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HILLS WINTER SLEEP OUT 2025

Magi* is 61 and says she owes the fact that she has a roof over her head to Hills Community Aid's homeless prevention initiative.

She was living in supported housing when a storm damaged the building. "The roof had caved in. I was behind with my rent because I got sick and I had nowhere to go.

I was really scared."

With help from HCA her rent debt was paid off and a bond was paid for a new home where she says: "I am really happy".

The HCA homeless initiative is one of the two projects that will receive money raised at this year's Hills Winter Sleep Out on Saturday, August 2.

The Hills Winter Sleep Out asks people to raise money by giving up their warm beds for one night to sleep at Bella Vista Farm and gain an insight into being homeless.

Hills Shire Mayor Michelle Byrne who set up the first Hills Winter Sleep Out in 2014 said: "The funds raised from the Sleep Out have made an incredible difference in the lives of so many here in the Hills. People who were one pay cheque away from living in their car or on the streets have been helped, families facing severe financial crisis have been given assistance as well as women and children fleeing family and domestic violence."



Director of Hills Community Aid Mici Beer said that funds raised and distributed through HCA's Homeless Prevention Fund have made life-changing differences to people at risk of homelessness.

So far this year, 15 adults and 5 children have been supported including people leaving domestic violence situations and three people living with a disability.

Support has included help with bonds, rent, council rates/strata, and removalist costs.

Mici says: "Every grant is a chance to stop homelessness before it starts. These funds don't just pay bills-they protect dignity, restore hope, and keep families together."

Funds from the Sleepout will also support Transitional Community Housing.

TCH was set up by concerned volunteers who began lobbying for accommodation for older women at risk of homelessness 9 years ago.

They secured their first property 18 months ago in the Hills, the registered charity now has six houses and has provided homes or support to secure housing for 31 people including 12 older women and 18 dependants.

Kenthurst Rotarian and TCH director Dennis Van Someren said: "The Transitional Community Housing project has been our response to the deteriorating homelessness situation facing so many today in Sydney.

"We recognise that women over 55 are the fastest growing cohort of homeless. "Sleepout funds will go straight to the front line as TCH is a volunteer organisation. We subsidise the rent and look after property maintenance."

FISH SWALLOWED

Police are investigating a case of animal cruelty after a man allegedly consumed a live fish inside a Castle Hill pet store.

Officers from The Hills Police Area Command were called to the store on Victoria Ave ust after 12.15pm on Sunday, 6th July, following reports that a man had removed a fish from a display tank and eaten it in front of staff. It's believed the act was filmed for potential online sharing.

Following public tip-offs, the 20-year-old has since handed himself in and is now assisting police with their inquiries. Digital evidence is being examined as part of the ongoing investigation.

Authorities thanked the community for their assistance and urged anyone with further

information to contact Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000. Police also advised the public not to post information or allegations online to avoid disrupting the investigation.

SWITCHEROO

Two men are facing charges after allegedly swapping seats at a red light in an attempt to avoid a drink-driving offence in Rouse Hill.

Police observed suspicious behaviour at the intersection of Windsor Rd and Mile End Rd around 11.15pm on Sunday, 6th July.

The vehicle was stopped shortly after, and police discovered that the two occupants had swapped seats. The second driver underwent a breath test and allegedly returned a low-range PCA reading.

The original driver refused to undergo a breath analysis and was charged with refusing a breath Analysis.

DRINK DRIVING

A 45-year-old man has been charged with midrange drink driving following a late-night traffic stop in Castle Hill on Sunday, 29th June.

At around 11:20pm, police observed a silver Audi A4 travel straight through a right-turnonly lane at the intersection of Old Northern Road and Castle Hill Road. The vehicle was stopped shortly after and the driver underwent

ALARM WARNING

Residents are being urged to check they have a working smoke alarm following a fire in Newfoundland Way, Box Hill in the early hours of July 4th.

Police say occupants smelt smoke and rushed out of the house at 2.20am after being woken up by their smoke alarm and called emergency services. Six fire trucks attended with crews from Riverstone and Windsor Fire and Rescue NSW and RFS Brigades from Box Hill/Nelson, Kellyville, Windsor and Oakville. The fire was contained to the garage however the house suffered extensive smoke damage. Initial enquires suggest the fire was caused by a number of garden tool batteries that had been left charging overnight. Turn off chargers for garden tools, e-bikes, etc before going to bed.

LEARNER SUSPENDED

An 18-year-old learner rider has been issued several fines and had his licence suspended after being caught speeding more than twice the limit in Clarendon on Monday 30th June. Hawkesbury Highway Patrol recorded a green Kawasaki motorcycle travelling at 125km/h in a 60km/h zone along Racecourse Rd, overtaking several vehicles and crossing double unbroken lines before being stopped by police. Officers identified the motorcyclist as a local learner licence holder who was not displaying L plates at the time. He was issued penalty notices for exceeding the speed limit by over 45km/h (\$2959 fine and six demerit points), failing to display L plates (\$320 and two points), and crossing unbroken lines (\$320 and two points). The rider's licence has been suspended for six months, and the motorcycle's number plates were seized, with registration cancelled for three months.

a roadside breath test, which returned a positive result.

He was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station, where a subsequent breath analysis recorded a reading of 0.140. The man was issued a Court Attendance Notice and had his licence immediately suspended. The matter is now before the court.

SHOTS FIRED

An investigation is underway after shots were fired at a home in Kellyville.

Police were called to Janamba Avenue just after 3.10am on Tuesday, 8th July, following reports of gunfire. Officers from The Hills Police Area Command attended and established a crime scene, where they found damage to the front windows of the property.

A man and woman in their 30s, along with their two-year-old child, were inside the home at the time of the incident. Fortunately, no injuries were reported.

Shortly after, emergency services responded to a car fire on Gorman Avenue, Kellyville. Fire and Rescue NSW crews extinguished the blaze, but the vehicle was destroyed.

Police are treating the fire as suspicious and have commenced inquiries into both incidents, including whether they are linked. Investigations are continuing.

HOT PURSUIT

An 18-year-old man has been charged following a police pursuit through Kenthurst and Glenorie on Sunday, 29th June.

Around 11:55pm, officers from the Police Dog Unit spotted a Toyota Hilux speeding on Kenthurst Road. When they attempted to stop the vehicle for a random test, the driver allegedly accelerated and fled. A pursuit was initiated, with the Hilux reportedly reaching speeds of up to 120 km/h in a 70km/h zone. The vehicle travelled through Old Northern Road, Cranstons Road, Garmyn Road, and eventually turned into Sermelfi Drive, Glenorie, disappearing behind a property. Police attended the home linked to the vehicle and spoke with the driver's father. Shortly after, the 18-year-old presented himself to police and was arrested.

He was taken to The Hills Police Station, issued a licence suspension notice, and charged with police pursuit. The matter is scheduled to appear in court next month.



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The Base to Help First Responders BY BEV JORDAN

A new healing space dedicated to the care of First Responders, veterans and current serving defence personnel is set to open at Kellyville Private Hospital on Monday, July 21st.

The Base Ward is being opened in response to an ever-growing need for mental health support, tailored to the special needs of these personnel who experience a higher incidence of psychological consequence from exposure to trauma, when compared to the general population.

According to figures from the Black Dog Institute 1 in 10 first responders suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder and according to the Department of Veterans' Affairs, research indicates that the estimated rate of PTSD among current serving ADF personnel is 8%, rising to 17.7% among veterans. The rate in the general Australian population is estimated at 5.7%.

Staff in The Base Ward are dedicated to providing care that is trauma-informed, service aware with a recovery focus, to help first responders, veterans and current serving defence personnel struggling with posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD), alcohol and drug addiction and other mental health issues.

Aurora Health Care Australia runs Kellyville Private Hospital and also South Coast Private Hospital in Wollongong which has been a leading provider of mental health services for first responders, veterans and current serving defence personnel for the past five years.

Erin Ash, CEO of both hospitals said staff were thrilled to be able to extend the service to Kellyville Private Hospital.

"We know that recovery and healing is possible. However, the best patient outcomes are achieved through early intervention and rapid access to care. And this is one of the biggest challenges faced by first responders, veterans and defence personnel in seeking mental health care.

"We have seen some really positive outcomes from our first responder, veteran and defence patient cohort who have undergone our treatment programs at South Coast Private Hospital.

"By now offering this treatment program for first responders, veterans and defence personnel at Kellyville Private Hospital, we take a step towards closing this access gap potentially having an immense positive impact on someone who has dedicated so much of their life to serving others. "

The Base will have 13 bedrooms and offer a 3-week residential program to address mental health issues of PTSD and substance misuse/ dependence, with a 12-week outpatient program to provide continued support in the community. The Base also has the capacity to expand to 14 extra beds at a later stage.

Kellyville Private Hospital Clinical Program Coordinator Karen Hanzal says that having timely access to services is critical.

"There are other hospital services out there but not enough to both meet the demand and deliver a military and first responder specific culturally aware mental health program. The Base does this, by offering a safe and supportive space which facilitates connection – with self, peers, family, community - in collaboration with lived experience".

WISEMANS FERRY to Star in Film

The Hawkesbury region is set to take centre stage as Wisemans Ferry becomes the primary filming location for an upcoming Australian drama titled *Fireworks*.

Filming is expected to start in October this year and take four weeks.

Sydney-based producer Yolandi Franken (Streets of Colour, Carmen and Bolude) said: "We're genuinely excited to bring this story to life in Wisemans Ferry. The location adds realism and depth, and we're committed to engaging local suppliers and talent throughout the shoot."

Set over a single day, *Fireworks* follows two Iranian-born friends, Saman and Babak, who now live in Australia. Their reunion to celebrate their 20 years of friendship takes a dark and unexpected turn when a figure from their traumatic past reappears and long-buried memories resurface, forcing the pair into a tense moral reckoning.



The tightly woven, character-driven drama explores justice, loyalty and the lingering impact of trauma.

The cast of *Fireworks* includes Shayan Askari and Rina Mousavi, both of whom starred in the Sundance-winning film *Shayda* (2023), along with Baha Jamali and Maddie Jamali.

The creative team includes Iranian-Australian director Ali Vaziri, and writer-director Nick Bleszynski. Vaziri, a former political refugee, brings a deeply personal perspective to the project. The film draws inspiration from his experiences of escaping detention and resettling in Australia.

"Fireworks is not just a film for me – it's part of my story," he said. "It's about what it means to seek justice, rebuild a life, and reconcile with your past."

Yolandi says they have 75% of the finance needed for the film and will delay filming until they secure the rest.

She said post production will take several months once filming is finished. *Fireworks* will be doing festival circuit for a year and will then be in theatres and then on streaming platforms.

"We plan to do a special screening/premiere in your local area to thank and involve the community in what we all created together, " she said.

The production is expected to contribute to the local economy through accommodation,

catering, crew wages, and location hire. It also offers an opportunity to spotlight the Hawkesbury as a film-friendly region with potential for future screen projects.

HIDDEN IN THE HILLS DUCKS

Along many of the creeks flowing through local bushland reserves there are numerous ponds or deeper pools. Several water birds frequent the larger pools in search of food as well as establishing a secure nesting environment in thicker vegetation around the shoreline.

One such bird is the Pacific Black Duck (*Anas superciliosa*). Although it is found in suitable habitats throughout Australia, it is generally a wary bird when not accustomed to people. It can be solitary, but also gathers in pairs and small groups during the mating season. When breeding, mature ducks

pair off as they dabble along the edges of water courses searching for aquatic plants adjacent to their chosen nesting site.

This common species is characterised by a distinctive blue bill, black and white markings

on its head, with its neck and body being covered in dappled dark brown plumage. Other ducks that frequent bushland waterways are the Australian Wood Duck (*Chenonetta jubata*) and the Australian

Shellduck (*Tadorna tadornoides*). All three mostly prefer a hollow in a tree for nesting which is only a short distance above the ground in close

proximity to water. These three species may lay

up to 10 eggs each. The clutch leaves the nest very soon after birth. Both parents take seriously the

their family. The Australian Wood duck illustrated has a clutch of at least 13 chicks to look after.

When young, the new born ducklings are confined to the ground, and therefore are subject



to being eaten by stray cats and dogs. They naturally conceal themselves in long grass not far from the parent birds. They also have the ability to swim within a couple of days of hatching.

The Chestnut Teal (*Anas castanea*) illustrated has an injured left wing. When disturbed it swam to the cover of nearby reeds to hide.

Although not a duck, the migratory Eurasian Coot (*Fulica atra*) is frequently observed foraging along the fringes of more open water along with other water frequenting birds.

Self-Collect Cervical Screening. A Simple, Life Saving Test.

Every year in Australia, around 900 women are diagnosed with cervical cancer, and approximately 250 die from it.

Building a Better Community for the North West

Budgets aren't just numbers on a page - they're statements of priorities. In this year's New South Wales Budget, the Minns Labor Government has made it clear that the needs of our booming community are finally being listened to.

After 12 years of neglect by the former Liberal Government, this budget continues to deliver the funding needed to turn long-held ideas into reality. Add to that more funding for TAFE to train 23,000 new construction workers and targeted planning reform, and it's clear the Government isn't just planning for growth - it's building for it.

This budget proves you don't have to choose between economic responsibility and real outcomes for the community. In Riverstone, that means ideas are finally being funded, and the future is taking shape.

State Budget Delivers Little for Local Families

Last month, the NSW Labor Government handed down its 2025-26 Budget — and once again, it failed the people of The Hills.

Despite repeated calls and clear community need, there is still no funding for a much-needed new high school in our area.

Castle Hill High already has 51 demountable buildings – more than any other school in NSW – yet the government continues to ignore our calls for investment. While they've announced an upgrade for Excelsior Public School, construction won't even begin until mid-2026.

At the same time, this Budget offers no meaningful cost-of-living relief. Motor vehicle taxes are rising by 26% over the next four years. Stamp duty, payroll tax and land tax are all forecast to soar. There is no extension for toll relief beyond 1 January 2026. And working families are being asked to pay more — and get less in return.

Another glaring omission from this year's State Budget was the lack of funding to fix our increasingly congested roads — especially with the population booming in Box Hill, Rouse Hill, Schofields and Tallawong.

Annangrove Road is under serious strain. In the coming weeks, I'll be launching a petition calling for a long-overdue upgrade to ensure our community's needs aren't ignored any longer.

MEMORIES WITH IVOR JONES & FRIENDS RAILWAY TO ROGANS HILL & BEYOND

The first railway to operate in NSW was between Sydney and Parramatta in 1855. It was not long before other population centres were demanding rail transport to replace the existing horse drawn transport of carts and coaches. Orchardists in the Hills district were concerned that the fruit that was being transported overland to the river jetties on the Parramatta River at Ermington and Parramatta or to the new railway at Parramatta were prone to damage on the rough roads in the area.

With the building of the Northern rail line to Hornsby in the 1880s, railway stations were opened at Pennant Hills and Thornleigh with a goods yard at Thornleigh in 1886. However, in 1897 six residents from Pennant Hills formed a deputation to the Railway Commissioner to argue for a goods siding at Pennant Hills which was built the following year.

Whilst the Hornsby or Northern line assisted residents and orchardists in the eastern part of the Hills, and the western portion of the district was being assisted by the extension of the line with stations at Toongabbie, Seven Hills, and further, with the creation of the Hawkesbury branch line to Riverstone, Mulgrave, Windsor and Richmond, residents and orchardists in the remainder of the Hills felt overlooked.

A private railway was established in 1886 from Clyde to Rosehill, known as Bennett's Railway. In 1893

legislation was passed authorising the building of an additional railway line, Simpson's Railway, which was to run from Bennett's existing railway to Dural and to be built in three sections. The first section was to Carlingford, second to Rogan's Hill, and third to Dural. Only the first section was completed when both Bennett's and Simpson's Railways ran into financial difficulties. The State government then bought the private lines creating what was to become the Carlingford line.

In 1881, a deputation of property owners from the Hills met with the Minister for Public Works to urge for the construction of a light railway from Parramatta to Baulkham Hills, Castle Hill and Dural and as far as Pennant Hills. This was put forward again in 1884.

Fruit growers in the Hills decided to form a co-operative society to be called the Central Cumberland Co-operative Tramway and Fruit Packing Ltd. The idea was to construct and operate a tramway to run from Castle Hill to Parramatta Park gates where they would link up with the Redbank tramway which ran down George Street to the Parramatta River

at Camellia. The Co-operative also intended to purchase the Redbank tramway. The potential loss of freight for the Government-owned railways concerned the Government so much that in 1887 the Government decided to build and operate a tramway from Baulkham Hills to Parramatta, six years after the initial deputation.

The Baulkham Hills line opened on the 16th August 1902. Construction commenced in 1909 on an extension to Castle Hill which opened to the public on 1st August 1910 the line was extended to Rogan's Hill in 24th November 1924. Rogan's Hill had finally got a railway. The line had served initially as a tram line when first opened and as a railway when it closed on the 31st January 1932. It was not until June 1934 that the last of the tracks and platforms had been removed. You can still see signs of where the railway once stood. Model Farms Siding reserve between Folini Ave and Windsor Rd Northmead is one such location. Other indications are evident in street names such as Railway St, Baulkham Hills and Terminus St, Castle Hill.
