Riverside Gardens had a Christmas party on Friday evening of 20 Dec. The residents were entertained by the Riverland Harmony Chorus. The range of music included Christmas carols, Christmas songs and many favourites from bygone years.

Riverland Harmony Chorus is a women's A Cappella Chorus who love to sing, perform and entertain. It was formed in November 1992 and chartered in 1996. An A Cappella Chorus is music where people sing without instruments. Merryl Liston is the Music Director, and she is an accomplished musician herself. Merryl has been the Music Director of Riverland Harmony Chorus since 1994. Its Membership is drawn from a wide area of the Blue Mountains City Council, Hawkesbury City Council, Penrith City Council, Cumberland City Council and Camden City Council.

The Chorus meet every Monday evening for vocal training, simple stretch exercises and



breathing techniques that are incorporated into their rehearsals. Riverland Harmony Chorus aim to have fun whilst improving its vocal techniques.

The Chorus has competed in various Eisteddfods in the area, sung on the Nepean Belle, at the Joan Sutherland Centre, the Evan Theatre, Blacktown Civic Centre, Sydney Town Hall and at the Sydney Entertainment Centre, as well as many other local engagements and others further afield. Conventions for choruses Australia-wide are held annually. Whether it be festivals, charity events, birthday parties or Christmas functions; -Riverland Harmony Chorus love it all!

The Chorus also takes part in National Barbershop Conventions. What is Barbershop Harmony you may well ask. This style of harmony is produced by four voices singing without accompaniment (A Capella) - Tenor (above the melody), Lead (melody), Baritone (below the melody) and Bass (below the Baritone). A pitch pipe is used to indicate the starting note and from then on it is up to the Chorus to keep in tune. Barbershop singing is considered an original American art form.



Riverside Gardens felt privileged to have Riverland Harmony Chorus entertain them, knowing they are also part of Sweet Adelines International, a worldwide singing organisation for women, and one of more than 30 Sweet Adelines Choruses in Australia and around 450 Choruses world-wide.

ROAD RAGE

Riverstone Highway Patrol is appealing for information regarding a road rage incident/ assault that occurred around 12:10 PM on Wednesday, 18th December 2024, on Meadow Road, Schofields/Marsden Park. The incident involved a male and female driver.

HOLIDAY SPEEDING

At about 1:00 AM, on Saturday 21 December 2024, officers attached to Hawkesbury Traffic and Highway Patrol were patrolling Windsor Road, McGraths Hill, when they located a Mazda utility allegedly speeding.

Police directed the driver to stop; however, when they allegedly failed to stop a pursuit was initiated. During the pursuit the car allegedly reached speeds of 110km/h in an 80km/h zone.

The vehicle stopped on Freemans Reach Road where the driver, a 24-year-old man, was arrested and subjected to a roadside breath test, returning a positive result. He was taken to Windsor Police Station where he underwent a breath analysis, returning an alleged reading of 0.125.

The man was charged with police pursuit - not stop - drive recklessly and drive with mid-range PCA. He was granted conditional bail to appear before Windsor Local Court on Wednesday 15 January 2025.

UNLICENSED DRIVING

A man has been charged with driving unlicensed, use unregistered motor vehicle, use uninsured motor vehicle and drive with passenger on part of vehicle not permitted.

At about 2 AM on Friday, 27th of December 2024, officers attached to Ku-ringgai Highway Patrol were patrolling Pennant Hills Road Thornleigh when they observed a Harley Davidson motorcycle carrying a pillion passenger.

Police conducted checks revealing the man to have a suspended Class C drivers licence and no Class R rider licence. Checks also revealed the motorbike to be unregistered and uninsured. Police inspected the motorcycle which was fitted with a rider seat only and no passenger/ pillion seat.

Police observed the passenger to have a piece of removable foam with a towel wrapped around it which he was using as a makeshift seat. The foam was placed on the rear plastic fender of the motorcycle.

The man will face Hornsby Local Court in February 2025.

CHRISTMAS ASSAULT

At around 6:00 AM, on Christmas day, a 28-yearold woman arrived home heavily intoxicated and woke her housemates, a 29-year-old woman and a 20-year-old woman. A verbal argument ensued, escalating to a physical altercation.

The 28-year-old woman then allegedly physically assaulted the 29-year-old woman, causing her to fall onto the shattered glass and sustain significant injuries to her leg and foot.

Hills PAC officers and NSW Ambulance responded to the scene. The 28-year-old woman attempted to avoid arrest by throwing a light projector at an officer, leading to a violent confrontation. A taser was drawn but not discharged. The woman was eventually subdued and taken into custody.

Charges:

- Reckless wounding (DV)
- 2 counts of Assault police officer in execution of duty causing actual bodily harm
- 2 counts of Hinder or resist police officer in execution of duty
- Maliciously destroying or damaging property

An ADVO was granted for the protection of the 29-year-old woman. The 28-year-old woman was refused bail and is scheduled to appear at Parramatta Local Court on 26 December 2024.

RAINY DAY COLLISION

At about 2:30 AM on Tuesday, 7 January, The Hills Police, NSW Ambulance, and NSW Rural Fire Service responded to a Toyota van that had travelled west along Annangrove Rd, Kenthurst, and collided with a tree and a fence after losing control in wet weather conditions. The vehicle sustained significant damage to the passenger side, pushing the glovebox into the passenger seat.

The Police once again reminds drivers the importance of driving to the conditions. It is advisable to slow down in wet weather to ensure utmost safety and the safety of others on the road.

Fortunately, there was no passenger in the vehicle, and the driver walked away without injuries.

SHOPLIFTING SPREE

On 30th December 2024, Eastern Suburbs police arrested a 44-year-old man and a 55-yearold woman for multiple shoplifting offences across Sydney. The duo targeted retail stores at Castle Towers, Westfield Liverpool, and Westfield Bondi Junction, allegedly stealing items worth over \$20,000.

Thanks to CCTV footage, police identified and apprehended the offenders at Westfield Bondi Junction. Both were charged and refused bail, set to appear at Parramatta Local Court on 31st December 2024. The stolen items have been returned to the stores.

SUSPICIOUS BUSHFIRE

Riverstone Police Area Command is appealing for witnesses following a suspicious fire that started in the grasslands at the intersection of Aerodrome Drive and Triton Parade, Nirimba Fields (600 - 700 metres from Veron Road).

At approximately 7:34 PM on Friday, 27th December 2024, two males believed to be between the ages of 14 and 20, were observed at the location by a witness. The witness saw the two males leave the area on trail bikes.

Riverstone Police would like to speak to these two males in relation to the fire. If you were in the area at this time and witnessed anything suspicious or have CCTV footage, please contact Crime Stoppers or Riverstone Police Station.

MINOR P1 DRIVER

At approximately 3:00 AM on Wednesday, 1 January 2025, The Hills Police observed a silver Toyota Aurion travelling on Old Northern Road, with a rear-seat passenger not properly wearing a seatbelt.

Upon intercepting the vehicle, further checks on the driver revealed they were a 17-year-old P1 licence holder. There were three passengers in the vehicle, all under 18 years old.

The driver was issued the following infringement notices:

- Drive with 1 passenger seatbelt/restraint not properly adjusted/fastened.
- P1 driver under 25 years old drive between 11 PM and 5 AM with more than 1 passenger under 21 years.
- Not comply with P1 licence condition not display P plates.
- Drive motor vehicle not carry licence.

The total infringement amount was \$1548, with double demerit points in effect, resulting in 11 demerit points. Consequently, the RMS will suspend the driver's licence.

GARBAGE TRUCK FIRE

On 31 December 2024, a garbage truck was forced to tip out its load at Wrights Reserve early in the morning after onboard sensors detected a fire within the vehicle.

Fire and Rescue NSW crews extinguished the blaze, and a cleanup crew helped onsite.

Residents in the vicinity of Wrights Reserve, Pye Road, and Highfield Road, Quakers Hill, were advised to keep their windows closed to minimise exposure to smoke and avoid the area during the incident.

Macquarie Park upgrades to make life by the river safer and more enjoyable

Fancy relaxing at Macquarie Park with your family while gazing across the beautiful Hawkesbury River? Longing for an improved playground experience for your family?

Major improvements are now underway at Macquarie Park in Windsor, breathing fresh life into the beloved riverside recreation space. The \$1.8 million project includes State Government funding thanks to its Places to Swim program (\$839,400), Community Local Infrastructure **Recovery Package Community Asset Program** (\$600,000), and a \$550,000 contribution from Hawkesbury City Council, creating more options for safe recreation around our river.

The works will include added shade structures, picnic facilities, signage and a path and trail network to improve accessibility. New picnic areas adjacent to the riverbank that will include shade, seating, tables, barbeques and drinking fountain. There will also be an emergency access ramp down to the beach area. The existing picnic area will be upgraded with new table settings and additional shade. Each of these facilities will be suitable for all ages and abilities.

These works will also increase visibility from the park to the riverbank through landscaping, improving safety for river users. Signage will

be upgraded to provide risk, water quality and water safety messaging.

The existing playspace will be upgraded so that it is more suitable for a regional destination park and will include a water play area with water pumps, sluice gates and a nature play creek bed. Other additions include a basket swing, a rope canoe swing spinner and nature balance play. The playspace upgrade will be flood resilient and will include play that is suitable for all ages and abilities, include shade, trees and landscaping.

Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, Paul Scully, said the NSW Government has invested a combined \$1.8 million towards Macquarie Park foreshore's upgrade through the Places to Swim and Community Local Infrastructure Recovery programs.

"Macquarie Park has long been a much loved place for Windsor and surrounding Hawkesbury communities," Mr Scully said. "This revitalisation will enhance the park, providing a great place to picnic and safely access the water for recreation in Western Sydney."

These works were identified in the Macquarie Park Plan of Management and Masterplan, which was developed from community feedback in 2020, and was adopted by Council in August 2023.

There will be impacts to playground access and sections of the park during construction. Weather permitting, it is expected these works will be completed in winter 2025.

Places to Swim is connecting people to water in places that need it the most, creating better access to get in, on and around inland waterways across NSW through a \$16.7 million commitment to high quality open space. Together with the NSW Government, Hawkesbury City Council is delivering infrastructure that is essential for communities. increasing access to water for recreation across the state.

Other fun activities include slinging slime at friends standing behind a Perspex wall, sinking your hands into buckets of slime with differing textures and adding chunks of slime to the dedicated slime wall.

What makes Sophie's Slime Factory even better is that it is owned and run by local teenagers, Sophie and Isabelle. Sophie began her slime business in 2016 at the age of 11. Like many her age, Sophie became "hooked on the slime trend" and used whatever household items she could find, much to her "mum's dismay" to add to her slime creations. Sophie began selling her slime on Etsy and to her school friends.

After attending a friend's party where they all made slime, Sophie had the idea to start slime parties. Joining forces with her sister, Isabelle who has a drive for organisation and management, the girls started a party entertainment business and ran their first party for their cousin in 2017. So successful, Sophie and Isabelle spent the next 6 years travelling around Sydney every weekend hosting slime parties.

After a short break, Sophie and Isabelle opened Sophie's Slime Factory which Sophie



describes as being "one of the best experiences of her life" and one which is "so rewarding that it doesn't even feel like work"

Sophie's Slime Factory has now outgrown its current premises and will shortly relocate to Castle Hill with even more slime activities.


When asked what is the best part about running her own business Sophie said the following:



O'HARA'S CREEK FIRE TRAIL WALK

To commence this walk it is necessary to first drive to the northern end of Porter's Road Kenthurst until a locked gate is reached. Adequate parking is generally available.

Public pedestrian access only is available beyond this point. By following the ridge line in a general northerly to north westerly direction, views are revealed across to the distant mountains as the fire trail passes the local gun club on the right.

Shortly the track makes a distinct turn to the left and commences to proceed down a gentle slope until there appears some interesting rocky outcrops on the adjacent hillside. From here the track becomes a little steeper as it winds its way down the escarpment to eventually reveal a large lagoon along the course of O'Hara's Creek.

The environment in this valley is much wetter than higher up on the drier ridge. The result is a noticeable change in vegetation types growing here.

A track does continue upstream but soon ends. The return trip requires a great deal more energetic exertion to walk back to the car park. The altitude difference between the lagoon and the gun club is in the vicinity of 100m. It is advisable to be well prepared by way of appropriate clothing and footwear as well as having a supply of water and a snack bar or two. As with all bushwalking "adventures", it is suggested that a camera is a good idea as there will always be the opportunity to take a photo of something not seen before.

New Richmond Bridge takes shape

We're getting a much clearer picture of the design of the new Richmond Bridge, with more details out for people to see and respond to.

I started this battle for a quicker journey across the Hawkesbury River at North Richmond nearly 15 years ago!

Anthony Albanese and I stood on the Richmond Bridge in 2010, providing the first federal funding to tackle congestion and investigate options for a new bridge.

Once the initial study happened, not much more progress was made by state or federal governments for many years.

What the latest information tells us is that the NSW Government, with \$400 million of federal funding plus \$100 million of their own, is looking at a new 4-lane bridge next to the current one. It will be built 10 metres higher and the additional flood resilience it provides means the bridge, and the approaching roads, would remain open if the floods we've experienced since 2020 were repeated.

The Review of Environmental Factors (REF) also provides more detail on what is covered by the next stage of construction.

Plus it tells us that the old bridge will be kept for pedestrian and cycling use.

You can have a look at the details on the Transport for NSW website, and you can ask questions of the project team, and provide your feedback by Friday 21 February.

There's also an online information session on 29 January with drop-in sessions at the North Richmond Community Centre on Saturday 1 and Wednesday 5 February. The REF and further information can be found at https://www.transport. nsw.gov.au/projects/currentprojects/new-richmondbridge-stage-2

While all of that is happening, Transport for NSW is seeking expressions of interest to complete the detailed design and construction of the new bridge.

Tenders are also out for the upgrade of two intersections on The Driftway, as part of Stage 1 of the construction.

Hills author Peter Osterlund Thrives in His Own Orbit By Lawrence Machado

If you haven't heard of Peter Osterlund, chances are you or your family will soon be seeing and hearing more about this very creative Hills author. The 24-year-old has been out and about signing copies of his first published book, *Lost Orbit*, at the Alfie & Noa store at Castle Towers.

From the first impression, it seems Hills residents can't get enough of their local author, with Peter signing hundreds of copies of *Lost Orbit* already.

The book, self-published in June 2024, is a sci-fi mystery about a scientist investigating Earth's disappearance.

"At the moment, my first book has sold over 1000 copies, which I have to confess I did not expect to reach that number, especially since they're only available on Amazon and at my signings," Peter said. "There have been some sales overseas in the USA but as of now, Australia is the main seller.

Peter followed his debut novel with *The King's Pen Pal*, a fantasy comedy about a King travelling the country to meet his pen pal. Both his books are fast becoming a favourite with readers, with more than 1500 books snapped up so far.

He is already writing more books as he lives his dream of writing science fiction and fantasy.

Peter, who lives in Cattai, works in retail at the Castle Towers. The soft-spoken author lights up when he discusses his passions.

"I was always a big reader as a kid, plus I was always considered 'creative' by coming up with stories and daydreaming about worlds and characters in my head, and I was also into movies," Peter said. "The current genres I've been writing about are science fiction and fantasy. Those two are my go-to for reading, so naturally, it's what I want to write about.

"I began my first book *Lost Orbit*, over a year ago now. I'd finished the first draft of another story and decided to work on something different in the meantime.

"From start to finish, the book took about a year to write, but I wasn't exactly in a rush to have it finished."

He has received very good reviews on Amazon with one reader Caitlin Miles writing: "A great little book, easy to read, interesting concept, very enjoyable, a good plot and characters, really looking forward to the next book."

Another reader said: "I bought this for my 12-year-old, and he read it non-stop through. He really enjoyed it and it was the perfect length and level of engagement. Great to support a young, local author too. We look forward to the next installment!"

Like many present-day authors, Peter has resorted to self-publishing and has been blown away by the positive response at the book store and online.

"With Lost Orbit, I wrote it with the intention of self-publishing as it is relatively short and because I wanted to try it out as an experiment. I figured if it went badly, I'd just go to my other project and try to get that traditionally published. Or if it goes well, then I can keep writing with complete freedom."

He said *Lost Orbit* is part of a series he is planning, called *Broken Planets*, which will be an

anthology so anyone can pick up the series at any book. This and his other book are aimed at all ages (eight plus).

Peter said he tries to write whenever he gets the time. "Whether it be on the one or two days off I have or after a long day at work," he said. "My times change so often - I can sometimes write a good chapter early in the morning after a coffee or can do an all-nighter and write 5000 words."

Asked if he dreams of having his books made into a movie, Peter replied: "Absolutely. I originally wanted to write movies, so to see one of my books adapted would be a dream come true. For *Lost Orbit*, I could imagine someone like Jake Gyllenhaal playing the lead character, Doctor Reed Doyle."

Peter, who attended Marian College, Kenthurst and Macquarie University, is a huge video gamer who spends his free time walking, reading, gaming and of course writing.

"Whether you're a big-time sci-fi/fantasy fan or you're just getting into reading, my books are meant for anyone wanting something easy and fun," Peter said.

MEMORIES WITH IVOR JONES & FRIENDS **BLOCK A CHOC OF HISTORY**

Just a week or so before Christmas, Bev Jordan, our senior journalist, told me she had been discussing, with her brother, the nostalgic topic of chocolates of the past. Coincidentally, a few days later, at a Christmas party for The Hills branch of National Seniors, boxes of "Cadbury's Favourites" were sprinkled on the tables, including "Fry's Turkish Delight". This prompted me to mention to another patron at the party, that Fry's Chocolates was the first chocolate manufacturer to create, what is now, the popular chocolate bar way back in 1847. Not only did they produce the first chocolate bar, but also the first cream-filled chocolate bar in 1853.

I was born and raised in Bristol, England, where Fry's was first established in 1761 by Joseph Fry. The Fry family, like the other families that controlled the chocolate industry in England up to the early 20th Century, (Cadbury and Rowntree families) were Quakers. Apart from the "Turkish Delight" bar that was launched in 1914, the other product for which the company is most famous is "Fry's Chocolate Cream" bar launched in 1866.

When I left England for Australia, aged 11, Fry's were amongst the three largest employers in Bristol, the others being the large tobacco company of W.D. & H. O. Wills (now better known as British-American Tobacco) and the Bristol Aeroplane Company (now known as the British Aircraft Corporation and home of the Concorde supersonic aircraft).

It was in 1919 that Fry's and Cadbury merged and the company was renamed British Cocoa and Chocolate Company with the Fry family controlling 45.44%. Fry family interests were diluted gradually as the company acquired other companies over the following years including Pascall sweets and, in Australia, "MacRobertson's", "Red Tulip" and "Ricci Remond". The Australian operations were renamed Cadbury-Fry-Pascall and based at Claremont, Tasmania, later moving to Ringwood, Victoria.

Another famous chocolate brand, first launched by "Fry's, was "Crunchie" in 1929. Fry's Crunchie is now branded as "Cadbury Crunchie" and when I left England in the 1950s it was branded as Fry's Crunchie. One of my many favourite chocolates from the 1950s was Fry's 5 Boys, a milk chocolate bar. In 1847, Fry's produced the first solid chocolate bar for widespread consumption, and in 1902 they began selling the UK's first milk chocolate - 3 years before Cadbury's Dairy Milk was introduced. Fry's branded their new product as 5 Boys Milk Chocolate, linking it in the consumer mind to the trusted 5 Boys (dark) chocolate they had already been producing for some years. The famous advert shows a young boy's face passing through 5 expressions of 'Desperation, Pacification, Expectation, Acclamation and Realization' as he eats his Fry's chocolate. The image was reproduced as a postcard and sold

widely at food and industry exhibitions during the Edwardian period.

Another favourite was "Fry's 5 Centres" which was introduced in 1934 and was similar to Fry's Chocolate Cream in packaging and design. The five flavours produced over the years changed as tastes changed, however the bars marketed under the 5 Centres name ceased production in 1992 due to the increased costs in production.

After the Fry's name was dropped and the company reverted from British Cocoa and Chocolate Company to Cadbury, which continued until 2010, the company was acquired by Kraft Foods of the US. By 2012 Kraft Foods combined all their chocolate and biscuit brands, including Tobler and Milka into Mondelez International whilst the dairy and other grocery brands formed a new Kraft Foods Corporation in 2012.






