

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FOLLOW YOUR DREAM!

At the Dural Men's Shed we encourage the blokes to follow their dream and this can come in many different forms. Some have now learnt welding and others learnt how to turn some lovely lathe woodwork, or create great metalwork on the plasma cutter. One great dreamer is Colin Heald, and his dream from 72 years ago is to build from scratch a Hot-rod (Ford Roadster).

Colin's dream began in 1953, when as a teenager doing a Technical College course in the city, he would stop at the newsagent at Central Station and grab the Hot-rod magazines. He was so obsessed with the Hot-Rods that he decided one day he was going to build one (not bad for a 15-year-old!!) Now retired, and with the facilities of the shed available, he made

a start on the build in July last year. Working consistently each week, Colin reckons he still has eighteen months work to finish it. Many parts are not available now and so he has had to use his vast experience in the trade to build "hands on", so for example all the body panels will be hand built by Colin.

At the shed there is another member who is a Mustang fanatic and so he has supplied Colin with a Mustang engine for the Hot-Rod. Colin is shown proudly with his half-built Hot-Rod and the other photo shows what the finished product will look like.

The Dural Men's Shed has 150 members, and our main days of general operation are Thursday and Saturday from 9am till 2pm. There are particular activities on other days.

Mondays - there is a special woodturners day where the men can use one of our 12 lathes and there is an opportunity for trainees to be given guidance by some experienced woodturners.

On Wednesdays a group of 8 to 10 men from the local Warrah Home undertake basic timber work under the supervision of our men and each Friday during school terms we have 12 boys from Galston High School. who are taken through some trades, including welding, woodwork and electronics. This gives them a taste of what to expect in the

workforce and is under the guidance of about 12 of our experienced shed blokes. It is an intergenerational mentoring program which is enjoyed by both the men and boys and is highly regarded by the school and parents.

FIGHT FOR A FAIRER HILLS FUTURE BY BEV JORDAN

A major petition and campaign has just been launched by Hills Shire Council calling for the State Government to fund vital infrastructure upgrades before more appartments are built and thousands more people move into the area.

The Fight for a Fairer Hills Future campaign was launched by Hills Shire Mayor Dr Michelle Byrne last week in Kellyville alongside Old Windsor Road, which is struggling to cope with booming populations in The Hills Shire, Blacktown and Hawkesbury council areas.

The one square kilometre Kellyville-Bella Vista precinct has been rezoned by the State Government to allow more than 11,600 apartments housing more than 23,000 people.

Dr Byrne said : "According to the NSW Government's own housing targets, The Hills Shire is the fastest growing local government area in the state and our residents are fed up with the lack of funding for critical infrastructure like roads, schools and sporting fields.

"Windsor and Old Windsor Roads are already at a standstill during the morning and afternoon peaks and if you think it's bad now, you haven't seen anything yet."

A council staff member road-tested the commute from Gables to Norwest every day for five days during the morning peak. The average time taken for the 18km drive was 45 minutes and the average speed never made it above 24 km/h.

"If it's like this now – imagine what it will be like in 2041 when the population of our Shire booms by another 71 per cent to 328,600 people," said Dr Byrne.

Jason Owen, President of the Sydney Hills Business Chamber lives in Pitt Town and says his journey to Norwest on weekdays can take anywhere from 45 minutes to 70 minutes depending on the time of day.

With 350 members, the Sydney Hills Business Chamber is one of the largest in NSW. "The overall majority of members complain about traffic, particularly along Windsor Rd and Old Windsor Rd, " said Mr Owen.

"Of particular concern is how the impending construction of over 10,000 units in Bella Vista and Kellyville alone will further impact traffic across the LGA. This is compounded by the existing network of roads through Box Hill, The Gables and other surrounding areas where roads that were originally designed for rural or, at best, semi-rural loads of traffic now face an ever-increasing onslaught on residents making that trip.

"How do we as a community convince people to come to live here and to bring and grow their families if there is a considerable lack of resources for schools and rural-esk roads?"

He has already signed the petition which gained 1,000 signatures in 24 hours after the public launch.

Dr Byrne said: "We're calling on residents and workers across North-West Sydney to sign our petition to the NSW Parliament demanding the upgrade of 45 roads including Windsor and Old Windsor Roads, and urgent funding for schools and sports fields. "

The full list is online but also includes: 14 new schools. Funding for the development of 40 new sports fields (31 have partial funding and 9 have no funding) and funding to address a "\$207million infrastructure gap" in Box Hill.

The petition is at www.fairerhillsfuture.com. au. Once it reaches 20,000 signatures it will be debated in State Parliament.

State MP for Kellyville, Ray Williams has presented Council's petition to the NSW Parliament and urged the NSW Government to act, calling the situation "dire".



EMERGENCY Services

BAULKHAM HILLS Stabbing

A woman has been charged with three counts of wound with attempt to murder after an alleged domestic violence-related incident at Baulkham Hills.

Emergency services were called to a home on Jamieson Avenue about 5.20am on Monday, 31st March and found a 10-year-old boy, a 13-year-old girl, a 16-year-old girl and a 47-yearold woman suffering stab wounds.

They were treated at the scene by NSW Ambulance paramedics. The children were taken to The Children's Hospital at Westmead and the woman to Westmead Hospital.

The woman was charged with three counts of cause wounding/grievous bodily harm to person with intent to murder.

She was refused bail and appeared via a bedside hearing at Parramatta Local Court, Tuesday, 1st April.

METH POSITIVE

On Monday, 31 March, at around 11:50 PM, police officers from the Hawkesbury Highway Patrol observed a silver Volkswagen T-Cross driving at high speed on Hawkesbury Valley Way, Windsor.

Despite attempts to stop the vehicle, police allege the driver continued to evade them, reaching speeds of up to 170kph in a 70kph zone. The pursuit continued through multiple areas, including Windsor Road and Old Windsor Road. Police say the driver drove through several red lights and drove recklessly through roadworks.

The vehicle was eventually stopped with the assistance of PolAir and road spikes on Samantha Riley Drive, Kellyville.

The 29-year-old female driver, was arrested and allegedy tested positive for Methamphetamines. She was charged with Police Pursuit and other offences and will appear in Parramatta Local Court on 8th May.

JUICE WITH YOUTH

The Hawkesbury Police Area Command is inviting residents for the upcoming Youth Week to two events.

The first is a free juice and a chat from 3:30pm to 4:30pm on Thursday 10th April at Boost Juice, Richmond Marketplace.

The second event is a free ice-block and a morning of activities at Peel Park Richmond. Attendees should bring their skateboards, bikes, and helmets to Peel Park, North Richmond to test their slow speed bike skills in an obstacle course set up by the NSW Police Force Bike Unit. Everyone is welcome from 10am to 12pm on Tuesday 15th April.

CHARGED FOR MURDER

A 24-year-old Glenorie man has been charged with the murder of Johnny Birch whose body was discovered on a property at Glenorie.

Strike Force Halderen was established by The Hills Police Area Command and the State Crime Command's Homicide Squad, to investigate the circumstances surrounding the death of the 39-year-old whose body was found on a property on Gleness Place on Friday, 14th March.

Following inquiries, two men, aged 24 and 34, and a 35-year-old woman, were arrested at the scene and were taken to Castle Hill Police Station. Police say they were released pending further investigation.

At around 2.15pm on Sunday, 23rd March police arrested a 24-year-old man at a home on Meridan Avenue, Glenorie.

He was taken to Castle Hill Police Station where he was charged with murder. He was refused bail and appeared before Parramatta Local Court on 24th March. Inquiries under Strike Force Halderen continue.

VEHICLE CRASH

A P-Plate driver has been fined more than \$500 following a crash in North Kellyville. At approximately 9:30am on Wednesday, 2 April 2025, a white Toyota RAV4 travelling westbound along Wakefield Avenue in North Kellyville was involved in a crash, causing the vehicle to roll onto its side.

The P2 driver, and sole occupant of the vehicle was allegedly distracted, leading to a collision with a stationary parked vehicle resulting in minor superficial injuries.

Police issued a penalty notice to the driver for negligent driving, with a fine totalling \$544 and 3 demerit points.

TODDLER RECOVERING

The Mounties Care CareFlight Helicopter was tasked by NSW Ambulance after a piece of furniture fell on a toddler in Schofields at around 12pm on Wednesday, 19th March.

CareFlight's specialist doctor and NSW Ambulance paramedics treated the toddler for contusions following the incident before she was transported by road escorted by CareFlight's doctor to The Children's Hospital at Westmead in a stable condition

UNREGISTERED DIRT BIKE

On Monday, 17th March 2025, General Duties police attached to Hawkesbury Police Area Command stopped an unregistered dirt bike on March Street, Richmond. Checks revealed the dirt bike to be stolen from out of the area.

The 29-year-old male rider was disqualified from holding a licence and charged with a number of offences. The male was refused bail and will appear before Penrith Local Court.

VOLLIES HONOURED

The dedication and commitment of more than 30 NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) volunteers were recognised on 2 April 2025 at a celebration to honour their long service and efforts battling fires both locally and interstate.

Commissioner of the RFS joined the special guests and members for the presentation of 18 Long Service Medals, 11 National Medals and 5 Citations for Service.

Among those being honoured is David Stockman, of Galston Brigade and the Support Brigade, who is receiving the National Medal 3rd Clasp for 45 years' service.

"Joining the Galston Brigade in 1978, David is the perfect example of committed service to both the RFS and his local community, actively attending incidents over the decades and still, 28 years since commencing the role, tending to the upkeep of the brigade as Station Officer."

STRUCTURE FIRE

On Tuesday, 18 March, Fire & Rescue NSW and NSW RFS crews responded to reports of a Building Fire on Elara Boulevard at Melonba, near Marsden Park. Crews arrived to find the Newpark Sales Centre well alight, with fire burning through the roof of the building.

Firefighters in breathing apparatus initially entered the building and attempted to control the fire, before being forced out due to the roof becoming unstable and beginning to collapse.

Crews used Aerial Pumper 97 as well as ground monitors and hose streams to control the fire from outside the building, before committing breathing apparatus crews back inside to stop the fire spreading into the top floor.

Firefighters worked for over two hours to eventually bring the fire under control.

STOLEN TRAILBIKES

Trailbikes stolen from the Hawkesbury area have been recovered.

On Wednesday, 19 March 2025, Police from Mount Druitt Police Area Command and Operation Kella responded to reports that stolen trailbikes from the Hawkesbury were being ridden in Mount Druitt.

One male was arrested nearby at a service station whilst refueling a trail bike. The bike he was refueling was stolen the night prior from East Kurrajong. He was promptly charged. A second trailbike stolen during the same offence was located and seized from a nearby address.

The next day, with the assistance of Police from the Operational Support Group, Hawkesbury Proactive Crime Team and Mount Druitt PCT conducted a search of a residential property in Bidwell where three trailbikes were seized.

Two of these bikes have been linked to thefts from East Kurrajong and North Richmond in early March.

Kids With Cancer Foundation

The Kids with Cancer Foundation located in Castle Hill is a national charity that supports children with cancer and their families right across the country.

The aim of the foundation is to create a world where a child's cancer diagnosis is no longer a traumatic upheaval of their young lives and that of their family's but simply an unremarkable event in their life journey.

In 2024, the Kids with Cancer Foundation assisted 274 families and provided 955 financial assistance grants to families to assist with household bills and expenses such as utility bills, mortgage and rent payments, food and petrol vouchers, car expenses etc. These financial assistance grants ease the financial strain placed on families with a child who has been diagnosed with cancer and allows families to focus on their sick child rather than on household bills.

Beyond the financial assistance program, the Kids with Cancer Foundation funds 20 clinical positions and 4 support positions across 8 children's hospitals. To date Kids with Cancer has provided \$24 million for these positions providing children with cancer with the best facilities and staff to make things a little easier. On top of this tip 2024 the Kide wit

tin 2024, the Kids with Cancer Foundation committed almost \$1.5M for children's cancer research across 4 children's hospitals including researching genetic risk and brain cancer in children which is often lethal. These projects are potential game changers in the diagnosis and treatment of childhood cancers.

Recently I had the opportunity to visit the Kids With Cancer Foundation, to learn more about their programs as well as to assist packing Care Packs for children undergoing cancer treatment in hospital. These packs contain plenty of nutritious snacks as well as some fun activities to reduce the stress and beat the boredom of a hospital visit. Folding the boxes is a bit of a skill and ensuring the snacks and activities all fit is a challenge however, the most important part of the Care Pack is the handwritten encouraging message for the child receiving the Care Pack. It is incredible how powerful a few words written on the card can have on the child receiving the Care Pack and their family, knowing that someone is

thinking of them and cheering for them. These Care Packs truly do bring joy and moments of happiness in a difficult environment!

Last year, over 165 volunteers spent more than 60 hours packing close to 6000 Care Packs that were distributed to 7 hospitals across Australia. Volunteering to assist with assembly Care Parks is very rewarding and a lot of fun. It makes for a fantastic team building activity whether it be with a social group or work group whilst providing an opportunity to help some of our sickest kids in the country and to bring joy to them and their families. I look forward to assisting again with assembling Care Packs soon!

The Hills Shire Unites in Bold Push to End Domestic and Family Violence

Awareness of domestic and family violence (DFV) has grown significantly across Australian communities over the past decade.

From education campaigns to frontline support services, positive strides have been made - but true change requires more than awareness. It requires collective, community-driven action.

That belief is at the heart of a new initiative launched in The Hills Shire: the ZERO DFV pilot, developed in partnership with the social impact organisation Click Collab. This grassroots initiative aims to build a safer future by empowering local voices, setting shared goals, and taking coordinated steps toward eliminating DFV.

A key milestone in the project took place last week where community members, service providers, and local leaders came together to shape a bold vision for a DFV-free future. The session focused on reviewing insights from the community's earlier 'Click In' phase and identifying strategic priorities to guide action over the next 12 months. Importantly, the group also began laying the groundwork for a five-year vision rooted in longterm, measurable impact.

"These sessions are an amazing start to something that is quite extraordinary," said Group Chief Operating Officer CHRG, Andy Abey. "There was an incredible energy from those in attendance, who desperately want to see change in their community."

The power of these early sessions lies in both their ambition and their simplicity. As Click Collab Co-Founder Kirrily Dear explained, "Through these sessions we have been able to recognise the enormous amount of opportunity. The challenge now is to distil this into very simple actions that the community can move forward with."

The next phase of the project invites registered participants - either in person or online - to work collaboratively over a structured four-hour session.



Led by a Click Collab facilitator, this workshop will:

- Define a five-year vision for achieving Zero DFV in The Hills Shire
- Establish 12-month goals to guide prevention efforts
- Review community insights
- Identify key priorities and methods for tracking progress

By uniting individuals, community groups, and local leaders, the Strategy Huddle ensures the region is working together toward a common purpose. And whilst this is just the beginning, the passion and momentum from the community is clear.



Gifts in Wills help kids in the fight to beat cancer

When 12-year-old Cailey was diagnosed with a rare bone cancer, she was deep in the fight for her life.

In the space of just a few days, Cailey's cancer diagnosis turned life upside down, not just for her, but for her whole family.

"It was such a shock," her mum Gemma remembers. *"She went from being a perfectly healthy child one day, to being in hospital fighting for her life a few days later."*

The first sign that Cailey was sick came when she woke one morning in November 2021 feeling dizzy and unable to walk properly.

Her father Daniel took her to the GP, who recommended an MRI. They went to hospital the next day when there was no change in Cailey's condition, where a brain MRI was conducted with no issues found. Two days later she woke up completely paralysed from the waist down.

Cailey was taken by ambulance to Sydney Children's Hospital, Randwick (SCH), where further tests discovered a tumour on her spine. She was then rushed in for emergency surgery to remove the tumour, after surgeons were concerned it looked malignant.

Cailey was diagnosed with Ewings sarcoma, a rare bone cancer that impacts around 75 Australian children under the age of 15 each year. She soon began eight long months of treatment, which involved fortnightly rounds of chemotherapy and around 30 rounds of radiation.

"It was really intense for her," Gemma says. *"She spent about two solid months in hospital initially, then had to go back for three to six days each fortnight."*

Cailey's tumour had supressed her spinal cord and left her with an injury so serious that her doctors were unsure whether she would walk again.

In July 2022, Cailey and her family received the wonderful news that her treatment had been successful. Her cancer was in remission, and it was time for her to go home. It wasn't, however, the end of her journey with SCH.

Cailey returned in October for an intensive, four-week rehab program to help build her strength, get her walking again and get her ready to go back to school. Gemma says she could not be more thankful to the team who helped Cailey win her fight with cancer and get back on her feet.

"They were amazing. I was so impressed with everyone from her oncologist to all the



nurses who cared for Cailey and of course Sky, her physiotherapist. She ended up becoming very close to all of them."

Federal Budget – Delivering for the Hawkesbury

Funding for a new Hawkesbury Medicare Urgent Care Clinic and extra cost of living relief for every household was confirmed in the latest federal budget.

This continues our efforts to tackle cost of living pressures while at the same time investing in vital health services and ensuring that your Medicare card is the key to getting healthcare.

As well as the funding for our own Medicare Urgent Care Clinic – open extended hours, every day, for urgent but not lifethreatening things – we're funding more bulk billing to help you see a GP for free, and even cheaper medicines. Under Labor, the maximum co-payment for PBS scripts will be lowered from \$31.60 to \$25 – that's back to 2004 prices. It will save my communities \$1.2 million a year.

The Budget also tops up the tax cuts that began last July, reaching a combined average benefit of \$2589 per taxpayer in 2027-28. This is a permanent change to the tax system, not a one off.

And we extend energy bill relief with an additional \$150 for every household and small business, adding to the \$300 energy rebate that households, and \$325 energy rebate that small businesses received over the past year. We're making it easier for Australians to buy a home with foreign buyers banned from this month from purchasing existing homes, for two years, plus an expansion of our Help to Buy scheme, while also training more construction workers.

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There will be 100,000 free TAFE places each year and a 20 percent cut to student debt.

We know Australians have worked hard and made sacrifices, and my government is focused on delivering for households.

We're building on the strong foundations we have laid with lower inflation, rising wages and low unemployment helping to secure our nation's future at a time of global uncertainty. Now is the time to keep building.

SEALER AND SHIPBUILDER By W. J. GOOLD

Captain Grono, in the "Governor Bligh," picked up a gang of sealers off Secretary Island, a little rocky island on the far south west coast of New Zealand. These men had been left there by the "Active," three years previously, and had existed upon seal meat and the roots of ferns. Many of these little islands off the coast of New Zealand had been known and worked by the sealers long before they were "officially" discovered. Grono himself is credited with having named the Foveaux Straits during his voyages in the "Governor Bligh," and many of the islands bear names bestowed on them by the sealers. On March 11th, 1809, Captain Grono brought the "Governor Bligh" into Port Jackson with 10,000 seal skins aboard, he was followed three days later by Captain Ebor Bunker, in the "Pegasus," with 12,600 skins. Prices were then at their peak, and skins were fetching 30/each in London, so it can readily be understood what fortunes were being made in the sealing industry. In three voyages between 1813 and 1819, the "Governor Bligh" brought in over 34,000 skinsand as the skipper and crew received a percentage of the catch, Captain Grono soon had sufficient capital to launch out on his own account. In April, 1821, he received a grant of land on the banks of the Hawkesbury River, near Windsor, and here he commenced shipbuilding in partnership with

Barnett Levey (of the old Royal Hotel, George St Sydney) and James Cooper-the firm being known as Cooper, Levey & Grono. On 21 December 1821, the brig, "Elizabeth" (130 tons), was launched at Windsor with great ceremony, most of the elite of Sydney and Parramatta being present. Captain Grono took command of his new ship and left upon a sealing voyage which occupied nearly two years, returning on October 23rd, 1823. On her next voyage the "Elizabeth" was placed in the command of Captain Books (who had married one of Grono's daughters); John Grono remaining ashore to supervise the shipbuilding. The "Industry" was the next vessel built by Grono, and she was also placed in charge of a son-in-law of Captain Grono - William Wiseman, son of Solomon Wiseman, of "Wiseman's Ferry." He had married Miss Matilda Grono on June 22nd, 1827, and it was the first wedding at the old Ebenezer Church, at Portland Head. The "Industry" was wrecked off Stewart Island on February 28th, 1831, Captain Wiseman and ten seamen being lost. The next vessel turned out from Grono's shipbuilding yards was the "Australian," launched on March 21st, 1829. She was 270 tons register, being 100 tons larger than any other vessel built in the Colony up to that date. It is interesting to note that the whole of the timber used in her construction was grown

JOHN GRONO OF <u>THE HAWKESBURY</u> (Part 2)

Goold that appeared in the March 10 1932 issue of "The Voice of the North" newspaper. Due to the length of the article I have decided to print over two issues This is part two.

in the Hawkesbury River district, blue gum, black butted gum, iron bark, and appletree. Her planks were secured from what is now the McDonald River; they were cut and carved on the spot, and as they could not be hauled by land, they were dragged by manual labour down the creek to the Hawkesbury River. The iron work on the ship was made in Windsor, and the whole of her ropes and cordage were made from New Zealand flax. It took two years to complete the construction of this vessel, mainly owing to difficulty in securing good carpenters. The launching of the largest vessel in the Colony was a great event, and the old "Sydney Gazette" records that an immense concourse gathered at the stocks to see her take the water. "The Governor Bourke," launched in 1833, was the seventh large ship built by John Grono at the Hawkesbury River, but he turned out a large number of smaller craft for the river trade.

The old Captain died on May 4th, 1847, and is buried in the little cemetery at Portland Head, in company with many other old pioneers of the Hawkesbury. In his long span of 84 years he saw many changes take place in the Colony, particularly in the shipping trade. And what wonderful tales of adventure on the sea could the old Captain tell.

ALIVE WITH ROCK'N'ROLL

With the host suddenly leaving I decided to continue on even though I only had about 10 CDs at that time to play. Over 30 years later, now with over 25,000 Rock 'n' Roll songs from the 50s, 60s & 70s in my library, I am still excited about going to air every Friday night from 9am till midnight, as my show is a request show

where listeners can phone in, send an SMS, etc to request a song. For many years my late Mum helped answer request calls, now my partner John Brock fulfils that role. With more modern technology these days I have a number of listeners from overseas, who with podcasting, can listen when it suits them rather than having to get up at 5am etc for a direct broadcast. I certainly have some dedicated listeners as many of my current listeners have been with me since Day 1 as they enjoy the rock 'n' roll nostalgia.



Local trio chase Asian Cup glory with the Joeys

Australia has been drawn into Group B and will face Vietnam (April 4), United Arab Emirates (April 7) and Japan (April 10), with the top eight teams in the competition qualifying for the FIFA U-17 World Cup being hosted by Qatar in November 2025.

Defender Thomas Cutuk, is a Year 11 student at Marian Catholic College, Kenthurst. He started his career with Hills Spirit FC before being signed up by premier A-League side Sydney Wanderers.

Midfielder Kade Baccus, who spent his early days at Parklea FC, is now a teammate of Cutuk at the Wanderers. In the

2019 Under-12 grand final, Kade won the Man of the Match Award and has continued to excel at higher levels.

Kade's South African-born brothers, Kearyn and Keanu, are also professional footballers, with the latter a regular with the Socceroos.

Originally from Schofields, Alfaro was recruited from Football Tech Academy in Blackett after showing early promise as a talented midfielder.

Alfaro played for Nepean FC before being signed up by A-League powerhouse Sydney FC in January. He signed his first professional contact with multiple A-League champions Sydney FC early this year,

"Being selected to represent Australia at a major tournament is something that I am very grateful for and looking forward to as we've been working for this tournament for the last 12 months" Alfaro said.

"Being able to contribute to the team to get to this stage is something me and my family are proud of and can't wait to showcase what myself and my teammates can do."

The three-year deal with Sydney FC marks a significant milestone for Alfaro, who joined Sydney FC's Academy, aged 11, under the guidance of technical director Kelly Cross.

"Nico has always possessed a special quality on the pitch," says Cross. "With a Peruvian family background, he carries a touch of South American football in his game — something that stands out the moment you watch him play. He is incredibly comfortable on the ball and prefers to take risks and create opportunities rather than simply making a safe pass."

"Nico is a player who makes things happen. One of his standout attributes is his ability to draw opponents in, allowing them to think they can win the ball, only to glide past them effortlessly. This skill is what sets special players apart.

The Joeys recently won the recent Hattrick U17 International Tournament and the ASEAN U16 Boys Championship in addition to impressive tours of Europe and the Pacific.

Subway Joeys' coach Brad Maloney said he is pleased with his team's application and effort in implementing their playing style and off-field standards.

The official launch is on Sunday, April 13, at their Crestwood Oval headquarters, at 2pm.

The club expansion includes a level 1 clubhouse and a multi-purpose function room which will be a valued asset for the Bulls for many years to come. The Bulls have already completed Stage 1, incorporating a new canteen and suspended slab over the existing facilities in preparation for the new clubhouse. The completed gym has been named in honour of club stalwart and sponsor, Paul 'Griffo' Griffin, who died tragically last November.

Club president Michael Gremmo said they are reaching out to current and past members to make this a very successful campaign.
