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

New Urgent Care Service

An Urgent Care Service has just opened in North Richmond to stem the flow of people visiting busy hospital emergency departments for non-emergency care. Healthcare provided at North Richmond Urgent Care Service is bulk-billed.

To access the service, patients should call Healthdirect on 1800 022 222. A registered nurse will assess the patient's condition and then discuss with the patient the best place for their care needs. This may include an appointment at the North Richmond Urgent Care Service, a telehealth appointment with the virtualKIDS or virtualGP services or escalating their care to other services like NSW Ambulance if required.

The North Richmond Urgent Care Service is being delivered in partnership with Wentworth Healthcare, the provider of the Nepean Blue Mountains Primary Health Network (PHN).

Wentworth Healthcare CEO, Lizz Reay stated "We have been working towards this outcome for the Hawkesbury for some time and are pleased to have played our part in providing this service. We knew that there was a real need for an alternative care pathway for the local community when they can't access a GP quickly, particularly on weekends and after hours.

"Urgent care services fill an important gap, when care is needed quickly and urgently, but it's still important to have a regular family GP, who should always be the first point of contact for your health care, if they are available.

"Having a GP that you can build a relationship with over time means that they get to know you, your medical history and your lifestyle, making it easier for you to talk to them about your health concerns and allowing them to better consider your overall health and preventative care needs."

Health Minister Ryan Park said: "The North Richmond Urgent Care Service is open 365 days a year, from 8am to 8pm, and is staffed by general practitioners and nurses, with important diagnostic services close by including radiology and pathology.

"The service is well-supported to treat a range of illnesses and injuries that are deemed urgent, but not life-threatening, such as minor wounds that need stitches, suspected broken bones and skin infections that need antibiotics.

"I'm committed to increasing availability of healthcare to communities through urgent care services just like this one, which are aimed at bridging the gap between primary care and emergency care, ensuring that patients have fast access to the urgent care they need.

Labor spokesperson for Hawkesbury Peter Primrose MLC said: "This is an incredibly important service for people living in the Hawkesbury which will improve access to care, whilst also easing pressure on our local emergency departments.

"The co-design of this service was led by Wentworth Healthcare, together with the local community with attention paid to the location of the Urgent Care Service based on experience during flood events.

"This included the experience of patients being unable to access non-emergency care in the community due to flooding. The North Richmond Urgent Care Service is in a great location to increase access for local residents."

HAVE YOUR SAY ON THE HAWKESBURY OASIS CENTRE'S UPGRADES

The Hawkesbury Oasis Aquatic and Fitness Centre in South Windsor is getting a revamp of its facilities, and Hawkesbury City Council wants your advice on its changes.

The Aquatic and Fitness Centre provides sport, fitness and leisure services for the Hawkesbury and its surrounding districts. As a YMCA centre, it also offers a range of funded youth and community programs for disadvantaged locals including swimming lessons.

However, an exciting new series of upgrades will transform the 1990's built facility over the next few years. The NSW Government's Western Sydney Infrastructure Grants Program is delivering \$2 billion worth of transformational infrastructure across Western Sydney, including the Hawkesbury. Approximately \$5.9 million of the program will be applied to the Aquatic and Fitness Centre, expected to finish late 2026.

The proposed upgrades include a children's splash park, a climbing-wall facility and an outdoor gym. For seniors, a shallow-depth program has been proposed including an accessibility ramp and hydrotherapy programs.

Other suggestions by Hawkesbury Council include upgrades to the centre's existing infrastructure such as additional school-age amenities for school events, extended childminding areas, additional car parking and a new deck covering the change-rooms and out-door cafe.

Hawkesbury City Council wants to hear from its local residents about the project via *www.yourhawkesbury-yoursay.com.au*. This community survey will close on Thursday the 8th of August, 2024. Feedback from local residents will then be applied during the community consultation period and may influence the final concept design stage.

The timeline of expected upgrades are yet to be determined, but Council's intentions are to keep the Aquatic and Fitness Centre operational during the works.

Hawkesbury Mayor, Sarah McMahon has expressed her excitement for the new series of changes:

"Hawkesbury Oasis Aquatic and Fitness Centre is a much-loved and popular place to visit for our community. These improvements deliver on the already approved master plan for the centre and will create a more valuable and inclusive experience for current and future patrons. The grant funding will enable the centre to better serve the community for many years to come."

DO YOU KNOW THIS MAN?

Transport police are appealing to the public for information about several incidents in which commuters have been assaulted, touched inappropriately or intimidated on public transport across Sydney under Operation Waratah.

Operation Waratah has just issued an image of a man they would like to question about an incident on a bus in Winston Hills earlier this year.

At about 5.45pm on Tuesday, 9th January, officers attached to Police Transport Command were called to Winston Hill, following reports an unknown man had assaulted a bus driver. Police arrived and were told a man had allegedly punched the driver in the face while the vehicle was moving before fleeing the bus. As inquiries continue police have released an image of a man who may be able to assist police in their investigation.

Anyone with information about this incident is urged to contact Crime Stoppers. Information is treated in strict confidence.

FATAL CRASH

A 20-year-old motorcyclist died following a crash in South Maroota on Sunday 14th July.

Emergency services were called to a property on Pacific Park Road, South Maroota at about 10.30am following reports a motorcycle had crashed into a tree.

NSW Ambulance paramedics treated the man, aged 20, however, he died at the scene.

Officers attached to Hawkesbury Police Area Command have begun an investigation. A report will be prepared for the information of the Coroner.

SCAM WARNING

There have been a number of reports where scammers are seemingly taking advantage of the recent mass IT outage.

Police are warning people to be very careful saying companies will not contact you directly to fix issues as a result of the outage.

Never give personal details over the phone and NEVER allow another party to take control of your computer.

MAN CHARGED WITH 50 OFFENCES

A man will face court charged with 50 alleged property offences across Sydney following an investigation by officers attached to The Hills Police Area Command after he was arrested last week at Vineyard.

Earlier this year, officers from The Hills Proactive Crime Team commenced an investigation into a series of alleged break and enter offences on commercial premises across The Hills area.

Following extensive inquiries, officers were able to link offences in The Hills area to similar break and enter offences within The Hills, Riverstone, Ryde, Hawkesbury, Mt Druitt, Burwood, Leichhardt, Nepean, Parramatta, Northern Beaches, and Cumberland Police Area Commands.

On Tuesday (16th July 2024), police arrested a 35-year-old man and a 44-yearold woman at a hotel on Boundary Road at Vineyard.

During the search of the room, police allegedly located and seized several items linked to offences allegedly committed at Bankstown, Marsden Park and Kellyville.

A 35-year-old man was arrested at the scene and taken to Castle Hill Police Station where he was charged with 50 counts of break, enter and steal and breach of bail.

The 44-year-old woman was taken to Riverstone Police Station where she was charged with breach of bail.

CHERRYBROOK LINK

Two men have been charged after more than 300 weapons have been seized as part of an ongoing investigation under Strike Force Dudi.

In March 2024, officers from South Sydney Police Area Command established Strike Force Dudi to investigate an affray involving a number of men on Elizabeth Street, Waterloo.

A number of people have since been charged and remain before the courts.

During investigations, Strike Force Dudi investigators identified that prohibited weapons were allegedly being sold from businesses in Haymarket.

As a result of ongoing investigations officers yesterday (Thursday 18 July 2024) executed search warrants at businesses on Hay Street, Haymarket, and homes in Amos Street, Westmead and Shepherd Street, Cherrybrook.

During the search police seized in excess 300 prohibited weapons, including flick knives, sheath knives, butterfly knives, Zombie knives, push daggers and concealed blades.

DRUNK DRIVER

A driver who said he was on his way to pick up some fast food in Richmond was nearly four times over the drink driving limit.

Police attached to both the Hawkesbury HWP and Detectives observed a silver Mitsubishi Triton utility swerving from side to side on Old Kurrajong Road Richmond at about 8.40pm on Saturday 20th July.

The vehicle was stopped, and the driver was identified as a local 31-year-old male. Police allege he was slurring his words and appeared to be under the influence of alcohol. A roadside breath test returned a positive result to alcohol well above the legal limit. The breath analysis of the driver's breath at Windsor Police Station returned a reading of 0.197grams of alcohol in 210 litres of breath, almost four times over the legal limit of .05.. The driver had his licence immediately suspended and received a Court Attendance Notice for driving a motor vehicle with a High Range PCA.

RAPTOR SQUAD ARRESTS

NSW Police have charged 10 people and executed 74 Firearms Prohibition Orders (FPO) searches as part of a week-long operation targeting organised criminal networks across the state. The State Crime Command's Raptor Squad and Raptor North, with the assistance of State Intelligence Command, and the Dog Squad, conducted a 'Week of Action' between Tuesday 16th and Friday 19th July.

At About 6am on Tuesday (16th July 2024), Raptor Squad officers attended a home at Quakers Hill, and conducted an FPO compliance check. During a search of the home, officers seized steroids. A search warrant was subsequently executed after officers located 10 boxes containing 2000 vapes in the garage. The occupant, a 35-yearold OMCG associate was issued a court attendance notice for three counts of possess prohibited drug. The vapes, mobile phones and CCTV were seized with investigations ongoing.

The following day, at about 10.30am, Raptor Squad officers attended a home on Camorta Close, Kings Park, and conducted an FPO compliance check. During a search of the home, officers seized a spring-loaded flick knife, cannabis and vials of testosterone. The occupant, a 30-yearold man was arrested and taken to Riverstone Police Station where he was charged with use prohibited weapon. Contrary to prohibition order, possess prohibited drug and breach of bail.

Inquiries by Raptor Squad are continuing, and more arrests are expected.

AVIAN INFLUENZA IN THE HAWKESBURY Protecting your pet birds

Avian Influenza, is a serious, highly contagious disease of birds, has been detected in the Hawkesbury Local Government Area.

Can pet birds get avian influenza?

The majority of birds are susceptible to avian influenza and pet birds are no exception. All bird owners are encouraged to be aware of the signs of avian influenza and to report all unusual signs of disease or death to their veterinarian, or the Emergency Animal Disease Hotline on 1800 675 888.

How do I protect my aviary birds or backyard birds?

Basic biosecurity steps will minimise the risk of avian influenza as well as other diseases. Health monitoring and sound husbandry practices assist in early detection of any flock problems. Purchase birds from reputable sources. Where possible, minimise contact between domestic and wild birds or other animals. Minimise non-essential visitor contact with domestic and aviary birds. Keep new flock introductions separately for 2-3 weeks after arrival. Water supply in most urban backyards or aviary flocks is chlorinated town water. However, in rural areas, water used from a dam, river or creek should be chlorinated to make it safe to drink.

Avian influenza information for pet bird owners

High pathogenicity avian influenza (HPAI) is a serious, highly contagious disease of birds. It is notifiable in Australia, meaning any suspected cases need to be reported immediately to the national Emergency Animal Disease Hotline on 1800 675 888. HPAI can affect wild and pet birds including, but not limited to, budgerigars, parrots and other pet birds.

SUPT KAREN HODGES BIDS FAREWELL TO HAWKESBURY

"She has been an amazing leader – constant and reassuring." "A true leader not scared to make tough calls."

While her colleagues were saddened to see her leave her Fire Control Officer role in the Hawkesbury many believe Superintendent Karen Hodges AFSM's new role in

Queensland's South Eastern Region as its new Deputy Chief Officer is well deserved. Her meteoric rise started when she first

joined the Council as a typist in 1988. According to Councillor Danielle Wheeler, the Superintendent spent only "a couple of weeks" at Hawkesbury Fire Control and never left.

Only two years later, she was appointed as the Deputy Fire Control Officer, the youngest person and the first woman to be appointed in such a position, according to her colleague Group Captain and Operations Officer Craig Burley.

Karen was appointed Fire Control Officer (FCO) in 1999, also the youngest and first woman. She gained command of the entire Hawkesbury District and, over the years, across the state.

As an FCO, she carried a plethora of responsibilities, from the day-to-day operations to being in charge of 23 brigades, 1,800

volunteers, an office of short-staffed employees, and a tight budget.

Serving also as Incident Controller, Superintendent Hodges led 36 Section 44 declarations or Emergency Bush Fire Declarations in her stay.

Most notable is her key leadership role during the historic 2019-20 Gospers Mountain Fire, the months-long inferno that reached Sydney's doorstep, only held under control after months of arduous fighting and the eventual rain and flood in January.

In a Notion of Motion submitted to council by Councillor Wheeler, RFS members commend her as a competent leader, a quick thinker, and blunt but with a big heart:

"Karen is really well loved. She can probably tell you the names of most of the firefighters in the District. You see it at awards nights: she charms the crowd and has a word of a joke for everyone," a member said.

"She's known for her personal touch. Not many FCOs would send flowers for births or to Photo by Mridula Amin via ABC News.

grieving relatives. It's that personal touch we'll miss most," another member said.

"The competent, dedicated volunteer fire fighting force that Hawkesbury is today is a testament for Karen's commitment, both during and after work hours, for the conduct of firefighting and the welfare of the District's crews," one Group Officer mentioned.

The Hawkesbury City Council and Councillors formally recognised Superintendent Hodges' massive contribution to Hawkesbury and beyond during the 9th July Ordinary Council Meeting.

This month, she will transition to her new role in the newly formed Rural Fire Service Queensland as its first Deputy Chief Officer, South Eastern Region.

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UNIFORMS FOR KIDS

A clever program that refashions discarded police uniforms into new colorful clothing for children in need is calling out for people to join its Uniforms 4 Kids sewing group in Baulkham Hills.

The pilot program at Learning in the Hills is working with The Hills Police Area Command to repurpose old uniforms. The program so far has resulted in 25 new garments and 35 specially designed trauma bears since February.

Leonie Paterson, on the project's volunteer coordinators said it is an enjoyable project that has enabled some volunteers to unleash their creativity.

"Our small team is very talented. Our brief is to make the clothes nice and bright and use 50% police uniform in the design. We have made dresses, skirts, shirts, skorts, shorts and bags.

" Children's clothes are nice to make and the upcycling aspect is great, " said Leonie.

"We meet for two hours on a Tuesday afternoon but it goes longer. It is social as well as helping the community."

The charity was founded in Queensland eight years ago by Yvonne Pattinson, a keen sewer, who wanted to do something with all the material she had collected over the years. She made some clothes which were donated to an orphanage in Asia.

It was her daughter, Debbie Platz, a serving police officer, who suggested that old police

uniforms could be used, rather than shredded, to make clothes for children in Australia and so Uniforms 4 Kids was born in 2018.


So far the charity has prevented thousands of items of uniforms going to landfill and donated over 53,000 items to children who have a need including library bags, pencil cases and hats as well as clothing.

When the Hills pilot program was launched in February this year Anne Macdonald, Director and Operations Coordinator at Uniforms 4 Kids said: "Uniforms 4 Kids are so excited to welcome Hills Community Aid to our volunteer family."

"The children who receive these items love them, for most children they have never had a "new item" of clothing," she said.

"When they know that it was made from the uniforms of police who are giving them to them, they feel very special. The hugs the police get from children and the smiles on the children's faces says everything."

"We do not sell any of the clothes." She said the refashioned clothes are donated to domestic violence shelters, migrant



shelters, community centres, charities helping communities in time of disasters and children's hospitals. "They go to children who need them."

MULPHA'S MAJOR MILESTONE

Mulpha's ambitious zero-carbon residential development at Norwest Quarter has just marked a major milestone in the construction of its first apartment tower, the 14-storied Lacebark building.

Do Your Ears Feel Blocked?

Imagine you're walking through a serene forest, the sounds of nature surrounding you, but suddenly everything feels muffled, as if you've been plunged underwater. This unsettling sensation is what it feels like when your ears are blocked. Let's delve into why this can happen and what you can do about it.

This sensation can occur when the eustachian tube is not functioning well or it becomes obstructed. The eustachian tube is a small channel that connects the middle ear to the nose and sinuses. This tube equalises the pressure in your middle ear, behind the ear drum. 
Common Causes of Blocked Ears

Our ears can feel blocked for several reasons such as excessive ear wax, fluid build-up behind the eardrum, something stuck in the ear such as a cotton-bud or earphone tip or sudden hearing loss. Unfortunately, many people adopt a "wait and see" approach, hoping their ears will unblock on their own. It is very important to investigate the cause of the blockage as soon as you can. Hearing care providers, such as audiometrists and audiologists, can perform several tests to identify what is causing the symptoms. It is also a good idea to see your doctor if you are experiencing fever or cold and flu with your ear-related symptoms.

Blocked Eustachian Tubes and Their Causes Blocked eustachian tubes can be caused by allergies, sinus infections, or swelling from a recent cold. These conditions can lead to fluid collecting in the middle ear, causing pain, muffled hearing, ringing or popping noises, and dizziness. This sensation is particularly common in children, whose eustachian tubes are shorter, narrower, and more horizontal, it is easier for fluid to build up and become blocked.

The Impact of Flying

It's important that blocked ears are managed before getting on an aeroplane. When you are on a plane the pressure is, especially in descent, changing rapidly in the cabin. This puts stress on the eardrum, particularly if the middle ear does not equalise appropriately. Flying with blocked ears can be very uncomfortable or at times, painful. In extreme cases, when there is continual or increased pressure on the eardrum, it can burst, leading to further complications.

Local Filmmaker on Track

It has taken a few years to get to the screen but *The Boy Who Was Afraid of Everything* has just won several awards and talks are underway both in America and Australia about extending the pilot to make a television series.

For writer, actor and filmmaker Haris Mirza from Castle Hill it is a busy and exciting time.

Haris, who graduated from Cherrybrook Tech in 2017, says he was in love with drama and writing as a primary age student at Murray Farms Public School.

Comedy was his favourite form. "I grew up watching sitcoms like Modern Family and Malcolm in the Middle. Every school holiday was spent in acting classes and workshops."

As a 15-year-old he and his family spent two weeks in Los Angeles where he was captivated by the possibilities. His older brother, actor Waleed Mirza, now lives there.

Haris has had a guest spot on *Home and Away* and other shows but writing has been his focus.

"I started writing this character (Ali) and project in 2019 and went for funding a few times before deciding to co-write and create with my friend Nick Bartlett.

" It was originally created to be a web series which we self-funded (at a cost of \$15,000)

"We played (it) locally at Sydney Webfest and then LA Webfest before getting into SeriesFest as a half hour pilot. "

The Boy Who Was Afraid of Everything has since won three awards after premiering at

SeriesFest in Denver, Colorado including the Audience Award for Best Comedy and Haris for Best Performance.

"Our jury included Mike Falbo, producing partner of Ed Helms (The Office and Hangover) and Amanda Krentzman, a former Netflix exec," says Haris.

"Through this recognition, our production garnered international attention, and we're currently in talks to develop the series with multiple production companies worldwide. I also got signed by management in LA who are keen to get me auditioning for all kinds of American projects."

At the moment the team is working with an American producer and meeting a range of Australian companies with the aim of developing a TV show.

Haris says his biggest supporters have been his family, brother and best friends. "I'm also really lucky to have an amazing team."

Haris, a Pakistani-Australian, says he would love to encourage other creatives from diverse backgrounds in ways they can create their own space in the industry.

"When I started acting as a kid it was made very obvious that I wasn't what the media

"There's such a thrill to making people laugh or getting lost in another person while you're acting. I also see how the power of acting and comedy can connect you with people, I want to keep doing that," he said.

Shaun Morgan's Fight against Prostate Cancer

52 year old Shaun Morgan, shares his experience with prostate cancer and his mission to raise awareness through participating in Dry July.

Prostate cancer affects 1 in 6 men before the age of 85, according to Cancer Australia, impacting around 25,000 men each year. Shaun's PSA (prostate-specific antigen) testing in January earlier this year revealed a concerningly high level, which his GP flagged to a specialist. Following an MRI and biopsy of a lump, the Glenorie local was confirmed with the news that no-one is prepared for: a confirmed cancer diagnosis.

Prostate cancer can be hereditary - accounting for only 5-10% of cases - as his uncle has successfully overcome prostate cancer and is currently in remission. However, his grandfather lost his life to the disease in 2001. Shaun successfully underwent surgery to remove his prostate in April 2024. However, his battle is not yet over, with regular testing necessary every three months for the next five years.

The father of four, as well as two fur babies, is participating in Dry July known as Australia's sober charity challenge. Many may know of the name but not its impact, as the charity raises funds for cancer research and various cancer foundations, including the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia. Over 29,000 participants were involved in the fundraiser this year, raising more than \$90 million since the charity's inception in 2008.

Shaun wants to inspire others to support cancer research, noting that most people know someone impacted by cancer:

"Dry July was one of the first initiatives I saw that raised money for cancer foundations. Although I had heard about it before, as a cancer survivor, I decided to participate because cancer has completely changed my life."

"So many of my friends, family and guys at work have donated. I set a modest goal of \$1,000 for Dry July, but I surpassed it within a week. I'm now proud to have raised over \$2,000. I encourage others interested in fundraising to give it a try!"

Shaun wants his experience to advocate for the importance of early detection and regular PSA tests every six months for men over 40, especially since he didn't have any physical symptoms of prostate cancer:

"I never felt ill or noticed any signs of cancer. If I didn't go get tested, I probably would still be carrying that cancer with me. I'm so glad that I had it sorted out before it spread."

Shaun demonstrates incredible resilience and bravery in the face of the unknown. Whilst many of us may feel overwhelmed in a situation such as his, Shaun is using his platform to encourage early detection and for men over 40 to get regular check-ups, even if they don't notice anything wrong:

"I wasn't even aware in my own family about prostate cancer until recently. I've been very open about my experience but I was pretty amazed by how many men have also suffered from prostate cancer. Until I was diagnosed with it, I never really heard much about it. It's not something you ever hear about and I just think no-one's talking about it - despite the fact it affects 1 in 6 to 1 in 8 men now".

Baulkham Hills has been my home for 30 years. For many, many years I worked for a bank in Baulkham Hills. Those were the days when banking was about customer service. I loved caring for customers and excelled in that role.

Five years ago, I felt something was wrong. I had small symptoms but one day, when babysitting my baby granddaughter, I sang Twinkle Twinkle Little Star and tried to move my fingers to twinkle. One hand wouldn't twinkle at all. Something was wrong! It was as though all the wind had gone from my sails when I was diagnosed with Parkinsons Disease. I was one of the 50 people each day who are diagnosed with this disease.

I found Parkinsong, which is part of the Hornsby Kur-ring-gai Parkinson's Association Inc, when I was thinking of joining a support group. I dreaded the thought of a group who met to discuss the members' illnesses and problems. I joined PARKINSONG about 2 years ago. Parkinsong is a choir run by volunteers. The choir was launched in 2018, Chris Davis being the main force in establishing the choir and is known by both Parkinsong and Chris Davis Choir. The group meets weekly on Thursdays from 10am to 11.30am at the Turramurra Seniors Centre, 1 Gilroy Road, Turramurra. Meetings are held in a nice old cottage. The room is cosy and air conditioned.

Parkinsong is an amateur choir. There are no auditions, and a good voice is not a prerequisite. I don't have a good voice, by anyone's standards, but I do enjoy singing.

The first day I attended, the volunteers who met me at the door were friendly and welcoming AND I was greeted with a warm, comforting cup of tea.

I wasn't prepared for the fabulous sound the choir made. The combination of male and female voices was fantastic. We sang rounds with the help of words projected on a screen as well as words on printed sheets. All the songs chosen to sing are uplifting. From time to time,



we perform at local retirement villages and the Wahroonga Fair, highlights being singing at Government House and the Sydney Recital Centre as part of Singout Sydney.

This is a unique group which is made up of people with Parkinsons, their families, volunteers, carers and friends. Singing, particularly in groups, improves the voice and swallowing mechanisms which are common complaints with Parkinson sufferers. Singing relaxes muscles and releases tension in the back and neck which is shown to also reduce Parkinson's symptoms like tremor, posture and walking problems.

Coming away from singing, I feel uplifted and I'm often humming along to a tune that has stuck in my head. I also enjoy the friendship and support of choir members.





A Stage of Transport of a DIFFERENT ERA

Exactly 100 years ago, in August 1924, the last regular stagecoach run by the famous Cobb & Co., was held in Queensland. That 100-year anniversary has got me thinking of the various coach runs in the Hills and Hawkesbury districts and also the history of stagecoaches in Australia.

Whilst Cobb & Co was not founded until 1853 by Freeman Cobb, and eventually became the largest coach company in the Southern Hemisphere, there were a number of coach companies operating before that time.

Whilst not a stagecoach, a large covered wagon was used to carry produce to Sydney from the Hawkesbury, also carried paying passengers. It ran once every 3 weeks with a trip taking 16 hours at a cost of 7/6 for the full journey.

A coach, named the "Union", started running between Parramatta and Windsor in 1824. (ironically 100 years before the last Cobb & Co coach run) and took 3 hours to travel between the two settlements with fares of 7/6 inside and 6/- outside. Within 3 years coach services between the two settlements had ceased.

The cessation of the coach service was due to the poor state of the roads and also the cost of providing the service was found to be unprofitable.

The situation changed after the establishment of Post Offices in country areas of the Colony including at Parramatta and Windsor in 1828. In 1830 a mail contract was awarded to Hugh Kelly who held licences for a couple of inns along the Windsor Rd.

A entry on The New South Wales Calendar & General Post Office Directory of 1832 reads;-

"From Parramatta...Windsor Royal Mail, sets out every day, Thursday excepted, from Mr M'Govern's Inn, Church Street at half-past 2

o'clock, changes horses at the Bush Inn 9 miles distance at 4 o'clock and arrives at Blackman's Hotel, at 6 o'clock.

Fares – five shillings in, and three shillings outside. Proprietor Hugh Kelly, Windsor Road"


A rival to Hugh Kelly's coach operations started in 1832 when John Ireland and a convict, John Richards, started a coach service from the Talbot Inn, George Street, Sydney to the Plough Inn at Windsor.

The mail contracts saw further coach operators start operations within the Hills and Hawkesbury areas but the growth in rail services meant that mail from Sydney was sent by rail to settlements on rail lines and the advent of motorised transport also affected coach operators. A few coach operators evolved into bus operators. The Glenorie Bus Company which, during the 1990s, became part of the now CDC NSW operations evolved from a coach company started by Ern Black back in the early 1900s. Ern Black acquired an International Bus and started a bus run from Glenorie to Hornsby in 1918. At that time all you needed was a driving licence and a bus and enough passengers to make the run viable. In the 1920s a Fiat bus was introduced on the run between Hornsby and Arcadia. George Deaman, who had acquired the horse coaches from Ern Black, had purchased a Federal bus in 1923 and had a run between Castle Hill and Dural. The bus was destroyed by fire on a trip between Galston and Glenorie and was then replaced by a larger

bus which seated 25 passengers. The depot for George Deaman's buses was, at first, located at Galston then in 1934 the depot was moved to Glenorie.

But back to the stagecoach business of Cobb & Co., not all coaches bearing the name of Cobb & Co were actually owned or operated by Freeman Cobb and his partners. The original name the company operated under was "American Telegraph Line of Coaches" which was changed shortly after to Cobb & Co., with the founding partners seeking to benefit from the Victorian Goldrush of the 1850s. The company expanded into NSW in June 1862 following the Lambing Flat gold rush with Bathurst becoming the NSW headquarters. The company continued to expand by either buying out, or forcing out, competitors. In 1865 the company spread into Queensland. In 1871 the operations in the three Eastern States were devolved into three different separate companies all using the name of Cobb & Co. Freeman Cobb moved to Port Elizabeth in South Africa where he established a Cobb & Co service between Port Elizabeth and the Kimberley diamond fields. Other Cobb & Co operations were started by others in South Australia, New Zealand and even in Japan such was the renown that the original Cobb & Co had in the 1800s.

With the extension of the Metro, from Tallawong to Sydenham, due to open on 4 August this year, we have come a long way in one hundred years.


