

## Men's Kitchen on THE MENU By Bev Jordan

Plans are underway to set up a Men's Kitchen in Castle Hill to teach older men basic cooking skills. The new venture in the Hills will be the latest set up by the Men's Kitchen charity to meet a growing need.

President of the Men's Kitchen Association Peter Watson said good nutrition and strong social connections are critical to promote longevity and good health.

"It has been proven that people live longer when they feel more connected. We are what we eat, so learning to cook and making new mates along the way is a win-win."

He said after retirement some men lose their sense of purpose, in some cases they lose their partners or for health reasons of their partner taking on the cooking for the household.



"In the Hills District, there are over 15,000 men aged 60 or more, many of whom have never ventured into the kitchen."

He helped start the first Men's kitchen in 2016 in Forestville to help his father who had never stepped into a kitchen before.

"My mother died when I was in my 20s and my father married again but his second wife died when he was in his 80s."

Peter started learning to cook at a carers class run by NSW Health but when that closed down five of the men and their instructor moved to Forestville.

The Men's Kitchen Peter realised the need for such classes when demand grew. And they were able to fill classes in just a couple of hours.

Each session runs from 11am to 2pm. Classes are up to 10 men who work together in pairs to prepare a two course-meal under the guidance of three experienced volunteer instructors. Everyone chooses the recipe they would like to prepare and once cooking is completed, everyone sits down together to chat and enjoy the meal.

There are now 22 Men's Kitchen groups (including Canberra and the Gold Coast)

operating with 200 men learning to cook and 100 instructors. Everyone involved is a volunteer.

Annual membership is \$40 which includes a personal apron and a cook book.

Peter has been recruiting locally to find volunteers to help run the Castle Hill Men's Kitchen at Wesley Uniting Church in Showground Rd Castle Hill with the aim of starting classes in September. The leadership team needs to be in place soon. It needs a district manager, a treasurer and an admin person to start with, then it needs six instructors. All will receive training and be mentored through the process.

Alison Johnson from Castle Hill is keen to volunteer. "I was looking for a voluntary role and something to do. I wanted to be part of something that was meaningful."

## OOO SERVICES .....

#### **SHOTS FIRED**

Investigations are underway after shots were fired at a home in Nangar Crescent, North Kellyville on Wednesday night (25th June), damaging the front door and windows. Two men and a woman in the home were uninjured.

Police from The Hills Police Area Command attended just after 11pm and established a crime scene. A short time later, emergency services were called to Watergum Close, Rouse Hill, to a suspicious car fire. Police believe the two incidents may be linked.

#### ARMED CYCLIST

A 28-year-old cyclist without a helmet is facing several charges after being stopped by police in Seven Hills Rd, Baulkham Hills at around 2.10am on 20th June. During a search, police allegedly found: a hammer attached to the bicycle, a replica pistol, a small bag containing what is believed to be methylamphetamine, a concealed knife, credit cards and documents not in his name, and an unregistered vehicle permit that did not belong to him. He was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station, and was charged with several offences, including:

- Possession of suspected stolen goods
- Possession of a prohibited drug
- Possession of a firearm/imitation firearm
- Custody of a knife in a public place
- Failure to wear a bicycle helmet
- Multiple counts of goods in custody



#### **UNIT FIRE**

Emergency services responded to a unit fire at Gerbera Place, Kellyville at around 4.10 pm on Tuesday 17th June. A 29-year-old man, the sole occupant, sustained significant burns to his hands and legs. He was assisted by neighbours and treated at the scene by NSW Ambulance paramedics before being airlifted to hospital. Two neighbours, a 50-year-old woman and a 53-year-old woman, were also treated for smoke inhalation and taken to hospital. The building was temporarily evacuated as a precaution. No other injuries were reported.

#### **MULTI-CAR CRASH**

An 18-year-old P-Plate driver was charged after crashing into two parked vehicles in Castle Hill on Saturday 21st June. Police responded to reports of a crash on Warwick Parade just after 1am, after a silver Mitsubishi ASX hit a Hyundai i30, before colliding with a Holden Colorado. Nearby residents, alerted by the noise, came outside to assist and contacted emergency services. The driver was subjected to a roadside breath test, which returned a positive result. His licence was suspended on the spot, and he was issued a Court Attendance Notice for mid-range drink driving.

#### **SPEEDING CHARGE**

A man with a suspended licence is due in court after he was caught speeding in Glenorie on Thursday 19th June. Hills Highway Patrol officers were conducting speed enforcement duties along Cattai Ridge Road at approximately 9.20am when they detected a white Toyota Land Cruiser travelling at 83km/h in a 60 km/h zone. The vehicle was stopped on Smith Lane, where police spoke to the 31-year-old driver. His NSW licence had been suspended following a separate offence on 19th April, in which he was allegedly clocked at more than 45 km/h over the limit on Old Northern Road in Dural.

#### **DRINK DRIVING**

A 46-year-old man was charged with mid-range drink driving after being stopped for a roadside breath test in Kellyville at around 9:25pm on Thursday 19th June. Hills Highway Patrol officers stopped a silver Mazda CX-5 on Windsor Road, Kellyville. He returned a positive result. At Castle Hill Police Station, a breath analysis recorded a reading of 0.081, over 3 times the legal limit. His driver licence was suspended immediately.

#### **LARGE BRAWL**

A father and son have been charged as inquiries continue into a brawl at a Castle Hill construction site on Tuesday (24th July) involving up to 50 people. Officers from The Hills Police Area Command were called to the site on Sexton Avenue about 7am but most had dispersed as police arrived.

NSW Ambulance paramedics treated two men - aged 43 and 55 - at the scene before they were taken to Westmead Hospital with minor injuries and were later released.

Following inquiries, two men, aged 22 and 44, were arrested after handing themselves in at Castle Hill Police Station on Wednesday (25th June).

Allegedly, the contractors had been fired from the Meriton building site on Friday and had returned on Monday morning. They left the scene before police arrived, but allegedly returned just before 7am on Tuesday, joined by supporters.

The father was charged with affray and stalking or intimidating intending to cause fear or physical harm. His son was charged with the same offences, as well as one count of common assault.

Castle Hill Police Commander Supt Naomi Moore called the incident "absolutely appalling" saying: "It blew my mind, if I'm honest. It's a residential street. There are families [who] live on that street, and to be awoken at 6.55am to that – it's not OK."Police are seeking to identify several other men who may be able to assist investigators and is urged to contact Castle Hill Police or Crime Stoppers: 1800 333 000 or nsw. crimestoppers.com.au Information is managed on a confidential basis.

## GROWING FOOD FOR WILDLIFE PROJECT

The Growing Food for Wildlife Project began when local wildlife carers approached The Hills Shire Council and asked if they may have some land where they could plant specific native species to grow for the special food needs of rescued wildlife whilst in the care of local wildlife rescue groups. The Community Environment Centre in Currie Avenue at Annangrove was already an ideal site with a well established native plants garden from which wildlife carers could collect suitable foods.

There was also some unutilised and available land nearby suitable for planting a range of additional suitable species that has now been developed for this purpose.

An enthusiastic, active volunteer community was already available which could help with advice, as well as help maintain the native plantings.

Some of the rescued wildlife. such as possums, can eat up to 2kgs of native foliage a day! However, they would probably only eat the fresh outer tips of any fresh green foliage provided. Nectarivorous birds also need to eat from flowering native plants whilst in care, so that they can easily recognise their natural food source when released. Collecting native foliage and greens for rescued wildlife is a huge job for busy wildlife carers! The planting plots at the Community Environment Centre contain specifically selected local native species that wildlife carers most need to help support them

to feed and care for our rescued local wildlife.

A group of dedicated Volunteers tend to these planting plots at monthly working bees,

then regularly harvest and donate available native foliage to wildlife carers who need it.
They continue to provide supplies for injured wildlife whilst bringing like-minded communities together in a much needed support activity.

## Lakeview Private Hospital Opens New Cancer Centre

A new Cancer Care & Infusion Centre has been officially opened by Lakeview Private Hospital on its third floor.

The unit was created so that patients can receive all their treatment in the one location, close to home.

Currently there are 40 chemotherapy patients on treatment. Lakeview treats breast and head and neck cancers. As well as chemotherapy, hormone and immunotherapy it also provides blood transfusions and infusions to treat bowel conditions such as Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis and blood and iron infusions.

The new centre facilitates collaborative care to create a sense of familiarity and trust for patients. The Multidisciplinary Cancer Care Team includes a range of oncologists, oncology nurses and specialist surgeons, plus pharmacological services. In addition, the hospital provides cancer and post surgery rehabilitation services through inpatient and day programs, facilitated by an experienced allied health team including physios, occupational therapists, a dietician, social worker and more.

Breast cancer Surgeon Professor Elisabeth Eder said: "When the hospital started 10 years ago we wanted this comprehensive service. It's important for women to see they have the whole package and that they will have support all the way through."

"This has been a vision at Lakeview to have everything under one roof to work together under the motto: Patients First."

Associate Professor James French said being able to get treatment all in one place was "the final piece of the puzzle." He said it is every breast surgeon's dream to be involved in a private and comprehensive breast cancer service. "This has been a huge collaborative effort and our patients are really going to benefit from this."

### **Burger Room Takes Top Prize in the**

"Ultimate Aussie Burger Challenge".

The search for Australia's most mouthwatering burger has come to a sizzling close, with Baulkham Hills' Burger Room crowned New South Wales' winner in the Ultimate Aussie Burger Challenge, hosted by dairy specialists Anchor Food Professionals.

The nationwide competition invited chefs to create a unique burger using two slices of Anchor Hi-Melt burger cheese, and entrants certainly delivered—offering up everything from nostalgic milk-bar creations topped with pineapple fritters and fried eggs, to rich indulgences loaded with triple bacon and blue cheese sauce.

But it was the Burger Room's owner Mark Bishara who stole the show with his winning creation: The Downunder—a gourmet tribute to the classic Aussie burger. Featuring a Wagyu beef patty topped with two slices of Anchor Hi-Melt cheese, house-made beetroot relish, a bold Vegemite aioli, pineapple, and a fried egg, all served on an Aussie potato bun sourced from Sydney's Urbun Bakery-it's a burger designed to celebrate Australian produce with a fresh twist.

"It's what you'd expect on an Aussie burger, but with our own twist," Bishara said. "Everything is Australian—from the potato bun to the Wagyu beef. We kept tweaking it until all the flavours worked in harmony."

Inspired by a trip to the U.S., Burger Room began as an homage to American-style burgers. But Bishara quickly realised that local ingredients could elevate the concept.

"I was satisfied with Martin's potato rolls which are used by Shake Shack in America, until I found these buns from Urbun Bakery" he explained. "The cheese also had to be just right—Anchor's Hi-Melt slices gave us that perfect melt over a smash patty without bubbling or sliding off. It holds its shape, melts evenly, and brings the whole burger together."

Youth Mental Health Forum

Hundreds of Hills teenagers have had the benefit of attending the annual Young Healthy Minds Forum organised by the Positive Vibes Foundation.

This year's event was the 10th and was hosted by the Santa Sophia Catholic College at the Gables. The event brought together 140 high school students from 10 schools, fostering an open dialogue on mental health. So far 1500 students from 20 schools have been through the program.

Sara Ladomatos, a passionate youth leader in the Hills, shared her journey with depression and anxiety, offering students valuable insights into dealing with mental health.

Facilitated by Burn Bright, the forum empowered students to develop initiatives aimed at improving mental health within their

schools. Through engaging discussions, students learned how to support themselves, friends, and families in times of need.

Attendees participated in a Q&A session with a panel of counsellors (Queenie Tran and Karen Hanzal from Kellyville Private Hospital, and Jessica Valvason from Santa Sophia) and explored exhibits from organisations such as Western Sydney Youth Mental Health, headspace, and Castle Hill

Hills Shire Mayor Dr Michelle Byrne emphasised the importance of mental health education, stating, "It's important to teach our young people about good mental health, what that looks like, as well as where to get help when they need it."

Chairman of the Positive Vibes Foundation Mario Rodrigues said: "Our Young Healthy Minds Forum encourages young people to speak openly about mental health, to ask questions and hear tips on how to have good mental health. Each school then shared initiatives that they would take back to their school community to improve student mental health. This creates

a ripple effect that impacts their families, friends and the community at large."

He also gave special thanks to Santa Sophia College and sponsors including Wayfinder Buyer's Agent, Castle Hill Rotary, Bankstown Sports Club, Kellyville Private Hospital, and Hills Shire Council, for their role in supporting the event's success.

Like most committed volunteers Haran Ramachandran is incredibly humble about his recent OAM in the King's Birthday Honours. The Castle Hill father of two was recognised for his service to the community through a range of organisations including the Hills-Kellyville Rotary Club.

He told the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News, "I was in disbelief—honoured that someone recognised what I do out of passion. This award isn't just for me; it's for everyone working to make life better. It's renewed my drive to keep serving—whether it's helping a girl stay in school or bringing clean water to families."

Haran is former Chair, International Service, and former President, Chair Rotary Foundation (Rotary Club and District 9685) and former Chair



Rotary Foundation Grants Sub-Committee. As well as being part of programs in Australia, including a project to provide a portanle OCT camera to the Westmead Children's Hospital Eye Unit, he has been project manager for several overseas projects under Rotary Australia World Community Service to Vietnam, Sri Lanka and India and also been involved in The Rotary Foundation Global Grant programs in India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Bolivia, Nigeria and Cambodia. He is currently the District Governor Nominee for Rotary (D9685) and outside Rotary is a volunteer at the Sydney Sri Ayyappa Swami Temple and other diaspora organizations.

Haran joined Hills-Kellyville Rotary Club in 2001 and joined the E-Club of Greater Sydney in 2023 due to work travel commitments.

While a Rotarian for a long time he became really active after recovering from a near-fatal accident.

In May 2009 Haran suffered full thickness burns to 55% of his body after a lawnmower accident one weekend. He was initially on life-support and while asked about turning it off his wife refused. Haran ended up in Concord Hospital's burns unit for seven months. Years of surgical procedures followed. His wife Ahsha became the main breadwinner while Rotary members drove the couple's two daughters to school and back and then drove Haran to medical appointments for nearly three years.



He said after the OAM was announced he and Ahsha "spent a quiet day reflecting on the gratitude we feel for the opportunity to give back a little of what we've received" followed by a family dinner with their daughters Shivaany and Theepiga and their partners.

In a Facebook post he said: "Sixteen years ago, the question facing my family wasn't about recovery — it was "Will he live, or should we prepare to say goodbye? In those darkest days, the Rotary family stood by me — not for days or weeks, but for nearly three years.

"They helped keep my family together, and they gave me the strength and hope I needed to heal. Rotary saved my life, and in return, it gave me a renewed purpose to serve others. This OAM recognition is not mine alone. It belongs to the extraordinary members of The Hills-Kellyville Rotary Club, and to the many Rotarians who wrapped their arms around me and my family when we needed it most."

For 4 days, up to 150 handlers with their sheepdogs will do their best to get three sheep around an obstacle course and into a pen with minimal loss of points.

Sheepdog trials have been held in Australia since the late 1800s with the first recorded around 1870. While trials have been held at the Hawkesbury Showgrounds before, the Sydney Sheepdog Club has been running trials in the Hawkesbury for 11 years.

Vickie Priestly, President of the Sydney Sheepdog Club said: "Our competitors and their dogs come from all over NSW and from varied backgrounds. You will see third generation farmers competing against office workers from the city. You will see Border Collies competing against Kelpies. You will see dogs under 12 months competing against dogs up to 12 years."

The Open Championship winner last year was Andrew Heath, a farmer from Molong, who is back again defending the title. Andrew travels each year with his son Robbie from Molong and they usually take home a few ribbons.

**CHRG and Heartbeat of Football Unite to Support Community Heart Health** 

The Heartbeat of Football Foundation is a notfor-profit organisation founded in early 2016 by Andy Paschalidis, following the tragic on-field death of his Forest Rangers FC teammate, Matt Richardson, who suffered a sudden cardiac arrest while playing over-35s football. Just two days later, Andy's close friend Peter Katholos witnessed a similar incident involving his own teammate. These heartbreaking events prompted the creation of the Foundation, with a mission to raise awareness of heart health and prevent further loss within the sporting community.

Heartbeat of Football is built on three core pillars:

- Awareness and Education
- Prevention
- Action

Through community engagement, testing clinics, and ongoing education, the Foundation is dedicated to promoting healthier hearts and saving lives, on and off the field.

One of the Foundation's main initiatives is its Heart Health Testing Days. These events give local sporting clubs the chance to offer free heart checks. Nurses from the Victor Chang Cardiac Research Institute test blood pressure,

cholesterol, and blood sugar levels, then provide advice on improving heart health and reducing risks.

The Foundation relies on community donations and government support to run these clinics. CHRG is a proud supporter of Heartbeat of Football through its ClubGRANTS program. In February 2024, CHRG hosted four free testing clinics across its venues. During these events, 120 heart health checks were completed, with 88 people advised to follow up with their doctor. A striking result was that 91% of participants didn't know their heart health numbers, showing how important these clinics are.

"On average around 62% of people we test for cholesterol, blood sugar and blood pressure have shown high numbers and been referred to go for further testing with their GP" says Andy Paschalidis, Founder of Heartbeat of Sport and Heartbeat of Football Founder. "These activations with the Castle Hill RSL Group are most timely given the dramatic rise in issues we are seeing in the broader Community in 2025"

CHRG will continue its support this July, hosting another four free clinics across its venues. Community members are encouraged to attend and take a simple step toward better heart health.



#### HARRIS FARM FAMILY OF DURAL

Pam Trimmer, Research Officer for Hills District Historical Society, and also Editor of the Hills Heritage News, a position that I also held more than a few decades ago, provided me with the following.

"The first Harris Farm Market was opened in 1971 in Villawood, Western Sydney, by David and Cathy Harris. It has since grown to 26 stores open in NSW. Harris Farm Markets has had its fair share of ups and downs throughout its 50 years. Like many entrepreneurs, David and Cathy, having seen their first shop's success, were keen to expand their business. However, due to their limited business experience at the time, they ended up expanding too quickly and going broke. To save the company, the family had to bring in private equity investors, who, in another turn of bad luck for the family, also became broke. So, they turned to the banks, but with high interest rates through borrowing from the banks, could have never succeeded. In the end, they had to sell stores and scale back to three stores. "(The Farmer Magazine Sept Oct 2023)

To supply their stores, they had land and accommodation next to the Round Corner Dural shopping centre on Stonelea Court, which was originally a Poultry venture by David's father. David's father installed their swimming pool as a means to have a constant supply of water, especially in the summer when the local water tanks proved unreliable. This site, originally an early grant of land to a convict, John Stone, was the beginnings of Harris Farm Market.

John Stone was an elusive character who, arriving in the colony on the "Glatton" in 1803, appears to have joined his ancestors while living in John Hillas' Jnr's hut near Taralga sometime

after the 1828 Census. He doesn't appear to have developed his grant, but a stone cottage was built on the site and obtained the name "Stonelea". It was incorporated into a later modern extension as part of the family home.

David Harris was quoted in the Farmer Magazine – "we were always very connected to the farming community. Right through the 70s we were living in Dural, and we market gardened the whole 25 acres—we had share farmers living on the farm with us so we really understood how it works" (Harris Farm Markets from The Farmer Magazine ..)

"When David Harris was 65-yearsold, in 2013, the question of who would take over as CEO became an important question for the company; at the time, three out of David and Cathy's five sons were working for Harris Farm Markets. Luke had been there the longest and joining the business back in 1995. Angus joined the family business in 2003 as the chief information officer. Tristan was the last to join the company, starting as a grocery buyer in 2006. When David called all of them into a meeting to discuss the company's future, David shocked them by announcing that they would become co-CEOs, a move predicted to be the beginning of the end. The brothers maintain that all three together have made the company stronger." The Farmer Magazine.

Family has always been at the heart of Harris Farm Markets, right from its inception 52 years ago when David approached his entrepreneurial father for career advice after he, and his then fiancée Cathy, graduated with a Commerce degree from university. "He gave me some criteria to think about, and I identified two target

industries: we'd either be fruit shop owners, or funeral directors," David says. "Neither of them had big players in them at the time, so the shop was a logical industry to go into." "My father, who was Italian, was horrified!" Cathy interjects. "He was like, "I sent my daughter to the

best schools, and

she's just graduated university – hello?!" Life in retirement is on their 500-hectare farm in the Megalong Valley, although David still keeps an eye on buying while Cathy watches marketing. Here they still grow their vegetables; practice regenerative cattle farming with their 500 head herd; breed cattle; and have facilities for breaking and training their 120+ Icelandic horses (one of the oldest and purest horse breeds in the world); and wish to promote responsible more sustainable upmarket tourism in the valley while protecting the flora and fauna.




