

FEDERAL ELECTION

BY BEV JORDAN

If you hadn't noticed the Federal Election is about to get into full swing.

Early voting centres open their doors on Tuesday, April 22nd and applications for Postal voting close on Wednesday, 30th April. If you don't have one but would like one call 13 23 26.

It's now too late to change any details such as change of address as the federal electoral roll closed on 7th April.

If you need to check your electoral details and which electorate you are in, where to vote and who the candidates in that electorate are visit the Australian Electoral Commission website at: aec.gov.au

It is compulsory by law for all eligible Australian citizens to enrol and vote.

VOTING

On election day you will receive two ballot papers: a white one for the Senate.

Senate and a green one for the House of Representatives.

On the **white ballot paper**, you have a choice of two ways to vote:

If you choose to vote above the line, you need to number at least 6 boxes. Put the number '1' in the box for the party or group that is your first choice, a '2' for your second choice and so on until you've numbered at least 6 boxes. If you choose to vote below the line, you need to number at least 12 boxes, from 1 to 12, for individual candidates in the order of your choice.

On the **green ballot paper**, you need to put a '1' in the box beside the candidate who is your first choice, '2' in the box beside your second choice and so on, until you have numbered every box. You must number every box for your vote to count



ELECTION DAY SATURDAY MAY 3RD LOCAL CANDIDATES AIMING FOR CANBERRA

The circulation area of the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News covers the Federal electorates of Mitchell and Macquarie and parts of Greenway and Berowra.

Currently Labor holds two of the seats (Macquarie and Greenway) and the Liberals two (Mitchell and Berowra).

Mitchell was retained by Liberal Alex Hawke in 2022 with 60.7 per cent of the vote after preferences were distributed. Redistribution since that election means Mitchell now takes in West Pennant Hills with Box Hill and Rouse Hill moving into Greenway.

Greenway was retained by Labor's Michelle Rowland in the 2022 election with 57.9 per cent of the vote after distribution.

In the 2022 election Julian Leeser retained Berowra for Liberals with 57.6% vote after preferences were distributed on a two party preferred basis and Susan Templeman retained Macquarie for Labor with 56.3% of the vote after preferences.

The Greens have candidates in all four seats as does Pauline Hanson's One Nation.

We will be listing all candidates for the four Federal seats (26 candidates in total) but will not be going into details about them. The sitting MP in each seat will be marked with a *

The candidates are listed in the order they will appear on the ballot paper for the House of Representatives.

Details on voting for the Senate are on page 2. To find out what each candidate in your electorate is standing for please visit their website or social media. Who you vote for is your choice.

The political advertisements in the magazine are advertisements and have been paid for by the candidates.

Voting is compulsory by law for all eligible Australian citizens. The fine is \$20.

OOD EMERGENCY OOD SERVICES

ABANDONED UTE

Police patrolling Carrington Rd, Castle Hill, on the evening of 4 April, and saw a man leave a rental vehicle and run into a nearby building site.

An inspection of the bag in the rear tray identified an amount of wiring, along with a 'Specialised' brand mountain bike.

An inspection of the adjoining building site identified an electrical box that had been stripped of wiring, along with another bag of copper and various plastic tubing with the wiring stripped out.

A police search of the site with the assistance of a police dog handler failed to locate the male who had been sighted earlier. The vehicle has been seized for forensic examination, with inquiries to continue to identify the driver.

CARS CRASH

Firefighters from Riverstone Fire and Rescue NSW Station were called to a motor vehicle accident on Pitt Town Rd, Kenthurst, on 12th April after two cars were involved in a crash with one person trapped in a car.

Given the potential for a serious incident, resources from Oakville Rural Fire Brigade, Annangrove Rural Fire Service and rescue firefighters from Fire and Rescue NSW Station 071 Castle Hill were all called to attend.

The Hills Police Area Command had the road closed in both directions to allow access for firetrucks and NSW Ambulance.

The NSW Rural Fire Service established fire protection whilst Fire and Rescue NSW crews used hydraulic rescue equipment to assist Ambulance Officers gain access to a patient.

Fortunately, there were no serious injuries, and the occupants of the vehicles were transported to the hospital for further checks.



SECOND MURDER CHARGE

A woman has been charged in connection to the alleged murder of Johnny Birch at Glenorie last month.

Police arrested a 35-year-old woman on the morning of 3rd April, at a property on Gleness Place, Glenorie.

She was taken to Castle Hill Police Station, where she was charged with accessory after the fact to murder and larceny – accessory before the fact.

Strike Force Halderen was established by The Hills Police Area Command and the State Crime Command's Homicide Squad to investigate the circumstances surrounding the death of 39-year-old Johnny Birch, whose body was found on the property on Gleness Place onFriday, 14 March.

The woman was refused bail to appear in Parramatta Local Court on Thursday, 29th May.

She is the second person to be charged in relation to the man's death. A 24-year-old man remains before the courts charged with murder.

DRINK DRIVING CHARGES

Police are warning people not to drink and drive. At around 12.05 am on Thursday, 10th April, a 57-year-old male driver was stopped on Kings Rd, Castle Hill, while driving a 2018 white Holden station wagon.

He returned a positive roadside breath test. He was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station. A breath analysis was conducted, returning a reading of 0.107 grammes of alcohol in 210 litres of breath. As a result, the driver's licence was suspended, and he was charged with drink driving.

In another incident a woman failed a breath test after the car collided with multiple vehicles.

At around 5.40 pm on Friday, 4th April, a 20-year-old woman driving a blue Toyota Camry collided with multiple parked vehicles on James Mileham Dr, Kellyville. The driver continued driving after each collision, eventually stopping against a tree.

Police arrived around 6.10 pm and found the driver seated on a small brick wall nearby. A breath test returned a positive result, and she was arrested for a secondary breath analysis, which showed a reading of 0.144 grammes of alcohol in 210 litres of breath.

The driver was charged with Mid-Range PCA, her licence was suspended, and she was issued a 'Notice of Suspension.

On Saturday 5th April at 9.30pm a stationary RBT unit on Mile End Rd Rouse Hill stopped a red Toyota Camry April. The red P-Plate driver admitted to having some beers with a mate and returned a positive breath test. Due to his level of intoxication police say he vomited in the back of the car. At the station he returned a reading of 0.116. He will face cort at a later date on a mid-range drink driving charge.

CAR ALIGHT

Emergency services were called to the intersection of the North Connex Tunnel entrance and the M2 Pennant Hills Rd exit at West Pennant Hills after reports of a singlevehicle crash.

Prior to police arrival, passing motorists managed to pull the driver from the vehicle, which had caught alight. Another motorist extinguished the fire.

NSW Ambulance paramedics treated the 27-year-old driver before he was taken to Westmead Hospital in a critical condition.

An investigation into the circumstances surrounding the crash has commenced.

BREAK AND ENTER

On Sunday, 13th April, in Baulkham Hills Rd, two unknown persons opened an unlocked side gate and entered the rear of the garage through an open door.

The noise they made woke a resident. The men who broke in rolled out an unregistered KTM bike and a child's balance bike.

When the owner came outside he started to chase them, the two attempted to start the dirt bike but failed and fled to a black Holden Commodore bearing partial registration plates DSF.

Police are keen to speak with anyone who may have information about this incident. Contact Crime Stoppers NSW. All information is treated with the utmost confidentiality.

MASSIVE CLEAN UP

A massive clean-up was made along Annangrove Road and Bannerman Rd Glenhaven after an unknown vehicle deliberately ran down several garbage bins on Friday, 4th April.

According to GPS tracking, the earliest truck in the area was a recycling truck around the affected properties on Annangrove Road.

The Hills Council and Hills Police are calling for anyone in the area to check their CCTV and DashCam footage on the early morning of 4 April to help narrow down the offending vehicle.

SHOOTING APPEAL

Riverstone Police Area Command has renewed calls for public help with an investigation into a public place shooting in Canyon Drive, Stanhope Gardens on Sunday, 9th February at around 2am. At the time police were told a group of people had broken into the home and fired shots at the home before fleeing the scene.

Giulia Celebrates 108

It's hard to believe that Giulia Paini was born over 100 years ago but on Saturday (April 12th) this elegant long-time Hills resident celebrated her 108th birthday with a smile, lots of stories and great wit.

She chatted and laughed with friends and carers who came to wish her a happy birthday at a special morning tea.

When I asked her what the secret to a long and healthy life was, she said if she told me, it wouldn't be a secret anymore!

Born in Montagna in northern Italy on April 12th, 1917 Giulia was the youngest of four children and lived in a 500-year-old house nestled amongst vineyards. Her family grew grapes and had animals.

Her earliest memories include eating an apple while looking out of an upstairs window in the family home and seeing it fall on the head of a visiting priest. While she was in kindergarten she squeezed her head through the fence surrounding the local church to see what was behind the wall and her head got stuck. She started singing and was eventually rescued by people who came to investigate where the singing was coming from.

Giulia has lots of stories to tell and has lots of willing listeners.

She was only a toddler when she first met her future husband Angelo who was 10 years

older and a great friend of her older brother. At the age of 18 Angelo left their Italian village and migrated to Australia. For years afterwards Giulia would ask where Angelo was and when he would be coming back.

When Angelo did return to Italy 20 years later love blossomed. They married and decided to build a life together in Sydney. Giulia left Italy on 2nd February 1950, her father's birthday, and never saw her father again.

The move was a big culture shock. She left a town with cobbled streets and no cars and arrived in a busy city with lots of cars but not many shoe shops. Her brothers would send her shoes and handbags from Milan.

She was an accomplished dressmaker and would make clothes for herself and family but also for other families to help with the finances.

Her son John was born in Australia and remembers the beautiful clothes his mother used to make. The last dress she made was for her own 100th birthday celebration. For her 108th celebration Giulia wore a silk blouse and skirt she had made years ago.

Her son John said: " Mum was a perfectionist at whatever she did, dress making, gardening, cooking, cleaning, ironing and wouldn't stand for less from anyone else.

"As a dress maker she made everything to measurement and never used a pattern."

Even though Giulia wouldn't tell me the secret of eating and living well, her carers, who obviously adore her said, raw egg yolk, good quality cheese and butter, olive oil and vinegar all feature highly in her diet. A glass of good quality red wine is also a must.

Griffo's Legacy Lives on at The Hills Bulls

The Hills Bulls took a page from the past to honour one of one of their much loved heroes, Paul 'Griffo' Griffin, as they launched their 'Our Club, Our Legacy' campaign last Sunday. Griffin, tragically killed last year, will be a permanent part of the Baulkham Hills club with the spanking new gym named after him.

Club president and Griffo's great mate, Michael Gremmo, speaking at the launch, paid a rich tribute to the club legend, saying he was someone who always showed up, whenever and where ever he was needed.

Gremmo recalled they first met back in 1988 when they had won a Grade C grand final together at Crestwood Oval, the current home ground. "And from that moment on, Griffo



became a part of the heartbeat of this club," the president said.

"Today is not just about opening a gym, it's about paying tribute to a man whose impact reached far beyond these fields," Gremmo said. "Griffo was the kind of bloke who made things happen. He gave, not just financially, but through countless hours of his time, through mentorship, through sheer grit and generosity.

"Griffo's beloved family honoured his wish on his passing, and he became an organ donor, something he was so supportive of. The gift of life – what a wonderful gift."

Coincidentally, Griffo's horse Aprapaho blitzed his rivals enroute to winning the Sydney Cup on Saturday.

Gremmo said Griffo's legacy will live on through the gym, which stands for his hard work, commitment and building something bigger than one's self.

Turning to 'Our Club, Our Legacy' campaign, Gremmo said their goal is to raise \$350,000 to complete the Hills Bulls clubhouse at Crestwood Oval, saying: "In true Bulls determination, we will make this happen.... This will be a true home for our club, where players, families and volunteers can connect, celebrate and grow."

He thanked the Federal and State Members of Parliament, including Alex Hawke, Ray Williams, and Mark Hodges, The Hills Shire Mayor Dr Michelle Byrne, deputy mayor Frank De Massi, and the councillors, NSWRL CEO David Trodden, life members, founding members (including his Dad and Col), and members of the Griffin family.

"Thank you to the Griffin family for sharing Paul with us, and allowing us to honour him in a way that reflects everything he stood for," Gremmo said. "So, thank you Griffo, you have left an amazing legacy that will live on."

JOHN MCAULEY, WWII VETERAN

There are not many World War II veterans still alive and certainly not many with a good memory and a passion to talk about their service. Castle Hill sub-branch has two, 105-year-old Bruce Robertson and 100-year-old John Patrick McAuley who both served with the RAAF during World War II.

Castle Hill's John McAuley has just been interviewed by a World War II historian, Jiri Kluc, who flew all the way from the Czech Republic to talk to the former RAAF radar operator.

John was thrilled to have the opportunity to share his story which will gain a world-wide audience.

The retired economist and author was born on 30th June 1924 at Murray Bridge South Australia and joined the Royal Australian Air Force on his 18th birthday, training as a radar operator at RAAF Richmond.

"In the second half of 1943 I was transferred to Merauke in what was then Dutch New Guinea. When I arrived in Merauke, it was obvious that Merauke had recently been bombed by the Japanese.

"At the time, Australia was concerned that the Japanese forces in the Aru Islands would launch an invasion of Australia.

"It rained most evenings. It sometimes rained during the day. Conditions were tough. Merauke was surrounded by jungle. Travelling from one place to another was difficult. There were no proper roads." John was demobbed in 1945 and the following year, as well as getting married to Margaret, he enrolled in a Bachelor of Economics at the University of Adelaide, as part of the Chifley Government's Post-War Retraining Scheme. The couple moved to Sydney where John worked as an economist in the Commonwealth Bank, prior to joining the State Bank. He was Treasurer of the United Nations Association of Australia and wrote a quarterly newsletter for former RAAF radar operators for over 24 years. "It kept comrades together and renewed their friendships," he said.

He has 3 children, 9 grandchildren and 30 great grandchildren and will be walking the ANZAC Day march in Sydney with his walking frame and eldest great grandson Stephen. He intends to complete the march at his own pace as he did last year. It's a march he has joined "on and off" for "most years" since the end of World War II.

"The ANZAC spirit is important. It's important to honour the people who answered the call to defend Australia," he says.

But he's disappointed that nations haven't learnt the lessons of history. "War is not to be glorified. What we need is peace with justice."

John will be playing a significant part in the special concert: Lest We Forget - Tribute at Sydney Opera House Forecourt on Thursday, April 24th which will be screened on Channel 7.

"It's heartbreaking."

"Some stay and talk for an hour or more. We don't ask questions and we don't judge. We just listen. It's like a little community, we sit and chat about life in general."

She says meals are freshly prepared by volunteers.

"Restaurants, grocery stores, and food suppliers' partner with the initiative, generously donating ingredients and supplies.

She said the Kenthurst Rotary Food Van for the Homeless was one of the busy club's most "impactful" projects.

According to the Hills Police Area Command, it can take up to 26 incidents before a victim makes a report.

The second important message is that "The March also gives those who attend knowledge of the resources in the community that are available to them if they are victims of domestic



and gender-based violence or if they know someone who is." Said Mr Mullan.

It is only by working together as a community alongside Castle Hill Police, the Hills Domestic Violence Prevention Network, community groups and service providers that we will reduce the impact of DV in our community.

Mr Mullans is encouraging the community to attend this important event.

"We need everyone in The Hills to stand up and be counted as we inform about, and act against, domestic and gender basedviolence" he said.

COLLABORATION: The key to building a better community for all

About six years ago, I saw firsthand the shortcomings of the proposed Rouse Hill Hospital plan – a \$300 million investment that didn't include an emergency department or maternity services, despite Riverstone's rapid growth and shift toward young families.

Recognising this gap, our local business chamber raised the alarm with representatives at all levels of government. Michelle Rowland MP championed the cause from opposition, launching a campaign to secure an emergency department. The need was undeniable, and community support quickly followed. After years of delay, the government finally committed to an emergency department though real progress only came after the last election.

One of my first meetings as a newly elected local MP was with the Health Minister, Ryan Park. I welcomed the expanded \$700 million commitment, which added 250 more beds and broader services, but I also raised the need for full maternity care. The Minister acknowledged the gap but warned budget pressures could cause delays.

That's where collaboration made the difference. Michelle Rowland worked closely

with both state and federal health ministers to secure the extra funding needed. Thanks to this partnership and strong community advocacy, Rouse Hill Hospital will now include full maternity services — delivering the kind of health care our growing community deserves.

It's proof that when all levels of government work together, everyone wins.

The Rouse Hill Hospital campaign is just one example of how collaboration between the Minns State Labor Government and the Albanese Federal Labor Government is delivering real outcomes for the Riverstone Electorate.

For too long, the North West's roads and infrastructure were neglected. The former Liberal-National governments held power for nearly a decade, but this region's needs were consistently overlooked. THIS PLACE HAS POTENTIAL – So where is the infrastructure?

Some great places don't just happen, they are created. Take for example Box Hill, where once there were paddocks with cattle grazing. Now, we have aspiring families eager to embrace their new suburb. You would think that moving about in Box Hill would take just minutes to travel through, around and outside the area, but existing road infrastructure is too narrow, devoid of roundabouts, traffic signals at major intersections, footpaths and adequate drainage, hence the time spent commuting is atrocious.

In ten years, the population is expected to increase to 50,000 residents, so Box Hill needs delivery of infrastructure now, to meet that growth. Neighbouring areas of Western and Northwest Sydney are experiencing rapid progress as investment in the Sydney International Airport and Aerotropolis and extensions of the Sydney Metro are prioritised. It is therefore crucial that we continue raising issues of inadequacy experienced by the Box Hill and neighbouring residents, so that a fairer future for The Hills and Hawkesbury can be secured.

The Federal election has provided a platform to escalate funding shortfalls for major projects

impacting Hawkesbury residents, including the ridiculous decision by the NSW Government to exclude a birthing suite from Rouse Hill Hospital. My representation to the Minister for Health seeking funding for this facility was flatly refused, but our collective continued advocacy has meant that both Labor and Liberal Federal candidates have committed \$120 million to build a birthing suite at Rouse Hill Hospital. Now that's a win for the community!




