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

Headspace / Open for Hawkesbury Youth

Access to mental health services for young people in the Hawkesbury has become significantly easier following the opening of a new Headspace location in the centre of Richmond on Friday, March 1st. The location, which was developed by Wentworth Healthcare and Uniting NSW, provides free intervention services to youth aged 12-25, providing support with a wide range of issues like mental and physical health, work and study, as well as alcohol and drug needs. The centre was officially opened with a ceremony attended by over 60 people, all in support of youth mental health.

Headspace's goal is to offer timely and tailored support to young people so that they are able to receive the right care when they need it. For the Hawkesbury site, Wentworth and Uniting heard feedback from 129 young people in the community, as well as teachers, psychologists, youth officers and parents to shape the centre into a welcoming place for young people.

Colo High School graduate Leah Venables was one of those young people on the Headspace Hawkesbury Youth Advisory Committee, and she spoke on the opening day about her excitement in seeing the centre now open: "I know what it's like to be a young person in the Hawkesbury, and I know a lot of young people who have struggled with their personal lives and mental health. Personally, I was very

anxious as a child and had a lot of crisis periods, and having a space like this opens the door to so many conversations that need to be had."

Wentworth Health Care CEO Lizz Reay stressed the hard work that went into getting Headspace Hawkesbury open and how important it is for the local community: "We knew that young people in the Hawkesbury wouldn't be able to go to the Penrith Headspace, so we kept advocating for this centre along the journey. We're really excited about the systems this space will provide to young people now and into the future, so we're really excited to be here with everyone else today."

Longtime advocate for youth mental health Susan Templeman MP was elated to see the Headspace Centre finally open after years of campaigning for its place in the Hawkesbury: "All of us already knew there was a need here, no matter what the people with pens said – we knew there was a need here. There's been fantastic support from community members and young people, and that's been the key to all of this. Our job now is to spread the word and bring this service alive for our young people and their families."

Headspace Hawkesbury is open from Monday-Friday from 9am until 5pm every day. Sessions are by appointment only - head to https://headspace.org.au/headspace-centres/ hawkesbury/ to find out more.

### **LIFE SAVER**

JEFF GOODWIN owes his life to fellow cricketer Thomas Finlyason and last month he and his grateful wife were at RAAF Base Richmond to see Leading Aircraftman Finlayson awarded a Chief of Air Force Gold Commendation for his life-saving action.

The two men were playing cricket on the same team, in December 2022, when Jeff collapsed and Thomas used his First Aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training to help him.

Thomas said his team mate was on his back having a seizure, going blue in the face and gasping for air in short, sharp breaths. Two other teammates called triple-zero and when the seizure subsided Thomas started CPR.

"At one point I looked up whilst giving compressions to see if the gate was open for the ambulance to access the field; when I noticed it was closed I screamed to have it opened," he said.

"The triple-zero medical operator provided guidance on the time and depth of compressions. I kept the compressions going for 13 minutes until the paramedics arrived, only stopping when advised by the triple-zero medical support to listen to (his)

all those who do the training, please pay attention as you may need it one day," said Thomas

Jeff's wife Sonia said: "No words come close to describing how incredibly grateful I am that Leading Aircraftman Finlayson was playing that day and provided life-saving CPR that ensured my beautiful husband is alive today. Any recognition that comes his way is well and truly deserved," she said.

Jeff, who spent 72 hours in an induced coma, said: "I'm just happy to be here."

The commendation certificate reads, "On this day, your leadership and first aid has been recognised as having directly contributed to saving this individual's life, of which there was only an eight per cent chance of survival outside of a hospital.

"Your life-saving actions have not only helped an individual and their family, they have enhanced the reputation of the Australian Defence Force in the local community."

### VETERAN'S HUB

Plans to build a Veterans and Families Hub in the Hawkesbury has taken another step forward with RSL LifeCare in partnership with RSL NSW receiving a \$5.445 million Federal Government

A statement from RSL Life Care said: "The initiative will establish a corridor of support, bookended by two Veterans' and Families' Hubs, one in Richmond in the Hawkesbury region, and one in South Western Sydney, in Ingleburn, to ensure that the 19,200 local veterans in the area can access services close to home."

There will be an interim hub established in the Hawkesbury in the next few months. The purpose-built Hub will be completed by June 2026, once a site has been identified (either at Richmond or Windsor).

RSL LifeCare CEO Janet Muir said that the successful bid was another essential milestone for RSL LifeCare's commitment to supporting veterans and their families.

"We thank RSL NSW and sub-Branches for their ongoing partnership which helps us collectively bring significant and valuable resources to the delivery of these Hubs."

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### **OVAL VANDALISED**

Officers from Hawkesbury Police Area Command are investigating who caused \$25,000-worth of damage to a popular sporting ground in Windsor disrupting games for several weeks.

The damage to 'Don't Worry Oval' was discovered on Monday, 4th of March. The grounds had been driven over with "wheelies" causing significant damage to the turf and the cricket pitch.

On its FaceBook site council stated: "This senseless act will potentially deny the

community and sporting groups access to the space for several weeks. A preliminary assessment has been carried out and the damage could cost up to \$25k to repair, especially if it is determined that the synthetic wicket has been damaged. A more detailed assessment will be carried out over the coming days."

Anyone who may know something about what happened is asked to contact Windsor Police or Crime Stoppers.



The Australian Federal Police is calling for public assistance after finding about 300kg of MDMA and about 70kg of ketamine in a consignment at a storage facility in Box HIII.

Police are trying to identify the transnational criminal syndicate behind the import, after seizing the drugs on Friday, 23rd February during a warrant executed at the Box Hill premises which revealed 20 pallets of boxes labelled as metal fiber.

Some of the boxes were filled with sand and plastic water bottles. Tests allegedly returned presumptive positive results for both MDMA and

ketamine. The drugs will be subject to further forensic testing to determine their exact weight and purity.

AFP Detective Superintendent Kristie Cressy said 300kg of MDMA had a potential estimated street value of more than \$12 million.

### **MOBILE DRUG BUST**

A 26-year-old Northmead man was one of several people arrested by Criminal Group Squad detectives under a Strike Force Wessex investigation into "dial-a-dealer" service across Sydney.

In a first action of its kind detectives have shut down 26 alleged drug runner phone numbers connected to more than 50,000 potential customers.

Strike Force Wessex was established in April 2023 to investigate alleged criminal groups involved in drug supply using drug run or 'dial-adealer' phones.

About 6.35am on Tuesday 27th February strike force detectives executed a search warrant in Northmead where they located and seized two phones. A 29-year-old man was arrested and charged with breach of bail. He appeared in Parramatta Local Court the same day. A 25-year-old woman was also arrested and charged with common assault and assault

police officer in execution of duty without actual bodily harm. She was granted conditional bail to appear in Parramatta Local Court on Tuesday 26 March 2024.

Previous arrests and charges were made at Bankstown where a 71-year-old woman was charged with two counts of dealing with the proceeds of crime; Bass hill where a 53-year-old man was charged with two counts of dealing with the proceeds of crime.

In Guildford police arrested two men, aged 50 and 19. The younger man was charged with supply a commercial quantity and possess prohibited drug, while the older man was charged with supply prohibited drug commercial quantity, two counts of possessing an unauthorised prohibited firearm, and possessing or using a prohibited weapon without a permit..

### **MEET OUR NEW COPS**

There are some new faces on the beat at local police stations with several new probationary constables joining police ranks.

For 20-year-old Lachlan Sedger, one of 3 new probationary constables assigned to The Hills Area Command, entering Castle Hill police station is a family tradition ... his mum, Acting Inspector Melissa Sedger a 26-year police veteran, was based at the Hills for several years.

At the attestation of Class 361 held at Goulburn on Friday 1st March NSW Police and Counter-terrorism Minister, Yasmin Catley welcomed the 158 attesting officers.

NSW Police Commissioner, Karen Webb said: "Policing is a job where we all have the chance to make a difference to the community we've been entrusted to serve and protect."

Recruits reported to their stations on Monday 4th March. They have to complete 12 months' on-the-job training and study by distance education with Charles Sturt University. They officially graduate with an Associate Degree in Policing Practice once they have passed all academic and operation standards.

Three new recruits have joined the ranks at The Hills Police Area Command, two have started at Hawkesbury PAC and three at Riverstone.



### Hills has new Top Cop

Superintendent Naomi Moore is the new Hills Police Area Commander. It is only the second time in over 100 years that Castle Hill police station has had a female officer in charge.

Supt Moore graduated from the Police Academy 27 years ago at the age of 19. For her it was the perfect career choice.

"I had wanted to be a police officer for as long as I can remember. I get great satisfaction out of helping others and I love that I can be active in my job and be part of something meaningful," she told the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News.

Prior to coming to The Hills PAC Superintendent Moore headed the NSW Police Governance Command for two years and before that she was at the Police Transport Command and operational commands at Kuring gai, Bankstown, Northern Beaches and Leichhardt.

"My heart has, and always will be in frontline policing as I believe this is where I have the greatest impact as a police officer," she says.

A keen sportswoman, she played "anything that was going" when young with netball, cricket, athletics and softball in the mix. She represented NSW in softball for many years and still plays and also still holds athletics records from the 1980s.

Supt Moore grew up in Lake Macquarie and lived in the Hills for 12 years before moving to the Hornsby Shire with her partner and four "very sporty" kids.

She says priorities for her new Command in the Hills are:

"Supporting my officers and providing them with the skills and resources that they need to do their job and being accessible to the community to help me understand what the community needs and expects from the police.

"As a detective I have a very strong focus on crime - preventing, disrupting and responding to it in a way that not only keeps the community safe but instils confidence in the community that police in The Hills will do everything they can to prevent people becoming victims and when it does occur, respond in a very professional manner.

"While all crime, and preventing it is my priority, domestic violence and youth-related crime is at the top of the list.

"(The Hills) is just a great place to live and work with plenty of localised groups working together supporting each other and the broader community - from Carlingford to Pennant Hills, across to Box Hill up to Maroota and all the suburbs in between, The Hills PAC is a large, diverse and growing community.

"I see opportunities to continue fostering police and community relationships, building



reducing crime and victims in this great area."


She also wants to encourage more women to go into policing, "Policing as a career has been very good to me, I have had incredible opportunities to develop my skills and communication from being a detective investigating serious criminal activity to supporting the Chief Risk Officer functions of our internal organisation.

"I encourage other women to consider policing as a career option - particularly with the added bonus of recent changes to recruitment with students being paid during the study phase of entry - in my view this is the best job ever".

Supt Moore replaces Supt Darrin Batchelor who has moved to Mt Druitt Police Area Command after 2 1/2 years in the Hills.



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### **Norwest Quarter**

Apartment living is becoming a bigger lifestyle choice amongst people downsizing in the Hills with Norwest developer Mulpha seeing an upsurge in demand.

Mulpha has sold more than 60 per cent of the first stage of its \$1 billion masterplanned mixeduse development Norwest Quarter.

The strong sales have been driven by a demand for bigger apartments, which has meant the original 196 apartments have been whittled down to 181 through floorplan amalgamation by buyers.

The Lacebark and Banksia towers in Stage 1 are the first of 8 residential towers in Norwest Quarter which will house over 2,000 residents. Plans include 6,000 m2 of space for cafes, restaurants, neighborhood shops and everyday services set within 3.8 hectares of greenfield land, up to 70 percent of which is to be dedicated to green, open space. Banksia and Lacebark will be carbon neutral in operation, providing residents with cheaper energy bills with 100 per cent electric and no gas provision.

Mulpha's Head of Development, Tim Spencer said the demand for quality apartments inNorwest reflects a change in mindset in how people view apartment living.

'The demand for quality apartments will continue to grow not just due to relative affordabilitybut also the lifestyle benefits. These include being able to live in a great location

close to transport connections, education and public amenities, parks and recreational facilities, all within a vibrant community.

"Many of the buyers are downsizers from the same area, as well as young families employed locally. Investors, recognising the projected growth in Norwest, have become more active participants in the community."

Norwest apartment purchaser, retired professor and former Education Department director Lindsay Wasson and his wife Diane are now purchasing an apartment in Norwest Quarter after having first purchased an apartment in Mulpha's Watermark building overlooking Norwest Lake in 2016.

"Our apartment building in Norwest Quarter is all-electric and has double glazing, solar roof panels, high-rating insulation, inspirational water and energy efficiency, EV charging in car spaces and the list goes on," said Lindsay.

"Combine these great elements (earning a NatHERS rating of 7.8) with Mulpha's outstanding build quality and the confidence we have in Mulpha, buying into Norwest Quarter is probably the best decision we have ever made."

Lindsay says the convenience and transport links of Norwest were a major consideration.

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### **Archibald Approaching**

If you missed seeing the Archibald Prize exhibition at the Art Gallery of NSW last year or you want to see it again the great news is that it is coming to Windsor.

The Archibald Prize 2023 regional tour will roll up to the Hawkesbury Regional Gallery from Friday, 15th March and stay until Sunday, 28th April, when the Gallery will open for extended hours with an exhibition program including artist talks.

It is an exciting opportunity to be a part of the regional tour – the last time it was exhibited in the Hawkesbury was in 2017.

The 2023 Archibald Prize attracted an incredible 949 entries. From these 57 finalists

were selected and for the first time ever, there were more works by women (30) than men (27) selected as finalists with significant representation of First Nations artists. The Archibald Prize is Australia's foremost portraiture prize. Awarded to the best portrait 'preferentially of some man or woman distinguished in arts, letters, science or politics, painted by any artist resident in Australasia', the Archibald Prize is a who's who of Australian culture, from politicians and celebrities to sporting heroes and artists.

The first Archibald Prize was awarded in 1921 to artist William Beckwith (Billy) McInnes. The 2023 winner was Julia Gutman with her work *Head in the sky, feet on the ground* which features singer Montaigne.

While the People's Choice Award went to Jaq Grantford's portrait of actor, writer and director

Noni Hazlehurst called *Through the window*, visitors to Hawkesbury Regional Gallery will have their own opportunity to vote for their favourite in the Hawkesbury's People's Choice Award.

### **VALE QUEEN** of Kellyville

Florence "Flo" Willcox (the unofficial Queen of Kellyville) who passed away at the age of 102 has been remembered as a community stalwart who genuinely cared for the people around her. The very full life of the great, great grandmother was celebrated at Kellyville Anglican Church in January when more than 200 people gathered to pay their respects.

The former District Commissioner of Girl Guides was a former President of Castle Hill Ladies Bowling Club (and was Patron) and President of Mitchell District Bowling Club and was still playing lawn bowls at the age of 93.

Born Florence Cassie Garner on May 1st 1921, she studied shorthand and typing to become a stenographer when she left school and during World War 2 enlisted in the Australian Women's Army Service to work in administration for the Army in several States.

She married Hector Willcox, a dairy farmer, in 1949 and they purchased a 50-acre property in Balmoral Rd, Kellyville which they named Severn Vale Farm after the Severn River in Gloucester, England where Hector had been born. They milked 150 Friesian cows and sold milk to United Dairies at North Rocks. When he died in 1975 the family closed the dairy.

Flo and her sons continued to live on the Kellyville property until most of the land was sold for commercial and housing development and stayed in the area. In 2018 Balmoral Road was renamed Hector Court and Flo moved to Bella Vista Gardens Nursing Home, a mere 300m from the old Farm's boundary where Woolworths new Grove shopping Centre exists, Local streets are named after family members including Florence.

Her son Dennis said his mother would love to be remembered as a community minded person who was genuine. Flo and Hector had 3 children (Jean who passed away, Dennis and Glen) and Flo was step mother to Graydon. She had 10 grandchildren, 22 great grandchildren and nine great, great grandchildren before she passed away in her sleep. She told her son Dennis she loved living in Kellyville because of the "country village feeling and community where everybody looked after each other."

### **Fagan Park**

Fagan Park, a hidden jewel in Galston offers 55 hectares of sprawling open space, 11 themed gardens, an eco-garden, playgrounds, bicycle paths, bushwalking trails, picnic/BBQ areas and so much more for the whole family.

Like many regional parks in Sydney, Fagan Park is also accompanied by an interesting history dating back to the early 1900's. The Fagan family were the pioneers of the citrus industry in Dural, Galston and Arcadia. William Fagan emigrated from Derry, Ireland as a free settler in 1948, married Ann Waddell and purchased 70 hectares of land at Arcadia where they established a successful citrus orchard. Two of William's Sons, Samuel and William (named after his father) learned the family business and expanded the citrus orchards to land they acquired in Dural. After Samuel married, he acquired the land at Galston, now known as Fagan Park, ran the largest the orchard in Galston and also constructed 'Netherby", the original family homestead made of handmade bricks which is still located on site today.

The Great Depression of the 1930s saw Samuel close his orchards, after which Fagan Park was utilised by his youngest brother Bruce to run a herd of Jersey Dairy cattle and a cattle breeding programme which involved constructing a dairy building and packing shed both of which remain on the property today. In 1980 Bruce Fagan and his sister, Ida, donated the original property, "Fagan Park," to the Department of Lands with Hornsby Council appointed the as the sole trustee for the park.

Fagan Park became Council's Bicentenary project in 1988. The Council successfully received a grant towards the "Garden of Many Nations" which overs 10 hectares of Fagan Park and features plants and flowers of countries across the globe including Japan, China, North and

South America, Africa, Great Britain, and the Netherlands. The original buildings on the site, 'Netherby', the milking complex and packing shed were also restored homestead, 'Netherby', together with the original milking complex and packing shed were also restored the bicentennial year. "Netherby" is regularly opened to the public and the packing shed and milking complex are used as a rural museum featuring heritage artefacts, where you can learn more about the history of the area.

Adding to the attractions at Fagan Park, Council has added a very popular eco-garden to educate the community about sustainable gardening through open days, workshops and school holiday programs. There are plans in place to create a Children's Forest which will be the first park in NSW designed to encourage children to connect with and become responsible stewards of nature. When completed the Children's Forest will also include a tree house, hidden sculptures for children to find, informal discovery trails and a pond.

Fagan Park is fast becoming one of our favourite parks to visit with the various gardens from around the world to explore, paths to meander along with signage outlining the history of Fagan Park, large playgrounds to enjoy, places to sit near the lake to watch the ducks and the turtles swim and on the weekends a mobile café is on site selling coffee, food and of course ice cream!

### **PETA GETS INTO GEAR**

Peta Patrice is a first-year Heavy Vehicle student completing her apprenticeship with Complete Sweep in the Hawkesbury region.

The Richmond local is one of 10 women enrolled at TAFE NSW Wetherill Park in Certificate III in Heavy Commercial Vehicle Mechanical Technology – one of the highest ever female enrolments at the campus.

Diesel Motor Mechanics have been on the Skills Priority List for the past three years, with the June 2023 report finding the estimated vacancy fill rate was particularly low for occupations in Automotive Trades.

It is a growing industry in Western Sydney, with Labour Market data showing the region's Transport, Postal and Warehousing industry grew by 10,000 workers in the past year, with an 80 per cent male workforce.

Peta had previous experience with heavy vehicles, but wanted to achieve her accreditation, and so began her apprenticeship at TAFE NSW.

She says she has always been drawn to the practical skills needed in mechanics.

"I have always loved the hands-on nature of working with vehicles. Completing this apprenticeship at TAFE NSW is an opportunity for me to turn a passion into a career," she said. "It will mean I can work in an industry I'm interested in, where there is plenty of work, and can earn a good income, and stay living

"Being a woman in a male dominated industry can be daunting, but my teachers at TAFE NSW are incredibly supportive and encouraging, as is my employer."

Workshop manager Corey Brownlow at Complete Sweep says Peta is proving to be a promising employee, eager to learn and demonstrating initiative.

"Heavy vehicles can be complex to work with and you need to have the right attitude. Peta has already shown she has the desire to learn and build her skills, which is what we look for in this industry," Corey said.

"Peta is the first female employee we've had in the workshop. We've had several women operating our vehicles, but it's great to have Peta here behind the scenes.

"Being an apprentice is the best way to accelerate a career in automotive and provides a real pathway to more senior positions. There's strong demand for skilled heavy vehicle workers across western Sydney, so it's great to have TAFE NSW delivering the courses locally."

TAFE NSW Heavy Vehicle Teacher Tuliana Morell is the first female to hold the role at TAFE NSW Wetherill Park and said it's an exciting time for women joining the industry.

"I've never worked with another female heavy vehicle mechanic, but the industry



is starting to see more women enter the workforce, and I get to be part of it by imparting my knowledge to a generation of young women it's a very rewarding job," Tuliana said.

"TAFE NSW Wetherill Park is the largest delivery point of automotive training in Australia and we're providing leading industry-relevant training, so all students gain the skills they need to thrive in the automotive industry."




On Sunday, May 19th dog morning returns. The last lap for the 2024 Hills Relay is just before 10am on Sunday May 19th.

### Western Sydney deserves to keep more of what it earns

Western Sydney is vast, dynamic and diverse. Its many communities have unique experiences and challenges. It is not a uniform place, however there is one uniform statement that rings true: Western Sydney deserves to keep more of what it earns. This is why we are delivering tax cuts to every taxpayer in Western Sydney - all 902,000 of them. MEMORIES WITH IVOR JONES & FRIENDS

Easter means a number of things to different people. Some regard the season as a significant religious occasion (which it is), others may think of the Royal Easter Show and all its attractions, whilst chocoholics think of a time to binge on chocolate Easter Eggs.



It is the thought of chocolates that comes to mind in this article. Chocolate manufacturers make Easter a time of mass marketing. Back in the mid-1960s when I worked in the centre of Sydney, I noticed that Red Tulip, which also at the time owned the Ricci Remond chocolate brand, would send brochures and catalogues from which to choose Easter Eggs and chocolate gift packs for sale to give to family and friends, to social clubs in offices, shops and factories. The social club would presumably receive a commission on sales made.

The Royal Easter Show at the Sydney Showground, later at Olympic Park at Homebush, also provided an opportunity for the promotion and marketing of chocolate products, Darrell Lea, Cadbury and other manufacturers had showbag stands.

As time went on, many Australian brands of confectionary became parts of major international companies, including manufacturers such as Hoadley's, whose major brands included "Violet Crumble" and "Polly Waffle". Interestingly, Hoadley's originally wanted to call the product just plain simple "Crumble", however were convinced to name it after Mrs. Hoadley's favourite flower "Violet" hence it became "Violet Crumble". Later, the company became part of Rowntree-MacIntosh which, even later, became part of Nestlé. Both Violet Crumble and Polly Waffle have since

reverted to Australian ownership as part of the South Australian company of Robert Menz.

In the early-mid 2000s, Nestlé withdrew the Bertie Beetle Showbag (another former Hoadley product) from sale at annual shows, citing production costs as the product was now manufactured in New Zealand and shipped to Australia. A public campaign was started pressuring Nestlé to bring back the showbag, which was a crowd favourite. In 2007 Nestlé relented and the showbag was again available, first reappearing in that year's Sydney Royal Easter Show. In 2006 the price of the showbag, traditionally \$2, was raised to \$3, resulting in public backlash. In 2007 the showbag returned to its previous price.

Darrell Lea was always a popular showbag stall at the show. Jason Lea Jnr, a great grandson of the founder, has a photograph of which he is extremely proud. The photograph shows Jason as a stocky and bearded man in his thirties with a boater hat and a broad grin shaking hands with a Doug Sutherland, then Lord Mayor of Sydney. Behind him are rows of young employees and a huge mountain of show bags filled with Darrell Lea products. It was taken at the Royal Easter Show in 1983 for the best display in the Royal Hall of Industries.

Jason was a showman. He certainly enjoyed working at such shows and speaks with glee of his time at the shows whilst also displaying his

sadness at what happened to what was once a unique family-owned company. Following his success at the 1983 Easter show he followed up in 1986 at the Easter Show with other successful marketing innovations.

Once, to rid the company of excess Easter Eggs, he removed silver paper wrapping from the eggs and smashed about a dozen of the eggs in big clear plastic bags and continued until he had a quite a few bags. He went out of the front of the stall holding a bag of chocolate calling out "The boys have just had an accident out the back and dropped a load of eggs. The first one with twenty bucks in their hand can have them." The bags sold out very quickly, with Jason repeating this story giving time for the public to move on so that he had a fresh audience on each occasion.

Another innovation he tried at Brisbane in 1984, where the use of a microphone to spruik was banned, he penned a jingle which, when sung by the whole staff, reverberated throughout the hall.

"Golly gosh golly gee, Here it is from Darrell Lea Hurry hurry, snappy snappy Here's the bag to make you happy, Goodness gracious, goodness me, Buy a bag from Darrell Lea."

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Sydney Hills Gymnastics were big winners at the recent Gymnastics NSW's awards night. They were crowned the Men's Gymnastics Club of the Year, Men's Gymnastics International Coaching Team of the Year and Men's Gymnastics Junior Development Coaching Team of the Year, while four of their athletes also won awards..

Sydney Hills Gymnastics, which runs classes in Castle Hill and Bella Vista, nabbed nine medals at the Australian Gymnastics Championships and won 13 medals at international events.

Artistic gymnast **Daniel Chalabov**, 16, was named Men's Gymnastics Junior International Athlete of the Year. He represented Australia at the Austrian Future Cup, winning gold medals in the all-around, pommel and parallel bars events. He won gold on pommel and silver on rings at the Olympic Hopes Cup.

Noah Saad, 9, won the Men's Gymnastics International Development Athlete of the Year Award. He is the reigning state champion in his age group, having won gold on floor, pommel horse, rings, parallel bars and high bar. Catherine Boffa and Hana Heo were named Acrobatic Gymnastics Senior Levels Group of the Year. The Level 9 pair built on their scores throughout state and national events, finishing the 2023 season as Australian champions.

Vassili Trofimov, Director and Head Coach of Sydney Hills Gymnastics, said 2023 was their club's most successful year.

"Our mission is to nurture each gymnast to reach their full potential," Trofimov, said. "The recent recognition of both our gymnasts and coaching team through the Gymnastics NSW Awards fills me with great pride.

In 2023, the club had its first Special Olympics competitor while they had multiple state representatives in mainstream events.

Club owner Adam Rose said the award is a recognition for the whole club. "This award means a lot, because it's a reward for the hard work that goes into everything to make the club a success," Rose said.

"It's recognition for all our staff and everyone behind the scenes. Being nominated was a big honour, especially as there are many amazing large clubs within NSW. We just opened a ninja centre to offer variety and welcome more children with different interests."



Thompson's miracle win ends title drought

Jordan Thompson's hard work is paying off big time. Picture: Courtesy Tennis Australia Hills tennis star Jordan Thompson finally broke one of the longest title droughts on the ATP Tour when he lifted the Los Cabos crown in Mexico. His "miracle win", playing three matches in seven hours, made him one of the oldest men's players, at 29 years, to win his first ATP singles trophy.

The Oakhill College alumni conquered world number 12 and three-time grand slam finalist Casper Ruud of Norway 6-3 7-6 (4) in the Los Cabos final. However, Australia's second-ranked player (behind Alex de Minaur), did not have time to celebrate as he returned to the same court in the doubles semifinal, where he and his Davis Cup teammate Max Purcell beat Ruud and American Will Blumberg 7-6 (1) 6-3.

Thompson and Purcell then annexed the doubles title with a tough 7-5 7-6 (2) win in the late night final over Gonzalo Escobar and Aleksandr Nedovyesov.

"We've been putting in some seriously hard work and it's good to see that it pays off," the eighth seeded Thompson told journalists. "It's been a journey. I'm nearly 30 and lifting a trophy, I never thought I'd do that."

Thompson was also involved in the longest match in this tournament, stunning top seed Sascha Zverev of Germany 7-5, 4-6, 7-6 (2) in

three hours and 40 minutes, the match finishing about 1 am on Saturday.

Thompson scored his most famous victory in January when he defeated tennis legend Rafael Nadal 5-7, 7-6 (8-6), 6-3 in the Brisbane International, after saving three match points.

"I spent so many hours on the court this week," Thompson said. "In the quarter-final (against American Alex Michelsen), I could have been double bagelled. I could have been losing 6-0, 6-0. And now I'm about to lift the trophy, so I think it's still a miracle," Thompson said.

Thompson earned \$212,000 for his singles title while he and Purcell shared \$74,000 for their doubles crown.

Thompson becomes the first man since fellow Australian Nick Kyrgios in Washington DC two years ago, to win both the singles and doubles titles in an ATP Tour event. Thompson is now at a career-high ranking of world No. 32

### HILLS WOMEN OFF TO GRAND START

Hills United FC thumped South East Phoenix 7-0 to kick off the new FNSW Women's One season in grand style on Sunday. The Hills led 3-0 at half time. Kaylie Shannon starred with a hat-trick, finding the net in the 37th, 55th and 87th minutes. Isabella Scibberas scored a brace while Bella Donaldson and Ashleigh Heuston-Richardson fired the other goals as the Hills women went on the rampage.

### HILLS MEN FINDING IT TOUGH

Newly-promoted Hills United FC suffered two successive losses in the National Premier Leagues Men's NSW football competition.

After their opening round victory over Sydney Olympic, Hills United were beaten 2-1 by Western Sydney Wanderers and 5-3 by Central Coast Mariners on Sunday.

While the Wanderers scored a 2-1 win, the Mariners had dig deep to pluck a thrilling 5-3 victory over Hills United FC who led 2-1 at half time. Anthony Frangie, Caleb Jackson-Brown and Yu Okuno scored for Hills United. The Hills team were thwarted by the Mariners keeper Dylan Peraic-Cullen who made two impressive saves in the first half. Hills United defeated the Mariners 2-1 in their Under-20 clash.






