

# **BOX HILL SCHOOLS** IN BUDGET

The State Government has announced that a temporary school is being fasttracked for the growing Box Hill area with enrolments set to open from 2025.

The government will begin work on a new primary school and high school at Box Hill, in addition to the new primary school in Gables currently in planning. Together the three schools will cater for 3000 local students with room to grow.

Both Box Hill and Gables primary schools will be delivered with co-located public preschools to increase access to high quality early education.

Nearby, the state's most populous school campuses at Riverbank Public School and The Ponds High School will receive significant additional funding for further upgrades on top of those already underway, to cater for their large and growing student populations.

New schools have also been announced for Tallawong which will get a new public school and a new high school.

Treasurer Daniel Mookhey said: "This is a must-have investment in the future of Western Sydney families.

"Growing communities, including Box Hill, have been waiting years for this announcement. It means they'll be able to access quality public education close to home.

"It builds on the investments this Government has already made to build stronger communities and better schools by funding critical infrastructure and paying our teachers more.

Member for Riverstone Warren Kirby said: "For years children from Marsden Park and Box Hill have had to travel to Riverstone just to access a public school,

"The delivery of these local schools will not only have a positive impact on our children's

education, it will also reduce traffic on critical roads like Richmond Road, Windsor Road and Garfield Road."

Funds for the new Primary School in the Gables will also include an on-site public preschool.

A site for the new primary school was acquired in early 2023 between Fontana Drive and Cataract Road at Gables.

The Government will be using the Manufacturing for Schools program (announced in February this year) which it says will deliver cost savings of up to 20 per cent and slash construction time by up to 30 per cent.

It incorporates a range of cutting-edge construction techniques including digital technologies, off-site manufacturing and on-site assembly of prefabricated elements to deliver high quality school buildings faster and at a lower cost than with traditional construction methods.

At Oran Park Public School, a stage two upgrade that opened for students to use on day one, Term 1 2024, was installed on site in eight weeks. From design to completion, the project took a total of 13 months.

The Government says the new program will reduce carbon emissions, material waste and water waste on sites in comparison with traditional construction methods.

At the time Deputy Premier and Minister for Education and Early Learning Prue Car said: "This is an economical, sustainable, and speedy solution that will deliver school facilities meeting the needs of our growing population, while getting better bang for taxpayers' buck."

# TOPLACE APARTMENTS

Complex negotiations are still being carried out to find a builder to complete work on the Skyview apartment complex in Castle Hill opposite Castle Towers Shopping Centre.

A spokesman for The Hills Shire Council told the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News this week that Building Commission NSW is currently working with receivers and managers to appoint a contract to complete the Hydra, Phoenix and Vela Towers.

"Council staff will continue to work alongside Building Commission NSW to address the defects in these buildings," they said.

Last month (May, 2024) the Supreme Court wound up JKN Hills PTY Ltd which was the Toplace entity responsible for the remediation works.

Buyers were blocked from moving into the \$900million apartment complex in 2021 after the NSW Building Commissioner confirmed "extensive signs of cracking" were discovered in the basement of the buildings.

Thousands of homeowners have been caught up in the collapse of Toplace, one of the biggest private apartment developers in Sydney for over a decade.

As well as the five

towers (Lyra, Carina, Hydra, Phoenix and Vella) in the Skyview project Toplace companies also built the Atmosphere building on Old Northern Road, Castle Hill, Grand at Kellyville and was building Box Hill City Centre, bounded by Terry Rd and Mason Road at Box Hill and a townhouse development in Watkins Road, Baulkham Hills.

The dVT Group was appointed as administrators to over five entities related to the Toplace Group after Toplace's building licence was suspended in March 2023. Around \$436 million is owed to unsecured creditors, including \$146 million relating to strata bodies' defect claims, \$85 million to tradies and suppliers and a reported \$25million to the Australian Tax Office.

In answer to questions from the *Hills to Hawkesbury Community News*, a Shire Council spokesperson said: "Development consent for the

Atmosphere building approved 378 residential apartments, most of which are occupied.

"In 2018, an Interim Occupation Certificate was issued by a private certifier and that was the subject of a complaint managed through the Department of Fair Trading.

"Since then, Council staff have raised concerns about the extent of the building's defects and have requested Building Commission NSW to take regulatory action against JKN Hills Pty Ltd to fix the defects.

"In June 2021, Building Commission NSW issued a Prohibition Order on JKN Hills Pty Ltd to prevent the issuing of a final Occupation Certificate. In 2022 and 2023, Building Commission NSW also issued Building Works Rectification Orders on JKN Hills Pty Ltd to rectify the building defects. As JKN Hills Pty Ltd has gone into liquidation, Council staff are working with

#### RFS VOLUNTEER HONOURED

The prestigious Australian Fire Service Medal has been awarded to Firefighter Suzanne 'Sue' Talbert from the Hills District RFS. She was one of eight RFS

members named as part of the King's Birthday Honours List for distinguished service by members of Australian fire services.

Sue has spent 45 years as a volunteer with the Kenthurst Brigade.

Her citation reads: "From the very start, Sue demonstrated a passion for service and an unwavering commitment. She later became a dual member with The Hills District Communication Brigade, where she served as a Deputy Captain from 2008 to 2024.

Sue's outstanding dedication extends beyond firefighting.

In 1994, she was a founding member of the RFS Critical Incident Support Services (CISS) team. The CISS provides crucial emotional support to fellow volunteers and staff across the state. Sue works unconventional

hours, traveling throughout NSW often onto firegrounds to prioritise the wellbeing of the RFS family. Over the last 30 years as a member of CISS, Sue has arguably made her greatest impact on the RFS by supporting and protecting its members.

#### **METRO ALERT**

Police are stepping up patrols around Metro stations following a number of robberies and threatening behaviour by groups of youths gathering near the entrances.

On one day last week at 3pm police searched a group of teenagers wearing hoodies and face masks at Castle Hill Metro to find a whole collection of weapons including a machete, hammers, box cutters and kitchen knives.

Police are now urging the general public to call police immediately if they see any young males who have their faces covered and wearing a hoodie in groups at train stations and transport hubs anywhere along the Metro line so they can be checked out.

If you are at a Transport Hub, and you see people acting suspiciously, tell staff, or call 131444 to request a police car to patrol. If it is a dangerous situation, call 000 immediately. #### **CALLOUS THEFT**

A 27-year-old Kellyville woman has been charged with break and enter after the home of 81-year-old Nola Bulkeley was broken into while her family were attending her funeral and wake.

The break-in was discovered by three of the grandmother's grandchildren when they returned to the home from her wake on Friday, May 31st.

Police allege jewellery and iPads were stolen in the break-in at the house on Chalet Rd, Kwllyville which was empty between 8am and 6pm.

The 27-year-old woman and her 27-year-old partner were arrested at a Kellyville home on Wednesday, 5th June.

The woman was taken to Castle Hill Police Station where she was charged with two counts of break and enter house etc steal. The second offence relates to the alleged break in and theft of electronics and jewellery at a home in Lancroft Court, Castle Hill, on Monday 3rd June.

The man was charged with dispose property theft. Police allege the man sold stolen jewellery.

#### ROBBER CAUGHT.

General duties police from The Hills Police Area Command were patrolling the North Kellyville area at about 11.30pm on 6th June when they caught a man allegedly in the act of stealing a number of line trimmers, hedge trimmers and other handheld landscaping power tools from a utility and trailer parked on Sandbanks Ave. The 49-year-old Londonderry man is due in court in July after he was arrested at the scene.

#### SPOOF CALL WARNING

Beware of caller ID spoofing calls. Police in Hills and Hawkesbury have received a large number of people contacting them advising they had received phone calls from the police stations phone number. No response when they answered and no message left.

We urge people to be vigilant about these scam calls. Majority of phone calls from the police station will come from a PRIVATE number. Police will leave a message if we need you to return our phone call!

#### **MOTEL ASSAULT**

A man is in critical condition following an alleged assault at a motel at about 12.40am on Tuesday 4th June.

Emergency services were called to a motel on George Street, Windsor, following reports a man was being assaulted in a motel room. On arrival, officers attached to Hawkesbury Police Area Command found a 27-year-old man with severe head injuries. He was treated at the scene by NSW Ambulance paramedics and taken to Westmead in a critical condition.

A 53-year-old man was taken to Windsor Police Station for guestioning.

#### **DRIVING OFFENCES**

Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol suspend a 20-year-old male Learner driver from Lakemba travelling well above the sign posted speed limit with no supervisor. At about 12.55am on Thursday 30th May, officers were conducting stationary speed enforcement along Old Windsor Road, Glenwood and detected a white Suzuki Vitara travelling up to 130 km/hr in a sign posted 80 km/hr zone. The driver returned negative results for alcohol and drugs. He was issued infringement notice for Learner driver exceed speed limit - over 45 km/h, Learner not accompanied by licenced driver/police officer or tester and Learner driver not display L plates. His NSW driver's licence was suspended and confiscated on the spot for a period of 6 months. The vehicle was not owned by the driver and the number plates remained on the vehicle.

Hills Highway Patrol have caught 3048 drivers speeding so far this year. Hills Highway Patrol and Hills Police have also charged 248 drivers so far this year with driving without a licence. Some were disqualified, or never held a licence but some others were suspended drivers due to non payment of fines, and demerit points. To avoid the mandatory penalty of 12 month disqualitification if you're caught driving whilst suspended, check that your licence is current now. From July 1, Seatbelt Detection Cameras will be in operation.

CHRISTOPHER'S LAW

Industrial manslaughter legislation has taken a step closer to being made law in NSW after a Bill was introduced in State Parliament on Tuesday, June 4th.

It's been a five year crusade for Patrizia and Robert Cassaniti from Castle Hill who lost their son Christopher in a horrific workplace incident just days after his 18th birthday. They hope the Bill will now pass through both the Lower and Upper House quickly without any amendments.

Christopher Cassaniti died in April 2019 after scaffolding on the building he was working next to at Macquarie Park gave way, trapping the 18-year-old under debris and rubble for 20 minutes before he died.

Synergy Scaffolding Services, which pleaded guilty to one offence under the Work Health and Safety Act, was fined \$2million over the "catastrophic" collapse which also injured another worker.

The scaffolding company was engaged to design, erect and maintain the scaffolding by principal contractor GN Residential Construction, which was fined \$900,000.

NSW is the last mainland state without an industrial manslaughter offence. The maximum penalties under the new legislation will be 25 years jail for an individual and \$20million for a body corporate. Until the new law is passed the maximum penalty is 5 years imprisonment for an individual or a \$3.8 million fine for a body corporate.

Minister for Work Health and Safety Sophie Cotsis said: "Every worker deserves to go home to their loved ones at the end of the day. No government should ever want to have to use these laws. Any workplace death is a tragedy and in cases where a person with a work health and safety duty has been careless or irresponsible, they must be held accountable."

The Cassaniti family have made it their mission since Christopher died to improve workplace safety on construction sites and help families touched by tragedy.

Their Touched by Christopher Foundation provides financial assistance to families of someone who has died on a construction site by providing three months' worth of groceries plus an additional \$1,500 towards current utilities.



As part of her business, Let's Talk About Safety, Patrizia has spoken to workers at thousands of construction sites around Australia and overseas reminding them that it's not worth risking their lives to get a job done. Patrizia tells workers: "Every two days an Aussie is going to work and will die. It is my mission to get that number to 0. No Australian should ever go to work and die."

#### **WINDSOR GAS LANTERN FESTIVAL**

#### **HAWKESBURY REGIONAL GALLERY**

Only recently opened in 2005, this public gallery promotes the work of regional and North-Western Sydney artists, presenting their work in a brightly lit space. Often touring exhibitions from regional communities will display their work, otherwise general entry is free. With changing exhibitions and a range of both Indigenous, contemporary and abstract art - the Regional Gallery has something to intrigue everything's tastes. Currently, The New Quilt 2024 exhibition is operating until the end of June, showcasing 37 contemporary textile artists across Australia in conjunction

with QuiltNsw. Public and education programs are also offered including artist talks, master classes and school holiday workshop programs which you can check out on their website.

You can visit this Art Gallery at 300 George Street, Windsor, 2756. They are open 6 days a week from Monday, Wednesday- Friday 10am to 4pm and, Saturday to Sunday 10am to 3pm.

#### HAWKESBURY REGIONAL MUSEUM

The Regional Museum operates in both a new brick building and the adjacent historic al, Georgian-style Howe House. This heritage home is rich with 200 years of history as it was builtby John Home in the 1820s and is now a time-capsule of Australia's colonial history. However, the newly-built museum showcases its previous Tourism and Heritage awards with a variety of displays including Indigenous Australian stories and artefacts, and astronomer John Tebutt's scientific instruments. Perhaps the most intriguing is their 'Paradise Lost' collection exploring the nostalgia of abandoned theme parks and reliving child-hood memories through photographs and memorabilia.

You can visit this regional museum at 8 Baker Street, Windsor 2756. They are open Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday from 10am to 4pm, and Saturday to Sunday from 10am to 4pm. Currently, the Howe House is only open for group-bookings.

#### **STREET ART MURALS**

Pretty pastels, local birds and bright fruit are all jumping off the walls of George Street's Mall art murals. Designed by David and Noni Craigg in 2019 with conjunction in Art Pharmacy Consulting, these vibrant pieces offer both native and contemporary flora and fauna, bringing lush colour to the historical old town. With a mixture of Eastern Spinebills, a Honeyeater and a Golden Bell Frog are an ode to the traditional Dharug owners of the land and honour Windsor's beautiful landscape.

A recent addition to Baker Street is local artist Bella Bonazza's silhouette of Old Windsor Town outside of The Manor on George. Her art brightens the area and revamps the historical town's image with a focus on traditional and bold colours. You can find the artwork outside of 278 George Street, Windsor.

# Murray Park Road Track

Bush tracks can take the bushwalker through a variety of landscapes and vegetation. One such track, which is in reality a fire trail, starts and ends at the end of Murray Park Rd Kenthurst.

This track is hardly hidden but the diversity of native flora that can be "discovered", certainly in many cases, is hidden from the view of the casual walker.

At most times of the year the walker can be rewarded in finding a wide variety of wildflowers both large and small, along the fringes of the track. The track passes through ridge top landscapes of open forest and heathland scrub, to a spot where there are views over adjacent forested valleys and slopes.

There is a relatively steep descent into one of these valleys which supports an extensive regrowth forest of towering Blue Gums.

The track then follows Blue Gum Creek upstream a short distance before ascending a reasonably steep hillside to the ridge top plateau.

When walking slowly and quietly through this area it is possible to sight many birds, some that are not usually visible in built up areas, as this is their preferred habitat.

#### **COMMUNITY NEWS**

Depending on the pace chosen to walk, it may take up to two hours to complete. Remember to take your camera as there is always the opportunity to capture something memorable.

If you are not a frequent bushwalker accustomed to being out in this environment there are some points of advice to consider when you venture out into bushland. Adequate strong footwear is essential, so too is a hat. If going out for an extended time always take some water and maybe a snack bar or two.

Through the Community Environment Centre at Annangrove there is a program of free guided bushwalks organised throughout the year. For further details go to the Hills Shire Council website at http://www.thehills.nsw.gov. au and enter "bushwalks" into the search box at the top of the page.

Frank has been President of the Castle Hill and Hills District Agricultural Society since 2016 and honorary vet surgeon since 2013. His involvement with the Castle Hill Show

spans more than 60 years, first as a member of the Epping Junior Farmers and later showing Jersey cattle. He has been a Representative State disaster plan New South Wales

He has been a Representative State disaster plan New South Wales agricultural and animal services committee and is a life member of the Australian Veterinary Association.

He trained as a vet and qualified in 1962 and worked in the Agriculture Department's Laboratory and in the Field for over 40 years becoming Director of the Animal Quarantine Services in 1983. It saw him travel to many parts of the world ensuring (pre-export) the safe passage of pedigree horses and cattle from their home country and through quarantine in Australia.

Harinder Kaur and her husband Maninder Singh set up the Harman Foundation in 2013 after their eldest son died in a car crash. Harinder said they felt so lost following Harman's death "we were looking for a purpose".

While the Harman Foundation started off as a grief and loss support network it has evolved into supporting victims of domestic violence and the homeless. Harinder says they have a holistic approach and as well as helping people in DV situations they also work with people struggling and have a chaplaincy.

The Harman Foundation is run by volunteers and deals with people in crisis around the clock. The Foundation has food drives and runs events, since 2013 it has reached 20,000 people.

In 2015. The Foundation set up a helpline (1800 116 675) which operates 24/7. In the DV area alone the Foundation has had 500 calls and helped in 150 complex DV cases.

Harinder says the culturally appropriate service is aimed at the South Asian community.


"As we travelled down the path of providing support for grief and loss we came across so many cracks in services," she said.

"We ran a survey of 500 people to find out what services people needed so we started the 1800 number.


"As.a family we had never come across family and domestic violence. We had to find resources. In 2016. We opened a shelter in Western Sydney which has helped 75 people. There is such a need, it is always full There's such a scarcity of accommodation that is culturally appropriate.

"In 2022. Because of the need. We also opened a multicultural community hub as well. We have no Government funding."

Harinder says the OAM Recognises the work of the Foundation which is also supported by the couple's children Manu and Nikki.

"Regarding the five Skyview Towers, in June 2021, an interim Occupation Certificate was issued for the Lyra and Carina buildings, which certified these two buildings were safe to be occupied. Both buildings are occupied. Since then, Council and Fire and Rescue NSW have raised concerns about the defects of these buildings. Building Commission NSW is currently investigating these defects.

"In September 2023, Building Commission NSW issued a Prohibition Order and a Draft Building Works Rectification and is working with the appointed receivers and managers to address the defects in the building.

"These two examples are very concerning to Council as unit owners are exposed to large strata fees to fix defects that should have been the builder's responsibility in the first place. These are examples where the independent building certification system should be overhauled to protect consumers and if it is not fixed, these examples will make housing targets all the more difficult to resolve."

On June 15th 2023 Hills Shire Council issued Toplace with a notice to rectify fire safety issues at its Skyview Apartment building after the partially completed apartment complex failed a Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW) inspection.

FRNSW discovered several fire safety breaches including an inoperable and dry fire hydrant system (for the three of five buildings under construction within the complex), faults. isolations, and disablements on the fire indicator panel, problems with the emergency warning and intercom systems, issues with the absence of fire compartmentation in the basement carpark. A media statement from Hills Shire Council at the time said staff also inspected the building and identified issues with the sprinkler system, non-compliant ceiling heights, non-related fire services found in the fire stairway and problems with fire doors not opening and closing, amongst other safety breaches.

In July 2023 the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News reported that Antony Resnick and Suelen McCallum of the dVT Group had been announced as voluntary administrators of Toplace Pty Ltd.







Since the South Windsor charity's inception in 2011 by Linda Strickland and her daughter, hot meals have been offered every Saturday and Sunday; fortifying the community and offering dignity back into the lives of those doing it tough. The atmosphere at the dinners is heautiful and attention to detail is taken

doing it tough. The atmosphere at the dinners is beautiful and attention to detail is taken with spreads, linen tablecloths and always a delicious dessert to finish the night with. Linda is incredibly down-to-earth and passionate about her cause, with great ambitions to offer even more services, "We are a food rescue & relief charity trying to help those experiencing

homelessness and food poverty".

Hawkesbury's Helping Hands also prepares fresh food hampers sold each Saturday 2 - 4:30pm. Despite the struggle to maintain the cap at \$20, the hampers remain incredibly generous and affordable as most of the food is purchased out of pocket by the charity. The hampers are nutritionally dense, offering people almost a trolley-worth of cold food, dry cupboard goods and fresh produce.

Battling against the sharp bite of Winter and the rise of rough sleepers, Linda offers hot showers and has recently introduced a 'Warm Room' on the top level of the warehouse, which operates 8am to 1pm on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. Community and connection is at the heart of Linda's work, as

the 'Hub' which operates at the same time is a safe place for people to have a cup of tea and connect with nearby services.

"Our warm room gives people a chance to snuggle up on a bean-bag, have a nap, and watch TV. It gives them a safe where they can relax during the day. They're welcome to bring up coffee, tea or popcorn - whatever they choose. A lot of people who are homeless don't have a lot of choices and giving someone a choice, is giving them their dignity".

A new computer room, expected to open within the next month in partnership with Mastercard, will offer opportunities for people to bridge the gap in technological access. Donations of desks, computers, printers and also a free-wifi network are included for viable job-searching opportunities without the judgement of public spaces.

The impact of Hawkesbury's Helping Hands on the local community is phenomenal, Linda has seen families grow up and people's situations change: "We still have people come in and say, 'You were there when we needed you the most'. Last year, I was surprised when a group of regulars visited me outside the warehouse saying 'We came home for Christmas!' It was incredibly moving".

However, Hawkesbury's Helping Hands has been greatly affected by the cost of living crisis as Linda reflected on the increased pressure on their services: "A new demographic has found themselves in these tough situations - the working poor. But the cost of living is also affecting charities - our overheads are higher. Hawkesbury's Helping Hands is completely unfunded and relies solely on donations. The Hawkesbury has also dealt with eight major floods in 2 to 3 years and has been hit so hard, we are in constant recovery mode."

Linda praises her volunteers and expresses her deepest gratitude to everyone that has helped: "We are very fortunate with our volunteers, without the community and volunteers we wouldn't be running for 13 years. Thank you for believing in us and our core mission". She also is desperate for new community-minded individuals who are willing to offer 4 hours a month to volunteer in cooking, delivering ingredients or assisting at food pickups. # Connection through Craft

The Positive Vibes Foundation and their partnership with The Hills Women's Shed unites women together and inspires connection through their workshops.

Within the brick-buildings at Balcombe Heights Estate in Baulkham Hills, you'll find a community of women who connect every Thursday morning to learn new skills ranging from tools, craft and dance. Women's Shed's are a relatively new concept in Australia, as there are only about 50 sheds dedicated towards women compared to 1,200 Men's sheds.

The Positive Vibes Foundation is a not-forprofit charity, "promoting positive mental health in Communities through Connections and Conversations". They opened the Hills' Women's Shed in 2018 and it's the first of its kind in the area: creating a community for women to feel empowered. Protecting and promoting mental health is imperative more than ever, with social isolation rising even as we become more interconnected online.

Director Susan Smith works alongside Jeanette Farell, to bring a safe place where

women can have a cup of tea and reconnect with other women. Susan recounted why the Women's Shed is so important for women's mental health: "Over at the Women's Shed, it's really about creating a safe and warm environment for women to decompress and share their life circumstances. Loneliness is a big player with mental health, so our Shed creates an outlet for women to find community, like-minded people and friendships".

Previous artistic classes have included macrame, dot-painting and mosaic. However, they also provide a range of instructional workshops aimed at empowering women such as changing tyres, stroke prevention talks and checking car oil. ### STRONGER TOGETHER

It may be a new name but the Stronger Together Foundation has been helping families for over a decade.

Previously known as the Fit Kidz Foundation it supports around 120 families across its different programs every year.

The official opening of the Stronger Together Foundation office at Castle Hill was held on Wednesday, 12 th June. The not-forprofit has been providing support and services to local children who have a disability, delay or neurodivergent needs, their families and local community for over 10 years.

Services include, vital early intervention therapies, such as Speech and Occupational Therapy and family support such as, sibling support groups, family connection groups, and family events where families who have a child with a disability can come together in a safe way to form connections with each other.

Ellen Kulbicki (Witzlsperger), Educational and Developmental Psychologist with the Stronger Together Foundation said: "Over the 10 years we have supported around 500 different families, some stay with us for many years."

The Stronger Together Foundation was awarded the 2024 Hills Shire Community Group of the Year for the work it does in the community, in particular its highly regarded annual 'Stronger Together Conference'.

The first Stronger Together Conference held in 2022 was attended by 200 parents and its success was repeated the next year. The one-day conference is for parents and carers of children with disabilities or neuro-diversity and aims to break down the isolation that many parents of children with special needs feel. This year's conference is on Saturday, August 31st at Castle Hill RSL.

Cheralee, whose 12-year-old son lives with Autism and intellectual disability said:

"The Stronger Together Conference is a one-of-a-kind and invaluable experience for the special needs community. It is a very rare opportunity to have access to multiple disability service providers, resources, amazing and

informative presentations and network with other special needs parents in one place at the same time."

Under the guidance of Ellen Kulbicki, who was named 2024 Hills Shire Citizen of the Year, the Stronger

Together Foundation continues to find opportunities to further support the local disability community.

"We are committed to ensuring all children with a disability are included in our community, and so our supports and services go beyond just supporting the child and family. They also focus on building a community of families who have a child with a disability to form meaning connections and reduce social isolation," she said."We are not just an early intervention service, we are a community."

Ellen has been involved in the Disability and Inclusion Reference Group for the Hills Shire Council and has been supporting the Council's events team to host sensory sensitive sessions at local events and discuss opportunities to ensure the community is inclusive of children with disabilities and





# Queen Elizabeth II **Memorial Rose Garden**

Formerly known as the Roxborough Rose Garden, Queen Elizabeth II Memorial Rose Garden is an ideal place to stop and smell the roses, literally!

The Oueen Elizabeth II Memorial Rose Garden occupies over 8000 square meters and contains over 4000 roses from more than 80 different species and is one of the largest rose gardens in Sydney.

What makes well-loved Queen Elizabeth II Memorial Rose Garden even more special is the history of the site. The land on which the Rose Garden sits was originally owned by Scottish immigrants Andrew and Elizabeth who migrated in 1799 who named it after Roxburgh County in Scotland. The site was sold multiple times over the years and used for different things including orchards, a storage area for a hardware company and finally as the Roxborough Park

In 1966 Council was approached by the NSW Association of Nurserymen and Garden Societies who requested a rose garden be planted within the Hills with the site on Roxborough Park Road chosen. The original concept design for the garden was prepared by the Senior Landscape Designer of the Royal Botanic Gardens included terraces created by natural rock retaining walls, a fight of steps bisecting the terraces and a circular rotunda in the middle of the garden. The Roxborough Park Rose Garden opened in 1972 and celebrated its 50th Anniversary in 2022. In 2023 the rose garden was renamed Queen Elizabeth II Memorial Rose Garden in dedication to Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.





The rose garden also contains roses marking historical events such as the Australian Bi-Centennial Rose, The Hills Shire Council Rose, the Olympic Gold Rose and the Little Sunset Rose which was planted to celebrate the 40th Anniversary of the Hills Soroptimists. The construction of the fountain and pool still present today was carried out by the Castle Hill Rotary Club in the early 1970s reflecting the importance of the rose garden to the community then and now.

The rose garden is in full bloom in the Spring though there are some roses that bloom during the colder months. However, despite the season it is a wonderful place to walk through and to enjoy the beauty and fragrance off the various roses. It is also a great place to sit and read a book either on one of the park benches in the garden or on the grass area under the trees.

If you have not visited the Queen Elizabeth II Memorial Rose Garden it is well worth a visit and given its location to Waves Aquatic Centre why not pop in and grab a coffee before or after your walk through the rose gardens.
















# Aged care that's personal



In the heart of Dural you'll find a hidden paradise where wildlife conservationists Nat and Ben, along with their team of dedicated volunteers, rescue and rehabilitate injured animals.

The Hills Wildlife Sanctuary offers a 35-acre natural site with sprawling bushland, tucked away down Carters Road. Inside the big iron gates is a world-class rehabilitation facility for Australian wildlife, providing a home for rescued emus, dingoes and native birds. Established in 1977 by Marjorie Wilson, it was previously known as the Kangaroo Protection Co-operative and has been protecting injured wildlife since its inception. Their passionate team of over 20 volunteers includes live-in Caretaker, Olivia Gillespie, professional dog trainer, Nat Conway, and resident wildlife vet, Dr Audrey Shen.

The backdrop of Berowra Valley National Park is phenomenal, as are their countless animals, each with varying degrees of personality. Upon arrival, I was greeted by some friendly surrendered dingoes, who were enjoying their new natural enclosure. Whilst they go out for walks 3-4 times

a week, it was clear they were very excited to see some new faces. Some other new friendly animals included three red-tailed black cockatoos, a threatened species of bird, though they can be spotted around the Hills. Casper, their leucistic kookaburra, was particularly vibrant as he proudly showed off his white plumage despite his reduced vision. The birds are interactive and can rest on people's arms - though I've been warned to watch shoelaces around Casper!

Sanctuary manager and Dural local Ben Dessen, along with his brother Sam and a team of passionate volunteers have transformed the site over the past 10 years. Ben also has extensive experience in wildlife rescue and rehabilitation. However, it was the 2019 and 2020 Black Summer Bush Fires that was the real catalyst for the project, as the community were desperate to find a sanctuary for injured animals.

Currently, there is only one dedicated wildlife hospital in the Greater Sydney region, creating an increased demand for volunteer services such as WIRES. Ben and his team have been working alongside local MPs and are appealing to the State government to build a world-class wildlife hospital that would remedy the lack of medical care for injured wildlife in Sydney. He shared why

this site would be the perfect opportunity to care for animals and his future ambitions: 'We have an amazing 35 acres of land, so close to Sydney which is so unique. We hope to create a centralised conservation and education hub, to help up-skill and train wildlife

carers and veterinarians and support rehabilitation groups across NSW. We also hope to establish an emergency

response team to support wildlife in times of crisis, which could be deployed during future natural disasters such as bushfires and floods."

North Rocks local Nat Conway has been volunteering at the Hills Wildlife Sanctuary for a number of years, falling in love with animals in her role as a dog behaviourist: "We want the Hills community to know that there is a facility here that is doing this amazing rescue and rehabilitation work for native wildlife. We only need one person to read this article and go 'Wow! I would love to donate or sponsor a particular project at the sanctuary!', because it is currently 100% volunteer run and funded entirely by our own fundraising initiatives."

The Education Centre on site also hosts a range of reptiles, invertebrates and amphibians, with my eyes being drawn to the tiniest Green Tree frogs. The facilities are used to train wildlife carers, as well as vets and vet nurses. The Hills Wildlife Sanctuary are currently seeking sponsorship to build an outdoor covered education space and amphitheatre. They will also begin construction shortly of a specialised wombat, echidna and bandicoot rehabilitation enclosure, which has generously been funded by Linda Meumann, the owner of Calabash Kennels in Arcadia. Linda was so impressed by the work of the sanctuary after handing in an injured Tawny Frogmouth, that she offered to support their work.

The Hills Wildlife Sanctuary is actively seeking corporate and philanthropic partners, to help continue building the vision and assisting native wildlife. The sanctuary is always in need of support from local skilled tradespeople, including carpenters, electricians, plumbers, landscapers and arborists. #### **Looking After Your Own Backyard**

Whilst ambitious housing targets by the NSW Minns Labor Government have committed to delivering 377,000 homes across New South Wales by 2029, their first milestone to reach a target of 75,000 new homes in 2024, has failed miserably.

It comes as no surprise that NSW is in desperate need of housing to offer the safety, security and support that individuals and families deserve, particularly with the cost-of-living crisis looming over our heads.

As well intended as the Government might be, the new planning laws are housing targets without a plan. Targets don't mean anything unless they are financially and logically feasible to build. This Government is crippling financial feasibility with its taxes and charges. We need to ramp up housing supply with a credible housing plan, not one that doesn't consult with local councils to tap in on the experience they have in providing well considered open space, adequate parking, sustainable and sufficient designs and ensuring the ambience and surrounds are not denigrated.

New builds should complement the current streetscape in a suburb. The Minns Labor Government's housing plans are not inviting and

welcoming. Councils help create a community that people want to belong to. These new housing plans will rob a community of space and may create 'qhettos'.

Why aren't we creating housing incentives that encourage empty nesters to downsize without financial penalty? Why should we funnel first homes owners into only buying apartments when they should be given a choice of an affordable house and land package — somewhere with a backyard with room for families to grow, to kick a ball, play with their children and roll around on the lawn? Why should first home buyers have to compete with an overworked migration system? We should be looking after the new citizens and locally born residents who have already come to this country, rather than bringing more competition into the housing market. These residents should be our priority. Let's accommodate those already living in this country.

# **Better, Fairer Tax Cuts from July 1**

In the lead up to July 1, I encourage everyone to take a look at their payslip and make a note of how much take-home pay they receive.

That's because from July 1, every single taxpayer in the Hawkesbury will receive a tax cut, meaning they will get to keep more of what

Taking pressure off families and households is the Albanese Government's number one priority and we made cost of living relief a key focus in our 2024 Budget.

A primary school teacher in Richmond on \$80,000 will get a tax cut of \$1,679. An electrician from Wilberforce on \$110,000 will get a tax cut of \$2,429. A nurse from Windsor on \$76,000 will get a tax cut of \$1,579.

We're also making things easier for households in the Hawkesbury through the new energy rebate. Every household will receive \$300 off their electricity bill, and \$325 for every eligible Hawkesbury small business. It's another way we can provide some relief, across every home.

And then there's the ways we're making it easier for businesses or all sizes to train up the next generation of workers.

For instance, for priority construction skills we've increased the support payments to apprentices to \$5000, for another 12 months. Employers of these apprentices will receive a \$5,000 hiring incentive, up from \$4,000. Plus, we will provide access to \$10,000 incentive payments to support our target of 10,000 new energy apprentices.

The Government will also invest \$88 million to deliver 20,000 new fee-free TAFE places, including pre-apprenticeships in courses relevant to the construction sector, as well as in childcare, aged care and many other courses.

For vocational and uni students, there's a cut to student debt, to make up for some of the big increases students saw last year and this year because of high inflation.

And Hawkesbury teaching, social work and nursing students will soon have their mandatory paid prac work supported by a payment of around

These are just a few of the ways we're easing the cost of living, tackling inflation and growing our economy.

### **Transport Infrastructure**

I am incredibly proud to be part of a government that listens and takes decisive action, especially in building infrastructure in growth areas. As the member for Riverstone, I've hosted various Ministers on tours of the electorate.

Starting from my office in Stanhope Gardens, we travel through the serene suburbia of The Ponds, a legacy of the last Labor Government. However, this tranquillity is disrupted as we turn onto Schofields Road towards the Tallawong metro platforms.

Cudgegong Road reveals the planning failures of the former Liberal Government. Cars overflow onto every available surface, and commuters park wherever they can. High-density housing dominates what was once farmland, highlighting the previous Government's failure to foresee the negative impact inadequate planning would have on surrounding suburbs, roads, and residents. Each metro station—Tallawong, Rouse Hill, Kellyville compounds the daily struggle as car parks fill to capacity early each morning, transforming roads into barely moving masses of vehicles. This is the daily purgatory faced by desperate commuters.

The North West Growth Area was always destined for substantial expansion, with projections indicating the largest population growth in the state. Despite this, the previous Government's over-reliance on private

development and its failure to deliver adequate public infrastructure are glaring examples of short-sightedness. Sydney Metro North West serves established suburbs effectively but falls 2.7 kilometers short of connecting to the T1 line in Schofields. This gap limits access for people trying to catch the T1 from the Hawkesbury to the metro, forcing them to drive.

At Riverstone station, the cancellation of the rail duplication has left a single line, restricting train services to a meagre 30-minute interval during peak hours. The absence of express services means residents increasingly opt for Tallawong station's faster metro service, further overwhelming its car parking facilities. The previous Government failed to deliver a promised multi-level car park, leaving commuters with 500 fewer spaces than needed.

While local buses help, they only address part of the problem. Residents from neighboring suburbs travel long distances to find employment, congesting local roads. The Northwest Growth Area was designed with a comprehensive strategy to minimize long commutes. However, with most growth area projects rezoned and the population booming, there is a severe lack of supporting infrastructure.

Twelve years of failure cannot be undone in a single year. The Minns Labor Government has allocated significant funds to the Riverstone



electorate to improve infrastructure, and I will continue to advocate for more. Adequate local employment is the heart of a livable city—projects like the Riverstone West Precinct and Riverstone Town Centre are crucial to alleviating current issues. By establishing local employment hubs and robust housing, we can secure a better future for Riverstone families. We can fix it, but we must remember the previous Government's mistakes and ensure they are never repeated.

# Kerrye Katz says her OAM is for her family and club

One of Australia's most experienced and respected judo coaches, Kerrye Katz, has been awarded a Medal of the Order (OAM) on the King's Birthday Honour List this year. The 63-year-old Hills local thrives in coaching roles – she is the Australian under 18 coach, in addition to training special needs children, four-year-olds and 9-15 age groups at her Budokan Judo Club.

Kerrye is a very successful judoka, having represented Australia at the 1988 Seoul Olympics, World and Oceanic championships, and is a winner of many national, state and Masters titles over the years. Kerrye is one part of a highly-successful judo coaching couple with her husband Rob, her former Olympic coach. They run the phenomenally-successful Budokan Judo Club based in Castle Hills, with their two sons, Nathan and Josh, who are also Olympians.

"This is a big and amazing honour for me, it's very special," Kerry told *Hills to Hawkesbury Community News.* "I was absolutely surprised at being informed of the award and I feel it is not just for me but also for my husband Rob, without whom I won't be the person I am. This award is also for my family and the judo club because everyone has helped us achieve the success we have.

"The Budokan Judo Club provides fantastic support and we are one big family with great role models across all the age groups. "This weekend has been extra special for us because on top of my honour, Rob and I got our sixth dan black belts while my second son Josh was selected for the Paris Olympics. In addition, the club has done very well at the

Nationals in Queensland, so it's been a superb weekend for us."

Kerrye was selected as a shadow coach at the 2000 Sydney Olympics but elected a role as Field-of-play Supervisor for SOCOG instead. She lets her judo and coaching do the talking.

The mother of two captured gold medals in the Senior National championships over 10 different years between 1980 and 1993. She used to coach the NSW teams but now concentrates on her national, club and school coaching roles – she is also a special needs teacher at The Ponds School.

Kerrye said her sons Nathan and Josh have always been involved in judo and everyone supports each other. "Rob coached me at the Seoul Olympics and my sons also know how to cope (at the highest level)," Kerrye said. "I feel the others in our club also know what they can achieve by working hard.

"I would like to thank our club vice president Scott Young, who I believe nominated me, Rob, Nathan and Josh, for their support and help. My family is called Team Katz because we are always there for each other."



#### MEMORIES WITH IVOR JONES & FRIENDS



Continuing Hilary's story of her travelling to Australia on the "Fairsea" in 1958, and her early days in Australia, her story continues on after boarding the ship to emigrate to Australia only to find that all of the family's belongings had been lost in a fire whilst in storage.

Here is the remainder of her experiences in her own words.

"Word soon got around that there was a small family needing clothes. The generosity of people was most humbling, clothes came from everywhere. Even immigrants were expected to "dress" for dinner, so taffeta dresses were given to my mother and dad had very smart suits, all on loan. When we reached Aden, my mother bought a bolt of calico fabric with colourful Arabic children on it and sewed, by hand, a skirt and top.


I loved the sea voyage and participated in the "Crossing the Line" ceremony being one of King Neptune's servants! I am sure the trip was not as happy for my parents. It appeared we were the only family on board who only had 2 suitcases and no luggage in the hold!!.

When we arrived in Sydney, we had the good fortune to be staying with distant relatives in Enfield.

I remember going down to the docks at Pyrmont as each new ship docked, my father searching for any sign that our luggage may have been delayed and put on another ship, but to no avail.

Finally we were notified that our luggage had been in the fire. In those days insurance was not like it is today and so the compensation was minimal, the biggest loss was photographs, mementos and of course my bike!!!. Both my parents picked themselves up and got jobs within days of arriving. Mum worked for an engineering company in Burwood, a remark was made to her "Not another Bloody POM"!!! My father got a job for, what was called back then, The Spastic Centre at Mosman and was given the luxury of a company car. He used to have to chaperone "Miss Australia" to various functions, and so, his car had that title on the roof, There was many a disappointed face when he used to drive me to school with that sign on top!!!. They managed to buy a house and land package at Bass Hill, all the furniture was on time payment, mum made all the curtains, and we were extremely happy. Unfortunately we were only in the country 7 years when my father died of a massive heart attack. However what he and my mother achieved in that 7 years would never had happened if we had disembarked and returned to the life they knew, my mother, God bless her, made the best decision and never regretted it."

Ivor's note: As this article is titled "A Tale of Two Migrants". I thought I had better mention that the second migrant who travelled on the "Fairsea" to Australia at the same age as Hilary, and in the same year (1958), but on a later voyage, was myself. As Hilary mentioned in the last issue of this publication, male and female passengers were segregated. I shared a cabin with my father and a number of other men whilst my mother and two sisters shared a cabin with another woman and her daughter. My parents became lifelong friends with this family whilst on board and both families settled in Sydney. As my father was sponsored as a migrant by the Anglican Church we disembarked from the "Fairsea" in Melbourne on the 8th December having left Southampton on the 4th November. (the day before Guy Fawkes Day) I remember looking out at night whilst we were travelling through the Bay of Biscay hoping to see the fireworks in England. As being only 11 years of age at the time I had no idea that we had travelled too far out at sea to be able to view the fireworks. We only lived in Melbourne for a few months, during a heatwave, and next door to an abattoir with the resultant flies. So, during the following February, we moved to Cabramatta where my mother and my older sister found work and my father found employment as a welder. I then spent the rest of my childhood and formative years in the Cabramatta area until I met Maree and we moved to Baulkham Hills around 40 years ago.

Circular Keys Chorus, from Bella Vista in the Hills District, has won second place in the 2024 Sweet Adelines Australia women's barbershop competition. This year's event was held in Fremantle, Western Australia and featured 13 women's choruses and 22 quartets from around the country.

Women's barbershop singing is a particular style of a cappella (unaccompanied) singing in four parts. Sweet Adelines is one of the largest non-profit women's singing associations in the world, and the Australian region encompasses 32 choruses and over 1,100 singers.

CKC was represented in Fremantle this year by 33 members of the chorus. Their competition songs were the Lerner and Lowe classic 'Almost like being in love' and the swooniest of swoony ballads, 'I wish you love'. At the end of the competition, they delighted the audience with an exuberant performance of 'Don't rain on my parade'.

Vicki Dwyer, musical director of CKC said, 'The competition is always fierce, and our chorus sang beautifully, but we were just beaten by an amazing performance from Redland Rhapsody from Brisbane.' CKC has won many awards over the years, including first place at previous Sweet Adelines Australia contests, and has represented Australia three times at annual international Sweet Adelines conventions held in the USA.

Vicki also competed in the quartet division as lead singer in Alouette along with three other CKC members, including Diane Jenkins, the chorus's assistant director. Diane went on to win a separate award for the most outstanding recent graduate from the Sweet Adelines directors' program. Other members also competed in their own quartets, and although they didn't win official placings, they all received their best scores so far in the national competition and were very pleased with their performances. Within a week, Alouette also competed to be Overall Quartet winners for Barbershop Harmony Australia (BHA) Eastern Region Contest, and also winners of the Open Women's Quartet.

But the only chance these intrepid volunteers got to float on Cloud 9 was on the flight back to Sydney, because they're now

straight back into preparations for upcoming local recitals, community events and end-of-year Christmas carol performances.






