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

Council Conducting **Town Centre Parking Study** A comprehensive study of parking needs and habits around Richmond, North Richmond, Windsor and South

This study, which will include on-the-ground surveys of formalised and kerbside parking space use around the centres on weekdays and weekends, was committed to by Council in February 2022 and will provide guidance to Council on the right mix of parking to support these four critical town centres.

As the Windsor Liveability Project designs are now confirmed, the study is now taking place at all four locations simultaneously to create an accurate snapshot in time.

Physical surveying of parked cars and parking spaces will be carried out this month.

Complementing the physical surveying will be direct engagement with business owners and residents online and in-person to understand their needs and how current parking arrangements impact them.

Council will hold community drop-in meetings where residents and business owners are invited to come and speak to staff about their thoughts, ideas and concerns about the parking in the four major town centres.

Rouse Hill Hospital Latest

Community Information sessions regarding plans for the new \$700-million Rouse Hill Hospital development are being held between now and Thursday, 12th September at various locations.

The sessions are an opportunity to ask the project team questions and provide feedback.

Rouse Hill Hospital is expected to include:

- an emergency department and primary access
- in-patient beds and a day surgery unit
- short stay medical assessment services
- pathology, pharmacy, and medical imaging
- outpatient and ambulatory care services including paediatrics, renal and women's health
- a health hub for virtual care and hospital in the home services
- prehabilitation, rehabilitation and lifestyle medicine.

Alison Derrett, Acting Chief Executive Western Sydney Local Health District (WSLHD) said: "Our new hospital will meet the evolving needs of the community. It will provide patient-centred care, integrating hospital services with urgent care. early intervention and prevention strategies along with initiatives to provide care to patients in their own homes.

"In parallel with the planning and design of the new Rouse Hill Hospital, Western Sydney

Local Health District is working towards building a highly skilled health workforce, and we look forward to providing more information about recruitment opportunities as the project progresses."

The full scope of services provided by the new hospital will be confirmed following the conclusion of the planning and design process. Feedback from the community, consumers, staff and stakeholders will help to inform this process.

Health Minister Ryan Park said: "This project will ensure the thousands of people moving into this growth area every year continue to have access to world-class healthcare now and well into the future.

"Consultation with consumers, the local community, staff and stakeholders, will help guide the planning and design process for the hospital to ensure it meets the community health needs of the future."

Riverstone MP Warren Kirby urged people to attend one of the community information sessions: "This is a chance for our local community to get involved and learn more about planning and design for the future of healthcare right on our doorstep."

Construction of the hospital will support an estimated 1,200 direct jobs and thousands of indirect jobs throughout the life of the project. Construction timeframes for the new development will be confirmed as planning progresses and following the appointment of a building contractor.

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POLICE PURSUIT

A man and three teenagers have been charged following a pursuit through Dural on Saturday (17th August).

Officers attached to Region Enforcement Squad Gordon observed an Audi Q7, which had allegedly been stolen, travelling southbound on Old Northern Road, Dural just after 1am and attempted to stop the vehicle.

When the Audi failed to stop, a pursuit was initiated and continued to Pennant Hills Road, where a tyre deflation device was successfully deployed. The vehicle came to a stop after hitting a traffic light at the intersection of James Ruse Drive, North Parramatta.

One of the occupants of the vehicle, a 22-year-old man, was arrested at the scene. Three other occupants fled the scene on foot. Following an extensive search by local police, with the assistance of PolAir and the Dog Unit, the three 17-year-old boys were located nearby.

One of the teenagers was taken to hospital to be treated for a previous medical condition.



He was later released and taken to Parramatta Police Station. The other two teens and the man were taken to Parramatta Police Station.

The 22-year-old man was charged with be carried in conveyance taken without consent of owner. The three teens were charged with be carried in conveyance taken w/o consent of owner, enter enclosed land without lawful excuse and breach of bail.

DRINK DRIVING

A mum driving with her two young children failed a police road-side breath test in Castle Hill.

The 32-year-old was the first car pulled over for a RBT by police on Sunday, August 11th at 7.40pm on Windsor Rd Castle Hill.

The Kellyville woman returned a positive road side test and was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station where she returned a blood alcohol reading of 0.140.

She was given a court attendance notice for mid range drink driving for Parramatta Local Court. Her licence was suspended on the spot and her children were collected by family members

FINANCE FRAUD

Detectives have charged a Carlingford man following an investigation into an alleged \$10 million financing fraud targeting a Sydney automotive group. They also seized over \$200,000 worth of wine

The 40-year-old man was charged on Wednesday, 14th August.

He is the second person to be charged in relation to the alleged fraud. A 31-year-old woman was charged in May this year with 102 counts of dishonestly obtain financial advantage by deception and one count of possess prohibited drug.

The man was charged with three counts of recklessly deal proceeds general crime intend to conceal, participate criminal group contribute criminal activity and recklessly deal with proceeds of crime greater than \$5000.

In January 2024, detectives attached to State Crime Command's Financial Crimes Squad – with assistance from the NSW Crime Commission (NSWCC) – launched an investigation into a criminal syndicate targeting automotive financing companies under Strike Force Myddleton.

The investigation found that the syndicate was allegedly using the stolen personal information of over 33 people to apply for financing through the various financial companies to purchase luxury cars that did not exist

Following extensive investigations, strike force detectives executed a search warrant at a Middleton Grange home at about 6am on Wednesday, 15th May where they arrested a 31-year-old woman.

Following further investigations, strike force detectives – with assistance from Raptor Squad and the NSWCC – executed search warrants at a home in Carlingford and a warehouse unit in

Alexandria at about 6am on Wednesday 14th August..

During the searches, detectives located and seized a Tesla sedan, a Mercedes Benz van, multiple Rolex watches, large amounts of luxury jewellery and an estimated \$200,000 worth of wine and other assorted alcohol.

Detectives arrested a 40-year-old man at the Carlingford property.

Detectives will allege in court the man made a number of fraudulent applications through the woman – who used her position as an employee at the automotive financing business – to approve financing to the value of \$600,000, which the man attempted to then launder through various bank accounts.

It will be further alleged the female employee went on to facilitate a total of over 50 luxury vehicles worth a combined \$10 million between November 2022 and August 2023.

Detective Superintendent Gordon Arbinja, Commander of State Crime Command's Financial Crime Squad, wants the victims of this fraud to know more arrests are coming.

"We have several more targets allegedly involved in this criminal syndicate that we are interested in and want those victims of this syndicate to know more arrests are coming.

"No one should receive a letter in the mail saying they owe tens of thousands of dollars for a car they have never seen."

"I want to thank the businesses involved in this investigation for their outstanding cooperation. Thanks to them we have been able to prevent further innocent people from having their personal information caught up in this fraud. Det Supt Arbinja said.

Investigations under Strike Force Myddleton continue, and further arrests are expected.

CRASH FOOTAGE APPEAL

Police have appealed for information and dashcam footage following a multi-vehicle crash in West Pennant Hills on Thursday, 15th August.

Officers attached to a specialist command attempted to stop a blue Subaru Impreza on Pennant Hills Road, West Pennant Hills at about 10.35am. The vehicle allegedly failed to stop and was involved in a crash with five other vehicles before the male driver ran from the scene.

No pursuit was initiated and there were no reports of injuries.

Officers attached to The Hills Police Area Command commenced an investigation into the circumstances surrounding the crash. Checks revealed the Impreza had been reported stolen from the state's north coast overnight. Police seized the vehicle for forensic examination.

OPERATION SIDESTEP

Officers from Hawkesbury Police Area Command ran Operation SIDESTEP on Thursday 8th August assisted by Loss Prevention Officers from major retail stores.

The operation focused on preventing, disrupting and responding to retail theft, street offences, anti-social behaviour and road safety within the Hawkesbury area.

At the end of the day four people were fined for shoplifting, 1 person was charged, police also carried out 182 random breath/drug tests and issued 44 traffic infringement notices. There were also 13 inspections regarding the safe storage of firearms, 5 licensed premises business inspections and 15 bail compliance checks. Four people were searched and one person was given a move on direction.



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LOCAL GOVT ELECTIONS

SATURDAY, 14TH SEPTEMBER

Hills residents will have the opportunity to vote for a new Mayor at the Hills Shire Council Elections on Saturday, September 14th with three candidates nominating for the top spot.

Current Greens Councillor and local vet Dr Mila Kasby has gained the number 1 position on the ticket after the ballot draw on Thursday 15th August.

Second spot in the draw was won by former Mayor Liberal Dr Michelle Byrne, leaving the third spot on the ticket to Labor's Immanuel Selvarai.

Dr Byrne won Liberal pre-selection by 15 votes over current Mayor Dr Peter Gangemi who will stay on as Hills Mayor until after the election result is ratified by council which could be at the end of September or early in October.

The Mayor at Hawkesbury City Council is elected by councillors rather than residents and will be elected at a special council meeting in late September or October.

The Electoral Commission closed nominations for the Local Government elections at noon on Wednesday 14th August and ballots were held at each Electoral Office on Thursday to determine which order candidates will appear on the ballot paper.

The Hills Shire Council is divided into wards and residents can ONLY vote in their wards on election day, Saturday, September 14th. You can find out which Ward you are in on the NSW Electoral Commission website at *elections.nsw.gov.au*

Three councillors will be voted on to represent each ward at Hills Shire Council meaning 12 representatives on council plus the popularly elected Mayor. Interestingly none of the sitting Labor Councillors will be returning to contest their seats and four former Liberal councillors are hoping to return following a bitter pre-selection battle ahead of the 2021 election which saw them fail to be endorsed by Liberal State head office.

Hawkesbury City Council does not have a divided council (le a ward system) as all councillors represent the entire area.

Safer Roads Funding

People living in and around Hawkesbury will have a safer trip home due to more than \$3.6 million in Federal Government funding to improve 5 known crash sites under the 2024–25 Black Spot Program.

The Blackspot Program will fund \$730,000 of safety improvements to Old Pitt Town Road at Oakville, installing curve alignment markers, flexible barriers on the roadside, motorcycle underrun on existing semi-rigid barrier and guideposts with reflectors and improving the sealed shoulder.

The Black Spot Program funds a range of safety measures at locations where serious crashes have occurred, or are at risk of occurring.

Other local black spot sites receiving funding are this round are:

- Hanckel Road, Oakville: \$530,000 to install a motorcycle underrun, guideposts with reflectors, raised islands with additional stop, a flexible barrier on the roadside and money to remove sight distance restrictions at intersection.
- Tennyson Road, Tennyson: \$900,000 to install a flexible barrier on roadside, guideposts with

reflectors, curve alignment markers and motorcycle underrun on existing semi-rigid barrier.

- Spinks Road, Freemans Reach: \$780,000 for a motorcycle underrun, curve alignment markers, raised islands with additional stop, a flexible barrier on roadside and guideposts with reflectors. This funding will also be used to seal a section of the shoulder of Spinks Rd.
- Freemans Reach Road: \$680,000 for audiotactile centre line, curve alignment markers, guideposts with reflectors and flexible barrier on roadside and a motorcycle underrun on existing semi-rigid barrier and mark barrier line.

The Australian Government has substantially increased Black Spot Program funding, which is progressively rising from \$110 million to \$150 million per year.

Federal Member for Macquarie, Susan Templeman MP said: "At these locations we've seen a high number of incidents. I know there is more work to be done to improve the safety of Hawkesbury roads and encourage anyone who knows of a dangerous road location near them to consider submitting a nomination for future funding rounds."

"Road safety, of course, is a shared responsibility, and this is a timely reminder to be extra vigilant and to slow down on the roads so everyone can get home safely from every journey."

In honour of National Homelessness Awareness Month, Bella Vista Farm hosted its 11th annual Hills Winter Sleepout, raising funds and awareness for homeless individuals and victims of domestic violence in the Hills.

According to the 2021 census, approximately 122,000 individuals experience homelessness every day across Sydney. This appears in various forms such as couch surfing, living in crisis accommodation and sleeping rough. With the sharp increase of cost of living, and rising unemployment rates, the rate of homelessness is not just ben affecting Sydney's residents; it's a growing concern within the Hills Shire Council. Vulnerable members of our community are living in improvised dwellings and squatted accommodation, often fleeing domestic violence situations.

Mici Beer, Executive Officer and Program Director of the Hills Community Aid, has over 25 years experience in the community sector. Whilst the Hills Shire Council does not have a large population of people sleeping rough, Mici spoke of the emerging category, 'The Working Poor' and the hidden couch-surfers within our own community:

"In the past year, Hills Community Aid has had a 47% increase in the number of people who have presented as homeless. We can see it's a growing issue. Homeless Australia reported that in 2023, 76,000 children under the

age of 18 sought help from homeless support services nationally. However, 19,800 of those children were turned away from these resources due to a lack of support - this needs to change".

However, the Hills Winter Sleepout is here to support our most vulnerable and improve their living conditions. On the 17th of August, the Sleeopout held its 11th annual event, bringing the community together to experience one night of sleeping rough. The Hills Winter Sleepout raises funds for Hills Community Aid (HCA), specifically for their Homeless Prevention Initiative, which provides services such as crisis accommodation and rental/bond support for those experiencing financial hardship.

Through the generous donations from the Hills Winter Sleepout, over \$350,000 has been raised in previous years, helping hundreds of vulnerable locals who were facing the terrifying reality of being homeless.

Michelle Byrne, former Mayor and founder of the event, started the mission in 2014 to address misconceptions of homelessness in the Hills. During her speech, she noted the rise of domestic violence in the Hills and encouraged families to access the wonderful services offered by the Hills Community Aid:

"We started this Sleepout because we wanted to raise awareness of homelessness and its causes in the Hills. In 2014, people didn't believe that homelessness existed in the Hills and that's simply not true. We know that

tonight, there are women and children who are sleeping in their cars. We know that there are people who are employed but cannot afford rent. Occasionally we do have rough sleepers in the Hills, but they are very well hidden. Over the last 11 years, we have raised \$350,000 and what is special about the sleepout is that it's a very different event, we get to meet our community and the people around us on a greater level".

Reverend Bill Crews is also passionate about homelessness prevention through The Rev. Bill Crews Foundation. His advocacy spans over 50 years and includes his 'Loaves and Fishes' restaurant, which distributes half a million meals a year. At the event, Reverend Bill spoke of the importance in recognising the homeless community as part of our humanity: "We see a lot of people at our meal services who say to our volunteers, 'I never thought I'd be here'. But I don't think there is as much hope as there is right now. Homeless people here are just the same as homeless people in Sydney - there's a family of homelessness, just like there's a community of us. We are all interconnected - all those people that are on the streets now are in lots of ways, our brothers and sisters".

At the event, Norwest Sunrise Rotary Club provided much-needed respite throughout the night with a BBQ dinner and hot bacon and egg rolls the next morning - a much kinder reality for us than those experiencing homelessness. Hills Daily Grind, an initiative and fundraiser for Hills Community Aid, generously provided participants with bakery goods and coffees late into the night and early the next morning. This year, Vidzero also joined the Hills Winter Sleepout to film a pro-bono advertisement as part of their initiative of: '100 videos for 100 charities'.

Any one of us is only a few paychecks away from being Homeless. If this story speaks to you, The Hills Winter Sleepout is still accepting donations. You can choose the amount you wish to donate, with donations over \$2 tax deductible. Our team raised almost \$400 for the event and you can donate to our page by searching for the 'The Hills Winter Sleepout August 2024' online.

The Hills Domestic Violence Prevention Network is looking to the future after more than 30 years of support and advocacy in the area.

At its recent AGM it elected a new executive team for 2024 with Anita Fisher from Hills Community Aid and Uma Menon from KNC sharing the role as convenors. Tara Gleig and Upala Sunthankar are taking on the role as the HDVPN secretary for the year. Treasurer is Aurelia Rahman and Publicity Officer is Pratibha Bhanushali.

MISSION STATEMENT: The core mission of HDVPN is to raise awareness and reduce the incidence of domestic violence in the Hills Shire. The network's efforts have led to significant strides in making the community safer and more informed. By hosting annual forums and events, HDVPN ensures that domestic violence remains a visible and urgent issue, particularly focusing on educating the younger generation.

Uma Menon said: "The HDVPN has been instrumental in bringing together the local community, community organisations, service providers, institutions, and the local police to create a united front to prevent and stop domestic violence for over 30 years.

"The network has worked to raise awareness on domestic violence through educational and interactive annual forums and community outreach. Members meet every month at the Hills Shire Council to share information and discuss current trends of domestic and family violence in the area."

Anita Fisher said: "One notable achievement over the past year was the development of a Poster Awareness Campaign in The Hills Shire, which was a collaboration between the HDVPN, The Hills Shire Council and The Hills Area Police Command. Posters were created and placed strategically on the toilet doors of toilets in Rouse Hill Shopping Centre as well as changeable electronic street signs across The Hills Shire."

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'Mini City" Plan Plea

Hills Shire Council has officially submitted its feedback on the proposed "mini city" development at Bella Vista and Kellyville Metro Stations, urging the NSW Government to reconsider its "rushed plans".

At the recent council meeting on 13th August, Hills Shire councillors unanimously backed a submission to the NSW Department of Planning, Housing, and Infrastructure, raising significant concerns about the proposed rezoning of land around the Kellyville and Bella Vista Metro Stations.

The submission was prompted by the Department's exhibition of its Transport Oriented Development (TOD) plan for the Bella Vista and Kellyville Metro Stations, which close for public comment today, Friday, August 23.

Council's submission highlights what it calls "serious issues" with the proposal, including inadequate infrastructure, insufficient road upgrades, environmental impacts, and increased flooding risks.

It maintains that if the plans are approved, they would create the capacity for 100,000 additional people ... more than some of Sydney's Local Government Areas.

Key concerns outlined by Council include:

- Traffic: The plan fails to account for the contribution of the arterial road network to regional traffic and productivity.
- Public Transport: Council calls for more bus services, additional commuter parking spaces,

and bus priority measures to improve access to Metro stations.

- Open Space and Community Facilities: The plan provides insufficient funding for social infrastructure. All residents should have access to a local park within 400 metres, and the area needs more than a dozen new playing fields. The additional community centre and library space must also be funded.
- Schools: Despite plans to further upzone the land to accommodate an additional 43,000 residents, no new school sites have been identified.
- · Flooding Risks: The area near Elizabeth Macarthur Creek is prone to flooding
- Growth Distribution: Of the 47,800 additional dwellings planned across eight TOD Accelerated Precincts, 43% are concentrated in just two precincts, including Bella Vista and Kellyville.
- Employment Land Use: Council insists that rezoning must preserve the area's job capacity and employment potential. Old Windsor Road will struggle to support the incoming population without significant upgrades.
- Built Form and Scale: Further urban design analysis is needed to assess the impacts on the Elizabeth Macarthur Creek corridor and nearby low-density areas.
- Ecologically Sustainable Development: An updated flora and fauna study is required to consider potential heritage and ecological impacts before finalising the rezoning.
- Building Certification: Council highlighted ongoing issues with private certification,



which have led to significant defects in some developments.

Emergency Services: The NSW Government should honour its commitment to secure a site for a future SES headquarters within the Bella Vista-Kellyville Metro corridor. The plan lacks provisions for Fire & Rescue, Police, or local courts to service the new population.

Hills Shire Council's General Manager, Michael Edgar, said: "Unless revised, these plans will leave our current and future residents with a precinct that feels overdeveloped and inadequate, leading to widespread dissatisfaction.

"Our submission reflects Council's deep concerns about the impacts of an additional 100,000 residents in these precincts, on top of the current population.

"While we recognise the urgency of addressing the housing crisis, rushing these plans through without proper assessment and infrastructure will lead to a quality-of-life crisis. "



Rouse Hill Regional Park

Rouse Hill Regional Park is a hidden gem in the Hills and Hawkesbury region and it only takes one visit to discover why it is so popular amongst those who know it exists. The park offers a fun day out for all with a slice of living history thrown in.

The heart of Rouse Hill Regional Park is the playground from which walking trails and tracks radiate from. The playground aesthetically fits in with the grassland and remnant Cumberland Woodland setting with a yarning circle to sit and share stories, playhouses, slippery dips, swings, climbing frames, a flying fox, a life-size maze to solve and an inground merry-go-round.

When the kids have finished in the playground there is plenty of open space to kick a ball as well as paths to cycle or skate on. Rouse Hill Regional Park also offers two walking tracks. The first is the Second Ponds Creek Walk that takes you through grassland and remnant Cumberland woodlands past the Second Creek Pond offering a chance to get close to nature and to enjoy the peace and tranguillity that comes with it.



The second walk, The Rouse Hill Estate Walk, offers a glimpse into the history of Rouse Hill. The walk takes you past the grounds of the Old Rouse Hill House and Farm which was home to Richard Rouse, a public servant and grazier followed by his descendants up until the 1980's. It is now maintained by the Museums of History NSW. For us the most exciting part as we looked through the fence at the Old Rouse Hill House, the outbuildings, stables and historic gardens was seeing the cows including some tiny calves. If you time up your visit to the Rouse Hill Regional Park well, you may also get a tour of Rouse Hill House and Farm at the same time which is so worth it!



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

Hawkesbury Street Speak Project. Thank you to Hawkesbury City Council for the opportunity to be part of the program," Mark Wilson said.



"I was inspired by Kirpy and E.L.K. (Luke Cornish) who have both had work in the Archibald Prize. I am not a graffiti artist, but I do like graffiti and street art and it is what inspired me to be an artist."

When asked about if the perception of graffiti art is slowly changing in the local community, Mark said:



All are welcome.
Bring your friends and family and enjoy shopping, indoors, for gifts, crafts, accessories, plants and many more stalls.

There will also be a pop up cafe and a sausage sizzle.



"I think that depends on what you classify graffiti as. Murals and street art are mostly accepted these days whereas tagging, I think, is still one of those art forms that is misunderstood."

To Mark, events such as Street Speak give youth a place to learn, practice, connect and have fun.

"It would be great to open a few sites up around the Hawkesbury for artists to use as graffiti walls et cetera."

"I would encourage artists to explore their creativity and express themselves in a way that is both artistic and respectful. Remember, graffiti is a form of art, and like any art form, it requires skill, practice, and a deep appreciation for the craft. Make your art in a safe space and make it count."

Mark won the First Prize as a Local District Artist at this year's Hawkesbury Agricultural Show and was a Jenny Birt Painting Prize finalist. He also participated in Group and Solo shows such as Royal Easter Show, and Political Pop! He is volunteering at the Ferry Artists Gallery and Macquarie Town Arts Society.

Cameron, a local South Windsor artist and TAFE teacher, seeks to change the public's view on graffiti art. With his 27 years of experience, Cameron acknowledged that the perception of graffiti and tagging is slowly changing for the better.

"I don't blame anyone for thinking what they do about graffiti, until they've met someone like me where I can kind of shake that grey area away."

Years ago, the public thought we were all the same. It's been a hard 10-15 years, but my friends and I have all grown up here and believe that going around doing these free murals has really shifted the perception Now, people come up to us and compliment our work, even offering

free cold drinks!" Cameron shared with Hills to Hawkesbury Community News about a free mural he made with his friends Paul Zoeller from Paul.Riot and Andrew.

"I live local and I've always seen the wall and asked Allen, the owner of Foodworks, do you mind if we do something for free? It was a great Easter weekend, we spent the whole thing laughing and doing what we love. That's something that money can't put a price on," he

said. In 2023, he and his friends also revitalised the Heritage Water Tank along the Windsor promenade in conjunction with the Windsor

Rotary Club, combining iconic symbols of

Windsor's rich agriculture and a sense of youth culture to the historical area.

Cameron and Mark are both looking to change the narrative of urban artists and use events such as 'Street Speak' to create safe environments for the youth to practise and express their art.

The Street Speak project was funded by the NSW Government under the Graffiti Management Grant Application (Western Sydney).


Welcome in Spring with the Secret Garden's **Scarecrow Fair**



HIDDEN IN THE HILLS

BUSHWALKING BY LACHLAN TURNER

Bushwalking means different things to different people. Some are quite dedicated to the challenge of a long and varied walk, whilst others may engage in just a short walk along their favourite track on a regular basis. Others may only enter bushland reserves on a casual basis. Some prefer to attend guided bushwalks.

Nevertheless, all who spend time in the bush express similar feelings about having been there. There is a personal sense of freedom and relaxation as each individual enjoys an ever changing environmental scene as the seasons come and go.

Not all tracks are smoothly graded and easily traversed. Therefore bushwalking is not without unexpected challenges such as steep climbs, rocky terrain, wet areas such as creek crossings as well as clambering over the occasional fallen log.

Adequate clothing and footwear are essential. Due to the high level of effort that

can be required it is a good idea to take a supply of water and maybe a snack bar or two. A light back pack is most useful in which to carry personal items securely. Some bushwalkers also take a small first aid kit including sunscreen.

Looking at this week's photos will give you an idea of how experienced bushwalkers prepare for their excursion into the natural world. Most are wearing a hat; some wear sunglasses; several have equipped themselves with a walking pole; all have substantial footwear for the occasion. Some may even take their camera with them to capture some of the unexpected beauty that is otherwise hidden in the bushland along the track.

Temperatures in bushland environments can be variable, so it is advisable to dress appropriately.

Remember to enjoy your outdoor experience, leaving nothing but footprints taking nothing but photos.





Having conquered the famed English Channel crossing aged 19 in 2022 – the youngest Australian to do so – Michael, 21, is celebrating after swimming across the Irish Sea from Northern Ireland to Scotland, and also the Strait

of Gibraltar within a hectic fortnight.

He swam the 34.5km Northern Channel on July 30, starting at Robbys Point on the North Irish Coast, completing the epic journey in 10 hours, three minutes. He followed it up by crossing the Strait of Gibraltar from Spain to Morocco (15.1km) on August 12, in three hours, 36 minutes, again watched proudly by his Dad Steve and Mum Jenny.

Michael, who has done open water swimming and relay events with his Dad in his teens, trained for a month in Ireland before these challenges.

And unsurprisingly, the son of two Ironmen contestants is already preparing for his next adventure in September: swimming the gruelling Catalina Channel which separates Santa Catalina Island from southern California.

"The Northern Channel swim was a tough swim as the water was 13.2-14.6 degrees Celsius and the current picked up towards the end, but other than that, I had pancake flat conditions luckily enough," Michael said. "I was really tired and my body was very sore as I was stung by a lion's mane jellyfish but I was very lucky with the conditions on the day.

"I just love long distance swimming, having been to the Australian Nationals twice when I was in college. I love open water championships and I am looking forward to trying the Nationals one more time next year. I thank my parents for all their support. "I train nine to ten times a week, often in the mornings and afternoons at the Nepean Aquatic Centre and also go to the gym twice a week. For the Northern Channel swim, I had to put on around 10kg, which was a mental and physical challenge in itself.

"Before my Northern Channel swim, I attended the Cork Distance Week, which is an amazing camp with international legends from all over the world, including Ned Denison, whom I was fortunate to know and train with."

Michael did cold water training in the Hawkesbury River and Lake Canobolas in Orange. "I have done two solo, one team (four team members), and two duo crossings of Rottnest Channel Swim (WA), which were categories for the event," he said.

Michael is a former Hawkesbury Sportsperson of the Year (2022) and in 2023 received the Special Achievement Award as part of Australia Day Awards.

Michael is also completing his nursing degree at Charles Sturt University, Bathurst. He had numerous placements in western NSW this year to complete, so training was challenging. However, he diligently followed the training program set by his coach James Sweeney and former coach Jackie Barck.

Michael has been supported by the Richmond Club for the past two years.

It featured an image taken of Kellyville post office in 1932 when it was on the corner of Acres and Windsor roads and was cut to mark the occasion by long term resident and customer Beverly Green.

The De Masi family took over Kellyville Post Office in March 2013 and gave the outlet a new lease of life with a new team and refit and good old fashion customer service.

Joining them to celebrate and give the stamp of approval was Federal Member for Mitchell Alex Hawke MP, Kellyville State MP Ray Williams, Hills Councillor Reena Jethi, former Hills Mayor Michelle Byrne, Sarah Coe, General Manager Australia Post Retail Operations North and Joel Boeman, Deputy Principal Kellyville Public School. Kellyville Post Office opened on 1 January 1889. It was established 16 years

after Kellyville Public School opened its doors in 1873

According to information in the *Hills Heritage News*, Hills District Museum archives and Daisy Ardley's book *Kellyville: The Pleasant Village* (published in 1997) Kellyville Post Office began its life near Kellyville Public School and was run by Mary Pryce, the daughter of Edward Pryce who taught at the school. She resigned when her father resigned from teaching and left Kellyville.

Mrs Mary Ann Redden took over the position of Post Mistress in 1892 but operated it from her home in "Hillview" on the corner of Acres and Windsor roads which was not a popular decision.

The Post office remained in hands of the Redden family until 1934 with Mary Ann Redden

holding the official position of Postmistress until she was 85 with family members sharing the duties.

Horace Faulkner took the position in 1934 followed by Reginald Brownhill from 1945 until his death in 1961.

According to Daisy Ardley's history of Kellyville the Post office building moved to the village centre in 1973 and later to the Cecily Centre and then the Village Arcade.



The Black and White Milk Bar that Mick Adams (Joachim Tavlarides) opened in 1932, sported a sleek bar topped with soda fountain pumps and gleaming milkshake makers. Trade was brisk on its first day, with 5000 customers breasting the bar, and soon, weekly patronage had grown to 27,000. Milk Bars have now largely disappeared from Australian shopping strips although a number still exist in country towns, attracting locals and the travelling public.

Upon my arrival in this fabulous country in the very late 1950s, I discovered that great institution of the traditional Australian milk bar. They were extremely popular during their heyday of the 1950s, 1960s and 1970s. This coincided with the influx of migrants from Italy and Greece which saw many make their fortunes from these suburban stores.

The floors were always linoleum (lino) and the counters were Laminex. Your purchases were added up on butchers' paper (no-one had calculators or self-calculating cash registers in those days). You had to hope the proprietor was good at maths!

A typical layout was a long thin shop, with a long counter on one side. At the street end was often a sweet counter selling lollies. This was where children spent countless hours deciding which lollies to include in their "mixed lolly" bag by pointing grubby little fingers on the glass exclaiming "I'll have one of those & two of those....".

A mainstay was the milkshake mixer, which necessitated having the milk and ice-cream nearby, as well as the flavouring syrups (chocolate, caramel, strawberry, banana, lime, and vanilla) and, of course, the malt powder (because a malted milkshake was only an extra five cents) & tasted so much better. You had to drink your milk shake in the shop in those days, as the containers were metal and you had to give them back!

Many had a juke-box situated in corner somewhere where you could put a 10 cent coin in and play some great rock'n'roll music. Most stores had tables affixed to the wall and bench seats formed in booths, some with small individual juke boxes on the table.

There was a grill, and a wide range of hamburgers or steak sandwiches where the owner or sales assistant would cook to order, featuring the usual Australian accompaniments such as beetroot and fried onions as well as the usual cheese, lettuce and tomato plus variations including egg and pineapple. Also available were hot pies, pasties & sausage rolls (with sauce).

Chocolate bars and packets of potato chips were on sale, as were a small but diverse range of other items: boxes of chocolate for last-minute gifts, cigarettes and tobacco, painkillers,

packs of tissues, and a few stores also sold basic groceries such as boxes of cereal and cans of baked beans.


On weekends after the newsagent closed you could sometimes get newspapers and a few magazines there too. The milk bar sold a huge range of items and was open from early morning to late in the evening.

On the other side of the shop from the counter there were usually free-standing cabinets holding soft drinks, flavoured milk in cartons, ice creams such as Paddle Pops (on a stick) or the Triple Treat (layers of ice cream and marshmallow wrapped in chocolate).

The proprietor was invariably male, and worked the shop together with any of his children who were old enough, and perhaps one or two assistants. His wife was hard at work sourcing ingredients and preparing them "out the back", juggling this with the role of mother.

But every milk bar was different and reflected the aspirations of its owner. Where I lived, we had a choice of two milk bars, each with a unique difference, one sold Peters Ice Cream & one sold Streets Ice Cream.

Many readers, now in their 70s, 80s or 90s, remember those halcyon days of milk shakes, Ice Cream Sodas (Spiders) and the music and artists of those days of their youth. I know that my memories of that era seem like yesterday,



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
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




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
