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Kellyville Home to the World's Biggest RL Training Precinct

Kellyville is officially home to the largest rugby league training facility in the world, making The Hills District a magnet for emerging talent across the NRL. And if the Eastwood Rugby planned move to Castle Hill's Fred Caterson Reserve takes off soon, it will mean massive growth potential for both rugby union and rugby league in The Hills and Hawkesbury regions.

Parramatta Eels unveiled its futuristic \$70 million Centre of Excellence and Kellyville Memorial Park Community Centre on May 22.

The COE houses a 1,500-seat grandstand at the international-standard venue. It has five full-sized rugby league fields and is the first gender-equal elite facility in Australia with training facilities replicated for men and women across NRL, NRLW and Elite Pathways programs.

Sports Minister Steve Kamper said the precinct will fire the dreams of boys and girls at the Wentworthville Magpies or Rouse Hill Rhinos of one day wearing the famous Eels iersey.

The Hills is home to some of the most inclusive and sporting popular clubs in Sydney, and constantly expanding facilities to cope with the increasing numbers. The Hills Shire Mayor Dr Michelle Byrne said it is a world class facility allowing young footballers to chase their dreams.

"The next (Eels star) Mitchell Moses could very well begin their journey right here," she said. "This project is a great example of all three levels of government working together with a leading sporting organisation to deliver outstanding outcomes for our growing community and the ever-popular and rapidly growing rugby league."

Federal Member for Parramatta Andrew Charlton said nothing brings people together like sport. "It's inclusive, it's local, it's Eels, and it's everything we're proud of in Parramatta," he said The COE is funded by the Australian and NSW Governments, The Hills Shire Council, and Parramatta Leagues Club.

According to Parramatta Eels CEO Jim Sarantinos, the venue provides a thriving environment for the Eels players. He said it will "increase participation across all forms of rugby league in one of the fastest-growing regions in Australia."

"Most importantly, it will be a home for the entire Parramatta Eels family, including past players, members, fans, partners and the wider Eels and Western Sydney community."

Parramatta Leagues Club chairman Greg Monaghan said: "Congratulations to the Eels on the incredible achievement of launching this world-class Centre of Excellence. As the cornerstone of our Parra Group, now proudly representing 100,000 members, our shared commitment to rugby league, sport, and community has never been stronger."







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OOO SERVICES

DRUNK RAMPAGE

Hills Police arrested a 58-year-old male after a serious incident at a residence in Crane Road, Castle Hill.

At around 4:25 am, officers responded to reports of a drunk man who was reportedly driving erratically in a vehicle in someone's backyard. The vehicle caused considerable damage to the turf, retaining walls, and fencing.

When the police arrived, they saw the man behind the wheel. He was asked to stop and exit the car, but reportedly refused and became aggressive.

As a Chief Inspector tried to arrest him, the man allegedly punched the officer in the chin and put him in a chokehold.

More officers arrived, and after a physical struggle, they were able to subdue the man and arrest him. He was then transported to Castle Hill Station.

While in police custody, the man appeared to lose consciousness and was taken to hospital. After regaining consciousness, he allegedly attempted to flee but was quickly reapprehended by officers.

The man was charged with Assault Police, Resist Arrest, and Malicious Damage.

He was refused bail and scheduled to appear at Parramatta Local Court on 24 May.

DRINK DRIVING

On 18 May, Hills Highway Patrol officers attended to multiple reports of a vehicle being driven dangerously along Old Northern Road, Maroota. The officers conducted checks and soon found the 38-year-old woman who refused a roadside breath test.

The woman was arrested and taken to Windsor Police Station. A breath analysis returned a 0.258 reading, more than five times the legal limit. Her licence was then immediately suspended. She will appear at the Windsor Local Court in June.

Police remind drivers that intoxicated driving endangers lives and urge the community to report similar incidents.

MULCH FIRE

On 21 May, multiple Hawkesbury Rural Fire Service brigades responded to calls of a 40m x 40m mulch fire at Ebenezer.

The Hawkesbury Headquarters RFB was activated due to the size and intensity of the fire, which brought a bulk water carrier and additional equipment from Oakville RFB.

Crews from Freemans Reach, Ebenezer, and Wilberforce attempted to extinguish the fire, which lasted for 6 hours.

ROBBERY ARREST

Hills Police arrested a teenage male after a robbery incident at Rouse Hill Town Centre on 23 May.

At around 9:30 pm, two teenage boys entered the shopping centre and were followed by a group of seven people. One victim was approached and assaulted by a male who punched and kicked him in the head. A second male allegedly showed a knife from his waistband, which led the victim to give up his jumper.

The group escaped with the stolen item. Police responded quickly and collaborated with local security and transport network operators.

According to the police, they arrested five individuals in the area. One of the arrested teens was reportedly found in possession of the stolen property and has been charged with robbery in company.

Three more individuals were released, while the two others remain at large and unidentified.

NSW Police continue investigating and are working to identify the remaining persons involved.

REPLICA FIREARM

On 17 May, Officers from Riverstone Police Area Command attended an address in Riverstone to speak with a male about a stealing offence. During a search of the man's vehicle, Police located 6 grams of the drug ice and two replica firearms. The man was arrested.

Riverstone Police Area Command officers attended an address on 17 May to speak with a male regarding a stealing offence. Police discovered six grams of drug ice and two replica firearms during a search of his vehicle.

Police arrested the man and was taken to Riverstone Police Station, where he was charged with:

- Two counts of possessing an unauthorised pictol
- One count of possessing a prohibited drug

He has been granted strict conditional bail and is scheduled to appear before Blacktown Local Court.

VEHICLE COLLISION

On 24 May, Oakville Rural Fire Brigade attended a motor vehicle accident in Pitt Town.

When the crews arrived, they found a two-vehicle collision. One vehicle was on the drainage ditch on the side of the road.

All occupants were able to exit their vehicles and only sustained minor injuries. The crews, along with police, controlled the flow of traffic and the clearing of debris.

BREAK & ENTER

Police charged two men after an aggravated break-and-enter at a self-storage facility at Carrington Road, Castle Hill, on 16 May.

At around 2:24 am, the two men allegedly gained unauthorised access to the facility. They entered the area through a fire door and forced entry into a storage unit.

The site manager saw suspicious activity on the CCTV and alerted the police, who then found and arrested the men nearby after several boxes were taken away.

Two men, aged 24 and 26, were caught with a broken padlock and face masks that matched the CCTV images. One was released under strict bail conditions, while the other is still in custody after being denied bail.

Police are still looking into the seized items, which include a significant number of vapes and tobacco products.

ELECTRICAL SPARKS

On 26 May, crews from the Glossodia Rural Fire Brigade responded to a structure/electrical fire on Spinks Drive, near Golden Valley Drive, in Glossodia.

On arrival, the firefighters found sparks and smoke from the electrical Point of Attachment on the fascia bracket. According to the Glossodia RFS, nearby trees had damaged the cabling.

Crews remained on the scene to keep the area safe and trimmed the trees to make way for the energy company to make repairs.

HIGH-SPEED PURSUIT

Police charged a 22-year-old male after a dangerous vehicle pursuit through North Kellyville, Rouse Hill, and Kellyville on 15 May.

According to police, the man performed predatory driving, chasing another vehicle from residential streets to major intersections at high speed. He also ignored traffic signals and crossed onto the wrong side of the road.

The pursuit concluded in a severe collision at the Memorial Avenue and Windsor Road intersection, where he struck a Mazda.

A 30-year-old woman rideshare Mazda driver and a male passenger both sustained injuries, with the driver requiring immediate hospitalisation.

Police arrested the man the next day and charged him with multiple offences, including Predatory Driving and injuries by Furious Driving.

ZERO DFV NAVBOOK Launched in The Hills

Minister for Prevention of Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Jodie Harrison was at Castle Hill RSL last week to launch The Hills Zero DFV Navbook. a new tool to coordinate and accelerate community efforts to eliminate Domestic and Family Violence.

She told the audience: "What you are launching is a message of hope."

The Hills Zero DFV Navbook – developed by Click Collab - provides a framework for the next five years to achieve ZERO DVF.

Kirrily Dear and Kerrie Edwards, co-founders of Click Collab, spent six months on the wholeof-community initiative, bringing together local organisations, advocates, and frontline workers across the Hills along with survivors to piece the Navbook together.

Kirrily Dear said: "The key insight we uncovered during our early discovery phase, is that so much great prevention was already happening - but much of it is invisible or disconnected.

"The Navbook makes this work visible, measurable, and scalable. It's a rallying point for anyone who wants to contribute to real change in their community."

Kerrie Edwards Co-founder, Click Collab, Andy Abey Group Chief Operating Officer, CHRG, Kirrily Dear Co-founder, Click Collab, Minister Jodie Harrison, MP and Supt Naomi Moore. The Navbook contains local facts and stats, a shared vision, three priority goals, and a unified action framework to address the lack of coordination and facilitation that leads to fragmentation and demobilisation.

It aligns with the NSW Government's Pathways to Prevention strategy.

The Navbook looked at the extent of DVF in the community saying more than 23,000 children in the Hills are at risk of exposure to DFV, over 27,000 adults have suffered intimate partner abuse and more than 4,700 people over the age of 65 have experienced elder abuse in the past 12 months.

Kerrie Edwards said: "We all know that if we want a different outcome, we need to do things differently. This solution draws on decades of cross-sector knowledge. It's a pivot point for the prevention sector, and we believe it will significantly accelerate our path to Zero DFV."

CHRG has not only funded the development of Click Collab and the Navbook but is now embedding the strategy into its operations, partnerships, and future investments.

Andy Abey, CHRG's Group Chief Operating Officer said: "This is not a campaign. This is a commitment to community. We saw a problem with fragmentation and a lack of clarity around where best to invest resources. Now, with the Navbook in hand, we have a roadmap to help steer our support toward maximum impact."

"I grew up in a home shaped by fear, violence and control. The scars of that time still sit with me – as a partner, as a mother, as a person. That's why this work means so much.

"At CHRG, I've seen inspiring programs and people doing incredible things. But I could also see how fragmentation was holding us back.

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
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






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Cultures of The Hills

So, I took the idea to our Board – and I'm grateful they backed it with the largest single grant in our history. The launch of the Navbook is more than just a milestone. It's a turning point. A chance to do better for the next generation, and to help break the cycle, for good."

CHRG's contributions and commitments include funding Click Collab and development of the Navbook, along with future support for a community facilitator; ClubGRANTS investment in respectful relationships education and counselling/support services, in line with identified priority goals; implementation of the "Recognise.Respond. Refer." initiative, training all CHRG staff as first responders and expanding safe room access across venues; leading the way with strategic partnerships with police, councils, sporting clubs, business chambers and schools; and ongoing awareness and activation campaigns across CHRG venues and networks.

Superintendent Naomi Moore, The Hills PAC, said: "DFV is not only a crime but also a serious community issue that demands a collaborative and coordinated response, leveraging expertise and resources to foster positive change for individuals and the broader community.

"As the Commander, I am constantly seeking opportunities to harness our strong

community relationships to create a safer Hills district. I wholeheartedly support the Click Collab pilot as a valuable opportunity to collaborate with other passionate stakeholders, achieving tangible outcomes and significant improvements in addressing DFV within The Hills."

In the 12 months to March 2025 there were more than 2,140 DFV incidents reported to Hills police.

Anita Fisher, Convenor of the Hills Domestic Violence Prevention Network said:

"The Hills Domestic Violence
Prevention Network represents a
large network of local community
organisations, service providers,
institutions, the police and individuals to create

a united front to address domestic violence in all its forms.

"For over 30 years, the Network has worked to raise awareness on domestic violence, abuse and coercive control through educational forums and community outreach campaigns across The Hills Shire.

"While our Network does some great work, it is still not able to achieve all that is required to bring about zero Domestic Family Violence so the HDVPN leadership team is very supportive



"It will reduce duplication of efforts and offer avenues for greater collaboration which is driven by evidence-based practice. We look forward to seeing what can be achieved together."



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Rotary In Action

There's a busy but quiet warehouse in the Hills that's changing lives and outcomes around the world while saving valuable resources from becoming landfill here.

MediShare is a Rotary International initiative supported by volunteers from all over Sydney who come to the Hills facility to repurpose medical equipment to where it is needed.

While Rotary has been shipping donated items to countries in need for 50 years it became apparent that a need for a service totally focussed on medical equipment was also needed.

Rotarian Keith Roffey has run MediShare since it was founded in 2020 with Janis Harvey.

The medical surplus recovery service works with Government and Non Government Organisations to redirect in-date and useful items.

Since 2020 it has sent containers filled with equipment (including thousands of Covid testing kits) to: Sri Lanka, Sudan, South Sudan, Nepal, Vietnam, Cambodia, PNG and Ukraine

The organisation is also the only group outside America to be accredited by MedSurplus Alliance to assemble Kits4Life to be sent where needed. It enables clinical trial sites to donate surplus lab kits and supplies (including unused syringes and collection tubes). Keith says MediShare is working with 14 international pharmaceutical company. "They send us unused kits to us, Volunteers de-link the product (removing all the bar codes) and

sort them out into bulk packs and ship them overseas. "

MediShare has also shipped 115,000 blankets to Jordan for Gaza refugees, Philippines, Zimbabwe, Ethiopia, Somalia, Tanzania, Fiji and Bangladesh. The containers have also included humidity cribs, crutches, walkers and wheelchairs. "We strengthen the health system for these countries but also save a lot of good equipment from landfill. Whatever we do has to be sustainable and what we do send over is useable. It has to be managed properly. It has to be achieving something," says Keith.

It costs \$12,000 for each container and shipping costs are covered by Rotary clubs and charities for projects and partnerships they are involved in. But some communities need support. "If we had some regular (financial) donations we could help," said Keith. He says smaller Pacific Islands such as Kiribati would definitely benefit from help with shipping costs.

"TB in Kiribati and Leprosy is rife. They could use these products."

Medishare works with big organisations and pharmaceutical companies on corporate volunteer days and the day I visited Bayer staff were repacking Kits4Life. Tonnes have

been saved from landfill. MediShare also works with Rotary Club volunteers and community volunteers. Schools can also organise packing days and Rotarians from clubs across Sydney volunteer. Alan Grady from Norwest Rotary, Chris Johnson from Carlingford Rotary Club and Richard Bell are regular volunteers who I met on the day of my visit along with Rae-anne Medforth from the Rotary Club Sydney Darling Harbour.


Members are appointed by the NSW Minister for the Environment, with the Chair jointly appointed by both NSW and Australian government ministers.

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Connie's Garden Blossoms

A dream to turn a barely used grassed area into a beautiful garden for the community has taken five years to blossom and now the vision and passion of volunteer Connie Keith who drove the program has been recognised.

The sensory garden at Balcombe Heights Estate in Baulkham Hills was officially renamed The Connie Anne Keith Sensory Garden at a special ceremony by Hills Shire Mayor Dr Michelle Byrne this month.

"The renaming of the garden after Connie is a small way our community can recognise her incredible efforts over the past 19 years, which have included promoting the history of Balcombe Heights Estate, organising annual Remembrance Day ceremonies, opening the war memorial, planting trees as part of the Queen's Jubilee celebrations, and much more," she said.

"Connie has a long history of volunteering at Balcombe Heights Estate, stretching back to 2006 when she was part of a pottery group onsite and put her hand up to become Chair of the Balcombe Heights Estate Committee. She has held that position ever since.

"From coming up with the initial idea for the garden, to applying for the Western Sydney Infrastructure Grants Program and working alongside Council and the garden's designer, Connie cultivated the sensory garden and brought it to life.

"Sensory gardens stimulate the four senses of sight, touch, hearing and smell, and have been shown to improve mental and physical wellbeing, especially for people with dementia or neurodivergent needs," she said.

Connie said she was thinking of ways to mark the 100th anniversary of the old Masonic School site (now the Balcombe Heights Estate) during the COVID lockdown when she thought about a community garden.

"When I was with the Macquarie Hills Potters we would sit on the verandah for lunch and I would look at this grassy field that no one seemed to use."

After approaching the Hills Shire council's general manager who supported the idea she started to look for funding for the project.

"Because of the organisations on the Estate I saw that having a sensory garden would be really good and also good for the community's mental health."

It took two years for the grant application to be approved but working with landscape designer Tig Crowley and Hills Community Aid the plans were well in place by the time the funding did come through. The garden was opened in November 2024 and renamed following community consultation.

Connie said she always felt a connection to the site as she used to go to Northead High School with boys who lived at the Masonic Schools at Balcombe Heights.

"It started as a place that was caring for people and I still see it as a place that's caring for people. I wanted to have something that's going to be useful for the community and Mayor of The



Supporting Veterans and their Families

The historic Richmond Courthouse and Police Station is about to have a new phase of life as the permanent home for the new Hawkesbury Veterans' and Families' Hub.

The Hub will support the more than 20,000 veterans living in and around the Hawkesbury district, their families, and the families of serving personnel whose loved ones work at Richmond RAAF Base, which was my 2022 election commitment.

It's been great to work with RSL Lifecare who have been selected to operate the Hub,

It will start at a temporary site at Windsor RSL, with a separate entrance to the Club, where veterans and their families can access things like health and wellbeing services, Department

of Veteran Affairs claims help and housing and employment support and will operate until work on the permanent site is completed.

The repurposing of the Court House, a joint project with the NSW Government, will create a warm and welcoming environment for veterans of all ages and their families, while still respecting the important heritage of the building. It is very conveniently located, in the heart of the town, and will have dedicated parking.

Labor's commitment to improving the support for veterans and their families is multifaceted.

Along with the Veteran's Hub, we have also funded Taskforce Veteran, who received \$5 million towards their restoration of the historic Scheyville Officer Training Unit at Scheyville National Park.



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

Alex Hully, Australia's outstanding hammer thrower for more than 14 years, has retired due to spinal injuries. giving up her dream of competing in the 2028 LA Games.

The powerful Rouse Hill athlete dominated junior, state and Australian hammer throwing with stunning performances in Australia, Commonwealth, Youth Olympics, Pacific Games, and other international events. Her greatest achievement was winning silver at the 2018 Gold Coast Commonwealth Games.

For many years, I have followed Alex's astounding career, which included 11 consecutive NSW state crowns, three All Australia All School championships and the U16, U18 and U20 national records.

"At first, and still, it (retirement) is a very emotional and hard decision to make because of all the success I have had and hammer is a massive part of my life, and always will be," said Alex, fourth on the all-time Australian hammer throwing list.

"I have had time to reflect on my amazing achievements throughout my career and the decision is sitting a little easier with me, however, still difficult.

"I am looking forward to some new challenges and experiences that come my way in the next few years.

"I made the decision as I had been struggling to get my body right after injuring my back in 2022. Since then, I have had three spinal surgeries. (It was) after the 3rd surgery, (that) I decided to retire to look after my physical health.

"It was not an easy decision and took about a year for me to properly decide I was not going to continue throwing. I had not been able to train for one year due to my back injury.

"I think winning the silver medal at the 2018 Commonwealth Games in the Gold Coast was my best achievement.

"It was my highest placing at an open international event and my first senior championships! It was also made even more special by having my family and friends there with me."

Alex praised her close-knit family and coaches Bre Clement and Karyne 'Kaz' Di Marco for their support. Team Hulley organised regular fundraisers to pay for her training and overseas competitions in addition to following her around the world.

"My Mum Louise, Dad Matt, sister Georgia and extended family backed me since day one and provided emotional, physical and financial support," Alex said.

"My coaches, Bre and Kaz, have been my rocks for the last 14-15 years of my life. They have supported me each day through good times and bad times," she said.

Alex, a qualified occupational therapist, wants to focus on her career while spending more time with friends and family. "I may plan to take up some coaching in the future but for now I am enjoying a nice break from athletics," she said,

She is an Australian representative on the Oceania Athletes Commission and will help develop athletics in Australia and other Oceania countries.

Young Gun TOMMY RIZK on Track for F4 debut

Even as a child, Tommy Rizk loved to speed. The son of Egyptian master coach and former sprinter, Emil Rizk, Tommy loved bikes, cars and karts from a very early age.

When he was just 14 months, he rode a cycle; at two years, he drove an electric car; at six years, Emil bought him a second hand kart for \$200, which sparked his love for motor sports.

At 10 years, the Rouse Hill Anglican College student trialled at the Indy 800 kart track in Wilberforce. Tommy set the track alight with skilful driving, finishing third in his first competitive race, just three months after his start. He was later undefeated at the Indy facility for two years, with track records under his belt.

"I love go karting because I really like the speed and adrenaline and how all the competitors are really close with each other," the Pitt Town teenager said. "It gets me away from school and calms me down and I can really live life the way I like it.

Emil said go karting came naturally to him, because he had a keen understanding of the sport. Tommy won against older rivals, before getting a new go-kart the next year. He went onto win a staggering 27 races that year, smashing a track record in a 50-lap race, after starting in 15th place.

Since then, Tommy, 14, has raced in different tracks and tougher competitions like the Dubbo Gold Cup, Todd Road championships and Port Macquarie, across NSW and Victoria, showing his undoubted class with eye-catching performances.

Tommy is now ready to race in Formula Four, the starting block for Formula One, his ultimate goal. He is confident, dedicated and focused on his goals.

He is coming off a phenomenal 2024 season where he won 37 races, two club championships, smashed two track records, while taking out his third Dubbo Gold Cup.

The biggest challenge when going to F4 would be learn everything and driving the car for the first time. Also, there are challenges like getting the money, training every day and just doing everything for the first time," he said.

"I feel I'm capable for the challenge because I've been waiting a long time to drive the car and I've been training and working hard to prepare."

Tommy has been training for months on the Formula One stimulator installed at his home. Formula 4 races involves a lot of travelling here and overseas which means Team Tommy needs sponsors and financial backing to make his dreams come true.

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SIR JAMES BURNS & BURNSIDE

At what was once the southern part of the Hills Shire stood "Gowan Brae" the home of Sir James Burns. The home still stands. Sir James migrated from Scotland to Queensland together with one of his brothers in 1862 and worked as a Jackaroo in the outback of that state for three years until he and his brother established a General store in Brisbane called "Burns & Scott", and soon after, also had stores at Gympie, One Mile Creek and Kilkivan.

After returning to Scotland in 1870 after the death of his father he then returned to Queensland in 1871 to establish a trading and shipping company based in Townsville - "Queensland Steam Shipping Company Ltd." After loaning Robert Philp enough money to become a partner in his enterprise the company then became Burns Philp, best known as island traders throughout the Pacific and the East Indies.

James Burns moved to New South Wales in the 1880s and resided at his home "Gowen Brae" at North Parramatta until his death in 1923. Sometime during 1909 he wrote the following to the Presbyterian Church.

"Understanding that your Church is desirous of forming a Presbyterian Boys' Home, where orphan and abandoned lads may be trained to become useful citizens, I am prepared to purchase and have transferred, free of all cost, the piece of land which has been shown to you, comprising forty-five acres of good agricultural land, in an elevated and suitable position near my own residence.

And should you accept this land, then it will be understood that a substantial building will be erected worthy of the district and position occupied, and I agree to make a donation of 500 [pounds] towards such a building and will otherwise assist as far as I possibly can."

This was the start of what was to become the Burnside Homes at North Parramatta. What prompted Burns to this idea was that whilst travelling from Katoomba to Sydney by train, he had been inspired by the buildings of orphanages, convents and homes that had been erected by the Catholic Church that he had seen from the railway. Whilst Burns had proposed a Boys home the Church thought that a home for boys and girls would be more appropriate.


The first of the Burnside Homes was "Blairgowrie" which opened on Saturday 17 June 1911. Over the years, more homes were erected and given Scottish names, and the site became like a little village with its own vegetable farm, dairy, gym nasium, swimming pool, and sports grounds. Eventually there were 13 homes.

Sir James Burns own home of "Gowan Brae" was situated across from the Burnside Homes. Sir James Burns did not want his name reflected in the property. However, the board, given the task of selecting a name for the property, decided on Burnside as a burn (Scottish for creek) ran through the grounds.

Burns continued to live at Gowan Brae until his death and was buried there in a family cemetery, which now lies within The King's Schools grounds. He left the property to his son, James, but suggested that, should James not need the property, it should be given to the (then) Burnside Presbyterian Orphans Homes. James honoured this request, and the property was donated.

Much of the land has since been sold or leased to other organisations, or as residential developments. The property immediately around Gowan Brae is now owned by The King's School, while sections of the property are now owned by the Redeemer Baptist School and Tara Anglican School for Girls, with some still owned by the Synod of New South Wales and the ACT of the Uniting Church in Australia for Burnside's own operations and the synod's activities such as the archives, Camden Library and the Uniting Theological College..

Kings School, the Tara Girls High School, Burnside Public School and the Redeemer Baptist School were either purchasers, or became occupiers, of a number of the Burnside properties particularly on the northern side of Pennant Hills Road.







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
