Norwest Sales Smash Record

The record price for an apartment in the Hills has been smashed not once, but twice by a substantial amount with two Norwest penthouses selling off market for over \$6.5million each.

Both four-bedroom penthouse apartments are in Mulpha's Banksia apartment building in Norwest Quarter. The previous apartment record in the Hills District was set in September 2023 when a four-bedroom sub-penthouse sold off the plan for \$3.7m at Infinity Park Norwest by Hitchin.

Mulpha Head of Developments, Tim Spencer says interest in the penthouses has largely been from downsizers from the Hills District who want to stay in the Hills to be close to family, friends and sporting clubs including nearby Castle Hill Country Club.

The remaining four penthouses, including the second garden penthouse, will be released for sale on Saturday March 8th. Mulpha says they will be ready to move into in Spring 2025. The interiors have been crafted by awardwinning architect Richard Archer

Tim Spencer said: "The fact that we have been able to secure two of the six penthouse sales before they are released to market is testament to our understanding of the growing demand for quality design, materials and craftsmanship in the top-end Hills market. We are extremely excited to be delivering such properties and responding to the needs of the community." Residents can access a resort-style heated mineral pool, sunlit garden sanctuary and function room, as well as the bespoke community shops, eateries and a commercial gym with activities deck within the building.

Banksia will be positioned around an open plaza featuring a wild botanical forest, timber walkways, water and wild play for kids, decked areas, and seating.

Architecture firm Bates Smart designed the building and focused on creating high amenity apartments that connect to the outdoors. Matthew Allen, Director, Bates Smart, said:

"Our design concept for Banksia integrates landscape and architecture so that people can feel that they're living in nature. We wanted to design an apartment building that is green, flexible and inviting to residents.

"We maximised access to natural light, fresh air and usable living space, both inside and outside. The balconies are particularly special. They are oversized and feel private due to their integrated plantings. The greenery will eventually cascade over the planters as it grows and will visually tie the apartments to the lushness of the public plaza, retail terraces and



beautiful communal gardens on the building's podium levels."

The plans for the entire Norwest Quarter precinct propose a major mixed-use development for over 2,000 residents who will live amongst 26,000m 2 of green open space. Encompassed within the landscape will be eight residential towers containing 864 apartments, and up to 6,000m 2 of space provided for cafes, restaurants, neighbourhood shops and childcare Facilities.

Seventy percent of apartments in the first stage (Lacebark and Banksia) have also sold to date. EMERGENCY Services

FOUR ANGELS LAW

Police from the Hawkesbury Highway Patrol were patrolling Railway Road North in Mulgrave on Saturday, 22nd February when they detected a white Holden Captiva travelling at a speed of 85kph in a signposted 50kph speed-enforced area.

The male driver was subjected to a breath test which was positive. Roadside testing for drugs also showed positive for illicit drugs.

He was arrested and taken to Windsor Police Station for secondary testing, where his breath analysis was recorded at 0.160 grams of alcohol in 210 milli-litres of breath (high range). He was subjected to a second oral fluid test for drugs and tested positive for cocaine.

The driver was charged with the "Four Angels Law" Driving with a high range prescribed concentration of alcohol (PCA) and the presence of a prescribed illicit drug. He was also charged with exceeding the speed limit by more than 30kph. He is due before Windsor Local Court later this month.

The "Four Angels Law" was in response to the tragic death of four children (Anthony, Angelina, Sienna Abdulla, and Veronique Sakr) who were killed when a drunk driver mounted the footpath in Oatlands in February 2020.

DRIVING ON DRUGS

Hills Highway Patrol stopped a white MG SUV for speeding on the M2 Motorway, Baulkham Hills just after 1am on 22nd February. The 26-year-old male driver was clocked at 147 km/h in a 100 km/h zone. Police say the driver allegedly provided false details and was found to be breaching his bail conditions. A roadside breath test returned a negative result, but an oral fluid test indicated the presence of both cannabis and cocaine. He was charged with driving with an illicit drug in his system.

OPERATION AMAROK

Hills Police participated in the state-wide Operation Amarok, with a number of DV-related arrests and charges, including seven assaults, two breach AVO, as well as attending over 25 other domestic disputes. Police also conducted a large number of AVO Compliance and bail checks on defendants.

BREAK AND ENTER

Between 2nd March 7pm and 3rd March 4am a suspect allegedly entered a residential property at Bridgewood Dr, Beaumont Hills through an open garage door.

The suspect stole keys from inside the dwelling and subsequently took a 2024 BMW Coupe from outside the home.

NAZI SWASTIKA ON CHEST

A man has been charged with allegedly displaying a Nazi swastika outside a war memorial on Wright's Rd Castle Hill after Police were called to the Centenary of ANZAC Reserve at about 7pm on Monday, 24th February.

Officers attached to Castle Hill Police Area Command arrived to find a 31-year-old man with a Nazi swastika drawn on his chest. He was arrested and charged with knowingly display by public act Nazi symbol without excuse. The man was granted strict conditional bail to appear before Parramatta Local Court on Wednesday, 19th March 2025.

The NSW Police Force takes hate crimes seriously and encourages anyone who is the victim of a hate crime or witnesses a hate crime to report the matter to police through Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 or through Triple Zero (000) in an emergency.

FALLEN TREE

In the middle of Friday's heat, 28th February, volunteers attended to a fallen tree blocking an entire road in Castle Hill and blocking access to about 20 houses.

SES volunteers responded quickly to the scene and cleared the road, which took over two hours to clear. While the car was damaged, no person was inside it when the large branch broke and fell on it.

METRO PATROLS

Due to an increase in anti-social behaviour by young people at Metro Train Stations in the past weeks, the Hills Police and Police Transport Command will be stepping up patrols at the Metro Stations within the Hills District Police will speak to groups of teenagers loitering for long periods of time. Anyone found with weapons will be arrested and prosecuted. If you see any large groups of people loitering at these locations, call 131444 to request a patrol to be dispatched.

DRINK DRIVING

A Kellyville woman has been charged with High Range drink driving following a crash on Wednesday, 26th February at about 4.40pm.

Police say the female driver of a Jeep was involved in a minor crash with another vehicle at the President and Green Rd' roundabout.

Both drivers went through the roundabout, stopped on Roseberry Road. The Jeep driver collided with the gutter, causing the near side front tyre to deflate.

Police breath tested the Jeep driver, a 40-year-old female from Kellyville, who returned a positive reading. At Castle Hill Police Station she underwent a breath analysis, which returned a reading in the High Range. Her driver's licence was immediately suspended. She is due to appear before Parramatta Local Court.



TRESPASSING

A 57-year-old man was arrested at 1 am in the morning on Wednesday, 27 th February, after police responded to a construction site alarm at Norwest. A PolAir Helicopter also attended the scene. He was charged with: Enter Enclosed Lands, Goods in Custody x2 Possess Housebreaking Implements, Display Altered Numberplate.

SWITCH-A-ROO

A 28-year-old man has been with a issued a court attendance notice to Parramatta Local Court on 10th April for driving while disqualified. Police allege he was driving a white Hyundai i30 hatchback at about 6.30pm on Friday, 28th February eastbound on Memorial Ave, Kellyville, the vehicle approached a yellow traffic light at the intersection of Arnold Avenue.

Police alleged the driver proceeded through the light, which turned red before the vehicle crossed. Police, who were using an unmarked Highway Patrol Vehicle, activated all warning lights and sirens, causing the driver to stop on Memorial Ave, Kellyville.

Police say they observed a male driver in the driver's seat, and what appeared to be a female with hair in a ponytail was seated in the front passenger seat.

Police observed through the rear window of the Hyundai that the male driver removed his seatbelt, climbed over the centre console and sat in the back seat. The female passenger climbed over the centre console and sat in the driver's seat.

The police claim it was clearly captured on the crystal-clear high-definition in-car video.

Officers approached the driver's side window and spoke to the male seated in the vehicle's back seat. The male and female were the only occupants in the vehicle.

The male repeatedly denied being the driver of the vehicle, while the female repeatedly stated to police that she was driving at the time. Checks on the male's licence confirmed he was disqualified from driving. The male was alcohol and drug tested, providing negative results to both.

The golden moment will be celebrated by members at a gathering starting at 7pm. At its usual meeting place at Restore Church, 47 Britannia Road, Castle Hill.

The club is inviting former members and people associated with the club via Youth Leadership and Speechcraft to come along and join the celebrations.

The Club was formed in 1974 and has continually operated for over 50 years, holding more than 1200 meetings. The Club is a not for profit, community organisation focused on fostering and improving communication skills for its members and the general public.

Bella Vista Pocket Park

With the rising cost of living there is increased pressure on families to find activities and events to enjoy without breaking the bank. However, when you scratch beneath the surface, it's amazing what events and activities you can find, and often for free.

A great example is the events held at Bella Vista Pocket Park. As part of the Landcom's Sydney Metro North West place making program, regular events are run here for free. The aim of the program is to create welcoming neighbourhoods and public places whilst building a sense of community.

Every Wednesday morning, during school term, local dance school, Stage Door Performing Arts operates a free weekly dance class for pre-schoolers. Everyone regardless of fitness level can participate with adaptable exercises and well-trained instructors, connect with others in the community, have fun whilst improving fitness levels and enjoying all the health benefits that come with being active.

Learn to Skate with Totem Skate at Bella Vista Pocket Park is becoming increasingly popular and is the perfect activity to get the kids out of the house and off their devices. Free skate workshops are held with Totem Skate on the first Saturday of March, April, September, October and November. Designed for kids aged 6+, who are either beginners or looking to improve their skills, these workshops create a supportive space to develop confidence on a skateboard. Helmets, skateboards, elbow, and knee pads are provided on the day, if



needed, so there is literally no cost to participate.

Other special activities run at Bella Vista Pocket from time to time include things such as Diwali Celebrations, free movie nights, Tasty of Diversity and free learn to ride classes. These enjoyable events are also well worth attending with family and friends.

Located at the Southern end of the Metro Station, Bella Vista Pocket Park is a great place to meet with friends, go for a walk, enjoy a coffee and bite from the Stage Door Café and take the opportunity to participate in one of the free activities organised by Landcom as part of the Sydney Metro North West place making program.

Set in 1940s New York, the singer everyone wants to see is the enthusiastic (and slightly delusional) soprano dubbed "the first lady of the sliding scale".



Scott or ScoRo as he is popularly known has been a busy reporter for Scouts NSW. "I got to interview Chandler Powell (Bindi Irwin's husband) at Australia Zoo as part of the recent Australian Jamboree in Maryborough, Queensland," he said. "He was a really cool guy to chat to beforehand. I was amazed because I've never interviewed someone who was media trained."

The goal of the King's Scout Award is to widen the interests and knowledge of Venturer Scouts by encouraging them to push their personal limits. It is the peak award for this age group, taking three to four years to complete, and a wider range of activities. "For our Scouts, a peak award is representative of so much more than just earning a uniform badge and a special certificate – they are a reflection of countless hours of personal development and contributions to the community," Scouts NSW Deputy Chief Commissioner Niamh Hitchman said.

King's Scout Award recipients work to achieve personal development and contribute positively to their communities. Recipients qualify for additional Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) adjustment factor points via some universities.

"Balancing the work required to achieve these awards with the competing demands of everyday life – whether that be taking the HSC, starting apprenticeships, or maintaining fulltime working and family commitments – is an undertaking that cannot be understated," Ms Hitchman said. "My sincere congratulations to the recipients on their awards, and my thanks to those families, friends and Scouting members, who helped support them along the way."

Clean Up Australia Day success!

Over 50 volunteers came together to remove litter from Crestwood Reserve in honour of Clean Up Australia Day.

Approximately seven bags of rubbish and several bulky items were collected such as metal and wooden signs, scooters, soccer balls, garden ornaments, traffic bollards, and cones.

The volunteers attended a special talk by Dr Michelle Ryan from Western Sydney University. She talked about the importance of keeping local waterways free from debris to protect the platypus and all the other creatures and insects that depend on these ecosystems.

In August 2023, Dr Ryan and her team from the Cattai Hills Environment Network (CHEN) made an exciting discovery—a platypus they affectionately named Bluey. This event marked the first capture and release of an egg-laying mammal in the area in 25 years.

Since this discovery, The Hills Shire Council has partnered with CHEN to offer a series of free workshops aimed at educating the community about the platypus.

The Clean Up event focused on removing rubbish from Toongabbie Creek and raised awareness about the importance of keeping all waterways clean, especially in critical areas where these animals may live or where water flows into regions inhabited by platypuses.

Crestwood Reserve is home to Toongabbie Creek, which serves as a vital water source for the critically endangered Sydney Turpentine-Ironbark Forest.



100 YEARS IN THE SKIES OVER RICHMOND

On 30 June 1925, almost 100 years ago, the Royal Australian Air Force established a base at what was then known as Ham Common. The flat land situated between Richmond and Windsor was a popular spot for horse racing (as evidenced by the establishment of Clarendon or Richmond racecourse) and for aviators such William Hart, the flying dentist from Parramatta, who conducted flights from Ham Common in 1912. The NSW State Government sponsored the establishment of a flying school at the site in 1916 as part of the war effort during the First World War, graduates from the school would then join the Australian Flying Corps or be shipped to Britain to join the Royal Flying Corps. Both of these organisations eventually formed the basis of the Air Forces of either Australia or Britain.

William Hart was the winner of Australia's first air race from Botany to Parramatta in 1912 – a distance of 32 kilometres. He completed the distance in 23 minutes and won the race. He also opened an Aviation School in Penrith, taking on student aviators. On 30 June 1912, William Hart flew from Parramatta Park to Richmond. He had intended to fly the former mayor, Alderman Jago, who had become a firm supporter of Mr. Hart, to fulfill a longstanding promise, but the conditions looked dangerous, so he flew solo.

In August 1912, William Hart constructed a two-seat monoplane which he successfully tested at Wagga Wagga, but narrowly escaped death in it in a serious accident in Richmond on the 4 September of that year. He suffered multiple fractures and a fractured skull and lapsed into a coma for three weeks. He was in rehabilitation in Windsor Hospital for two months and in recovery for nearly a year. This accident effectively ended his aviation career.

The Royal Australian Air Force was established in March 1921 at Point Cook, Melbourne after which it was deemed necessary to also establish a base near Sydney. Senior officers of the RAAF felt that it should not be located near the coast where it could be subjected to naval bombardment. At the time it was felt that aircraft in Australia were more likely to be used in a defensive manner rather than an offensive attack vehicle. The site at Ham Common between Richmond and Windsor was chosen as the location for the RAAF Base as it matched the requirements perfectly. It sat alongside the Windsor Road and Richmond Railway line which had suitable transport links to Sydney, and it had suitable aviation facilities from its previous use as a flying school during World War 1, leading to the establishment of RAAF Richmond some four years after the creation of the RAAF.

The Hawkesbury region continued to see a growing number of flights overhead as aviation grew in popularity during the 1920s, as many pioneer aviators took to the skies. Sir Charles Kingsford Smith, Amy Johnson and Jean Batten were among those who were seen high above Windsor and Richmond. A friend and reader of this magazine, Marilyn Stoneham loaned to me last year an album of photographs of Sir Charles Kingsford Smith and Charles Ulm at, I believe to be, Richmond. This allowed me to copy many of the photos before she donated the album to the State Library of NSW.

On the 18th of July 1935, Smithy flew his faithful 'Old Bus', Southern Cross, for the last time from its base at Sydney's Mascot aerodrome (which would later become Kingsford Smith International Airport) to RAAF Richmond for storage. It was later moved to Eagle Farm Airport at Brisbane.

In a first for the Richmond base, an experiment was conducted in 1927 on the use of parachutes in Australia for the first time.

During May 1977, my family and I were evacuated from Auckland to Richmond on a Hercules Transport by the RAAF during an Air Traffic controller's strike. Unlike modern commercial planes of the time, the Hercules provided webbing seats along the sides of the plane, no windows, and was very noisy, requiring ear muffs, At the time, I was employed by the Australian Electoral Commission and a series of referendum questions were to be put to Australians while, at the same time, a National Song Poll was due to be held to consider a possible change to the National Anthem. As the Acting Divisional Returning Officer for the Division of Prospect, I was required to be flown home in order to conduct the election. The Hercules held many Australian citizens who had been stranded in New Zealand by the strike. At least they got home in time to vote.

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

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
