New High-Tech Buildings for Australian **Christian College**

Two new buildings were officially opened at Australian Christian College Marsden Park on Monday March 18th, bolstering the K-12 school's ability to accommodate for its rapidly growing enrolment numbers. The buildings were opened by the school's Principal Brendan Corr and Minister for Education and Early Learning Prue Car MP, along with members of the student body.

The school, which is set in a prime position of the North West Growth Corridor has grown massively in the past five years. In 2019, the school was host to 667 students; at the start of 2024, over 2,000 were enrolled. Due to its increasing numbers, the NSW Government recognised that ACC Marsden Park's growth plan aligned with their vision for the area, and both buildings were allocated funding from the Building Grants Assistance Scheme.

The Senior School building will accommodate over 650 students with 22 new classrooms spread across three interlinked levels. Also present in this building is a new admin and reception area and 4 science classrooms.

The new High-Tech Learning Hub is connected to the Senior School Building, and has a huge array of cutting-edge technology for students to utilise in their learning. The building includes two film and podcast studios, a production booth, two Mac labs, a robotics lab and a VR lab.

Brendan Corr spoke with excitement about the opening of the two buildings and how they

will assist students with learning valuable 21st century skills: "These services will assist in a very practical way. Students will be able to encounter industry standard technology, but it's also couched in a way that allows the thing that students are imagining in English or Art can be transferred into digital artefacts. They can walk into the studio and record the script or video production and share that on the network.

"It's incredibly exciting. We've watched it develop for about 15 months, we've looked at architects' impressions and plans, but it's not the same as being able to now walk through and experience it. My belief is that it's setting a very high level of expectation in the students, and that they will rise to that with these outstanding facilities. We're looking forward to seeing that!'

Students at ACC Marsden Park are equally thrilled to have access to these new facilities. Senior school students Yuj Patel and Prisha Malhotra were taking part in VR experiences on the opening day, and took a break to talk to Hills to Hawkesbury Community News about the benefits of the facilities.

Yuj said: "It helps us use facilities that will actually go outside of school, and we can use this space to do more hands-on work. It can really help us develop our future studies, and help us work as a group more." Prisha added: "It's a cool, interactive space. I'm really excited to use it more this year, and so is everyone else!"

HAVE YOUR SAY BY BEV JORDAN

Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley residents from eight Local Government areas are being encouraged to have their say and join a new community panel to help work underway to reduce the risk and impact of future floods in the region following six major flood events since 2020.

The NSW Reconstruction Authority announced the state's first regional Disaster Adaptation Plan on Tuesday, March 19th saying it will investigate infrastructure options "to better support communities" as well as strategies and ways to improve flood awareness and preparedness.

NSW Reconstruction Authority Head, Adaptation Mitigation & Reconstruction, Amanda Leck said: "The NSW Reconstruction Authority wants to reduce flood risk where we can and adapt where we can't. I encourage everyone across the Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley to share what they think their regional DAP should look like."

"Being informed will save lives – there's no simple solution to flooding in the Valley but we are making sure people are as prepared as they can be. This DAP will also be a key tool for our leading emergency services, including the NSW SES, who put their lives on the line when floods unfold."

But the announcement has dismayed the Hawkesbury Community Alliance which issued a statement saying: "Two years after the last major floods, the NSW Government has yet to provide tangible results, and we appear to be

still in a consultation phase.

This is yet another 'talk fest' with no action.

"Despite the community's active participation in the NSW Parliamentary FloodInquiry and unwavering cooperation with all information requests, the current government and the one before it have failed to deliver meaningful outcomes. This inertia is frustrating and disappointing.

"Hawkesbury Community Alliance has gone above and beyond by inviting several politicians to witness the devastation firsthand, including speaking to impacted residents. It also hosted the Flood mitigation forum, with expert input from Professor Stuart Khan for the community, politicians, and media, sharing what actions would make a difference in the future. Yet, despite these efforts, the situation remains stagnant.

The Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley stretches from Brooklyn to Wallacia and Wisemans Ferry. It covers land in the Hawkesbury, Hills, Blacktown, Penrith, Central Coast, Wollondilly, Liverpool and Hornsby local government areas.

NSW Reconstruction Authority Deputy CEO, Simone Walker said: "Floods in the

Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley have devastated communities, homes and businesses, and we know people will only face more and worse impacts if nothing changes.

"This critical work will provide strategies and actions to make sure people living and working in the Valley are safe and better prepared.

"Community input is vital to this work and the RA is seeking feedback to help us develop ways to better prepare for, and recover from, future floods."

The DAP is being developed in partnership with community, councils, government agencies, emergency services and technical specialists and will be delivered by mid-2025.

Taking the plunge during Seniors Week was a great opportunity for The Hills Area Police Command's vulnerable persons aged crime prevention officer, Snr Constable Michael Barnes, to meet locals and chat about his role in the community.

He was one of seven police officers from the Castle Hill station to join Senior Week Aguarobics held at Waves Fitness and Aguatic Centre on Tuesday. The officers had a chance to mingle with seniors before jumping in wearing hats and waterproof uniforms to join in

The session, organised by Hills Shire Council, gave Snr Constable Barnes the opportunity to talk to attendees about his role with The Hills PAC and advise about the help that is at hand.

Hills PAC Crime Manager, Detective Chief Inspector Chris Laird said: "Hills Police recognise that preventing crime in the first place is what we are trying to achieve for members of the community, and we have specialist officers who work in Domestic Violence, Youth and Vulnerable Communities.

"Senior Constable Mick Barnes, our Aged Crime Prevention Officer, works closely with support agencies, nursing homes, retirement villages and senior citizen organisations to help prevent our local seniors from being victims in the first place. Sadly Elder abuse is a problem that exists, but isn't as wide known

as other crimes such as Domestic Violence and Child Abuse... that is why we have a full time dedicated officer in this area."

Sue Pettman said it was her first time at Hills Shire Council Senior's Week event and it was great having the police involved.

"I've been working up until just recently but now that I am a senior, I need to get in and do some stuff. It was only last week that I came to Waves to enquire about classes and I found out about the Seniors Week Aqua Aerobics class so I put my name down and I came, and I thoroughly enjoyed it.

"It was a very active workout. Everybody was really into it today and it wasn't too slow for me. It was great."

Hills Shire Council Mayor Peter Gangemi said: "Council is proud to get behind NSW Seniors Week - a wonderful tribute to the remarkable contributions of our seniors.

Recognising the mix of excitement and opportunities this stage of life brings, we see this program as a chance to connect seniors with community support, including partnerships with local police and Council, further boosting their confidence and resilience."

SPEEDING P-PLATER

An 18-year-old P-Plate driver is due in court for allegedly driving at over 150km/ph in a 50km zone.

Officers from Hawkesbury Highway Patrol were conducting speed enforcement duties on Carrington Road Londonderry as part of Operation Safer Speeds when they spotted the Red P1 Provisional driver at about 5.20am on Wednesday, 13th March.

Police allege he was travelling towards police at a speed of 153km/ph in the signposted 50 km/ ph area and was stopped shortly afterwards.

His licence was immediately suspended and he was issued a Court Attendance Notice for the offences of Driving at a speed/ manner dangerous to the public and exceeding the speed limit by more than 45kph. He returned a negative result for Drugs and Alcohol.

MAN, 47, CHARGED

Hills Police investigating a series of break-ins on business premises in Norwest have arrested and charged a 47-year-old North Parramatta man with aggravated break and enter.

Over the past week, a number of commercial break and enters have been reported around Norwest Business Park, the most recent being in the early morning of Tuesday, 19th March.

Hills Police together with Northwest Metro Region Operational Support Group executed a search warrant upon a home at North Parramatta on Tuesday, 19th March. The 47-year-old has been charged with two counts of Aggravated Break, Enter & Steal.

Jack Fitzgibbon

A parachute training accident gone wrong on March 6th at the RAAF Base in Richmond resulted in the tragic death of Lance Corporal Jack Fitzgibbon, following injuries sustained during the incident.

The 33-year old Jack Fitzgibbon was the son of former Defence Minister Joel Fitzgibbon, and the soldier had recently become a member of the Special Operations Command in what was described as his 'dream job'.

Though it is not currently clear what caused the parachuting accident at present, three independent investigations into the incident are underway that are hoping to prevent another accident from happening again. The wider Australian Defence Force has halted all parachuting training exercises while investigations are active.

Acting Special Operations Commander Brigadier James Kidd addressed a press conference about the incident on March 7th, providing a statement about the Lance Corporal to those in attendance: "Jack was a much loved and respected soldier within the 2nd Commando Regiment, which is part of the Special Operations Command in the Army. Jack was loved for his courage and known for his sense of humour and his service to the country.

"Jack had served his country on operations abroad and also closer to home, serving

with country and local communities as part of natural disaster responses. Defence has initiated a formal investigation into this incident as we seek to learn how we can strengthen our processes, but we acknowledge that military training is inherently risky, and we remain committed to constantly training at the highest standards to achieve the level of excellence that we know our nation demands of us. Nonetheless, that investigation is underway and we'll be able to provide you some further information in due course."

Brigadier Kidd also presented a statement from Joel Fitzgibbon on behalf of the wider family, which said:

"We are devastated and heartbroken by the loss of our wonderful Jack. Serving in the Special Forces was Jack's dream job, and we take some comfort from the fact that he died serving his nation in the uniform of the Australian Defence Force. Jack was a dedicated, highly skilled and courageous soldier. He was an experienced parachutist. Our lives will never be the same

without Jack, but we will always remain proud of him and his many achievements."

The funeral for Lance Corporal Fitzgibbon was held in Cessnock on Monday March 18th, which was attended by hundreds of people including Prime Minister Anthony Albanese. Family members and fellow soldiers shared memories of the fallen soldier, remembering him for his genuine, fun-loving attitude and strong sense of mateship.



She explains: "This event started with my dog who helped immensely when our family went through a difficult time. If the dog wasn't there, I don't know how we would have coped – the dog knew that we were sad, and he had this remarkable ability to bring us together."

That inspiration, along with Padmini wanting to raise more awareness about mental health in the community, led to the Pawsitive Steps Festival. Initially, it began as a general

mental health day, but the integration of fun activities and animals has made the space more welcoming to people. Padmini says: "The Festival is largely a family fun day where children, adults and dogs can join in, but the overarching theme is of mental health. In that way, people feel it's not stigmatised, and they feel very comfortable talking about the topic it's a winning strategy!"

Nathan Cassar, the event's MC, is excited to be providing his service to such an important community event. He says: "Pets bring a lot of mental health benefits for us as humans – having a loyal companion like a dog that trusts you, believes in you and wants the best for you is so important, especially when a lot of people in this world don't get that experience in their human relationships.

"It's such a privilege and an honour to be asked to do this, and to be the voice and face of such a great initiative. on the day because there's so many things that are on offer. It's really special and a highlight of my career."

Though Padmini is hoping that people will have fun on the day, she wishes for all attendees to walk away with a greater understanding of the reality of mental health in the community. "What is most important to me is people actually monitoring their mental health rather than waiting too long until it becomes severe. To have the ability to talk about mental health like it's any other physical illness so that people feel comfortable discussing it, that's what this Festival is trying to do — create awareness on where to go and how to get help. And of course, on top of that, we'll have lots of dog activities and a family fun atmosphere. Everyone will have something to do on the day!"

The Pawsitive Steps Festival is on April 27th from 9am-5pm, in the area across from the Metro station at Rouse Hill Town Centre.

Hills Twins head to Maths Olympiad

Twin sisters Cloris Xu and Iris Xu from Baulkham Hills High are heading to Georgia next month to compete in the 2024 European Girls' Mathematical Olympiad (ENGMO).

The Year 12 students make up half of the Australian team competing in Georgia in a mathematics Olympic-style competition. The ENGMO is a mathematical and problem-solving global contest where teams of four young women compete to win the prestigious title.

Host country Georgia is over 13,000km away and will be holding the Mathematics Olympic event from the 11th-17th April.

This will be Australia's 7th year represented in the global competition, and the third year that Cloris and Iris have entered. The other two Australian team members this year are Amber Lee from Pymble Ladies College and Laura Nan from Fintona Girls School, Victoria.

Iris, who has won third place in the past two years, said: "My passion for mathematics stems from a keen interest in problem-solving and understanding its impact on the world.

"I find satisfaction in overcoming challenging problems, and exploring the positive influence such skills can have on society. The possibility of meeting people [at EGMO] who share the same interest as me is exciting, and

it's also great to have a chance to form lasting connections that extend beyond the event".

Her sister Cloris also shares a passion for problem solving and finds the process of problem-solving complex mathematical problems very rewarding, wants to apply it to future issues such as climate change.

As both sisters are in Year 12, this will be their last year of participating in the ENGMO, but Cloris looks forward to the opportunity of meeting like-minded young women and hearing their perspectives on mathematics.

Both sisters were recognised for their mathematical excellence by the Australian

Mathematical Olympiad Committee (AMOC) in 2022. In addition, Iris won the gold medal consecutively for two years as well as two bronze medals in the Asian Pacific Mathematical Olympiad in 2022 and 2023.

Head Mathematics Teacher at Baulkham High School, Jason Ribbans, praised the girls for their dedication and living out their school values; "Since arriving at the school, the girls have demonstrated excellence in their study of mathematics".

"Both Cloris and Iris enjoy a challenge and thoroughly deserve this opportunity. As a school community, we could not be prouder of their effort and achievements."

CEO of the Australian Maths Trust, Nathan Ford, who announced this years' team also congratulated the four team members for their contribution to mathematics.

"While our teams always want to perform their best for the competition, EGMO is about so much more - a chance for young women to meet their international peers and form relationships that will last a lifetime. Above all, after the hard work they've all put in, it's time for Amber, Cloris, Iris and Laura to have fun and enjoy the challenge and inspiration of mathematical problem-solving."

New Bus for Hills Community Aid

The power of community transport to connect people and places cannot be underestimated.

For the past 22 years, Hills Community Aid's (HCA) community bus has been instrumental to the success of the Tuesday Days Traveller Group which forms part of the Learning in the Hills program. Thanks to access to HCA's community bus, hundreds of independent travellers over the years have had the opportunity to explore different sites across Sydney and surrounding areas including gardens, beaches, galleries and places of historical interest whilst having fun and making new friends.

The community bus is driven by volunteers who not only love being part of the service but also have formed friendships with the groups they drive. Roly one of HCA's longest volunteer drivers, last year handed in his keys after more than 15 years of service. When Roly began driving there was 200,000km, by the time he had finished there was 465,830km on the clock.

HCA's community bus is also hired out at a low cost to community groups including sporting groups, Probus Clubs and Friendship Groups, giving them the opportunity to undertake activities without cost of bus hire being prohibitive. Mici Beer, CEO of Hills Community Aid is passionate about the service the community provides and the difference it is making in the lives of others.

"Without access to a community bus, people wouldn't have the opportunity to explore new places, visit places they haven't seen in years and make new friends. Two people who recently used our bus, mentioned to me that they hadn't been to the beach for over 6 years or visited Wollongong for over 10 years, they had a great day and enjoyed putting their feet in the water and listening to the waves." Mici Beer said.

With incredibly high mileage on the clock and after 22 years of service to the community, the well-loved HCA community bus is set to be retired. However, thanks to funding from State and Local Government, Hills Community Aid has a new bus, a Mitsubishi Rosa, which has been affectionately named Rosie by Hills Community Aid staff and volunteers.

When their homeland became too dangerous to stay, Ahmad* and Aafreen's* daughter Sayeh* was already very unwell. With healthcare in their country also in crisis, the family left Afghanistan and travelled to neighbouring countries to seek a diagnosis. The HARK Clinic, was established in 2005, to provide refugee and asylum seeker children and young people under the age of 16 with multidisciplinary health assessments and treatments. The Clinic also makes referrals to specialised support services within the community, which are consistent with these childrens' health care needs.

Dr Nikola Morton, is the Clinical Lead of the HARK Refugee Service at The Children's Hospital at Westmead, and also works as a Staff Specialist Paediatrician and international advisor for organisations such as Médecins Sans Frontières in France and as a field paediatrician in the Middle East and Africa.

Support from the community benefits the refugee and asylum seeker patients and their families by ensuring that they have equitable

access to healthcare, it enables the team to provide education and training across Sydney Children's Hospitals Network to deliver care to these patients and their families. It helps strengthen partnerships with other refugee and asylum seeker community agencies and services.

"We really appreciate everything that has been done for Sayeh. The HARK Clinic has always been there to support us. We are very thankful to Dr Nikola Morton and her colleagues," Aafreen said.



The Webbs Creek, Wisemans Ferry and Sackville ferry services are a lifeline to the nearby communities of Hawkesbury. Residents and businesses rely on them to get to school, to work, to attract customers, to attend medical services, attend sport and remain connected.

The industrial action by the Maritime Union of Australia (MUA) has caused disruptions to the daily lives of the people in this part of The Hills Shire and Hawkesbury region. The stoppages have proceeded with minimal notice. Ferry users have had to allow considerable extra time to travel and I know the ferry workers are uncomfortable with the pain this has caused.

Following on from my interventions in Parliament, the advocacy from the community and the media attention gained, the MUA and contractor Birdon Group, have decided to sit down at the negotiation table. I have also been advised that Transport for NSW has become more engaged in the dispute and is pressuring the parties to reach a workable employment agreement.

On a more uplifting note, let me introduce you to Fiona Germaine, Hawkesbury's 2024 Woman of the Year! Fiona has a remarkable story as a successful international model with Versace and owner of a fashion business. A few years ago, Fiona and her family moved to Hawkesbury for a tree change and like most of us, fell in love with Hawkesbury's distinct landscape and culture.

The Black Summer Bushfires brought out Fiona's ability to identify critical needs and to find solutions. She felt compelled to help her community by working with volunteers to provide food and emergency resources for those isolated in remote parts of the electorate.

Investing in women's health care

If you're someone who doesn't have endometriosis, or doesn't know someone with endo, this may not seem important.

But women across the Hawkesbury and north western Sydney can now access endometriosis and pelvic pain care close to home, at a specialist clinic in Rouse Hill and I know it could change their lives.

Located at the Rouse Hill Town Medical and Dental Centre, the Evoca Endometriosis and Pelvic Pain Clinic is staffed by nurses, GPs with a specialisation in endo and pelvic pain, physios and other health professionals who can offer multidisciplinary and targeted treatment.

It is one of the first of 22 clinics the Albanese government has established to deal with this debilitating condition that strikes 1 in 9 women from puberty to beyond menopause and takes an average of seven years to be diagnosed and treated. It also costs some sufferers tens of thousands of dollars, mostly in lost wages.

The \$58.3 million package we've rolled out to fund the clinics also covers an additional Medicare item for MRI scans for women with endo having fertility problems and the development an endometriosis management plan.

We know there needs to be changes to the health care system, so it works better for women, and at a recent women's health forum I held with Assistant Minister for Health and Aged Care, Ged Kearney, we heard from women who've faced misdiagnosis, not being listened to, and being ignored- often when at their most vulnerable.

The results of a new national survey called #EndGenderBias confirm that this experience is overwhelmingly shared across the country, with 70% of women experiencing bias in the diagnosis and treatment of health conditions, while 70% of experts felt women were 'only slightly or not at all' believed about a health issues.



The endometriosis and pelvic pain clinics are designed to change that for women with the condition. I'd really encourage any woman or girl suffering in silence with pelvic pain or endometriosis to reach out to them and make an appointment. You deserve to be heard and you don't have to endure this pain.

On the 19th March 1932 an Irish immigrant, a resident of the Hills district, caused a stir in the annals of Australian history. The occasion was the official opening of our first road crossing of Sydney Harbour - The Sydney Harbour Bridge.

The bridge was to be officially opened by the Premier Jack Lang, when the diminutive Irishman, Francis Edward de Groot, mounted on a horse borrowed for the occasion, charged forward brandishing a sword and slashed the ribbon at the entrance the bridge, shouting "I declare this bridge Open in the name of the people of New South Wales".

De Groot was a member of the Fascist organisation named "The New Guard" who were vehemently opposed to Jack Lang, the Labor Premier of New South Wales, who they believed was a Communist sympathiser. Upon the Police disarming de Groot and arresting him it was thought that he was a lunatic and the Police charged him as such but he was later pronounced sane. Colonel Eric Campbell, a Solicitor from Turramurra, was the leader of the New Guard and declared that had acted with the full approval of the Executive Council of the New Guard. Subsequently, de Groot sued the NSW Government on the grounds that a police officer had no right to arrest an officer of the Hussars (de Groot had served in the British Army in the 15th Hussars during WW1 and had kept his sword from this period) in which he was awarded what amounted to around \$138 in damages for wrongful arrest.

After his arrest, Francis de Groot is reported to have said, "Of course having ceased to even looking like fighting, I was easy, and accordingly about 14 large pair of hands tried to obtain a grip on some portion of me, not all with success because a lack of space...

Tempers soon simmered down, my foot was released from the stirrup, and I was hurried into the toll house, where I remained for about an hour, whilst Lang, his Cabinet and Cops debated what best to do with me."

As well as being noted for his membership of the New Guard, de Groot was an antique dealer and a furniture manufacturer and was commissioned to make a chair for the first Australian born Governor-General, Sir Isaac Isaacs. The chair was last exhibited at the Centenary of Federation in 2001 at Centennial Park, by Governor-General, Sir William Deane. Regrettably, on the day, no commentator mentioned that the chair had been hand-crafted by de Groot. The chair is now in the Mitchell Library NSW State Library. Among his clients for handmade furniture was Dame Eadith Walker of Yaralla at Concord.

Prior to his death in Ireland, de Groot indicated he would like to see the sword returned to Australia. In 2004, the sword was

found on a farm in County Wicklow, in the possession of de Groot's nephew. Plans were announced to have it valued and returned to Australia, possibly as a display at the National Museum of Australia. However, the Museum was outbid by Paul Cave, the founder and chairman of BridgeClimb Sydney, the tourism company that conducts climbs across the Harbour Bridge. The sword was presented to Bridge Climb Sydney by prior students of Blackrock College, De Groot's old school, during a school reunion for ex-students now living in Australia.

The home in which Francis de Groot lived "Dunrath House" is currently still standing at139 Castle Hill Rd, West Pennant Hills (Cherrybrook) and is currently owned by Top Place Development who are currently in receivership and controlled by controversial developer Jean Nassif who is believed to be in Lebanon. It was sold to Top Place for \$42 million in 2015 and is subject to Heritage Protection by Hills Shire Council.

Previous owners of Dunrath have included the artist William Dobell, radio personality Frank Clune and printer and publisher Bob McMillan.

De Groot died in Dublin in 1969 age 80.



Golden moments for Budokan Judo Club

Budokan Judo Club have creamed their rivals in two major competitions, bringing home a massive haul of 47 medals, including 16 gold, to cement their reputation as one of the most successful clubs in NSW and Australia.

More importantly, the Castle Hill club is attracting more newcomers to its ranks and increasing the popularity of judo in The Hills District and surrounding suburbs.

The club is run by highly-experienced and passionate Hills judo coaches Rob and Kerrye Katz (who competed at the 1988 Seoul Olympics). They had 61 athletes competing in 85 competition divisions at the Sydney International Open and the ACT International Open.

In addition to the gold haul, their female and male representatives won 18 silver and 13 bronze medals. In addition, Budokan Judo Club's five competitors in the kata events captured three golds and one silver.

"Both the Sydney International Open and the ACT International Open were very successful events for Budokan Judo Club," head coach Rob said. "Our participation is higher now than ever which means we are building significant depth in competition experience across all our age categories."

Rob, rated as one of Australia's most successful judo competitors before he retired, said their better Cadet (15-17 years) athletes are competing in both Juniors (18-20 years) and

Senior categories meaning that if they progress through the rounds, they can get 9-12 matches in a day.

"This is great preparation for international events. Performances at these two events resulted in four of our cadets being selected for two competitions and training camps in Europe next month, which is really encouraging for all our athletes, including our youngest (under 11) competitors," Rob said. "Our international senior athlete will

continue his preparation for the Paris Olympic Games with the Pan-American-Oceania qualifying event in Brazil scheduled end of April."

According to the official results at the ACT and Sydney International events, Budokan Judo Club's medal tally across Juniors (U/11, U/13, U/15), Seniors (Cadets, Junior men/Women, Senior Men/Women), Veterans and Adaptive divisions, was the highest of any participating club. Rob said his athletes are training hard for the big championships slated for Melbourne and Perth prior to the June Nationals.

Hills United were held scoreless in the first half by Sutherland Strikes before banking a 3-0 victory. They broke free in the second session, starting with Sciberras scoring from the spot in the 53rd minute.

Donaldson and Davidson then killed off their opponents hopes with two quick goals within four minutes to maintain their strong start to the 2024 season, with three wins.

In the second round, Hills United crushed Inter-Lions 5-0, thanks to goals from Bella Donaldson, Alix Roberts, Kaylie Shannon, Aisling Davidson and Ashleigh Heuston-Richardson.

The Hills women lie second to high scoring Blacktown City FC on goal difference as both have perfect starts after three rounds, along with thirdplaced Central Coast Mariners.

The in-form Hills women next take on hosts Mt Druitt Town Rangers on Sunday, March 24, at the Popondetta Park field 2 at 3pm.

Meanwhile, the Hills United men, who slumped to a 4-0 defeat against Wollongong Wolves in the sixth round, will be looking for better fortunes this Saturday, March 23, when they face Rockdale Llinden FC at Landen Stadium, Seven Hills, from 7pm.
