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

### NAIDOC WEEK FUN

There are a whole range of free activities being organised for NAIDOC Week in the Hills to Hawkesbury during the school holidays.

**Tuesday, July 9th:** Free family fun day organized by Hills Community Aid at the Balcombe Heights Estate, 92 Seven Hills Rd, Baulkham Hills between 9.50am and 1pm. There indigenous themed crafts, jumping castle, treasure hunt, community stalls, Hills Daily Grind Coffee and sausage sizzle.

**Thursday 11th July:** Yarn at the Farm. Hills Shire Council has organised a family fun event at Bella Vista Farm between 11am and 2pm.

## **BIRD FLU IN HAWKESBURY**

Thousands of birds at two Hawkesbury poultry farms have died since avian influenza was confirmed earlier this month.

The first case was at a Freemans Reach equ farm where 8,000 birds died in 48 hours after the virus was detected.

Biosecurity restrictions were placed around the farm as soon as the CSIRO's Australian Centre for Disease Preparedness confirmed a positive result for High Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI H7N) on 19th June.

Just days later a second positive result for the same strain was detected at a second poultry farm located within the restricted biosecurity zone, 1.5km from the original infected farm site.

While the two viruses are the same in the Hawkesbury it is not the same virus that has hit seven poultry farms in Victoria or has been a global cause of concern.

Agriculture Minister Tara Moriarty said the State Government's biosecurity plan is working and because teams responded rapidly, teams were able to quickly survey, test and detect another site that had been locked down on Wednesday 19 June.

She said: "This type of avian influenza is highly infectious in commercial poultry and it

was always a possibility that we could detect sites within the control zone. The Government will continue its testing at sites.

The Government's biosecurity team is working closely with the industry using wellestablished national response arrangements to manage the outbreak and has advised the

The Minister acknowledged the support and collaboration of the industry, which increases the ability to manage this situation.

Eggs and poultry meat are safe to eat provided they are handled and cooked according to safe food handling practices.

She said: "We'll continue our tracing work for anything that has come out of either of these farms for the last couple of weeks, just to make sure that there hasn't been any spread."

A total of 330.000 birds across the two farms are being culled and destroyed.

The guarantine area has been extended to protect surrounding farms. It is believed the highly contagious virus has been spread by wild

influenza which is believed to be the same strain as the Hawkesbury virus.

Transmission to humans is very rare, and unlikely unless there is direct and close contact with sick birds.

NSW and ACT are working together to deal with the biosecurity issue.

People should report any sick or dead birds as a priority. This includes all domestic poultry or wild birds. Call the Emergency Animal Disease Hotline on 1800 675 888.





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# OOD SERVICES .....

#### **RIDESHARE ASSAULT**

A man has been charged over the theft of a rideshare vehicle and assaulting the driver in Winston Hills last week.

About 1.35am on Monday, 24th June, emergency services responded to reports of an assault at the intersection of Kindelan Road and Gibbon Road, Winston Hills.

Officers from Parramatta Police Area Command were informed a 49-year-old man was working as a rideshare driver when he accepted a booking from two men – both aged 23 and known to one another – from Dorado Street, Box Hill, at about 12.50am.

The men directed the driver to several locations including a service station on Penmure Street, Rouse Hill, at 1.05am where they purchased food items before returning to the vehicle.

The driver was instructed to attend further addresses.

It will be alleged that during the journey one of the passengers became aggressive towards the driver whilst the second passenger attempted to calm the situation.

When at the intersection of Kindelan Road and Gibbon Road the driver was allegedly assaulted by the man.

Police will allege the driver ran from the vehicle – leaving his mobile phone in the vehicle - and sought assistance from a nearby resident who contacted Triple Zero.

The men then drove from the location in the rideshare vehicle – a white 2018 Volkswagen Tiguan.

NSW Ambulance paramedics treated the 49-year-old at the scene before he was taken

to Blacktown Hospital with head and facial injuries. He has since been released.

Following inquiries, the driver's phone was located damaged in a drain along Lambert Place. Winston Hills, about 8am.

About 9.30am the vehicle was recovered abandoned on Junction Road, Winston Hills, where it was seized for forensic examination.

Shortly after midday on Tuesday detectives - with the assistance of the Public Order Riot Squad - executed a search warrant at a home on Lanhams Road, Winston Hills, where the man who allegedly assaulted the driver was arrested.

Whilst conducting a search of the premises officers located a small fire in the rear yard that was extinguished by Fire and Rescue NSW.

It will be alleged that at the source of the fire was the man's mobile phone and clothing items that were worn by him at the time of the incident. Police allege he drove the rideshare vehicle from the scene and he is the holder of a learner's drivers' licence. Whilst in custody the man allegedly hindered officers in obtaining a forensic sample from his hands.

He has been charged with five offences:

- Aggravated take/drive motor vehicle with person in/on it-inflict actual bodily harm
- Aggravated robbery and inflict actual bodily harm
- Learner not accompanied by driver/police officer/tester
- Tamper with evidence with intent to mislead judicial tribunal
- Hinder or resist police officer in the execution of duty

#### **LUXURY CAR THIEF**

A teenager has been charged over the alleged break and enter of six homes and one business where five luxury cars and three motorbikes were stolen.

Detectives attached to Strike Force Sweetenham were called to a home on Wayfield Way, Glenhaven where a Mercedes GLC and a Dodge Ram were allegedly stolen about 4.30am on Monday 10th June. Police then attended Volmer Street, Oatlands following reports the Dodge Ram was in the vicinity at the time a home was allegedly broken into while a woman was inside about 5.30am the same day.

Police were told eight pairs of luxury shoes, worth about \$14,400, were allegedly stolen.

Police commenced an investigation into the break-ins

The Dodge Ram was allegedly seen following a break in and theft of three motorbikes from a store in Caringbah about 12.30am on Tuesday 11th June. Investigations continued after an alleged break in of a home on Milson Road, Cremorne Point where a BMW X6 was allegedly stolen on Monday 17th June.

The same car was allegedly involved in a police pursuit at Acacia Gardens about 12.10am on Tuesday 18th June.

The BMW X6 was then allegedly used in a break-in of a home on Kenthurst Road, Kenthurst about 1am the same day.

The car was allegedly used again during the break and enter of a home on Stuart Street Longueville about 2.20am where a Mercedes was stolen. The Mercedes was recovered at a Blackett carpark the same day.

Police were called to investigate the break in of a home on Lismore Street, Hoxton Park on (Friday 21st June) where a Land Rover was stolen before it was recovered in Oakhurst about 7.40am. About 9.40am Friday 21st June, police arrested a 17-year-old boy at a home in Rooty Hill.

He was taken to Mount Druitt Police Station where he was charged with 22 sequences:

#### FATAL BOAT CRASH CHARGES

A man has been charged after a woman died following a boat crash in the Hawkesbury River in Wilberforce earlier this year.

In February 2024, officers attached to Marine Area Command commenced an investigation into the death of a 32-year-old woman who died after the boat she was a passenger in crashed into a riverbank.

Immediately after the collision the driver of the boat – a 38-year-old man – was taken to Westmead Hospital for mandatory testing, which later returned a positive result for alcohol.

About 9am Tuesday, 18the June. Police arrested the 38-year-old man. He was taken to Windsor Police Station where he was charged with dangerous navigation occasioning death. He was granted conditional bail to appear at Windsor Local Court on Thursday 11 July 2024. His boating licence has been suspended.

#### **DRUNK DRIVER**

A 20-year-old woman has been caught drink driving twice in the same day and faces two charges of high range drink driving.

She was tracked by PolAir, the Police Aviation Command, driving on the M2 at 11.20am on Saturday 22nd June after Police received several 000 calls regarding erratic driving. The Kia collided with a number of barriers before stopping near the Cropley Drive underpass at Baulkham Hills. Hills Police were directed to the scene where the Bidwill woman returned a positive roadside breath test. She was arrested and conveyed to Castle Hill Police Station where she returned a blood alcohol reading of 0.281, nearly 6 times the legal limit. She was charged with High Range Drink Driving and her licence was suspended.

At 4.18pm later that day police say the same woman was driving a Kia Sedan on the M2 near Culloden Road at Macquarie Park and broke down police attended a short time later. She allegedly returned a positive roadside breath test and was arrested and taken to Gladesville Police station where she allegedly returned a blood alcohol reading of 0.126.

#### **ONE DEAD SEVERAL INJURED**

Emergency services have been called to the scene of several local crashes recently, one of them fatal. A 58 year old female passenger died following a head on crash at Castle Hill on Wednesday, 19th June.

Emergency services were called to Tuckwell Rd at about 5.25pm following reports of a two-vehicle crash involving a silver Mercedes sedan and a white Isuzu Ute.

The front seat passenger of the sedan, a 58-year-old woman, was treated by NSW Ambulance paramedics before being taken to Westmead Hospital in a critical condition but later died at the hospital.

The driver of the sedan, a 24-year-old woman, and two other passengers aged 60 and 18 were also taken to Westmead Hospital for non-life threatening injuries.

The 47-year-old Ute driver was taken to Westmead Hospital for mandatory testing. Officers from the Crash Investigation Unit are preparing a report for the information of the Coroner.

On Sunday June 23rd there were two nasty crashes on Annangrove Road. The driver of a car which hit a power pole at 1am (pictured) was lucky to escape serious injury. The impact crumpled his car. He escaped with a broken leg.

At 2pm on the same day the driver of a Mercedes and the driver of a Toyota were trapped when their vehicles collided on Annangrove Road. Both were taken to hospital.

Careflight was called to a crash site on Windsor Rd Riverstone following a collision between two trucks on Thursday June 20th. A driver, in his 40s, was treated for multiple injuries before being conveyed to Westmead Hospital in a serious but stable condition.

Emergency services were also called to collisions on Boundary Rd, Oakville and Andromeda Parkway, Box Hill.



#### **OPERATION DISRUPT**

Police arrested and charged 24 people and seized several knives and replica firearms in a two-day transport safety blitz in the area called Operation Disrupt.

Conducted by officers attached to the Police Transport Command, with assistance from the Dog Unit, the proactive, intelligence-driven operation was aimed at disrupting and preventing crime and improving community safety across the public transport network and surrounds.

Operation Disrupt ran between 1.30pm Friday, 21st June and 12.30am Sunday, 23rd June. During the Operation, police conducted 73 searches, seizing seven knives, two replica firearms, prohibited drugs and various items suspected of being stolen and arrested and charged 24 people with 31 offences.

Incidents of note included:

 About 4.35pm on Friday, 21st June officers responded to reports a person was carrying what appeared to be a firearm on a train from Riverstone. Police intercepted the 15-yearold boy at Quakers Hills railway station and located a replica firearm with replica ammunition. The teenager was arrested and taken to Riverstone Police Station, where he was charged with possess unauthorised

 On Saturday, 22nd June at around 4pm, police were patrolling the vicinity of Rouse Hill Metro Train Station and spoke to a 31-year-old man. He was searched and police allegedly located a multi-tool, including a knife, and a hammer. He was issued a field court attendance notice for custody of knife in public place.

Police Transport Command North West Inspector Scott Carr said: "The focus of this operation was to increase community safety on the public transport network through intelligence driven policing and it has been highly successful.

"The Police Transport Command will continue to work cooperatively with the community and our partner agencies to target those who carry weapons, commit criminal offences and impact upon the safety and comfort of the travelling public."

In another incident a teenager has been charged for robbing a 12-year-old student waiting for a bus on Monday morning (24th June)

Police allege that at 7.30am the student was waiting for a bus at the Castle Hill Metro, when he was approached by two teenage males dressed in black hoodies. It will be alleged that males assaulted him, taking his phone. A bus driver intervened and managed to get the phone back. The two males then ran off.

Following investigations, Hills Detectives arrested a 15 year-old male at 9.30pm that same day. He was taken to Castle Hill Police Station where he was charged with Robbery in Company and bail refused to a Children's Court. Enquiries are continuing as to the identity of the second male.

#### **SPEEDING FINE**

At 11pm on Tuesday 25th June, police attached to the Hawkesbury Highway Patrol detected a grey Toyota Camry travelling at 132kph westbound along Windsor Road, Vineyard in a marked 80km/ph zone.

The vehicle was stopped at McGraths Hills McDonald's where Police discovered the 33-year-old male driver from Lethbridge Park was travelling with his female partner in the front passenger seat and his daughter, aged 3 1/2 years old. His young daughter did not have her seatbelt fastened correctly and was not restrained in her seat.

The driver had his licence suspended for six months and received infringement notices for exceeding the speed limit by more than 45kph and driving with an unrestrained child between 6 months and four years of age. The vehicle's plates were not seized on this occasion as the vehicle is a rental.



## WASTE AND RECYCLING IN THE

When I was at school, "Do the right thing!" meant put your rubbish in the bin without littering. We've come a long way from that mindset now, realising that 'out of sight' (at the tip) is not the best solution given that resources are finite, and our 'waste' has value.

I love going to the waste industry conference in May – not only because one of my favourite people, Costa from Gardening Australia (along with Dirt Girl and Scrapboy) are among the key presenters but because it's inspiring to see the seismic shift in thinking that is happening in this space.

One day, hopefully we won't have any waste – the aim is to 'design it out' and this is key to what is called the circular economy. This is a system where products and materials are kept in circulation through processes like reuse, repurposing, recycling and composting.

NSW is moving to a circular economy over the next 20 years and this means we'll be using our resources much more efficiently – ending up with less waste, lower emissions, less harm to our environment and more jobs.

You can't see it but councils are now starting to use more recycled content in everyday infrastructure, driving demand for these products and stimulating new markets.

Rubber crumb from thousands of tonnes of truck and car tyres are now being used in asphalt to build roads instead of going to the tip - with the rubber even improving the performance and durability of the road. Footpaths and paved areas can now contain crushed glass and printer cartridge toner and recycled plastics are being used to create resilient bridges, playgrounds, outdoor furniture and decking.

Our council is constructing 2 pedestrian bridges in Cockayne Reserve, Castle Hill made from recycled plastic (Fibre-Reinforced Polymer) a material that is more durable, corrosion resistant, strong and affordable - and a very impressive reuse of our waste.

FOGO (food organics and garden organics) is a part of this circular economy thinking – all of our food scraps will be collected from 2027 and turned into valuable compost to feed the soils in our gardens, local parks and sports fields.

Clothing is a huge challenge but the Sebastian Foundation has come up with a beautiful circular economy example. Through their partnership with E-Thread they repurpose and recycle all textiles donated to their bins (none goes to landfill) and use the proceeds to fund an enriching youth mental health program in schools within that community. It would be fabulous to see this in the Hills!

Of course recycling is only part of the solution, we also need to address the generation of waste at the source. Australia needs packaging reform, not just voluntary guidelines – manufacturers should be responsible for the waste their products create. They can't keep churning out products that are not recyclable or difficult to recycle and they need to financially support the recovery of these materials.

I'm pleased that the council supported my motion on June 25th to minimise waste to landfill, encourage the use of materials with recycled content and ask the government to urgently act on waste generation at the source.

He says his volunteering journey with St John started 16 years ago when he honoured a promise to a friend.

He said the camaraderie and knowing he is helping people are what he enjoys most about his volunteering.

"I just encourage people to give a little bit of their time (to volunteering) when they find an area they want to be involved with."

St John Ambulance cadet Penelope Ravn joined the cadet program a year ago when she was just 7 years old, following in the footsteps of her

Is it ok to know where your partner is and what they are doing at all times? How do you know if someone is giving consent?

These are just some of the scenarios played out in the LoveBites program that is teaching teenagers the importance of respectful relationships.

To date, CHRG (Castle Hill RSL Group) has provided around \$50,000 in funding, through cash and in-kind support, which has helped to train more than 100 facilitators from the Hills, Hawkesbury, Hornsby and Parramatta Local Area Police commands.

CHRG Group Chief Operating Officer Andy Abey said: "CHRG is incredibly proud of the work we have done with the Hills Local Area Command and more specifically, Senior Constable Ethan West and Tara Gleig (Crestwood High).

"Several years ago, we came together to discuss the impact of domestic and relationship violence on youth – with each of us having our own experience as youth and the interaction we have had with youth.

"We recognised that we were in a unique position to provide information and resources to engage, inform and influence better outcomes for teenagers. And we started with offering the National Association for Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect (NAPCAN's), LoveBites training for local police and civilians to enable

them to get into classrooms and deliver the content in a supported environment.

"Training has also been provided to civilians working in the sector. Approximately 1000 students have been delivered the LoveBites program in schools, since the program inception.

"Our ability to deliver these programs is borne from the position and relationships we have in the local community. Tackling the topic of domestic and relationship violence takes a whole of community approach. Importantly, it takes action, difficult conversations and a relentless commitment to effect change.

"The model we have used to train facilitators and support the rollout of the program in local schools, can be replicated community after community – in particular with the support of NAPCAN, Police and frontline

service providers who are in desperate need for funding of education programs and resources that get to the core of the issue.

"CHRG is now working with NAPCAN to identify other programs and partnerships to be able to reach more pre-teens and teens and do our part to bring an end to domestic and relationship violence.

"Clubs are in a unique position to bring so many stakeholders together for a common purpose. And that's exactly what's required if we want to see the dial shift. The community must work together on the rollout of education programs to create enough groundswell in order to gain momentum for change."

This simple gesture can help avoiding misunderstandings and frustration, fostering a more attentive and engaged interaction.
- 3. SPEAK CLEARLY AND SLOWLY: When communicating aim to speak clearly. Be mindful that some individuals may process speech slightly slower meaning they require more time

to decipher what you are trying to say. Speaking a little slower can be therefore quite helpful to stay engaged. Avoid shouting, as it can make lip-reading more challenging. If they ask for repetition, refrain from simply increasing volume. Instead, rephrase your sentence or simplify your message. For example, if you state "the weather has been absolutely terrible all week" and they can't comprehend what you're saying, you could rephrase your sentence to "It has been raining all day!" Keeping things little bit simpler.

- 4. MINIMISE BACKGROUND NOISE: Reduce environmental distractions by minimising background noise wherever possible. Appliances, televisions, and other sources of noise can interfere or compete with conversations, making it difficult for individuals with hearing loss to follow. Sometimes it may be possible to position yourself and the person with hearing loss away from noisy distractions for example outside seating at a café vs inside. If you can't eliminate background noise, make sure the noise is positioned behind the person with the hearing loss making the most of the natural shape of our ears.
- **SHOW EMPATHY AND PATIENCE: Understand** the frustration and challenges faced by your loved one with hearing loss. Put yourself in their shoes by imagining how difficult it would be to understand conversations with blocked ears. Approach communication with empathy, patience, and dignity, avoiding



frustration or annoyance. Remember, they desire to communicate effectively, and your understanding can make a significant difference.

In conclusion, supporting a loved one with hearing loss requires patience, empathy, and effective communication strategies. By implementing these simple yet impactful tips, you can help make conversations more accessible and enjoyable for both parties. Remember, your loved one wants to engage with you, and by creating a supportive environment, you can encourage open communication and strengthen your relationship.

So, as we observe Hearing Awareness Week, let's pledge to be more mindful of the communication needs of those with hearing loss. **Stopping Domestic Abuse**

Every four minutes police in NSW respond to a domestic violence related issue. Research has shown that on average people will experience 26 incidents before they make a report.

Hills Police Commander Supt Naomi Moore says there is no simple solution to curbing domestic and family violence \_ "we need to work together".

In the past 12 months officers for The Hills Police Area Command have investigated just under 3,400 domestic related incidents including 355 domestic violence assaults. Last year the figure was 410. Around 70% of those 355 reported assaults have resulted in an offender being arrested and charged.

In one case a 44-year-old man from Bella Vista, with a history of domestic related charges was charged in April with stalk/intimidate and breach of an apprehended violence order after it is alleged he used a third person to send messages to his ex partner to intimidate her and cause her to fear for her safety.

Spt Moore said: "The Hills PAC DV Team did a great job to support the victim and locate, arrest and charge the offender which resulted in him being refused bail until the court hearing in November 2024.

'This male will spend 7 months in custody for these matters showing how serious police and the court system is currently responding to domestic violence in our community," she said.

Supt Moore was responding to guestions put by the Hills to Hawkesbury Community **News** this week and said the most frequent offences seen in The Hills PAC are assault, harrassment or intimidation, contravene ADVO and malicious damage to property.

"Across NSW, not just The Hills, DV assault has increased by 6.7% in the past 2 years and

breach ADVO has increased by 6% in the same period," she said.

"The state average for time a police crew spends at the scene of a DV incident is 43 mins and we are responding to a DV incident every 4 minutes.

"Police at The Hills will do everything we can to protect victims and break the cycle of violence in family units but we cannot do it alone.

"We need role models in the community to speak up and speak out.

" If you know your friend or loved one is a victim or an offender of domestic violence don't be complicit, be a role model and do something to help make a positive change to the situation."

"Report domestic violence. Whether as a victim, a witness, a family member, a friend or a neighbour. If you hear it, see it, report it to police and provide support, where possible, to the victim."

She said the EMPOWER YOU APP release by NSW Police provides important support.

"You can use, or encourage a victim to download the EMPOWER YOU APP. This app is designed to allow a victim of domestic violence to record details of an incident.

"There is an ability to catalogue incidents over a period of time which will be important for capturing conduct which may be relevant to coercive control offences.

"There is a diary function where victims can document incidents, capture photos and upload images. The diary entry can be emailed

"This is especially important with new Coercive Control legislation coming into effect from 1st July. The app also gives victims of about support services and provides a virtual safety network for victims who can establish this via the app."

## **Council Grants To Help**

Two organisations on the coalface of the domestic violence crisis have received a major financial boost from The Hills Shire Council, sharing in \$70,000 in grant funding.

Council will award \$40,000 to The Sanctuary, The Hills Women's Shelter and \$30,000 to the Lisa Harnum Foundation through its grant program to support the vital work they do in the community.

Hills Shire Mayor, Dr Peter Gangemi said: "Domestic violence in The Hills has escalated by 10 per cent over the last five years, and this is unacceptable. Council is very committed to playing a greater role in reducing this crime in our community. The Sanctuary and the Lisa Harnum Foundation are the two largest organisations in The Hills on the frontline against domestic violence. Their work in our community is indispensable, providing accommodation, counselling and other services to women and children.

Chair of The Sanctuary Yvonne Keane thanked Council for the contribution.

"Every contribution is vital in helping us provide safe refuge and support for those escaping domestic violence," she said. "Many who come to us, leave without a cent to their name and the clothes on their backs. This funding will help victims to rebuild their lives and reestablish themselves within their community."

The Lisa Harnum Foundation supports women experiencing domestic violence through their Safe Room program, case management, counselling, education and monthly group

Founder of the Lisa Harnum Foundation Aileen Mountifield said: "These much-needed funds will go toward our established Safe Rooms in Castle Hill and Rouse Hill. The Safe Rooms are where women can access help in a safe and confidential space so they can receive the support they need.

The grants to both organisations are the largest grants Council has allocated to organisations supporting domestic violence victims in a financial year.

The Mayor said the funding comes on the back of Council partnering with The Hills Police Area Command and The Hills Domestic Violence Prevention Network on a high-visibility domestic violence awareness campaign.

"Raising awareness is our strongest tool as a community against domestic violence. "Together, we can bring this heinous crime into the light and stop it."

To receive the funding, both organisations applied for their respective amounts through the Other Financial Grant Assistance program.



During the annual Craft Alive event in June. the Hawkesbury Showground pavilion was transformed into a crafter's paradise, bringing together like-minded makers.

Craft Alive, operating for 33 years across Australia, is the largest craft event series, featuring a variety of workshops and exhibitors. Their presence at the Hawkesbury is welcomed year after year by visitors who participate and take home their hand-made goodies.

Within the newly-built pavilion, over 30 exhibitors on the weekend were present, including the Embroidery Guild NSW, Handweavers and Spinners NSW and Western Sydney Woodturners. At every turn, artistic abilities were displayed with mounted guilts and embroidery panels from the Online Quilt Magazine.

But visitors weren't just persuaded to buy colourful fabric or scrapbooking supplies. Guest teacher Sandi Foley-De Vinceo featured her junk journaling class during the show, encouraging makers to reuse scrap material through a therapeutic journaling process. Guest teacher Debbie Hatumale-Uy also appeared at the event, with workshops specialising in the UV 'Direct to Film' fabric printing technique, allowing visitors to practise creating personalised gifts and products.

Two artists at the event I spoke to expressed their deep passion and love for creating. Blue Mountains artist Miss Leela at 'The Maker's Stash', has over 20 years experience in english

paper piecing and is fascinated with slowstitching projects. She shared why events such as Craft Alive are essential for online businesses to connect with their customers:

"It's wonderful when online customers come and I meet them in person, and I enjoy meeting new customers who haven't yet discovered me. It also gives me the opportunity to share my particular craft and passion, and I love to inspire and encourage others to try English Paper Piecing".

Michelle Kistima-Menser at 'You are Brave Textile' specialises in textile screen-printing, creating products like poplin fabrics and tea-towels. Michelle enjoys working inside her Marrickville studio but also spoke of the importance of building strong craft community:

"Often as a maker, we work alone in the studio for days or months at a time, not really engaging with many people. That's why I love Craft Alive - I enjoy introducing people to work as a textile designer and screen printer. But more importantly, it's just lovely to meet people who are creative themselves, and I think we can all learn from each other if we are open to listening and sharing".

Sally Taylor, the marketing and event manager for Craft Alive, believes in the difference of leaving a community "craftenriched" through the connection of art:



The VR learning programs will benefit 40 Hills locals with disabilities from the Castle Hill Learning and Lifestyle hub, as well as around 100 students from 12 local schools.

The exclusive Virtual Reality suite, which was rolled out earlier this month, features all of Endeavour Foundation's leading VR learning programs, including:

- catching public transport
- how to cross a road through pedestrian safety

### **Students hear from Veterans**

Chris Kirk is one of several veterans from Castle Hill RSL sub-branch who have been talking to students about their service in the Middle East.

The talks are part of the Postcards of Honour campaign as a lead up to the Middle East Area of Operations National Commemoration Day. After the talks students are given blank postcards to decorate and write a message to a Middle East veteran.

So far veterans have spoken at Kellyville Public School, Excelsior Public School and Castle Hill High. The postcards will be posted by Castle Hill RSL sub-branch to local veterans.

Forty-one Australians died in Afghanistan, including former Oakhill student Trooper Jason Brown. Two lives were lost in Iraq and Kuwait and many veterans returned from the Middle

East with long-lasting physical and mental trauma.

Chris Kirk, who served for 17 years in the British Army was the youngest soldier in his troop when he was first posted to Iraq in 2003.

"The others were much older and they looked out for me. When I was deployed in 2006 to Iraq we had a few 18-year-olds in the troop and the roles were reversed. I looked out for them. The friends I made and the comrades I had were brilliant."

He said talking to Year 5 students at Kellyville Public was a rewarding experience. "They listened and asked questions that were respectful and well thought out. They also wanted to know what the food was like."

Co-ordinator of the program in the HIlls, Vietnam veteran Phill Evenden said: "Having learnt the lessons on the way Vietnam veterans were treated both by the public and the military after we withdrew from Vietnam, the RSL movement and the Government decided on a commemoration day specific to the Middle East campaign.

"The significance of the date, July 11th, is that it is the month and day in 2021 that troops were officially withdrawn for the Middle East and the war was declared over."



On 11 July 2021, the Minister for Defence confirmed that all Australia personnel had been withdrawn from Afghanistan bringing Australia's longest war to an end. An official National service will be held at the Cenotaph at 11am on Thursday, 11th July.

Chris Kirk won't be part of the Castle Hill RSL sub-branch group because he will be walking the Kokoda track with other veterans.

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
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NURTURED VILLAGE HAMPERS:

Supporting New Mums and Bubs in the Hills

It may take a village to raise a child, but this registered charity is reconnecting mothers one hamper at a time with their newly opened Hills network.

The Nurtured Village Hampers is a national charity that recognises a gap in the traditional village of support in early parenthood. Starting as a kindness initiative in Brisbane by founder Emma Gray, the campaign has now expanded to include over 21 locations across Australia. Kaitlyn Bywater, Executive Director and Manager of Operations for The Nurtured Village was excited to share the story of the charity's inception in 2019:

"Emma, our founder, received a hamper when she was in a new-born bubble with her first child. There was no knock on the door, it was just dropped off by some of her husband's gym friends who knew that it wasn't the time for new mums to host. Since that moment, she's just been paying that kindness forward".

In a campaign to advocate for and promote maternal mental health, The Nurtured Village organises home cooked meals, store bought foods, and gifts in the form of a hamper that is randomly gifted to a young family each month in each town and city. At the beginning of each month, nominations are opened for any biological mothers, foster, kinship-care or stepmothers. As this charity is not means-tested, the results are drawn at random unless a highrisk case is flagged, allowing mothers to access this service without a mental health diagnosis.

Since January this year, a new village has opened up in the Hills spanning from Wisemans Ferry to Baulkham Hills. Andrea Pateman, Glenorie local, is the group facilitator and would

love mums to join the Facebook Group: 'Nurtured Village Hampers Hills District Sydney'.

Creating support structures for new mums is essential in combating maternal mental health issues such as postnatal depression and anxiety, which affects up to 1 in 3 women. The enormous physical, emotional and social changes after becoming a mum are rarely acknowledged and rather, become an invisible burden for women.

Marketing Manager Michael Holani reflected on the lack of available mental health support as he said,

"Maternal mental health is not something that is talked about, there still seems to be a stigma for mental health. Our charity recognises that there is a gap for mothers and we aim to create strong support networks to address this".

Kaitlyn Bywater, has also seen first-hand the common struggles faced by new parents and why their mission to support new mothers is essential for maternal mental health:

"By creating these virtual mother groups online, we aim to reduce the social isolation that new mums face. But our physical hamper also resolves financial burdens and mental loads, all whilst creating connection and a safe space."

Since January to April 2024, The Nurtured Village Hampers has distributed 107 hampers across Australia consisting of over 8715 donations. Kaitlyn also hopes to continue

expanding their locations and reflected on their grass-root approach in 2019:

"We went from a bunch of mums across the country paying it forward with coffee, to a board of nine and 85 volunteers - the growth has been so inspiring!"

If you know a special mum between the ages of 14-51 years who needs a helping hand, you can nominate them through the Hills District Facebook Page or on The Nurtured Village Hamper's website 'Nomination Form'.

Hills District mums can also reach out to hillsdistrict@thenuturedvillage.org to connect to clothing, food relief and other essential services especially for domestic violence situations.

For those passionate about maternal and women's healthcare, The Nurtured Village Hampers is seeking volunteers for roles in hamper coordination, administrative work, and distributing flyers in community centres. This charity is also recognised by Centrelink as a childcare subsidiary activity, and can be contacted at hello@nuturedvillage.org.





Command, 7th Squadron. They flew raids over Germany in Lancaster Bombers.

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Macquarie Towns Garden Club – Treasure Hunt

Louise Johnson of Macquarie Towns Garden Club has been on an unusual year-long adventure, on a quest to establish the age of the Club. Turns out it is VERY old: 130 years old! Most Sydney Clubs don't even get close for longevity!

In her book *Macquarie Towns Garden Club – A Guide to its History and Formation*, Mrs Johnson describes the Trove (National Library) searches that helped back-track her way into the history of the Hawkesbury, and her discovery that the first General Meeting was held on 1 st May, 1894, under its then-name Richmond Horticultural Society.

The book touches lightly on the social history of the area, and covers the impact of war and pandemics, including the so-called Spanish flu of 1918/1919. The newspaper clippings show a seemingly continuous cycle of 'droughts and flooding rains' that the Hawkesbury continues to experience, with huge impacts on local agriculture, and in consequence, the Spring and Autumn Flower Shows which the Society inaugurated and which soon became an important part of the district's social calendar, especially in the late 1890s.

Mrs Johnson also uncovered some interesting tidbits, such as the Horticultural Society having an interest in the state of Richmond Park during 1955. After receiving their letter, the Council assured the Society that "areas under the trees in the Park would be mown more often".

Another incident: it appears there was a flurry of activity in 1934 when the past-President resigned after the Governor's wife was unable to open the Spring Show, but later offered to be reinstated when the Governor's wife suddenly became available. Sadly, it appears that no one wished to take him up on his offer, and as a result he later withdrew sponsorship of prizes for the Show. The Club finally became known as Macquarie Towns Garden Club in 1998. It now meets on the first Thursday of the month in the Tebbutt Room at Windsor Library. For a copy of the book (\$20)

## The Hills Winter Sleep Out 2024

The Hills Winter Sleep Out, now in its 11th year, is set to return to Bella Vista Farm on 17 August 2024.

This well loved and memorable event has seen hundreds of residents take up the challenge of becoming "homeless" for the night, raised over \$350,000 for local charities and has helped hundreds of vulnerable locals who are facing homelessness for real.

In 2022/2023 Hills Community Aid (HCA), the primary beneficiary of the funds raised from the Hills Winter Sleep Out reported a 23% increase in calls/emails asking for assistance with 6558 individuals reaching out for help. For 54% of clients, it was their first time visiting HCA indicating that more and more of our community who could once "weather the storm" and cope with an increase in living costs are no longer able to. Sadly, in 2023 the number of clients affected by domestic and family violence increased by 93% with 323 individuals plus their children asking for help.



The Hills Winter Sleep Out funds HCA's Hills Homeless Prevention Initiative that aims to give those facing homelessness or at risk of homelessness a hand up by helping with rent/bond, food vouchers for food and other essential items such as clothes and linen.

Over the past year funds from the 2023 Hills Winter Sleep Out has helped over 100 individuals plus their families. Fiona\* is one example. Fiona receives an aged pension and works part time. In 2022, she moved in with her adult son to support him following his divorce. However, Fiona soon found herself a victim of family violence with her son becoming increasingly abusive and forcing her to use her money to purchase cigarettes and alcohol for him. Fiona came to HCA looking for assistance. Through the Hills Winter Sleep Out, HCA was able to assist Fiona with bond on a new rental and with removal costs so she could move homes and enjoy a fresh start away from abuse.

Grace\* is a 59 year old Grandmother looking after her daughter's 5 children who are 10, 7, 5, 4 and 4 months. Sadly, Grace's daughter and mother of the 5 children died during childbirth. Grace was struggling with her rent plus providing clothes, nappies and food for the children. Through the Hills winter Sleep Out, HCA was able to assist Grace with rent and food vouchers.

Mick\* is experiencing homelessness following a relationship breakdown. He has been living in his car which has a cracked windscreen. The Police were going to defect his car for the cracked windscreen which would have left him with no shelter or anywhere to

sleep. However, with funds from The Hills Winter Sleepout HCA were able to pay for the windscreen to be repaired and provide vouchers for food and other essential items.



# Local Guides first Guides in state to complete SES resilience development program



Annangrove Girl Guides recently took part in an emergency resilience program with the NSW State Emergency Service (SES), emerging as empowered and resilient young women ready to tackle emergency situations with confidence and skill.

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Riding for the Disabled's 10th year anniversary

Richmond's Riding For the Disabled centre recently celebrated their ten-year anniversary, reflecting on a decade of offering equine-assisted activities to promote the wellbeing of people living with disabilities.

The ceremony began with student harpist Claire, who created a tranquil atmosphere for volunteers and other community leaders present. Shane Laws, a First Nations speaker from the Boorooberongal clan, delivered a Welcome to Country and gave the audience insight into the nature of the Hawkesbury including its precious waterways. Local MP Susan Templeton also spoke at the event, recognising the excellence of the RDA's (Riding For the Disabled Association) services:

"I feel very privileged to be included in this because I've watched the growth and seen its development. What a better place to have an RDA than the Hawkesbury with its huge history and landscape."

The Riding for Disabled Association was established in Australia in 1964 by Mr and Mrs Peter McIntyre, who introduced horse-riding services as a form of therapy. Richmond's centre is located on the former Clydesdale Stud at the Western Sydney University campus in Richmond. In 2016 founder Deborah Gersbach partnered her horse-riding coaching with Riding for the Disabled (RDA) and received support from North-West Disability Services, offering a unique service for individuals living with disabilities: "I had to come up with an idea of why we needed this RDA and I wanted to offer

riding to adults who have previously missed out. Unlike other centres, we focus on adults with disabilities and the [Western Sydney] University has been amazing for that support, offering us

Well now we have to stay here and continue to build this as a community hub!"

There are now 35 RDA centres across Australia, including Gable's 'Tall Timbers' centre. Senior coach Nicole King at Tall Timbers congratulated the Richmond centre on their anniversary:

"I would like to congratulate the Team at Richmond Centre on reaching the 10 year milestone! Providing equine programs to local community members with a disability is hard work and takes dedication and commitment to continue offering these programs with the reliance of volunteers, fundraising and donations".

Ian Travers, fundraising director for RDA NSW and organiser of this event, spoke passionately about the impact of equine therapy. With over nine years' experience with the Richmond Centre and as a former RDA president, he reflected on his career changes from retail to disability services: "It's a very worthwhile cause, we have a little saying

called 'bums in saddles and smiles on faces'! Our clients are so joyous and have big smiles coming up the driveway. We even get involved with equestrian events including dressage, A1 and A2 grades.'

Horse riding is incredibly therapeutic and offers a range of physical benefits such as improved balance and posture as resistance training builds bone and muscle strength. However, Ian believes that the trained horses also provide deeper benefits such as enhancing self-confidence, communication and the selfesteem of clients:

"It's just therapeutic magic that just works where they connect with each other. You see the response coming back from the way our horse interacts, and our horses are very sensory. Our animals and clients just seem to understand each other."

For any avid horse lovers out there, lan Travers would love to hear from volunteers. However, you don't have to be horse-orientated as any assistance with admin or general stable cleaning duties is greatly appreciated. 



JUDO STAR JOSH KATZ rocks into Olympic contention

Courageous champion Josh Katz doubted he would compete in the Olympics again when he suffered serious injuries over the past couple of years. A knee injury in January had him even pondering the unthinkable: would he ever get back to judo at all?

In one of the feel-good sporting stories of the year, The Hills District star not only got back to the sport - where he has won 11 Oceania titles and 12 Australian crowns - but has also qualified for the 2024 Paris Olympics starting next month. It did not come easy; Josh had to perform at his best at the last two qualifying events over the past month to earn his spot. The 2022 Commonwealth bronze medallist and 2023 Pan American Oceania

Championship silver medallist now wants to win a rare Olympic judo medal for Australia.

"After the disappointment of missing qualification for the Tokyo 2021 Games, it's been a very challenging couple of years for me during this Olympic cycle," Josh, 26, told the Hills To Hawkesbury Community News. "Coming back from a number of really serious injuries that made me really doubt whether or not I was going to be able to get to Paris. In particular, after injuring my knee in January this year, I had so much uncertainty around if

I would be able to get back to Judo at all in time, and even more so how I would be able to perform when the

"Needing to reach the final of my last two qualification tournaments in Tahiti and Ivory Coast, it was a huge relief to finally secure my official Olympic qualification after achieving both results. Even more so, it is really special to be able to share that experience at the time with my brother Nathan who was coaching me at the events, and then with my family and friends when I returned home to Sydney."

Josh was the youngest Australian male judoka to compete in the Olympics, making his debut

at the 2016 Rio Games, aged 18 years and 220 days. He and Nathan were the first brothers to compete for Australia in judo at the same Olympics.

The champion genes run strong in the Katz family with Dad Rob, Mum Kerrye (1988 Olympian), and brother Nathan all masters of judo. The family run the highly-rated Budokan Judo Club in Castle Hill.

"With less than five weeks to go until the Games, I'm extremely excited to be able to prepare once more to represent Australia at the Olympic Games, and see the reward for years of struggle," Josh said. "These last couple of months have really shown me that anything is possible, so I want to put everything on the line once again to win Australia's first Olympic men's medal in judo in 60 years."

JORDAN THOMPSON hits great form in time for Wimbledon

Hills tennis star Jordan Thompson showed giant-killing form in the prestigious Queens tournament, which was a near perfect warm up for next month's Wimbledon championships, despite being beaten in the semifinals.

The 30-year-old Thompson had a great run of form on grass at the right time, despite suffering a back injury during his 6-3, 3-6, 6-3 semifinal loss to Italian Lorenzo Musetti, who had earlier seen off Australian star Alex de Minaur.

However, Thompson told reporters he would be fit for Wimbledon, having decided to skip the Paris Olympics next month due to scheduling complications. A spokesman for his management told *AAP* that the injury is "nothing serious. A bit of a sore back after a long week in Queen's so just a little rest and recovery this week, and he'll be good to go for Wimbledon."

Thompson stunned No.7 seed Holger Rune, grand slam champion Andy Murray and fourth seed Taylor Fritz enroute to the semifinals at Queens. His form here was a remarkable turnaround after his five-match losing streak.

Now ranked a career-best 39th in the ATP rankings after his recent exploits and second in Australia, Thompson said he is delighted at his progress.

"It's probably one of the toughest tournaments in the world, so to come through to the semis is extremely pleasing, especially after I've had a rough run recently," Thompson said.
"I'm getting old now; it just goes to show that if you stick at it long enough you can keep improving, whatever age you are, and I feel like I'm getting better."

This was the first time the outstanding Australian player had ever reached a semi-final in an ATP 500 tournament. Thompson said he was sorry to see the great Andy Murray retire hurt during his match. "He is a great champion, a grand slam champion who has won this tournament maybe five times and it is probably one of his favourite courts, so it is disappointing to see," Thompson said.

"I learned a lot of things from him and it is an honour to share the court with him," said Thompson, who had also upset the former number one Scot seven years ago.

Speaking about his decision not to play in the Paris Games, Thompson said: "I love representing my country, everybody knows that. "But clay is clearly not my favourite surface. (The Olympics) is back in Europe when the season of tennis is actually in America and getting ready to play the US Open."

This Sunday, June 30, they face Central Coast Mariners needing a win to reignite their leadership hopes.


# Hills Men Look For Revival

# A LANDMARK JUNCTION

Some of Australia's oldest roads in early Colonial Australia exist within our area. When main roads meet they form a junction and one of the major junctions in our area is the junction formed where Windsor, Seven Hills and Old Northern Roads all meet. Possibly referred to as the "Bull and Bush" Junction.

What has caused me to look at this particular junction was a reader asking me, a few weeks ago, "Do you know anything about Wood's store at Baulkham Hills?" I had heard of it and had some photographs of the store. When looking at the photos, it occurred to me that the site upon which Wood's store once stood had changed considerably over time and more changes are in the wind.

The site of Wood's store is currently unoccupied, it being a demolition site next door to Ackling House, the home of dental surgeries and retail premises. Prior to demolition, it was the site of the "Gateway Plaza Centre" which contained a Swimart pool shop, Chinese restaurant, newsagency and other retail establishments.

Prior to the Gateway Plaza centre being constructed, it was the site of a car sales yard and service station. An Ampol service station was built on the site during 1956 which, after a period, became Schmutter's Car Sales which later transferred to Blacktown. The land was excavated in 1982 and the Gateway Plaza Centre building was constructed.

The first store on the site was operated by Charlie Brown who then sold the store to O. A Vecsey in 1916 who operated the store until 1918. The Wood family bought the business in

1918 and operated it until 1956.

A few more readers have also asked about the Moderna building opposite the current Bull & Bush hotel which has been mostly unoccupied for a couple of years which is also located at the same junction.

The landmark Moderna building is a topic which a number of readers have asked about. This site has seen many changes over time. From the late 1800s. A hotel named the "Horse & Jockey" was situated on the site, as Yattenden Oval, which is nearby, was once the location of a racetrack and the hotel would stand to be a profitable enterprise on race days. The Post Office on the site operated at the rear of the hotel, along a general store both operated by Aborn Pouler. In 1880 Joseph Washington Phillips took over the business running it until 1885. In 1915 the hotel and shop were demolished. During 1936, Butter's Newsagency was built on the site, over a period of years serving as a Post Office, haberdashery and as a shoe shop. In 1964 G. J. Coles & Coy built a Coles New World Supermarket on the site which operated until 1981 after which the supermarket was converted to a "Shoppers World" store. A later conversion saw a restaurant included in the building which operated first as Sizzler, followed by Bells Restaurant, and even later as


a Food Star Restaurant. My wife reminded me of the time an elderly gentleman had driven into the front of the restaurant having lost control of his vehicle when turning from Windsor Rd into Seven Hills Rd, I think back in the 1990s.

Developers Dyldam acquired the site much later to build the controversial Moderna apartments, which have been the subject of a NSW Investigation resulting in the discovery of serious defects which has prevented or delayed occupation of tenants and purchasers. Recent work during past months has seen more residents moving in.

The other landmark building at the junction is that of the "Bull & Bush" Hotel. This was also purchased by Dyldam but has since been acquired by other interests after Dydam was put under administration.


A Pub was originally built on this site circa 1810 and was called the 'Lamb and Lark', then renamed 'The Cricketers' c1870, demolished in 1885 to make way for the "Royal Hotel" also referred to as the "Royal Baulkham Hills Hotel"

This was demolished and rebuilt as the 'Bull & Bush Inn' after the 1930's Depression. In 1991 there was a fire in the public bar, so reconstruction took place in 1992, with the latest renovation in 2004.






