Work on a \$2 million upgrade and extension at the much-loved Livvi's Place all-abilities playground at Bernie Mullane Reserve in Kellyville is set to start this month with fences blocking off the back area of the playground installed on Monday, 23rd September.

A spokesperson for The Hills Shire Council says council is working hard to ensure that parts of the playground will be kept open for as much time as possible, including the water play area. The construction is expected to be completed by March 2025.

"Some areas of the current playground, located outside the construction zone at Bernie Mullane Reserve, will need to be temporarily closed at intervals to facilitate necessary works. However, Council is committed to minimising disruptions and ensuring that parts of the playground, including the popular water play

area, remain accessible for as much time as possible throughout the construction period," she said.

"The designated construction zone, which is located behind the water park and play area, will remain closed for the duration of the works.

"Council appreciates the community's understanding and cooperation during this time, as we work to enhance the facilities for all to enjoy."

The extended facilities will provide an all-inclusive recreation space for children of all ages and abilities and will boast a variety of new features, including an accessible multi-activity play tower, a double flying fox, slides, a climbing net and swings designed for both toddlers and older children.

The work will also include the construction of an accessible amenities building, complete

with a 'Changing Places' room, with an overhead hoist, shower, toilet, and ambulant unisex cubicles.

Shade sails, picnic shelters, a dry creek bed, accessible park furniture and wide pathways will also feature.

The Livvi's Place Playground Extension Project is funded by the NSW Government's Western Sydney Infrastructure Grants (WSIG) Program in partnership with Council. \$1.1 million of the WSIG Program is going towards the Livvi's Place project.

The upgrade is the latest in a huge portfolio of park and playground works completed by Hills Shire Council in the past three years.

So far over \$8million has been spent on upgrades and nearly \$64 million on new parks in the Shire.

Recent upgrades include: Balcombe Heights Estate at Baulkham Hills, Gooden Drive Reserve, Baulkham Hills, Coorumbene Court Reserve, Bella Vista, McGilvray Place Reserve, Rouse Hill and William Harvey Reserve, Rouse Hill.

For those seeking alternative play areas during the closure Livvi's Place at Kellyville will find that Samantha Riley Drive Reserve playground, Golden Grove Reserve, Duncraig Drive Reserve, and Ted Pike Reserve are all within 800 metres of Livvi's Place Playground.

MUM FACES 2 DRINK DRIVE CHARGES

A 43-year-old mum has been charged with High Range drink driving after she was stopped by Hills Highway police driving to school to pick up her young son. She was five times over the legal limit.

Officers from the Hills Highway were patrolling the streets of Baulkham Hills on Monday 9th September at about 12.25pm when a silver Toyota Camry exiting a driveway almost collided with the passing police vehicle.

The driver was stopped. Officers who began speaking with her, allege it was clear that she was intoxicated. She was breath tested and returned a positive reading.

She was arrested and conveyed to Castle Hill Police Station. The breath analysis returned a reading of 0.269 grammes of alcohol per 210 litres of breath.. The legal limit is 0.05. Her drivers' licence was immediately confiscated and suspended. She was given a court attendance notice to appear before Parramatta Local Court in October 2024 for Drive with High Range PCA – 1st offence.

Two days later, on Wednesday (September 11th) the same driver was involved in a collision with another car in Winston Hills.

Emergency services were called to Junction Road, Winston Hills, following reports of a crash at about 9.20am.

Officers attached to Parramatta Police Area Command attended the scene and found two vehicles had collided. Minor injuries were reported.

The 43-year-old female driver of the offending vehicle was subjected to a roadside breath test which returned an alleged positive reading. She was arrested and taken to Parramatta Police Station for further testing and taken to hospital for further treatment.

Police are awaiting the results of a blood sample taken at hospital before taking any further action.

PRAISE FOR NEIGHBOUR

Emergency services attended a Kellyville house at about 7pm on Monday, 16th September following reports of a kitchen fire.

Before Police arrived at the home in Tooloom Rd, North Kellyville, a neighbour had rushed over and extinguished the main fire with a fire extinguisher.

Police say the neighbour's prompt response, along with functional fire alarms prevented further extensive damage to the house.

The occupant of the house was assessed for minor burns and smoke inhalation, however they were not transported to Hospital.

Working smoke alarms save lives. It is also important to have a fire extinguisher and a fire blanket in the kitchen.

SPEEDSTER FINED

A driver who was driving at double the signposted speed limit has been issued with a fine for \$2959 for exceeding the speed limit by more than 45km/h in North Parramatta, They also received an on the 6 month suspension of their driver's licence.

Police from Parramatta Highway Patrol were performing stationary speed enforcement duties on Pennant Hills Road, North Parramatta, outside The King's School, at about 5.10pm on Tuesday 10th September.

A grey Mercedes was observed at high speed and, utlising a lidar instrument, police detected its speed to be 133km/h in a 60km/h zone. The vehicle was stopped by police and its driver was issued with a fine for \$2959 for exceeding the speed limit by more than 45km/h.

OPERATION RAID RESULTS

Police detect over 470 alleged drug drivers during Operation RAID (Remove All Impaired Drivers) on NSW roads, following concerning road trauma trends across the state.

The operation detected 6,653 traffic offences in total between Thursday, 5th September and 4am Sunday, 8th September .

During the operation, police conducted 120,093 Random Breath Tests and charged 211 drivers for PCA and DUI related offences. Of the 10,885 Random Drug Tests conducted, 470 drivers returned a positive result.

Further, police detected 1,895 speeding offences, 261 mobile phone or distraction related offences, and over 4,200 other driving offences.

Incidents of note include:

 At about 1.15am on Sunday, 8th September, officers attached to The Hills Police District Traffic and Highway Patrol Command attempted to stop a BMW sedan on Green Road in Kellyville allegedly driving at 95km/h in a sign posted 60km/h area. Police stopped the vehicle a short time later and the driver – a 46-year-old man was subject to a Random Breath Test which allegedly returned a reading of 0.188. The man was issued an infringement for speeding and a Court Attendance Notice for drive with high range PCA, to appear in Parramatta Local Court on Wednesday 10 October 2024.

On Saturday, 7th September, Castle Hill Police Station were conducting stationary random breath testing along Windsor Road, Kellyville. At approximately 11.40pm police observed a black Toyota Hilux, approach the testing site in a northbound direction. Approximately 80m from the testing site, the vehicle conducted a U-turn across double white lines before turning left onto Showground Road towards Castle Hill. Police activated their warning devices and pursued the vehicle, which continued onto Green Road, Kellyville. After approximately 1km police caught up to the vehicle and found the driver standing beside the passenger door. The driver admitted to conducting the U-turn stating he had not seen the testing site. He also admitted to consuming two

scotches, with his last drink at approximately 10.30pm. He returned a positive roadside test. The driver was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station for further testing, which returned a blood alcohol reading of 0.071. He was issued an infringement notice for driving with a low-range PCA (first offence) and a suspension notice. His licence was confiscated.

About 1.20pm on Thursday, 5th September, officers attached to Ku Ring Gai Police
 Area Command Traffic and Highway Patrol attempted to intercept a white Mercedes van on the Pacific Highway at Mt Colah following calls from the public that the driver was allegedly driving erratically. The driver – a 29-year-old man – was subject to Random Breath and Drug Tests, both which returned a negative result; however, subsequent sobriety tests and conversations with the man established he was fatigued and unfit to drive. Police issued the man with an infringement notice for his manner of driving and transported him to the nearest train station.

NSW RFS State Championships

Competition was blazing hot as hundreds of firefighters and catering crew members across NSW gathered together in Albury Wodonga Equestrian Centre for the 26th NSW Rural Fire Service State Championships.

Defending State Champion Oakville Rural Fire Brigade scored 2nd and 3rd positions this season.

Although they were unable to keep the crown, their longstanding State Champion streak is forever written on the books. Oakville RFB held the spot for the last three Championships and has a total of six wins in the past.

Senior Deputy Captain Brandon Beneke, Deputy Captain Cameron Panton, Deputy Captain Mitchell Dalley, and Firefighters Kurtis Ripper and Nathan Jessop made up the Oakville RFB team.

In its RFS State Championship debut, East Kurrajong already placed two 1st place wins in the PACFIRE Hacienda and Code 3 South of the Border scenarios.

The team comprised Deputy Captain Adam Henson, Operational Officer Aiden Hippensteel, and Firefighters Cameron Luck, Kale Chesworth, and Claudia Virzi.

Deputy Captain Henson shared that they are proud of the team placing first out of 15 brigades in the Hacienda scenario. It involved



"We are very lucky here at East Kurrajong RFB to have a great bunch of people to work with, and we all get along so well. It is like my 'second family'," Deputy Captain Henson said.

"This is a young team, and I have been lucky enough to be involved in their basic firefighting training from day one and have been able to watch them develop into some of the best firefighters in the state."

"Being our first championships, the 2 first places were an amazing bonus, and reinforces the fact that we are prepared for the readily approaching fire season."

The Hawkesbury Catering Team brought home the bacon in the 'Eat Street' Challenge, coming out on top against Southern Highlands and Clarence Valley in the third. The crew comprised Angela Bateson, David Putland,



Les Jenkins, and Jake Pepper from Dumarsq Brigade, New England.

Jenkins was also awarded the Individual Team Player Award. The team prepared the Mexican-themed menu items consisting of the Breakfast Burrito, Beef Quesadilla, and Fruit tub.

Hawkesbury Catering Team Brigade Captain Vanessa Mepham commended the team for their team dynamics and efficiency and looks forward to defending their title in Dubbo.

"All teams were judged on numerous tasks which included general hygiene, practices, team work, communication, taste, and presentation, this is just to name a few," Captain Mepham said.

Six groups had to prepare and serve 85 portions of an assigned breakfast, lunch, and snack item according to various food items set by the NSW Rural Fire Service Association. The teams had their own hawker-style booths and were judged on their recipes, budget adherence, and taste, among many.

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Democracy Sausages Servicing History

St Andrews Uniting Church in Richmond spent last Saturday fundraising, with every sausage and cake sold helping to protect the history of the church built in 1845. \$1800 was raised between the two stalls to help finance the renovation of the church ceiling.

The Church also runs other activities through the year such as community lunches – the next one is the 26 September – and the Spring Fair is on the 19 October.

On Election Day church members hosted their own democracy sausage sizzle and cake stall. The auditorium on the church grounds doubled as a polling booth as volunteers served up post-voting lunch and sweet treats.

While church grounds being home to a polling venue may be out of the ordinary, it allows St Andrews to serve their community in more ways and raise money to maintain their church. Denise Aslin, a member of the Church Council, and Beryl Hedges, a member of the Pastoral Leaders Team discussed the importance of the church. As Denise puts it – "It's an Icon" that they feel needs to be preserved for the whole town.

George Bowman donated the prime spot in the middle of Richmond for a church to be built in 1845 and paid for its erection. The church was formerly called St Andrews Presbyterian Church but in 1977 the Congregational, Presbyterian and Methodist churches came into union to form the Uniting Church.

Over the years the church has seen many upgrades with the church even shutting down in 1987 for five years of restoration work. Throughout those years the Heritage Commission aided with the repairs to the foundations, restoration of timber pews and panelling, installation of damp coursing and repainting of the entire building.

A private residence was added in 1861, a Sunday School Hall in 1876 and multipurpose centre in 1996 that joined the church to the Sunday School. These buildings also endeavoured to keep their original foundations, with the private residence becoming a nursing home and offices before returning to a private residence once again and the Sunday School Hall becoming another multi-use facility.

The renting of rooms and extra space on the church grounds also helps towards the congregation's goal of preserving the historic building.

St Andrews received the 'Heritage Near Me' grant from the NSW Government with

approved funding of \$100,000 which covered the cost of restoring 8 decorative and stainedglass windows, as close as possible, to original condition.

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Counting Continues for Some Seats

HILLS MAYOR

Dr Michelle Byrne is the Hills Shire's new Mayor, returning to the post she held for three years from 2017 to 2021 as the Hills Shire's first popularly elected Mayor.

It was an emotion-packed return for the former Mayor who was shattered in November 2021 when the NSW Liberal Party head office selected Dr Peter Gangemi as its Liberal candidate for Mayor ahead of her following a bitter factional dispute which saw local Liberal party branches blocked from taking part in the selection process.

Hills Liberal party members voted in the 2024 selection process in August this year with Dr Bryne winning the Liberal pre-selection by 149 votes to Dr Gangemi's 134 votes.

Dr Byrne returns after 13 years on council, with a total of seven years as Mayor. When she stepped down after the election in December 2021 she said in a statement on social media: "Despite no longer being on Council past December I will continue to actively serve the community through my continued involvement with numerous community groups - in fact I may now have more time to spend working on community-based projects!

"This is not the last time the community will see Michelle Byrne in Public Office. I intend to return bigger, better and fiercer than ever to fight for the community I love so much."

On Saturday (14th December) Voters had the choice of three candidates as Mayor, Dr Byrne (Liberal) Dr Mila Kasby (The Greens) and Immanuel Selvaraj (Labor). Of the 94,955 votes counted by Wednesday evening Dr Byrne had 59,559 votes (62.39%), Dr Kasby had 18,030 (18.89%) and Mr Selvaraj 17,866 (18.72%). The count for the 12 councillors to Hills Shire Council are still continuing.

Each of the four wards will be represented by three councillors. The initial counts so far have all three seats in two wards decided and two seats decided in the other two wards. The Labor and The Greens candidates in East and North Wards are waiting for the postal votes to come in to find out who gets the final seat. In East Ward after 33,220 people voted 372 votes separated Labor's Jane Grevtseva ahead of The Greens Suzannah McDonald. In North Ward the contest is even closer with Labor's Dilvan Bircan ahead of Greens candidate and former councillor Mila Kasby by 98 votes in an electorate with 34,243 voters.

Already elected are:

- CENTRAL: Reena Jethi (Lib), Jerome Cox (Lib) Tina Cartwright (Labor)
- WEST: Frank De Masi (Lib) Rosemarie Boneham (Lib) Immanuel Selvaraj (Lab)
- EAST: Samuel Uno (Lib) Alan Haselden (Lib) with the third seat still to be decided.
- NORTH: Mitchell Blue (Lib) Jacob Jackson (Lib) with the third seat still to be decided.

All eight Liberal councillors have been on Hills Shire Council before. Four have just served for four years and the other four are returning after a four year break. The Labor councillors are new to council.

Dr Byrne told the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News: "I am completely overwhelmed and very grateful for the support the community has given me.

"I look forward to hitting the ground running and working as hard as I can for all residents across the Hills.

Top priorities include:

- Pushing back on the NSW Government's plan to double the housing targets for the Hills as well as the TOD (Transport Orientated Development) precinct plan for 21,000 dwellings between Bella Vista and Kellyville metro stations and ensuring we have the right levels of development that can be supported with infrastructure, jobs, public amenities and open space.
- Advocate for our share of State and Federal funding to deliver critical infrastructure including road upgrades, footpaths, cycleways, open space, sporting fields, community amenities etc to support our growing community.
- Keeping rates and waste charges as low as possible whilst making the Hills the most business friendly council in the region.

At the moment Hills Shire Council has its special meeting to welcome the new council and install the new Mayor down for Tuesday October 1st.

The first General council meeting of The Hills Shire Council will be on Tuesday, October 8th.

New High School

The State Government has confirmed it will build a new public high school for the growing Schofields and Tallawong area at 201 Guntawong Road, Tallawong.

The 50-classroom school will cater for 1,000 students and is due for completion before the start of Term 1 in 2027.

Tallawong and its surrounding suburbs have recorded the fastest student population growth in the recent Enrolment Growth Audit, with the overall population more than tripling between 2016 and 2021.

The school site is also being master planned for future expansion and will cater for significant growth around the Tallawong Metro Station, supporting the nearby mixeduse precinct and reducing pressure on nearby schools. The site was identified following collaboration between the Department of Education, Landcom, the Office of Strategic Lands and the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure (DPHI).

New public schools are also being fasttracked in Box Hill, Tallawong and Gables as well as major upgrades at Rouse Hill High School and Schofields Public School.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Education and Early Learning Prue Car said: "It is fantastic to share where we will build the first new public high school for the growing communities of Schofields and Tallawong".

Minister for Planning and Public Spaces Paul Scully also acknowledged the stresses on infrastructure faced by local residents: "As the NSW Government confronts the housing crisis,



more homes need to be built across NSW and Western Sydney. Our government is committed to making sure those homes are supported by new schools and infrastructure to make sure families have access to quality education and essential services close to where they live".

"This new public high school investment complements our planning reforms that are focused on building better homes and better communities."

HAWKESBURY ELECTORATE

With 10 groups and a total of 62 candidates vying for the 12 seats on Hawkesbury City Council counting was bound to be a long process.

Unlike The Hills Shire Council where only 1 Independent candidate stood, in Hawkesbury five groups of Independents stood against Liberal, Labor, The Greens, Shooters, Fishers and Farmers and The Small Business Party.

After the initial count after Saturday's election, 9 of the 12 seats up for election had been decided on quotas with the Liberals gaining the lion's share of these.

The Liberals have three seats assured with former Hawkesbury Mayor Sarah McMahon joined by Mike Creed and veteran councillor Jill Reardon. Paul Veigel who was elected on the last council is still waiting to see if the Liberals Group I above the line will get enough in postal votes for him to claim the fourth seat on quota for the Liberals but it looks likely.

The first preference votes also saw: Greens candidate Danielle Wheeler, Independent candidate Mary Lyons-Bucket, Labor's Amanda Kotlash, Shane Djuric from the Shooters, Fishers and Farmers Party, Independent Nathan Zamprogno and Eddie Dogramaci from The Small Business Party all re-elected to Hawkesbury City Council.

Counting of Votes will continue during the week. With 31,164 votes counted on Saturday there is still 20% of the vote to be counted including below line the votes.

By Wednesday evening the top votes vying for last 3 seats to be decided were:

- Liberals: 9,096 votes
- Shooters, Fishers and Farmers: 3,751

- Labor: 3,605
- IND (Mary Lyons-Bucket team) 3, 593
- IND (Nathan Zamprogno team) 3,540

The count cannot be concluded until all postal votes have been returned to the Electoral Commissioner. The deadline for return of completed postal votes is 6pm on Friday, 27th September 2024.

When all the votes have been counted, the official announcement of the election result will be declared in writing. Results will be declared between 1 and 3 October 2024.

The first meeting of Hawkesbury City Council, when the new Mayor and Deputy Mayor will be elected by councillors, will be held on Tuesday October 15th.

THANK YOU

In a post on Facebook former Hawkesbury Mayor Sarah McMahon thanked people for voting for the Liberal team in the Hawkesbury Local Government Elections.

"I will continue to work hard and serve the people of the Hawkesbury over the following 4 year term diligently, with compassion, and in a manner that prioritises civic duty as a core pillar of my responsibilities.

"I hope that the makeup of the next Council Chamber looks at this term as an opportunity to hit the 're-set' button, both on how we treat each other and how we communicate our varying policy stances to the community in a professional manner."

Housing Plea BY BEV JORDAN

There are now three transitional housing options for older women in the Hills thanks to the campaigning efforts of a small band of Kenthurst locals.

The fight to turn empty houses in the area into homes for older women and their children in danger of homelessness started seven years ago when friends and Kenthurst locals Dennis Van Someren and James Visione got together and started talking to service providers about the need for accommodation.

Their efforts saw the founding of the Transitional Housing The Hills which is working with Wesley Mission Community Housing to provide accommodation for three women and a total of 6 children. The group is now on the hunt for more housing.

Dennis, who has been lobbying both MPs and local councillors for over a year says it's a dire situation that needs resolving. The search for empty properties has involved contacting over 70 church groups. He said aside from Wesley Uniting Church, The Baptist Centre at Dural, Baptist Castle Hill and The Zoroastrian Church in Annangrove,

the response has been poor. "We are looking for compassionate landlords who want to make a difference in the community," said Dennis. The tenancy agreement will be with Wesley Mission who will guarantee rent, property damage will be rectified and no vacancy risk.

"There are 110,000 women in NSW over 45 who are either homeless or in danger of becoming homeless. This situation is unacceptable,: he said.

A testimonial from one Hills tenant said: "This program literally saved my life and has given us an opportunity to get back on (our) feet."

In a tour of local community groups Dennis has been calling for action saying: "There are 533 empty houses in the Hills and so many people desperate to rent. There are 273 empty Kenthurst Men's Shed members Rob McLachan, Dave Beck, Billy van Der Heyden, Neville Lines with Dennis Van Someren at the front.

houses in the Hawkesbury and 510 in the Hornsby Council area.

"Nearly half the women (48.2%) who asked for accommodation assistance from a specialist homeless service in 2020/2021 went without help according to The Older's Women Network.

"About 30 women a week are being turned away from Women's Community shelters because there are no rooms."

FAREWELL NOTE

Hills Mayor Dr Peter Gangemi spoke to the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News on Wednesday, before the official declaration of the poll, and said: "I would like to thank everyone in The Hills for their support during my three years as Mayor and my 12 years on Council.

Hills Rotaract Club is Sharing the DIGNITY

A club based in Baulkham Hills is collecting women's hygiene products to make 100 bags for those experiencing homelessness and domestic violence.

Share the Dignity is an Australian charity founded in 2016 by Rochelle Courtenay, which addresses period poverty among homeless women through menstrual product donations. With 6000 volunteers Australia-wide and 80,000 handbags donated to women, the charity embraces up to its mission statement which is to: "Ensure that everyone is afforded the dignity in life that so many of us take for granted".

Hills Rotaract Club is partnering with the organisation through the 'It's in the Bag' initiative, which involves sourcing second-hand bags and filling them with essential products such as soap, pads/tampons, shampoo, and conditioner. Other items include lotion, facewash wet-wipes, roll-on deodorant, brand-new makeup, toothbrushes and toothpaste.

Over 5 million products have been donated to the charities 'It's in the Bag' initiative since its inception, and Hills Rotaract Club is aiming to donate 100 more bags by November.

President of the Hills Rotaract Club, Joel Devlin, has been a passionate member of the club for five years. The Baulkham Hills local is an active member of his community, focusing on advocacy towards the environment and uplifting the homeless community in his other charity work at 'Shining Light Foundation'. As Coordinator of the club's 'It's in the Bag', Joel expressed how valuable the experience has been so far. Previous packing day for 'It's in the Bag' including an assortment of hygiene products

"Share the Dignity gives an opportunity to support a mission that both my club and I are passionate about including breaking down the stigma around periods. Since doing this project I've learnt a lot about how to have that conversation about access to period hygiene".

Richmond RDA's Flooding Fixed

The Riding for the Disabled Association in Richmond has recently received a grant from Endeavour Energy which helped them restore their grounds from the damage caused by continual flooding. After having to cancel important lessons due to the state of the arena and paddocks, Richmond RDA has now been able to resume their usual operations.

The Richmond RDA received \$8,000 through the Powering Communities grant to fix the water damage to the centre. Their land is an old Clydesdale stud on the University of Western Sydney Hawkesbury Campus and is an old premises. Ian Travers, Riding for the Disabled Richmond's President, says that they had installed recycling water tanks to reduce their usage of city water and because they were unable to use the dam recycled water due to the pollution by fruit bats. Ian says the three tanks were installed incorrectly and when they were filling up, they were flooding over the top and pouring in the side of the arena. This was then made worse when strong winds came and blew all the spilled water throughout the whole of the arena.

The grounds then became unusable and during a week of particularly heavy rain lessons had to be cancelled for the whole week, leaving the riders disappointed. The RDA offer therapeutic horse-riding services to people living with a disability and pride themselves on "being able to put bums in saddles and smiles on faces" and the cancelled lessons meant many riders missing out on their favourite time of the week.

The \$8,000 grant that Ian applied for and received was able to pay for new gutters, pipes and underground drainage pipes. It also facilitated a new drainage system, a new pump for a sprinkler system and a horse wash area to be able to hose the horses down in the summer without it flooding the fields.

Ian says how the grant impacted the Richmond RDA. "Yes, it was important, and it makes a big difference to the way we operate". Endeavour Energy even got hands on, in what Ian calls a giving back day. They had staff volunteer to come down and help out at the Richmond RDA.

Leanne Pickering, Endeavour Energy's Chief Customer and Strategy Office, says "We know that our customers are doing it tough right now with cost-of-living pressures, and our Powering Communities grants program is needed more than ever". Volunteer Karyn Downs from Endeavour Energy

The Powering Communities grant invites community groups, schools and not-for-profit organisations to apply for grants ranging from \$2,000 to \$15,000. They are offering these oneoff grants across four categories: STEM and education, community resilience, environmental leadership and social inclusion. 

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Kenthurst Rotary Club Feeds the Homeless in the Hills BY SOPHIE POREDOS

Kathy and Peter Bray are two Glenorie locals who recently initiated a food van project, which will play a crucial role in supporting the growing homeless and disadvantaged population of the Hills.

Kenthurst Rotary, part of District 9685, is a notfor-profit club that has recognised the need for a food van to feed the disadvantaged members of our community. With Hills Community Aid reporting a 41% rise in requests for homeless assistance in 2024, this van will be essential in delivering hot meals, including sausage sizzles, along with blankets. Once the project has grown, other crucial resources will be available to those in need, ranging from homelessness and domestic violence support.

President of Kenthurst Rotary Club Kathy Bray was inspired to initiate this project alongside her husband Peter Bray after her experience at the Hills Winter Sleepout:

"After listening to statistics from speakers at The Hills Winter Sleepout and anti-domestic violence dinners, it was a no-brainer to do something to help those less fortunate. What better way to get involved than by providing nourishment, support and hope to those directly in need. After conducting due diligence by speaking with others working in this space at Hawkesbury Helping Hands, Hills Community Aid and The Salvation Army - our project was born. Homelessness isn't a choice but a journey many find themselves on.

Peter Bray, a long-standing Rotarian of 21 years and former club President, is equally as passionate about eradicating homelessness in the Hills. As the Project Manager for the Kenthurst Food Van Initiative, he spoke to me about why the club believed in the mission.

"Our inspiration came from watching the wonderful work of Linda Strickland at Hawkesbury's Helping Hands and Mici Beer at Hills Community Aid".

"With one of the highest levels of mortgage stress in Australia, we realised there was a need to create something in the Hills for people living rough, where they can get a cup of coffee or something to eat. We plan to start off once a week with our services and build up from there."

In September this year, Bendigo Bank generously donated \$35,000 to help the club purchase a food van, presenting the cheque during the Kenthurst Fair. The 4-metre van has since been fully installed and ready to go, with \$5,000 hotplates courtesy of Nisbets Catering Supplies. It will be unveiled at John Benyon Rotary Park, with free sausage sizzles offered to lucky locals on Saturday the 21st, from 9am to 11am.

The food van initiative is still in its early stages, but Kenthurst Rotary is also exploring other projects, such as clothing donations and the 'Teacher in a Box' program, which uploads schoolcurriculums and textbooks onto a hard drive, enabling students to study without internet access. The club is also reaching out to Galston High School to feed their students on a monthly basis, especially for disadvantaged students who often go without hot breakfasts and lunches.

However, Kenthurst Rotary Club is still searching for a suitable warehouse to store

extra supplies, as Peter calls on the community to help:

"We are still hoping Council will give us a place to work, preferably in Castle Hill, even though it's prime display. We need a space to offer some privacy for our vulnerable clients. At the moment, we are storing our van at Rotarian's sheds in Kenthurst, but we need a place to store our donations especially as we expand our services".

The club welcomes donations through their GoFundMe page, 'Making a Difference in the Hills Shire,' to help support the supplies needed for delivering hot food. Kenthurst Rotary Club is also eager to welcome new members, with meetings held every Monday evening at 7pm at Uniting Hall, 116B Kenthurst Road. Transitional Housing The Hills has won the support of several local service groups including Kenthurst Rotary Club, West Pennant Hills/Cherrybrook Rotary Club, (all integral to the maintenance program) Galston branch of the Country Women's Association and The Hills branch of Soroptimists International which have given a financial commitment.

Dennis said the group hopes to have six houses by the end of 2024 and at least 12 in total next year. The group is calling for an audit of council properties to see if any are suitable for transitional or affordable housing.

Incoming Hills Mayor Michelle Byrne said: "I look forward to continuing to work with local community groups and organisations as well as all levels of Government to solve homelessness in the Hills.

"Already we have seen the success of the Hills Transitional Housing project and what can be achieved when we all work together. I am open to exploring all avenues to find a way to reduce homelessness in the Hills."

Despite council like Randwick council looking at a vacancy residential land tax she said it was "not the silver bullet to solving the overall housing crisis" saying it might mean less houses available on the rental market.

THE STATISTICS

ABS Statics from the 2021 census highlighted by Mission Australia show:

- 1 in 7 people experiencing homelessness are over the age of 55.
- There are over 122,000 people experiencing homelessness on any given night.

In NSW the February 2023 street count revealed 1,623 people sleeping rough - a 34 per cent increase compared to 2022.

Street counts took place between 2 February and 27 February 2023, in more than 350 towns and suburbs in 76 local government areas (LGA) across NSW.

The Housing for the Aged Action Group (HAAG) estimates there are 405,000 older women at risk of homelessness in Australia.

Women experience homelessness later in life due to a number of factors including: rising housing costs, eviction, job loss, financial instability, the end of a relationship, sudden illness and disability, domestic violence or elder abuse or a combination of these factors. Limited superannuation is also a problem.

According to HAAG Many older women are "hidden" and do not present at homelessness services. They may be couch surfing, pet sitting, or travelling in vans.

Why is Hearing in Noise so Difficult?

Many people struggle to follow conversations in noisy environments, such as family gatherings, BBQs, or meals at a busy pub. In these situations, conversations can seem "muddled up," making it difficult to communicate. But why is this, and what can be done to improve hearing in noisy settings?

The Challenge of Hearing in Noise

Struggling to hear in social settings can lead to tuning out, and in some cases, even social withdrawal. When there's a lot of background noise, it becomes harder to distinguish speech, and this challenge affects many people, not just those with hearing difficulties. The issue arises from how human speech is composed and how different sounds behave in noisy environments.

Speech consists of many different sounds. For example:

Letters like "M," "N," "A," and "O" are low in frequency but have a lot of intensity and have lots of power, so they carry well as they have plenty of "energy".

On the other hand, sounds like "TH," "S," "F," and "SH" are essentially only pressed air through the teeth and tongue. These unvoiced sounds are higher in frequency but have very little intensity. These sounds help provide clarity by distinguishing one word from another.

The difficulty is that these softer, highfrequency sounds are easily drowned out by louder noises. In a noisy social setting, as people raise their voices to compete with the surrounding noise, the louder, low-frequency sounds overpower the softer, high-frequency ones, making speech sound muffled. This effect is often called the "cocktail-party effect."

For people with age- or noise-related hearing loss, this situation is even more challenging because their ability to hear high-frequency sounds is already reduced.

The Impact on Social Life

For some people, even mild hearing loss can make social settings overwhelming. When conversations are hard to follow, it requires a lot of mental effort to keep up. Over time, this can be exhausting, leading some to avoid social gatherings altogether. The strain on the brain to make sense of the muffled sounds leads to fatigue and frustration. The good news is – that it doesn't have to be this way!

The Path to Better Hearing

Hakea sericea Silky Needle Bush Plant

SILKY NEEDLE BUSH

When venturing along walking tracks in our local bushland it is always a pleasant surprise to come across an unexpected wildflower. One of the more noticeable and abundant varieties during cooler months would be the Silky Needle Bush (*Hakea sericea*).

This attractive spreading, open shrub may grow up to 3m high in favourable conditions. It can be found in both open forest and scrubby heathlands which have sandy or clay soils.

Depending upon its habitat, flowering may commence in June and continue into September. The narrow, fairly rigid leaves are about 50mm long, right angled to the branch, having a sharp tip at the end. Hence the word "Needle" in its name. The other word in its common name appears to be derived from the silky hairs that are present on new growth. Delicately formed white flowers are mostly clustered towards the ends of reddish brown branches. These flowers possess a mild scent that can be detected if you are able to get close enough to them without coming in contact with the sharp spiky leaves while doing so.

The fruits of this shrub develop into a rounded and wrinkled, woody hard shell reminiscent of a walnut shell. The matured fruit may remain on the plant for several years before it opens to reveal a flat, winged seed.

As with many species of our native flora there are frequently similar varieties. One close relative is known as the Warty Needle Bush (*Hakea propinqua*). Another is the Hairy Needle bush (*Hakea gibbosa*). Both may be mistaken for the Silky Needle Bush, as their flowering periods tend to overlap.

It is possible to propagate both these varieties for use in a native home garden.



After all the talking, Barrie took everyone out to the greens for some hands-on drills. The members practiced accuracy, concentration,



and different techniques that will definitely improve their game.

"It was really inspiring to have someone like Barrie here, and he made everything feel doable," added Harkins.

All in all, it was an awesome day that gave the club members a lot to think about—and practice!

A FEW DROPS OF WATER CAN CHANGE LIVES A Drop At A Time BY GISELA HORNER

In 2010 when local Castle Hill businessman, Craig Hawkins, was courting his wife Hannah, they decided to take a trip to Cambodia. Their guide, Virak, drove them into the mountains to an ancient tower in Battambang, the scene of a shocking massacre during the Cambodian War, now overrun by vines, jungle and monkeys.

Virak introduced them to a local guide, David, who said he took tourists there because of its tragic history. It was there, the Khmer Rouge had rounded up men, women and children, separating them into three different caves, thrown grenades into each cave and fled. The bodies lie there still. David was one of the fortunate ones. He ran for his life and hid but his entire family died. Craig and Hannah, moved to tears, wanted to know why he would take people to this horrifying place. His simple answer was, '...because we forgive, we don't forget. Without forgiveness, we can't move on'.

On their first tour of Cambodia, Craig and Hannah were to learn more important information about the country's history, this time affecting people's day-to-day lives. They had noticed modern signs along the way showing Virak's name. He explained this was his initiative to help locals access water via pumps. Craig asked how much each pump cost and on



departure, Craig gave Virak \$300 to help with his work.

He didn't think any more about it.

A couple of weeks later an email arrived with 12 photos of a water pump being built in Craig's name. An idea formed in Craig's mind and he decided to put aside \$5 from his fee to his client's annual review towards a pump project in Cambodia. Over the next 2-3 years, money was sent to Cambodia and the project grew.

In 2014, Hannah and Craig decided to go on a return visit, to spend Christmas looking at water pumps. When Craig mentioned this to one of his clients, \$50 was immediately donated. Craig knew something was growing, so he let clients know about the project through his business Facebook page and in-house newsletter. By the time he and Hannah flew to Cambodia, they had enough money for 13 pumps.

Over the last ten years, it has become a selfperpetuating exercise.

By 2020, plans had been made to take a team of friends and clients to build more pumps but COVID put a stop to that trip.

In April this year the delayed trip became a reality when Craig took 30 people to Cambodia to create 46 pumps for locals in villages in and around Siem Reap in the north west of the country. The trip consisted of enthusiastic staff members, their partners, family and friends; they dug the 24-metre holes and laid the pipes for the pumps. In one village, 200 families had their lives changed for the better by the three pumps serving their community.

One local woman explained how the pump had been beneficial to her life and that of her daughters. Instead of hand-watering her eggplant crop all day, she could spend time helping her two girls to read and write in English. The extra water meant she could grow more crops and within two years, she had saved enough money to build a brick house. The pump made everything in her life much easier. One daughter is now at international school studying to become a doctor. This could never have happened without the water pump.

Craig and Virak have a handshake agreement going back 14 years. "I will keep sending money and you will keep digging holes in the ground for the pumps," Craig said. In a voice full of emotion, he continued, "This all started as an accident, taking a tour with Hannah in the first year of our relationship, driving to a temple 70 miles away from Siem Reap. Seeing modern signs in a developing country made me ask what they were. We never knew it would result in this. It's been life-changing for us too. People ask me why I do this - I say, ... because I can".

A number of years ago, it was decided to start dedicating water pumps to clients (and family) who had passed away. Around seventy of the pumps have honoured clients in this way in recent years. Without the knowledge of the family, a photograph of the installed pump dedicated to their loved one is framed and given to the family at an appropriate time. This small gesture has been positively received. The photographs are hung in 'pride of place' and there has been a lot of emotion expressed in the giving of those framed photographs - on both sides.

In all, Craig and dedicated contributors have built 204 wells, creating opportunities and much happiness. His philosophy is that tiny amounts of money and a small effort can create monumental changes in all our lives.

Craig was a proud nominee of the Fred Hollows Foundation 2022 Humanitarian Award.



We all have a role to play in keeping our kids safe online

Our children are digital natives who learn, explore, connect and engage with their friends online. They can also wander into harm's way.

As a mother of two young daughters, I understand the concerns parents have around social media, like bullying, peer pressure and negative body image. Or unintentionally accessing harmful, distressing and ageinappropriate content.

Recent research by our online safety regulator, eSafety, found almost two-thirds of 14 to 17-year-olds have viewed extremely harmful content including drug abuse, suicide or self-harm, as well as gory or violent material online. A quarter have been exposed to content promoting unhealthy eating habits.

Digital platforms, government and society all have a role to play in ensuring our children

are safe online. We know that technology moves fast and no government can protect every child from every threat, every day. But we have to do all we can to address this.

The Albanese Government is leading an important national conversation on this issue and we are engaging experts, parents and young people.

Parents I speak to are rightly concerned about the potential for social media to negatively influence or harm their children. Young people are telling me they understand the need for protections too.

Our Government will introduce legislation into the Parliament by the end of the year to create a new minimum age for access to social media. In this pursuit, the national conversation has proposed a range of ages to be considered. We will be guided by evidence. Our age assurance trial is testing technologies that could be effective to ensure ages from 13 up to 16.

eSafety is also working across multiple fronts to support a safer online environment for all Australians.

It offers a wealth of resources to help put parental controls in place and guide important conversations about children's online experiences. I encourage parents, carers, educators and children to visit www.esafety.gov. au to find out more.

Australia leads the world in online safety, but with technology evolving rapidly, we need to stay vigilant.

Our priority is the ongoing safety of Australians, and that's the forward-facing national approach we are taking.

Getting School Infrastructure Back on Track in Riverstone

Last year, the New South Wales Department of Education conducted an audit of enrollment growth in the state's schools at the request of the Labor government. The audit, which covered the period from 2018 to 2023, aimed to analyze student population trends. The audit revealed significant student population growth in the North-West and South-West growth corridors.

The Schofields-East region in the Riverstone electorate experienced the most substantial increase, with government school enrollments surging from 1,535 students in 2018 to 4,762 in 2023, exceeding the projected number of students by more than 3 times.

The number of students in Schofields was grossly underestimated to the point where actual number of students in this area now is higher than the amount that was predicted for 2041. Three of the top 20 suburbs with the most significant growth were in Riverstone, and another three were in neighbouring electorates like Box Hill and Marsden Park.

Upon taking office in early 2023, I was confronted with the dire situation in our schools. Despite the rapid student enrollment growth, the former Government sold off multiple school sites in the electorate and replaced them with housing. Riverstone students were crammed into overcrowded classrooms, their playgrounds invaded by temporary structures, and their teachers overburdened. This begs the question: How could such a massive planning failure have been allowed to persist?

The former government's handling of education in the Riverstone electorate can only be described as woeful. The pursuit of rapid housing development blindsided the students and families of Riverstone.

The Minns Labor government is working to bring public education back on track. Under Education Minister Prue Car's leadership, the NSW schooling system is receiving a historic boost in funding \$3.6 billion across the state.

A multitude of school upgrades, temporary schools and new fast-tracked schools, permanent teaching positions and teacher salary upgrades is just the first step to fixing the mess. Addressing the school infrastructure crisis is a complex issue that requires a multifaceted approach.

The audit report suggests several actions that can be adopted to address the crisis. Custom school population projections, continually enhancing projection models, engagement with local stakeholders, developing strategic land provisioning strategies, active monitoring of schools in growth areas and short-term enrolment management strategies.

The findings of this report paint a clear image of how the state of schooling was left in when I came into office. I am proud to be a part of a government who values education the way it should be. All students deserve an equal standard of education – and the Mins Labor government is getting education back on track in Riverstone.

Since using this system he hasn't lost or had any damaged plants due to excessive heat. He installed uv protected nylex tubing with several different misting tips every metre. The system can be preset to turn on up to 12 times a day or can be turned on manually.


"On a personal level it was pretty satisfying to help get my childhood club, and now my son's club, a premiership win."

Thompson's First Grand Slam Has a Great Ring To It

The Hill's biggest tennis export, Jordan Thompson, can now proudly display his first Grand Slam after partnering good mate Max Purcell to win the recent US Open doubles crown in New York.

"To be grand slam champions, it has a great ring to it, especially after what happened at Wimbledon," Thompson said. "It got a bit tense there at the end, with match points, but we stuck with it and we got there in the end."

The experienced duo saw off the challenge of the 10th seeded Germans Kevin Krawietz and Tim Puetz 6-4, 7-6 (7-4), becoming the first all-Australian doubles team win the US Open after legends Mark Woodforde and Todd Woodbridge in 1996. The new doubles champs shared a huge cheque for \$A1.15 million.

Thompson, an alumnus of Oakhill College, Castle Hill, is enjoying some of his best tennis at 30 years. He broke into the top 30 singles ranks for the first time after making the last 16 of the US Open singles, and is ranked seventh in doubles. To top it off, Thompson is a key member of Australia's Davis Cup team which has stormed into the finals of the prestigious event.

Thompson and Purcell, the 2024 Paris Olympics doubles champ, are a terrific combination this year, also capturing ATP doubles titles in Houston, Los Cabos and Dallas.

The US Open win atoned for their heartbreaking loss in the doubles final at Wimbledon in July, when they were narrowly defeated by Great Britain's Henry Patten and Finland's Harri Heliovaara who saved three championship points.

At the US Open, Thompson and Purcell recovered from squandering two championship points at 5-3 in the second set to win the title.

There was no time for Thompson to enjoy his Grand Slam breakthrough title, because he flew to Spain to join the Australian team competing in the Davis Cup in Valencia.

Australia, coached by tennis ace Leyton Hewitt, qualified for the Davis Cup finals to be staged in Malaga, Spain, from November 19-24.

For people living with dementia, even little changes can go a long way. Take the example of golfer Scott Cooper, 67, who loves playing at Pennant Hills Golf Club. However, he found it hard to distinguish between the colour white on the club's balcony and spoke to the management about it.

The club quickly fixed it, leaving a delighted Scott to say: "There's a door on the balcony outside that had a white handle on it. White on white for somebody with my dementia can be difficult, so I mentioned it, and they changed it to a grey handle. I can easily navigate now."

Pennant Hills GC manager Barnaby Sumner said that one of their mottos is to deliver the little things. "Our team members are encouraged to get out from behind the counter and help whoever is in need of assistance." he said.

Scott, who has a golf handicap of 18, said all venues should be dementia-friendly: "It doesn't matter if it's a golf club, bowls club, restaurant or coffee shop, the more you can make the place more inclusive for people living with dementia, I think the world would be a better place.'

Scott was diagnosed with dementia four years ago, but that hasn't stopped him from enjoying his golf. "I have been playing golf since 2014 and it helps me keep physically active and also socially connected to my friends and the community," said Scott, who played cricket and rugby in his younger days.

The retired grandfather of two also loves to snow ski when they visit their family in Canada.

"All sporting clubs need to be inclusive for people living with dementia because if club facilities were easy to navigate and the staff are trained to communicate, then all members of that club will benefit," Scott said.

Dementia Australia is using Dementia Action Week (September 16-22) to highlight there are the many things people can do in their own communities to make them more "dementia-friendly, which helps to break down the stigma and discrimination".

"It is important that they are not left behind and we actively seek out their participation," Summer said. "Members with dementia are included in club events and are encouraged to attend our social occasions. I know that Scott continues to enjoy these social moments and continues to engage with his fellow members.



"I am proud to say that our club allows those with dementia the ability to maintain their identity and provides a number of reasons for continuing to live an active everyday life.

"People living with dementia have the basic right to participate in all decisions which affect their lives and wellbeing. What would I say to other business owners who are looking to become more dementia-friendly is that it starts at the top. You need to create a culture of support, one that genuinely looks after people. My best tip is to set an example yourself."

MEMORIES WITH IVOR JONES & FRIENDS

THE RETAILING HORDERNS

The Hordern family once controlled the largest Department Store in the World. The store Anthony Hordern & Sons built on a small hill in the Southern part of the Sydney CBD known as Brickfield Hill covered an area of 52 acres (27 hectares).

After the Pulsford family home was converted to Hordern Bros. hardware and paint department

The company was founded by Anthony and Ann Hordern in 1823 from a small bonnet and corset shop in King Street, Sydney with a saddlery located at the rear. The business eventually grew into a department store located in George St Haymaket. With a growing family most of whom went into the retail trade, some starting their own retail businesses of which at one time amounted to six stores operated by members of the Hordern family. Eventually many were merged into the one company of Anthony Hordern & Sons. In 1926 the site of Anthony Hordern & Sons was sold to a public company of the same name with the family having only one store of Hordern Brothers in Pitt St. Sydney. The public company of Anthony Hordern & Sons was sold to Waltons Ltd.in 1970. The Brickfield Hill store closed in 1973 and is now the site of World Square, The Hordern name is remembered as part of the World Square site was named Hordern Tower.

In 1962 two brothers, Hunter and Ross Hordern, fifth generation descendants of Anthony and Ann Hordern, decided to look around for another retail business and settled on a company based in Windsor named M H Pulsford & Co. which operated a department store on the corner of George & Fitzgerald Sts which promoted themselves as the Friendly Corner Store. The brothers renamed the Windsor store as H & R Hordern – Value Department Store. Maurice Pulsford had operated the store at the site since 1935 prior to that the original Pulsford store was located next to the old Post Office (now the site of the Post Office Arcade) later in 1910 Pulsford acquired the adjoining William Beard's Ironmongery before moving the business to the George & Fitzgerald Sts. site in January 1920.

HAND MAN 53 TRI

A feature of a number of early department stores was a "cash railway" or "cash carrier" and such a system was in use at Windsor during both Pulsford's and Hordern's times and both customers and staff had to be careful not to be struck by the wooden cash cup which caried the customer's cash to the cashier and the change and receipt back to the sales desk for the for sales assistant to hand to the customer. Goods were delivered to outlying customers at Wisemans Ferry, Ebenezer and other locations by the use of buses going to those areas.

The store sold everything from foundation garments (underwear) to hardware and has also sold guns, ammunition and explosives such as gelignite.

Hunter Hordern speaking to a journalist back in 1998 said "We keep the old philosophy of good value and good service" Hunter went on to say "I think that Windsor is a wonderful town for trading. The Windsor people are loyal to the local traders in the town and we have enjoyed giving them the best service possible.

When brothers Hunter and Ross Hordern decided to retire towards the end of the 20th century they sold the business in three lots. The Hardware section was sold in1996, ladies wear in 1998 and finally menswear in 1999. Several of the fittings and fixtures were donated at around the turn of the century to the Hawkesbury Historical Society and formed the basis of the museum's 2013 exhibition.









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
