Tills to Hawkesbury

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NEW CIVIC LEADERS

Hawkesbury City Council has a new Mayor, Les Sheather (Ind) after he was voted in by a majority of Hawkesbury's councillors, including the four Liberal councillors, at a special meeting on Tuesday, 15th October 2024.

The position of Deputy Mayor went to Liberal councillor and former Mayor Sarah McMahon. They will serve in their respective roles until September 2026.

Unlike Hills Shire Council where the Mayor is elected by the electorate during the Local Government Elections, the Hawkesbury Mayor is voted on by the 12 elected Hawkesbury Councillors and it can be a long drawn out process.

Councillor Sheather re-claimed his seat on Hawkesbury City Council after the 59th count



of the vote after the Local Government Elections on September 14th. He gained the seat with 2,010 votes following the distributions of preferences.

The election saw the Labor Party reduced to just one councillor (Amanda Kotlash) losing its second seat to Independent Tom Aczel (2,056 votes) after the 59th count. The last seat was picked up by Liberal's Paul Veigel after the final distribution of preference with 1,871 votes.

In contrast, over 70,000 residents voted in Dr Michelle Byrne as Mayor of Hills Shire Council in the September 14th Local Government Elections. The Liberal Mayor's first preference vote was 71,520 which was boosted to 75,293 votes following the distribution of preferences (71.1% of residents).

Councillor Frank De Masi was elected Deputy Mayor by councillors at the first Hills Shire Council Meeting after the election on Tuesday, October 8th.

The West Ward Councillor who has already served two terms on Council and said he was "deeply honoured" to be elected as Deputy Mayor of The Hills Shire.



"I'm looking forward to working alongside Mayor Byrne and my Councillor colleagues for the betterment of our region.

"We have a lot we would like to achieve in this term of Council, and I would like to particularly focus on how we can reduce the cost and scale of waste in The Hills Shire and how we can advocate for the NSW Government to help."

Hills Shire Mayor Dr Michelle Byrne said: "Clr De Masi has earned the role of Deputy Mayor through his extraordinary passion and work for The Hills Shire. Frank is a proud Hills resident who has served as a Clr since 2017. His knowledge of and enthusiasm for The Hills will be an incredible asset in our advocacy efforts for our residents."



Call for Showground School

An e-petition calling for a new primary school at Castle Hill Showground has now been signed by 3,710 people.

Launched by Castle Hill MP Mark Hodges it calls for a new school for the area, claiming 9,500 children will be without a school if one is not planned soon due to the planned growth area around the Showground Metro station.

The Petition states: "For over a decade, promises of a new primary school have not materialized. Castle Hill and nearby areas are experiencing rapid population growth, leading to overcrowding in existing schools. The lack of adequate educational facilities is stressing families, teachers, and local infrastructure.

"The CAP of 5,000 apartments placed on the Showground Precinct was due to the need for a school, with assurances that this cap would not be lifted until a school was provided. However, Minister Scully has recently increased this cap to 9,500 apartments, yet no school has been built or committed.

"According to ABS, the average household has one child, resulting in 9,500 additional children in the Showground Precinct.

We ask the Legislative Assembly to call on the Government to:

- 1. Immediately allocate funds for planning and constructing a new school in Castle Hill.
- 2. Provide a clear and binding timeline for the school's development and opening.

3. Engage in transparent communication with the community.

4. Ensure the new school is adequately staffed and resourced to meet our growing community's needs.

In September the Government announced the site for a new public high school on land it owned in Guntawong Road, Tallawong to cater for the growth area around Tallawong Metro Station, reducing pressure on nearby schools.

The new high school will initially cater for 1000 students, delivering more than 50 permanent classrooms, and is due for completion on day one, Term 1 2027.

A release from the Government at the time of the announcement said: "Delivering this new high school is part of the NSW Government's work to address the school infrastructure backlog in Sydney's north-west growth corridor, with new public schools being fast-tracked in Melonba, Box Hill, Tallawong, Gables and Nirimba Fields, and major upgrades underway at Rouse Hill High School and Schofields Public School.

In June The State Government announced that a temporary school was being fast tracked for the growing Box Hill area with enrolments set to open from 2025.

Its media statement said that the government will begin work on a new primary school and high school at Box Hill, in addition to the new primary school in Gables. Together the three schools will cater for 3000 local students with room to grow.

It said the state's most populous school campuses at Riverbank Public School and The Ponds High School will receive significant additional funding for further upgrades on top of those already underway, to cater for their large and growing student populations.

There was fury from local civic leaders when no funding was allocated for new schools at Castle Hill in the State Budget despite Castle Hill Public School catering for more than 1,000 students and Castle Hill High catering for over 2,000 students before the extra influx of residents.

BRAVERY AWARDS

The Commissioner's
Commendation for Courage
has been awarded to three
members of NSW SES The
Hills Unit for their involvement
in a life saving flood rescue.

Volunteers Matthew Stone, Mathew Knight and Christopher Ward received the award earlier this month for their involvement in a dangerous Flood Rescue in 2022.

On 8/9th March 2022, their team responded to an urgent, potentially life-threatening situation after a resident, who had a history of heart complaints including previous heart attacks, required urgent attention when he developed chest pains while cut off by flood waters in a remote area near the Hawkesbury River.

The conditions at the time, together with certain aspects of the job, combined to make it a very challenging job.

The crew had to navigate around 72 km of heavily flooded, turbulent river in a remote area, at night, during rain and generally with poor visibility, on top of a 100 km round trip road journey;

They located the patient in an isolated and remote area based on vague directions and at a time when communication was not available,



including NSW Ambulance losing contact with the patient when the call dropped out;

Persevering, even when told by other locals that the given address did not exist. Operating in the dark while raining, wading and carrying the patient through flood waters; and operating in an environment where assistance or backup was effectively unavailable.

The citation said: "The volunteers faced these challenges with resilience, courage and skill, delivering the patient five hours after it was tasked to them. The patient was safely retrieved and transferred to the Ambulance Service who transported him to hospital where he spent three days before returning home safely."

ARSON PLEA

Police are re-appealing for public assistance over an alleged arson in Marsden Park. At about 11pm on Friday, 23rd August, emergency services were called to Fermoy Road following reports of a suspicious fire. Officers attached to Riverstone Police Area Command located a shed well alight. Fire and Rescue NSW extinguished the fire a short time after their arrival. There were no reports of injuries. Initial inquiries alleged a man was at the premises a short time before the fire ignited. He is described as being of Caucasian appearance, of slim build, and has a beard, last seen wearing a blue shirt, light coloured pants, and a blue baseball cap. It is believed he was riding an e-scooter. Anyone with information about this incident is urged to contact Riverstone Police Area Command or Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

CHOOK HEIST

A woman was arrested and charged on Monday 14th October following the theft of \$2000-worth of chicken from Rouse Hill last month. Police say that in the early hours of Monday, 2nd September a delivery of 65kg of chicken was left at the rear of a butcher's shop in Rouse Hill.

CCTV footage captured a black Kia Sorento, registered to a 36-year-old Whalan resident, pulling into a loading bay at 3:45am. She was accompanied by an unknown female accomplice. The duo proceeded to make off with several boxes of chicken.

The woman was spotted in the same vehicle on Monday and was stopped and spoken to by police. She is due before Parramatta Court next month.

DRIVERS' CHARGED

Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol were conducting routine patrols on Green Road, Kellyville on Friday, 11th October At around 9.20pm they observed a silver Hyundai traveling southbound allegedly travelling at 113 km/ hr in a 60 km/hr stretch of road. The 22-yearold male driver from Rouse Hill had two male passengers. A roadside breath test returned a positive result. The driver was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station for a breath analysis. At the station, the breath analysis returned a reading of 0.094 grams of alcohol per 210 litres of breath. A notice of licence suspension was issued to the driver. As well as court attendance notices for Mid Range Drink Driving and exceed speed over 45kph.

 On Tuesday, October 8th a 29-year-old man was spotted by Hills Police at 1.43am driving a grey sedan with alleged stolen NSW plates at a storage complex. The individual, along with an unidentified accomplice, unloaded various items into a large white bin and took them to the unit. Later that day, police executed a search warrant at the storage unit and seized numerous items: Stolen NSW registration plates, Stolen trailer vehicle identification plates, debit cards, a gel blaster, knuckle dusters and 0.3 grams of suspected crystal amphetamine On October 10th, the individual presented himself to Castle Hill Police Station and was subsequently arrested. He was charged with multiple offences, including driving while disqualified, using a vehicle with altered number plates, and possession of stolen goods and prohibited items and will appear in Parramatta Local Court next month.

At 9:48 PM on Thursday, 10th October, Hills
Highway Patrol officers conducted a routine
traffic stop on Showground Road, Castle Hill.
The 37-year-old male driver could not produce
a valid license and allegedly provided false
identification details. During a search of the
vehicle, officers allegedly discovered a small
clear plastic bag containing 2.8 grams of
Methamphetamine. An oral fluid drug test at
Castle Hill police station allegedly returned

a positive result for Methamphetamine. A sample has been sent to the laboratory for further analysis. He has been charged with: Providing false name, Driving while disqualified (second subsequent offense), Possession of prohibited drugs (Methamphetamine and MDMA powder) and Driving with oral fluid (pending lab results).

On Saturday, 5th October 2024, The Hills
 Highway Patrol were conducting stationary
 drug and alcohol testing on Caddies Boulevard,
 Rouse Hill. At 6:45 PM, they observed a red
 Ford Focus travelling in an easterly direction
 on Commercial Road. It suddenly changed
 lanes, appearing to avoid the testing site.
 Police followed the vehicle and stopped it
 a short distance away on Greensborough
 Avenue, Rouse Hill. The driver, 69, , was drug
 and alcohol tested, returning negative results.
 Police enquiries revealed that the accused was
 the holder of a NSW C class driver's licence,
 which had expired and was endorsed as
 disqualified.



Waterski Tragedy

A celebration to remember the life of 25-year-old water-ski champion Jack Coaldrake will be held on Friday 25th October at Hawkesbury Race Club.

Jack died on Sunday 6th October while water skiing on the Hawkesbury River.

Emergency services were called to a boat ramp at Lower Portland at about 7.25am following the incident. He was brought ashore and treated by NSW Ambulance paramedics but died at the scene.

Police are preparing a report for the information of the coroner.

He was with close family friends and his girlfriend of over two years Samara Ross when

Jack worked at the family business Coldys Towbars and Bullbars at McGraths Hill.

His dad Dave said on Facebook that the world was made a better place by Jack being in it.

"He packed so much into 25 years, more than most do in a lifetime."

Tributes have been flooding social media since the news of Jack's death reached the closeknit community.

Ian Macca McCorkell from the Vintage and Veteran Powerboat Club said the club had lost a very valued member.

He said Jack was: polite, happy go lucky, hard working, dedicated young man.

"Anything he put his mind to he did with 100 per cent effort.



"RIP Jack You will be missed by so many" The young waterskier had won a number of titles including the prestigious Barry Carne Memorial Cup in 2023. He also placed third in the men's open world waterskiing titles last November.

Waterski Racing Europe said online: "Jack was a deeply valued member of the waterskiing community, a dedicated mentor, and a passionate ambassador for the sport.

'He will be greatly missed but his legacy will live on in the hearts of all that he knew.'

He leaves behind his parents. Dave and Nat and siblings Blake and Georgia.

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

Vaping Concerns

Australia has led the world with regulation of cigarettes. Our community understands the harms of smoking cigarettes.

Now there is regulation of e cigarettes. Single use vapes are now banned. Vapes can only be sold at pharmacies to people over 18 and can no longer be sold at tobacconists or other small businesses.

The number of children smoking e cigarettes at school has increased in the past 5 years. Vaping increases the risk of seizures, insomnia, anxiety and depression, and lung damage (from depositing aerosol and particulate matter in the airways).

It can accelerate dental cavities. There is 3 times the risk of progressing combustible tobacco use.

It is very easy to be addicted to vapes.

The BEAT Program

Breathe Easy All Together (BEAT) is a program at the forefront of e cigarette prevention in Western Sydney. Working together are the Prevention Education and Research Unit (PERU) and the Eastern Creek Principles network.

BEAT utilises evidence-based program with a peer-lead education model to empower students to make informed decisions about vaping. The BEAT programme is currently recruiting schools.

Vaping Adolescents and children

The incidence of vaping in 14–17-year-olds is one ten. It is important not normalise this behaviour. The risk of harm is so significant that the prevention strategies are vital.

What is a vape?

Vaping devices heats a mixture and generate an aerosol together with particles. This is inhaled mixed with pure air.

The original mixture of vapes is glycerine, propylene glycol, nicotine and flavours that soaked into a sponge.


What you inhale?

- The original mixture
- Chemicals from the mixture reaction
- Thermal degradation from A and B depending on device characteristics
- Metals and other materials from heating the device
- Thermal degradation of the sponge.

Vapes are Waste disposal problem

This can be complex, expensive and confusing for the public. Vapes need to be pulled apart before they can be disposed of. There are various hazardous components to them - a lithium battery, toxic liquids, nicotine. Councils will need to deal with this as it is too dangerous for the public to deal with.

Car Changing Lives

This week, four sisters, Elizabeth, Mary, Kitty, and Frances from the Refalo family estate, were delighted to donate their parents' specially adapted disability vehicle to the Manning Foundation.

Seeing this car donated to Northwest Disability Services (NWDS) in Baulkham Hills was a deeply emotional moment for them, as they knew their parents, Charlie, and Jane Refalo, would have been proud to support those in need.

The wheelchair-accessible vehicle will now benefit the hundreds of participants at NWDS. While the service already operates mini buses for group transport, this is their first car, opening up new opportunities for one-on-one excursions.

NWDS CEO, Carmen Izurieta, said they were very grateful for the donation which was organised through the Manning Foundation. "Donations like this make all the difference to our organisation," she said. "It will allow our support workers to take participants out individually. This donation will make a lasting impact on many lives."

Lisa Beavan, Chair of the NWDS Board. highlighted the benefits of the donation, saving that it would allow participants, who may not usually be able to leave a building, to visit other NWDS sites. "It will help build social connections and opportunities," she said.

When Charlie and Jane Refalo passed away within nine months of each other, approximately six years ago, the seven siblings, Elizabeth, Mary, Kitty, Frances, Joe, Sonia, and Jovce wanted their parents' disability vehicle and household belongings to be put to good use. After numerous discussions with many people and organisations, their real estate agent, Martin Baldacchino from Century 21 The Hills, connected them with Bill Driver from the Manning Foundation, a volunteer organisation established 19 years ago to support people in need across the Dundas, Parramatta, and Hills

With the assistance of Bill Driver, the Refalo family was pleased to donate many household items and furniture, which have already been distributed to disadvantaged individuals and

President of the Manning Foundation, Lorraine Bonisoli, expressed her gratitude for the donation. "We were delighted to pass on the car to NWDS, and we have been able to

distribute other items from the Refalo family to those in need," she said. "We are always eager to pick up furniture and pass it on to those who need it." She explained that the foundation provides furniture to people moving into public housing, including those who were previously homeless or fleeing domestic violence.

Lorraine said the Foundation was recently able to provide a recliner chair for a person undergoing home dialysis. The charity also helps with food donations. "We receive many calls for help from all over Sydney, but due to distance and a shortage of volunteers, we are unable to meet the needs of many," she said.

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Care and Connect Domestic Violence Program Expands to Support Sexual Assault

Wentworth Healthcare recently launched its expansion of the Care and Connect domestic and family violence program, which now includes supports for survivors of sexual violence and child sexual abuse.

Domestic, family and sexual violence are a complex issues that affect 1 in 5 women and 1 in 16 men over the age of 15. As the primary provider of the Nepean Blue Mountains Primary Health Network, Wentworth Healthcare has funded the Care and Connect Program alongside the Department of Health and Aged Care. The initiative aims to support primary healthcare professionals in the Blue Mountains, Hawkesbury, Lithgow and Penrith areas to identify, respond to and support victim-survivors.

A report by the Special Taskforce on Domestic Violence in Queensland has identified many of those impacted by domestic, family and sexual violence to seek support from a health professional as the first point of contact.

Wentworth Healthcare CEO, Lizz Reay, said despite statistics, sexual violence and child sexual abuse often goes unreported.

"It is important that primary healthcare professionals are supported to identify the signs and to respond appropriately to patients impacted by sexual violence and child sexual abuse as in some cases, they may be the first point of contact for victim-survivors".

"For many health professionals, when they undertook their training the issue of domestic, family and sexual violence was not covered in any depth. While times are changing in the health education sector, there is sometimes

a gap of knowledge for clinicians in this area. This program plans to address this by giving health professionals the tools to ask patients the right questions and the confidence that they have the resources to support any patients impacted," she said.

The reformed Care and Connect Program has a two-pronged approach by firstly, providing training to primary healthcare professionals including GPs, practice nurses, practice staff and others. Secondly, the program provides Care and Connect Linkers through Relationships Australia NSW, who are primary healthcare professionals that can seek advice from or refer patients to.

There are six local general practices in the Hawesbury region with Care and Connect Linkers, who are specially trained in domestic, family and sexual violence, including child sexual abuse and can bridge the gap for victim survivors obtaining appropriate health care and support.

Kate Tye, the Executive Manager Primary Care Development for Wentworth Healthcare wanted to reiterate the process of anonymity and safety for patients seeking support.



"We believe that our Care and Connect
Program helps to integrate the care response
for some of our society's most vulnerable. When
we are talking about family, domestic and sexual
violence and drug and alcohol services, patient
safety can be a concern and staff providing these
services are well trained in this area. People in our
community can feel confident that they are safe
to seek help from these services and that their
privacy and anonymity is assured."

For those affected by domestic, violence, family or sexual violence, Lizz Reay urged survivors to reach out to their GP as a safe place to start seeking help.

"Many people might not know that their GP can be a safe first point of contact for those facing domestic, family, or sexual violence or child sexual abuse. With support through the Care and Connect Program, we are increasing the knowledge and resources GPs and other primary healthcare professionals have access to in order to help address this important issue".

Hawkesbury Welcomes New Community Drug and Alcohol Support Service

We Help Ourselves (WHO) Hawkesbury has opened its free community-based alcohol and drug support service, providing day treatments for those suffering with substance addiction.

WHO's service will offer support to both individuals as well as family and friends with integrated recovery and care. The new centre targeting alcohol and drug (AOD) addiction is funded as part of Wentworth Healthcare and the Federal Government's Community Health and Hospitals Program. Wentworth Healthcare is a local not-for-profit organisation operating since 2012 in the Blue Mountains, Hawkesbury, Lithgow and Penrith regions, striving to improve the health and wellbeing of local people.

With 78,208 total alcohol and other drugrelated hospital admissions across NSW in 2022-2023, WHOS Executive Director, Garth Popple, said the organisation is excited to partner with Wentworth Healthcare to operate the WHOS Hawkesbury:

"WHOS Hawkesbury is a place where people of the Hawkesbury area experiencing issues associated with their substance use, can access our range of best practice community-based WHO's service will be critical in targeting the growing concern of AOD addiction. Within the

Hawkesbury, over 2,000 people received treatment at an AOD treatment service funded by Wentworth Healthcare, and the most common drug of concern in the region was alcohol, accounting for over a quarter of those treated support services."

Services provided as part of the centre include comprehensive AOD support, structured group work, counselling, case management, GP liaison, relapse prevention and access to services including housing and welfare.

Wentworth Healthcare CEO, Lizz Reay is passionate about framing AOD support with a community-based model:

"When it comes to supporting people with AOD concerns, residential rehabilitation services

are important but aren't always suitable in every situation. Some people have responsibilities that prevent them from being able to commit to a residential program and this can act as a barrier to seeking help. That is why community-

based support is so important. People need to be able to seek support and get well within their own community".

Executive Manager Primary Care Development, Kate Tye, also wanted to highlight the unfortunate reality of AOD addiction that can affect anyone in their life-time, and how to support loved ones to access this service:

"Alcohol and other drugs concerns can affect anyone, it doesn't discriminate. It's important to encourage them to seek help and not to judge those affected by these issues. Let them know about this new free service, where no referral is needed, or encourage them to talk to their GP who can also provide them with help."

You can access the service at 2 Forbes Street, Windsor, operates from 9.00am - 5.00pm, Monday to Friday. Patients can be referred by GPs, other specialists or self-refer, and can either walk-in or attend a pre-arranged appointment, by calling 4509 9110.



Hawkesbury headspace is **Destigmatizing Mental Health with** their Open Day

Hawkesbury headspace's free mental health service has been operating in Richmond for the past nine months, but they are hoping to reach even more people with their upcoming open day.

Between 2020 and 2022, the National Study of Mental Health and Wellbeing found that over 1 in 5 Australians aged 16 to 85 experienced a mental health disorder in the past year. Mental health can be an especially challenging journey for young people, particularly those without a strong support network. To address this, Hawkesbury headspace offers free counselling for those aged 12 to 25, in areas including mental health, work, school and study, physical and sexual health, and substance abuse.

Hawkesbury headspace also collaborates with local schools through outreach programs and facilitates social groups to help young people connect with their community. At their upcoming open day on October 18th, they are excited to offer art therapy, live music from local school students, youth art displays, as well as the essential slushies and fairy floss for all attendees.

Lauren Betts, a social worker with Hawkesbury headspace, is part of the Youth Access team and is passionate about ensuring young people have equitable access to care.

"Here at headspace, we meet young people where they're at and work towards goals led by our clients. We strive to continue to be a space that allows youth with the opportunity to seek mental health support in a confidential, safe, and supportive manner".

At Hawkesbury headspace, Youth Access Team Clinician Laura Vouden is a Registered Nurse who has noticed an increase in demand for services in Richmond over the past nine months. She emphasises the importance of providing free mental health support for young people, as financial stress often creates limits accessibility:

"We also know that poor mental health and challenging life circumstances may prohibit a young person from obtaining an income of their own, and that it is not always feasible for family members to pay for these services. We believe that increased accessibility for our service encourages more young people to attend headspace".

"I would first like to validate that it is completely normal to feel that way. For generations, and in many environments that people grow up in, there has been a stigma that reaching out for support is a sign of weakness. But reaching out for support is a sign of strength, not a weakness. Remember, you are not alone, and it is okay to

prioritise your well-being and take that step that can lead to positive changes"

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RAAF SYDNEY OPEN DAY

Richmond RAAF Base Community Open Day

Thousands of people will be treated to some spectacular sights on Saturday, 26th October as RAAF Richmond opens its gates for a Community Open day _ the first since 2016.

It took just a few hours for enthusiasts to snap up the 13,000 free tickets initially released. A smaller batch of 3,000 tickets released on Tuesday (15th October) were snapped up within 30 minutes.

For those who are unable to get on the base on the day there will still be some spectacular movement in the skies over Richmond with flaypasts by a C-130J Hercules, C-27J Spartan and a Hawk 127 Lead-in

There will be a 9am-12pm session and a 12pm-3pm session. A Defence media spokesman the flypasts would be during the morning session and the afternoon session subject to weather conditions.

"We are also hoping to have a handling display by an F-35A Lightning II fighter during each session," he said.

"The Hawkesbury community has been supporting operations at RAAF Base Richmond for nearly a century and the open day will be a great opportunity for Australian Defence Force personnel from the base to meet with the local community", he said.

Attendees will get to experience getting up close to ADF aircrafts such as air combat, air mobility and surveillance aircrafts as well as a whole range of military vehicles.

There is also the opportunity to meet and talk with people in all different areas of the

Defence Force. The RAAF base will also be home to a range of locally sourced food vendors for the day.

Live displays on the day, permitting good weather, will give patrons the opportunity to experience static displays, flypasts, and watching their Military Working Dogs in action. The ADF recommends that due to the low-level flypasts that are planned, attendees bring their own hearing protection, especially for children.

Air Force C-130J Hercules over the RAAF Base Richmond

RAAF Base Richmond is now home to Number 37 Squadron and is best known for being home to the C-130J Hercules medium transport aircraft.

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ROCK FORMATIONS

As you descend into bushland valleys along the many walking tracks in the Hills region, the presence of large rock formations becomes guite obvious.

Grey weathered sandstone bluffs are interspersed with wind eroded hollows resembling small caves.

Water too has a defining influence on the sculpturing of these rocky overhangs.

The continual breaking down of the sandstone provides much of the nutrients required by so many of the wildflowers and other plants growing in this special environment.

Sandstone ridges and slopes retain rainwater and slowly release moisture through the surrounding soils which in turn helps to nourish vegetation in the vicinity.

There are many plants, such as orchids, ferns and mosses, whose roots can actually grow on the surface of the rocks, taking advantage of small cracks in which to secure a foothold. Other plants depend on the close proximity of these rocky habitats taking advantage of the rock's protection in which to flourish.

The ability of large rocky formations to create a protected and cool environment enables


moisture loving plants such as fungi and ground covers the opportunity to flourish in leaf litter beyond the reaches of the sometimes hot sunshine.

On occasions when walking through such rocky places it is possible to be confronted with rock formations that can take on some form of recognisable shape, which could, without too much imagination, be likened to some living or imaginary creature. Several examples accompany this month's column.

Next time if you are out walking along tracks bordered by large rocky outcrops, test your skill by trying to identify one of these rocky features. If you are not sure, move to another position and view your find from a different direction.

Dural Club is also home to a number of Sub Clubs including Dural Lawn Bowls Club, Dural snooker club. Dural Indoor Bowls. Dural Fishing Club and Dural Bocce Club which is an Italian/ European version of Lawn Bowls. All these clubs have benefited from the renovations of the facilities at the Dural Club which now boasts some of the best bowls and Bocce facilities in the region. The aim of these facilities is to connect to the local community and to create

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
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

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

A former William Clarke College student, Stephanie has been with the Hills-based Sister2Sister School of Singing since she was 6 years old and has performed at many major Shire events including Orange Blossom, Relay for Life and Australia Day.

Sisters Sharon & Christine Muscat at Sister 2 Sister School of Singing praises her musical talent: "We are so incredibly proud of Stephi! After seeing so many students come through our hallways over the last 20 years, it's always special when they decide to move into the professional space. LOCAL IN UK RESCUE CHALLENGE

Hawkesbury SES Vollie Part of UK Rescue Challenge

A multi-agency team has returned from the UK after representing NSW during the United Kingdom Rescue Organisation (UKRO) Challenge dominating in multiple training scenarios.

The team won 1st place in the Water Rescue Challenge and 1st place internationally in the trauma and vehicle extraction challenges.

NSW SES Hawkesbury volunteer Matt Thornton was part of the road crash rescue team while

Waverley-Woollahra volunteer Max Henderson competed in swift water challenges.

During one emergency scenario, the NSW road crash rescue team had a strict 20-minute timeframe to retrieve two individuals trapped under overturned cars. Remarkably, they completed the rescue in just 14 minutes.

NSW SES Hawkesbury Unit Volunteer, Matt Thornton highlighted the value of collaborating with diverse teams.

"Working alongside others reinforced that our training is world-class. I learned about the EXIT study in the UK, which focuses on expediting extrications to minimise patient risk—a game-changer."

"These challenges not only benefit us personally but ultimately enhance the service we provide to our community. We respond to about 60 road crash rescues annually in the Hawkesbury Unit, and the techniques I learned will benefit my fellow members," he said.

Waverley-Woollahra volunteer Max Henderson, who was ranked in the 1st position for Helm on the water rescue challenge, said it was a valuable training in swift water rescue techniques.

"I was honoured to represent the NSW SES on an international stage. The training was intense but invaluable, highlighting differences in rescue practices between Australia and the UK. I appreciated the opportunity to learn new techniques."

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



Affordable Public Transport for Hawkesbury

Hawkesbury locals enjoy the serenity and the distance they have from metropolitan areas. Let's face it, why wouldn't you want to live here where there is room to move, raise a family, work on the land or retire in tranquillity?

It's the travel sometimes that can be a disadvantage. So when the Sydney Metro North West opened, I was interested to see how well it might be received by Hawkesbury residents. I mean it's not as if it's on our doorstep, but it's almost in our backyard, isn't it? So, I think we need to provide an efficient way for Hawkesbury commuters to access this rail link because I know they love travelling on the Metro.

Currently, you need to arrive at Tallawong or Rouse Hill Stations before 7:00 a.m. on weekdays, if you wish to park your car within close proximity to the station. I don't think that's good enough. In my Inaugural Speech, I spoke about the opportunity for 'park and ride' access to the Metro. By that, I mean, commuters drive to a large carpark destination and a bus would be waiting to take them straight to and from Tallawong Station. The reason why I haven't pursued this is because we were inflicted with a drought, the Black Summer bushfires of 2019/2020, eight floods in four and a half years, and who could forget, the pandemic. So my focus has been on looking after Hawkesbury as we recovered from these devastating times.

Fast forward to 2024 and I think the opportunity is ripe to advocate for better access to public transport for Hawkesbury locals wanting to travel to the Metro Station.

I spoke with the Minister for Transport, Jo Haylen MP, about this matter and will put forward several proposed solutions that will get cars off the road and people enjoying public transport. Buses on demand is another plausible option. Public transport is a much more affordable option when commuting to work, medical appointments, to school or for recreational purposes. I'm sure with the cost-of-living pressures we are experiencing right now, any savings in weekly travel expenses would be welcomed.

Identifying suitable 'park and ride' locations could be determined through a review of local council or state government parking facilities, already existing in Hawkesbury, that may adjoin sporting fields, community halls or even partnering with clubs and retail outlets that already have carparks established.

Let's find a way to do this, Hawkesbury!

RIVERSTONE PARKS

Riverstone is rapidly becoming the hub for youth in the state, a trend that shows no signs of slowing down. A recent audit by Schools Infrastructure underscores this, with the Schofields-East region within the Riverstone electorate seeing a significant surge in government school enrolments. In 2018, there were 1,535 students enrolled, but by 2023, that number had skyrocketed to 4,762—more than three times the projected figure. In fact, the current student population in Schofields exceeds the numbers originally predicted for 2041. This gross underestimation highlights the challenges posed by rapid growth and the urgency for action.

With more young people calling Riverstone home, it is imperative they have access to the same amenities and infrastructure that past generations enjoyed. One glance at Google Maps reveals the stark reality: the fast-growing areas of Schofields and other northern pockets of the electorate lack sufficient green spaces, parks,

and sporting fields. South of Schofields Road, the landscape is dotted with parks, reserves, and long-established sports clubs that cater to both junior and senior teams. These legacy clubs have long been the heart of the community, offering spaces where sports like soccer, cricket, and netball bring people together.


In contrast, the northern parts of Riverstone, where growth is most rapid, have been left out. No space has been allocated for new sporting parks, leading to overcrowding at existing clubs and facilities. While short-term solutions, such as upgrades to current facilities, are helpful, they are not enough. A long-term, multijurisdictional effort is required to address the shortfall and ensure that the northern parts of Riverstone are adequately serviced.

Older areas of the electorate, such as Stanhope Gardens and Quakers Hill, provide a glimpse of what a well-balanced community looks like. These suburbs benefit from a mix of pocket parks, playgrounds, nature reserves, and sporting fields, creating active spaces that promote both physical and mental well-being. This is the kind of balance Riverstone's new communities desperately need. Unfortunately, the previous government sold land to developers without ensuring these new communities were adequately serviced. As a result, Riverstone suffers not only from a lack of parks and sporting fields but also from inadequate transport, roads, and health services.

Sport plays a critical role in building community, especially in rapidly growing areas like Riverstone. When young families move to the area, local sports clubs provide a gateway for integration, helping both children and parents form connections. For children, participating in sports is about more than just physical activity. It is about learning important life skills such as communication, teamwork, resilience, and patience. These lessons extend far beyond the playing field and contribute to personal development.

Riverstone is home to many talented young athletes, but they deserve equitable access to the same active spaces that children across the state enjoy. As the area continues to grow, the demand for parks, fields, and sporting amenities will only increase. Addressing this shortage requires collaboration at all levels of government. I am committed to working with my ministerial colleagues, federal counterparts, and local councils to ensure Riverstone's youth have the infrastructure they need to thrive.

A multi-talented sportswoman who attended Westfield Sports High School, Jennifer has represented Australia and NSW in futsal and also turned out for the Marconi women's under-21 team in regular football competitions.

Jennifer is also no stranger to the tough competitive fitness sport of CrossFit – she competed for the NSW Masters League CrossFit team at the 2016 competition in Perth.

"After I had my first daughter, I discovered CrossFit, where I trained six days a week at RevX in Holroyd, and competed in a number of competitions placing on a number of occasions. As much as I loved soccer and CrossFit, I found it difficult to juggle with family and shift work.

"My two daughters began karate with GKR karate after getting a flyer sent home from school. When sport returned after the first Covid-19 lockdowns, my husband Peter and I decided to join our daughters and began training.

"After a while, we were hooked and training 4-5 days a week. We met so many great people and made some really good friends. GKR has dojos all across Australia, NZ, the UK and parts of the US. Our area, Region 22 has dojos in Rouse Hill, Riverstone and Richmond."



A MOMENT IN THE

Remember in times past, when your mother would possibly take you to have your photo taken in a photographic studio. Perhaps you may have been photographed by a studio photographer as a baby.





Maybe during December you would have visited a Department store to have a photo taken with Santa. Then of course there were the group photos taken at school or at your workplace. Not forgetting the photos taken on special occasions such as the first day at school in your newly acquired school uniform or those of your twenty-first birthday. What memories those snaps would bring back.

Have you ever stopped to think that the photos from the past reveal much more than the subject. When photographing a person or a group of people you are also showing the clothing fashion of the time. If photographing a picnic scene or street scene you reveal the style of cars or other transport of the day. Have you also noticed that in those distant days many people did not smile at the camera. Perhaps the saying "Say Cheese" was not used so much if at all.

The introduction of the "Box Brownie" by Eastman Kodak in February 1900 brought photography to the masses. No longer did people have to rely on photographers with complicated cameras and images on glass plates. Most early photographs were monochrome in black and white or sepia although a process was developed in 1850 by Levi Hill of the US whilst the basis of most methods of colour photos evolved from a system devised by Scottish physicist James Clerk Maxwell in 1855 however colour photography did not come into use by the general amateur photographers or general public until around the 1970s as evidenced by most family albums.


Photojournalism has been around since the 1840s or perhaps earlier although it was rarely used in most newspapers. The first photograph to appear in a newspaper was in June 1848 showing barricades in Paris during an uprising. This photograph appeared in a French newspaper at the time. The Crimean war in the 1840s appeared as a subject of illustrations later in the Illustrated London News. It was not until the 1930s when it became more widespread and newspapers began to show more and more photos accompanying articles.

Some great Australian photographers from the past were also able to capture the moods of

the time. Photographers such as Frank Hurley, Harold Cazneaux, Max Duplain and Sam Hood and his son Ted Hood were famous for their various photographic skills around Sydney and elsewhere. They not only captured people in various situations but the various moods. I can recall Sam Hood's photograph of Angel Place in Sydney showing a very west and dismal scene. Harold Cazneaux also produced many similar styled photos. Max Duplain's photo of the sunbather on Culburra Beach was also very popular and Frank Hurley's wartime and Antarctic photos as well as his many scenes of Sydney and country NSW are great to view.

During the 1940s and 50s street photographers would often stop pedestrians on the streets of Sydney and other major cities and take photos of young courting couples walking along holding hands.

Now that most people have a mobile phone with a camera included, the Street photographers and the studio photographers have disappeared or are diminishing in use and photography as an occupation is threatened by the digitalisation of technology.



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
