Australia Day in Hawkesbury

It's shaping up to be an exciting Australia Day in the Hawkesbury thanks to a wide range of events happening throughout the day for locals to attend and celebrate the start of a long weekend.

Australia Day on the Hawkesbury is a massive Council event running from 5-9pm, with a huge variety of activities to enjoy at Windsor's Governor Phillip Park. One such activity will be the thongthrowing event, which Hawkesbury Mayor Sarah McMahon called a "real highlight" of last year's event. Other activities include amusement rides, free face painting, emergency vehicle displays and a RAAF Flyover by the Roulettes.

Founder of RuffTRACK and former reality TV star Farmer Dave Graham also returns as guest MC for Australia on the Hawkesbury 2024 after his great work last year introducing live music acts with his usual charm. The night will end with a huge fireworks display for residents to enjoy with their friends and family against the beautiful backdrop of the Hawkesbury River.

Australia Day on the Hawkesbury is a dogfriendly event, so long as your furry friends are on a leash. Council encourages attendees to bring picnic rugs and chairs, but asks that all portable shelters are left at home.

Earlier in the day, attend Hawkesbury City Council's Australia Day awards where citizens who have done exemplary work in the last 12 months will be rewarded in a special ceremony. Located at Windsor Function Centre, the ceremony will be preceded by morning tea before the ceremony properly kicks off at 11:30am. Admission to the event is free - sign up through EventBrite to support the members of your community.

The Australiana Pioneer Village in Wilberforce is open from 10am-4pm with an exciting range of things to do and see on the day. Live music will be playing throughout the day as families have the chance to hop on train and wagon rides, take part in Aussie-themed games and look at antique machinery and cars. Cost of entry is \$10 per adult, \$5 per child and \$25 for a family of four.

Windsor RSL is hosting a free show celebrating the music of INXS from 8:30pm onwards, giving Hawkesbury residents a chance to celebrate Australia Day with a tribute to one of the country's most iconic bands. Entry is free to the show, and the RSL is at 36 Argyle Street, Windsor.

Bruce Fraser Honoured

The playing field at Holland Road Reserve, Glenhaven will be named the Bruce Fraser Field after Glenhaven Football Club's much loved and respected inaugural president who made the dream come true.

Hills Shire Council received 62 submissions supporting the proposal when it was placed on exhibition on council's website for 28 days leading up to December 31st.

Bruce Fraser (pictured) was 72 when he passed away in July last year. His wife Donna said naming the field after her husband was a huge honour. It will come 32 years after Bruce saw the field he pioneered first used as the club's home ground.

She said the idea to establish a Glenhaven soccer club was made over 30 years ago after Bruce attended a picnic to celebrate the centenary of Glenhaven Public School and the dads got talking.

In a tribute to Bruce Glenhaven FC wrote: "Holland Reserve was a very small unused, overgrown cricket park and holding ground for Council road shale, however it was Bruce Fraser who identified it as having enough area to have a full size football field."

As council at the time had no funds to develop the facility, Bruce with a committee and a few residents formed the Park Management Committee with the dream to develop Holland Reserve to become the home ground of Glenhaven Soccer Club. The proposal was put to council in July 1990 and work started the next month.

Bruce organised a series of fundraising events to contribute to half of the construction costs of the field with the Glenhaven Father's Club running barbecues and raffles and sourcing donations. He also arranged a working bee of local plumbers and electricians to assist with the development of the field for free, and for his workplace, Coates Hire, to donate several pieces of equipment for use during the project.

He was coordinator and foreman during the time it took to complete.

Bruce was elected inaugural President in 1991 and was president for the next 10 years and an active member for next 20 years.

It was Hills Deputy Mayor Councillor Mitchell Blue who asked Council to Investigate opportunities to honour Bruce's legacy and in November, following discussions with Bruce's family, the Glenhaven Football Club and the community, he put up a motion suggesting the Field be named after Bruce Fraser.

He said: "I am glad to see so many submissions supporting the proposal, which

further highlights the significance of Bruce's contribution to the community. I look forward to the unveiling of the sign in due course. "

Hills Shire Mayor Peter Gangemi said: "This is a fantastic response from the community and is a testament to Bruce and the incredible work he has done for the Glenhaven football community and beyond."

Donna said: "Bruce would have been so honoured to receive this recognition - I know his family and his many friends within the community are pleased for him!"

A vintage Fire Truck carried fallen firefighter Michael Kidd to his funeral which was held at St Monica's Catholic Church in Richmond on December 22nd.

It was a funeral with full honours as family, friends and fellow firefighters gathered to farewell the veteran firefighter who died when a beam fell on him at a house fire in Grose Vale.

Premier Chris Minns joined hundreds of of mourners at the church where the 51-yearold father-of-two was remembered as a pilar of the community, an "ever-doting dad" who had volunteered for 34 years with the Rural Fire Service and served 13 years with Fire and Rescue NSW.

His wife of 26 years Rebecca spoke about how proud he was of his children, Lachlan and Samantha in her eulogy.

Fire and Rescue NSW Senior Chaplin Lyndsay Smithspoke on Rebecca's behalf and said: "Michael died doing what he loved: helping others and putting others first.

"He made the world a better place, he made his family feel safe, loved and valued and they thank him for it.

"He will not be forgotten."

DRUG CHARGES

A 51-year-old man has been arrested in Castle Hill and taken to Castle Hill Police Station where he was charged with

- Supply prohibited drug more than commercial quantity
- Supply prohibited drug more than indictable/ less than commercial quantity
- Deal with proceeds of crime
- Organises/conducts/assists drug premises

He was one of four men arrested on Wednesday 10th January and charged after drugs and cash worth \$1.3million were seized as part of Strike Force Abut.

Strike Force Abut was established in September 2023 to investigate large-scale drug supply in Sydney's south-west and Illawarra region.

Following extensive investigations, detectives from Bankstown Region Enforcement Squad and Wollongong Police District executed seven search warrants simultaneously at homesin Castle Hill, Cecil Hills, Sadleir, Punchbowl and Bankstown at about 1.30pm on Wednesday 10th January.

Officers seized a total of 6.5 litres of 1,4-butanediol, 1kg of heroin, 981.7g

methylamphetamine, cannabis, MDMA, and cocaine, a mobile phone, and \$27,000 cash. These items will undergo forensic examination.

The drugs are believed to have an estimated potential street value of \$1,087,000.

During a search of the Castle Hill and Bankstown homes, police located two clandestine laboratories in a shed and a granny flat. A crime scene was declared, and both locations are undergoing forensic examinations by the SCC Chemical Operations Unit.

A 51-year-old man was arrested at the Castle Hill. A 29-year-old man was arrested on Joadja Road, Liverpool, and taken to Liverpool Police Station where he was charged with 29 offences,

A 28-year-old man was arrested on Hoxton Park Road, Prestons. A 49-year-old man was also arrested on Hoxton Park Road, Prestons, and charged with possess or use a prohibited weapon without permit.

Anyone with information that may assist Strike Force Abut investigators is urged to contact Crime Stoppers Information is treated in strict confidence.

CAN YOU HELP

Robbery and Serious Crime Squad detectives have renwed their appeal for public help as investigations continue into an attempted kidnapping of a man in Vineyard in 2022.

Police were told about 6.20pm on Thursday 7th July 2022, a group of unknown men attempted to force another man into a car outside a petrol station on Windsor Road in Vineyard.

The man was able to flee and was uninjured, while the unknown men left the scene in a white Mitsubishi Pajero which was later found burnt out in Macquarie Fields.

Local police commenced initial inquiries before the investigation was referred to officers from State Crime Command's Robbery and Serious Crime Squad under Strike Force Castlefield.

As the investigation continues, detectives have released CCTV and images of the men who may be able to assist with their inquiries.

One man is described as being of Pacific Islander/Maori appearance, solid build, bald with black mullet hair style. He was wearing a black jacket with a white t-shirt, black trackpants and black shoes.

Another man is also described as being of Pacific Islander/Maori appearance and medium build. He was wearing a black face covering, a black, grey and white coloured hooded jumper, grey trackpants and white shoes.

A third man was seen wearing a black balaclava, black jumper, black pants, and white shoes.

Information is treated in strict confidence. The public is reminded not to report information via NSW Police social media pages.

SCHOFIELDS CRASH

The Mounties Care CareFlight Helicopter was tasked by NSW Ambulance to the scene of a two-car accident in Schofields at about 2:15pm on Tuesday 26th December.

Three people were extricated from the cars after a multi-agency operation including NSW Ambulance, NSW Police and Fire & Rescue NSW. CareFlight's specialist doctor and NSW Ambulance paramedics worked together at the scene to assess and treat the patients.

CareFlight and NSW Ambulance paramedics treated a male in his 20s for head and torso injuries.

The man was then taken in a road ambulance with a CareFlight specialist doctor to Westmead Hospital in a stable condition. The other two patients were also transported by road ambulance to Westmead Hospital in stable conditions.

Help For Fire Family

Locals have banded together to help a Maraylya family after their heritage home and everything they owned was destroyed by fire on Thursday, 4th January.

Bec Mills, partner Joel Ignacz and their daughter Abby had just left for a short holiday trip when fire broke out in their home of ten years.

Fire crews arrived just after 11.30am to see flames spreading through the 85-year-old weatherboard building, the former St John Evangelist Church in St John's Road, Maraylya.

Firefighters from Oakville RFS, Hillside and Box Hill Nelson worked alongside Riverstone Fire and Rescue crew to contain the fire.

The family's 2-year-old Ragdoll cat Pearl escaped with singed whiskers and was taken to a local vet but the family's other much-loved cat, Boris a 4-year-old Burmese (pictured), is yet to be found.

They are hoping he will be found soon.

Some of the hardest losses have been photographs of Bec's late father Wayne Mills who taught at Glenorie Public School and Oakville Public School and died 15 years ago. Also lost in the fire was a ring he made that was handed down to Bec.

Her twin sister Megan Mills set up a GoFund Me page which raised over \$28,000 in 24 hours. The total is now \$40,450 as locals support the long-time local residents.

Rebecca was a Student Learning Support Officer at both Glenorie Public School and Middle Dural Public School for many years before taking on the office administration role at Glenorie Public School. Joel works at Toongabbie Sports Club and Abby will be starting Year 5 at school this year.

MEGAN'S APPEAL READS IN PART:

"On the 4th of January, Bec, Joel and Abby's home in Maraylya was made unliveable in a house fire, just hours after they took off to try and enjoy a summer holiday at the south coast. Their two gorgeous cats, Boris and Pearl escaped the blaze, with Pearl being taken to an animal hospital for treatment. Boris is sadly missing.

"Bec and her family are luckily not hurt, which we are so grateful for, but everything of theirs, built up as precious possessions over 10 years living on St John's Rd is unsalvageable, leaving the family of 3 with little to their name, and a house unlivable, just weeks before school goes back.

"Anything not burnt is melted beyond repair, from furniture to toothbrushes, clothing to bedding, appliances to food and medication, they are starting from scratch.

"Support purchasing school supplies, school uniforms etc would help get Abby ready to return to school without additional financial burden on the family, as they look to use all their disposable income in rebuilding and regaining what was lost in the fire. Megan went on to write that donations could also be used to care for the family cats Pearl and Boris (if Boris is found) and for counselling support for the family after the traumatic event.

"I know I am biased, Bec, Joel and Abby are some of the most selfless people I know, and I'm absolutely positive of the impact they've made on their friends, family, and our Glenorie community. Words of shock, relief and joy were heard around New South Wales on December 14th when Year 12 students received their HSC results, capping off the final year of schooling for thousands of young people. In the Hills and Hawkesbury, a number of students performed exceptionally well under the stress of the exam period, with high ATAR and subject scores to prove it.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Education Prue Car congratulated over 130 students from 89 schools who received First in Course awards at a special ceremony on December 13th, before all the results were officially released the next day. She said: "I am so impressed by the many talented and brilliant kids in our schools, and I'm particularly proud as Minister for Education that half of the students with First in Course awards are from NSW public schools."

Isaac Bust from Model Farms High School in Baulkham Hills was one such student, who was initially convinced he had received a prank call when told he placed first in Industrial Technology. He attributed his success in the subject to hard work both in and out of school hours, and his timber teacher Mr Venhuizen. Now looking to begin a carpentry apprenticeship, Isaac has this advice for HSC students: "Do what you love. If you love the subject, it's much easier."


Across our area, there have been a huge amount of other impressive results from a number of students. Windsor High School saw a 200% increase of students placing in the top 20% of the grade, after earlier in the year revealing that they had increased their overall attendance by 15%. Three students - Layla George, Callum Bird and Keely Martin - made the Distinguished Achievers list.

Richmond High School's Class of 2023 secured the best results ever for the school

despite a challenging past two years, with four students - Zoe Chaseling, Penny Graham, Hayley Innins and Karla Schindler - all attaining at least one Band 6 score. Principal Angela Heath said: "I am so proud of our students. The highest number of Distinguished Achievers we've seen and a load of excellent results all round are a testament to the dedication of our students and the teachers supporting them. What a win for Richmond High!"

Colo High School's class of 2023 delivered impressive results, with 14 Distinguished Achiever results and over 74% of students with results in the top three bands. The two highest ATARs came from Georgia Estrich (91.85) and Jet Loiselle (90.65), both of whom secured Band 6 scores. Many CHS students have also been nominated for their major works, with four students for SHAPE, two for ArtEXPRESS and one student, Kyah Rowley, for her work in Dance at Callback.

Principal Tara Cullen praised the 2023 cohort for their resilience in the face of many challenges over the past few years: "We're incredibly proud of the Class of 2023. They're an incredible and inspiring group of young people who achieved outstanding results this year. Colo High School, along with lots of schools in the Hawkesbury, have had lots of difficulties over the last few years due to school closures and floods in 2022. But this group of young people

Major Box Hill intersection set for transformation

One of the key intersections in Box Hill will soon feature traffic signals after The Hills Shire Council awarded a construction contract for the intersection upgrade of Old Pitt Town Road, Terry Road and Fontana Road.


Mayor of The Hills Shire Dr Peter Gangemi said the upgrade was important for the local community.

"I've been advocating for this project alongside local residents since 2017," Mayor Gangemi said.

^wWe made repeated requests over many years to Transport for NSW to approve the warrants for traffic lights at this intersection with our request only being granted in 2022.

"The awarding of the tender for construction is an important step towards the completion of the project. The installation of signals will improve traffic flow and safety at this key intersection for Box Hill and Gables residents."

President of the Box Hill Nelson Progress Association Vicki Giannoulis said the upgrade is highly anticipated.



"This is a very busy intersection in Box Hill and I know many locals who will be relieved once the upgrade has been completed," Ms Giannoulis said.

"I would like to thank The Hills Shire Council for their efforts in getting this project approved."

The works will result in:

- New traffic lights
- road widening along Old Pitt Town Road60m right turn lane on Fontana Drive to
- partially replace the existing median

- shoulder pavement and safety barriers on both sides of Old Pitt Town Road and
- new footpaths, street lighting, landscaping and relocation of services.

The influx over the holiday season has forced the closure of Hawkesbury Companion Animal Shelter which started the 2024 New Year at capacity.

In a 2 week period over Christmas and New Year more than 100 animals arrived needing shelter.

Hawkesbury currently has 64 dogs (46 are available for adoption) and 52 cats (4 available for adoption as the rest are strays waiting to be reclaimed or are on hold).

Andrew Kearns, Acting Director City Planning said 45 dogs and 56 cats arrived at the Shelter just before Christmas (22nd December) and 5th January.

Luckily 10 dogs have since been reunited with their owners, 22 dogs were adopted and 11 were sent to rescue groups.

During the same period 52 cats were adopted.

FROM MOTOR CYCLES TO OPERA A HARD ACT TO FOLLOW

At the last meeting of the Hills Friendship Club for 2023, long-time member, ninety-year-old, Lester Morris launched his book "If People Had Tails", the latest in a long list of published works. This latest book is one of his children's books, well written and beautifully illustrated by Josie Granger.

Lester, a resident of Winston Hills, has had a varied and interesting life, starting work in the mid-1940s as a messenger boy delivering telegrams at Kings Cross and selling newspapers. He saved the money earnt to purchase his first motor bike, a 1929 Norton, in 1947 as a 14-year-old schoolboy and from that developed his love of motorcycles. Motorbikes had a grip on him and never let him go. He went on to study motorcycles and became somewhat an expert on their design and suspension which led to his employment in the trade working for up to six motorcycle companies and becoming a columnist for the Motor Cycle Magazine in 1967 for whom he wrote for 20 odd years. Lester Morris is Australia's longest-serving, and probably most published, specialist motorcycle writer, with most of his peers considering him to be 'iconic', or even 'legendary'.

His first articles, on simple maintenance and safety, were published in REVS Motorcycle News in 1968. His Two Wheels work encompassed four decades and included road tests of contemporary and classic bikes and sparkling autobiographical accounts of long rides as a young man in the 1950s with his mates, including the equally legendary, and pretty scary, Fred, on his Vincent.

From 1948 Lester spent over 20 years in the trade, including working at Sydney's famed

Omodeis store. His first book, Motorcycling in Australia, was published by McMillan in 1976.

Lester is also a noted race commentator, often featuring as an expert motorcycle compere on Torque, a 1970s motoring programme on ABC television. His race commentary from Mount Panorama at Bathurst was often broadcast on Sydney radio station 2GB.

One of his books on his past experiences, "Vintage Morris: Tall Tales but True from a Lifetime in Motorcycling" is just that, a memoir of his many-and-various (and often hilarious) experiences in the motorcycle industry.

Motor cycling is not his only interest. Lester also has worked on stage and television having appeared in many Australian TV shows such as "Home and Away" and "Sons and Daughters". He appeared in a commercial for Energy Australia which proved so popular that the company followed it up with Lester appearing in eight different commercials playing the same character. Lester's screen credits also include appearances in Mission: Impossible II, Danny Deckchair and Police Rescue.

As a member of Actors' Equity since 1968, he appeared initially in TV drama, then on-tour with J.C. Williamson's with the musical 'Mame', "Two Gentlemen of Verona" and later as Mr. Buckle in "The Shoemaker and the Elves" for the Alexander Theatre Company in 1974, before founding, directing and appearing in Music Hall in 1975, which returned to Sydney in 1977.

He has also Played the King in "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs, Live! On Stage!" from 1985 and directed a production of 'Snow White' which played Sydney and toured

Australia and New Zealand several times since 1999.

A trained opera singer, actor and stage director, he also formed the 'Piccadilly Music Hall' which toured the Eastern Seaboard of Australia for more than 30 years, playing three Theatre Restaurant venues, and countless Clubs, Town Halls and Theatres, including a sell-out in Sydney Town Hall, then playing, five months later, to audience of four (4) in Outback Queensland. "No publicity, that's why!" according to Lester.

He later directed several plays for the Gaels Company and the Operas 'Iolanthe', 'Love by Lanternlight', 'Gianni Schicchi' for Rockdale and Sydney Independent Opera companies, among others.

Lester was honoured at the Hills Friendship Club meeting at Castle Hill in December with a presentation to him and his wife, Lyn, of a certificate celebrating their 10-year membership of the Friendship Club.

Thompson writes a piece of Nadal's history

Hills ace Jordan Thompson could go down in the record books as the last player to defeat Rafael Nadal in Australia if the legendary Spaniard stays away after his latest injury.

Thompson, 29, stunned Nadal 5-7, 7-6 (8/6), 6-3 in an epic quarterfinal of the Brisbane International last week, giving the Hills star his biggest scalp in his impressive tennis career.

Thompson, who has a string of big victories over the years, saved three match points in toppling Nadal, and leapt eight places in the world rankings to 47.

The former Oakhill College student (class of 2012) will be one of the local hopes at

the Australian Open which starts on Sunday, January 14.

Nadal, who skipped most of 2023 after injuring his hip at the Australian Open, said he has a micro tear on a muscle and was going back to Spain for treatment.

"I think he (Thompson) played a good match." Nadal said. "For me, it was not the best match, I had a lot of opportunities to win it. I need to accept that. After a year (of not playing), that's normal."

Thompson had never taken a set off the 22-Grand Slam winning Spaniard in their previous two encounters, saying it was amazing to defeat one of his idols.

"That was something special," Thompson said. "I forgot I saved match points but to beat Rafa in Brissy at home and it's my first semifinal on a hardcourt, I couldn't be happier.

"I completely forgot I saved match points. He was one of my idols growing up. I loved Lleyton (Hewitt), Andy Murray (he toppled Murray in 2017), loved Rafa. It was special to share the court again and to take him down was a whole other feeling."

Thompson thanked the crowd for their support: "You guys got me through it That was something special."

Thompson hit 47 winners against Nadal's 38 with one less unforced error than his opponent's 29.

Unfortunately, Thompson could not repeat his heroics in the semifinal where he was defeated by second seed and eventual champion Grigor Dimitrov of Bulgaria 6-3, 7-5.

The right-handed Thompson is coached by Peter Luczak, and is one of the most talented and hard working Australians on the ATP Tour. Having started playing tennis aged four, his first coach was his Dad Stephen. He would have been a rugby league player if he hadn't succeeded in tennis, which has so far earned him more than \$5 million.

Thompson and fellow Australian Max Purcell also made it to the doubles semifinals of the Brisbane International, making it a near perfect warmup for the Australian Open.

Spreading AFL cheer in Tiwi Islands


