

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

Box Hill Town Centre BY BEV JORDAN

There has been a huge amount of interest from developers in snapping up the Box Hill City Centre site at 29-31 Terry Road Box Hill which has been put on the market by receivers after the collapse of Toplace.

The 4.3ha site is being sold by Frank Knight and CBRE on behalf of Toplace receivers FTI consulting. The closing date for expression of interest this Tuesday, October 11th at 4pm.

No price has been mentioned in the advertising but the estimated value quoted in many areas in \$600million. The Masterplanned site has development approval for a 22,843sq shopping centre and 660 apartments across nine residential blocks, 6 to 9 storeys high.

Knight Frank's Mark Litwin said: "It is an asset that has drawn a lot of interest given its position within the precinct and the terms under which it is being sold.

"The site is currently improved with an active DA for a much needed shopping centre and 660 apartments."

Existing works include site excavation, two levels of substructure (parking and loading) and the slap for the major retail anchor tenant.

When Toplace started marketing Box Hill Town Centre it listed the key features as: Coles, Liquor Land Supermarket, Chemist Warehouse a major medical/imaging precinct, approximately 479 Retail Car spaces and a major transport hub. In its marketing Frank Knight says the area is expected to be home to 30,200 residents by 2036

Hills Shire Council General Manager Michael Edgar told the *Hills to Hawkesbury Community News* he hoped work will restart on the important retail centre soon.

"Box Hill is growing every day, and our new residents are looking for places to shop or to grab a cup of coffee within a convenient distance from their homes or workplaces," he said.

"The centre, if completed, will be a valuable addition to the community, providing benefits for day-to-day shopping, but also upgrades to roads and intersections in the vicinity. It's an expected piece of social infrastructure for the surrounding community.

"It's my hope that the administrator can find solutions and get this project back off the ground. In the meantime, I recommend the government looks to improve its consumer protection laws to safeguard individuals who are owed money or left with unfinished homes. This will help restore trust in the construction industry and provide meaningful protection to prevent similar situations from occurring in the future."

Toplace collapsed owing over \$1billion. Over 20,000 homeowners were affected by the collapse of the developer which had several highrise developments in the Hills including Atmosphere and Skyview at Castle Hill and Grand at Kellyville plus Watkins St Townhomes at Baulkham Hills.

* In December 2022 Frank Knight sold a 30.9 hectare parcel of land at 10-31 Terry Road Box Hill to WST Property Group for homes. The land is adjacent to the Box Hill City Centre site and was sold by the McCall Gardens Community Foundation to future proof the services it provides to the disabled community. The Foundation retained nearly 5 hectares of the parcel for existing community facilities and operations.

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MAN, 62, ARRESTED

Detectives have charged a man with alleged historic child sexual and indecent assault offences which occurred in Sydney's northwest and at various NSW locations from the 1980s to the mid-2000s.

Detectives attached to Riverstone Police Area Command established Strike Force Mimo in August 2021, following reports a man sexually assaulted a teenage girl known to him between 2005 and 2006.

As part of ongoing investigations, police received additional reports of alleged acts of indecency committed against four young boys when the man was a leader of a scout group between 1980 and the mid-1990s.

Following extensive inquiries, investigators attended a home in Dean Park about 9.40am on Tuesday 3rd October where they arrested a 62-year-old man.

He was taken to Riverstone Police Station and charged with sexual intercourse without consent, three counts of indecent assault on male, and one count of incite person under 16 years to commit act of indecency.

As inquiries continue, police are appealing for anyone who may be able to assist detectives with their inquiries.

Anyone with information about this incident is urged to contact Crime Stoppers. Information is treated in strict confidence.

HOUSE FIRE

A lightening strike is believed to have caused a fire which destroyed a ten-bedroom home in Glenorie on Wednesday, September 27th. Emergency services were called to the fire at Cattai Ridge Road Glenorie at around 7.30pm. The family of seven got themselves out and no-one was in the house when crews arrived. The fire was well alight. More than 70 fire crews attended.

A go fund me page has been set up to support the Zeaiter family who lost everything in the blaze.

SEXTORTION

Police say sexual extortion, also known as sextortion, is a growing concern for law enforcement agencies

Boys between the ages of 13 and 17 are primarily targeted, and it involves coercing them into sending sexually explicit content and then blackmail.

The Australian Federal Police have created an online response kit to help manage serious incidents of sextortion.

They say do not hesitate to seek assistance and take action against this threat. Reporting is safe and the reporter won't be blamed.

BREAK-IN CHARGES

A 36-year-old man has been arrested and charged with a series of brek-ins in the Hills last month

The Hills Proactive Crime Team, assisted by specialist officers from the North-West Metro. Region Operational Support Group (OSG), executed a search warrant at a Blackett

Police were seeking items connected to thefts and residential break-ins committed in Castle Hill, Dural, and Kellyville during September 2023.

A 36-year-old man was arrested and taken to Mt Druitt Police Station where he was charged with two counts of break, enter and steal, four stealings, entering land with intent to commit an indicatable offence, and disposing of stolen property.

The search recovered several items of stolen property which can now be returned to their owners. Anyone with information about this or other incidents is urged to call Crime Stoppers NSW. Information is treated in strict confidence. The public is reminded not to report information via NSW Police social media pages.

LUCKY ESCAPE

Two men had a lucky escape when the vehicle they were in left the road and Box Hill and crashed onto its roof.

Emergency services were called to the incident site on Nelson Rd, Box Hill just after midnight on Monday 25th September.

When Castle Hill Police officers and members of the Rural Fire Service arrived both occupants had managed to get themselves out of the crashed vehicle, one sustained only a minor injury to his arm. The driver returned a negative road-side breath test and was issued an infringement notice for Negligent Driving (\$481).

SCAM ALERT

There are numerous text scams doing the rounds inviting people to click on links including messages saying that parcels have not been delivered because of an incorrect address.

Police are warning of a recent scam text which advises people that their Medicare card has expired. The message asks people to click a link to update your details.

The warning is not to click any links sent to your phone. Services Australia will send a new new Medicare card about 4 to 8 weeks before it expires and will not send a phone message.

L DRIVER CAUGHT

Riverstone Highway Patrol have arrested a 19-year-old Learner Driver for drink driving who will face court on October 10th..

The man was stopped by Riverstone Highway Patrol driving a red Hyundai I30 after he failed to giveway to a Police vehicle on the roundabout on Hambledon Road, Quakers Hill at about 1.50am on Monday 16th September.

The 19 year old produced a NSW Learner's licence and did not have a supervising driver in the vehicle at the time. He submitted to a breath test, returning a positive result and was arrested and conveyed to Riverstone Police Station where he submitted to a breath analysis which returned a positive reading of 0.118.

He was charged with driving with Mid Range PCA and Learner not accompanied by authorised driver, and his licence was suspended until he is to appear before Blacktown Local Court on 10th October.

BUSHFIRE READY

Deputy Mayor and RFS volunteer Clr Mitchell Blue spoke to Glenorie Progress Association at Glenorie RSL recently about being prepared for bush fires. He was joined by The Hills NSW Rural Fire Service staff along with members of Glenorie Rural Fire Brigade, Maroota Rural Fire Brigade and Hillside Rural Fire Brigade.

"Before the presentation, it was interesting to see how many residents chose to 'stay and defend' in the event of a bushfire and then the number that decided afterward that it was best for them to 'leave early. This is a key consideration when developing a Bushfire Survival Plan," he said.

"Bush fire is a part of life in New South Wales. So, you need to live bush fire ready. That means knowing your risk and having a plan for what to do during a fire. The best way to do this is to make a Bushfire Survival Plan. www. myfireplan.com.au

"A bush or grass fire can happen at any time of the year, but the risk is higher during the warmer months, when bush, grass or scrub is drier. You don't have to live right near the bush to be at risk. Even if your home is a few streets back, you may be at risk. A well-prepared home is more likely to survive a bush fire. Even if your plan is to leave early, the more you prepare your home, the more likely it will survive a bush fire or ember attack. A well-prepared home can also be easier for you or firefighters to defend and is less likely to put your neighbours' homes at risk. A well-prepared home will also give you more protection if a fire threatens suddenly and you cannot leave. For more information on 'getting ready' visit www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/plan-and-prepare.

Soph's Puppy Love BY BEV JORDAN

It has taken four years and a lot of hard work but autistic 21-year-old Soph has raised almost enough money to buy herself an assistance dog.

The Beaumont Hills resident is determined to be placed with a specially trained service dog for people with special needs and is required to raise a minimum of \$20,000 for this to happen. So far Soph has raised \$17,000 of the \$20,000 she needs by recycling bottles and cans and selling fidget toys which she makes.

Her recycling has raised more than half the money she has collected so far and the rest has come from various other means including donations and the sale of over 660 of her own fidget range via Instagram.

Soph communicates through AAC apps (augmentatative/alternative communication programs) on her devices and she used AAC to contact the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News, to tell her story.

In her email she wrote: "I am a very determined and passionate 21-year-old. I am autistic and mostly non-speaking with many mental health impacts – leading to multiple hospitalisations in the past year.

Soph spent over 3 months last year in and out of hospitals for mental health reasons.

"Considering all the impacts my disability has on my life I thought an assistance dog may well be the most significant support," she said.

An assistance dog will be trained in tasks to help Soph mitigate her disabilities, the dog will help her develop independence and confidence and improve her quality of life.

"It will promote my safety as well as dogs are a constant 24/7 support being there with you all the time and provide constant comfort and companionship."

Soph says she started to fundraise herself after being knocked back three times for NDIS funding for an assistance dog and so applied to the Smart Pups program which approved her

She has a stuffed golden retriever toy she made herself and has named Nugget which she takes with her everywhere she goes to remind her of her puppy goal.

"Being honest, thinking about my future dog has been my biggest factor helping me have a will to live," she writes.

While family, friends and neighbours save bottles and cans for Soph she admits to "bin diving" to recover more and credits her parents,

Julia and Andrew, for their help in driving her around to help with her recycling quest.

"The fundraising (by) myself has been a huge effort and I feel is something I should not have to do for something that will significantly change and support me in my life. Once I acquire the funding, I have to wait 18 months to 2 years for a dog to be trained, placed and gain full public access."

I show my support for SCHF through volunteering, which I absolutely love. Knowing that I'm part of something bigger and it's contributing directly to children's health by supporting sick kids and their parents, who may be going through a lot of emotional and physical pain means a lot. Through volunteering I get to meet really amazing people and you're part of a community who are having a positive impact – that personally for me is really rewarding.

I know every time I say to myself I'm too busy, I don't have time and end up volunteering – it's just the best feeling afterwards because I was able to give back in some shape or form. You don't need to take it from me, give it a go and you'll know exactly what I mean!"

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Why is hearing in noise so difficult?

When we gather with friends and family around the dinner table, at a BBQ or at the local pub for a meal and a catchup. In those situations, many people experience they have difficulties following the conversation as everything seems to get 'muddled up'. Why is this and what can be done?

If one struggles to hear and understand in social settings it bears the risk of 'tuning out' and social withdrawal may be a result. It is difficult for most people to communicate in situations with lots of surrounding noise.

The problem has multiple reasons. Human speech consists of many parts. Some parts like letters such as "M, N, L, A, O" are low in frequency but high in intensity so they carry well and have lots of power. These parts of the speech transfer volume from a speaker to a listener and they do that very well as they have plenty of energy. Other parts of speech like sounds such as "TH, S, C, F, SH," are essentially only pressed air through the teeth and tongue. These unvoiced sounds are very high in frequency and extremely low in energy. The purpose of those sounds is to transfer speech clarity and help to distinguish one word from another. Often the smallest part of a word makes all the difference. For example, "Faith"

and "Face" - the difference between 'th' and 'ce' is very small. In most cases our eyes 'hear' these sounds better by lipreading than the ears really hear them. A major problem with these highly important part of speech is that they can be masked and literally squashed by louder sounds.

In social settings the "cocktail-party-effect" makes the noise level increase quickly. There is a little bit of music, that makes it harder to hear - so everyone starts speaking louder and as we 'shout' the energy of A, E, M, N, O etc. gets so high that they overpower the important sounds for clarity. So, in a situation with many people talking everything sounds really muffled and it's difficult to make out the words the other person is saying. Additionally, most age or noise related hearing losses start in the higher frequency only adding to those issues.

Some people with even a mild hearing loss choose not to go to functions and meetings

anymore as they cannot participate in conversations. It is very tiring for the brain to

constantly strain to try hearing what is being said and the choice to withdraw is quickly made.



Natasha Lester's **Latest Mystery Novel**

Bestselling Australian author Natasha Lester will be visiting The Hills on Wednesday 11th October to spend an evening with readers after the recent release of her book The Disappearance of Astrid Bricard, an intergenerational mystery about Blythe Bricard finding answers to the puzzling disappearance of her mother Astrid and the infamous legacy of her grandmother Mizza.

Natasha is very keen to come to The Hills and meet new readers, where she'll be putting on a slideshow of her research from the 1910s and 1970s that she utilised while writing the novel, followed by a Q&A. She says: "I always make a slideshow because people love seeing the fashion and photographs of handwritten letters. But the highlight of publishing a book is sitting down, signing readers' books and hearing them tell their stories in the signing queue. You always find someone who's had a similar experience to one of your characters, and I love finding out that these stories really resonate with people."

The idea for the book had been in Natasha's head since 2020, inspired by how the media treats famous women in society. It was also around this time Natasha learned about the real-life Mitzah Bricard, whose story fascinated her. "That was when all the other things like the Battle of Versailles Fashion Show and the treatment of women in the media began to come together into a story that hangs around Mizza and her descendants, looking at what it's like to be the daughter and granddaughter of a

famous muse. How do you carry that burden with you in your life?"

The book's focus on three distinct time periods is one of its most striking elements; one that Natasha found equally challenging and rewarding. "I did have to do quite a lot of research just to make sure I wasn't ignoring a lot of key events happening at the time, and I needed to get a real handle on what was happening," she says.

'But I really liked doing that. Because I like people to feel this could have actually happened." That sense of reality makes The Disappearance of Astrid Bricard a gripping read as Blythe fights to discover the truth behind her family lineage and rewrite history.

Voice to Parliament Voting Now Open

Pre-poll voting for the Voice to Parliament Referendum is now open ahead of the official October 14th date. The Referendum is asking every Australian to answer either Yes or No to the question of enshrining an Indigenous Voice in the Australian Constitution - if passed, an advisory body of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people is to be formed that will be able to make representations to the Australian Parliament on ATSI matters.

The idea for the Voice came after the Gillard Government's recommendations on recognising ATSI people in the Constitution was rejected in 2012. Following this, discussions between policymakers and political thinkers formed the idea for the Voice, which aimed to unite Aboriginal advocates and constitutional conservatives.

The proposition was endorsed by nearly 250 Aboriginal elders in 2017's Uluru Statement from the Heart, which said: "We call for the establishment of a First Nations voice enshrined in the Constitution."

Once they were elected in May 2022, the Albanese Labor government promised that a Referendum to decide the Voice to Parliament would be held within the term, asking Australians if they approved of the proposed amendment to the Constitution. Since then, there has been much debate both nationally

and locally about the Voice and the changes it's looking to make to the Constitution.

On Thursday 20th July earlier this year, India Club held a debate for members of the Hills community to hear both sides of the argument. Parramatta MP Andrew Charlton, constitutional lawyer Shireen Morris and Gidgee Group Director Sean Gordon spoke passionately for the Yes vote by stressing its importance in being able to assist Indigenous Australians. Meanwhile, Mitchell MP Alex Hawke, Castle Hill member Mark Hodges and Warren Mundine AO cast doubts on the necessity of the Voice.

The Yes Vote puts emphasis on the fact that it is a recommendation from ATSI people and will lead to tangible results through recognition, more practical results and ensuring a way for Parliament to listen to Indigenous voices. The Yes campaign states that the current approach to Indigenous affairs isn't working, and that an alternative in the Voice is necessary.

The No Vote finds the idea of an Indigenous voice legally risky to Australia's system of government, while also not being the solution needed to help Indigenous Australians. The No Campaign argues that there are not enough details on the Voice and that it is divisive and

Cumberland State Forest

out and about

The Cumberland State Forest is one of the most magical places in North West Sydney. It is Australia's only metropolitan forest and consists of 40 hectares of natural forest offering a tranquil experience for visitors away from the hustle and bustle of modern city life.

Hidden within Cumberland Forest sits Tree Tops Adventure. The Hills is one of 15 Tree Tops parks around Australia offering exciting and challenging obstacle courses high up in the tree canopies. Tree Tops Adventure The Hills is a 5 minute walk from the administration centre that takes you along a peaceful forest trail until you reach your destination and lay eyes on the obstacle courses for the first time, evoking different emotions from different people. For my brave, thrill-seeking eight- year-olds, there was sheer excitement at tackling the courses especially the harder and higher ones whilst my reaction was slight trepidation knowing completing the courses would mean facing my phobia of heights! The rope courses are constructed

from wooden platforms sitting around the tree trunks, to ensure the native trees aren't damaged and continue to grow. However, between each tree platform is a different obstacle that needs to be completed to reach the next platform. Obstacles include different length zip lines, cargo nets, tight ropes, wobbling bridges, ladders, tunnels, suspended rafts, trapezes and Tarzan swings just to name a few! The obstacle courses range in difficulty levels from easy, medium, hard and extreme with each course getting more and more tricky as your confidence and skills grow. There are also junior courses for children under 8 that only require parent supervision from the ground whilst the harder courses require children under 16 to be with a participating parent.

Each session is 2.5 hours long after a 30-minute induction session which includes putting on harnesses and helmets as well as a safety training session with the very friendly and helpful Tree Tops staff. After this you're on your way to swinging, leaping, climbing and flying through the beautiful Cumberland State Forest as you navigate the various obstacle courses. The views of the Forest up high are amazing and reinforce the importance of the Forest for our rapidly growing community in this part of Sydney. Tree Tops was challenging and we were absolutely exhausted by the end of our session however, my eight-year-olds can't wait to go again and explore more of the more difficult courses! We also look forward to experiencing different courses at Tree Tops Western Sydney Parklands as well as Tree Tops Yarramundi located at the foot of the Blue Mountains when it re-opens. 

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Daisy Blooms in Cactus Flower

Watching her performance as Toni in the Pavilion Theatre's hilarious production of *Cactus Flower*, it's hard to believe that it's only Daisy Alexis' third play with the iconic local company. Daisy shines brightly as Toni throughout the entirety of the play, bringing tangible energy and life to a character she describes as "quite eccentric and super kooky. She's this wild person that's trying to navigate this situation, but also has a lot of kindness in the things that she does."

Though *Cactus Flower* is Daisy's third production with the Pavilion, the 18-year-old Hills local has been acting for a long time – technically since she was a toddler. "I had my debut in a Wiggles commercial at the age of three, which 'kickstarted' my career!" she jokes. "Not that I remember it much. But I do have the video!"

From there, a passion for theatre grew in Daisy as her parents took her to theatre productions throughout her youth. "I think having that exposure really influenced me, and my love for it just grew from there," she says. "I did some local musical theatre productions when I was 13, and that helped me build my confidence and go 'This is what I really like to do."

While finishing Year 12 last year, Daisy was cast in her first Pavilion Theatre production *Picasso at the Lapin Agile*, a mix she describes

as quite balanced. "I would study and do my exams throughout the day, and then I would come to the theatre in the night, and I just loved it. I was getting to do what I love and that just kind of balanced everything else."

Earlier this year, Daisy was part of the Pavilion's production of *Funny Money*, where she acted alongside *Cactus Flower*'s director Stephen Snars who she was talking to about the then-upcoming production. "I was thinking about auditioning," Daisy says, "and I asked him if he could send me the script, I'd have a read.

"But I approached him and said 'You know what, I'm actually going to audition for the next one.' And he sat me down for 40 minutes and ended up convincing me why it would be really great to do. And then I was convinced, so I auditioned for it, and then got the role!"

Daisy was drawn to Toni and *Cactus Flower* as a real opportunity to build a character. "We hadn't really had much opportunity to do that in previous shows, to sort of have a deeper relationship with the people that make up the world Toni lives in," she comments. "So that was quite exciting. I spent a lot of time reading the script, and rereading and rereading… so I could pull out all the information I could about the character and understand the relationship and world that she lives in."

Having the Pavilion as a space to explore that character, as well as have a blast

performing, is something that Daisy really values. "Stephen was really about bringing out the fun of the play, and getting to play with the cast has just been amazing," she says. 






THE VOICE: IF YOU'RE UNSURE, FIND OUT MORE BY MICHELLE ROWLAND MP

Since 2010, I have had the great privilege of representing the good people of Greenway – the federal electorate that sits in Sydney's North West.

We're a unique part of Australia, known for being one of the most culturally diverse electorates in the nation. In fact, our suburb of Blacktown is home to a total of 133 nationalities the third highest nationally - and we have the highest number of different languages spoken at home (72) in Australia.

So, at a time when our nation is deciding how to vote at a once-in-a-generation Referendum to enshrine an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice to Parliament, many people have asked me how this is unfolding for Australia's culturally and linguistically diverse communities, such as those in Greenway.

And perhaps, the response is not what you might expect. In my experience, people who have come to this nation in the pursuit of a better life have great aspirations - not only for themselves and their families, but for Australia as a whole.

Regardless of where they or their parents were born, Australia is their home and they have a sense of responsibility in making it an even better place to live. The Australians I meet overwhelmingly want to deliver the best outcomes for themselves, their neighbours and for all Australians.

That's why, when Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people presented the Uluru Statement from the Heart to the Australian people, the overwhelming majority of constituents I spoke to

were listening, eager to learn more.

Now, as the Referendum date fast approaches diverse communities in my electorate have mobilised among themselves to best understand what this Referendum could mean for not only them, and for all people who call Australia home.

How it will create a better future for all of us.

They have important questions.

What will the Voice look like? What will a Voice do for First Nations Australians and all Australians?

The Voice will be an independent committee made up of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people from every state and territory, the Torres Strait and regional and remote communities.

The Voice is an idea that came from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people - as expressed in the Uluru Statement from the Heart. The Voice is about advice. Advice that will lead to better outcome in health, education, jobs and housing.

When governments listen to people on the ground they make better decisions, get better results and deliver better value for money. This will unify Australia - and move our country forward together.

Whether it's over a community Zoom call, a group Facebook chat, discussions at a place of worship, or an in-person panel with guest speakers, I've noticed our multicultural communities creating their own opportunities to learn more about the Voice Referendum.

Sikh Youth Australia is just one example. Just

a couple of weeks ago, they hosted "Inclusive Dialogues: The Voice Referendum Explored Through a First Nations Lens". This event was moderated by popular hip-hop artist L-FRESH the Lion.

Immigrant Women's Speakout and the Women's Electoral Lobby held a similar forum, called "Western Sydney Women for Yes" and Australia's East Asian community have created a group called "Desis for Yes" to educate community members about the Referendum in-language.

The learning-focused local activation we're seeing in multicultural communities in Greenway and beyond puts into practice a simple but crucial concept as we approach the Referendum: if you're unsure, find out more.

And for so many people, when we do find out more, we understand what we are saying Yes to nothing extra, just an equal chance.

Because after all, Indigenous Australians want the same things for their children as we do: staying healthy, doing well at school, finding a job they love - leading fulfilling lives.

Voting YES is a way forward, for the entire

MENTAL HEALTH MONTH

Did you know that one in five Australians experience a mental illness in any year and compounding to this, is the confronting statistic that about 54% of people do not seek treatment?

Looking back four decades ago, mental health and wellbeing had such a stigma attached to it. Rarely did anyone seek treatment. It was considered a weakness, so people withdrew, didn't acknowledge their need for such aid and rarely resolved the anxiety, grief, depression and trauma that presented them in life. In those days, we compartmentalised our feelings. Veterans came back from war torn engagements and were told to 'just get on with life'. Mothers experiencing post-natal depression saw it as a weakness. For so long, we believed that time would heal everything, when in fact it perpetuates misery, detaches us from loved ones and creates

a real feeling of isolation that comes with the rollercoaster of our mental wellbeing.

Fast forward to 2023, we have identified October as Mental Health Month. A stark difference to the hidden landscape that was apparent four decades ago. Knowing where to go to seek help is the first step to recovery and governments have invested over the years in an area that is still underfunded.

HAVE YOUR SAY ON FLOOD INSURANCE

As our minds turn to bushfires and being prepared for what looks to be a hot, dry spring and summer, it might seem an odd time to writing about the 2022 floods.

But there is a lot to be learned from floods the Hawkesbury experienced, especially when it comes to improving affordability and availability of insurance. It's clear the current insurance arrangements have not served everyone well and a new government inquiry needs to hear from people who flooded, about their insurance experience.

I have been appointed to the Standing Economics Committee, along with the Member for Calare, Andrew Gee and Queensland MP

Shayne Neumann, for the inquiry, and we want to make sure our communities voices are heard.

That's why I'm urging Hawkesbury residents to share their flood insurance story - even if you weren't insured.

There are two ways to take part: you can take a survey or make your own individual submission to tell your story in more detail - even if it occurred in one of the earlier flood events.

The inquiry is looking at this issue from all angles and your contribution will help guide the questions we ask insurers and other stakeholders, and ultimately help shape the inquiry's recommendations to the Albanese Government.

Whatever your experience was, good, bad, easy or frustrating, or if you weren't insured at all, we want to hear about it so we can make the system work better for our communities.

I really encourage everyone to share your insights with the Committee so we can get the specific examples of the issues people have faced when dealing with insurance companies before and after floods.

FUN & FRIENDS ON OUR WATERWAYS

Living, as we do, in the Hills and Hawkesbury areas we are fortunate to have some amazing waterways to enjoy.

The majestic Hawkesbury River and its tributaries such as Berowra Creek and the Colo River have provided us with a means of transportation in our early days and beauty spots for relaxation.

Some thirty years ago or more, the late Gordon Mandin, and his wife, Joan, operated the historic ferry "Macquarie Princess" as a cruise vessel along Berowra Creek and the Hawkesbury. My wife and I had some great trips on this vessel and one recollection I have is when I had some family members from interstate and their friends join us on a cruise during which Gordon allowed me into the wheelhouse and for me to take the wheel of this historic ferry for a part of the way along Berowra Creek. We got to know Gordon and Joan from our days with Sydney Hills Tourism which, at the time, was the Tourism body representing tourist operators in the Hills district with my wife being the Secretary of the group.

Amongst other members of the tourism group

were Tom and Hilda McQuillan who, along with their son Simon, operated "Able Hawkesbury Houseboats" at Wisemans Ferry. Tom, I also discovered, once was a ferryman in my old hometown and birthplace of Bristol, England in his younger days.

During the late 1980s it was decided that the

Christmas party for the Tourism body be held onboard one of Tom and Hilda's larger houseboats in the middle of the river. It was a great evening where we enjoyed some of our great local seafood. The locally caught prawns were amongst the best I have ever tasted. That night Tom amazed us all by drinking a glass of water straight from the river, proving to us that the water was so pure.

A couple of years later, my wife and I decided to hire a houseboat for a week from Tom and Hilda and cruise along the beautiful Hawkesbury and

MacDonald rivers and watch the world go by as we relaxed on board. Well, that is what we thought we would do; however, I was enjoying myself so much that I wanted to see as much as I could of the river. During the week I wanted to explore every little bay or inlet that I could see whilst my wife just wanted a restful river trip and pull over to enjoy a relaxing lunch or meal every now and then. For me, as soon as lunch was over, I was upping anchor and at the wheel of the boat and away.

Tom had said that we had enough fuel on board to last us for the week we had hired the houseboat. He said that he had only one customer in the time that he had been operating the business who had ever run out of fuel. Little did he know of my desire to explore and discover every nook and cranny of the Hawkesbury that I could find. As a result, our trip became a series of memorable incidents.

There was the getting stuck on a sand bank near the Hawkesbury River Bridge at Brooklyn as the tide was retreating and getting up at 2.30am to move the houseboat once we realised the tide had come in and we could float free. There were also problems when travelling near oyster leases when you had to be careful that you had sufficient room not to be carried over them by the tide. I had failed to keep watch over the fuel gauge as I discovered near Spencer when the vessel's motor came to a stop. This in the days before we had mobile phones.



We were in luck when she found a weekender where the owner was just locking up to go back to his home in the suburbs and who had a phone in the home. She telephoned Tom who then sent his son, Simon, out for the hour-long trip by boat to where we were situated on the Hawkesbury with a can of fuel. My wife has never let me forget that holiday!

Four Hills Little Athletes at Australian High-Performance Camp

Four Hills youngsters have made the most of their 2023 Coles Little Athletics National High-Performance Camp held at the Gold Coast this week.

Matilda Webb and Caitlyn Martin from Winston Hills Little Athletics, Jack Proudfoot (Hills District Athletics) and Brendan Armstrong (Cherrybrook Athletics) were among more than 75 other top performing athletes born in 2009 who were invited to compete at the October 1-4 camp.

All participants were chosen on their performances at the recent 2023 Coles

They were also made aware of the process that is required to assist with their own development, in the high-performance pathway.

The youngsters were mentored and supported by former Australian stars who shared their experiences during coaching sessions. Athletes took part in training sessions, workshops, recovery sessions, presentations, and social activities onsite.

"I am always very pleased to be able to contribute to the development of up and coming Little Athletes and look forward to meeting them at the camp," said Australia's first Olympic heptathlete champion, Glynis Nunn OAM, the driving force behind the camp since it began 11 years ago.

Zoe has competed in discus at the regional level while Immy, who is also a gymnast and football player, is the state discus champion for the past two years. She has also competed at NSW level in shot put and high jump. Immy underlined her growing confidence by winning gold in discus and silver in shot put at the recent Athletics NSW Primary Schools challenge.

Dylan previously competed in Little Athletics at Kuring-Gai for a few years and also represented his high school while Karen represented her high school and was school age champion in athletics but never did Little Athletics herself, which she regretted.

When their children started doing athletics, they and CA – which is open to athletes of all ages, with a strong Seniors/Masters team - strongly encouraged Dylan to get back into it despite the long layoff.

Karen then saw other parents doing it and said to herself: "I can do this too!"

Dylan's first event for the club was the NSW Masters where he won gold in his 40-44 age group in shot put while breaking the all-time club record. He continues to break club records while competing in Masters Nationals and Masters Indoor State and Nationals throwing events, and is an inspiration to other members.

Karen is keen complete for the club for the first time as she pushes herself to reach new heights in her renewed athletic career.

"From the time the kids started at Cherrybrook we were always happy to help," Karen said. "Since then, we both became Age Managers as we understand athletics. It's great to be involved at the grassroots level, teaching young athletes basic skills and watching them progress in both ability and confidence. The

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



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
