FLOOD WASTE ACCEPTED FREE OF CHARGE BY HAWKESBURY CITY COUNCIL

The Hawkesbury City Waste Management Facility is accepting flood waste free of charge from Hawkesbury residential properties impacted by the recent floods. Residents who are attending the Waste Management Facility are asked to show patience, kindness, and respect to all onsite staff. Traffic control will be in place over the weekend.

Flood waste should not contain prohibited items like soil, fibro, or asbestos. Loads will be checked at the weighbridge as usual. Loads containing asbestos or any other prohibited waste will be rejected. These cannot be accepted even if it is flood waste.

The Waste Management Facility is open to Hawkesbury Local Government Area residents from 8am to 4pm, 7 days a week (excluding public holidays). Please bring proof of address such as a Driver's Licence or Rates Notice. Please note that charges apply for all other waste that is not flood waste and for residential properties that are not flood affected.

The NSW Reconstruction Authority's Pop-Up Flood Recovery Centre that was at Windsor Function Centre is now closed.

Memorial Ave Upgrade

Years of roadworks at Memorial Ave Kellyville should finish by the end of 2024 as Stage 1 of the \$224 million project ends and stage 2 begins.

Recent wet weather delayed the planned opening of six lanes on Old Windsor Road at the junction with Memorial Ave this week.

Preliminary work on Memorial Ave, which connects Old Windsor Road and Windsor Road, started in 2019 with electrical works undertaken but public consultation started in 2013.

The busy 2.2km stretch of road, which was used by 30,000 drivers a day before work started and housing development expanded, has been a major road blackspot over the years with multiple accidents.

A report in 2015 detailed that in a five year period there had been 72 crashes resulting in one fatality and 54 people injured.

Civil Engineering Group Daracon was awarded the contract for the main Memorial Ave works in 2020. The finished project will see the two-lane road expanded to four lanes with a future capacity to expand it to six lanes as the area develops.

Stage one the new road has been constructed on the southern side of the existing Memorial Avenue between Old Windsor Road and Hector Court, and on the northern side between Hector Court and Windsor Road.

The first of the twin bridges over Strangers Creek was also built during stage 1, and traffic was aligned onto the eastbound bridge and new road to allow construction of Stage 2.

As Stage 2 starts it will see the new road built opposite Stage 1 and the second part of Strangers Creek bridge to be completed. The wide central median strip will be landscaped, and traffic will be realigned to provide two lanes in both directions.

Labor Spokesperson for Kellyville, Peter Primrose MLC said the new lanes at the intersection of Old Windsor Road will help improve traffic flow and save motorists time.

"The Memorial Avenue upgrade is well on the way, and once complete, will be a gamechanger for our growing community."

"This upgrade will help to manage current traffic as well as allow for the expected increases in traffic with residential and commercial development in the area."

Castle Hill MP Mark Hodges said he was pleased that the project, announced by the former State Government in 2020, was nearer completion.

"I am pleased motorists travelling between Blacktown and Castle Hill will now see the benefits of the improved network.

The Memorial Avenue upgrade will reduce travel times and congestion for motorists and improve road safety.

The key benefits to the community include:

- Increasing road capacity to cater for traffic growth:
- Improving safety for motorists through the installation of traffic lights and a central median to separate traffic travelling in opposing directions;
- Improving safety for cyclists and pedestrians by providing off-road shared paths;
- Improving travel times between Blacktown and Castle Hill:
- Improving access and travel times for road freight;
- Improving bus accessibility at traffic lights;
- Improved street lighting and landscaping; and
- Facilitating the development of the Balmoral Road release area precinct.

STABBING DEATH

A 26-year-old man has been charged with murder following a stabbing in Quakers Hill on Friday 26th April.

Emergency services were called to Narcissus Avenue, Quakers Hill, following reports of a stabbing at about 8.25pm.

Officers attached to Riverstone Police Area Command arrived to find a 28-year-old man with stab wounds to his chest. He was treated at the scene by NSW Ambulance paramedics before being taken to hospital in a critical condition, however he died on the way.

On Sunday (28th April) at about 1.35pm officers attached to Burwood Police Area Command stopped a vehicle on Nipper Street, Strathfield, and arrested a 26-year-old man.

He was taken to Burwood Police Station where he was charged by detectives attached to Riverstone Police Area Command and the State Crime Command's Homicide Squad with murder.

Anyone with information about this incident is urged to contact Crime Stoppers. Information is treated in strict confidence.

STOLEN SUV

A boy is due to appear in children's court today charged after a SUV stolen from Baulkham Hills crashed and caught fire at Seven Hills early on Sunday morning (28th April).

Officers attached to Cumberland Police Area Command were patrolling Goodall Street, Pendle Hill, about 12.05am when an SUV passed them without headlights.

Police attempted to stop the driver; however, they allege the direction was ignored, and a pursuit was initiated.

The SUV continued along the Cumberland Highway and onto Old Windsor Road before turning onto Seven Hills Road, allegedly at high speed.

As the vehicle turned onto Abbott Road it hit an electrical box and caught alight with the driver – and sole occupant – running away.

A perimeter was established and a short time later a police dog tracked down a 15-yearold boy who was arrested and taken to Granville Police Station.

The teen was charged with police pursuit – not stop – drive recklessly, and drive conveyance taken without consent of owner. He's been refused bail and will appear in Parramatta Children's Court today.

The SUV was reported stolen from a home in Baulkham Hills on Thursday 25th April.

DV SUPPORT

The Hills Police Area Command, in partnership with the Women's Domestic Violence Court Advocacy Service (WDVCAS), are continuing an initiative to support vulnerable women who are subjected to domestic violence that require additional support and are not able to attend a Police Station.

CHARGES LAID

Detectives attached to Strike Force Sweetenham have charged one adult and two teens following inquiries into the alleged theft of two luxury vehicles from a Dural property.

Police say a white convertible Ferrari and a BMW sedan were allegedly stolen from a property on Old Northern Road, Dural between 3am and 3.45am on Tuesday 16th April.

Following inquiries, officers located the vehicles parked outside premises on Perigee Close, Doonside, later that day.

At about 2am on Friday (19th April), a Mazda CX-9 was allegedly stolen from Constitution Hill.

The vehicle was sighted on Richmond Road, Prospect, and briefly pursued by officers attached to Highway Patrol before being terminated on the Great Western Highway.

About 2.30am the vehicle was sighted abandoned on Doig Street, Northmead.

A short time later – with the assistance of Polair and the Dog Unit – three people were located in bushland near Hood Street, Northmead.

An 18-year-old man and two boys, aged 15 and 17, were arrested.

The 15-year-old was charged with 15 counts of break and enter offences, 14 counts of stolen vehicle offences, as well as being the first person charged under Section154K – performance crime offence (Post and Boast), and breach of bail.

The 17-year-old was charged with aggravated break enter and steal, and be carried in conveyance without consent.

The 18-year-old man was charged with aggravated break enter and steal, and be carried in conveyance without consent.

About 9.40pm on Friday 19th April he was charged with a further 12 counts of aggravated break and enter offences, 10 counts of stolen vehicle offences, and charged under Section 154K – Performance crime offence (Post and Boast).

Officers from the North West Region Response Squad supported by Hills Police have arrested say the break and enters included: Murrayfield Ave, Kellyville April 6th, and Bernabeau Street North Kellyville on April 7th.

Nurses Protest BY BEV JORDAN

Staff at Hawkesbury District Health Service are celebrating a huge win after Health NSW agreed to transfer leave entitlements when the running of Hawkesbury Hospital transfers from St John of God to the Department of Health at the end of June.

The announcement came on Tuesday (April 30th) following months of anxiety.

Hawkesbury District Health Service has been operated by St John of God Health Care for the past eight years since the service was transferred from Catholic Care which had run the hospital since 1996.

Over 700 staff at the 131-bed hospital were informed in March that their accrued annual and long service leave would not be transferred due to legal implications between private sector and public sector systems.

Nurses and midwives protested outside Hawkesbury Hospital at Windsor in their own time last week calling for a smooth and seamless transition, fearing they wouldn't have any leave available from July 1.

Branch secretary of the NSW Nurses and Midwives Association Hawkesbury District Health Service, Ben Wright, (representing over 200 staff) said the decision was a "huge relief".

He said over 100 people had joined last week's rally outside the hospital which was supported by both Liberal State MP Robyn Preston and Federal Labor MP Susan Templeman.

"We ran a petition on change org which received more than 2,000 signatures in just a weekend." He said locals were very supportive of their stance.

He said the letter informing staff that entitlements could not be transferred but would be paid out was a "massive shock" to staff members and would have affected the "most loyal and hardworking" staff.

He said some staff had accrued hundreds of hours to take when they needed for surgery and recovery, family reasons or transition to retirement option. "It wasn't about the money but about the time available to them and the tax bill."

Staff were told on Tuesday afternoon (April 30th) that their entitlements would be transferred.

"We are so grateful," said Ben.

NSWNMA Hawkesbury District Health Service Branch Delegate, Ann Jackson, who has worked at the hospital for almost 30 years, said it showed what could be achieved when members and the community banded together.

'So many healthcare workers and their families came together to support our own-time rally last week, and it really demonstrated what a fantastic community we have in the Hawkesbury.



now recognised this and has found a solution that allows us to keep our well-earned leave entitlements," she said.

"We are very appreciative to the NSWNMA. NSW Health and St John of God Health Care for working together to resolve this for us."

NSWNMA General Secretary, Shaye Candish, said it was a fantastic result for Hawkesbury's hardworking nurses and midwives."We thank the NSW Government and St John of God Health Care for working collaboratively with us on this issue to achieve a positive outcome for staff. We know this has been an incredibly stressful and anxious time for our members, so this decision means a lot to them and their families."

Local South Windsor Artist and TAFE teacher, Cameron Marbus, is looking to change the public perception of graffiti art.

As a TAFE teacher for Signwriting, Cameron partnered up with his friends. Andrew and Paul, to paint a free mural outside the back of FoodWorks in South Windsor. This particular street-art, like many of Cameron's around the area, has been praised by the local public for its positivity and uplifting image.

"I live local and I've always seen the wall and asked Allen, the owner of Foodworks, do you mind if we do something for free? It was a great Easter weekend, we spent the whole thing laughing and doing what we love. That's something that money can't put a price on.

Another recent project over Christmas in 2023, was the revitalised Heritage Water Tank along the Windsor promenade in conjunction with Windsor Rotary club. This joint project sought iconic symbols from Windsor's rich agriculture but also aimed to bring a sense of youth culture to the historical area.

"My biggest drive wasn't money, but trying to prove what graffiti actually was. A lot of us

are guite skillful in the art and have gone to build professional careers".

However, Cameron acknowledged the stigma surrounding graffiti art, and with 27 years of experience, he has seen firsthand the lack of respect with tagging culture. "I don't blame anyone for thinking what they do about graffiti, until they've met someone like me where I can kind of shake that grey area away. Years ago, the public thought we were all the same. It's been a hard 10-15 years, but my friends and I have all grown up here and believe that going around doing these free murals has really shifted the perception. Now, people come up to us and compliment our work, even offering free cold drinks!"

Winning the Hawkesbury Business Award in 2023 and 2022 for 'Entertainment and the Arts', Cameron runs his business Aerosol Obsessions and praises Graffiti for building his confidence. A lot of his work features an emphasis of 'Lettering', a street-art stylethat focuses on bright and bold text as the centrepiece for his work.

Changing the stereotype for young people, Cameron partnered up with one of his friends, Paul Zoeller from Paul Riot to create the 'Walls Out West Paint Jam' in 2023.

This event aimed at celebrating Western Sydney Street Art for emerging artists and had a live painting of over 20 murals. At present, Cameron is also working with Blacktown Council to create a series of workshops to create safe spaces for young people to practice, with ambitions for more and asks people:

"Don't just write us off as delinquent and don't write the kids off either!"

The Spectacular Hawkesbury Show by Sophie Poredos

The humble origins of the Hawkesbury Show in 1845 at Clarendon marked its establishment as an Agricultural Show. With crowd popularity, it eventually formed as the Hawkesbury District Agricultural Association in 1879. Ever since then, the Hawkesbury Show has been hailed as a family favourite and has been put on almost every year.

However, the Hawkesbury Show in 2024 conjures images of chip-on-a-stick, decadent show bags and elaborate face painting. I attended the opening Friday evening on the 19th of April and was incredibly inspired by the young exhibitors in the main arena including the Hot Wheels Stunt Team and the show jumping competitors

Pursuing the rows of beautiful market stalls, there was something for everyone; from candles, honey and surprisingly, a computer-read tarot experience. Even the showbag warehouse seemed to draw an endless crowd, with crowd favourites such as Bertie Beetle making their appearance.

But perhaps the most unique and overlooked experience isn't the daring roller coasters that made you sick simply by staring at them - but the sense of community that the Hawkesbury Show seems to ignite.

As NSW's biggest regional agricultural show, I spoke to some of the craft stalls within the Hawkesbury Pavilion to understand the role

of the community within exciting events like these. With their products out for display, the community was invited to share in their various crafting endeavours.

Funeral for FARAZ BY BEV JORDAN

An estimated 1,000 people attended the funeral to honour security officer Faraz Tahir at Baitul Huda Mosque at Marsden Park on Friday (26th April).

Faraz lost his life trying to protect people from a knifeman at Westfield Bondi Junction on Saturday, 13th April.

Five women stabbed on that day also died, Jade Young, Ashlee Good, Dawn Singleton, Pikria Darchia, and Yixuan Cheng. Twelve others were wounded, including Ashlee's nine-monthold daughter and security guard Muhammad Taha. He left Royal Prince Alfred Hospital to attend the funeral in a wheelchair. He said: "It's very painful. I can't even sleep. Lots of nightmares."

Faraz, a refugee from Pakistan, would have turned 31 this week. He was a member of the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community and volunteered his time with a Muslim youth organisation. It was his first day shift at Westfield Bondi Junction when a 40-year-old knifeman started attacking people that Saturday afternoon.

Faraz's family members, including his three brothers, travelled from overseas to be at the service. His eldest brother Mudasar Bashir said: "He was very brave and he was strong ... he was the bravest person I've ever seen."



Inamul Haq Kauser, President of the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community of Australia said: "His sacrifice has been recognised by all Australians. Although he was a stranger in this country ... he sacrificed his life for all Australians."

He said an annual blood donation program has been set up in Faraz's name ... giving blood to save others.

Mourners at Friday's service included Prime Minister Anthony Albanese and Premier Chris Minns.

GIVING BLOOD

The campaign, Faraz's Gift, has been established in partnership with Red Cross Lifeblood to encourage Australians to give blood.

Adnan Qadir, President of AMYA, said: "With 'Faraz's Gift,' we honor Faraz and the five courageous individuals who lost their lives, by inviting Australians to help continue their legacy. This blood drive is a tribute to their spirit of community service and bravery."

Mr Albanese said Faraz's life was about giving back.

"His kindness uplifted all those it touched – and it inspired all those who witnessed it.

"It is so fitting that the Ahmadiyya Muslim community are helping honour Faraz Tahir's life with a blood drive.

""Faraz Tahir gave everything to help others: his time, his energy, his optimism and dedication, his heart and his soul. And on that devastating Saturday afternoon at Bondi Junction, he gave his life. Running toward danger, to protect people he had never even met. Without doubt, he helped save lives that day. Without question, Faraz Tahir died a hero."

Following the ceremony Faraz was buried at Riverstone Cemetery.







Help, Where did my hearing go?

RECOGNISING AND ADDRESSING SUDDEN SENSORINEURAL HEARING LOSS

Sudden sensorineural hearing loss can catch anyone off guard. It can affect one or both ears, it may leave you feeling like your ears are underwater or blocked, and possibly accompanied by ringing or buzzing sounds. Why an Audiologist or Audiometrist?

GPs may lack the tools to diagnose sudden hearing loss. While they certainly can inspect your ears, most do not have the equipment to perform detailed hearing tests identifying if a sudden sensorineural hearing loss may be the cause for your complaint. Our clinicians can assess various parts of your hearing and ears comprehensively, pinpointing issues like a sudden hearing loss and advise the best course of action.

Why the urgency?

Sudden sensorineural hearing loss is indeed a medical emergency. The sooner targeted treatment can commence, the more likely a successful outcome is, and your hearing can be restored. In some cases, the hearing loss may recover partially or not at all, which is why it is important to seek treatment maximising the chances of recovery.

Sudden sensorineural hearing loss can be caused by swelling in blood vessels supplying the inner ear. Treatment is prescribed by your GP or ENT and aims to reduce swelling and restore blood flow to the affected area promptly, therefore minimising any permanent damage. The causes of sudden hearing loss can vary, often it remains a mystery. However, swift intervention is the key for recovery, regardless of the cause.

Don't ignore sudden changes in your hearing.

Take the proactive step of scheduling an appointment with a clinician at an audiology clinic - no referrals are needed for adults. They'll conduct assessments, report and collaborate with your GP on treatment plans, and refer you to specialists if necessary.

While sudden sensorineural hearing loss requires urgent attention, other ear issues like infections or wax blockages may produce similar symptoms but are less time-sensitive. After the incredible success of the inaugural Hills domestic violence awareness and fundraising evening in 2023, the event returns to Norwest Rydges on May 16.

The event forms part of the domestic violence prevention month, which aims to raise awareness of the devastating impact domestic and family violence has on individuals, families and the community at large.

In the past two weeks we have seen the alleged domestic violence murders of Molly Ticehurst, Emma Bates and Erica Hay. We have seen the outrage and the numerous rallies that have been held around the country including right here in the Hills.

According to Destroy the Joint, a Facebook page committed to recording the deaths of women as result of violence, 28 women already have lost their lives this year across Australia – almost double the number of deaths since the same period in 2023.

The domestic and family scourge is getting worse not better, and more has to be done to bring the violence to an end.

This year's speaker at the Hills domestic awareness and fundraising evening is Gwen Cherne, the inaugural Veteran Family Advocate Commissioner. Gwen's career has taken her all around the world, including the US, Australia, Afghanistan, Africa, Central and South America, and the Caribbean. She also has her own lived experience of military family life, mental health issues and recovery, family and domestic violence and intimate partner violence.

The funds raised from the event will go to support the DV programs run by Hills Community Aid (HCA) and the Hills Transitional Housing Project.

In the past year alone there has been a 28% increase in the number of people asking HCA for help as a result of domestic violence. From the funds raised from last year's event 74 clients have been helped so far.

One example is Suzie*, a client of HCA who recently escaped with her 6 children from domestic violence. Her ex-partner burnt all their clothes and threatened to burn the children's Christmas gifts. He has since been charged with damage and assault and the family have some assurance of safety now that an AVO is in place against him. Through funds raised from the DV Fundraiser HCA assisted Suzie and her children in purchasing new clothes, and essential food items.

Another example of the people the funds raised from last year is Carly*, a single parent with 3 dependents aged 17, 13 & 12 years who had fled the family home because of domestic violence. As a result of funds raised from last year's event, HCA was able to assist Carly with vouchers to purchase food and essential items for her and the children.

Mici Beer, CEO of HCA is encouraging as many people as possible to attend this year's event.

"We need your support! Our community needs your support! Every year we are experiencing an increase in the number of people who are experiencing Domestic and Family Violence who need our assistance. Please purchase a ticket and join us at The Hills Domestic Violence Fundraiser on 16 May" she said.

As a result of funds raised from last year's event the Hills Transitional Housing project now has two houses in operation and is housing women and children who would have otherwise been homeless.



Expo organisers say the event is gathering more and more interest as people seek alternative solutions to a multitude of pressures from rental stress, the housing crisis, aged care alternatives, and options for young people wanting to save rental money.

"While initially the tiny house movement was in the realm of alternative lifestyles, a greener solution and coming from the aspect of having less 'stuff', in more recent years it has attracted a much wider audience in search of solutions to an array of issues, the most obvious one being the housing crisis," said expo organiser Phae Barrett. "The tiny houses are also a hit for hospitality set-ups such as Farm Stay and AirBNB, enticing many acreage owners to utilise space as an income stream".

The Hills Shire and Hawkesbury City Councils have welcomed the NSW Government's announcement that it will accept the management of the Lower Portland Ferry, with the transfer anticipated to occur later this year.

The announcement follows years of advocacy work by both councils and the Member for Hawkesbury Robyn Preston MP calling for the ferry to be managed by the State Government like the other ferries on the Hawkesbury River.

Hawkesbury City Mayor Sarah McMahon said the decision made perfect sense.

"Hawkesbury City Council has been asking Transport for NSW to take on the management of the ferry for some time, and this decision is very much a welcome one," Mayor McMahon

"This is a win for the Council and a win for the community. This will allow for the seamless and efficient coordination of all ferry services in the Hawkesbury and The Hills under one authority to deliver a more predictable service for motorists.

"Until now, Lower Portland Ferry was one of the very few in NSW that was still being managed at the local government level. This

decision brings this ferry in line with the vast majority of others across the State."

Mayor of The Hills Shire Council, Dr Peter Gangemi said this outcome would be beneficial for the community.

"Alongside Hawkesbury City Council and the Member for Hawkesbury Robyn Preston, The Hills Shire Council has been advocating for Transport for NSW to take over this service for many years," Mayor Gangemi said.

"The decision paves the way for greater collective local and state government investment in the rural parts of The Hills Shire and the Hawkesbury Local Government Areas.

"I would like to thank the residents, Robyn Preston and the Councillors and staff of both councils who have been tirelessly fighting for this outcome."

Member for Hawkesbury Robyn Preston MP stated: "I have been a strong advocate for

preserving the ferry service since becoming the Member for Hawkesbury. This has resulted in securing funding to keep the ferry running, followed by the NSW Government taking over the ferry's management. I am grateful to the community and both the Hawkesbury and The Hills councils for supporting my efforts. This is a great outcome for the community, and it will benefit residents, businesses, and tourism in this beautiful section of The Hills and the Hawkesbury."

Transport for NSW will commence management of the ferry from 1 October 2024, with negotiations for an earlier transfer currently underway.

Lower Portland Ferry is currently out of service while essential maintenance is carried out. Work is on track to be completed in late April/early May.

HILLS RELAY FOR LIFE BY BEV JORDAN

Former Castle Hill High School Captain Lachlan Forrest was in Year 9 when he took part in his first Hills Relay For Life event.

Lachlan, who now volunteers on the Hills Relay For Life orgainising committee said the 2019 Relay was "mind blowing".

He said supporting the event, which raises funds for the Cancer Council, is important to him as he was three years old when he lost his dad, Jeffrey, to cancer.

"I always wanted to be involved in supporting the Cancer Council," he said.

The youngest of the three children (his brother was six years old and his sister four) when his dad died.

"My dad had kidney cancer diagnosed in June 202, two months after my brother was born, and had his kidney removed. He had an 18-hour operation in August 2004 (when cancer returned) and had radiation therapy. In 2008 he was diagnosed yet again with cancer in his chest, had another round of radiation and died later that year. He's the reason I Relay," said Lachlan.

He said taking part in Relay was an opportunity to do something positive.

"I went from having an individual pain to a shared pain and we are all motivated for the same outcome. The atmosphere is amazing, it is a very different experience and very hard to explain."

Lachlan says walking the track with friends from his school and others has been a highlight.

Castle Hill High School students and staff have been supporting the Hills Relay For Life since the first event held at Castle Hill Showaround in 2001.

Several other local schools have been involved for many years.

Lachlan now volunteers on the community organising committee and is co-ordinating schools at the event.

This year eight high schools have registered to join the 2024 Hills Relay For Life which starts at 9am on May 18th and finishes on Sunday morning. Castle Hill High will be joined by students and staff from Crestwood High at Baulkham Hills, Kellyville High, Rouse Hill Anglican College, Glenwood High, The Kings School and Hills Grammar at Kenthurst. Baulkham Hills High is also supportive.

Schools have been fundraising at a furious pace with Glenwood High already raising over \$11,000, Castle Hill High over \$7,000, Rouse Hill Anglican College over \$5,000 and Kellyville High nearly \$3,500.

Many visitors know and love the roses that grow in the Netherby homestead garden. These roses have been here for many years, withstanding droughts, excessive rain, and Covid, when there were no visitors or gardeners for months.

At either side of the entrance to Netherby stand large bushes of a fragrant pink heritage Tea rose, named the Comtesse de Laplante, welcoming visitors to a bygone era. The multipetalled flowers nod down, a soft contrast to the old paling fence.

Walking towards the house, the path curves to the right, beside the west verandah, enclosing a wide garden bed. This protected site is perfect for roses, with abundant sunshine.

Here you'll find The Fairy, a low growing rose from 1932, with clusters of very small bright pink flowers and a slight apple fragrance. In this garden modern and heritage roses mix happily, a testament to both the origin of Netherby, built in 1900, and also to its long life as home to the Fagan family, until 1980, when Bruce Fagan and his sister Ida donated their property to the people of NSW.

The generous spirit which inspired this gift makes the house and garden very special. A team of four gardening members of the Friends of Fagan enjoy caring for the Netherby garden, keeping it blooming for visitors.

The path passes bright pink Bonica, then three large bushes of that great favourite rose, Iceberg, in burgundy and white. The

combination of the warm bricks of the old home and the bright profusion of flowers are a pretty background for visitors' photos.

The front of the house faces south, with beautiful old camellias which flower in Autumn. Further around, the east side gets morning sun. Here grow a mix of roses, names unknown, with a new planting of Perle d'Or, an apricot rose with pink undertones, and a strong fragrance. Known as an excellent robust rose with good disease resistance, the team believes this rose will grow to rival the established roses on the west side.

Over one of the old iron sheds below the house we've planted two Renae climbing roses, hoping their fragrant blossoms will one day cover the entire shed and fill the air with perfume.

Our most recent introduction is Queen Elizabeth, planted in front of the original cottage, in the spot where a large palm tree used to grow. Surrounded now by lavender and succulents, our new rose is thriving.

Autumn is a great time to see roses in flower before they rest for the winter. We hope you pay a visit soon and enjoy all the roses of Netherby.





Historic Cemetery tour in Richmond

Connect with the Hawkesbury's heritage on a visit to some of Richmond's lesser-known cemeteries, with Hawkesbury Library Service, on Saturday, 11 May. Journey through time and discover some of the unique stories behind the historic headstones.

The tour will include the small Richmond
Presbyterian Cemetery which dates from the
1860s and view the vault of George Bowman,
who financed the building of St. Andrews
Church, plus the entrepreneur Phillip Charley
who made his fortune when he discovered silver
and lead at Broken Hill, and built his palatial
home at North Richmond, now known as St
John of God.

In the Richmond Lawn Cemetery, established in the 1890s, participants will view Richmond's Parish priest Father O'Brien who died 1915 and his very impressive marker, a Celtic Cross. In the Methodist section, hear about Irish born teacher Thomas Sullivan who



was originally buried at Londonderry but later interred in the cemetery with his son William, a bootmaker and Alderman elected to the first Richmond Council in the 1870s. At the Richmond War Cemetery, stories about the RAAF personnel who died when the Lockheed Hudson plane in which they were travelling, crashed in Richmond in 1944, will be shared.

The tour starts at 9:30am and runs for two

of The Hills Shire, Dr Peter Gangemi said. "As a community, we owe a debt of gratitude to our brave servicemen and women who have sacrificed so much for our nation. That is why we have paid tribute to their incredible service in this way.

"I would like to extend my heartfelt appreciation to the Castle Hill and District RSL sub-Branch for their invaluable contribution in helping Council bring this project to fruition."

President of the Castle Hill and District RSL sub-branch, Cheryl Hill said she is thrilled with Council's decision to acknowledge the former war memorial pool and recognise the brave men and women who have served or are currently serving in our country's defence forces.

"Castle Hill and District RSL sub-Branch is pleased that Council have designed and erected this silhouette and plaque, in consultation with the sub-Branch, to acknowledge the old war memorial pool and to recognise those in the Navy, Army, Air Force and Merchant Navy who have served or are serving in the defence of our country," Mrs Hill said.

The pool, located in Baulkham Hills, was opened on 16 March 1965, during a time when it was common for local pools to be registered as a 'war memorial' to honour those who served in WWI and WWII. The centre's operator later rebranded the pool to 'Waves' in 1996.

The centre was then revitalised over a twoyear period from 2020 to 2022 and re-opened to the community as 'Waves Fitness and Aquatic Centre' on 3 September 2022.

With autumn upon us and winter days ahead, more people will be driving in times of lower light when many native animals are most active.

This places native animals at higher risk but there are things you can do to reduce the danger to our precious wildlife. The Mayor of Hawkesbury, Councillor Sarah McMahon is encouraging all road users to always drive safely and to be extra vigilant on the roads in low light conditions and especially at dusk and dawn

"If we drive with caution on both rural and urban roads, we'll not only help to protect ourselves and other people, but also native animals such as wombats, echidnas, koalas, kangaroos, wallabies, reptiles, possums and more," Mayor McMahon said.

"We are so lucky to live in the Hawkesbury where we have national parks and many rural areas with native animals. But with this privilege comes a responsibility to protect them.

"We also have warning signs installed in various areas of the Hawkesbury to encourage drivers to be aware of native animals on our roads and to be alert and slow down."

Give way to wildlife

Anne Marks, Macropod Coordinator for WIRES Hawkesbury Branch is one of the local volunteers who attends animal rescue calls at all hours of the day and night. Anne is also encouraging motorists to please help our native animals by driving carefully in known wildlife areas.

"It is especially important to be vigilant in the early mornings when it is darker and often foggy. It's also important in the late afternoon and through the night when so many of our nocturnal native animals are moving about seeking food and water." Anne said.

"Please drive to the conditions and expect the unexpected as wildlife is not road savvy. Whenever possible to safely do so, give way to wildlife".



You can keep these items in your vehicle to be prepared to help native wildlife: towel, torch, cardboard box, pillowcase, hand sanitiser.

Locating surviving joeys

As well as driving safely to prevent wildlife casualties, Anne suggests providing early emergency assistance to any pouch young of injured wildlife.

"Unfortunately, even with careful driving, wildlife car strikes can still happen. Please stop if safe to do so and check if the animal requires emergency assistance," Anne said.

"We advise wearing high-vis or bright clothing when possible, to ensure you can be seen by other motorists. Always approach any animal with care as they can be in shock after a car strike and could behave aggressively if injured."

Contact WIRES on 1300 094 737 for advice on how to check a pouch, especially before attempting to remove any tiny pink joeys still on the teat as this needs to be done by an experienced rescuer. Also check nearby areas for joeys that may have been thrown from the pouch and please note they need to be kept warm and quiet while you call WIRES or a nearby vet for help. Following vet assessment, native animals require specialist rehabilitation care from licensed wildlife carers as soon as possible.

If it is difficult or unsafe to stop and check pouches, please notify WIRES of the location (note the GPS coordinates and/or mark the location with a stick or other suitable item).

During peak periods when phone lines may be busy, you can also use the report-a-rescue form www.wires.org.au/report-a-rescue to report wildlife emergencies online. Please note that all other forms of WIRES contact, including Facebook, are not monitored for rescues.

Deceased animals attract other native wildlife. This includes Lace Monitors (Goannas) and Raptors such as our protected Wedge-tailed Eagles which then are also at risk of car strike. If safe to do so, put on your hazard lights and move the deceased animal well away from the road. If possible, tie a ribbon, or something similar, to the animal's foot to signal that it has been checked for pouch young. Report deceased animals to WIRES (to collect statistics on high-risk collision areas and species numbers, and to ensure the pouch has been checked adequately). Call Council for removal from public roads on 4560 4444.

"WIRES volunteers help and rescue many native animals – if you can help by also making a donation to WIRES, please do," Mayor McMahon added.

WIRES (NSW Wildlife Information, Rescue and Education Service Inc.) has been rescuing and caring for native animals since 1985. Parramatta Eels are not having the best of seasons but for former Hills Bulls junior, Ethan Sanders making his debut for the club is a dream come true.

One of the country's most promising halfbacks, Sanders, 19, made his NRL debut for Parramatta last Friday though it was a night to forget as Manly Eagles won 32-18.

Sanders, who played for the Hills Bulls in the Under 7's in 2011, always wanted to play for the Eels. "It means a lot to me; it's been my dream for as long as I can remember," Sanders said in a pre-season interview with SMH. However, last week, Sanders confirmed he will be playing next year for Canberra Raiders who have been chasing his signature for months.

The Hills Bulls are immensely proud of Sanders, saying their end of the book report for 2012 mentioned that: 'I think we have a footballer to look out for in the future'. "Well, the future is here and everyone at the Bulls is super proud of you," the Hills Bulls posted on their Facebook page.

Sanders is officially Eel number 845. His form for the Eels junior teams is very impressive, leading them to the SG Ball Cup title, and being named Player of the Match in the final.

The former Patrician Brothers (Blacktown) player starred for the NSW Under-19 side and also led the Eels to their first finals in the Jersey Flegg tournament since 2018, scoring 80 points with 31 tackle busts.

Sanders continued his phenomenal form for the NSW Under-19 team, helping them to retain the title.

Growing up in Quakers Hill, Eels star half-back Mitchell Moses was one of his role models, with Sanders saying it's amazing that he is now playing alongside his hero. Ironically, Moses' injury has opened up the opportunity for Sanders to play for the Eels.

"Mitchie's been unreal," he added. "I sort of try and double up with Mitchie and ask him as much as I can and try and learn from him, especially his kicking game ... and whatever else. It's been unreal.

"My dad supports
Parramatta, and he sort of put
a Parra jersey on me since I can
remember. It means the world to me."

Parramatta coach Brad Arthur said he is pleased that Sanders has committed to stay with the club until the end of the 2024 season.

"He's come and fronted up and let us know that he'd be moving on," Arthur told the AAP.



The first dog out was Amber, in Nineteen Eighty Two. You'd think dogs were human if you saw what they can do. Like Blind dogs have become your eyes, these dogs become your ears. To see the love that forms the bond would bring most men to tears.

Their training is substantial, not all pups pass the test. It's also quite expensive as they only take the best. Each dog is vaccinated and checked out by a vet; Implanted with an ID Chip before the programme's set.

The schooling can take eight long months and sometimes even more.

The dog will stay in training until they're very sure.

And then there is reaction between recipient and pup;

So let's see how the puppy feels on how it ended up.

"The lady that they put me with has a very special need I've told you what they put me through, and I managed to succeed. The kindness I'm receiving. The affection and the care Makes me wish I could do more, there's so much we can share

I've learnt to recognise the phone and knocking at the door; And other sounds around the house and know what they are for. The smoke alarm however is a special sound I react, then must not move, 'till a solution has been found.

We have become inseparable, go everywhere as one.
We even go to the park where I can have a run.
I sit with her at meetings, I never leave her side.
I know that she depends on me, my chest sticks out with pride."




