

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The Nurtured Village Celebrates a Year of **Operations** By LANCE ZAFE

A growing number of mums found a shoulder to lean on in The Nurtured Village as the charity celebrates another successful year of operations.

Since 2019, the Brisbane initiative, which was founded not only as a mental health support system for mums but also to address the gap in 'the traditional village of support' during early parenthood, has grown into more than 20 locations in NSW, QLD, Victoria, and Western Australia. It branched out into The Hills in January 2024, reaching local mums in need of food, formula, and fellowship.

This year, The Hills District branch and its members banded together for an initiative to create assistance for a family that suffered a complete loss due to a house fire.

The local Hills coordinator, Andrea Pateman, and Mr Alex Hawke MP met in June. Mr Hawke articulated his support for the charity's different initiatives. They discussed the charity's impact in light of the ongoing cost-of-living crisis and its efforts to enhance its members' mental health.

They also discussed the grants the organisation may be eligible to apply for.

In December, Executive Director and Manager of Operations Kaitlyn Bywater felt saddened and concerned that they saw a significant increase in mums and families experiencing food instability over the last few months leading up to Christmas.

The Nurtured Village acknowledged that the Christmas season is a major stress for families, so they came up with the Secret Santa initiative, asking the community to become one and donate to help build Christmas hampers.

The charity is thankful for the donations received for the initiative and the generosity and support of The Hills district community. The Hills branch remains laserfocused on expanding its programs and outreach in 2025.

Nationwide, the Nurtured Village delivered over 250 hampers in 2024, amounting to \$130,000 worth of support to Australian families. Achieving this milestone meant the collective help of 96 volunteers.

Marketing Manager Michael Holani reflects on the previous year's strides and highlights the efforts of everyone involved.

"The Nurtured Village Hampers Hills District proudly marks another successful year of operations, continuing its mission to prevent and advocate maternal mental health disorders by creating communities for mums. This milestone reflects the dedication of volunteers, the generosity of donors and the unwavering support of the community," he said.

The charity manages home-cooked meals, store-bought foods and gifts in the form of a hamper that is randomly gifted to a young family each month in each town and city to advocate for and promote mental health for mums.

kinship-care mothers or stepmothers. Members of the community nominate individuals or families through their website. The hamper recipients are then selected at random. As the charity isn't means-tested, winners are chosen randomly unless a high-risk case is identified, enabling access without a mental health diagnosis.

STORMS HIT HILLS, HAWKESBURY

Severe thunderstorms swept across The Hills and Hawkesbury, along with Metropolitan Sydney and parts of NSW, on Wednesday, 15 January, causing power shutdowns, fallen trees, and debris shutting down roads. The weather event continued up until Sunday, 19 January, battering the state's north eastern coasts.

Crews were dispatched to assist in clearing the roads. The NSW State Emergency Service reported that its members have responded to more than 4,000 incidents since the morning of 15 January.

Multiple brigades in the Hills and Hawkesbury, such as Blaxlands Ridge, Glenhaven, Kellyville, Kenthurst, Oakville, Round Corner, and Wilberforce also attended to a large number of calls within and outside their local areas.

The Rouse Hill Rural Fire Brigade responded to calls on John's Rd, Halcrows Rd, and Cattai Rd regarding damage due to weather.

Glossodia RFB responded to reports of downed trees on Bull Ridge Rd on Wednesday evening. Glossodia crews also helped Kurrajong RFB and Kurrajong Heights RFS members in opening Burralow, while the Kurrajong Heights crews also cleared trees on Bull Ridge Rd.

In Carlingford, the roof of a property was ripped off, resulting in 14 people requiring alternative accommodation. Meanwhile, a fallen tree trapped a person inside a car in Castle Hill.

Obstructions were also reported on Glenorie, Dural, Box Hill, and Kenthurst, among others.

The SES reported that more than 143,000 connections experienced power outages during the storms.

MULTIPLE OFFENSES

At 1:25 AM on 16 January, Hills Police arrested a 30-year-old male from Box Hill for multiple offenses, including driving while disqualified and possession of suspected stolen goods.

Charges:

- Driving an unregistered and uninsured vehicle
- Using unauthorized number plates
- Providing false information to police
- Driving during a disqualification period
- Possession of suspected stolen goods

It will be alleged the 30yo was stopped for a random breath test. Police discovered the vehicle had mismatched number plates. He initially provided false details but later admitted his identity. A search of the vehicle revealed various power tools and other items suspected to be stolen.

He was taken to Castle Hill Police Station and charged with multiple offenses.

NEW TRAINING CENTRE IN THE HILLS

The NSW RFS – Hills District officially opened a new state-of-the-art training facility at Sackville North on December 2024. It will help in supporting the training and operational needs of RFS crews and surrounding Districts.

The training facility includes a training room equipped with wireless internet, video conferencing capabilities and essential radio systems. It also houses structural firefighting hot cell and warm cell structures for realistic training scenarios, along with safe work on roofs training. Amenities such as a kitchen, BBQ area, accessible restrooms, PPC washing and drying facilities and a backup generator are also onsite. The site, co-located with the Sackville North Brigade station, has evolved over a decade, with the latest construction phase completed in July 2024.

As a special tribute, the training centre room has been named in honour of Group Captain James 'Jim' Smith AFSM (Retired), whose extraordinary contributions over 50 years have left a lasting legacy.

"As a Captain of Middle Dural Brigade for 16 years and 25 years as Group Captain, Jim's dedication to the RFS and his community is exemplary," Deputy Commissioner McKechnie said.

HIGH-SPEED PURSUIT

At approximately 7:18 PM on Thursday, 16 January, Hills Highway Parol observed a red Honda CB1000RR motorcycle allegedly speeding on Kenthurst Rd, Dural.

The rider, a 26-year-old male, was allegedly clocked at 105 km/h in a 70 km/h zone and subsequently fled from police, reaching speeds estimated at 160 km/h. The pursuit continued until the rider abandoned the motorcycle on Raym Rd, Kenthurst.

With the assistance of a police dog unit, the rider was located hiding in nearby bushland and was arrested. The rider, who was found to be disqualified from driving, provided negative results for both breath and drug tests.

He has been charged with multiple offences including police pursuit and drive whilst disqualified. He was refused bail by Parramatta Local Court.

BREAK & ENTERS

In Box Hill, a break and enter occurred at Hereford St, Box Hill, between 03:43 and 03:46 AM on the 11th of January, 2025.

Three persons of interest (POIs) entered the backyard and cut a hole in the rear screen door but did not gain entry. They then jumped the side fence into the neighbour's yard. The incident was captured on CCTV.

According to Police, a small white vehicle was seen, if residents could check CCTV in adjoining streets.

On the other hand, in Pennant Hills, a break and enter occurred at Cherrybrook Rd between 03:00 and 06:00 AM on the same day.

Entry was gained through a ground floor side window after removing the flyscreen. Residents in adjoining streets are encouraged to check their CCTVs for any suspicious activity around these times.

ROOF ABLAZE

On 17 January, occupants of a Riverstone home near Blacktown in western Sydney have safely evacuated from their property after being alerted their roof was on fire by their neighbours.

Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW) responded to reports of the fire in King Street just after 1:00 pm after the occupants called Triple Zero (000) from outside the home.

The blaze was in the roof space and ceiling and quickly spread to the second level.

Firefighters battled the fire inside the dwelling but their efforts were hampered when the roof structure partially collapsed.

Crews extinguished the blaze within an hour and there were no reported injuries.

FRNSW and NSW Police are currently investigating the cause of the fire however it is believed to be electrical in nature.

WHO IS KEITH LEES AND Why was he arrested

Police Officers attached to Kuring-Gai Police Area Command arrested 72-year-old Keith Lees at a property on Kenthurst Road, Dural at about 8am on Thursday 2 January 2025. He was wanted on an arrest warrant for an alleged murder in Queensland 27 years ago.

The warrant was issued in July 2023 in relation to an alleged murder of Meaghan Rose in 1997 on the Sunshine Coast.

Much of the back story to this arrest was covered by the Australia True Crime Podcast which you can listen to here https://shows. acast.com/australiantruecrime, then look for Episodes 573 to 577 (577 includes details of the latest update). The podcast first aired on 23rd December 2024.

It was a podcast listener who provided the breakthrough to Police enabling them to find and arrest Keith Lees. Police first visited a unit block in Hornsby. A neighbour knew the man police were looking for as David Japaljarri.

Readers may wonder what happened between 1997 and today. This is covered in the podcast.

Notice of intention to grant a licence under section 151 of the *National Parks and Wildlife Act* 1974

Public consultation on the proposal to grant a licence is open until 3 February 2025.

The proposed grant of licence is to Hunter Anzac Memorial Limited ACN 623 275 196 for the premises known as Long Tan Place House, located near the corner of Long Tan Place and Scheyville Road within Scheyville National Park. The proposed licence area includes Long Tan Place House and the surrounding yard area (see Figure 1).

Hunter Anzac Memorial Limited have an existing licence for areas within Scheyville Camp precinct, Scheyville National Park, that provides for the operation of a public museum, a military vehicle restoration society, military members shed and community activities.

The proposed licence would enable Hunter Anzac Memorial Limited to undertake work to refurbish Long Tan Place House before use as an office and/ or caretaker accommodation to support operations under its existing licence.

The proposed licence is for a term of 10-years with two option terms of 5-years (potential total term of 20 years).

Community Group of the Year Winner: Bears of Hope

The Castle Hill organisation provides comfort, counselling, and resources for families who have experienced the loss of a baby during pregnancy, birth, or infancy. The organisation offers fee-free face-to-face counselling, support groups, community events, and education sessions for local hospitals. They also supply bears, resources, and cuddle cots to hospitals to help grieving families.

Highly Commended: Hills Musical Theatre Company (HMTC)

HMTC's musicals allow people to participate and enjoy theatre within the community. Their musical, Seussical, was particularly noteworthy for its accessible and inclusive approach,



featuring performers of all abilities, receiving praise from theatre enthusiasts and audience members alike ensuring everyone, regardless of background or ability, could participate in and enjoy live theatre.

Environmental Citizen of the Year Winner: Patrick Shirvington

Patrick is a renowned Hills' landscape artist and multimedia creator, known for his work as an illustrator, curator, and children's book illustrator, including Can You Find Me and Can You Find 12 Busy Bees. Passionate about the local environment, he works as a bush regenerator for the National Trust and shares his expertise through nature journalling workshops for The Hills Shire Council's Environment Workshop program.



Young Citizen of the Year Winner: Megan Sutton

Megan is a dedicated advocate for disability awareness and a committed volunteer, known for her role as Run Director for the Rouse Hill Parkrun. Over 8 years, she has volunteered more than 130 times, ensuring the safety of participants in the weekly 5km community event. Megan lives with a disability and is passionate about advocacy including the Hidden Disabilities Sunflower Scheme, which helps individuals with non-visible disabilities receive understanding and support in public spaces.

Winner: Ashleen Khela

At 12 years-old, Ashleen is one of Australia's youngest-ever female published authors. She has released her fiction book 17 Stories at just 11 years-old, with proceeds being donated to Australian charities and to support aid programs in developing nations. She self-funded the production of the book through creative efforts like recycling bottles, selling backyard plants, and using her savings.

Senior Citizen of the Year Winner: Alan Grady

Alan has been a member of Rotary for 50 years and is an active participant in the Norwest Sunrise Rotary Club and the Wesley Castle Hill Uniting Church. He is also a charter member of the Hills Older Men's Network. Always eager to contribute, Alan is quick to volunteer for many projects. For the past 20 years, Alan has worked in the Rotary Warehouse, packing donated medical and school supplies to be sent overseas.

Citizen of the Year Winner: Katherine Kirk

Katherine is a mother of five and serves as the President of the Castle High School P&C Association. She organises BBQ fundraisers, chairs meetings, and collaborates with others to ensure that teachers, staff, and students have the best possible learning environment. She holds the position of Vice President at Northmead CAPA High School, supports Baulkham Hills Hawks AFL Club, Hills Spirit FC and volunteers with the Castle Hill RSL Sub-Branch, organising events which contributed to the Castle Hill Sub-Branch winning an award at the RSL NSW Congress in 2024.

Hills Squash

Squash was once a popular choice for sport particularly in the 80's and 90's with many taking to courts across the country to try the game. It was during this time Australia shone on the local and International stage, producing numerous World Champions.

At its peak it is estimated more than million Australians participated in the sport however the last year 25 years has seen squash courts across the country disappear and replaced with gyms or pulled down for development. As a result, squash is no longer in 20 most played sports in the Country, however with the inclusion of the sport in the 2028 Olympics, James Ethan is hopeful squash will make a resurgence.

For local James Ethan, squash became his lifelong passion the moment he picked up a racket for the first time at 17 years old. James was determined to master the game, practicing hour after hour and taking on the more experienced players in the Club until he could beat them. By the time he was 22, James achieved 'A' grade status and by the time he was 25, he had achieved State grade level. Squash had become his life, he trained six days a week: running, gym, squash practice and coaching. At the peak of his playing career, James reached a World Ranking of 250 travelling around the country playing in tournaments. However, his real dream was to own squash courts and to teach others the love of the game and to train the next generation of Australian and World Champion Squash Courts.

James ran the only squash courts in the Hills Local Government Area at Baulkham Hills until recently when the building was demolished leaving Hills Squash without a home. However, since then Hills Squash has found a new home at Dural Recreational Centre, returning three forgotten, damaged and unused courts to their former glory and creating opportunities for residents to play squash locally again.

When you speak with James, his love of the game is evident as he tells you about his own successful squash career including writing a book, coaching up and coming Australian Champions and why everyone should give squash a go, regardless of ability. James will tell you how fun the game is especially when you play with family and friends as well as the health benefits including burning calories, increasing aerobic fitness, improving flexibility, building strength and power, and of course improving the hand-eye coordination. And yes, for the beginners, there is a slightly bigger rubber ball to play the game with!

If you are looking for a good work out or a social activity or simply haven't played in years, then why not pick up a racket and give squash a qo!





In 2013, former Prime Minister Tony Abbott said: "We are absolutely confident that 25 megs (Mbps) is going to be enough, more than enough, for the average household," a forecast award-winning Australian journalist Adam Turner placed in the tech world's Short-sighted Hall of Fame. With a 25Mbps connection, downloading a 5GB file (a large software file or update, video game, or HD/4K movie) takes around 30 minutes. At 1Gbps – available with a full fibre connection – the same task takes less than one minute.

Australians have always known a fast and affordable publicly-owned National Broadband Network (NBN) is essential for a modern economy. The Albanese Government is delivering on its vision for a world-class fibre NBN – and we are finishing what we started.

We announced an equity injection of up to \$3 billion into NBN Co to upgrade the remaining Fibre to the Node (FTTN) network. This will see an additional 622,000 premises move off the deteriorating copper network - around 164,000 across New South Wales. This builds on our \$2.4 billion outlay to upgrade an additional 1.5 million premises to full fibre by the end of 2025. We are delivering this on time and on budget. The average Australian household is using more than 450GB of data per month and around 22 connected devices. This is forecast to increase to 1 Terabyte and more than 40 devices by the end of the decade. Fast broadband enables more people and devices to be online at the same time with minimal disruptions. Heritage Grants open for Hawkesbury

BETTER BUS SERVICES CONNECTING OUR COMMUNITY AFTER 12 YEARS OF NEGLECT

The North West region of Sydney has among the highest number of families in New South Wales. Often both parents need to commute to work using Metro Stations such as Tallawong, Rouse Hill and Kellyville. The Metro (opened in 2019) was a valuable addition to the North West's public transport network. The previous government inexplicably terminated the Metro at Tallawong, failing to terminate the Metro at an interchange with Schofields Station a mere 3 kilometres away. This oversight placed unnecessary strain on the Public Bus system. Bus services taking commuters to Metro stations had not been adjusted to be 'fit for purpose' when serving the needs of commuters in the North West wanting to use the Metro to travel to work.

Soon after taking office the Minns Labor Government established the NSW Bus Industry Taskforce. I encouraged as many people as were able to send a submission to the Taskforce. The culmination of 12 months of investigations, engagement and consultation resulted in the Final report being released in May of last year. As result of the findings from the Taskforce report, many bus services in the North West of Sydney were adjusted and received a significant boost.

Buses move more people than any other form of public transport and at the lowest cost to commuters. The previous Government neglected and underfunded Bus services not just here in the North West but across New South Wales. Poor leadership and coordination within Transport for NSW during the tenure of the previous government caused service degradation, while low driver pay, and inadequate safety systems were ignored.

From Monday the 20th of January commuters of the North West will enjoy more buses more often. In the biggest shake-up the public bus system has seen for years. Capacity will be increased, as will bus service frequency for high demand routes to Sydney Trains and Metro stations. There will be extra services and extended hours of services on several routes. Access to bus services will be expanded to two communities getting their first local bus route, the 748 – Melonba and Jerralong Drive, Schofields, connecting thousands of residents directly to train and Metro services.

Bus routes linking the North West to Rouse Hill Metro station will welcome new services including the 643, 740, 742, 746,747 and the 748. In Riverstone and Tallawong the 742 bus will run more frequently across the week, running every 30 minutes in the morning and afternoon peaks, doubling the number of services on the route. Similarly, 747 passengers will see additional services, commuters will enjoy buses running every 15 minutes in the morning and evening peaks.



These timetable changes follow a multimillion dollar investment announced in the 2024-25 budget, providing bus services that the residents of North West Sydney deserve. We know there is more to do. Routes and the frequency of services will continue to be monitored and improved to meet the needs of our rapidly growing population. This Government understands that an efficient public transport system is essential for families, workers, and students, and we will keep delivering on our promise to build a better future for North-West Sydney.

Nikkita Fazzari is just 17 and already is making her mark in international Futsal. The Dural Warriors forward scored five goals as Australia finished unbeaten in the recent AFC Women's Futsal Asian Cup Qualifiers in Tashkent, Uzbekistan.

Fellow Dural Warrior and seasoned goalkeeper Sarah Easthope, also showed her skills as Australia defeated four rivals to advance to the Asian Cup finals. Sarah, a stalwart with Hills United FC, pulled some fine saves throughout the tournament underlining her form and commitment. Nikkita, the youngest player in the Australian side, had the honour of scoring the team's first goal in the tournament in the second minute a stunning effort from

the left flank against Turkmenistan. She scored a second as Australia romped home in style.

Nikkita was again on target in the 5-0 victory over Kuwait in their second match. She then netted a brace, including an absolute cracking first goal, as the Australians qualified for the AFC Futsal Women's Asian Cup 2025, by beating the hosts Uzbekistan 3-1.

Nikkita, who represents the North West Sydney Spirit FC in the NSW NPL Women's League, is one of the rising female footballers in NSW. Judging by her composure and outstanding goals during her Futsal debut for Australia, she could become a regular

for the country.

Australia, playing their first Futsal qualification competition, defeated The Philippines 2-1 in their last group game. Uzbekistan go through to the Asian finals as the Group C runnersup while The Philippines went through as the best third-placed team.

Thailand and Bahrain qualified from Group A, Indonesia and Hong Kong from Group B while Vietnam and Chinese Taipei are the Group D qualifiers. They will join hosts China, defending champs Iran and Japan in the finals to be staged from May 6-17. The draw will be held on February 7.

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MEMORIES WITH IVOR JONES & FRIENDS

A SHINE ON AUSTRALIA

Arriving from Scotland in1878, John and Margaret Ramsay settled in Melbourne with their four children. Within 10 years, having amassed a fortune in real estate, they built the glorious mansion in Essendon named Clydebank which now forms part of the Ave Maria college.

One of their sons, William, was very entrepreneurial and along with Hamilton McKellan, during the early 1900s, established a two-roomed factory at Carlton, a inner suburb of Melbourne, where they tried to manufacture various products ranging from disinfectants to eczema ointments.

They struck gold in 1906 when they started to manufacture boot polish. As William's wife, Annie Elizabeth Meek, was from New Zealand, he decided to name the product "Kiwi Boot Polish". William Ramsay also aided in spreading knowledge of the product by loading boxes onto his horse-drawn cart and travelled around the country selling directly to farmers, who bought the product to protect their boots.

Kiwi had rivals including, in Sydney, a brand named "Cobra" which ran a series of cartoon advertisements, which, in today's environment, would be frowned upon, The advertisements featured a character named "Chunder Loo of Akim Foo". As many would know the word "Chunder" in Australian slang means "to vomit" and so using rhyming slang could conceive "Chunder Loo" as "Chunder Spew".

Another rival product scored a significant victory when a photo of William Ramsay and Hamilton McKellan, taken in their shop in Elizabeth St, Melbourne in 1909, featured a billboard advertising "Nugget" boot polish in the photo. Whilst boot polish

had been around since at least 1851, there was no local production in Victoria. Kiwi boot polish soon became very popular as it had a superior formula to other brands as it preserved shoe leather, made it shine and restored colour. Further improvements by 1908 added suppleness and water resistance. The success of Kiwi Boot Polish in Australia came to the notice of the British and US Armies who awarded contracts for the supply of the product to their forces during World War 1.

William died of cancer in 1914 and his father, John, then took charge and headed a large sales team in the UK. A factory was opened at Ealing in England which exported Kiwi product to various countries in Europe and the Middle East. As sales increased, further factories and sales offices were opened, including one at Rouen, France which was bombed in World War II and co-opted by the Nazis for their own boots.

In the middle of the war years of 1914-1918, Kiwi also made a silent film depicting two boys shining a hotel guest's shoes after the adult staff had enlisted to fight in the war. The film was produced in 1916 and shown in movie houses (cinemas).

After the Second World War, William's son travelled around the world promoting Kiwi and

opened factories from Kenya to Singapore. This soon led to "Kiwi" becoming a generic name similar to the use of "Hoover" which, in the UK, is used to describe a vacuum cleaner. Kiwi became a verb within Malay speakers meaning "to polish shoes".

The company, through much of its life, has contained the name "Kiwi" within its corporate name. It started in 1906 as McKellan & Ramsay, changing in 1913 - 1916 to Kiwi Boot Polish Co. In 1916, a slight name change to the Kiwi Polish Co, by which it was known until 1971 when a merger took place between Kiwi and Nicholas International Ltd, a Melbourne based pharmaceutical company who were best known as the manufacturers of "Aspro" and "Rennies". The company was then renamed Nicholas Kiwi Ltd. In 1984 Nicholas Kiwi was taken over by American based Consolidated Foods Corporation (now known as Sara Lee Corporation). Sara Lee then went on to acquire other companies in the shoe care business, so much so that both the US and UK governments became concerned over what seemed to be, in April 2011, a potential monopoly of the industry and they were ordered to divest part of their operations. The Kiwi business was sold to S.C. Johnson.

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
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




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
