

#### JP AWARDS

It may surprise people to know the amount of paperwork that comes before Justices of the Peace in the area.

In the past 12 months JPs in the Hills Shire NSW Justices Association have signed 26,800 documents.

Nine members were honoured in State Parliament last week by Castle Hill MP March Hodges, each one for serving over 50 years service as JPs in the Hills community.

Noel Love Daniel O'Dea, Cecil Fisher, Doug McClymont, Ross Page Brian Pusep, Terry Manderson, John Maker and Valerie Evans were named.

Mr Hodges said: JPs provide an essential service including witnessing a person making a statutory declaration or affidavit and certifying copies of documents.

"Our community relies on the service provided by Justices of the Peace for many many aspects of our lives including applying for passports, witnessing documents for court proceedings or opening a bank account.

"I am pleased to acknowledge and honor the service of those who have achieved 50 years of service. I extend my deepest congratulations to those who have achieved 50 years service and to all Justices across the State."

At a morning tea the JPs were also congratulated by Federal MP for Mitchel Alex Hawke and Hills Shire Mayor Peter Gangemi for their long service as volunteers.

Brian Pusep, who first became a JP in 1963, said there was definitely a need for more people to volunteer as JPs.

Terry Manderson said he took on the role as a JP to help people.

Cecil Fisher said while he had been abused by people for refusing to witness documents he felt were not legitimate he found his 50 years of service as a JP had been "enriching".

lan Gilbertson, vice president of the Cumberland Branch of the NSW Justices Association which includes the Hills Area, said JPs were always needed.

## **BOX HILL CENTRE**

The private company that bought Stanhope Village shopping centre off market for \$158m from Mirvac last year has submitted plans to Hills Shire Council to build a new shopping centre at Box Hill.

Charbel Hazzouri, co-founder of Parramattabased property company Revelop, made the announcement on his LinkedIn profile earlier this month

The \$55 million development will be built on land at 17 Nelson Rd, Box Hill.and will be anchored by a Woolworths Supermarket and Dan Murphy's.

The Box Hill Village Centre will have over 40 specialty retailers and restaurants, including a second supermarket and over 3000m2 of medical and allied health services.

The shopping village will feature parking for more than 500 cars and will also include a gym plus a landscaped plaza at the corner of Nelson Road and The Water Lane. Its \$55m value will mean that the final decision will be with the State Government's Sydney Central City Planning Panel.

Mr Hazzouril said: "With a primary trade area of up to 17,749 residents, the centre will be a vital destination serving the needs of the growing Box Hill population. Furthermore, the development will include a 140+ place childcare centre on-site, demonstrating a commitment

to supporting families within the community. Within the vicinity of the centre will be the future NSW Community & Leisure Centre which will further enhance the area's appeal, providing additional opportunities for recreational activities.

"Revelop is excited about the positive impact this Village Centre will have on the Box Hill and neighbouring communities. It will not only provide essential services and shopping options but also serve as a vibrant hub for social connections and community engagement."

Charbel and his cousin Anthony El-Hazouri founded Revelop just over 15 years ago.

Redevelop has been involved in 160 developments since founded in 2008 and owns 22 shopping centres with a further nine in the pipeline. It bought the Dural Town Centre site at 488 Old Northern Rd, Dural in September last year for a reported \$22 million.

At the time Charbel posted on his LinkedIn account:: "The Town centre development,

located at 488-494 Old Northern Road, Dural, has an existing Staged approval for road infrastructure works and retail development. Revelop will capitalise from a decade-long campaign of the current owners by further developing plans to create a truly state-of-the-art neighbourhood shopping centre providing Dural residents a one-stop-shop destination. The remainder of the 2-hectare land will form a desirable integrated housing development providing much needed additional housing options for Dural and the surrounding precincts."

Revelop also owns the Dural Village site at 636 Old Northern Rd, Dural which is approved for mixed use and shopping centre development.

#### **FATAL CRASH**

An elderly man struck by a car as he crossed Windsor Rd in Winston Hills on Friday May 17th died despite desperate efforts to save him.

The incident happened at about 3.25pm on Friday near the junction with Model Farms Road. It is understood the man was well known in the area.

People rushed to his aid and gave him CPR until paramedics arrived but he died at the scene.

Windsor Road was closed in both directions between the M2 and Churchill Drive for some time.

Earlier that same day there was a serious crash when a ute and truck collided at Seven Hills.

The crash on Old Windsor Road under the M2 overpass at Bella Vista happened at 3.30am. Two people were trapped with serious injuries.

Emergency services were called to the intersection of Old Windsor Road and Abbott Road and found a woman and man trapped in a road-marking truck. The male driver of the truck sustained fractures while his female passenger suffered burns when splashed by hot paint. The man driving the ute escaped serious injury. All three northbound lanes of Old Windsor Road were closed for some time due to the emergency response.

#### **CHECK YOUR LICENCE**

Hills Highway Patrol and Hills Police have charged 248 drivers so far this year with driving without a licence. Some were disqualified, or never held a licence, others were suspended drivers due to non payment of fines, and demerit points. Drivers are being urged to check that their licence is current to avoid the mandatory penalty of 12 month disqualification if they are caught driving whilst suspended. Check at ww.service.nsw.gov.au

#### **CRIME SPREE CHARGES**

A 31-year-old Windsor man who failed to attend court in March is now facing multiple charges following an investigation by Strikeforce Puma.

Officers attached to Strikeforce Puma charged the man in January this year with driving while disqualified and stealing offences. He failed to attend court in March and arrest warrants were issued. Police commenced enquiries to locate the man.

On 21st May officers from Strikeforce Puma observed the man driving a red Mazda sedan in the Kingswood area. He was stopped and arrested for the outstanding warrants and driving whilst disqualified. He underwent roadside testing returning a positive oral fluid sample to Methamphetamine.

Officers located a flick style box cutter, stolen supermarket goods and a set of stolen number plates inside the vehicle.

He underwent a secondary drug test returning a positive result to Methamphetamine at the police station. He was charged with 2 x outstanding warrants, Drive whilst disqualified, Custody of a knife in a public place, Shoplifting and unlawfully possess number plates. He was also served Court Attendance Notices for a further two stealing offences.

#### **DUE IN COURT**

Officers from Hawkesbury Police Area Command's Proactive Team have been working closely with local Loss Prevention Officers to identify and charge a number of people in relation to shoplifting offences over the past few weeks

As a result a 16-year-old male has been charged with stealing from a retail store in Richmond on three separate occasions. A 35-yearold woman and a 31-year-old woman have been charged with stealing from retail stores in Windsor.

#### **VIOLENT RAMPAGE**

A 22-year-old North Kellyville man has faced court after a violent rampage saw a trail of damage.

Police say the man first approached a home in North Kellyville and damaged the front door at around 6.30pm on Sunday, 26th May 2024. A short time later, it is alleged the same person attended a supermarket at North Kellyville and started smashing bottles.

Police say he ripped down a fire extinguisher. and intimidated the manager. A short time later, he attended a supermarket in Beaumont Hills, where he allegedly smashed more bottles, attempted to damage the register and intimidated the staff member at the register.

At 7.15pm he attended a fast food restaurant at Kellyville Ridge, where he allegedly damaged the register area and intimidated staff. Police say 15 minutes later he visited a service station at Dural, where he again smashed drinks, intimidating a staff member.

He was stopped by Traffic and Highway Patrol Command - NSW Police Force driving a black Audi in North Kellyville at 7.45pm and was arrested. He was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station, where he was charged with numerous counts of Malicious Damage and Intimidation.

#### SPEEDING DRIVER

Police say a Volkswagen Golf exceeded the speed limit by over 45km/ph whilst trying to 'catch up' to motorbike travelling over 45kph.

Officers attached to Riverstone Highway Patrol detected a blue VW travelling at 126km/ ph whilst attempting to "catch u" to a Yamaha MT50 travelling at 156km/ph in the sign posted 70km/ph speed limit on Richmond Road, Doonside at about 10.20pm on Wednesday 22nd May. Both vehicles were stopped. The 22-year-old motorbike rider had a Learners' licence. Police confiscated his licence and the 45-year-old driver of the VW on the spot for a period of 6 months, the registration plates were confiscated for a period of 3 months, and both were issued with infringements for exceeding the posted speed limit by over 45kph.

#### **SCAM ALERT**

State Crime Command's Cybercrime Squad are urging people to be vigilant about scam calls after seeing an increase in reported caller ID spoofing.

ID or web-based spoofing is where scammers use technology to make it appear their illegitimate call is originating from a legitimate phone number, such as a financial institution or government agency.

In recent months, detectives have been made aware of an increase of ID spoofing from scammers pretending to be from NSW Police

The caller will usually impersonate a NSW Police Officer and tell the person receiving the call they have an outstanding fine, before demanding payment to prevent further court action.

Commander of State Crime Command's Cybercrime Squad, Detective Superintendent Matt Craft, said the NSW Police will never call a member of the public for payment in order to avoid further police action.

"The best way to deal with these types of calls is to not engage or provide information. and to hang up," Det Supt Craft said.

"A police officer will always be willing to identify themselves and make themselves contactable at a police station. If you're concerned or want to verify the legitimacy of your call, we recommend contacting the station or Police Assistance Line directly on 131 444.

"Always remember that legitimate businesses, organisations or government departments will never call a customer seeking confidential information.

"Importantly, never give your personal details or credit information out over the phone. unless you are the one who made the call to a trusted number."

# SMOKE ALARMS SAVE LIVES

Householders are being warned about the importance of working smoke alarms by Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW).

New figures reveal that last winter, nearly half (49 per cent) of the 1,080 homes that were impacted by fire did not have a working smoke alarm, or any alarm, in place \_ kitchen fires were the most common. Fire can take hold in three minutes.

Winter in 2022 was particularly deadly for house fires, with a record 17 deaths – more than four times the total of the previous winter – and 87 people injured. During that season, exactly half of the 959 houses that caught alight did not have a working smoke alarm.

FRNSW kicks off its Winter Fire Safety Campaign this Saturday 1st June.

Residents can book a home fire safety visit when firefighters can install smoke alarms free of charge and find further advice on the FRNSW website at www.fire.nsw.gov.au/visits.

FRNSW Commissioner Jeremy Fewtrell said: "We understand that people are busy these days but making sure you have a functioning smoke alarm in your home should be a priority, especially as we enter winter. We're particularly concerned about the number of fires occurring in the kitchen, which was 44 per cent of cases last winter."

"You've got to keep looking while you're cooking – don't get distracted and if a fire

breaks out, whatever you do, don't throw water onto it, the flames will flare up dramatically."

"Keep a fire blanket near the kitchen to smother flames if they occur."

Minister for Emergency Services Jihad Dib said: "Having at least one working smoke alarm installed in your home will help safeguard your loved ones and provide peace of mind.

"But the alarms must be in working order to be effective, and we are finding this isn't the case a lot of the time. In their home safety visits, firefighters have been finding outdated and broken smoke alarms, with some even hanging from ceilings by wires. I encourage residents to book a fire safety visit from a firefighter, who can install an alarm for free or make sure your alarm is functioning properly."

Member for Riverstone Warren Kirby said: "In Sydney's growing North West, it's essential that every household has a working fire alarm."

"We have some of the best local firefighters. Don't hesitate to reach out if you need any assistance installing your alarm. Riverstone is home to the most young families in New South Wales. It's crucial that we keep each other safe."

#### TIPS FOR SAFETY

You will not smell smoke while asleep. Only working smoke alarms save lives.

• Test that your smoke alarm/s are working. If not, change the batteries or replace the alarm.

- Check the smoke alarm is in date. Smoke alarms have a lifespan of ten years.
- Give the smoke alarm a vacuum, if you haven't done so in the last six months, to remove dust and any insects.

To meet legislation you must have at least one working smoke alarm on each level of the home placed between bedrooms and living areas, it's the law. FRNSW also recommends having one in each bedroom. Hardwired and interconnected is best.

FRANKIFIELD De Ul Remember You

Much-loved Dural identity Frank Ifield died on Saturday, May 18th aged 86.

The man who was patron of the Galston Country Music Festival for a decade and was a champion of up and coming country singers was a major star in the UK in the 60s when he gave a young Liverpool band called The Beatles a chance to perform.

Frank became a household name in Britain before fellow Australians, the Seekers, the Bee Gees and the Easybeats headed to the UK and yet he was always humble. A Rotarian who went out of his way to foster young Australian talent when he returned home to his beloved Hills.

Rock Historian Glenn A. Baker said on Facebook page:

"There is so much to be said about this remarkable man, who had four number ones in Britain, three of them before the Beatles (who he had briefly supported him in concert). I Remember You became an indelible hit all around the world and a perfect signature song. It topped the UK charts for 7 weeks.'

Frank's parents (Richard and Hannah) were Australians who were living in the UK when Frank was born on 30th November 1937.

His father was an inventor and engineer who created the Ifield fuel pump used in jet aircraft. The family returned to Australia when Frank was 11 and moved to Dural to live on a farm.

Frank, who was the third of seven boys, listened to country music while milking the family cow Betsy. He said he used to yodel to stop her kicking the milking bucket over.

At junior school, he led the singing. Music was in his genes as his grandfather was a former performer with touring minstrel shows.

Frank taught himself to play the ukulele before his grandmother bought him his first quitar as an 11th birthday present. After coming second in a talent competition held by a local radio station, Frank made his first broadcasts at the age of 13.

Two years later he was hired to dress as a cowboy and entertain audiences for Big Chief Little Wolf, a wrestling booth showman in a touring fair.

He made his first record at the age of 16 for the Australian branch of EMI. His career was interrupted by national service but by the age of 21 Ifield was one of Australia's leading country and pop singers, with his own television show, Campfire Favourites.

He returned to the UK at the age of 21 in 1959 where he secured a recording deal with Norrie Paramor of EMI's Columbia label.

While his first few records were not hits he topped the charts with a cover version of *I Remember You*, a song written for the 1942 film Follow the Fleet. It reached a million sales in the UK and stayed at Number 1 for seven weeks. It remained in the UK charts for 28 weeks and made number 1 in Australia and number 5 in the US.

It was around this time that he met The Beatles' manager Brian Epstein. Ifield included the band as a support act at his show at the Embassy Cinema in Peterborough in December 1962 after he heard Love Me Do. They appeared free of charge.

Ifield also entered the race to represent the UK at Eurovision on two occasions - in 1962 and 1976 - but was unsuccessful at the national selection stage.

In 1986 he contracted pneumonia and required surgery to remove part of a lung. As a result, his vocal cords were damaged, which meant he could not sing or yodel for years. He returned to Australia in the 1980s moving to Dural.

In 1991, Ifield made a surprise return to the UK charts with The Yodelling Song - a dance remake of his 1962 track She Taught Me How To Yodel, which the Queen Mother once requested at a Royal Command Performance.

In 2016 his singing voice had recovered enough for him to return to the stage with a show that revisited his career.

He joined the Rotary Club of Galston and was Patron of the Galston Country Music Festival (1997 to 2007).

In a career spanning seven decades, he recorded 25 albums. In 2003, Ifield was inducted into the Australian Roll of Renown and was inducted into the ARIA Hall of Fame at the ARIA Music Awards of 2007. He was presented with the Medal of the Order of Australia in 2009 for services to the music industry.

He is survived by his second wife, Carole Wood, whom he married in 1992, and by two children from his first marriage, to Gillian Bowden.

Therapy dogs often remind residents of their own loved



to aged-care homes. Even the science backs it up, with therapy dogs providing reduced levels of the stress hormone cortisol and increasing the bonding hormone oxytocin. With previous experience in dog therapy, Sandra believes strongly in offering a volunteer service to reach more of her community:

"We break down barriers by getting people to engage with the animals as they are non-judgmental. From our visits, people often come out of the shell and can be themselves. Our dogs have unconditional love and accept our residents as they are".

The volunteer-led team of twelve visit eight locations including Arcare Glenhaven,

Cranbrook Care in Bella Vista Gardens and Dural House, where I was able to tag along with the gorgeous Cocker Spaniel, Leo.

The volunteers of Hills Pet Buddi





HELPING KIDS TRANSPORTED TO THE CARLES THE C

When Farmer Dave Graham had his signature long locks cut off it was for very good reason ... to help

children with cancer.

The Grantham Farm resident visited the Kids With Cancer head office in Castle Hill last week to have his hair cut off to make five wigs for five kids. He also set himself a goal to raise \$13,000, the cost of making the wigs, as part for the Kids with Cancer Foundation's Wigs 4 Kids program.

Farmer Dave became known for his luscious long golden locks while a contestant on Big Brother in 2006. He became a TV celebrity after he shared his story of growing up as a gay man in the bush, and for his work with dogs for social good.

Dave said: "Having long hair has been my protective armour, emotionally mentally and physically. I hope that the little kids whose wigs are made from my hair, and the funds we raise to make more, get that same sense of self affirmation and ability to keep getting up each day, slip in their protective amour in their fight for life".

He said he was moved to help when he was MC at last year's Gold Ribbon Ball fundraiser for Kids with Cancer Foundation, held by Danielle, Sophie and Harrison Smith who lost 8-year-old son and brother, William, to cancer in 2018.

"The Foundation provides so much holistic care," he said. "They do absolutely everything, from funding 20 healthcare professionals, funding hospitals and helping individual families. I spoke to so many families that had been helped.

"I didn't realise wigs for KWCF's Wigs 4 Kids program were made right here on the Central Coast (Ella Wigmakers) and has provided over 100 wigs for children with cancer. It enables kids going through treatment to feel like ordinary kids without reminders that they are different."

He said while he had his long hair cut regularly to donate wigs for children, he had previously sent it to a charity in America.

He was happy that this year's "big chop" (a healthy 80cms of hair) was kept in Australia after six years of growing it.

The big chop was livestreamed on Facebook by Farmer Dave, and who better to do the big cut than 9-year-old cancer warrior Zai (pictured) who was diagnosed with stage 4, high risk Neuroblastoma in March last year.

Since his diagnosis Zai has undergone one of the most gruelling treatment protocols a child can endure - eight rounds of high-dose chemotherapy, two 8 hour surgeries, a bone marrow transplant, 12 rounds of radiation, and 6 months of immunotherapies. He has responded very well to treatment, but the hard truth is that Neuroblastoma has a 50% relapse rate and if Zai relapses, his chances of survival plummet to just 5%.

The good news is that Zai has been accepted into an American Clinical trial of an amazing drug, DFMO, for relapse prevention in high-risk Neuroblastoma cases. This is not available in Australia yet, and to undergo this treatment Zai will need to travel to the USA at least six times in the next two years, which brings with it huge financial stress for his family. 

Scott Berry has enjoyed cycling round the Hills but this month the Kellyville father-of-three cycled 1,100kms from Brisbane to Sydney, battling some pretty strong headwinds on the way.

While the big cycle ride has always been on Scott's mind he thought he had little chance of pursuing his dream until his employer, Komatsu Australia, offered staff the opportunity to undertake a personal challenge to raise funds for a cause of their choice.

Scott embraced the "Live Your Dream" opportunity and took nine days to cycle from Komatsu's Brisbane office to its Sydney base to raise money for Lifestart, a disability support program which helped his son Nathan more than 20 years ago. Komatsu donated \$10,000 and Scott's own fundraising page is close to raising an additional \$7,000.

He and his wife Julia were told their son Nathan was on the autism spectrum when he was a toddler. Scott said Julia realised something

was different about the development of their second born son and when the diagnosis came they enrolled him into an early intervention program with Lifestart. The couple say it changed not just Nathan's life but theirs as well.

Speech pathologist Louise Ulliana was part of the Lifestart team that worked with the family and she was at the finishing line to congratulate Scott on his epic fundraising journey.

Now 24, Nathan is a happy, healthy independent young man and much-loved member of the Hills community where he works at Coles in Kellyville. The family say his growth and success are a testament to Lifestart's support and early intervention programs.

Scott said he has wanted to cycle from Brisbane to Sydney since 2009. "It was a

multiple win." he said. "It was a great feeling to help Lifestart and I did my ride. It is good to set your goals and achieve them."

His nine day journey took him through Kingscliff, Kempsey, Taree, Hawkesnest and The Entrance and then Kellyville with his last leg taking him from Kellyville to the Lifestart Headquarters in Rhodes on Friday, 24th May. The longest day was 165kms from Woodburn to Woolgoola.

He said one of the biggest rewards of the trip was being able to pass on information about Lifestart to a friend whose family had just received a diagnosis of autism for their daughter and didn't know where to turn to for help.

The early years are crucial for development which is why Lifestart's early intervention was able to have such a big impact for Nathan. The couple have three sons. Mitchell, Nathan and Chris.

Lifestart was established in 1996 by a group of eight families who wanted more involvement in their children's support. Lifestart now supports over 10,000 children and young people every year. For more information visit lifestart.org.au



The One Mile Kitchen Cafe may be difficult to miss, as it is hidden within The Secret Garden and overlooks the nursery. However, you can expect to be greeted by a very colourful cow statue at the entrance: vibrant rainbow colours setting the standard for the warm service you will receive. Inside, staff with a spectrum of disabilities receive training in barista skills, cooking and customer service. Their menu is simple but has a variety of hot lunch specials, coffees and gourmet toasties.

Eight years ago, NorthWest Disability Services expanded The Secret Garden from its origins as a garden centre for people with disabilities. Today, it is a thriving not-for-profit community centre that organises three annual festivals and a variety of workshops catering to everyone's needs and interests.

With over 20 years in disability support and previous experience in youth work, Hawkesbury coordinator and local Wayne Williams

DINING OUT workshops teach women a range of skills with expresses pride in his team and the supportive

environment they have built together: "This is a place where everyone is welcome. Our Cafe offers a sense of autonomy and independence. It's a very inclusive environment where people take a lot of pride and ownership in their work. Some of our participants have scored their first job outside of this establishment and that's such a proud moment for them, and us".

local tennis coaching business at the age of 63 and then enrolled to study at the University of Western Sydney achieving a Master's in Applied Science, with a Major in Cultural Action.

Ron was devoted to improving men's mental health and worked tirelessly to that end. As a result of his university studies he established the MISTER Newsletter (Men's Information Sheet to Every Region) at the age of 65 to start discussions about men's mental health.

The monthly newsletter was sent to 400 subscribers from Australia, New Zealand and abroad and included information about health issues, practising self awareness and support services.

He also set up Older Men's Network Incorporated (OMNi) chapters to provide a regular meeting space for retired men to meet and to lessen the effects of isolation, one running in Epping for 25 years and one in Castle Hill.

The Hills Older Men's Network (OMNi) at Castle Hill was set up with the support of Norwest Sunrise Rotary Club Ron and meets on the first and third Monday of the month at Castle Hill Senior Citizens Club. Ron was also the driving force behind the annual Norwest Sunrise Rotary Club's Mental Health Expo and founded the Men's Carers Support Group, which meets monthly in Seven Hills.

He was 70 when he started acting with the Castle Hill Players.

# **Must see lookouts across** the Hills and Hawkesbury

We are blessed to live in one of the most beautiful parts of NSW where the urban meets the semi-rural part of Sydney. As a result, we have lots of wonderful lookouts providing incredible views as well as places to sit and relax away from the hustle and bustle of everyday life.

Every drive we go on is a chance to discover a new lookout or to revisit a lookout we have been to before, of which we can't just get enough!

Here are a few of our favourite lookouts across the Hills and Hawkesbury and we encourage you to also explore these lookouts and enjoy them as much as we do.

#### **Hawkins Lookout**

This is located on Old Northern Road, Wisemans Ferry is the best place in the State to get a spectacular view of the sparkling Hawkesbury River and the valley below. We love watching the Webb's Creek Ferry and other boats on the river. There is a corten steel heritage bus to pose beside, a tribute to bus driver Fred Hawkins who would often stop at the steepest hill overlooking the river for his passengers to enjoy the view. With a small picnic area, Hawkins Lookout is a great place to stop for a bite to eat and to enjoy one of the best views in the Hills.

#### **Bellbird Lookout, Kurrajong Heights**

Located on Bells Line of Road, this is one of our favourite places to stop on our way back from fruit picking in Bilpin. At 500 metres above sea level, this lookout gives extensive views to the east, south and north over the Hawkesbury Valley and the Sydney Basin. What we love best about this lookout is that if you listen carefully, you will hear the distinct call of the bellbirds through the valley.

Unlike many of the other lookouts we visit, Turkeys Nest Recreation Park on Tamborine Drive, Beaumont Hills is in the urban part of the Hills. This lookout offers stunning views over Northwest Sydney including over Rouse Hill, Blacktown and Norwest Business Park particularly at night with all the lights. The great thing about this location is that it also has a large pond, a playground, picnic shelters and walking tracks making it the perfect place to enjoy the afternoon whilst appreciating the view. The park was a dairy farm up until the 1970s and features metal cow statues and milk jugs as a reminder of the site's past.

One of the newer lookouts we have visited in recent times is the Hawkesbury Lookout located at Hawkesbury Heights. This lookout,

located between Hawkesbury and Katoomba, offers a place to stop and stretch your legs and enjoy an incredible view out of the Nepean River and the Cumberland Plain. There are picnic tables and chairs to sit and enjoy the view.


The official opening of Box Hill's first sporting complex will be marked with a plaque unveiling, free gelato, coffee, BBQ, and face painting.

"Animals have always been my passion, so I was eager to find a career that would combine my interest with a role that was meaningful," said Ms Lamy. "I really enjoyed studying at TAFE NSW, as it gave me the practical skills I needed to successfully groom different types of animals and understand the spectrum of animal behaviour. This helped me to move forward with confidence knowing that I had a strong knowledge base. My TAFE NSW course gave me peace of mind that this was the career for me. I learn better in a hands-on environment, so it was the practicals that made the biggest difference to my learning. I also gained business skills, which helped me launch my career and carve the path I wanted to take."

Pet ownership in Australia has surged in recent years, with 69% of households now owning pets, compared to 61% in 2019,

according to surveys by Animal Medicines Australia. The growth has prompted a significant need for more qualified groomers to enter the industry.



The Hills Shire Symphony Orchestra are eagerly looking forward to transporting you to Finland, on Saturday 15th June, at 7.30pm at the Hills Grammar School, Kenthurst.

The concert will pay homage to Finland's bestknown composer, Jean Sibelius, and features three of his most well known and loved works. Finlandia, the Karelia Suite and his Violin Concerto.

Under Russian rule until after the 1917 Soviet revolution, Finland strongly retained its own culture through the works of its artists, writers, and composers, all of whom drew themes and imagery from the Finland's vast, majestic landscape of forests and water.

The concert opens with Finlandia, a tone poem written in 1899. Finlandia was composed as a covert protest against increasing censorship from the Russian Empire. Most of the piece is taken up with rousing and turbulent music evoking the national struggle of the Finnish people, however, towards the end calm emerges, with the serene and melodic Finlandia hymn.

A similarly nationalistic work completes the first half of the concert, the famous Karelia Suite.

Composed six years earlier than Finlandia, the rough-hewn character of the Karelia Suite was deliberate. The intention was to capture the quality of naïve, folk-based authenticity.

The featured work on the program is one of the most popular of twentieth century violin concertos, Sibelius' Concerto for Violin and Orchestra in D minor Op 47 featuring soloist, Sunny Roh. After graduating with a Masters Degree in Performance from the Sydney Conservatorium, Sunny made her Australian debut performing this concerto with the Sydney Symphony Orchestra. She now performs regularly as a concert violinist throughout Europe, England, Korea and Russia, as well as in Australia.

Hills Shire Symphony Orchestra Chief Conductor and Artistic Director, Chris Upton said, "We are thrilled to have this opportunity to work with Sunny and to share her wealth of musical knowledge and experience with Hills music lovers."

Chris founded The Hills Shire Symphony Orchestra (HSSO) in 2018 to enrich the musical life of The Hills by providing engaging and exhilarating performances of classical music at a reasonable cost, as well as to provide opportunities for local performers, aspiring conductors and composers.

Chamber musicians from the HSSO perform at Bella Vista Farm's Open Day, on the first Sunday of every month. Listen to the music while enjoying a Devonshire Tea or Sausage Sizzle in the tranguil grounds of the Farm. 

"The competition is an excellent opportunity to showcase your photographic skills in a calendar adored by the local community," Mayor Gangemi said.





**Old Seed Drill** Comes to an End

The Friends Of Fagan Park are going to dismantle and scrap an old seed drill. The seed/fertilizer drill was manufactured by H.V.McKay P/L in Victoria.

Hugh Victor McKay (1865 - 1926) was a farmer and engineer in Victoria in the late 1800's. He developed horse drawn farming equipment with factories at Sunshine and Ballarat in Victoria. The company grew in size over the years and at its peak, employed 3,000 personnel, and formed a partnership with Canadian Company Massey-Harris. The range of machinery expanded to headers, chaff cutters, cane cutters, hay making, balers, field mowers, and much more and also equipment for the war effort in WW1.

The exact age of this seeder drill is not known but is most likely 1920's to 1930's. The model is a "Sunshine" but no casting name marks are visible. It is a 14 row seeder used for

the sowing of wheat, oats and barley. Bagged seed grain would be poured into the wooden hoppers along the length of the machine, where simple adjustments would be made to regulate the feed rate of the seed to the speed of the motive power, be it horse or tractor. 14 rows approximately one foot apart would be sown in a shallow furrow and covered over in one pass of the paddock. A distributor disc would rotate around and around under the seed, pushing a constant regulated amount of seed down a tube into the furrow in the ground. This seeder in the image will be dismantled by the Friends Of Fagan Park and scrapped.

# Two Migrants

A while back my wife and I joined a bus tour to Jindabyne and one evening during dinner I overheard a conversation where one of our fellow travellers was relating to some others of her time as a child emigrating to Australia back in the 1950s. My ears pricked up when I heard her mention of the name of the ship and when she arrived in Australia.

Later I spoke to her and we discovered that we had similar experiences and had also travelled on the same ship, at the same age and in the same but on different voyages. We have since became friends

This is part 1 of Hilary's story in her own words;-

# ODYSSEY OF AN 11 YEAR OLD FROM ENGLAND TO AUSTRALIA 1958

It was sometime in 1957 that my father told me we were emigrating to Sydney, Australia, sheep and kangaroos immediately came to my 11 year old mind!!. It had been my dream to be a ballerina, attending dance classes 5 days a week, so I was not happy about this move, my parents said that it was to give me a "better life". It was only 12 years since the war ended and times were still tough in England, I can remember going with mum to the grocers with the ration book. My father was an ex-Grenadier Guard having served in Italy and North Africa during the war. With my mother, they managed a shop in Marton, Blackpool in Lancashire. This was considered a "good" job at the time as a house came with the job. An Aunt told me I was a lucky girl to be going to Australia and to remember everything about the journey.

We were interviewed by Australia House and I clearly remember seeing posters saying "Australia Needs You". Once we were approved, we had to wait to be given a sailing date. The first date came in late 1957 so my parents resigned their jobs, farewell parties and gifts were given and packed into large trunks including a brand new bike and two beautiful ballerina dolls given to me by my dance teacher. I remember seeing them briefly get placed into one of the trunks. The luggage was then dispatched to The British Road Services ready to go on the road to Southampton.

However our sailing date got cancelled, quite a common occurrence at this time, after all my parents were 10 pound POMS, not paying passengers and children under 12 went for nothing!!!.


So with no job or house we went to live with relatives in Manchester and I started back at school to sit my final exams. British Road Services were informed and our luggage was put into their storage.

Finally on 4th February 1958, we arrived at Southampton ready for the 6 week journey to Australia, with just 2 suitcases. These had served us well during the wait for a sailing date. We were sitting on the deck of the "Fairsea" one of many belonging to the "Sitmar

line" and the first non-British ship employed to carry assisted immigrants from Britain to Australia, when we heard my father's name on the loudspeaker requesting him to go to the Pursers office. When he came back he told us our luggage was not on board. When we went to live with our relatives my father read there had been a big fire in the warehouse of The British Road Services, my father assured us our luggage would have left by then, headed for Southampton, however it now looked as though that was not the case. We were given the option to leave the ship or set sail. My mother made the big decision to sail. I can remember my parents being very brave they probably shed tears away from me, as for myself I was worried about my bike, ballet costumes and presents!!.

Our cabin on D deck, had a port hole, the water came up half way. There were 8 bunks to a cabin, tiny wardrobes (didn't bother us as we didn't have much) I was an only child, so my mother and I waited for the other 6 women to arrive. My father was down the passage way in a cabin similar to ours and he waited for the 7 men, who would be related to the 6 women in my cabin. The bathrooms were shared and I was fascinated by the showers never having seen anything but a bath before!!.


