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NEW COUNCILS BY BEV JORDAN

Hills Shire Council welcomed new Mayor Dr Michelle Byrne and the 12 newly elected councilors at a special meeting on Thursday, 3rd October to publicly swear them in.

It was a tight race for the 12th council seat with Greens' councillor Dr Mila Kasby only finding out at the declaration on Tuesday afternoon (1st October) at the Hills Electoral Commission Office that she had secured the last vacant seat on council, just 114 votes ahead of Labor's Dilvan Bircan after the eighth count.

An application by the Labor party for a recount on Wednesday (2nd October) was dismissed by the Electoral Commissioner who said there were insufficient grounds to warrant a ninth count.

There was an 88.72 percent turn out in North Ward. Liberal Mitchel Blue secured his second Term on council with first preferences votes after Liberals gained 63.92% of the vote. The huge vote meant that Liberal Jacob Jackson who was first elected to Hills Shire council in August 2018 and served for three years, was also elected.

While the results of those two seats were known after the polls closed at 6pm on election day, September 14th, there was a lot of movement on the third seat with Labor initially ahead.

Counting didn't begin on the sizable number of Postal votes until Monday, September 30th followed by preference distribution.

Councillor Kasby said it had been a roller coaster ride until the vote was declared.

The three new faces on Hills council are all from the Labor Party: Tina Cartwright, Immanuel Selvaraj and Jane Grevtseva who won the third seat on East Ward by 612 votes ahead of Greens candidate Suzannah McDonald on the eighth count after distribution of preferences.

Of the 8 Liberal councillors elected, Frank Di Masi, Reena Jethi, Mitchell Blue, Rosemarie Boneham and Jermome Cox have been on council for the past four year term. Liberal councillors Sam Uno, Alan Haselden and Jacob Jackson are returning after a four year break.

HAWKESBURY RESULTS

At Hawkesbury Council there was a lot of counting with the final 3 seats only decided after the 59th count.

With 10 Groups and a total of 62 candidates vying for the 12 seats on Hawkesbury City Council preferences were always going to be important.

In the end the Liberal Party claimed four seats and the Labor Party was reduced to just one seat with the Independent team led by Mary Lyons-Buckett picking up a seat. Under the banner of People Not Parties, it now has a second representative on council with Dr Tom Aczel claiming a seat on the 59th count of preferences. Also elected on the 59th count were Liberal's Paul Veigel and Independent Les



Sheather who are both returning councillors. As there isn't a ward system in Hawkesbury all 12 represent the whole city.

The 12 councillors declared for Hawkesbury City Council are in the order they were on the Ballot Paper:

ALAND RESCUES SKYVIEW PROJECT

Work to complete the three unfinished Skyview apartment buildings at Castle Hill, opposite Castle Towers, is set to start in the next few weeks after leading Australian developer and construction group ALAND was appointed to do the work.

ALAND has undertaken to complete the construction of the three buildings (which they refer to as Buildings C, D and E) at the site at 51-53 Old Castle Hill Road and to also rectify any potential defects in the existing shared basement.

The company, which has over 20 years experience in the industry, was selected by receivers KordaMentha who were appointed following the collapse of Toplace and its associated companies.

A spokesman for ALAND said site preparation and pre-construction activities had already begun. The work will take an estimated 16 months to complete depending on the weather and other factors.

Two buildings in the five-building development have been completed. The third is around 80 per cent complete, a fourth about 40 per cent and fifth about 25 per cent. ALAND will work closely with the Building Commission NSW while it gets the work done. ALAND has a 100% completion rate of projects and was recently awarded an iCIRT Gold rating following a rigorous and independent review process to determine its capability, capacity and commitment.

According to its website it has 38 developments in NSW. Over 5,000 departments built, 1,708 departments under construction (including 405 apartments at Schofield Gardens) and 6,000 apartments being planned.

ALAND Founder and owner Andrew Hrsto said ALAND has a strong record of turning around challenging projects and transforming them into award-winning residential complexes in sought-after suburbs.

"ALAND maintains an end-to-end capability that uniquely positions us to take on these types of projects," he said. "Both KordaMentha and the Building Commission NSW clearly recognise our strong reputation, the quality of our product and our expertise and we are excited to drive this entire complex to completion." The complete development will provide a total of 964 apartments housing 2500 people. When completed, buildings C, D and E at Castle Hill will be offered as Build to Rent homes and will increase rental property availability with 536 apartments providing much-needed rental housing for 1500 residents.

In June this year the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News carried a story saying a spokesman for The Hills Shire Council said that Building Commission NSW was working with receivers and managers to appoint a contract to complete the Hydra, Phoenix and Vela Towers.

Buyers were blocked from moving into the \$900million apartment complex in 2021 after the NSW Building Commissioner confirmed "extensive signs of cracking" were discovered in the basement of the buildings.

Toplace run by Jean Nassif had its licence revoked in December, 2022. In May 2024 the Supreme Court wound up JKN Hills PTY Ltd which was the Toplace entity responsible for the remediation works.

DRINK DRIVING

Hills police arrested 21 individuals for Drink Driving in September. Supt Naomi Moore said: "It is incredibly disappointing to see so many individuals making the reckless decision to drink and drive. This behaviour endangers not only the drivers but also innocent road users."

Incidents include:

- A 27-year-old male driving a grey Subaru Impreza along Windsor Road, Baulkham Hills lost control and crashed into a black fence before hitting a concrete fence at about 1:30am on Saturday, 28th September, Police arrived at the scene around 1:50am and conducted a breath test on the driver, which returned a positive result. He was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station, where a breath analysis indicated a blood alcohol concentration of 0.146. His driver's licence was immediately suspended and he is due before Parramatta Local Court next month.
- Another male driver who crashed is also due in court for high range drink driving. Police were called to the scene by passersby following the crash at 8.40pm on Wednesday, 25th September at the junction of Windsor Rd and Terry Road Box Hill. The driver gave a positive reading 0.244 for high range PCA. His licence was suspended and he was issued with a court attendance notice.
- A 57-year-old driver was charged with high range drink driving after colliding with the rear of a Mercedes at 7.20pm on Monday, 23rd September in North Kellyville. The Isuzu Table Top Truck collided twice with the Mercedes A2000which was waiting to turn right at the intersection of Withers Road and Oxlade Street. Police were alerted to the incident through the automatic

collision alert system of the Mercedes. Officers arrived at the scene at 7:47pm and observed significant damage to the rear bumper of the Mercedes, which was partially in the oncoming lane. The truck driver returned a positive breath test result. He was arrested. A subsequent test at Castle Hill Police Station showed a level of 0.162 (over 3 times the legal limit). The driver's licence was suspended. He is due before Parramatta Local Court in November.

- Several concerned shoppers called Hills police after seeing what appeared to be an intoxicated man getting into his car and trying to drive out of the car park at Oakhill Village Shopping Centre, Castle Hill at around 4.20pm on Wednesday, 18th September. They told police the man had narrowly missed hitting parked cars and a fence. A roadside breath test was conducted, returning a positive result. The 47-year-old male driver was arrested and transported to Castle Hill Police Station, where a breath analysis indicated a blood alcohol concentration of 0.254 grams per 210 litres of breath, over five times the legal limit. His licence was suspended on the spot and he is due before Parramatta court.
- A 55-year-old man was observed by police driving north on Windsor Road, Rouse Hill at 12:05am on 18th September swerving in and out of its lane. Police activated their warning devices, signaling the driver to stop. A roadside breath test returned a positive result. The driver was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station, where a breath analysis indicated a blood alcohol concentration of 0.121 grams per 210 litres of breath. The driver's licence was immediately suspended. He is due before Parramatta Local Court next month.

PRAISE FOR RESCUERS

Hills police have praised two women who came to the rescue of a woman who they saw was being intimidated on Ridgeline Drive, The Ponds and took her to Castle Hill Police Station at around 11.45pm on Monday, 23rd September .

Police say that a woman was visibly distressed and was walking towards the bus stop on Ridgeline Drive when she encountered the accused and an alleged domestic violence offence occurred. Despite her pleas, the accused allegedly continued to follow her as she walked towards Schofields Road, a distance of about 2kms.

Two female witnesses, noticing the victim's distress and the accused's persistent following, pulled over and asked if she was okay. When they heard her cry for help, they immediately offered her refuge in their vehicle and drove her to Castle

FINED OVER \$2K

A dirt bike rider had an expensive day out when he decided to ride his bike through Crestwood Reserve off Chapel Lane Baulkham Hills at around 5pm on Friday, 20th September.

Police received multiple phone calls regarding the dirt bike on the reserve where several children were playing oz-tag and numerous members of the public were present. Callers said the 19-year-old

HOUSE FIRE

Emergency services responded to a house fire at a single-level residence in Colin Place, Carlingford just after midnight on 19th September.

At approximately 12.21am, a loud bang was heard from the garage, prompting the occupants to investigate. They attempted to extinguish the fire but were unsuccessful. The fire quickly spread, engulfing the garage and moving through the house.

Emergency services were alerted, and police from The Hills PAC, along with multiple Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW) units, arrived on the scene around 00:31. FRNSW began efforts to extinguish the fire, while police located the three occupants trapped in the backyard. Officers forced open rear fence panels to assist the occupants to safety.

Paramedics treated one occupant for minor burns and smoke inhalation before transporting them to Concord Hospital for further treatment. The other two occupants were assessed at the scene and found to be uninjured. A neighbour was also treated for minor smoke inhalation.

The fire was brought under control and extinguished by 1.26am. FRNSW has determined the likely point of origin to be the garage, with an electrical cause suspected.

MAN, 28, SHOT Police have launched an investigation into the shooting of a 28-year-old at Winston Hills on Wednesday night (2nd October).

Officers attached to Parramatta Police Area Command were called to Dale Place, Winston Hills, at around 10.50pm and found a man had been shot four times on various parts of his body.

He was treated by NSW Ambulance paramedics at the scene before he was taken to hospital in a serious but stable condition where he was placed under police guard.

At about 11pm, officers were called to Redbank Road, Northmead, following reports of a car fire. A Jeep Grand Cherokee SUV was destroyed. The police are working to establish what happened. Anyone with information, CCTV or dashcam vision in relation to this incident to contact Parramatta Police or Crime Stoppers .

MEN ARRESTED

Two men were arrested by Hills police on Wednesday morning following calls that there was a break in at a house in Quarry Rd, Dural which was being renovated.

Officers from The Hills Police Area Command arrived at 9am and successfully apprehended two males, aged 33 and 37, for breaking and entering a home. The community has been congratulated for their vigilance. Anyone with further information to contact The Hills Police Area Command on Crime Stoppers.

Hawkesbury's Helping Hands New Technology Hub

Hawkesbury's Helping Hands has upgraded how they serve the community with their new Technology Hub, which harbours eight workstations with computers and headphones. For over 13 years, Hawkesbury's Helping Hands has served the local community by offering a helping hand to anyone who could use some help.

The Technology Hub is a joint endeavour with Mastercard in which the Mastercard tech team and engineers volunteered their time to install the equipment they donated. There was no funding for this ambitious project but between the volunteers at Hawkesbury's Helping Hands, Mastercard, and assistance from a few local businesses, they were able to pull it all together.

Linda Strickland, the founder and CEO of Hawkesbury's Helping Hands, says how the Technology Hub has already proven useful in the short time since it has opened. It allows anyone who does not have access to a computer or Wi-Fi a place to come and use the internet, in a no judgement environment.

Hawkesbury's Helping Hands was founded in 2011 by Linda and her daughter Cassidy and is still running strong with about 45 volunteers on rotation. The unfunded charity started very small and did not have the space they have now, but services have been added and extended over the years as demand grew to where they are now. Linda says each week they service hundreds of people, with them servicing 45 people for dinner alone on the 22nd of September.

The unit the business resides in was once spacious but is now filled with donated items and free services for those in need. "We outgrew the space in 2019 after the bushfires", Linda says and yet thanks to help from a local storage service, they were still able to make room for the new Technology Hub.

The Hawkesbury's Helping Hands unit in South Windsor also offers a chance for people to sit on a beanbag and watch some TV, or even just use the room to get out of the weather. It also dons toilets and a free shower with most of the unit's space being taken up with crates of donated and bought goods.

Hawkesbury's Helping Hands services the Hawkesbury 5 days a week. They have free meal services every Saturday and Sunday from 6pm-7pm in which anyone is welcome to come down for dinner. The drop in hub is 8am-1pm every Wednesday to Friday where people can come for tea and coffee, to watch the TV, use the computers and other amenities, or even just for a chat. Every Saturday from 2pm-4pm the volunteers sell hampers filled with rescued food that has been purchased. The hampers are only \$20 but are filled with a large number of goodies and each week the hampers change based on the availability that week.

As a charity, the organisation gives what they can to those who need it. They have camping gear for the homeless, free food and toiletries for those in need. Linda says, "Anything that comes in for free, goes out for free". Everything that is donated to the organisation, is available for those who may be struggling at absolutely no cost.

Hawkesbury's Helping Hands also does other programs and events over the course of the year such as the free Christmas Day Lunch for anyone who could use the company and a meal on the day. They also do a back-to-school program, disaster relief and remote Aboriginal community runs.

Some programs even come about just as the need arises. Linda talks about how she had noticed some of those who were struggling couldn't afford the upkeep of their dyed hair, so she organised a drive for hair dye and hair wash products to maintain the colour. Linda says that these types of drives help people to be more comfortable with themselves. AUSTIN'S LEGACY: Parents Fundraise to Give Bears of Hope

A loving Mother and Father have raised more than \$14,000 to deliver Cuddle Cots for grieving parents, in honour of their baby boy, Austin.

In Australia, six babies are stillborn everyday, and one in four pregnancies end in loss. Taneal Pond and her husband, Bradley Pond, experienced this devastating loss with their child, Austin Jeffrey Pond.

Whilst grieving the loss of their child, the parents were able to spend more time with their son through a donated 'Cuddle Cot', fundraised to the hospital on behalf of another family's child, Jesse Bowles. Cuddle Cots are an initiative of Bears of Hope, which is a charity that provides free pregnancy and infant loss support to families after experiencing the devastating loss of their baby. They are designed to keep the baby's temperature cooler, allowing parents to spend days with their child before they have to say goodbye.

Taneal spoke about the incredible support of Northwest Private Hospital during their grieving process. Her mission to give back and offer other families hope started with a small teddy bear. "It's been such a wonderful experience with Bears of Hope. The first thing we were given was a teddy, donated in honour of Josiah Finn. It let me know that people weren't alone, and that people have been through this before. I don't know who these people are, but these people were okay, and we would be too".

After her experience in the hospital, Taneal and her husband wanted to give back to the community and provide other parents with bears. However, they soon raised \$6,500 necessary for a Cuddle Cot at Northwest Private:

"Throughout this, we've been so lucky to be surrounded by an amazing network of family and friends. We didn't think that we would raise this much. We contacted Bears of Hope and within two weeks we had the Cuddle Cot at Teneal Pond and Bradley Pond with their two children.

our house, [which we were able to assemble ourselves]. Bears of Hope was fantastic, and we decided we wanted to be directly involved in that process."

The couple continued their efforts, asking people to donate bears in Austin's name, hoping he could offer the same comfort they received to others. Taneal and Bradley's fundraising efforts didn't stop there. With the support of community and friends, they were able to fundraise for a second cot, which was sent to King Edward Hospital in Perth.

A group of dedicated Barbershop Acapella singers performed on the Gold Coast at the Barbershop Harmony Festival, earning a gold medal for the first time in the Chorus' 28 year history.

Across Australia, 16 Choruses and 11 Quartets participated in the annual Barbershop Harmony Festival, held this year at the Star Theatre. Barbershop is an acapella four-part Chorus with a tenor, lead, baritone and bass singer, often linked to the musicality of 50's movies.

Hills Harmony Chorus entered with two Quartets in the Senior Mens, Vintage Fusion and the Mixed section, What Four? Why Not! Both Quartets took home gold and the Senior Chorus with 12 members also came 3rd in their section.

Formed in 1996, Hills Harmony Chorus regularly performs in regional and national organisations, as well as Retirement Villages and charity organisations. Secretary Ian Nicolson first performed with the Chorus in 2023 after he picked up a flyer about the group's 'Learn To Sing' four-week program.

"I didn't know how well I could sing before I went to the course. At the end of the four week program they asked me to sing with four others with the musical director. I retired a couple of years early and I was looking for something to do, there's a lot of groups for women to join when they retire but there aren't as many opportunities for men. It's a good time of fellowship, caring for a group of blokes to get together. However, as a group we are not restricting ourselves to a men only Chorus".

Ian was elected as Secretary from December 2023, and was re-elected until Senior Men's Quartet, *Vintage Fusion*, with their Gold trophy.

September 2025. Since the competition, the group has been elated with their results, as three of the twelve singers in the senior Chorus competed for the first time:

"We jumped up and down when they first won, it was the first time we won gold medals at a national level. The trophies are still making the rounds with all of the members!"

Ian said their famous four-week singing course to 'find your voice' welcomes new singers female and male, regardless of their experience.

DV Network Coercive Control

The Hills Domestic Violence Prevention Network (HDVPN) hosted an overwhelmingly positive Domestic Violence forum at the Castle Hill Cultural Centre on the topic of Coercive Control in Practice.

The forum, held on 18th September, was attended by members of the community, frontline workers, government staff, and students, all eager to gain practical insights into how coercive control operates and how to support those affected, making them better prepared to manage these situations in their own contexts.

Under the leadership of Uma Menon, Co-Chair of HDVPN and Chair of the Forum, the event was a deliberate response to what the community has been asking for: clear, practical information on how to identify coercive control and support those experiencing it.

"The topic of coercive control struck a chord with the community, and rightly so," Uma said.

Paula Smith, founder of Upstream Educator, Investigator, and Survivor Strategist facilitated a powerful presentation on coercion, Visa weaponisation, cultural safety, and technological abuse.

Using case studies, Paula's approach enabled participants to engage deeply with the content, helping them identify coercive control behaviours, such as isolation, monitoring, financial control and restricted freedom.

Coercive control refers to a series of sustained behaviours intended to make a person dependent, isolate them from support, exploit their resources, deprive them of independence and regulate their everyday behaviour. This might include restricting the victim's movements, isolating them from friends and family, controlling their access to money, and using intimidation to instil fear.

Coercive control is now recognised as a criminal offence in NSW, and offenders can face up to seven years in prison for this kind of abuse.

Recognising coercive control requires education and collective awareness understanding what it looks like, how it starts, and what we can do to stop it.which is why the Hills Domestic Violence Prevention Network (HDVPN).

Held the forum which brought together a diverse range of community representatives,

including panellists and the DV Forum committee.

The collaborative case studies demonstrated the power of sharing knowledge across the community to better support people compounding the impact that coercive control can have on people experiencing cultural and linguistic barriers and disability. Participants learnt from one another to better understand ways to tailor their support approaches.

Uma Menon highlighted the importance of this approach, stating: "Participants came away more open-minded and felt better equipped with information and resources to support victimsurvivors effectively."

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Carers Connect Expo and Support

Miriam Sonego (pictured) is deeply attuned to the needs of carers, having provided direct care for her late mother and connected her to essential services that enabled her to live independently.

With over 20 years of experience in the aged and disability sector, including a decade managing the Cumberland/Prospect Carer Respite Centre with Baptist Care, Miriam brings a wealth of knowledge to her advocacy.

Miriam highlights several persistent challenges faced by carers, such as limited access to respite services, long waiting lists for community aged packages, and the overwhelming demands of caregiving that often lead them to neglect their own health. Many carers are unaware of the available support due to time constraints, which can result in heightened stress and missed opportunities for assistance.

The wellbeing, psychological distress and social connectedness reported by respondents to the 2022 National Carer Survey conducted by Carers NSW, together with the Australian State and Territory Carer Organisations remains at concerning levels, similar to the 2020 Survey. Almost half of all respondents (47.5%) experience high to very high levels of psychological distress, and 56.3% are socially isolated or highly socially isolated. Currently volunteering with Hills Community Aid, Miriam is helping to organise the upcoming Carers Connect Expo on October 16 as part of Carer's Week celebrations. Building A New Career

Sunil Narayan was a teacher in Fiji but when he moved to Sydney he changed career paths.

The Riverstone resident wanted to take advantage of employment fuelled by the construction boom and so studied a Diploma in Civil Construction Design at TAFE NSW.

With more than 122,000 jobs forecast to be added to the construction industry over the decade to 2033, and almost 173,000 homes forecast to be built in Greater Sydney over the six years to 2028-29, there's strong demand for skilled workers in the construction sector.

Sunil said: "My career began in Suva, where I was a schoolteacher and then the head of campus at a technical college. But in 2022, I decided it was time for a change. Knowing that construction was an industry in Australia with a ready supply of jobs and interesting projects, I moved here to study at TAFE NSW. With my background in electronic engineering and science, I thought I'd be best suited to the Diploma of Civil Construction Design, so I could build upon my existing skillset and start my new career."

He graduated from TAFE NSW last year and is now helping address Sydney's housing shortage by working as a manager on residential projects across the city. "My studies gave me a wide range of practical skills that I'm using to help succeed in my new role. At TAFE NSW I also gained extensive theoretical knowledge about Australian building standards and codes, which has been essential in helping me transition into this new workforce in a new country," he said.

"Studying at TAFE NSW also bolstered my project management skills, particularly managing construction timelines and budgets. This has helped projects I work on stay on track. I'm now working on residential developments and involved in the whole process from slab pouring to lockup. I'm working all over Sydney, which exposes me to different projects and ensures I'm using my new skillset in a broad range of settings."

Civil Engineering Head Teacher Amro Ezzeldin said studying at TAFE NSW gives students a wide range of industry-current skills to ensure they hit the ground running in their new jobs. "Through courses like our Diploma of Civil Construction Design, we provide students with the practical skills and knowledge necessary to align with current industry standards and secure their desired jobs," he said.



Sunil says he's glad he took the leap to start a new chapter in Australia.

"I feel proud to be using my new skills to play a role in helping secure Sydney's housing supply for future generations. I'm glad I took the opportunity to move from Fiji to start this new life for myself in Australia, and TAFE NSW has played a significant role in making me thrive with this move," he said.



THE SECRET GARDEN It's all about the Birds and the Bees

Recently we held our annual Spring Fair in the grounds here at the Secret Garden, Richmond. The market stalls were very popular, but we noticed that plenty of people were after plants for bee and bird gardens. It would seem that gardeners are getting onboard with creating gardens that attract both native bees, honey bees as well as other insects, and that attracts a whole lot of other wildlife into our backyards!

Bees are attracted to blossoms with plenty of pollen as well as brightly coloured flowers. We stock a great range of Lavenders, Rosemary, as well as the less well known native shrubs like Thryptomene and Baeckea. The French Lavender, Italian and English are the most hardy and reliable small shrubs to go for! They usually last around 3 years and then tend to start to die off - just rip it out and start again! They enjoy full sun, a regular trim and keep them mulched and they will be happy! We carry the upright Rosemary 'Tuscan Blue' and the trailing variety - great for retaining walls as they love hot sun!!

Callistemons or Bottle Brush are reliable native flowering large shrubs and small trees. The red, white or pink flowers usually appear through the warmer months and they are much loved by councils for street trees always a good indication of their toughness.

Citrus trees provide awesome scented spring blossoms which are very attractive to bees - the added bonus is the winter fruit which follows!! They are great for nesting birds also providing great cover and a steady supply of insects. Limes, lemons, oranges and mandarins are all available at the Secret Garden.

The Salvia species are brilliant for providing year round colour - except for the depths of winter. There are literally hundreds of varieties to hunt down, from pretty blues and mauves, to bold reds and pinks to subtle blush pink, whites and yellows. We are investing in building our stocks up of these cheery little guys - most stay less than 1m in height and provide great fodder for the bees and the birds. All they need is a good prune at the end of winter, re mulch them, add a handful of Dynamic Lifter and they will take off! Don't be timid with the prune - get into it!! By mixing your varieties you could have flowers for 8 months of the year!

Another great way to encourage bees is to invest in a Bee Hotel. These are man made timber boxes specifically designed to allow native bees to colonise. Our Mates Shed at the Secret Garden builds them and they are one of our best sellers! The Mates Shed is a place where all those with a disability can use their skills to build cool things using timber: so every Bee Hotel we sell helps turn their dreams into reality!! We fill ours with drilled out hardwood, short lengths of hollow bamboo and add various nooks and crannies. The bees are attracted to nest in them, which encourages them to stay around in your garden, feeding from the flowers and pollinating your veggies.

All of the above plants also attract birds, from Honeyeaters after nectar, to providing habitat for smaller birds. The more spiky foliaged natives provide a safe haven from the bigger birds, and enables smaller species to nest deep in the foliage. The flowers attract insects for small birds, and small trees allow bigger birds to nest just that little bit higher to escape predators like foxes and wild cats. Both birds and bees require a steady supply of water - this only needs to be 10-20 deep for bees. You can add pebbles into your bird bath to create this shallower area for the bees to slurp up water while maintaining the deeper end for bird drinking and bathing. Or have several around - even better! With the warmer months upon us, top up every day and you will definitely have them visiting!

So next time you're out and about in your neighbourhood, check out what the bees are interested in! Snap a pic, ask someone or google it, and invest in providing homes for our smallest residents in our gardens!

Feedback from participants was overwhelmingly positive, with an 81% engagement rate and 83 attendees noting a significant increase in their understanding of coercive control.

Alexandra Duckett, Castle Hill said: "What resonated deeply with many of us in the room was simply asking victim survivors "what's your highest priority right now?" – there is so much power in curiosity and listening, rather than making assumptions."

Many participants left with a greater awareness of the different forms of coercion, improved confidence in recognising these signs, and practical strategies for providing support to respond effectively to coercive control.

"We asked Bears of Hope to put a photo of Austin in the Cuddle Cot box, so that he will never be unnoticed. Seeing Josiah's name on that bear truly provided us hope and we really wish that seeing Austin's name on a bear can provide hope to other families".

The 29-year old Mother and 31-year old Father also have a 3 and a half yearold daughter, Mackenzie, which Taneal has described as her beacon of hope:

"We've both had to be parents for our daughter who has been such a trooper. My daughter has been such a light for us to keep on going, without my husband and daughter - I don't know where I would be right now".

However, Taneal also wanted to remind the community on how Dads can often be forgotten in the process of grief:

"It's so hard for husbands to stand by and watch their wives go through that. It's just as much our journey for both of us. My husband wanted to share, 'I'm just sitting in the hospital thinking of all the moments I had with my Dad that I've lost with my son, even little things like teaching him how to drive or brewing beers together". Taneal wanted her story to let other families and Mothers know that they aren't alone in their grief.

"My first advice is it's so easy to feel so alone but it's really important to remember that you're not alone. Infant loss feels like your world is crumbling around you, but you need to lean on those pillars around you with your community and family. There are people that have walked this path before. I also think it's very comforting to try and make something from such a tragedy - for us doing the fundraiser was keeping our memory of Austin alive".

Dr Michelle Byrne returned to the Mayoral Chair she had last occupied from 2017 to 2021 on Thursday, October 3rd, saying she was grateful for the community's continued trust and support.

Connor's Big Race

An image of Connor, a 7-year-old cancer survivor from Bowen Mountain, will feature on V8 Superutes driver Jimmy Vernon's helmet for the Repco Bathurst 1000 next week ((10th October to 13th).

He and his family will be joining the V8 Superute driver at the Repco Bathurst 1000 as special guests - going behind the scenes to explore the pit, sit in Vernon's racing ute, the 'Purple Rocket', and experience all the fast-car action.

His story shines the spotlight on the nearly 800 children diagnosed with cancer in Australia each year. Vernon is also supporting the Castle Hill-based Kids with Cancer Foundation which supports kids with cancer and their families.

Conner was diagnosed with Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia in August 2023 after months of colds and flus, skin infections, bowel issues, tummy pains, sore legs and eventually lots of bruising. At first, Connor's parents and GP had an answer to the ailments - school germs, not eating healthily enough, it's normal for a young boy to have bruises on his legs...

Then, one night in August 2023, Connor experienced severe stomach pain – so severe his parents took him to the emergency department at the local hospital. Connor was discharged and asked to do some blood tests the following morning. That night he was rushed to The Children's Hospital at Westmead for more testing, and Connor and his family were given the devastating news that Connor had Acute Lymphoblastic Leukaemia.

Connor endured seven months of intense chemotherapy treatment which brought on many side effects and challenges. Connor lost his ability to walk twice during this time and required physio to rebuild muscle and strength. Connor moved into remission and then finished his phase of intense treatment in March this year. He now remains on oral chemotherapy until August 2025 which will mark two years since diagnosis.

Connor is now back at school and is playir sport again, riding bikes and being a typical 7 year old boy. Connor loves fast cars and is so excited to see himself on a racing car drivers helmet whizzing around the famous Bathurst track.

Throughout his journey, his family has had the support of Kids with Cancer Foundation, a charity which provides financial assistance for families of kids with cancer – through paying household bills, medical expenses, grocery and fuel/transport costs, as well as providing Care Packs, Wigs 4 Kids, funding paediatric clinician positions in children's hospitals around Australia, funding children's hospital infrastructure and capital works, and funding research into childhood cancers.

Rebecca, Connor's mum, says: "Kids with Cancer Foundation has been an amazing support for our family. They have helped us pay some large outstanding bills, provided us with tickets to various events and when in the oncology clinic for appointments and hospital stays, Connor has been the recipient of many care packages to cheer him up and fill his day. This is such a wonderful foundation and we are so grateful for their care and support provided to us. Thank you, Thank you!"

WIRES Hawkesbury Summer Advice

WIRES Hawkesbury Branch is starting to head into its busy season as the warmer weather arrives. Hawkesbury's volunteer koala coordinator, Morgan Philpott, is dedicated to caring for injured animals and wants to spread awareness of wildlife safety as we head into summer.

WIRES in the Hawkesbury is run by volunteers who catch injured animals, nurse them back to health and release them back into the wild. Morgan, with the help of his team, and a trained veterinarian is currently treating a 5-year-old koala named Daphne for chlamydia. Most of the koalas they treat at their property in Richmond are sick with chlamydia. Morgan mentions that when Daphne was first picked up, she couldn't even open her eyes due to disease. Thankfully, Daphne is about halfway through her treatment and already looks much improved. Once she is finished her treatment, the team at WIRES Hawkesbury will return her back where they found her in Kurrajong.

The property for WIRES in the Hawkesbury has room to house up to 4 koalas at a time and in peak season Morgan says they can have all 4 spaces filled. Koala breeding season runs from September to February which means more males may be seen out and about looking for a mate.

Like koalas, many other animals have their mating season soon as we head for the warmer months. This means you will be seeing a lot more animals around in the Hawkesbury and surrounds. Hawkesbury is rich with biodiversity, with hundreds of bird species alone, and that means the work of WIRES Hawkesbury branch is just that much more important. It is vital that you know when to call WIRES and what to do if you see an injured animal.

It is very important for WIRES to keep track of koalas as they are an endangered species. "Even if someone sees the koala and it looks quite healthy, it's still good to phone WIRES and put it in as a record of sighting", Morgan says. This record of sighting then goes into the WIRES database which feeds into the BioNet database. Morgan says this is important as developers use the BioNet database when looking for places to develop, which is becoming an increasing concern as animal habitats are being lost to developments.

Sometimes when WIRES gets a call about injured wildlife, the animals have already walked off before they arrive. If it is safe to do so, you can trap the animal until help arrives. Morgan says it all depends on the type of animal. He says to not try and contain snakes, as they can kill you, or bats, as they carry harmful diseases. Some birds can have very sharp talons which can also seriously

injure. Koalas themselves can prove dangerous in trying to capture. "I'll always advise people around koalas that if you feel confident to do it, we'll explain how to do it. Even if it's just getting a washing basket to stick over the animal on the ground, put a blanket over it and secure the blanket with a couple of bricks. Then we know when we get there, the animal is there, and it's a fairly low level of risk for the members of the public", Morgan says.

With the warmer months meaning an increase in animals around, it is important that people stay vigilant. As Morgan says, "Animals tend to come across our paths more, so if they're sick, then people will see". It is important to contact WIRES if you do see an



injured animal, as it could save their life. Koalas, for example, can die from symptoms associated with chlamydia. Daphne's chlamydia caused her to go blind which meant it was harder for her to find food and defend against predators. For animals like Daphne, the work WIRES do is very important. In the 2023 financial year, WIRES was able to assist 131,167 native animals in need.



HIDDEN IN THE HILLS

It could be said that bushland would not be the same if there weren't any birds around. When walking through bushland reserves it is possible to encounter many birds as they search for food either on the ground, through the undergrowth or in the treetops.

Larger birds, because they are more easily seen appear to be fairly common. However, it can be the smaller birds which tend to captivate a bird watching enthusiast.

It is a very fortunate occurrence to come across a bird in the process of nest building. It can even be more interesting to observe a parent bird supplying food to its demanding juvenile.

To successfully observe most birdlife in bushland forests it is important to remember that humans are intruders in their environment. Most small birds will keep their distance as you walk along a bush track.

If you are specifically in the bush to observe birds it is advisable to wear bush coloured clothing which makes you less noticeable. Remember to move slowly, talking softly to anyone with you. Don't make sudden movements like pointing at arms length to where you think you have just spotted a bird. Take a pair of binoculars with you as well.

If you have a camera with you, avoid moving it suddenly to eye level, as birds have an amazingly quick reflex to sudden movement causing them to "disappear" in an instant. For best results when capturing images of small birds in particular, a telephoto or zoom lens is almost essential.

Birds naturally are most active when searching for food in the early parts of the day. A greater variety of birds can be located where there is water, such as a creek or a lagoon nearby.

The images accompanying this column are just a small selection of the overall bird population that can be readily spotted in local woodland areas.

Rouse Hill Brewery awarded 'Best NSW Beer'

In the 2024 Sydney Royal Beer and Cider Show, Esker Beer Co. stole the show with four champion trophies, including 'Best Beer in Show' and also two gold medals.

The Australian Brewery in Rouse Hill is the only brewery in the Hills Shire Council, with a Craft-beer company, Esker Beer Co. launched in 2022. The humble team of only six, including four brewers, is run by General Manager Dan Shaw, who has been with the brewery since its beginnings in 2010.

At the 2024 Sydney Royal Beer and Cider Show, Esker Beer Co. stole the show with winning both the Champion Fruit or Sour Beer, Best NSW Beer or Cider and the coveted Best Beer in Show with their Esker Citrus Gose.

Head Brewer, Charlie Claridge, who has been at the Brewery since 2016, previously studied an industrial chemistry degree at UNSW. However, he switched over to beer after studying a postgraduate Certificate of Brewing at Fed Uni. He spoke proudly of their Citrus Gose, which is described having a tart aftertaste:

"We had an idea that we wanted to change beer and create a signature beer with the new brand and that is the citrus Gose. We wanted to focus locally on the Hills Shire and we wanted to pay tribute to the fruit growing history of the area". The local brewery's successes didn't stop there, they also took home Champion Indian Pale Ale with their Esker West Coast IPA, and won two gold medals for their Esker Old Dark Ale and Esker Hazy Pale out of the 206 exhibitors across Australia. While Charlie didn't attend the award ceremony, he spoke of how proud he and his team are of the achievement:

"We are really stoked to win the Best in Show. We like to put our beers into the awards to be judged for some feedback from the judges, but we certainly weren't expecting to win. It's a great reward for the care and effort the team puts in".

Esker Beer Co. has six beers in the core range, including the best selling beer, Esker Pacific Ale. They've previously won awards including the Best Modern Pale Ale for their Hazy Pale at last year's Australian International Beer Awards.

For those who aren't big beer drinkers, Charlie's advice was to start out simple:

"Of course my biased opinion is that Esker is the best place to start, but there's lots of complex flavours out there and you just need Kantali James and James Howie of Esker Beer Co. at the 2024 Sydney Royal Beer

> to start with something simple. A Lager is the best to start with and then you work your way into it from there".

Sydney Royal Beer and Cider Show Chair of Judges, Ian Kingham, said he was very impressed with the quality of entries this year and congratulated all entrants on a fantastic show:

"I was particularly impressed with Esker Beer Co. Following a rebrand and redirection in 2022, the Hills Shire brewery has not only won four champions and a plethora of gold and silver medals, but they have taken home the top award with the Esker Citrus Gose really impressing our judges".

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

High Achieving Winston Hills Athletic Centre Launches 50th Season

Winston Hills Athletics Centre recently launched its 50th season with a grand ceremony, with founding member and former president David Bruce saying it is a huge achievement. Bruce, 80, said they never thought about reaching this 50th milestone, "because we didn't think that far."

"We tried to make it successful and the club has improved each year, with some of our initiatives like the Most Improved Athlete now popular in other clubs," Bruce said. Remarkably, he still coaches six days a week. "I got involved because of my three children and I still enjoy coaching at the club," he said

Bruce, who cut the ribbon to launch the season, was presented with a Club Patron Award from current president Steven Pospischil.

From a humble start in 1975 where committee members met in what was called the "cow shed" (a tin shed in the middle of what is now the M2), the WHAC is now a thriving club with more than 500 athletes. The early members worked hard to establish a strong foundation, building much of the equipment by hand because money was scarce then.

The hurdles, the high jump uprights and even the tunnels for the tots obstacle course were all hand made. The club has a rich tradition of nurturing and supporting athletes over the past five decades, with Olympians Brandon Starc and Jana Pittman among their most successful members. Starc won the 2018 Commonwealth gold medal and the IAAF Diamond League final.

Pittman, now a practising doctor, is a twotime world champion in 400m hurdles and the 2002 and 2006 Commonwealth gold medallist. She also won the world youth and junior titles and competed at the 2014 Winter Olympics in bobsleigh.

"The 50th season launch day was a wonderful celebration for our club, our athletes and our community," a club spokesperson said. "Many athletes and their families attended. There was face painting, balloon twisting, hair braiding and a free BBQ for the athletes and their families."

Special guests included Castle Hill MP Mark Hodges, Winston Hills MP Mark Taylor, Alvin Umadhay from Little Athletics NSW, WHAC life members and coaches.

The club was formed as Winston Hills Little Athletics Club in 1975 at Max Ruddock Reserve, Winston Hills before moving to Gooden Drive Reserve, Baulkham Hills. The club changed its name in 2019 when it was affiliated with Athletics NSW and LANSW.

In addition to Pittman and Starc, WHAC has produced national and international representatives including Taylah Sengul (Commonwealth Youth Games), Josh Byron (Australian men's netball), Amber Luchtmeijer (U20 Matildas), and Tiana Fuller (Junior Matildas).

Back From Surgery, Judo star Josh says his best is yet to come BY LAWRENCE MACHADO

Leading Hills judo star and two-time Olympian, Josh Katz, is aiming to return to competition mid next year after undergoing urgent knee surgery.

The multiple Australian, Oceania champion is putting behind his disappointment of losing in the first round of the Paris Games in July, as he aims for one more shot at Olympic glory in 2028.

The 26-year-old told the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News that he believes his best is still to come, as he continues rehabilitation after the recent surgery. The 2022 Commonwealth bronze medallist and dual European Open medallist displayed immense courage to qualify for the Paris Games despite suffering a crippling knee injury in January.

"Aside from a disappointing result, my Olympic experience in Paris was really incredible," said Josh who lost to Italian Andrea Carlino of the men's 60kg event.

"Without a doubt the hardest part was how quickly and abruptly it was over," the William Clarke College alumnus said. "After such a long and emotional journey to arrive in Paris, for my competition to be over after match one on day one of the Games was really difficult to accept and process.

Josh and his elder brother Nathan are the first Australian judo brothers to compete in the same Olympics when they competed in the 2016 Rio Games.

The duo run their own speaking and mentoring company, in addition to helping out at their family-run Budokan Judo Club in Castle Hill. Dad Rob, a highly-reputed Australian coach and Mum Kerrye, an Olympian herself, run the club.

"The injury was something that first occurred in January. We just had to do the best that we could with training and preparation so that I could still achieve the results I needed to qualify for Paris, and then arrive at the Games in the best shape possible to give myself the best chance," Josh explained.

"It's going to be a long recovery that will keep me away from competition until the second half of 2025, but I still have the same hunger as before," said Josh, who has a double degree in exercise and sport science and sport management.

"I definitely think my best is still ahead of me, and I'm excited for when the time eventually comes to have one more run in 2028 (Los Angeles Olympics)."

On their speaking and mentoring programs, Josh said they are doing really well, and he plans to devote more time and energy to them so that he and Nathan can reach as many schools and corporate businesses as possible.

Learning self-defence is one of the best things anyone can do, especially with violent incidents, random or otherwise on the rise. And now, you have the opportunity to pick up important self defence techniques from the experts at GKR Karate Region 22.

They will be holding self-defence seminars at Riverstone on Saturday, October 26 from 10am-12pm and at Rouse Hill and Richmond, on Sunday, October 27, from 10am – 12pm. The aim is to fundraise money for 'RIZEUP Australia' to help stop domestic and family violence. GKR Karate is a self defence based martial arts organisation.

According to the latest Australian Bureau of Statistics, sexual assault recorded by police rose 11 percent from 2022 to 36,318 victims in 2023, with 84 per cent of the victims being female. Two in five (41 per cent) were between 10 to 17 years.

The seminars will offer self-defence techniques, tools of awareness, danger avoidance and escape techniques in a fun and friendly environment.

Main instructor Sensei Ben and assistant instructor Sensei Stefie will be running the event at Rouse Hill while Sensei Charmaine will be conducting the seminars at Riverstone and Richmond. Sensi Charmaine Agius, the GKR Karate Regional Manager and senior karate instructor, said her goal is to help kids, teenagers and adults learn life skills that will benefit them long term, "like it did with me. "Besides learning self-defence, karate has other benefits such as learning discipline, self-control, and being more fit and healthy," she explained.

"I've been training with GKR for just over 14 years, and I have won and lost in tournaments, and learnt to improve my skills further. I achieved my 3rd dan black belt in 2022.

"I have sustained many injuries outside of karate, with all this done before I started training in karate. Although I teach sevendays-a-week, I'm dealing with arthritis in both knees, three bulging discs in the L3,4 and 5 with each disc torn in four different places.

"I have epilepsy, (and) although I have these injuries, I still get up, dress up and teach my class."

Sensei Ben has experience in eight different styles of martial arts, including Brazilian jiu-jitsu, Maui Thai and boxing. Sensei Stefie is the head Yoji (3-4 year old class) Instructor for the region. GKR has seven locations in the Hills District and Hawkesbury.

MEMORIES WITH IVOR JONES & FRIENDS

THE MUSICAL DOCTOR

As we age, there is no doubt that we need more medical care. Having to attend a medical centre every two days during recent months my mind has turned to medical centres within the area.

When my wife and I moved to the Hills 40 years ago, there was a medical practice owned and operated by a well-known GP at the time. That GP went on to become a celebrity who amassed a great fortune. The medical practice was named, or known as a "Superclinic", and was one of a chain of such clinics around the eastern states. The GP that we mostly saw at that practice was Dr. Poulos who went on to start the Railway Street Medical Centre at Baulkham Hills. The owner and Principal at the "Superclinic" was one Dr. Geoffrey Edelsten, whom I only consulted once.

But going back to the 1960s, Geoffrey Edelsten's working life was altogether different. Before becoming a GP, his life revolved around the music and record industry. He owned a record company in Melbourne called Hit Productions and a record label "Scope" which in 1967 had an association with the largest Australian owned record company of Festival Records. In 1966 he also co-wrote songs for a few music groups and produced a record "Love Machine" for the studio group Pastoral Symphony, comprising Glenn Shorrock and his band the Twilights, Ronnie Charles of the Groop and various other musicians. His involvement with the recording industry may well have been influenced by his parents who owned "Edels" a nationwide chain of music stores.

Whilst his involvement in the music industry was brief, he is mostly remembered in the Hills district for his medical practice and flamboyant lifestyle. He did have a charitable side early in his medical career, as a GP he bought a medical practice at Walgett. He then obtained a private pilot's licence enabling him to provide medical services to remote communities – often at no cost to patients when they could not afford to pay.

Following the establishment of Medicare by the Hawke government in February 1984, Edelsten began to run innovative and multi-disciplinary 24-hour medical centres which were the forerunners of modern corporate medical practices.

Decorated with chandeliers, white grand pianos, pink carpets, and gold coloured metal walls, the clinics attracted considerable media attention. Edelsten's clinics were the first in Australia to bulk-bill patients to Medicare so that they incurred no direct cost. Within four months of opening, the first clinic was dealing with 2,000 patients every week. Edelsten eventually owned thirteen medical centres, in which approximately 20,000 patients consulted 200 doctors every week. The Baulkham Hills medical centre or Superclinic was such a clinic.

Another interest that Geoffrey Edelsten had was sport, particularly football. On 31 July 1985, Edelsten became the first private owner of a major Australian football team, the Sydney Swans. In July 1986, Edelsten


tried to buy the Cronulla-Sutherland Sharks rugby league team, but his offer was refused by the game's administrators. Edelsten was a long-term benefactor of the Carlton Football Club and in March 2013 the club awarded him life membership.

Edelsten's flamboyant lifestyle certainly attracted media attention by his marriages which were three in total. He owned mansions, helicopters, and a fleet of Rolls-Royces and Lamborghinis with license plates such as Macho, Spunky and Sexy. In June 2012, thieves stole luxury cars belonging to Edelsten, worth more than \$1.4 million. Among them was a Lamborghini Aventador worth approximately \$800,000 – one of only a handful of Aventadors in Australia.

When Edelsten was living at Dural, he was involved in a spectacular single vehicle accident in which his car left the Windsor Road at Baulkham Hills at high speed and crashed into the front yard of a house and he was taken to hospital.

Geoffrey Edelsten was found dead at his Melbourne apartment on 11 June 2021, aged 78.

He was buried in a small service at Springvale Cemetery on 16 June 2021.





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
