

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## **Powerhouse Castle Hill**

Powerhouse Castle Hill has won the Sir Zelman Cowen Award for Public Architecture.

It is the second major architecture award the facility has won this year.

Presented by the Australian Institute of Architects on Thursday 7th November, the

the 2024 National Architecture Awards' recognises Powerhouse Castle Hill as 'an exemplar of architecture as an interface between the public and research, preservation and curation'.

The Jury citation also described the building as one which 'invites curiosity – placing architecture as a vehicle for experience, both fascinating and cerebral'.

It was designed by Sydney-based Lahznimmo Architects, built by Australian construction company Taylor and delivered in partnership with Create NSW, Powerhouse Castle Hill opened in March 2024.

The \$44 million development at Castle Hill is part of a \$1.3 billion transformation of Powerhouse, led by the creation of Powerhouse Parramatta, one of the world's most significant new museum developments, and is set to open in 2026.

Powerhouse Castle Hill represents a reshaping of museum practice to increase accessibility to collections and connection to local communities, allowing visitors to enjoy one of Australia's most important applied arts

and sciences collection of over half a million objects.

At more than 8,000sqm, Powerhouse Castle Hill has been constructed to international museum standards and features a visible store, allowing public viewing into the 3,000 sqm Very Large Object storage area holding the museum's transport collection. It also features one of the southern hemisphere's largest photographic cycloramas that can carry objects up to 4 tonnes and enable the ongoing digitisation of the collection.

Powerhouse Chief Executive Lisa Havilah said, 'We are thrilled that Powerhouse Castle Hill has been awarded the Sir Zelman Cowen Award, the highest prize in Australian architecture. It sets a new international benchmark in bringing research, collection, conservation and community together in new ways, designed specifically for the Powerhouse Collection.'

Lahznimmo Architects Director Andrew Nimmo said, 'The material palette, both inside and out, is minimal and elemental, with the honest expression of materials on display to showcase their natural properties – including mill finish aluminium, off-form concrete walls and polished concrete floors.

'We aimed for 'beautiful utility', a building with a calmness and cool precision, that

would protect the Powerhouse Collection and functionally serve the activities within.'

Powerhouse Castle Hill was also awarded the 2024 New South Wales Architecture Award for Public Architecture earlier this year.

## TRIBUTES FOR PAUL 'GRIFFIN'

A minute's silence was held at Hills Shire Council on Tuesday night (November 5th) in memory of well-known local businessman Paul "Griffo" Griffin who died on Melbourne Cup Day after an alleged assault.

The 55-year-old was struck at the Ettamogah Hotel at Kellyville Ridge at around 8pm. He was taken to Westmead Hospital where he was put on life support. He died on Friday 8th November. Police have charged a 43-year-old man with assault occasioning death.

Hills Mayor Michelle Byrne said: "Paul was a renowned local businessman and community champion whose generosity and determination to help others knew no bounds.

"Paul grew up in The Hills, attended Muirfield High School in North Rocks and lived in Norwest. He was a proud local business owner, founding Griffin Air Conditioning in 1999, which was based in Seven Hills and operated throughout The Hills Shire and wider Sydney.

"Many members of The Hills community knew Paul through his love of sport, especially rugby league. Paul played rugby league in the 1980s and 90s as part of Hills Bulls and North Sydney Reserve Grade, but his love for the game went far beyond being on the field. "Paul was heavily involved with Hills Bulls where he was a board member from 2013 – 2021, a major sponsor for close to 30 years and a coach

since the 1990s. Paul's devotion to the club was recognised with life membership in 2013. His most recent role with the club was Senior Football Coordinator, a position he held for 12 years.

"His commitment to rugby league also saw him share his generosity and volunteering across many other sporting teams and organisations within The Hills and across the wider Sydney region, NSW and Australia."

The Hills Bulls said in a Facebook post that Paul was larger than life and a dedicated family man.

"Paul's love for his wife Robyn, children Kayla, Jayden and Dana, grandchildren, parents, siblings and extended family was evident in everything he did," the club said. "He was a mentor, a friend, and an inspiration to many. His generosity and community spirit touched everyone around him.

"While we mourn the loss of this extraordinary man, we also celebrate the incredible legacy Paul leaves behind. Paul's passion for the game of rugby league, and unwavering dedication to the Hills Bulls will



forever be remembered by all who had the privilege of knowing him".

According to Mark Jenkins, the chairperson of the Parramatta Junior Rugby League, Paul's influence extended far beyond the sidelines.

"Paul's passion for the sport, his unwavering dedication to the development of young players, and his selfless commitment to grassroots rugby league have left a lasting legacy that will be felt for many years to come," Jenkins said.

Paul was a big supporter of the Jersey Day initiative which encourages people to register for organ donation. His organs have been donated to give others the gift of life.

A service is being planned for Crestwood Oval, the home of the Hills Bulls.

## FRAUDSTER CAUGHT

A man is due to face court charged with nearly 30 fraud-related offences spanning the Sydney area following his arrest at Quakers Hill on Tuesday, 12th November.

In the past six months, 28 incidents have been reported to police, where elderly victims were targeted by persons posing as bank officials. They have been allegedly tricked into believing their bank accounts and credit cards have been compromised.

On each occasion, elderly victims have been instructed to place their credit cards into an envelope and leave it in their letter box, along with their PIN numbers.

The cards were collected and allegedly used across greater Sydney to make purchases and cash withdrawals from ATMs.

Detectives from Riverstone Police Area Command commenced an investigation and identified offences using this method occurred in Riverstone, Kuring Gai, North Shore and Blue Mountains Police Area Commands.

Following inquiries, on Tuesday 12 November 2024, investigators attended a unit at Walker Street, Quakers Hill, and arrested a 22-year-old man.

Police later executed a search warrant at the premises and seized a number of items relevant to the investigation.

The man was taken to Riverstone Police Station where he was charged with 28 offences: dishonestly obtain financial advantage by deception (27 counts) and recklessly deal with proceeds of crime.

Police allege that the frauds exceeded \$65,000. Riverstone Police Area Command Crime Manager, Detective Inspector Meagan Finlay said the arrest was the result of an extensive investigation across numerous commands which resulted in identifying an offender targeting elderly people."

Police would like to use this incident to remind the public to take the following precautions to reduce the risk of being scammed by cold-callers:

- If you receive a threatening phone call (and demanding money), hang up immediately;
- Do not disclose personal details to the caller;
- Never provide your personal or banking details to a person who calls you;
- Never provide your financial PIN or account passwords to anyone;
- Do not make any payments to the caller, either via phone, internet, or cash;
- If you are suspicious about the credentials of a person on the phone, ask questions of them.
   If they avoid answering or refuse to provide information, hang up:
- Don't let scammers pressure you scammers use detailed scripts to convince you that they're the real deal and create a high-pressure situation to make a decision on the spot;
- If you think you have provided your account details to a scammer, contact your bank or financial institution immediately; and
- · Contact police immediately to report the incident.

## **SPEEDING TEENS**

At 2.30am 9th November 2024, Ryde Highway Patrol officers were conducting stationary speed enforcement on the M2 Motorway near Windsor Road, Baulkham Hills. During this operation, a 19-year-old male driving a 2016 black BMW 530i was observed traveling westbound at an estimated speed of no less than 150 km/h in a sign-posted 100 km/h zone. The P-Plate driver was stopped and spoken to by police. He was issued a fine of \$3,300 for speeding over 45 km/h and received an automatic licence suspension for six months.

On Thursday, 7th November, around 1:30pm, police observed an unregistered red BMW 3 Series convertible fitted with plates registered to a green BMW 5 Series sedan in Castle Hill. The vehicles belonged to an 18-year-old male. a suspended P1 license holder. At 9:30am the next day, police spotted the same red BMW on Cecil Ave. Upon noticing the police, the driver allegedly performed a u-turn and sped off, losing sight of the officers. Minutes later, the vehicle was located stationary on Parsonage Road, the driver having "driven the wheels off it" in an alleged attempt to avoid being caught. The driver received six infringement notices within 24 hours, totaling \$3,862 and 6 demerit points, and was arrested and charged with

## **STABBING CHARGE**

A man has been charged following an alleged stabbing in Carlingford yesterday.

About 2pm yesterday (Sunday 10 November 2024), officers attached to Ryde Police Area Command were called to Carlingford Road, Carlingford, following reports of a stabbing inside a restaurant.

Police were told two employees had an argument before one man allegedly stabbed the other man multiple times in his head, face and arms.

The 63-year-old man suffered non-life threatening injuries and was taken to Royal

North Shore Hospital for further treatment. The 46-year-old man was arrested at the scene. He was taken to hospital under police guard for treatment for a minor injury to his head.

A crime scene was established and examined by specialist officers.

The 46-year-old man was released from hospital and taken to Gladesville Police Station where he was charged with wounding a person with intent to cause grievous bodily harm.

He was refused bail to appear before Burwood Local Court today (Mon 11 Nov 2024).

## **FIREARMS SEIZED**

A 74-year-old South Maroota resident faces several charges after police discovered multiple unregistered firearms and ammunition at his property.

Police responded to calls from neighbours on the evening of Saturday, November 9th who alleged the 74-year-old fired a shotgun in his backyard, causing distress to nearby residents.

When police arrived they secured the area and conducted a thorough investigation. The man (who is not a firearms licence holder) was allegedly found in possession of multiple unregistered firearms and ammunition. Additionally, prohibited drugs were discovered on the premises.

He was arrested and taken to Castle Hill police station. He faces multiple charges, including unauthorized possession and use of firearms, possession of unregistered firearms, failure to safely store firearms, possession of ammunition without a license, and possession and supply of prohibited drugs. He was given strict bail to attend Parramatta Local Court next month.

Police thanked community members and reminded the public about the NSW Firearms Amnesty, asking that all unregistered firearms are surrendered

## **LUCKY ESCAPE**

An 18-year-old escaped serious injury when his car was sliced in half following a crash on Old Northern Road, Baulkham Hills at approximately 7.15pm on Tuesday, November 5th.

Police are still investigating the incident on Old Northern Road at the junction of Hill St, Baulkham Hills.

The P-plater walked away from the scene but was arrested after returning a positive

## Windsor High School Students Graduate from RFS Cadet Program BY LANCE ZAFE

Fifteen students from Windsor High School completed the 13-week Secondary School Cadet Program (SSCP) run by the NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) on the 30<sup>th</sup> of October. The two-decade state-wide run program has provided students within the Hawkesbury District and across NSW with essential fire safety knowledge and valuable firefighting skills.

The cadets learned the use of canvas hoses and different nozzles or branches and equipment such as water pumps, rake-hoes, radios, and emergency procedures in the truck itself.

RFS Hawkesbury District Manager, Superintendent Jonathon Hill, presented the students with their Certifications of Completion at a school ceremony.

"This event acknowledges the hard work and dedication of the students who embraced the challenges and learning opportunities offered by the program," Supt Hill said.

"The program also fosters a sense of community and volunteerism and instills core values such as teamwork, leadership, confidence, and initiative."

Supt Hill thanks Deputy Group Captain Phil Hurst, who led a team of 40 volunteers and staff members, Windsor High School Principal Jennifer Hawken and School Cadet Coordinator Jacob Litchfield for helping to make the program a success.

RFS Cadets Coordinator Jacob encourages the students to go into the community and be part of their local brigade.

"Particularly in regions like Hawkesbury, with its extensive service area and numerous RFS stations, a strong volunteer base is essential. Every member, regardless of age, plays a vital role in supporting the community during emergencies," he said.

The "Doll's House demonstration" and the excursions to the Windsor Fire & Rescue and the Hawkesbury SES HQ at Wilberforce were the students' favourite parts of the SSCP. They saw scenarios such as structure fire phenomena, backdraft, and practical fire activities using extinguishers.

Jacob said the cadets were fascinated with those parts because they remember natural disasters such as the 2019/20 Gospers Mountain bushfires, the recent Hawkesbury floodings, and their impact on the Hawkesbury community.

"It's through this program that they are able to learn about how the emergency services help to reduce the impact of these disasters," he said.

When asked why they liked the program and what stood out, Windsor High School students Ruby, Luke, and Gurjaap replied:

RUBY: "I think it made me more confident, particularly with my teamwork and communication skills."

**LUKE:** "It was good to see and learn about something that helps the community. It was also fun learning about how firetrucks are used, along with all the different equipment available to local firefighters."

**GURJAAP:** "From a more practical perspective, it was exciting to learn how to put out a fire at home if I ever needed to and protect myself around fires."

**RUBY:** "My favourite part of actually getting to use the different hoses."

**GURJAAP:** "Like Ruby, my favourite part was using the hoses, but I particularly enjoyed knocking over the cones when we were learning to aim in the target practice activities."

Students living in rural and remote locations may apply for Aurora College, which provides online selective high school and opportunity classes in NSW public primary schools and high schools.



## Baulkham Hills Community Garden

The increase in apartments in our town centres and around transport brings with it an important need for access to open and green space for residents. The importance of this need cannot be understated given the direct links between good physical and mental health and open space.

Community gardens are becoming more common as a way of providing a space for those who live in apartments who don't have access to their own gardens as well as for those who live on smaller lot sizes with little to no backyard. Community Gardens provide an opportunity for residents to dig around the dirt, grow their own herbs, fruits and vegetables, find some stress relief, enjoy the outdoors and connect with other community members.

In 2021, the first Community Garden opened in Conie Avenue, Baulkham Hills, driven by the Hills-Kellyville Rotary Club. For many years, the Hills-Kellyville Rotary Club have run the Orange Blossom Garden Competition and have seen the joy gardens and gardening itself bring to people.

President of the Rotary Club of The
Hills-Kellyville John van den Burg said: "Our
involvement in the Garden Competition revealed
an opportunity for a Community Garden given
the increase in higher density living in the area.
We believe that this initiative could benefit
many in the Community for decades to come."

The Club saw the need for a Community Garden that would bring together residents who live in the apartments in and around the Baulkham Hills town centre and to contribute to their well-being.

With a lot of hard work and determination particularly by Rotarian Keith Stapley, the Hills-Kellyville Rotary got the Community Garden in Baulkham Hills off the ground with assistance from the Hills Council, local businesses, community members and a grant from the Federal Government.

To visit the Baulkham Hills Community Garden shows that the effort in establishing and running the Garden is well worth it. There is a sense of community and belonging by the members of the community who are no longer strangers but friends. It is a place to learn and share knowledge on gardening, nature, cooking and to trade produce and recipes. It is bringing together residents of all ages and backgrounds and is adding to the community spirit of the Hills. The Community Garden is a great place to spend time and is so popular with residents that it needs to expand in the near future.

Anyone can join the Baulkham Hills Community Garden and it is not restricted to residents living in Baulkham Hills. Cystic fibrosis is the most common lifethreatening genetic disease affecting Australian children. It severely affects the lungs, digestive system and sometimes the reproductive system, causing an abnormal build-up of sticky mucus that can make it difficult to breathe. Advances in treatment have seen improved quality of life and life expectancy for those with cystic fibrosis, but currently, there is no known cure.

"When he's well, Lachie's regular treatment includes oral medication – around 20 tablets a day, vitamins, a nebulizer in the morning, physiotherapy and another nebulizer in the evening. When he's unwell, it's a whole different story".

Fifty years ago, children with the most common and most serious forms of cystic fibrosis rarely lived past the age of five. Today, there are adults with cystic fibrosis who are having their own children.

Lachie is now thriving, and Lara puts this success down to the incredible team that surrounds them including doctors, nurses, dietitians, physiotherapists and more.

"This year, our quest speakers are Rob and Deb Sanasi. Their story is guite unique in that Rob was a perpetrator, mainly in coercive control type of behaviour.

"He had a moment, quite literally, where he said "she isn't the problem, It's me.

"He went on to have lengthy counselling and today they remain happily married."



## **Riverstone Youth Forum**

Kids are our future, they are the champions of change. Hearing from them and their ideas gives us a chance to see things from a fresh perspective.

Earlier this year I initiated a Youth Forum designed to bring together students from both public and private schools across the Riverstone electorate with one purpose in mind – to have their voice heard.

As Parliamentarians we implement policies that directly affect the lives of young Australians yet all too often they are not involved in the process. In an area like Riverstone which is home to the most youth in NSW and is undergoing a seismic change both in terms of size and demographics I think it's vital to engage with the people who will inherit the choices our government makes and the legacy we leave behind.

The opinions of these young leaders were thoughtful and insightful. Far from the common misconception that teenagers are disengaged, the participants offered strong opinions on issues ranging from cost of living, housing affordability, mental health and social connection. The students pointed out how pressures on the household budget affected their families and how that was impacting on their own mental health. They worried about how housing affordability was impacting on their desire for independence as they prepare to embark on their careers. They identified the effect social media was having on

disconnecting them from their peers and the antisocial nature of platforms that have such a negative effect on their mental health yet have become so integral to their lives. They yearned for more direct, interpersonal relationships. Above all, they proved the importance of engaging with the next generation and valuing the way they see the world.

It was a great pleasure to host some of these students in the NSW Parliament, where they had the opportunity to engage directly with ministers and other MPs. Students attended question time, spoke directly with Premier Chris Minns and Youth Minister Rose Jackson about their experiences during the forum, and had the chance to present their report to the Premier and ministers. It was an honor to facilitate

direct consultation between our youth and the state's top decision-makers, ensuring that Riverstone's next generation has a say in their future

I wish to thank North West Community Services, in particular CEO Angela Van Dyke and Child and Youth Counsellor Team Leader Vanessa Sokalik. This initiative could not have happened without their assistance. NWCS's enthusiasm and guidance ensured the students felt empowered to put forward their thoughts, no matter how controversial or uncomfortable.

The Riverstone Youth Forum was a resounding success. It has given me a greater insight into the issues that matter most to our young people and, importantly, ideas on ways to create a better future for them.

## HIDDEN IN THE HILLS

## **Ferals and Invasives**

Hills district residents may be surprised to know that there are a considerable number of feral animals roaming unchecked throughout the region.

Residents may also be surprised at the number of invasive garden escapee plant species that are colonising our bushland and adjacent areas.

Most feral and invasive pests are the direct result of historical human decisions, some supposedly made with good intentions. Some were to help eradicate other introduced species. Recent history has proven otherwise. It has now become the responsibility of everyone to be aware of the devastation caused by these exotic species which have no place in the Australian environment. All have the potential to destroy various elements of our unique Australian Biodiversity. Many have toxic effects on humans, domestic animals, livestock and native Australian birds, mammals, fish and insect species. By doing nothing about the adverse consequences of



these species, the sad history of feral infestations continues to be perpetuated.

It is illegal to keep, sell and trade (swap) many of these declared plant and animal species designated as having a detrimental effect on Australia's biodiversity.

There are strong requests for community members to notify appropriate authorities where any of these species are observed in their locality, as well as in other environmental situations elsewhere. Some known local feral animals include foxes, cats, rats, rabbits, dogs, deer, cane toads and possibly horses and goats. All are a death sentence to native birds, mammals, reptiles and riparian dwellers.

Some invasive plants known to overwhelm native bushland plants are Asparagus Ferns, Lantana, Blackberry, Privet varieties, Wandering Jew (Trad) and Scotch (English) Broom.

Feral birds such as Indian Myna, Starling and Feral Rock Pigeon harass and compete with native species for food and nesting spaces.

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## WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Since I started writing in this publication, many new residents have moved into the areas of the Hills and Hawkesbury districts. In this article I hope to explain the origins of various suburb and locality names.

AGNES BANKS, a locality in the Hawkesbury region, was named after Agnes Hilson, the mother of Andrew Thompson (1773-1810), who was described by Governor King as the "Father of Windsor". Thompson was an ex-convict who received a grant of 840ha on the banks of the Nepean River near Yarramundi Lagoon. He named his parcel of land after his mother.

ANNANGROVE was a property owned by Lt-Col George Johnston who lived at Annandale and was famed for his role In putting down the Castle Hill Rebellion in 1804. He planted an orange grove on the property.

ARCADIA was originally part of a district called Galston Heights. It was named Arcadia in 1895, the name being derived from Greek mythology and meant to epitomise the pastoral character of the area.

BAULKHAM HILLS was in official use from about 1801-2 and was bestowed by Andrew McDougall, a Scotsman, who arrived in the district in 1798. He named the area after a village in Roxburgh, Scotland. I have also heard that the name was a corruption of Balcombe Hills. A section of the suburb is known as Balcombe Heights.

BEECROFT, appropriately named in 1886 when a large number of beehives existed in the area. Some say that the suburb was named, however, by the then Minister for Lands after the maiden names of his two wives, sisters Hannah and Mary Beecroft.

BELLA VISTA, once part of Baulkham Hills, was named after Bella Vista Farm. The property was owned by the Pearce family for over 100 years and was once a leading citrus farm for the colonies. A portion of the farm, including the home, remains today and is open to the public on the first Sunday of each month.

BOX HILL, named by wealthy ex-convict Samuel Terry after Box Hill, London.

**CARLINGFORD** was originally called Mobbs Hill after the Mobbs family who owned orchards in the district. It was renamed in the mid 1800's after Lord Carlingford, Under-Secretary for the Colonies, at the request of residents of the area.

CASTLE HILL. The name was mentioned in dispatches by Governor King in March 1802 and is said to have arisen because of the splendid views from surrounding hills. It was also the site of a rebellion in 1804 by 300 Irish convicts.

CHERRYBROOK. The land was originally granted to to Mary Russell in the 1820s. A descendent, Mary Anne Thompson, inherited the land. She married Joseph Harrison in 1839 and they named the property after the cherry trees that they planted near a creek that ran through a portion of the preperty.

**CLARENDON** comes from Clarendon Park, an English Royal forest. In 1811 William Cox built a home there and called it Clarendon House. Cox built the first road across the Blue Mountains in 1814-15.

**CONSTITUTION HILL,** is part of Toongabbie, The name has been in use since 1797. It was the site where the rebels of the 1804 rebellion. had gathered to attack the settlement of Parramatta. However they decided to head along the Windsor Rd towards Windsor and were then persued by Lt.-Col. Johnson's troops.

#### **ALIVE WITH** INTERVIEWS
