**New Hawkesbury Cenotaph** 

Growing crowds at the ANZAC Day Dawn service at Windsor will now be facing a permanent sandstone cenotaph at McQuade Park after a 11-year campaign to have it approved and built.

Members of Windsor RSL sub-branch held its first Remembrance day service in front of the new cenotaph this month on November 11th just nine days after its official dedication.

Planning for a new cenotaph in McQuade Park began in 2013 following concerns about crowd numbers outside the historic Windsor Memorial Gates built in 1925.

Windsor RSL Sub-branch secretary Leon Walker said with more than 5,000 people attending ANZAC Dawn services in front of the Memorial Gates it was felt that there could be a more suitable venue.

'Those who managed to get a spot in front of the War Memorial were the only ones able to see and hear the service. Others packed the streets away from the War Memorial. There was also a Health and Safety Risk in people occupying local streets," he said.

"In 2013 we submitted a proposal to Hawkesbury Council to have a "Cenotaph" included in the "McQuade Park Plan of Management", This was just the first step."

He said the delays occurred because the sub-branch had to deal with both Hawkesbury City Council which managed McQuade Park and NSW Heritage and because the park is on Crown Land their development application had to be resubmitted to the correct authority for consent.

While waiting for consent for the permanent structure services were held in front of temporary structures.

Mr Walker said:

"For the Centenary of ANZAC in 2015 we conducted our first ANZAC Commemorative Service in McQuade Park. We used a temporary sandstone structure which is now located at the University of Western Sydney Richmond Campus. They conduct their Commemorative Services there." Our Average attendance at the Dawn Service now averages around 10,000.

He said the new cenotaph is a simple structure. "The three pillars represent the Navy, Army and Air Force. On ANZAC morning the sun rises to the east of the Cenotaph and beams through the three pillars. It is a place of commemoration along the same lines as the Sydney Cenotaph".

The temporary timber structures used from 2016 to 2024 were of the same design only larger.

Funding for the permanent cenotaph was boosted by a Federal Grant through Saluting Their Service of \$53,669. There were substantial additional costs covered by the Windsor RSL sub-Branch.

LEST WE FORGET

At the dedication service on November 2nd Veterans were joined by serving personnel and politicians with Fr Ranillo Creta, Parish Priest St Matthews Catholic Church and Chaplain Flt Lt Amanda Campbell RAAF Richmond, officiating in the blessing and dedication prayer. The official address was delivered by Sub Branch President David Hadfield, Federal MP for Macquarie Susan Templeman and Hawkesbury's Deputy Mayor Sarah McMahon who were joined by Sub-Branch Treasurer Dave Ingram for the unveiling. The Hawkesbury Cenotaph is our, the Windsor RSL sub-Branch, is our legacy to the Hawkesbury Community.

## **Housing Density Drop**

Transport Oriented Development (TOD) Accelerated Precincts came into effect on Wednesday 27th November as the State government moved to increase housing supply.

Hills Shire Council is one of several Local Government Areas affected by the rezoning changes (Hornsby is also on the list) which aim to create a total of 60,000 new homes near metro and train stations.

About 4,600 new homes with new and improved public spaces have been earmarked for Bella Vista and Kellyville. Between 3 to 10 per cent of all residential properties will be allocated as affordable housing in perpetuity.

The state government says the development will bring about 3,800 new jobs to the precinct. The State government has also said it will introduce new active transport links to the north-western suburbs as part of the development.

An Explanation of Intended Effect (EIE) outlining the proposed changes was exhibited for public feedback between 9th July and 23rd August 2024 this year and 34 submissions were received from industry, councils, state agencies, the general public and other organisations and interest groups.

Hills Shire Council opposed the initial plans which would have allowed 43,000 new homes between Kellyville and Bella Vista Metro stations and urged residents to have their say.

It has welcomed the "significant" scaling down of the proposal but says major questions remain unanswered.

In a media release Hills Shire Council said: "The Bella Vista and Kellyville Precincts already have capacity for 22,576 dwellings and the originally exhibited plans identified a further 20,700 additional homes beyond this. In the finalised plans, this has been reduced to an additional 4,600 homes.

Hills Shire Mayor Dr Michelle Byrne said: "While I'm glad the NSW Government's absurd original proposal has been scaled down, we need to know why all housing growth on the Blacktown side has disappeared and the additional growth has actually doubled on the Hills side.

"Instead of having an additional 18,200 homes on the Blacktown side as originally exhibited. Blacktown will now have no new homes while the Hills has an additional 4.600 on our side, in addition to the 18,600 homes we already have capacity for.

"If Council or a developer submitted plans this light on detail, the NSW Government wouldn't even let us put it on exhibition. Meanwhile the Government is completely

reshaping the face of The Hills Shire with the stroke of a pen.

"This is a major uplift and will require a significant investment from the NSW Government in infrastructure like local roads, schools, parks, playing fields and community facilities."

She said despite repeated requests for a meeting with Minister for Planning and Public Spaces Paul Scully, the rezoning announcements were made without any discussion between the Government and Council.

"The Hills Shire already has the most overcrowded schools in NSW and the Government's only commitment as part of this process is to undertake further investigations to increase school capacity.

"This simply isn't good enough and they need to act fast before quality of life for Hills residents is significantly eroded."

# OOO SERVICES .....

#### SUSPICIOUS VEHICLE

On 24 November, police from The Hills Police Area Command observed a suspicious vehicle on Annangrove Road, Rouse Hill. The vehicle, a Mazda BT50, was bearing number plates that did not match its registration. Upon stopping the vehicle, police discovered the driver had provided false identification details and was driving during a disqualification period.

A search of the vehicle revealed a small resealable bag containing a white crystalline substance, suspected to be a prohibited drug, and a large number of power tools and temporary fencing panels, which were suspected to be stolen. The driver was subjected to a roadside drug test, which returned a positive result for Methylamphetamines.

The individual has been charged with the following offenses:

- Use of an unregistered motor vehicle
- Use of an uninsured motor vehicle
- Use of a vehicle with unauthorized number plates
- Driving during a disgualification period
- Possession of prohibited drugs
- Possession of suspected stolen goods (7 counts)
- Providing false name or home address to police

The individual will be appearing at Parramatta Local Court on 11th December 2024.

#### **BREAK & ENTERS**

Following on from the arrest of a 58 yo Merrylands male made by Hills Proactive Team on 15 November 2024, for multiple break & enters in Dural this month:

The Northwest Metro Region Enforcement Squad have made another break through on 20 November relating to other offences in Dural this month, details are as follows;

- On November 7, 2024, a residence on Langford Rd, Dural was broken into, resulting in the theft of a grey Mercedes. This vehicle was later used in a break-in at Gooraway St, Castle Hill, where another Mercedes was stolen.
- On November 20, 2024, a stolen Audi was suspected to be in convoy with a stolen Ford Ranger in Dural. A pursuit was initiated, during which the Ford Ranger caused minor damage to another vehicle before fleeing.
- On November 20, 2024, a search warrant was executed at a residence in Greystanes by the North West Metro Region Enforcement Squad, leading to the arrest of a 32-year-old individual. During the search, keys to several high-end vehicles, clothing worn during the offences, and small amounts of drugs were found. The stolen Audi was located with false plates. The individual was charged with multiple break & enter offences and was refused bail.

The investigation into the incidents, including the vehicle ramming on November 20, is ongoing.

#### **POWER POLE COLLISION**

A man died after being critically injured in a single-vehicle crash at Kenthurst.

Emergency services were called to Kenthurst Road about 10:30 pm on Friday, 15 November 2024, after a blue Ford XR6 Falcon sedan left the roadway and hit a power pole.

The 18-year-old driver suffered multiple injuries and was taken to Westmead Hospital in a critical condition. The front-seat passenger, a 19-year-old man, suffered a head injury, while the back-seat passenger, also aged 18, escaped with minor injuries.

Officers attached to The Hills Police Area Command initiated inquiries, assisted by the Crash Investigation Unit (CIU).

Police have been advised the driver died on Monday, 18 November, in the hospital.

The older man is in the hospital in a stable condition, while the third man was released. All three are from Glenwood. A report will be prepared for the information of the Coroner.

#### TRUCK AND CAR CRASH

A teenage boy died following a two-vehicle crash in Sydney's west.

At about 4:35 am, Tuesday 19 November 2024, emergency services were called to Wilberforce Road, near Freemans Reach Road, Wilberforce, following reports of a two-vehicle crash.

Officers attached to Hawkesbury Police Area Command attended and found a truck with a dog (trailer) and a hatchback had collided.

The male driver of the hatchback, aged 17, was found deceased at the scene.

A report will be prepared for the information of the Coroner.

The male truck driver, aged 40, was uninjured and was taken to Nepean Hospital for mandatory testing.

Police established a crime scene, with investigations into the circumstances surrounding the incident on going.

#### **KNIFE OFFENCES**

On 19 November 2024, at around 5:15 pm, a 19-year-old male was allegedly involved in an affray, wielding a knife in a public place and resisting arrest. The incident occurred between Daintree Place and Marella Avenue, Kellyville.

Upon arrival, Hills Police pursued the suspect on foot through the surrounding streets. The suspect was seen jumping a fence at the rear of a residence on Marella Avenue. He was later apprehended and taken to Castle Hill Police Station.

He has been charged with affray and knife offences and has been bail refused. He is set to appear to Parramatta Local Court on 20 November 2024.

The Police is seeking assistance in locating the victim who may have been injured during this incident. If you have any information, please contact Crime Stoppers at 1800 333 000.

#### **WOMAN HIT BY UTE**

A woman died after being hit by ute while walking in Dural.

Emergency services were called to Old Northern Road at about 4:30pm, Monday 18 November 2024, and found the woman, believed to be aged in her 70s, had suffered critical injuries after being struck by the southbound ute.

The driver of the ute, a 28-year-old man from Zetland, stopped to render assistance but the woman died at the scene.

Officers attached to the Kuring Gai Police Area Command established a crime scene, arresting the driver and taking him to Hornsby Hospital for mandatory testing.

On release, the man was taken to Hornsby Police Station where specialist police attached to the Crash Investigation Unit (CIU) charged him with negligent driving occasioning death.

He has been granted conditional bail to appear in Hornsby Local Court on 19 December 2024.

#### DRINK DRIVING ARREST

On Wednesday, 20th November 2024, at around 8:05 pm, Hills Highway Patrol were patrolling Old Northern Road, Castle Hill, when they spotted a truck allegedly speeding at 82 km/h in a 60 km/h zone.

The driver, a 45-year-old male, was stopped on Gilbert Road. A roadside breath test revealed he was over the legal limit. He was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station, where a breath analysis showed a reading of 0.112.

His licence was immediately suspended. He was charged with Mid-Range Drink Driving and will appear in Parramatta Local Court on the 16 January 2025.

#### **VEHICLE CRASH**

At about 6:05 am, Sunday, 24 November 2024, emergency services were called to Dalmar Place, Carlingford, following reports a sedan had crashed.

Officers attached to Ryde Police Area Command attended and found a sedan had collided with a pole.

NSW Ambulance paramedics attended and treated a 30-year-old man, however he died at the scene. He is yet to be formally identified.

A report will be prepared for the information of the Coroner. A crime scene has been established and an investigation into the circumstances surrounding the incident commenced.

#### **DRUNK AND TIRED**

On 22 November, at around 11:30 PM, a 35-yearold male drove through a fast-food drivethrough in Bella Vista. After mounting the kerb, he fell asleep. Shortly after, police found him and conducted a breath test, which he failed.

He was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station, where a breath analysis showed a reading of 0.148, well above the legal limit. He was charged with Mid-Range Drink Driving.

As his licence was already disqualified, suspension was not necessary. He will face Parramatta Local Court after Christmas.

## Mirvac commences construction at West Pennant Hills

Mirvac has officially commenced construction on its new Highforest community at West Pennant Hills. The \$830 million project will deliver 414 new homes and apartments.

The development is on the former IBM site and backs on to Cumberland State Forest and is close to the Cherrybrook Metro station. Mirvac's CEO Development, Stuart Penklis was joined by NSW Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, Paul Scully to turn the first sod earlier this month.

Plans for the development caused a community outcry when the planning process started including Hills Shire Council. Mirvac will deliver 165 detached and attached houses and 249 apartments, along with publicly accessible open spaces and a range of community facilities.

Mr Penklis said Highforest has been many years in the making and will be a true legacy project for Mirvac. "Proximity to the forest has shaped the masterplanning and architecture of Highforest, and our aim was to create a community that balances its unique location with the urgent need for housing in areas that are well-served by public transport, including the new Sydney CBD Metro.

"Mirvac was a pioneer in sustainable development more than two decades ago and we have drawn on that experience to create a place unlike any other in Sydney. It is fantastic to see Highforest coming to life, and we have worked with the community and local stakeholders to ensure that we are delivering something very special. We are committed to leaving this place better than when we found it," said Mr Penklis.

"We are dedicating 10 hectares of endangered remnant forest to the public, replanting 1.5 trees for every tree removed – which equates to around 4,600 trees on site – and regenerating close to 10,000 square metres of forest. We have also ensured the safe relocation of important endangered species, including the dural land snail, and are closely monitoring the powerful owl. Importantly, the built form of Highforest will be confined to the footprint of the existing office buildings and carpark which was formerly the IBM commercial offices, which will be transformed into a wonderful place for over 1,000 people to call home over the next four years," said Mr Penklis.

Highforest will also include public spaces for the wider community to enjoy, including a cultural classroom with a yarning circle, walking trails connecting to the forest, playground, children's bike track and shaded barbeque and seating areas.

Born Adam Douglas Hill, Blak is a celebrated artist and descendant of the Dhungatti Nation (Kempsey, NSW). His work often explores themes of social justice, Indigenous identity, and environmental conservation. Douglas has received numerous awards, and his art is exhibited in galleries across Australia and internationally. In 2022 Douglas won the Archibald Prize for his portrait

of Karla Dickens in the Lismore floods. Blak said the Hawkesbury-Nepean River, also known as the Dyarubbin, is a place for recreation, a source of livelihood, a natural wonder, and culturally significant to local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

"Our rivers are the lifeblood of our communities, providing us with water, food, and a place to be creative and connect with nature," Douglas said. "Young, old - whoever you are, zoom in and capture everything. I encourage you to participate and share your perspectives on how we live with and cherish the Dyarubbin."

The Glenhaven Carols by Candlelight returns for its twenty-fourth year transforming Glenhaven Oval into a festive wonderland on December 8, 2024. The event has become a fixture of Christmas in Glenhaven, with the oval filling with thousands of residents to celebrate the festive season.

It all started in 2000 when a local Glenhaven RFS volunteer was looking for fundraising opportunities for the Brigade. She approached Donna Fraser, a community worker at the former Glenhaven Community Centre, about starting a Carols in Glenhaven. Donna contacted local organisations - Emmanuel Church Glenhaven, Before and After School Care, Glenhaven Public School and local Rotary clubs. The first year saw over 800 people and the event has grown every year since. We now see over 4000 people.

Donna is still on the committee and Glenhaven Rural Fire Brigade is still heavily involved in the event, which is now hosted by Friends of Glenhaven. The Hills SES also assists on the night. In 24 years, there have only been two occasions where the event did not proceed. A violent storm in the late 2000's and 2020 - COVID! In the following year, the committee decided to take the event to the next level. A bigger stage and more sophisticated performances with the North West Wind Ensemble and Castle Hill RSL Youth Wind

Orchestra entertaining the crowd with carols. The Hills Shire Council provided a grant and local businesses increased their sponsorships.

In 2023, and again this year, Harvey Norman came on board as the Major Sponsor. The Glenhaven Carols is now the biggest Christmas event in The Hills.

'We are truly grateful for what the Carols event has become and the support the community shows each year. There is excitement building yet again!" said Louise Hedges, member of the Friends of Glenhaven's Carols Committee.

"Each year the community comes together on this great night to relax and celebrate. It's a real community event with our local Glenhaven Rural Fire Service and The Hills SES Unit assisting on the night. Entry is a gold coin to our emergency services volunteers at the gate. To enhance inclusivity, The Fit Kidz Foundation provides a sensory breakout tent at the Carols this year, for individuals with neurodivergent needs, a disability or sensory needs. This space provides resources and activities to individuals

This breakout space will hopefully make Glenhaven Carols more accessible to all of our community.

Hills Rugby Club, whose home base is Yattenden Oval, Baulkham Hills, have junior boys and girls teams (U10-U16), plus Colts and seniors. Four grade sides take part in the in the NSW Suburban Rugby Division 2 competitions.

Club coach Matthew Brinnand said they plan to field a Colts team (U17 to U21) for the 2025 season.

Matthew's family have been closely involved with Hills Rugby Club for more than 40 years, starting with his Dad Craig and Mum Kerri, who have been serving on the committee for a long time. Current president Craig is among the longest serving members, having started his career with the minis.

In addition to Matthew, his brother Mick captains the first grade side, cousin Adam coaches the second grade with Jeremy Lawlor, while Adam's wife Siobhan serves as secretary.

"I've been involved with the club for 26 years as I was four when I started playing," Matthew said. "We have junior girls teams with the ultimate goal that these girl progress through and can help us start up our first-ever Open women's 15s or sevens team."

As with all other sports in the Hills, rugby has its challenges in attracting

players each season.

"In such a condensed market in the Hills District, it's very much a social media presence to help market the club," Matthew said. "It's also through word of mouth of players and showing their mates what the club is about and creating an environment where they don't want to go anywhere else.

Asked to comment on the planned move by Sydney rugby powerhouse Eastwood Rugby to Castle Hill within the next few years, Matthew said it is an interesting scenario.

"I guess only time will tell how it impacts our club as well as others around the area," he said. "Let's hope it will be on the positive side for rugby in The Hills district."

#### A lot of people will look back on 2024 and say: gee, that was a tough year to get through. I know it's been hard.

Whether it was at the supermarket checkout, when the electricity bill arrived or mortgages came off fixed rates, everyone felt it in some way at the hip pocket.

And that's why the Albanese Government has taken unprecedented measures to get wages moving, relieve cost of living pressures wherever we could, and deliver balanced budgets.

When we came to government, we inherited an inflation rate of 6.1 percent. Now inflation has dropped to below 3 percent - the lowest rate we've seen since early 2021 when we were in the midst of COVID. That's only happened because of how economically responsible we've been.

In talking to people about the cost of living relief we've provided, nearly everyone has had some benefit from tax cuts, or the \$300 energy relief, cheaper medicines or extra paid parental leave and cheaper childcare.

We're seeing more people being bulk-billed at the GP - a small but significant turnaround.

There are more free mental health services in the Hawkesbury, with Medicare Mental Health Service (badged as Head to Health) and Headspace, both in Richmond.

If you've got a young person training in a skills shortage area like construction or hospitality, I hope they've chosen one of the many free TAFE courses. These courses have been so successful that if Labor is reelected next year, we're making them permanently free. We know there's more to do as we go into 2025.

However, there's one sector that needs your support as you get ready for Christmas - and

that's our local small business community. Despite this year's challenges, businesses in the Hawkesbury have continued to employ locals, support other local businesses, and donate to local sporting and community organisations. They've been heroes.

As you do the mad dash for Christmas gifts, I encourage you to look no further than our local businesses. As always, I'll be shopping local this year, and I look forward to gifting my friends and family something created or curated in the Hawkesbury.

If you're an essential worker with shifts over the holidays, thank you! And if you get to enjoy a break with family or friends, in whatever way you spend it, I hope you have a lovely, safe Christmas and New Year.

A joyful season is already unfolding.



## Veterans, Families and Beyond

Lintroduced the Summary Offences Amendment (War Memorials and Other Protected Places) Bill 2024 into the Parliament of NSW's Legislative Assembly in August this year.

This Bill would have ensured that all memorials, monuments, pools, gardens and surrounds are automatically protected. The Bill also sought to discourage vandalism of Australia's war memorials through an increase in penalty units. Currently, the punishment is a maximum of 40 penalty units (\$4,400). My Bill proposed an increase to a maximum of 50 penalty units (\$5,500) or imprisonment for two years, or both. The increase in fines for the damage and desecration of war memorials was welcomed by many and in particular, our Veterans.

The fact that the penalties were to be incorporated into the Summary Offences Act rather than the Crimes Act, strengthened the ability for Police to issue such fines without the offence being caught up in the judicial system for years to come.

Regrettably, this Bill was not supported by the Minns Labor Government and was shamefully dismissed. In fact, forty-eight Members of the NSW Parliament did not support this, which indicates to me, the low regard they have for our Veterans. An untrue claim was that the RSL sub-branches within NSW had been consulted and were opposed to the amendments I had put forward.

Veterans who attended Parliament on the day of the debate were infuriated and were adamant that their sub-branches had not been consulted. Whilst Labor, the Greens and some Independents voted not to progress this Bill,

please know that my passion and advocacy to ensure our Veterans are remembered in respectful and honourable ways, will continue.

As we approach Christmas, I know it will be especially difficult for me, with the loss this year, of both my Mother and my eldest brother Bill, within weeks of each other. It is during these special times of the year that our faith and family carry us forward. To everyone catching up with family and friends during this festive season, here's to making every day count and to telling those closest to you, just how much you care about them.

I wish everyone a blessed Christmas and I look forward to continuing the advocacy for our good folk in Hawkesbury and Western Sydney, our Veterans, individuals and families.

## **WHAT'S IN A NAME?**

(Continued)

I have been asked by some readers to continue to explain how suburbs or localities within the Hills and Hawkesbury areas came to be named.

**DURAL** is an Aboriginal name, the meaning of which is obscure. There is a suggestion that it refers to a hollow tree from which smoke is rising. The name was originally spelt Dooral and was bestowed on the area in 1819 by James Meehan, a surveyor, and was applied to a greater area than that of the current suburb. Various parts of the district were named Upper Dooral, Middle Dooral and Lower Dooral. In the past it was a major timber and fruit growing area.

EBENEZER was previously called Portland Head, a small hill opposite what is now, Ebenezer Church was called Ebenezer Mount and was the site of meetings of Christians in the area. After the building of the church, the area became known as Ebenezer.

FIDDLETOWN. According to a report that I read some years ago, the story goes that two brothers were given a grant of land in what was then called Upper Galston. A requirement was made that they had to spend at least one night a week on the land during the time that the land was being developed. To relieve the boredom and isolation they each bought a fiddle (violin) which they played at local gatherings. They became known locally as "The Boys from Fiddletown", with the area then becoming known as Fiddletown.

FREEMANS REACH. You can take your pick of two versions as to which you believe. One common theory is that it was named after the free men who settled this section of the Hawkesbury in the early days of the colony. The second theory is that it was named after two brothers, William and James Freeman who were convicts who arrived in 1790s and who settled in the area.

**GALSTON** was settled in the early Nineteenth century and was originally named Upper Dural It later was renamed as North Colah. In 1887, following a public meeting, it was again renamed after a town in Kilmarnock, Scotland to Galston.

**GLENHAVEN** was originally named Sandhurst but underwent a name change in the 1890s to avoid confusion with a Victorian area with the same name. Glenhaven was chosen as the district was in a valley (Glen) and the southern portion was known as "The Haven", hence "Glenhaven" being the choice.

GLENORIE was originally called North Dural and was a major source of timber from 1817, By the 1870s, citrus growers were prominent in the area. By the early 1890s the Post Office found confusion amongst the public with other areas called Dural (see Dural above) so compiled a list of alternative names and residents were asked

in 1894 to select from that list and Glenorie, of Scottish origin, was chosen.

**GLOSSODIA** originally called Currency Creek after the term used to describe those born in the colony as a currency lass or lad. Currency Creek was changed in 1922 to Glossodia and named after the small blue orchids found in the area.

**GROSE VALE** and **GROSE WOLD** were both named after Lt. Francis Grose who arrived in Sydney in 1792 and had established the first settlers in the Hawkesbury by 1794. The Grose River was also named after him.

**KELLYVILLE**. The district was called by various names including Nowhere Here and similar derivations. Later it became known as Irish Town due to the large number of residents of Irish extraction living in the area. Hugh Kelly was a large landowner and prominent businessman in the district and when his properties were subdivided in the 1880s it became known as Kellyville.

KENTHURST was formerly known as Middle Dural. There was a suggestion that it should be called Kent Forest, however, as the area consisted of wooded hillocks. The old Anglo-Saxon word for hillock is hurst, and it was decided that Kenthurst was the name that best suited to the area.
