos issues at Castle Hill High School. As the matter is before the court no further information can be provided at this time."

Allegations that positive reports of asbestos found at Castle Hill High School in 2016 were falsely reported to staff and the school community as negative were raised by Castle Hill MP Ray Williams in 2022.

He said staff had been complaining for several years about white dust and fibers falling from the ceiling, the positive test results weren't revealed to staff until May 11, 2020. Parents were notified a few days later. Remediation work was carried out in 2020.

The MP's claims were investigated by the Department of Education and SafeWork NSW.

A Department of Education spokesman said: "The health, safety, and wellbeing of students and staff are our highest priorities. We have cooperated fully with SafeWork NSW throughout its investigations and will continue to do so. We will also continue to consult independent experts and relevant regulators on the best course of action when managing and remediating asbestos in schools."

The spokesman said the Department of Education has made significant improvements to asbestos management as part of a detailed review it initiated.

Meanwhile one local school was closed to students last week after the NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) confirmed the presence of bonded asbestos in mulch at St Luke's Catholic College, Marsden Park

Testing of recycled mulch laid at public parks, supermarkets and schools started on January 10th with more than 800 sites tested. Since 20th February there have been more than 40 positive tests returned including St Lukes at Marsden Park, Riverstone Sports Centre and St John of God Hospital Richmond.

A statement from the hospital on its social media said the contaminated mulch was



located within the recently landscaped gardens around the hospital's redevelopment site.

"The work site has been fully secured throughout the development and not accessible by patients, visitors or caregivers. NSW Health advises bonded, or non-friable asbestos, is considered low risk to human health and the environment. Our priority is the safety of our caregivers and patients, and we are working closely with our construction partners who are taking all necessary steps as directed by the EPA. The area will remain securely fenced until the necessary remediation works are complete."

The NSW Government has established an Asbestos Taskforce to co-ordinate government agencies and assist in prioritising sites considered of highest risk to the public.

The EPA says negative results have been returned for 798 sites since 20th February. To find out more visit www.epa.nsw.gov.au

Watching eight-year-old Micah Manyumwa effortlessly spin the sides of a jumbled Rubik's Cube until it returns to six faces of solid colour is remarkable. With a personal best of 29 seconds, the amount of time the young Micah has spent learning how to spin each individual part of the cube is apparent as he moves columns and rows seamlessly with different fingers.

Micah recalls when he first became interested in the art of speedily solving Rubik's Cubes, affectionately called 'Speedcubing' in the community: "I saw a documentary called 'The Speed Cubers', and that one of the guys Max Park had a lot of world records. And I wondered if I could get a record one day."

Becoming involved with the local speedcubing community has been really healthy for Micah, according to parents Kuda and Ernest. The family of five, which includes younger siblings Joelle and Gabe, moved to Sydney in November 2022 from Johannesburg, South Africa.

The huge move brought both great excitement and challenges for the family. Kuda says: "We were at a point where we were looking for a new adventure as a family. We were looking at Canada and Australia as possibilities, and when the offer to Australia came through, we were packing our bags within three months. I think we're grateful we came here, because the Canadian weather would have been on the cold side for us!"

The family decided to settle down in The Hills due to its high number of Christian schools, initially living in Bella Vista but having now recently moved to Glenorie. Ernest says: "We're loving it here, it's a great place. We settled in well in Bella Vista, but the kids' schools are closer to where we are now, so we decided to move. And it's also a pretty cool place, and very peaceful."

Though the area has been great for the family, the initial move 14 hours away from home was understandably difficult. Kuda says: "Adjusting wasn't easy for everyone, but I think Micah found himself something to help him. At first, we didn't even notice that he was learning to solve a Rubik's Cube. One day we picked up on it, and we saw that he watched YouTube videos and learned all by himself.

"It really helped him to find a hobby that he enjoys, and attended his first competition for speed cubing in December at Knox Grammar School. There, he was able to meet new friends and solve cubes under different circumstances, which he really enjoyed!"

The communal aspect is part of what makes it so much fun for Micah. He explains: "I can solve the cubes with my friends at school - we all come together and often have a Rubik's cube session after we put our bags down."

Micah isn't the only prodigy in the Manyumwa household though: twoyear-old Gabe is able to count past 100 and has some of his times tables already memorised. Ernest says: "Gabe loves numbers - he caught onto them more quickly than anything else. You'll just hear him counting and then suddenly he's doing times tables. And we're thinking 'Hey, you can't be doing times tables at two years old!' Even driving around, he's reading all the number plates."

Gabe's numerical ability has been somewhat of an accepted fact in the family, to the point it shocks others who casually hear him counting or multiplying up to double or triple digits. Kuda says: "A friend of ours highlighted it once and said that Gabe really does have a gift. I think you take these things for granted sometimes, but we've been really paying attention to his abilities."



Kuda and Ernest hope to continue nurturing the respective abilities of their children and seeing them continue to flourish. Kuda says: "With Gabe, I think his siblings have helped a lot, and we'll keep helping him count higher. For Micah, our aim is to keep exposing him to the local Cuber community, and hopefully see him advance and have some local role models. It's really good that he has local people that he can look up to who have reached similar heights."

Micah is hoping to trim his best Rubik's cube solve time down to 14 seconds. "After that, I'll be aiming for 3 seconds, which is the world record," he says. With his speed and commitment at such a young age, there's zero doubt Micah will be able to achieve this goal in no time.

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Sweetheart Day for HeartKids

CHRG's Sweetheart Day fundraiser this Valentine's Day surpassed expectations, raising over \$2,500 for HeartKids, highlighting the club's commitment to heart health awareness and supporting those affected by congenital heart disease.

In January 2020, Greg Page of The Wiggles suffered a sudden cardiac arrest during a reunion concert at the club's Lyceum Theatre. Quick action by staff who used a defibrillator at the club saved his life, sparking a passion for heart health advocacy within the club.

Similarly, in August 2020, Matt Bailey, General Manager of Lynwood Golf & Country Club, and his family experienced their own heart journey with their newborn daughter.

Harriet was just six days old when she was diagnosed with a hole in her heart and Atrial septal defect (ASD) and Hypoplastic Left Heart Syndrome (HLHS). At 8 days old Harriet underwent open heart surgery at The Children's Hospital at Westmead.

HeartKids provided crucial support during this challenging time, leaving a lasting impact on the Bailey family.

HeartKids is the only national not-for-profit organisation solely focused on supporting and advocating for all people impacted by Congenital or Childhood-Acquired Heart Disease (CHD) - one of the largest causes of infant death in Australia.



HeartKids offers support to 'heart families' on multiple levels - providing carebags with essential items for a hospital stay, financial assistance, parent education and community support pathways.

Inspired by these experiences, CHRG partnered with Castle Hill Police and Greg Page to equip first responder vehicles with defibrillators, aiming to improve survival rates for sudden cardiac arrest incidents.

The momentum continued with the club's participation in the HeartKids "Two Feet and a Heartbeat" walk in October 2022 and Lynwood Golf and Country Club's inaugural HeartKids Charity Golf Day in November.

At the time the State Manager of HeartKids, Janyne Hogan, said "Every day in Australia, eight babies are born with a form of congenital heart disease - that's one family every three hours whose life changes in a heartbeat. As we strive to increase community awareness of HeartKids, and its services available to families impacted by congenital heart disease in the local community, we are delighted to be partnering with CHRG."

Congenital heart disease incorporates a group of abnormalities of the heart and is a general name for any type of malformation of the heart, heart valves or major blood vessels which are present at birth. Childhood on-set heart disease includes children born with congenital heart disease and those who acquire it during childhood.

In 2023, CHRG and its hospitality venues supported Sweetheart Day, a Valentine's Daythemed fundraiser for HeartKids. Members and staff also embraced the initiative this Valentine's Day. The club has also partnered with Heartbeat of Football to offer heart health testing sessions across all venues, furthering their commitment to a heart-healthy community.

With each heartbeat, CHRG and its partners continue to cultivate a healthier, more compassionate community, one act of kindness at a time.

My Team and I are here to help

People often ask me what my favourite part of this job is. Without trying to sound like a cliché, it is undoubtedly the opportunity to help our community.

While part of that role is representing you in Canberra, another important part is helping members of our community to access and navigate Federal Government services.

I am hearing more and more about people suffering because the wheels of bureaucracy are turning far too slowly. When that happens, we are here to help.

One of the main areas where we assist is with Centrelink, Medicare and the NDIS. For instance, Jess from Mount Colah applied for paid parental leave but, 3 months later, it still had not been approved. My office raised the issue with Centrelink and, four days later, she started getting those much-needed payments.

I've long advocated for better telecommunications for our electorate. If you have telecommunications problems, we may be able to help. Recently, Lee from Cherrybrook contacted our office about issues with his phone and internet connection which had continued ever since he moved into his home 6 months before. My office raised the problem with Telstra, who fixed the problem within a week.

Additionally, while we can't influence the migration process, we can draw the

Department's attention to applications and seek updates on your behalf. For example, last year, Taylor from Thornleigh's niece applied for a visa to come to Australia for her wedding. When it still was not approved 3 months later, despite her family's visas being granted, our office escalated it with the Department. A few days later it was approved – making for a much happier wedding!

Hawkesbury residents benefit from Labor's better tax cuts

On the 1st of July this year, the Albanese Labor Government will deliver a tax cut for every single Australian taxpayer.

We understand that many households are doing it tough, we've listened and it became clear that giving more Australians a tax cut would make a real difference to help with the cost of living.

We want people to earn more – and keep more of what they earn. That includes hardworking Middle Australia, who benefit from our tax cuts—people who were getting not much or nothing from the coalition's tax plan.

A childcare worker in Bligh Park on \$40,000 a year will get a \$654 tax cut. Under the Liberal Party, they would have got zero. That's around \$90 million back into the pockets of taxpayers, the pockets of workers, just in the Hawkesbury and Blue Mountains alone. That's just for the first year

MEMORIES WITH IVOR JONES & FRIENDS



A few related events occurred recently. My wife, whilst sorting through things to make room for more things (as you do), decided that perhaps we needed to throw some stuff out. Placed on my desk in front of the computer was laid a number of files with the instruction "to go through and sort out what I want to keep, and what to dispose of."

I opened the first file and found an assortment of my press clippings from 1990, the second and third files similarly contained press clippings from later years. Looking through these clippings revealed to me that I first started writing for this publication when it was called the "Hills District & Toongabbie TV Guide & Entertainment Magazine", with my first column, entitled "Vote", appearing in the issue of February 16, 1990. The choice of the word "Vote" was because the aim of that column was to educate and inform readers of the complexities and issues relating to voting and 1990 was an election year. As an employee of the Australian Electoral Office (later Commission) for 25 years, and Divisional Returning Officer for Parramatta until 1993, I was keen to ensure readers of how their vote would be counted correctly, as I did point out what constituted a formal vote, and an informal vote, according to the rules in place at the time. The "Vote" column continued to be published until at least March 1991. By early 1992, it had been replaced by "Ivor's Column" which continued for a number of years along with my other offerings in the same publication, "From The Pages Of The Past" and "Hills Happenings by Bill". During this time the publication was being printed and published by Ron Stettler Printing in Reynolds St Toongabbie. By 1993, I was also writing a column, "Ivor's Galston Comments" in the, then, "Galston News" also printed by Stettler's. "Ivor's Roundup" appeared in 1994 in the "Dooral Roundup" and around that time the "Hills News" invited me to write pieces for them which I did for a few months. However, in 1996-97 I put away my writing for a while and my wife and I started a new enterprise which grew into one of the largest private election companies in NSW providing election services to registered clubs, credit unions and other non-profit organisations. That business "Metro-Poll Elections" continues to operate under new ownership as a division of the Australian Election Company and is now based in Queensland.

In February 2015, I recommenced writing for the former "Hills TV Magazine" now renamed "Hills to Hawkesbury" with a column named "Memories with Ivor Jones & Friends". In July 2016, I added a photographic page called "As We Were".

Recently, at the February Open Day at Bella Vista Farm, Marge Leary, a volunteer, asked me about something she once read about a lady who had serialised her younger days growing up. I immediately thought of Mary Leonora Smith whose life had been serialised in this column over three years ago during November and December 2020. Mary Leonora (Noreen) Smith featured in this publication once again in January of this year upon celebrating her 100th birthday. I had just seen this article in the aforesaid clippings and was able to pinpoint Marge's enquiry.

Another co-incidence is that Michelle Byrne, in her "Out and About" column in the last issue of this publication, wrote of the Radio Station "Alive 90.5" based at Baulkham Hills. As a former presenter and Chairman of the Board of that station during its early years, I covered that portion of my life in the media within my "Memories" column in the issue of 5th November 2021 which can still be found in our on-line issue of that year.

I enjoy what I do and hope to continue to write about things that interest me and work with people I like for as long as I am able. I have never sought payment for any of my articles even though I had been approached by another publication who offered me employment at one time.

A note that the Stettler family sold the "Hills TV Magazine" back in the 1990's and the "Hills to Hawkesbury" is now owned by the Compton Media Group and published by Adephi Printing. Diana Paton has kept the Community focus that was a hallmark of the Stettler-Touzel founding families, a focus which I enjoy.
